1. WILLIAM MILWEE/MILLWEE--b. 1752 d. 15 July 1840 m. Martha Taylor d/o John Taylor of Abbeville District SC.

Rev. Soldier, Pvt. South Carolina Line--Applied 21 October 1833 aged 80--South Carolinians in the Revolution pg. 30 by Sarah Sullivan Ervin. SC Revolutionary Pension No. W9200

William Milwee of Laurens Co., SC to Lewis Sherrill of Pendleton Co., 10 Feb. 1791 for L50, 300 acres on Big Beaver Dam Creek, branch of Rocky River, granted to Millwee 15 October 1784. Wit: James Houston, Samuel Houston. Anderson Co., SC (Pendleton) Conveyance Bk A pg 297-298

14 March 1792 of Washington District, SC--I William Millwee is justly indebted to James Millwee for L27 and 1 shilling with interest from 14 March 1792 to 1 Dec 1794 one negro girl named Mary, 5 years old security for debt. Anderson Co SC (Pendleton) Conveyance Bk C-D pg 217-218

Heirs of John Taylor 3 July 1811--John Taylor sold land on branch of 26 Mile Creek, including the place where on Milwee now lives to William Dunlap in trust for William Milwee and his wife Martha, during their lifetime and at their death to their sons, John Milwee, William Milwee, James Milwee, Samuel Milwee reserving to Elizabeth and Patsy Milwee, daughter of said William and Martha Milwee, a maintenance until they marry. Wit: Thomas Harrison and John Miller rec. 2 Dec. 1811. Anderson Co., SC Deed Bk A pg 225

Major William Milwee of Anderson District, SC departed this life the 15th of July, 4 minutes after 12 o'clock PM, aged 88 years. He was a citizen of SC at the commencement of the Revolution and a true friend to the cause of Liberty.

2. AARON GUYTON--born 27 Oct 1761 Baltimore County, Maryland died 30 June 1841. SC Rev. Pension No: W21237 BLWT.36605-160-55

Will of Aaron Guyton 14 Feb 1840 died by 17 Dec 1841 when widow Margaret asked that property to be sold as there was too much to maintain her--Issue: Polly Sherrill--Hannah Smith--Betsy Webb--Margaret Stelle--Sally Duckworth--Joseph Guyton to have land he lives on in Hall Co GA--Aaron W. Guyton--John W.--Robert and Guyton Guyton--Exors: 3 sons Robert--Aaron W. and John W.
Wit: Jas Wilson--Charles Irby--Thomas H. Garrett

3. JOHN WILSON--born 1755 died May 1849 aged 94 years buried Pickens Chapel, Anderson County, SC.
Rev. Soldier--Pvt. of Infantry and Cavalry North Carolina Line. Applied 17 May 1833 aged 78 years. South Carolinians in the Revolution pg. 30 by Sara Sullivan Ervin.

John Wilson, one of the commissioners for the town of Pendleton built in 1790 and named in honor of Judge Pendleton, a noted Virginia jurist of early times. The first court held in Pendleton was on 2 April 1790 by Magistrates Robert Anderson, John Wilson and William Halbert.

Wilson, Martha Durham, Betsey Gambrell and Nancy Sitton--All my children--Minerva Jane Copeland to receive equal share which I would have given to my deceased daughter Mary C. Copeland. Exors: Sons-in-law Reid Gambrell and John P. Sitton. Wit: John Watson Sr., R.E. Blassingame and Allen O. Merritt Sg: John Wilson.

4. SAMUEL WARREN--SC Rev. Pension No. BLWT. 1859-300.

Born 1760 d. 30 Nov 1841

Col. Samuel Warren was the son of Rev. Samuel Fenner Warren who officiated as the faithful pastor of old Eutaw Church for 31 years and died in 1789, buried in the church yard at the old Eutaw Church.

Col. Samuel Warren, his son, is buried in the same grave. He was born near the spot where his mortal remains repose, and at an early age was sent to England for his education, under the care of his uncle, John Warren, Bishop of Bangor, but when war ravaged his native state, his gallant spirit impelled him to fly to her rescue. At the age of 18, when leading his command against the British lines, he received a bullet in his leg, but supporting himself upon his sword until another struck him on the knee, and shattered the thigh bone, he fell, was taken up from the field in Savannah, his thigh was amputated, he survived and continued to perform staff duties in the army.

Served long in each branch of the Legislature, was made President of the Senate and was offered the appointment of Governor, which he declined. Late in life he removed to the district of Pendleton, and there died suddenly on the last day of December 1841 (should be November) in the 79th year of his age. He resided on the Three and Twenty Mile Creek below Pendleton Factory. He was a gentleman of considerable means and lived the life of a bachelor.

His household consisted of himself and Lydia Ann Perdreau, his ward and adopted daughter, whom he educated and reared most tenderly. This young lady married John Miller, a son of John Miller, the Englishman who was the editor and proprietor of "Millers Weekly Messenger" afterwards called the "Pendleton Messenger". Col. Warren gave all his property by will to Samuel Fenner Warren Miller, a son of the above first named John Miller. History of Old Pendleton District and Genealogy of Leading Families pg 31-33 by Col. Col. Samuel Warren died at his residence near the village of Pendleton, SC on the 30 November in the 81st year of his age, one of our Revolutionary Worthies. He lost a leg at the attack on Savannah. He served in both branches of the Legislature and was President of the Senate. Pendleton Messenger Issue: 3 Dec 1841

5. JOHN WARNOCK--born 1757 in Ireland no record of age though it was preserved in a family bible--To America in 1774--Applied for a pension 14 May 1833 in Anderson District, SC age 76.

William and Anne Lesley of Abbeville Co., SC to John Warnock of Pendleton Co. for L60, 200 acres on the waters of Great Rocky Creek, granted 15 October 1784 to John Warnock from William and Anne Lesley. Wit: John Miller, Robert Pickens, Robert Dowdle dated 30 April 1791. Anderson Co., SC (Pendleton) Conveyance Bk A pg 295-297

Will of John Warnock dated 22 Sept 1835 prov. 4 July 1842 wife Ellenor to have estate during her lifetime--Daughters: Jane, Margaret and Frances. Anderson Co SC Will Bk B pg 149-150

Estate of John Warnock Sr. dec'd--Sale 18 Nov 1842 (wife) Eleanor Warnock named as one of the buyers--Sale 16 Jan 1846.
