Seeking info on Powell BEELAND, supposedly the father of Sallie BEELAND who married BenjaminN BLASSINGAME. Benjamin and Sallie BEELAND BLASSINGAME died your of yellow fever on the same day in Greene Co., GA. Sallie had a brother Ben BEELAND who was guardian of a couple of the BLASSINGAME boys when they were orphaned.

Would also like info on the Prue BENSON and wife Mary BLASSINGAME married by 1810 when Mary, John and Thomas BLASSINGAME as heirs to William BLASSINGAME sell their interst in a slave "Dill" that this William left to his son William who died before reaching the age of majority. The death of the younger William left his share of slave "Dill" of the older William's estate to Mary, John, Thomas and James. James paid the other remaining heris of the older William each \$50.00 10 July 1810, but was not recorded until 1822. This was witnessed by Thomas FARMER and W.E. BLASSINGAME who was a son of General John BLASSINGAME who died Greenville, SC 1823. A James BLASSINGAME who died 1821 in Greenville Co., SC left a slave "Dill" in his will to one of his heirs. Trying to identify these BLASSINGAMES and also determine if Mary BLASSINGAME and Prue BENSON had children.

I want to recommend a book I believe is very relevent and important to everyone whose roots are Scotch Irish. "THE SCOTCH IRISH" a social History by Dr. James G. Leyburn PhD (deceased). Former Professor of Sociology, Washington and Lee University 1962 University of North Carolina Press. (recently reprinted) I found it through inter-library loan (South Carolina) This seems to be a scholarly, well done work. While it does not address genealogy issues per se, it provides valuable background. It addresses the Socio/cultural, political, religous and historical background of these people. It begins in 1600 with these people in their native Scotish Lowlands. Their immigration to Ulster beginnins in 1610, and to America beginning about 1714. It gives tremendous detail and background about why these events ocurred when they did. In America, it details the 700 mile crescent from Philadelphia, through Pennsylvania's Cumberland Valley, The Valley of Virginia, The Piedmont of the two Carolinas, to the Savannah River and Augusta. It details when the Scotch Irish arrived in each of these areas, and even more importantly, why. _____



Anthony STEWART and Elizabeth LEWIS were both born in the Keowee Valley of the Pendleton District in what is now Pickens County. Both had Grandfathers who had served in the Revolutionary War and had brought their families into the newly opened Indian land, Robert STEWART from Georgia and David LEWIS from North Carolina. Although no white families were in the area until about 1790, both families had been in the area many years when "Toney" and Elizabeth were married around 1829.

Toney had bought a farm in 1838 from his uncle, Abraham STEWART, near where Town Creek meets the Twelve Mile River. In 1850, this is the way the family looked in the census of the Eastern Division of the Pickens District:

In 1870 he and Elizabeth sold that farm to C.L. Hollingsworth and moved to Mr. HOLLINGSWORTH's farm on Toxaway Creek in Oconee County. Their youngest son and his family, Joab Franklin, moved with them. In 1877, Toney bought the farm from Mr. HOLLINGSWORTH where they had lived since 1870. Joab Franklin lived in the house that still stands by the big red barn. Toney's house was across the road.

Elizabeth died in 1884 and her body was carried about 20 miles back to Pickens to be buried at a church her father helped found, Mountain Grove Baptist Church.

Toney married Mrs. Ibby PITTS. Joab Franklin and his wife Harriett PERKINS had several children, but one, Joab Lewis "Tig", would live just a few yards up the hill and raise

his family there. Three generations of STEWARTS would raise their families along the Toxaway Creek.

Toney had a "stroke of paralysis" and died on 5 June 1894. The papers stated at his death, "He was born in Pickens county on January 21, 1810. He married Miss Elizabeth LEWIS in the 19th year of his age. They raised nine children living together until 1882, when she died. Mr. STEWART moved his family to Oconee in 1871, where he resided until his death. During all his long life he was noted for his thrift and industry, his strict integrity—being as strictly honest as mortal man is ever expected to be. The kindness of his heart and the hospitality of his home stands with scores of his friends today, as a lasting monument to his memory."

The 28 June 1894 issue of The People's Journal said, "Anthony STEWART died at his residence in Oconee County, S.C. the 5th (June). He was a resident of Pickens County until 1890 [sic]. Mr. STEWART leaves a brother."

Toney was buried maybe thirty or so yards from his house in deep woods in what is called the PERRY Cemetery. Three monuments are there-PERRY, STEWART, and HOLLINGSWORTH. Several other fieldstones are there. The PERRY is Nathaniel PERRY, the brother of Benjamin PERRY, governer of South Carolina during reconstruction. The graveyard is beside a stagecoach road on a hill overlooking Toxaway Creek. The mountain land is rather isolated and has forests, meadows, and streams and perhaps looks much like it did to Toney and Elizabeth as they moved to their new home in 1870.

Elizabeth LEWIS was the daughter of Jacob LEWIS and Aulsie LEONARD. Jacob was a farmer and a Preacher in Pickens County. He was pastor at Secona Baptist, one of the oldest churches in the area for 15 years until his death in 1838. He was instrumental in forming several other churches in the area including Mountain Grove where Elizabeth was buried in 1884. Elizabeth's grandfather, David LEWIS, was a Revolutionary War Soldier and is buried at Old Stone Church in Pendleton, S.C.

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The People's Journal of October 3, 1901 said, "Mrs. Rutha Ann STEPHENS, wife of L.D. STEPHENS, died at her home, Redmond, three miles west of Pickens, on the 26th of September, after a lingering illness, at the age of 52 years, and was buried the following day at Secona Cemetery, the funeral being conducted by Rev. J.M. STEWART, assisted by Rev. B.E. GRANDY. She had been, for twenty eight years, a consistant member of Concord Baptist Church, and at her death had reached the fulness of Christian womanhood, purified and strengthened through long and trying suffering. She leaves surviving her husband and nine children to mourn her death. Mrs. Stephens was a dutiful wife and a devoted mother whose taking off is a sore affliction to loved ones and a host of friends."

The 3 October 1901 issue of the Journal said, "Card of Thanks, to neighbors and friends for kindness during illness and death of wife. L.D. STEPHENS"

I am replying to Jessie Carr's comment in your April Newsletter asking for information on Ruth Ann Stewart Stephens. I am replying in hopes of learning more of her brothers and sisters who stayed in Pickens County.

Elias Earl Dillard, C.S.A. WARREN D. DILLARD served in Co. A, 1st SC Rifles and was a son of Tobias Gibson "Gip" Dillard (b. 1801) and Sarah "Sallie" Stephens Dillard (b. ca 1796 - d. April 1, 1892). W. F. DILLARD was killed during the Civil War. B. F. DILWORTH (1828-1901) served in a cavalry company commanded by Capt. John Westfield; he married Mary E. McAdams (1827-1895). ROBERT H. DILWORTH (1838-1904) was husband of Mary A. Dilworth, who received a widow's pension in 1930 FRANKLIN M. DODD (1842-1862) served in Orr's Rifles and died of measles in VA. GEORGE WASHINGTON DODD (1829-1898) joined Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, SC, in 1861 and served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers; he first married Elizabeth Amanda Hunnicutt (d. Nov. 14, 1870) and later married Ida Susan Compton (1862-1943). JAMES J. DODD served in 4th SC Volunteers and in a cavalry company. JOHN J. DODD enlisted at Pendleton, SC, on April 14, 1861, and served in 4th SC Volunteers. R. E. DODD received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee Co. W. FRANKLIN DODD (1835-1894) was husband of Sarah J. Dodd (18 37-1926), who received a widow's pension in Oconee Co. in 1902. WILLIAM P. DODD was born about 1839 and served in the Palmetto Sharpshooters; he was pardoned on April 9, 1865, at Appomattox Court House, VA. DODD (first name unknown), in 1902 Millie Dodd, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a pension in Oconee Co. HENRY DODGENS served in Co. G, 12th SC Infantry. ELIJAH DODGENS served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles and resided in Pumpkintown area of Pickens Co. WILLIAM R. DODSON (1824-1906) survived the war and resided in Rocky Bottom area of Pickens Co.; he was buried in the Powell-Alexander-Dodson Family JAMES H. DONAHUE (or DONAHOE) served in Moore's Rifles and in Ferguson's JOHN DONNALD (or Donald) served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regiment). WILLIAM M. DORSEY served in Co. L, 1st SC Rifles; on Dec. 29, 1899, a William Dorsey married Lizzie Mauldin of Central Twp. in Pickens Co. (Same man?). DOTSON (or DOBSON), in 1899, Mary Dotson, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a pension in Oconee Co. JAMES G. DOUTHIT served in Co. C, 4th SC Cavairy; in 1891, his daughter, Rebecca Douthit, married Samuel J. Pickle. JOHN DOWELL served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles and was killed in Virginia; his home was in the Pumpkintown area of Pickens Co. JOHN M. DOWIS (1834-1909) married Sarah Abbott; he lost a limb in the war and received a pension in 1902 in Oconee Co. BENJAMIN DOWNS (1832-1917) served in Co. A, 22nd Virginia Regt. and was buried in Westminister East View Cemetery in Oconee Co. DAVID THOMPSON DOYLE (1837-1864) was a son of James Alexander Doyle; he was killed Nov. 15, 1864, at Florence, AL. JAMES J. DOYLE served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles and moved to Texas after the war. WILLIAM H. DOYLE (1842-1915) was a 1st sergeant in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles; he surrendered to Union troops at Appomattox Court House, VA, in April 1865. BENJAMIN F DRIVER (1834-1921) was the husband of Letie E. Driver (1838-1913). DALLY (or Dolly) DRYMAN served in Co. F, 22nd SC Regt. and resided in Hurricane Twp. of Pickens Co. LEONARD DRYMAN was born about 1826 and was killed at Jackson, MS: he served in Co. F, Evans' Brigade, 22 SC Inf. LOUIS (or Lewis) DUCK served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles. WILLIAM M. DUCK died of disease at Morristown, TN; he served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles. JOHN WESLEY DUCKETT (1842-1916) was a son of James West "Jim" Duckett and Marcella Massingill Duckett. BEN W. DUCKWORTH (1845-1907) served in Co. A, 1st SC State Troops under Capt. James Long; he was buried at Enon Baptist Church. RUBEN L. DUFFIE (1840-1919) served in Co. I, 6th SC Volunteers; he became a minister and resided in Oconee Co. JAMES MARCUS DUKES served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers and was wounded in his left arm on July 21, 1861. HENRY MADISON DUKE born about 1839, he enlisted in Co. E, 4th SC Volunteers at Fair Play, SC. JOHN TYLER DUKE born about 1842, he enlisted in Co. E, 4th SC Volunteers; he was a son of James Duke (1804-1892) and Elizabeth Lavenia Duke (1812-1885).

At is thought that Elizabeth M. Sinith's ("Aunt Betsy") husband was named the name meant little to the family. Therefore all definite information regarding Sitas put she had been a widow for so many years before coming to Forest Hill that him has been lost.

There were nine children of Silas (?) and Elizabeth M. Smith but the names of three have been lost. They probably died in infancy. All were born in Pickens, S.C.

Billy (probably William) who was living in Texas about 1900. His family is unknown.

Malinda Jane Barton, daughter of John Milton and Sophia (Kytle) Barton, at was born in South Carolina, March 2, 1835. She married August 23, 1865, George Washington Alexander who was born in Henderson County, North Carolina, April 9, 1839 and died April 2, 1915. She died August 13, 1917. Both are buried at Cross Roads beside their many relatives and friends with whom they had worked and workinged when this country was young.

Unfortunately, nothing definitely is known of the early Alexanders, though the name is an old one throughout the Carolinas. George Alexander's childhood was spent apart from his people and he knew little about his immediate family. After his marriage, he left Hendersonville for a while and lived in Tennessee, but later returned to Carolina. During the Civil War he was a member of the 25th North Carolina Regiment.

He early joined the Cather's Creek Missionary Baptist Church in Transylvania County, North Carolina and he was ordained deacon there.

The family came to Forest Hill in 1881, the year that became known as the "bry year of the Locusts". With them came the Francis M. Barton family. There were seventeen in the party and they arrived unexpectedly at the William Barton home. Imagine the scurrying around to accomodate so many people in a very small log cabin.

Times were hard during those first years and, of course, money was scarce. They first lived in the old O'Brian cabin that was in the field below the later school, but the next year they removed to the George Knight place. Here George Alexander lad typhoid fever and nearly died. By the next year (1883) he was again strong and he homesteaded that portion of eastern Forest Itill still known as the "Old Alexander place" (A. Larsen farm). Here they built their log home and here they lived the rest of their lives, enjoying improved conditions year by year. For a while George was miller at old Dowler Mill, but he was a farmer at heart. The original home still stands in excellent condition, though it has undergone alterations.

They were among the founders of Forest Hill Church and he was deacon for many years. With his death, the church lost one of its most faithful supporters.

There were six children. Their youngest, Laura Jane, born in 1877 died the next year. The others came with their parents to Forest Hill. At the time Pink, the oldest, was tifteen and Dovie, the youngest was six.

COMPUTER AND ON-LINE CLASS by Herman Geschwind

Genealogy programs basically are specialized database programs. To satisfy the objectives of (1) speed, (2) safety and (3) storage efficiency program designers have the choice of many options. The result is that as far as internal structure and files systems are concerned, most genealogy programs are incompatible one from another. Thus, for instance, the dataset of Family Origins is incompatible from Brothers Keeper, and vice versa. Were it not for GEDCOM, the only way for users of these programs to exchange data would be to create print output from program A and to re-type the data from the print output into program B.

The drawbacks to such a limitation are obvious: time consuming and laborious keyboard work and the ever present danger of introducing errors.

The LDS [Mormon] Church about 15 years ago was faced by a similar dilemma. For religiousreasons for years the Church had solicited genealogical information, usually in the form of Group Sheets. In Salt Lake City these submissions had to be key-entered into their mainframe computer where the data where converted into micro-fiche output. A very labor-intensive and error-prone process.

When small computers first arrived on the market, the LDS Church saw a way to simplify this process. At a nominal fee the Church passed out a computer program called Personal Ancestry File or PAF for short which was easily adapted to run on many different small computers then on the market. One component of PAF was GEDCOM which stands for Genealogical Data COMmunications and Exchange.

It very quickly became obvious that GEDCOM offered possibilities of data exchange between otherwise incompatible programs and computer systems in addition to LDS submissions. Programmers adopted the LDS GEDCOM standard and at first offered GEDCOM as an extra-cost add-on utility to their programs [Roots III, Family Edge, etc,]. Presently GEDCOM import and export are a routine part of just about any genealogy program on the market.

What GEDCOM does is set up a standard way to output data and if the receiving program follows the standard, data and links to parents, children and spouse will be preserved. For example, Program A has a field called Surname and Program B for the same purpose has a field called Last Name. The GEDCOM standard defines a line with the tag NAME and other specifications such as number of characters, case, etc. Thus, Program A will write the data in Surname to the tag NAME and when Program B reads the tag NAME it will know that the information following the tag has to go into the Last Name field. This is a very simple illustration of the GEDCOM standard. Programs can vary widely in the information that can be entered and the GEDCOM specifications can accommodate a wide range of tags.

Once the GEDCOM concept was adopted by the genealogical research community, GEDCOM or GED files started to proliferate and networks [FIDO Net as an example] were organized to exchange GED files between interested parties. Today, there are large libraries of GED files on the Internet and the computer networks such as AOL, CompuServe, Prodigy and MSN.

When coming up with the GEDCOM format and standard, the LDS Church very wisely adopted a text format for the file with fixed line lengths of 79 mono-spaced characters followed by a carriage return and line feed [computer old timers will recognize this as a typical IBM punch card format of the "Do Not Fold, Staple or Mutilate" variety]. The advantage is that a file of this format can be written or read by many main-frame, mini and personal computers, regardless of make or operating system. Being a text file, it is possible to read or print a GED file but it is really meant for computer and not human consumption.

This record of the life and parentage of Benjamin Bristol Fagan, and his wife, Mary Smith Fagan and their children, is as nearly correct as the records I have, and trusting in part to my own memory and things that my Mother told me, will permit me to make it, and is for the information of their children and grandchildren.

Benjamin Bristol Fagan was born in North Carolina, March 12, 1812. His father's farm was located where Shelby, N.C. now stands. His father died while the children were quite small, there being six of them. Their mother, in those primitive days not being able to hold the place, it passed into other hands and the children received no benefit from it. His father was of Irish descent; his mother French, her maiden name being Mary Luquire. Benjamin was the oldest of the six and must have resembled his mother, he being of the brunette type, medium build, while his brother William was distinctly the type of the Irish, florid complexion, blue eyes and crisp curling hair. The names of the children were - Benjamin, John, William, Kattie, Lucinda and George.

There are many descendents in different parts of the country, but I only follow the line of my father. He went to South Carolina, when he grew to manhood, which at that time was the queen of the states to the south-land. He lived in Pickensville, now Easley, S.C. where he met and married Mary Smith. He was a carpenter by trade, also a farmer. He and his little family moved to Georgia in 1845(a new country) and settled in Forsyth County, first living in Cumming, the county seat, then bought a farm two miles out of town, where the welly lived for nineteen years, all the children being born there except the wooldest and one born in Marthasville in 1855. He sold the farm and moved to DeKalb County, Ga. when the youngest child was too small to remember. When Benjamin Fagan and his wife Mary moved to Georgia in 1845 there were no rail-road trains, so they moved in two horse wagons and were three weeks making the trip.

Mary Smith was born in South Carolina, daughter of James Smith; her mother having been Francis Smith before her marriage. Though of the same name they were not related. The grand parents on the paternal side were Hampton Smith and Susie Posey, both born in South Carolina about 1762. On her maternal side were Nicholas Smith and his wife who was Elizabeth Johnson, born in Virginia.

My mother's father, James Smith, was born in South Carolina in 1796, and died in Atlanta, Ga. in 1868. Her mother, Francis Smith was born in Virginia and died in 1883. They are both buried in Oakland Cemetery in Atlanta Ga. There were eight children born to this union, and I only give the names: Hampton, Bluford, Mary commonly called Polly, Betsey, Martha Jane called Patsey, Nancy, Vames and Terissa who was the last of the family and died in the summer of 1921, aged 84.

Benjamin Fagan and Mary Smith were married March 24, 1841 in Pickensville. Ten children were born to them, the oldest Francis Jane was born at January 9, 1842 in Pickensville, S.C. James Danelly Fagan was born at Pickensville, S.C. April 4, 1844. Martha Catherine Fagan was born in Forsyth County, Ga. January 1, 1847. Mary Elizabeth Fagan was born in Forsyth County, Ga. March 9, 1849. Nancy Amaltha Fagan was born in Forsyth County Ga. November 26, 1850. Alonzo Lafayette Fagan was born, I suppose in 1853 in Forsyth County, Ga. and died in infancy in Marthasville, now Atlanta. The family had left the old home and moved to the little town, living just opposite the little church(Wesley Chapel) which occupied the spot where the Candler Building now stands.

Terissa Rosalie Fagan was born in Marthasville June 18, 1855. She was married to William Nathun Sheridan October 27, 1875. Six children were born to this union - John Edgar, Benjamin Trammel, William Nathan, Jr., Laura Christine, Annie Cleo and Charles Smith. She is the only member of this large family whose circle remains unbroken, and as this mother has manifested in her life the power of the Christ to save and to keep, may she have an unbroken family in that home where there will be no good-byes.

Susan Asalée Fagan was born March 9, 1858; Alice Eveline Fagan was born June 10, 1862; Laura Bell Fagan was born December 9, 1864.

I want to say to the future generations that they lived consistent Christian lives, and were members of he Methodist Church, Mother Fagan being a member for sixty years. St. James Church, Atlanta, had its beginning in their home; after the last child married and left the home in 1884, and Father Fagan was too feeble to go to church Rev. John M. Bowden would come to the home and administer the Bacrament of the Lord's Supper to him, and then would hold services, and later when they had moved to the home of Rose Sheridan, their little home was used as a place to hold services. St. James Church was organized in 1886 from this small beginning, and many precious souls have been saved through her influence. Rev. C.M. Dunnaway found Jesus in sanctifying power while a member there, and has swung around this nation, a flaming evangel for Christ, but only eternity will tell the story. The children and grand children unto the fifth génération rise up to call them blessed, and as so many familiarly called them Uncle Ben and Aunt Polly have gone to their remard and their works will follow them.)

Benjamin B. Fagan died November 7, 1885 in Atlanta, Ga. Mary Smith Fagan died June 8, 1910 in Atlanta, Ga. They were buried in West View Cemetery, Section Pinewild, Lot 15, Atlanta, Ga. They died in the Christian Faith.
