Seeking Additional Information About the Following Men Who Fought in the U.S. Civil War, 1861-1865

B. F. BLASSINGAME, Lieutenant in Co. F, 1st SC Cavalry. JOHN C. BOGGS, served as 2nd sergeant, Co. F, 1st SC Cavalry. JAMES A. BOLDING, Co. F, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.)-pardoned at Appomattox, VA, in 1865. ISOM BOLT, born about 1840 and served in Co. F, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.)-wife: Mary C. McClure Bolt. LEWIS MARTIN BOLT, Co. K, 4th SC Vounteers (Sloan's Regt.). WILLIAM BOLT, attended the 19th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Sandy Springs in 1901. TYLER BOON, Corporal, Co. G, 12th SC Infantry-resided on headwaters of Keowee River. GEORGE W. BOROUGHS, Co. I, 4th SC Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) married Susan M. Parsons. **THOMAS** BOROUGHS, Co. G, 12th SC Infantry-killed at Sharpsburg. SAMUEL LELAND BOWDEN, Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment). EARLE BOWEN, Butler's Guards--- resided in Dacusville Township. WILLIAM REESE BOWEN, son of John and Elvira Hunt Bowen-moved to Missouri after the war. BOWEN, first name unknown-in 1888 Mary M. Bowen, widow of a Civil War veteran, was the recipient of a widow's pension. JOHN BOYD, (born about 1832-died 1876)---Was this John H. Boyd, son of Robert Boyd, Jr.? GEORGE BOYLE, Co. A, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.). CLEVE BRACEE (Brazie?), Co. H, 4th SC Cavalry--resided at Dacusville. MARTIN C. BRAMLLITE, son of Rutherford P. and Frances Bramlette, who moved to Pickens District from Laurens, SC, about 1840. LEWIS H. BRANDT, a German who resided in Walhalla, SC-wounded at Chancellorsville in 1863 and then discharged. JEREMIAH C. BRASSWELL, Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). JAMES W. BREAZEALE, Co. C, 4 SC Cavalry-he survived the Civil War. WILLIAM BRUCE BREAZEALE, pardoned by Union troops in 1865, he later moved to Texas (Dallas area). W. F. G. BREWER, died of disease at McPhersonville, VA. JIM BROCK, a resident of Dacusville, he was captured and killed by Union troops. JOSEPH C. "JOE" BROCK, died in 1862 from wounds---a son of William Orr Brock and Lucy Hannah Garvin Brock (?). JAMES A. BROOKS, killed at Spotsylvania. JOHN MURRAY BROOKS, Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) and was injured in a fall from a troop train in route to VA (Could this be John Brooks who was killed in 1876 by an explosion at a gin at Easley Station, SC?). JAMES BROOM, died of disease in a Confederate hospital---(note: There were two James Brooms in Pickens District during the Civil War; the father of one was Burrel Broom and the father of the other was Joseph Broom.). WILLIAM M. BROOM, resided in what is today Oconee County and married Anna Whitman (?). BROOM, first name unknown-in 1902 Elizabeth Broom widow of a Confederate veteran was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County. DANIEL P. BROWN, killed at Chancellorsville in May 1863-he was a resident of the western division of the Pickens District. NEWTON BROWN, died at Richmond, VA, during the war. ROBERT T. BROWN, Co. L. 1st SC Rifles. THOMAS BROWN, entered the CSA at age 42 years. TRAVIS BROWN, died of disease at Richmond, VA. WILLIAM SILAS BROWN, married Mary E. Pace---moved to Georgia after the war. A. E. BROWNE, attended the 1901 reunion of Orr's Rifles at Sandy Springs, SC. NEWTON JASPER BROWNING, Fort Hill Guards, Pendleton, SC.

W. F. BROWNING, Co. D, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). AUGUSTUS TALIAFERRO BROYLES. promoted from 1st lieutenant to captain in the CSA on Oct. 6, 1861. ABRAHAM C. BRUCE (1848-1932). resided in the Seneca area after the war. JAMES A. BRUCE (1841-1862), died at Richmond, VA. L. O. BRUCE, attended the 1916 reunion of Orr's Rifles at Seneca, SC. AUGUSTUS C. L. BRUCKE, German resident of Walhalla, SC, who joined the CSA at age 21. CHARLES BRUCKEY, pardoned at Appomattox, VA, in 1865. MENK BULWINKLE, German resident of Walhalla, SC, who was born about 1827 and served in Co. C, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.). F. W. BURDETTE, received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County. F. M. BURGESS, enlisted at Pickens Court House (Old Pickens on the Keowee River) on April 14, 1861. J. A. BURGESS, born about 1836, he enlisted in Co. B, 37th Virginia Cavalry on Apr. 15, 1862, in Richmond, VA-He was from Pickens District, SC. RILEY BURGESS, resided in the Dacusville area. LANE BURKETT, discharged from Orr's Rifles in Richmond, VA. THOMAS P. BURKETT, served as a 4th corporal in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). W.H. BURKETT, received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County. R. A. BURLEY (1834-1900, husband of Sarah K. Burley (1844-1933)--resided in Walhalla, SC. WILLIAM W. BURLEY (1847-1910), a resident of Walhalla, SC, and the husband of Eliza O. Keith Burley. ANDY BURNES, served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) . B. P. BURNS, died April 28, 1883, and was buried in Westminister, SC. CHRISTOPHER BURNS, served in Co. L, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.). JAMES R. BURNS, pardoned at Appomattox, VA, in April 1865. W. L. BURNS, his name was on the 1899 and 1909 Civil War pension lists in Oconee County. WILLIAM W. BURNSIDE (1844-1917), lost a limb as a result of a battle wound. BRIGHT BURREL! and BUTLER BURRELL, served in Co. F. 1st SC Cavalry. CECIL BURRELL, was buried in northern Georgia, somewhere between Walhalla, SC, and Highlands, NC. JAMES BURRELL (1839-1924), his wife, Martha Medlin Burrell (1851-1932), was the recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County. SAMUEL P. BURRELL, served in Co. F, 1st SC Cavalry. JOHN J. BURTON, killed in the First Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas) on July 21, 1861. W. J. N. BURTON, his name was on the 1909 list of recipients of Civil War pensions in Pickens County. BRIGHT A. BURTS, served as a 4th sergeant in Co. H. 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). JACOB BUSCH (1818-1899), born in Hanover, Germany, he entered the CSA at age 43 in Walhalla, SC. ALLEN BUTLER, served to the rank of 3rd lieutenant and was killed at Campbell's Station, Tenn. ELIHU C. BUTLER, born about 1831, his name was on the 1909 Civil War pension list in Oconee County. OBADIAH BUTLER, killed at the Battle of Fair Oaks (Seven Pines) in VA. H. BUTLER, killed at Kelley's Ford (was this Henry Butler, son of Susan Butler?). HENDERSON PICKENS BUTLER (1845-1875), married Martha Ann Leathers. WILLIAM HENRY BUTLER (1829-1893), served in Co. E, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.). SILAS BYNUM, died of disease at Richmond, VA. SAMUEL A. BYRD, (1836-1916), lost a limb as a result of a battle wound. ELBERT BYRD and RICHARD W. BYRD, served in Co. G, 12th SC Infantry.

- 6. Samuel b ca 1756 on Indian Creek, now Newberry Co. Samuel married Ann ???. Samuel died in August 1779 in confinement as prisoner of war by the British.
- 7. Henry born ca 1760 on Indian Creek. (Note by H.D. Hendricks: The following is incorrect.) Married Martha ??? He died after 1820 on the waters of Bush River, Newberry Co., SC. (Note: by H. D. Hendricks This Henry Hendricks married Martha Marbut was born 1787. He first bought land in Newberry area around 1807./8 He sold out and moved after 1817. The Marbut family records follow this trail. HDH's Henry Hendricks fit into this line. Henry was born 1760-1770 from census records. He shows with correct family profile no sons in the 1800 census of Newberry Co., SC. He appears in Pickens Co., SC shortly after David Hendricks m Sarah Major sells land in 1801 in Newberry Co., SC. In 1810 census, David, James and Henry are all living in close proximity in Pickens Co., SC. I believe this Henry to be a brother of David as he named his first child James, probably after Henry's father just as David did.

(It is extremely difficult to separate all the given name Hendricks in the upper state of SC prior to 1800.)

- 4. Moses born c 1718 in Philadelphia. He died on waters of Indian Creek near his brother Henry. Moses Hendricks died about 1760. It is not known who he married but he had at least one son Moses Jr. born c 10 May 1750 who married Sarah Glenn. Moses died 1836 in Pickens Co., SC. (- see Pickens Co., probate records for details.)
- 5. Isabell born c 1674 married c 1699 Thomas Harwood or Harrod. No more known.
- 6. Catherine born c 1674 married John Vanneman (Johannes Van Amend). Family is not traced.
- 7. Albertus Jr. born c 1679, married c 1702 Elizabeth? Evans? Albertus died in August 1732 in Pequea Township of Lancaster Co, PA.

1 Elizabeth born c 1704 married Carl Johns.

8. Tobias (last child) born c 1680 married c 1703 Catherine ???. Tobias died November 1739 in Pennsboro Twp., Lancaster Co. (Now Cumberland Co., PA.).

The following was sent to Avis by Kevin Adams of Seneca, SC: In the early 1800's a Mr ADAMS married a woman named Mary. Mr ADAMS first name and Mary's last name are unknown. They had 4 sons. Mr ADAMS must have died and his wife Mary took the 4 sons and was traveling through Oconee Co, SC near the Chauga River where she met a bachelor by the name of Mr William BARTON. She eventually married him but had no children by him.

Mr BARTON left his land to her and her 4 sons when he died in 1863. The land was near the Chauga River and Toxaway Creek area outside of Westminister on what is now N. Jenkins Bridge Road. John M. ADAMS and many of his descendants remained in this area. Jasper lived here for a while and then moved to Coffee Road outside Westminister where he raised a large family. Thomas Jerferson moved to the Unity Church area and many of his descendants are buried at Unity Baptist Church. Richard eventually left the area and went somewhere our West. Jasper, Thomas and Richard all fought in the Civil War for the South. Jasper and Thomas were injured.

- 23 Dec 1865: JOHN C. HAMILTON born 27 Sept 1831 and departed this life 28 April 1861 aged 29 years 5 months and 1 day. He died of pnemonia fever at Charleston, SC he belonged to the 22nd RegimentJCV and was a member of Co? he volunteered his services in the early part of the recent struggle between the Confederate and United States. He was a faithful and patriotic Soldier and we trust a faithful soldier of the Coss of Christ as his last christian walk and godly conversation when in our midst etc. The deceased has been a member of Enon for the last twelve years.
- 23 Dec 1865: L.P. WHITTEN born 27 Dec 1829 and volunteered as Soldier in the recent War between the United and Confederate States. He attached himself to the Hampton Ligion Co I CVS and faithfully discharged his duty giving satisfaction to his officers and honor to himself until his command was ordered from VA to the West in the fall of 63 being quite indusposed he gave out on a march and has not since been heard from consequently the time and particulars of his death cannot with any acuracy be given. The deceased had been for 12 years prior to his death a consistent and devoted member of the Enon Church. The Church is deploring their loss and sympathizing with his wife and tender offspring etc.
- 23 Dec 1865: WARREN HAMILTON born Aug 1835 and died at Ashland VA 12 April 1862 with Pneumonia Fever aged 26 years and about 8 months. He enlisted in the War between the Confederate and United States in the Hampton Legion Co D where he performed his duties of a Soldier undil his death. He was a member of the Enon Church for near 2 years and made public his profession of Christ on 9 Sept 1860.



Documents

- 1. Relaxing and flattening paper by humidification. Paper objects such as maps, posters, and documents that have been stored rolled for many years are often brittle. If these papers can be humidified first, unrolling is less apt to cause further breakfast or tearing. Paper is relaxed if moisture is added to it. Dampening a rolled or folded artifact by placing it in a humid environment for several hours will usually render it more flexible, at least as long as it remains damp.
- 2. If you are keeping records or making notations on your papers and photographs, use a soft lead pencil, rather than an ink pen, on the reverse side, as close to the outer margin as possible. Pressing hard will cause the writing point to emboss or distort the paper or emulsion. Inks may bleed through.
- 3. Do not repair your documents with scotch tape or glue. Most glues and all pressuresensitive tapes are highly acidic--that's why brown stains eventually develop on documents where tape has been applied.
- 4. Store your document flat when you can.
- 5. Keep your documents away from sunlight or fluorescent light--the darker your storage area the better. All visible light will eventually damage your documents; ultraviolet light will destroy them.
- 6. Do not wrap your documents with a rubber band. Over time, rubber will harden and bond to the paper. Removing a hardened rubber band can damage paper, and the rubber will usually leave a stain.
- 7. Do not use paper clips, straight pins, stapes, or other metal objects to bind documents together. Metal objects will eventually rust and destroy the documents you join this way.
- 9. Do not use wooden or ordinary cardboard boxes to store your valuable photographs and documents. Store these values in metal containers or acid-free boxes. Do not use cedar boxes.
- 10. Do not store your treasured photographs in the commercially-available scrapbooks that use plastic cover pages and adhesive-stripped backboards. They are deadly. So, too, are the old scrapbooks made with black construction paper.
- 11. Do not store your glass-based photographic materials flat, stacked, or in cardboard or wooden boxes. These glass-based materials require the specially designed vertical storage systems that are sold by vendors of conservation supplies.
- 12. Never open a daguerrotype or ambrotype to clean it. If you do, you will upset the balance of gases inside the seal and the image will deteriorate rapidly.
- 13. The readily-available plastic storage sheets for negatives and slides are usually unstable. They will decompose with a few years.
- 14. Oversize or embrittled materials and faded photographs are unlikely candidates for display-copy your original, frame the copy, then preserve your original in archival enclosures.

- Water colors, pastels, and unfaded photographs will endure only if you hang them for short periods--use them as part of a rotating display.
- 16. Do not dry mount or laminate any important document.
- 17. Use only wheat paste, methyl cellulose, or ethulose in the framing process. DO NOT use rubber cement, Elmer's glue, or even pressure sensitive tapes that are labeled "archival." ALL pressure sensitive tapes are acidic.
- 18. Mat your treasures ONLY on 100 percent museum board. And keep those with special value away from colored mats--the dyes are acidic.
- 19. Beware of "chip boards," cardboard, and wood. These are highly acidic and will mount an attack from behind.
- 20. Beware of foam core backing. Its paper lining is usually acidic and the core emit harmful gas as it deteriorates.
- 21. Beware of brown kraft paper.
- 22. Don't let the glass touch your documents, photographs, or works of art. If it does, your treasure will become damp when the humidity rises. Photographs will stick to glass when their gelatin emulsion is damp. Damp paper will attract mold.
- 23. If your treasure will be exposed to natural or florescent light: DDO cover it with plexiglass UF_3 to filter out the ultraviolet rays.
- 24. A metal frame is the frame of choice.
- 25. Do not place your treasure in direct sunlight or expose it to florescent lighting without the protection of an ultraviolet shield.
- 26. Choose an interior wall if you can. Objects placed on outside walls are more vulnerable to external changes in temperature and humidity and to the condensation that often forms in cold.
- 27. Keep them away from windows. Copy your FRAGILE treasure for display; DON'T hang the original.
- 28. Folding. Folding damages paper and is not recommended.
- 29. Scrapbook. Store in a acid-free box.
- 30. Labels. Self-adhering labels should be avoided as these often bear adhesives that stain so invasively they migrate into the folder. In addition, these pressure-sensitive adhesives often fall in time.
- 31. Map. Metal cases are much less damaging than those made of wood. Flat storage boxes with folders.
- 32. Temperature. Choose a shelf where temperature and relative humidity are constant. A bedroom or hall closet is a better choice than an attic or a basement. Temperatures above about 70 degrees and about 55-60% encourage mold and insects.

- 33. Mold Growth. The only sure way to stop mold growth is to get the item dry or frozen. Remember that mold likes four things: moisture, heat, poor air circulation, and dark. The first step in fighting mold growth is to get wet or damp material dry right away, it is best to freeze it. This will stabilize the material (mold will stop growing) until you have a chance to dry it. Unfortunately "quick cures" that you may have heard about (such as using lysol and bleaching objects) are often ineffective, especially where large-scale damage is involved. These measures may even cause additional damage to items or be toxic to people. Once moldy material is dry, take a soft, wide brush (such as a watercolor wash brush) and lightly brush the powdery mold off the surface of the item. Plan to brush off mold outdoors. An alternative is to vacuum the old (this should also be done outdoors), but DO NOT VACUUM THE ITEM DIRECTLY, since the suction can easily damage fragile materials.
- 34. Don't attach metal paper clips to book pages for any reason. They crimp and tear paper, and leave rust stains. Plastic clips are less damaging but should be used with discretion.
- 35. Avoid using elastic bands to hold together damaged books or piles of materials. Bands can dent covers and cause paper to tear and crumble. As they deteriorate, they give off damaging sulfur compounds. Use cotton string instead.
- 36. If you want your wedding pictures (or photos of any event) to last for your grandchildren, have the photographer take a roll of black-and-white photos. Video, color slides, and most color prints have a limited life-expectancy.
- 37. If you want to keep a clipping from the newspaper for a long term, have it photocopies onto buffered paper (e. g. Xerox XXV Century Bond or Howard Permalife). The copy will last far longer than the original.
- 38. Plastic enclosures made from POLYVINYL CHLORIDE (PVC) areunacceptable for archival photograph storage. This plastic is not chemically stable and will cause deterioration of a photograph over a period of time.

A HISTORY OF FAIRVIEW UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

The Methodist Church is a church where the Word of God is preached and the Sacraments are duly administered. It is a great Protestant body and had its beginning at a prayer service on Aldersgate Street in London, England on May 24, 1738, when John Wesley learned what Paul had discovered on the road to Damascus. Wesley did not plan to form a new church, but he wanted to preach the gospel to the needy, who were not being reached by the established church, so he did two things. (1) He adapted out-door preaching, and (2) He created a corpse of lay preachers, who gave all the time they could to preaching. They preached in vacant lots, on steps of buildings, or anywhere available and the Society, as it was called, grew and soon spread over England and into Ireland and other countries and soom came to America.

In 1776 a preacher from Ireland began to preach in New York. About the same time, another lay preacher from Ireland came to preach in Frederick County, Virginia. In 1768 Francis Asbury came to America and became a great leader of American Methodism. The Methodist movement grew. These lay preachers sought out homes and followed the tide of migration as it moved west. They organized societies, established "preaching places," and formed them into circuits, and by the close of the American Revolution, they became churches, when the Colonies were free.

In the history of Methodism two divisions occurred. In 1828 a group of earnest and godly persons by insistence on lay representation separated and became the Methodist Protestant Church. Fairview was organized from this branch.

The newly organized branch followed the way of the first church by sending out lay preachers. In the fall of 1832 two lay preachers came into this community and held a meeting in a brush arbor near Three and Twenty Creek and organized a Methodist Protestant Church. Meetings were held in the homes during the winter. In early spring the congregation met and built a meeting place on Mr. Billy Wilson's property, on the opposite side of the road from where the church now stands. It was built of logs with a rock chimney at one end, a ground floor and open shutters for windows.

There were sixteen charter members. The women and children were not counted as charter members.

This little building stood for many years after it was no longer used as a meeting place. At one time it was the dwelling place of Mr. Jesse Durham, who served as janitor for the church. In time it was rented to Mr. George Nalley who used it in which to store hay. One day, for some unknown reason, it burst into flames and burned.

After the church was organized it was put on a circuit and served by a circuit rider who only came at certain times. They didn't have preaching very often, yet they met regularly for class meetings and Bible study.

I only remember seeing one circuit rider, the Rev. Caleb Smith, an uncle of Mr. Wilmer Smith (Willie S. Brown's father) and that was after they had pastors for the church. I was very small, but I remember how he looked when he rode up in front of our door with his saddle and saddlebags on his horse. It was late in the afternoon on a cold, rainy day. He was on his way home to Westminster, S.C. and stopped by and spent the night with us. He died in Oconee County and is buried at a Fairview thur, hingar Senera, S.C.

In 1856 Mr. Billy Wilson said he would give land for a church and would give it upon the hill so they would have a fairer view. This statement gave the church the name Fairview. Mr. Wilson is buried in the cemetery here at Fairview.

This church stood on the left side of the present church on a part of what is now the cemetery. It was almost a square building, built of wood set upon rock pillars. The pulpit was built in one end of the church. It had a double door on one side, a door in the back and windows of glass.

ELMIRA PRISON: Taken from book, Elmira Prison written by Stephen T. Foster: Almost 25 persent of the 12,123 Confederate soldiers who entered the 40-acre prisoner of war camp at Elmira, NY, died. This death rate was more than double the average death rate in other Northern prison camps, and only 2 percent less than the death rate at the infamous Southern prison at Andersonville, GA. The deaths at Elmira were caused by diseases brought on by terrible living conditions and starvation, conditions deliberately caused by the vindictive, U.S. commissary-general of prisioners, Col. Union and our own county too, visions are becoming exceedingly scarce and we fear that many of our people will suffer greatly before the harvest season rolls around. Many of the families now in our county, from what we learn, have been without meat for weeks and but small allowance of bread. Many cattle and hogs are dying from hunger. A gentleman informs us who has just passed though Fannin and Union counties, that he scarcely passed a farm which did not give evidence of some decayed carcus, many of which he saw. Truly the times are becoming distressing.



Hamilton while residing in Guilford Co.. NC and was in the battles of Briar Creek, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse and Yorktown and in several skirmishes. Robert applied for pension that might have been due his father on 26 May 1854 while residing in Anderson District, SC aged about 73 years. Rev. Pension No. R11687

23 Dec 1865: JOHN ANDERSON HINTON born 30 April 1831 and departed this life at Petersburg VA 30 July 1864. He embrased religion in early life and united himself with Enon Church in July 1859 until his death of which we are unable to give the particulars as he has not been heard from since the memorable blow up or explosion at Petersburg VA. The sympathy of the Church is with the family.

23 Dec 1865: JOHN GILSTRAP son of Hardy and Caroline Gillstrap who was born. He was one of the first that responded to the call of his County to arms. He attached himself to the 4th Reg. SC Vol. and went with his command to Virginia where he remained a brave and Patriotic Soldier untill he received the fatel wound on the last days of June 1862 while engaged in the Seven days fight around Richmond where his body was left to moulder to its mother dust and his soul returned to God who gave it. He united with the Church of Christ at Enon July 1859.

23 Dec 1865: DANIEL PERKINS who departed this life after a painfull illness of pneumonia fever at Winchester VA 30 Sept 1862 aged 23 years and 4 months. He volenteered his services with the Hampton Legion Co D. He left home and friends on the 7 June 1861 to battle for the Writes of his Country. He had the misfortune to loose his parents while in childhood but was reared up by his (Pa's?) uncle and aunt, Felix and Casey Roggers. He professed faith in Christ on 14 Aug 1860 and on the 15 day of the same month was burried with him in Baptism at Enon Chruch.

25 Dec 1865: GEORGE W. BRADLEY born 29 July 1839 and departed this life 28 Oct 1865 aged 24 years 2 months and 30 days. He vollenteered his services in the Early part of the struggle between the United and Confederate States a member of the 2nd Reg of Riffels Co E. His promptness to duty and patriotic zeal gained him the position of orderely Sargent which he held with much honor to himself and command until his death. He was instantly killed in Battle near Look Out Mountain TN while contending for the rights of his Country and all that was near and dear to a Southern Patriot but he fell like a soldier, he fell at his post. He joined the Church of Christ at Enon and was baptized on the 1 saboth in Aug 1859. He was a kind neighbor a dutiful son and affectionate husband and a tender and loving father a kind brother. While the Church laments her loss let us drop a tear of sympathy with the family and pray that God may be a husband to his widowed companion and a father to his fatherless children.

25 Dec 1865: ABNER T. GRIFFIN born 29 Oct 1835 departed this life 4 July 1864 aged 28 years 8 months and 6 days. He volunteered on the 26 Dec 1861 with Calhoon Troops which was attached to the 4th SC Cavl Co C. His patriotic Zeal earned him the position of Orderly Sargent which he held until his death at Jacksons Hospital in Richmond VA after a protracted illness of 23 days of Chronic Diarreah where his remains now rest in the Symetery with many of his commrads who fell in the same cause and his soul retrived to God. Brother Griffin was not only a faithful officer and soldier but faithful to Christ. He pofessed Christ and was baptized in the State of Georgia on the 16 Oct 1858 was received by letter at Enon Chruch March 1859.

25 Dec 1865: CHARLES T. RICHARDSON born 7 May 1839 and departed this life 30 April 1864 aged 24 years 11 months and 23 days. He was a member of the Palmetto Sharp Shooters SC Vol Co I. He received a sevear wound on the 30 June 1862 while trying to rescue and administer to his brother. William who had just fell mortaley wounded they were both rescued and chorley (surely) succeeded in getting home where he had a mothers cear during his sevear illness before his wound was fulley well he took comsumption which soon told to his many friends that he must die but death was no furrer to him after biding kind friend forwell he told them he was going to meat his mainted father and brother who had just gone before him and fell asleep in Jesus. Brother Richardson was baptized at Big Creek Church in Anderson District. SC in the fall of 1853 was received by letter at Enon Charch Feb 1860.

25 Dec 1865: WILLIAM E.M. RICHARDSON son of Noah and Hester Richardson, was born on 13 Dec 1840 and departed this life 2 July 1862 aged 21 years 6 months and 19 days. He was a member of the Palmetto Sharp Shooters SC Vol Co I amongst the Brave there was noe braver among the good and kind. He fell in the bloom of youth far a way from home and kindred on the 30 June he received his fatal wound while engaged in the 7 days fight around Richmond VA which caused his death after two days severe suffering, but he fell like a soldier and a Christian he fell at his post, he was Baptized on 5 Aug 1860

- at Enon Chruch. The church mourns for the young brother and our deepest sympthany is with the widowed mother, brothers and sisters.
- 25 Dec 1865: WILLIAM F. McWHORTER son of James and Judy McWhorter, born 13 April 1844 and departed this life 23 Aug 1862 aged 18 years 4 months and 10 days. He was a member of the Hampton Legion Co D and while engaged on the 31st of May 1862 at the Battle of the Seven Pines he received a sevear wound which caused his death he died at home were he had the attention of a mother and kind friends it is said by his commerceds that he was a good soldier. He died in Honor to himself and his Country. He joined the Church at Enon on the 2 Aug 1860 and baptized on the 5 inst. The church sympathises with the widowed mother, brothers and sisters.
- 25 Dec 1865: M.D.L. HOWARD son of Joseph L and Ann Howard, born C Jan 1839 and departed this life 28 June 1862 aged 23 years 5 months and 22 days. He was amongst the 1st that volenteered his services a member of Hamptons Legion Co D and is said by his commander that he was a brave soldier good and agreeable companion in arms. He fell on the Battle field while engaged in the 7 days fight a round Richmond VA where he breathed his last and his sould returned to God who gave it. He united with the Enon Chruck 27 July and was baptised on 5 Aug 1860.
- 25 Dec 1865: NATHAN C. CARSON who departed this life at the Hospital in Richmond VA Sept 1864 aged about 20 years. He had bin a faithful soldier in the Hampton Legion Co D from the time that he entered until his death which in a few weeks of entrance suffering proved fatel but we learn from his kind visiting companions that he bore his afflictions with Christian patience etc. It was his misfortune or providence to loose both his parents when quite small and about the age of 13 he was taken in to the family and watch cear of Samuel A. Gary where he received a common education and religious training he was a quite and faithful obedient companion until his death. He was baptised at Enon Church in Aug 1860.
- 25 Dec 1865: SAMUEL I?J GARY Eldest son of Thomas R. and Elizabeth Cary who was born in Pickens District, SC on 3 May 1845 and died at Richmond VA on ? June 1862 aged 17 years 1 month and 4 days. He volunteered his services in the behalf of Southern Rights in the 16th year of his age. Connected himself with the Hampton Legion Rifle Co D commanded by Capt Smith of Anderson District, SC in which he bravely fought and fallently died. True to himself and idolized by his brother soldiers and the officials of the Hampton Legion and whilst manning a charge on the enemies battery in that memorable Battle known as the Seven Pines fight near Richmond he received a wound in his thigh that terminated in his death he suffered a few days and quietly and calmly fell asleep in Jesus in the month of August 1861. He joined Enon Church 27 and was baptised 29 by Rev John Ariail.
- 25 Dec 1865: THOMAS N. GARY only son of Samuel A and Lucinda Gary, who was born 3 Dec 1847 and departed this life 1 Jan 1865 aged 17 years and 28 days. Thomas was quite small at the commencement of the War between the United and Confederate States but as he grew up he often experienced a desire to join his youthful companions in this grate struggle. But his parents unwilling to give him up he being their only child he submitted and remained quietly at him until his age was called for which order he promptley obeyed and was organized with the 1st Reg SC Militia Co D his many friends gave him the position of LT in that command where he gave satisfaction until his death. His command left home the last days of Nov 1864 and ordered to the coast near Pocataliga where many of them soon sickened and died among that number was our much esteened young brother after about 8 days of extreem suffering with typhoid pneumonia he died at the 1st Lewisoons Hospital Charleston SC without a earthly friend except stangers to administer to his wants or to give him a word of comfort on his dying couch or to carry his dying words to his afflicted parents his friends and loved ones. His remains was intered in the Magnolia Cemetery was afterwards removed and brought home and intered at Enon Church Cemetery.

SC Disbanned 1969 Formed 6 March 1836 on land given by Leonard Towers, Josiah Perkins and James Johns Sr.--in 1851 Leonard Towers, James John Sr and Dr. T.S. Miller gave 4 acres of land for a church building and burial ground. It was this same year that the Church underwent regular organization by Rev. William McWhorter. Trustees named: Leonard Towers. Joseph Ryland Shelor and Ebenezer P. Verner. Architects were: William and Thomas Bibb with E.P. Verner as chairman. David and Lucinda are the first of a succeeding line of descendants of Grayson County Murphrees this Author being of the sixth generation.

CHESLEY CLARDY, born about 1837, a son of Dillard and Martha Clardy, he was discharged during the war. D. L. CLARDY, served in Co. E, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and died of disease while home on medical leave. WILLIAM CLARDY, served in Co. C, 4th SC Cavalry. CLARDY (given name unknown), in 1888 M. E. Clardy, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Pickens Co. ALFRED CLARK, b. ca 1818, he was discharged from Orr's Regt. because he was too old for military duty. H. H. CLARK (1835-1863), died during the war on Jan. 1, 1863. JAMES ALLEN CLARK, served to rank of 3rd sergeant in Co. B, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and married Lucretia Ann McJunkin, daughter of Daniel and Elender Douthit McJunkin. MOSES CLARK (1820-1886), served in Co. E, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). W. H. CLARK, served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). J. E. CLARKSON (1847-1910), buried in Mountain View Cemetery, Seneca, SC. WILLIAM C. CLAYTON, born about 1840 and served in Co. I, 4th SC Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.)---(Was he a son of Carter and Sarah Clayton?). E. A. (or H.) CLELAND (1831-1909), his name appeared on the 1909 list of Civil War pensioners in Oconee Co. JEREMIAH M. CLEMENTS (1838-1912), served in Co. K, 6th SC Regt. and was discharged at Appomattox, VA. WILLIAM T. (or E.) CLEVELAND, enlisted in Co. K, 2nd SC Regt. on July 10, 1861. PATRICK CLIFFORD, joined Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, SC, and served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteer's (Sloan's Regt.). ABNER L. CLINKSCALES, moved to Texas after the Civil War and came back to SC in 1921 to attend a reunion of Confederate veterans at Walhalla. ALEX E. CLINKSCALES (1841-1919), lost a limb during the war because of a battle wound. SILAS W. CLINKSCALES, served in Orr's Rifles and survived the war. CHARLES E. CLYDE, killed at Gettysburg, PA in July 1863; he was a brother of Joseph Benjamin Clyde, C.S.A. ANDREW A. COBB, served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and was discharged at Appomattox, VA. EPHRIAM COBB, JR., born about 1845, his name appeared on the 1930 Civil War pension list in Oconee Co. JOHN B. COBB, married Ara Adair and served in Co. D, 22nd SC Inf. JOHN C. COBB, served to rank of 1st lieutenant in Co. K, 12th SC Infantry and died of disease at Chickamauga, TN in 1862. RICHMOND S. COBB, died near Petersburg, VA. in 1864--his widow, Elizabeth Cobb, later married Thomas F. Riley. ROLAND COBB, married Ida M. Goodman and served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.). ROBERT COBB, wounded at Hanover Junction in 1864, after which his leg became stiff, forcing him to walk with a cane for the remainder of his life. ROBERT A. COBB, captured by Union troops and died at Point Lookout, MD in a prisoner-of-war camp. THOMAS WILLIAM COCHRAN, married Lula McWhorter and resided in Calhoun/Clemson area after the war. JOSEPH A. COFFEE, served in Orr's Rifles and died of disease at Winchester, VA.

I was told that Rev. John Burdine was the first pastor after the circuit riders, but I do not know how long he served as the pastor. Rev. W.T. Arnold, Rev. R.M. Pickens and Rev. John Griffin were pastors at one time. I do not know the order in which they served. The church roll recorded the Rev. M.E. McKissick as pastor in 1888. I do not know very much about these pastors except that which my grandfather, James E. Wyatt told me. The Rev. Pickens is buried in the Pickens Chapel Church cemetery. The Rev. John Griffin is buried at St. Paul. The Rev. John Burdine donated some land in Greenville, S.C. on the corner of Washington and Lloyd Streets for a Methodist Protestant Church. He is buried in the Pickens Chapel Church Cemetery.

I do not know when the Methodist Protestant Conference of South Carolina was formed, nor where any of the preachers who were sent by the South Carolina Conference were from, but in 1890 the roll was revised and a Rev. C.H. Whitaker was the pastor and in 1893 the Rev. J. W. Bailey. His wife died of typhoid fever and is buried in the cemetery here at Fairview. She is buried in the space between Ellen Johnson and her grandmother, Nancy Henderson, but there is no marker. I can remember when I was a child, cleaning and putting flowers on her grave.

A parsonage was built below the church. At that time the road was on the other side of the cemetery to what it is now, and the parsonage was on the opposite side of the road from the church. It was a four room house, built across county lines. Two rooms were built in Pickens County, a breeze way and two rooms in Anderson County. The Bailey's were the first to live in the parsonage. He was followed by Rev. Jimmie Cook. The Cooks did not have any children. The next pastor was the Rev. John Anderson. He was a very small man. His wife, named Banny, was a very large person. They were a very unusual couple. In 1899 the Rev. Stradford Newton came. He had a wife and five children. The youngest child was born in the parsonage and named for my mother, Nettie Mae.

Among my memories of the first church was attending the funeral of Mrs. George Hendricks. The Hendricks family lived where Mrs. V.T. (Mamie) Watson now lives. I also remember going to a love feast early one morning, the only one I ever attended. I have many memories of my childhood; among them the Children's Day and Easter programs I participated in, and the children I grew up with in Sunday School.

In 1900 we joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church along with three other churches in South Carolina, Liberty Hill, near Greer, S.C., Harmony, near Ware Shoals, S.C., and Yarborough Chapel, near Cross Anchor, S.C. We did not get a preacher that year until late in the spring when the Rev. S.W. Taylor, a young man just out of college, came and stayed until conference in November. In November of 1900 the Rev. W.R. Lowdermilk was sent as pastor to all four churches. He was a single man and when he was near enough he called our home his home aw y from home. He had a buggy and a spotted horse. It took him about a day to go from one church to the other. I remember when Cortez, the little son of J.C. (Bud) and Leila Henderson died. Rev. Lowdermilk was at Cross Anchor when he received the message. He got up and left before day and arrived at our house about noon. I was home from school, keeping the baby even though I was only nine years old. Mother and Father were at the Henderson's. I prepared dinner for him and made my first biscuits. He went onto the Henderson's home and commended me on my dinner. He stayed with us for four years. The third year he was here, he had his brother, Rev. E.G. Lowdermilk, to come and help him in a revival meeting. On Saturday morning he preached to the children and the next day I with several other children joined the church. The text of his sermon to the children was taken from The Song of Solomon, Second Chapter, Fifteenth Verse. The subject was "Little Foxes Have Sharp Teeth."

An amusing thing happened during this meeting. Miss Harbin, an old maid, was living in the parsonage. She came to church every night and brought her little dog with her. After taking her seat in a pew, she would arrange her skirt on the floor so the little dog could lay upon it. The doors in the church were always open and one night a large dog came into the church and up the aisle. The little dog ran out into the aisle barking at the big dog, my father, Robert Wyatt, took Mr. Bob Tripp's walking cane and ran the big dog out of the church. He then came back and picked up the little dog and threw it out the door. Mr. E.G. was standing in the pulpit saying, "let everybody be very prayerful and thoughtful." Mr. W.R. was sitting in the pulpit joining with the congregation laughing. Everyone was afraid Miss Harbin would not come to church again. She did, but did not bring her little dog again.

Mr. Lowdermilk stayed till the conference of 1904. He was married a few weeks before conference to Mrs. Jessie Richey Smith, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.O. Richey and the widow of Rev. Caleb Smith's son. She had two daughters, Ernestine and Clara Smith. The Lowdermilk's were married in the church, the only wedding in that church building.

At the conference of 1904, the Rev. H.L. Powell came with his wife and son. They resided at Cross Anchor and served all four churches. During his pastorate a house was built in Greenville, S.C. on some of the land given by the Burdines, Mr. Powell served until the conference of 1906.

At this conference the Rev. C.J. Edwards was sent to serve the South Carolina Churches. He was a single man when he came, but went back in June and married. They were the first family to live in the parsonage in Greenville and stayed until the conference of 1908, then Rev. C.C. Gerringer came. He was a single man and stayed only one year.

The Rev. C.H. Whitaker, his wife and four children came in 1909. Mrs. Whitaker was of the Lutheran faith and never attended church at Fairview. They stayed only one year.

In 1910 the Rev. W.A. Lamar was assigned to the charge. He lived at Cross Anchor the first two years and served all four churches. When the charge was divided into two charges he moved with his family to Easley. The parsonage in Greenville was rented and since he would rather live in Easley, they rented a house there for him. It was while he was here that we started observing Homecoming and Mother's Day on the first Sunday in May. We had preaching on the first and third Sunday. He stayed as our pastor till the conference of 1916. While he was here the new church was built.

In 1911 my father, Robert F. Wyatt, was the delegate to Annual Conference held in Ashboro, N.C. The church, where the conference was held, was built with the pulpit in the middle of one side and the front door in the corner of one end. He liked the church very much and came home interested in building a new church at Fairview, which was very much needed.

In the spring of 1912 the church was started. It was built mostly with donations of material and labor. The trees were donated and the men of the church went to the woods and cut and hauled them to the Henderson sawmill. The Hendersons sawed the lumber free of charge. The lumber that needed to be dressed was hauled to Easley to a plainer and then to the church. The carpenters began work in March. Since they were farmers they soon had to stop work and plant a crop. They worked only when it was too wet to work in the field, till their crops were layed by. By the first of August, however, they were ready to finish the inside. "Uncle Bobby" as he was called said they would dedicate the new church the third Sunday in September. Others said it could not be done, but they worked faithfully. On Monday after the second Sunday in September, they had it finished except for the pews. That morning, they met with their axes, saws and wagons and went down to a Mr. Rosemonds, who had given them some large trees. They began to cut and haul to the mill. As soon as the planks were sawed, they loaded them back on the wagons and carried them to be dressed. On Thursday morning, they began to put the pews together, although the lumber was green. Some thought they would have to make them over, but nothing was ever done to them and we are still using part of them in the balcony of the present church. Uncle Bobby was a very determined man. On Saturday morning he went to Easley and made arrangements to pay all the bills and on the third Sunday in September, September 15th, 1912 the church was dedicated. Ben Wyatt, his youngest son, took sick at the church that day and died the next Sunday, September 22nd. His was the first funeral held in this church.

The old church building was sold to Mr. George Nalley and torn down the next week. By this time most of the older members that were active in the old church had passed away. The ones I remember were Mr. Bob Tripp, who was superintendent of the Sunday School and his wife Mrs. Mattie, who played the organ when we had one. Mr. Theodore Smith, Mr. Jim Johnson and his wife Mary, Mr. Joe LaBoon, Mr. and Mrs. W.O. Richey, Mr. Ashley Smith, Aunt Sally Ann Smith and Charley, my grandparents James E. and Mary Wyatt, and Mr. and Mrs. Tilman Smith. The Smiths lived at the Rock Quarry,

Dear Linda,

I just received your February Newsletter. As always, I thoroughly enjoyed reading it and following up on several leads that interested me in this issue. Your continuation of the Zacheriah SMITH information had stories of Pickens County people that relocated to Bourbon, Missouri that immediately caught my attention. I wanted to relay some information to you for sharing with other interested researchers or as a follow-up in the newsletter.

My people are all Pickens County people from 1790 until today. The 1850 census had 53 of my great-grandparents (100%) in the Pickens District. The 1800 census was not quite 100% but very close. It has been fairly easy to trace my kinfolk back to 1800. Most are right there in the Keowee Valley - then and now! I therefore have enjoyed tracing some of my cousins as they left Pickens County to go make their fortunes in other parts of the nation. I have found that the cousins that left often traveled in family groups. I have also found that they often left trails of writings or photographs of Pickens, perhaps to remind themselves or their children of their roots. Tracing the wandering cousin therefore often leads not only to information about the cousin, but often to other cousins and sometimes to another view of Pickens.

Several years ago I began tracking Green STEPHENS, a brother of my great-grandfather Leonard Dison "Bud" STEPHENS. Green had moved to Bourbon, Missouri and made the Pickens papers when he returned near the turn of the century. He was in family gathering photographs. I wanted to know more of him and his family. Green had married a Pickens girl Rachel LEWIS, daughter of Jake and Catherine STEWART LEWIS. I soon found that other Pickens County people had also made the trip to Missouri starting in 1869 and ending about 1890.

I found many Pickens County descendants, and others, in the Bourbon area who had Pickens County information to share. The most interesting is a John S. McCormick, who now lives in California and is nearing 100 years of age. John taught school all his life, and to encourage his students to have an interest in history would interview elderly people in the community as a basis for class projects. In 1970, after retiring, he wrote a book called "Forest Hill and Vicinity". He has recently shared other information from his files.

Attached is some information on several Pickens County families that settled near Bourbon, Missouri:

- 1) Brothers Benjamin Franklin SMITH, Zacheriah H. SMITH and Rector SMITH and families, people talked of in your newsletter this month.
- 2) The Green and Rachel LEWIS STEPHENS family.
- 3) The Joanna SMITH STEPHENS family Joanne had lost her husband Samuel STEPHENS in the war.
- 4) Rachel LEWIS' brother James K. LEWIS and family her sister Mary Ann LEWIS, who had lost her husband John PORTER in the war.
- 5) John Rufus STEWART and family John was a son of Robert and Isabella TELFORD STEWART his wife was "Kitty" LEWIS, a daughter of Jim and Polly STEWART LEWIS.
- 6) There were also KINGS, BARTONS, HAMLINS, and ALEXANDER families from Greenville, Anderson and nearby North Carolina counties probably with connections to Pickens County.

I am also attaching a few of the general passages from his book about the "dark corner" of South Carolina that these people came from. You will notice a few errors, and perhaps a few embellishments, but I consider the work a wonderful glimpse into the life of Pickens County after the war. I hope you enjoy and feel free to share with others who might be interested.

THE CAROLINA IMMIGRATION: 1869-1890

Beginning with 1869 there came to Forest Hill a new people, so closely bound together by relationship and mutual interests that, by buying out and homesteading, they nearly replaced the older pioneers who were living here. Across the hills they came—poor indeed in wordly goods, having only the furnishings they hauled in their little ox carts, but no band ever surpassed them in faith and spirit and indominable will—to plant their homes and ideals in their newly chosen country. Forest Hill became a Caanan for this North and South colony and offered hope and hospitality for a people sickened with the memories of war. Led first by their Moses—the Moses of this countryside—James R. Hamlin, and shortly followed awaiting, like a congregation of old, to hear of the good report of the land.

All the immigration came from the "Dark Corner" where North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia corner and it was called "Dark" because few early records of any sort were kept. It is almost impossible to trace the history of a family that lived here for there were no tax records, no marriage records and not even a completely reliable census. /// The people were nicknamed "Tar-heels" and if you asked what a tar-heel was, the answer was, according to Mr. Ed. Hamlin, the kind of a heel the other fellow hasn't got.

The center of this region was Buncombe District of North Carolina, founded in 1791. It is the extreme tip of North Carolina, bounded by the Appalachtan Mountains to the West, by Rutherford and McDowell districts to the east, by Henderson County to the south, though this used to be a part of Buncombe. 121 The region was named for Edward Buncombe. James M. Smith was the first white settler and his cabin was where Ashville now stands. Henderson County was formed in 1838 and, since the immigation, two other counties, Polk and Transylvania, have been slabbed off Buncombe. The county is now generally called "Buncom" and it is still a large county and, in some ways and in some sections, is much like the immigration left it.

The forerunner of the immigration was Jerry King, who left South Carolina before the war. Strangely, he was a Union man and when he realized that if he remained in South Carolina it would mean taking up arms against the government, he removed to Arkansas. When Arkansas seceeded he came north to his brother-in-law, Con Hudson and family. He remained loyal all through the war and finally joined the militia at Rolla.

[1] Mr. Ed Hamlin explained this and I have since proved he knew what he was talking about. I have made several attempts to gather original fineage, but to no avail. Carolina history does not include any more than the organization of old Buncombe County and vicinity. We know the ancestors of this group must have been here for many generations but there is no record of their coming or leaving. Of all the families, only Father Hamlin, (Rev. J.R.) whose sense of values was always of the highest, left written data about the relationships. His papers served me as the principal source for the sketches that follow.

[2] This is the same Buncombe County whose representatives to Congress, in 1820, made a speech not too well accepted by his collegues. He defaintly insisted he was "just talking for Buncombe" and he thus added one of the best known Americanisms to our speech,

The rest of the Carolinaus remained in Carolina until after the war, most of then serving their states. Post-war conditions were so bad that they began considering a happier place to live. Hearing of the opportunities of Missouri through kerry King and others, the Rev. J.R. Hamlin and William Barton, both bother-in-laws of Jerry King, led the first group of seventeen to Forest Hill. They urived December 1869.

The most important groups who followed, meaning those who remained here, memaried, and helped build the community were:

The Smith families, particularly the Z. II. and B. F. families who arrived October of 1870. Several of their relatives came here, lived for a short while, and enturned to Carolina.

The third group was Aunt Joanna Stephens, her mother, her sons, (except Albert who had come with the Hamlins), and her brothers, Eben and Robert. They arrived January 1, 1871.

Ben Barton and Silas Smith came together in the spring of 1870. J.K. Lewis came alone in the summer of 1871.

The Green Stephens and J.R. Stewart families came together in the winter of

The J. W. King family did not arrive until February 12, 1881 as they had lived several years along the way.

George Alexander and Francis Barton Families came together in 1881.

John Gibson and Allen Pitts came together shortly after and Mrs. Mary Porter and her daughter, Eva, came just a little later.

The immigration closed with the arrival of the Ed Hamlin family from North (arolina in 1890)

The last of the immigrants came on the train, but all the earlier ones came in ox carts. The ox cart of the immigration days and before was a simpler and rougher affair than a wagon. It was built like a wagon, but had no springs. The axles were fifted with two iron straps, one on top and one on the bottom to prevent too much wear. At the end of these straps a key called a lynch pin, put through the axle, held on the wheel. The hub cap had not been invented. The entire load was pulled by the tongue that hooked onto a large wooden beam cut to fit the shoulders of the oxen. Hames made of bent hickory encircled the oxen's necks to hold the yolk in place. This served for bridle and harness. The oxen were shod with two thin iron plates made to fit each half-hoof.

Later hickory ribs were added to these carts to support canvas covers. This was the first step toward the much later famous covered wagons. Soon springs were added and the size of the bed increased. Some built their beds bowed so as to give extra space. Such developed into the prairie schooners because of their resemblance to the curve of a ship.

They traveled very slowly and it was usually preferable to walk along side rather than to ride. By the time of the immigration trails were well made, the travelers tried to make their camps at regular stops where there was water. At night one of the group was chosen as herder to watch. He had only to keep track of the leader, which was one of the older oxen that all the others seemed to recognize as their leader. When it was time to hitch up, the leader was caught and the rest followed. Oxen were very gentle and dependable and never hard to watch as they roamed only long enough to eat their fill and, as grass was plentiful, this was no problem.

STEPHENS, HONEA AND STEWART AND AFFILIATED FAMILIES OF

The Lewis family originated in France. They united with the Huegonot movement and, during the presecution, fled to England. From there various members of the family came to America. Geneologist have traced these families to Virginia where they became a numerous family. The English spelling of Lewis is a three brothers: Samuel, who settled in Wales. Green Stephens, son of Balus and Betty (Stewert) Stephens. This Stephens family lived next to the Lewis family in Pickins County, South Carolina.

Geen Stephen was born April 1849 on the old farm and was named for the town of Greenville, thirteen miles away. His family and that of "Aunt" Joanna Stephens were more distantly related than is usually supposed. Green Stephens and Jinn and Reed Stephens had the same great-grandfather, or in other words they were second-cousins, however, though his mother, Green Stephens was nephew of Aunt Joanna.

Betty (Stewart) Stephens was the daughter of Abraham Stewart of Pickins County, who had lived there even before the Revolutionary War. Grandmother Stewart lived to be one-hundred and five years old and often told her grand-children of hearing the cannons from the terrific battle of King's Mountain which was fought a short distance to the northeast of their home. "Uncle" Green Stephens remembered this little old lady very well and recalled making her a pair of house slippers from a squirrel's skin when he was a little boy.

Green and Rachel Stephens came to Forest Hill in the late fall of 1874. They came on the train, but after getting settled they drove back to South Carolina in a wagon for a visit. It took them four weeks to make the trip, but it remained a beautiful memory all their lives. They settled the present Schulze place and here they lived most of their lives, though they lived elsewhere in the community and finally retired to Bourbon where they enjoyed their last days amud friends without number.

Green Stephens' obituary was written by his son-in-law, C. O. Wainwright and his love and respect is reflected in a fine tribute which appeared in the Bourbon Standard:

Green Stephens' obituary:

"He had no enemies. This was the universal expression of the people concerning Mr. Stephens......What a tribute to come from his neighbors...... The gushing eloquence of Mark Anthony over the body of Ceaser contained no such a tribute as this..... The world is better for his having lived.... His memory will be revered and his personality will live after him....

Originally from Carolina, the family was swept westward on the tide of immigration and settled near Forest Hill nearly a century ago.... He has been a citizen of Bourbon for more than thirty years and his rugged honesty and friendly counsel rises like a white shaft from his grave....."

[Gran Mary Ann Lewis, born in South Carolina; died in Summerville, Missouri, and is buried there. She married when quite young John Porter, of Pickens County South Carolina. He was killed in the Civil War. Jake Lewis reared his family. Of the Porter children, three came to Eurest Hill: Nancy Tosie and Bushon.

Nancy Porter, always called "Nanny", married John Gibson, (one record says James). After several years residence in Forest Hill, the family removed to the state of Texas.



He was an officer of Militia from 1775 and led a partisan corps when the British overran the state. He defeated a superior force at Kettle Creek with 400 men where his horse was killed under him while covering the retreat at Stono. At Cowpens he rallied the militia for which service Congress gave him a sword. He forced the surrender of the Fort at Augusta and led a Brigade at Eutaw Springs, an expedition against the Cherokee Indians and was in Pyles Defeat. He became a Brigadier-General in 1795. State Legislature from 1801 to 1812. He obtained from the Cherokee Indians a part of the Northwestern Territory by the Treaty of Hopewell. During the period 1778-1810 in VA there is found only one John Major who is not accounted for by VA records. This is the John Major of Henry Co., VA. Since John Perry Major, son of John Major who married Elizabeth? Rebecca or ? was born in 1775, so he says in the 1850 census of Anderson Co., SC. This would leave a period of about 3 years to account for another John Major. If another John Major existed he cannot at this time be accounted for in records of VA during 1778-1810. Prior to this period or time, say 1740-1770 there are a number of John Major men that are not accounted for in VA Records. However no records exist elsewhere of where they went that have been found to date.

near Liberty, S.C. and came regularly on preaching Sundays. Their daughter, Mrs. Nannie Kennemore and her husband, Mr. George and their two children also lived near the Rock Quarry. They walked to church every Sunday that we had preaching, a distance of about nine miles. They were faithful members. I can't remember all of them but most are buried here in the cemetery.

Rev. Lamar left in 1916. Following him was the Rev. T.E. Martin. His family consisted of his wife and five children. They did not want to live in town, so they rented the Mullinax place on Highway Eight. He only had the two churches, Fairview and Liberty Hill, so he farmed as a second job. He liked farm life and outdoor work so well, he didn't take work any more. Instead he moved to the mountains and ran a sawmill, later moving down near Columbia, S.C.

Mr. Lamar and Mr. Martin were both great revivalist and held at least two meetings a year at both churches. The Rev. Sam Haynes from Atlanta came up and held several meetings. Dr. George Brown, Rev. N.G. Bethea, Rev. Bates and several others from the North Carolina Conference came and held meetings. We enjoyed Dr. Brown very much. He took such unusual subject for his sermons. One I remember was, The Bed Too Short, The Cover Too Narrow, Isaiah 28:20. They were all good preachers.

In 1919 the Rev. J.L. Trollinger served as pastor. At conference in 1920, Rev. C.C. Linley was assigned as pastor. He was single and made his home with Herbert and Eunice Ellison. He was a good worker and did a wonderful work with the young people. The young people's organization was known as The Christian Endeavor. At times more than one hundred people were present for the meetings.

Rev. George Reynolds served as pastor in 1922. He lived in High Point, N.C. and came back and forth on the train. He owned his own home and had two daughters in school there, so he did not want to move.

Rev. G.C. Baker was sent to us in 1923. He had a second wife, two children by the first wife and two by the second. They resided in Greer. We at Fairview never saw his family. It was believed that they were in dire financial circumstances and in need of clothes to wear to church. Mrs. Ola Jones (Aunt Ola) went over to see them and found the report to be true. The Ladies Aid Society raised funds, bought material and made Mrs. Baker and the two girls two complete outfits and bought pants and shirts for the two boys. The Liberty Hill people bought shoes for the entire family and sweaters for the two boys, before they departed for conference.

At the conference of 1924, the Rev. E.G. Lowdermilk and his wife came and stayed with us until January of 1926, when he resigned to become Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home in High Point, N.C.

In February the Rev. R.G. Koons came down for a try-out. He was not a member of the conference. Some of the members liked him and some did not. His family consisted of his wife and three children and they too resided in Greer. Rev. Koons was a great musician. He played a harp, beat a drum with his foot, and picked a guitar all at the same time. Mrs. Koons took sick and was very ill for several weeks and died in August of 1927. She was brought to Fairview for burial. After her death Rev. Koons carried his children to the Children's Home in High Point, N.C. Later he married a young girl and when the conference turned him down they came back to Easley to live. His wife left him and he took his children and went to Tennessee.

The next pastor was a single man, the Rev. H.G. Crutchfield. Mr. Crutchfield did a lot of visiting, walking every place he went. While he was with us Clarence Watson, the little son of Marshall and Pearl Watson, passed away. He conducted and sang at his funeral. Mr. Crutchfield's health was not very good while he was here so he did not take work the next year, instead he entered a T.B. Sanitorium and lived only a short time afterwards.

At the conference of 1928 the Rev. G.B. Ferree was assigned as our pastor. He, his wife and five children lived in Easley and served Fairview and Liberty Hill. While Mr. Ferree was our pastor there were several families of the Methodist Protestant (a)th living in Greenville. During this time they had a minister from Concord, N.C. to come and hold a tent meeting and rapping a church in Greenville. The meeting was a success. Seventy five members were added. They planned to take over the Burking property and build a church on the corner of Washington and Lloyd Streets. Mr. W.T. (Bill) Watson went over and obtained a court order to stop the procedure of taking over the property. Our delegate to conference in 1929 was Mr. League Davis from the Liberty Hill Church. Ruth (Mrs. J. Lee Poole) was the delegate from Greenville. I also went to conference and to set Bertha who was in college at High Point. The conference was held in Greensboro, N.C. As we were going to conference Mr. Davis asked me about the petition being sent to conference from Fairview. I had not seen or heard about a petition, reather had my father. The next day at conference Dr. Taylor, President of the Conference, sent for me and showed me the petition stated that they would not support the church in anyway if they recognized the church in Greenville. He asked me if I knew the men who signed it. I told him that I did and that they would do what they said. I was very disappointed to the men who signed it. I told him that I did and that they would do what they said. I was very disappointed to the next few days as they would send preachers to talk with me about the work.

A Mr. Russell, who had come into conference from the Presbyterian Church agreed to take the work. He was to preach at Liberty Hill one Sunday and one Sunday night, at Fairview on the first and third Sundays. Liberty Hill gave the Greenville Church one Sunday and one Sunday night and they would also have prayer meeting on Wednesday night. Mr. Russell came and lived in Greenville, but came over every first and third Sunday to preach and every Wednesday to visit. He was one of the best preachers and most consecrated men I ever knew but he received no cooperation at Fairview.

Rev. M. C. Henderson was sent to be our pastor in 1930. He also lived in Greenville and stayed until the conference of 1932. He was followed by Rev. J.L. Love who came and stayed one year. He and his family resided in Easley.

From the conference of 1934 Rev. Robert Short was sent to us. He and his family also lived in Easley. On July 6, 1934 he performed the marrige ceremony of my daughter Helen to Knox B. Lamar of Burlington, N.C. Mr. Short stayed until the conference of 1935.

While he was here the Greenville property was sold and the money dividied between the Liberty Hill Church and Fairview. At this time Mrs. Emily Hendrix Jameson gave the church a house and some land for a parsonage. The house was located on Highway Eight, where Mrs. Ruby Hunt now lives. The money from the sale of the Greenville property was used to remodel the house and our next pastor, the Rev. R.L. Vickery lived there. He was the father of the Rev. T.H. Vickery and the Rev. Robert Vickery, who became members of the South Carolina Conference.

While Mr. Vickery was our pastor six Sunday School rooms were added to the church. They were built with donations of labor and material. Mr. Dan Foster served as foreman.

Dr. T.M. Johnson came in 1936. He was the last pastor we had from the North Carolina Conference. His wife was deceased and his three children of age so he didn't need the parsonage. It was rented. The parsonage was made to the church as long as it was used as a parsonage, then it was to go to Mrs. Ethel Nalley (Mrs. T.B.). After it was rented it burned. There was no insurance, so the church lost the land and the money it received from the Greenville property.

In the meantime unification came into being and was voted upon. The church was somewhat divided again. Though Fairview voted almost unanimously against it, it passed and went into effect in 1940. Dr. Johnson stayed on and served Fairview and Liberty Hill until the conference of 1941.

Dr. Johnson made his home, while he was here, with Mr. and Mrs. T.B. Nalley and family. He did a wonderful work while he was here. He was never idle. He set the water oaks and kept them watered, which now shade the front of the church. He visited not only his members but the poor and unchurched as well. He was always at Sunday School for the devotional and taught a Sunday School class most every Sunday. In his honor one of our present classes bears his name. He matried Bertha and Alvin Maw on June 19, 1938. He was very good to my father, Robert F. Wyatt during his illness and last days on earth and when he passed away conducted his funeral on September 27, 1939.

Our connection with the Liberty Hill Church lasted one hundred and eight years and connected several families in the two churches. J. Lee Poole married Ruth Wyatt on April 18, 1906. Albert Foster married Ernestine Compton, June 5, 1917. Henry Nalley married Edith McClimons, July 7, 1918. Arthur Nalley, their son, married Esther Compton, June 17, 1940.

The year 1941 was a very trying one for us. It was so confusing trying to get accustomed to the change brought about by unification. Everything was different. In the Methodist Protestant Church we stood for communion. There was no official board. We had trustees to take care of the buildings and stewards to take care of the finances. The stewards each had a list of members which they visited at least four times a year. Among those serving so faithfully in this capacity were J. Wilmer Smith, Marshall Watson, J. Newton Henderson and my father. When his health began to fail I was elected in his place. Mrs. T.J. Watson (Ruth) was also elected about the same time. I had an unusually long route to cover. I went to Liberty on to Pickens, through the Cedar Rock section of the county to Dacusville and back to Easley and generally collected \$12.50 a trip. The ones who came regularly to church turned their contributions over to the chairman of the Board of Stewards, he in turn, turned it over to the pastor on salary. All elections were held in church conference and all church members over eighteen years of age were allowed to vote. Most of the members were farmers and all other assessments were paid in the fall of the year.

We were placed on the North Easley Charge in 1941-42 and the Rev. T.D. George was our pastor. The Charge consited of the Glenwood Mill, Antioch and Dacusville churches. Our services were cut to one service a month and we didn't see much of the preacher who lived at Glenwood. Some of our oldest and most faithful members were still upset over unification.

In 1943 the Rev. T.D. Moore served this charge. He resided in Easley. Soon after getting settled in he had a very serious heart attack and was not able to preach. We had substitutes for the rest of the year.

We were taken off the North Easley Charge in 1944 and placed with Liberty. Our pastor was the Rev. W.W. Pendleton. He was with us only a few months, then resigned and went into service. He was a young man with a wife and two small children. In service he served as a chaplain in the army and was stationed in California. He lived only a few months after going into service.

Rev. Voight O. Taylor came and finished the year of 1944 and stayed until the conference of 1947. During his pastorate it was decided to remodel the church. The plan was to raise the church and put a basement under it for Sunday School rooms. The plan didn't work out, so it was decided to start a building fund for a new church. Rev. Taylor did a good work while he was pastor. The membership increased greatly. Among those united in marriage by Rev. Taylor were Annie Lou Pepper and Milton David Able on January 7, 1944; Fannynett Freeman and Luther Powell, June 14, 1944 and Sara Henderson and Ralph P. Barnett, June 27, 1945.

Rev. C.D. Goodwin came in 1947 and stayed only one year. Rev. J.L. Carter came in 1948, Rev. Glenn Smith came in November of 1949 and served until December 31, 1951. These pastors lived in the Liberty parsonage as we were still on the charge with Liberty.

Mr. Smith resigned at Fairview and we were placed on the North Easley Charge again and the Rev. J.L. Frazier became our pastor. 

Her family had moved from Fairfield Co., SC to AL and them to Mississippi. She was d/o Rev. Reuben MASON 1878-1863(s/o Rev. John MASON d. 1803 and Mary MASON 1768-1824) and Nancy WATSON 1808-1840 (d/o William Alexander WATSON and Elizabeth____1778-1857.

Probate Court Estate Partition of 3 Feb 1876 list his children and the state they were located but not the city or town. No wife was listed. Three minor children: Benjamin, Martha and Eliza were with older siblings in NC and GA.

Other children were: Andrew J., William F., Joseph W., Mary C. Dodson HARRIS, Jane DURHAM, Rebecca McKINNEY. Andrew J. COTHRAN was the only sibling living in Pickens. Another daugher, Mahala Cothran SUTTLES, wife of Isaac SUTTLES of Westminster, Oconee Co., SC, was my G-Grandmother. She died in Oconee about 1915 and is buried either at Holly Springs or Unity Baptist Church (unmarked). They were parents of seven children.

Thompson W. TOLLESON had possession of part of this property at this time, having bought it from William F. COTHRAN when he moved to Georgia earlier in 1871. TOLLESON was also residing on the part he had supposedly bought. The Probate Court ordered this land sold and money from sale divided among the children to settle this litigation.

Does anyone have information on this COTHRAN family and descendants? Where were they located in Georgia and North Carolina? Who was their Mother, when did she die and where was she buried?

Pickens Sentinel 3 Feb 1876: Pickens County Probate Court advertised this Partition of the estate of Samuel W. COTHRAN who died intestate listing all of his children.

Samuel Woodson COTHRAN was listed in April Newsletter as a Confederate Solider enlisting in Orr's Rifles at the age of 40 on 27 June 1862. He died 20 July 1862 at Gaines Mill, Virginia. Is he the same Samuel W. COTHRAN? Why was the estate not settled until much later?

I was discharged from service at Appomattox on the 9 April 1865 at that time a member of Co D Hamptons Legion. I was born 18 April 1837 and reside at Liberty RR 2 in Pickens Co., SC. Both hips broken can't walk 82 years old. 10 April 1919 Sg: J.L. Hendricks. Wit by: L.L. Taylor of Co D Hamptons Legion and H.D. Boggs of Co D Hamptons Legion.

EDLY HENDRICKS: I am the widow of Edly Hendricks who enlisted in Co B 2nd SC Rifles under Jenkins Brigade, Capt Phillpotts on ? and served until 9 April 1865 when discharged at Appomatox CH VA. I was married to him 1860. I am 88 years old My husband died 1865. I reside at Dacusville S.C., Pickens Co., SC Sg: Millie Hendricks X. Wit by: Robert Stewart of Co B SC Rifles and D.H. Cassell of Co H 2nd SC Rifles.

M.T. HOGAN: I am the widow of M.T. Hogan who enlisted in Co. F. Orr's Rifles under B.F. Martin on May 1861. He was discharged at Greensboro NC 26 Apr 1865. 

COMPUTER AND ON-LINE CLASS

So many of you do not know a lot about computers and need help with the simple things. Herman Geschwind has agreed to give us at least 1 to 2 pages each newsletter to simplify these computer terms. If you have questions that you would like to ask, please E-mail me: LGCheek@Aol.Com and I will compile, in the Newsletter, Herman's reply. This will eliminate so many people asking the same questions to Herman over and over.

File Names, File Types and File Extensions

PC computers normally use the so-called eight-plus-three file designation. That is a <File Name -eight characters ><Separator - a period><File Extension - three characters>.

Windows 95 introduced the concept of "long file names" where a file name could be up to 252 characters long. Since this is limited to Win95 users and Win95 programs, for the time being it is best to stick with the 8.3 system for compatibility reasons. [Win95 will support both systems]

File names can be anything the user finds helpful, except that it should not contain blanks and punctuation marks. The eight characters limitation hurts if you want to save a Kennemore or Childress file, so judicious abbreviations are in order.

The purpose of the File Extension [three characters preceded by a period] is to identify the type of file being saved. More on this later. Some program will append the correct file extension by default during a save [MS Word documents with the extension .DOC, Word Perfect 6.1 documents as .WPD, some genealogy programs will append .GED to a GEDCOM file] but this is not normally a given. The user should take care that the file has the proper extension. For instance, Genealogy programs are very particular in requiring the .GED extension before they will accept a file for import.

There can be many files types and extensions, some are more common and of interest to the genealogist. Here is a list of the more common file types and extensions:

.ZIP [binary] designates a compressed archive of one or more files. Since it is a binary [machine language] file it cannot be viewed with a normal editor or WP program. The file or files need to be "extracted" [decompressed] before they can be used by other programs. Commonly used extraction programs are PKUNZIP, WinZIP and PKZIP.

.GED [ASCII] a Genealogy Interchange file which can be used to move genealogical information from one genealogy program to another. Useful for loading files into a different program on the same computer [upgrading], exchanging information with others users, and even swapping PC data with Macintosh or Atari users [via a communications link].

.TXT [ASCII] the most basic type of document file. No fancy formats or fonts. Monospaced characters of 12 point size, typically 78 characters per line followed by a carriage return and line feed. Advantage: Can be read - viewed - printed by most word processing programs or text editor. As a last resort, a .TXT file can be viewed by giving the following command at the DOS prompt: TYPE *.TXT|MORE, or dumped to the printer by giving the DOS command COPY *.TXT PRN.

.RTF [ASCII] a much more sophisticated document file. Allows many typographical enhancements and fonts. Line length can be variable since it will support proportionally spaced fonts. Not usable by simple text editors. Many more advanced word processing programs will import/convert RTF files [MS Word, MS Write, MS Works, MS Wordpad, Word Perfect]. Developed by IBM in the 1980's as a successor to TXT.

- .DOC [Binary] is the default document file type for MS Word. Supports all typographical enhancements and fonts, extensive support for embedded graphics and photographs. Not very compatible even within different versions of MS Word. Word Perfect can import/convert .DOC files but the conversion may be less than perfect.
- .WPD [Binary] the default type for Word Perfect 6.X and later. Capabilities similar to MS Word .DOC. MS Word can import/convert .WPD files but conversion may not preserve all document attributes.
- .FTM [Binary] These are data files created by Family Tree Maker. Some of these have been uploaded by Family Tree Maker users in the mistaken belief that they were creating GEDCOM files. .FTM files can be used by Family Tree Maker users only!!!
- .EXE [Binary] Designates a program file. Double-clicking on an .EXE file will "run" the program.
- .COM [Binary] Another variation on a program file. See above.
- .BAT [ASCII] Stands for Batch File. Commonly used to load program start-up defaults. Can be viewed or edited by means of any editor or word processing program. Best left alone unless you are absolutely sure of what you are doing.
- .INI [ASCII] Initialization files. Fancier term for .BAT files. Same caveats apply.
- .GIF [Binary] .GIF is to graphics files what .TXT is to document files: the lowest common denominator of a graphics file. Used a lot on the Internet.
- .PCX [Binary] another common type of graphics [picture] file.
- .BMP [Binary] yet another common type of graphics file.
- .HTM [ASCII] Used on the Internet to "paint" a WEB page to the user screen.
- .TMP [ASCII or Binary] Temporary files created by programs usually in a directory called C:\Temp, or C:\TMP, or C:\Windows\Temp. .TMP files are very much like certain taxes for a limited purpose only but with a tendency to persist forever. .TMP files are good material for periodic housecleaning to regain badly needed disk space. After boot-up just about any .TMP file will be fair game for deletion [Win95 users don't forget to empty the Recyle Bin].

Note: [Binary] as a file type means all file characters are in computer language. Trying to TYPE a binary file will only show funny characters at the screen. [ASCII] means that the file characters are in normal, readable type - BUT only .TXT files are meant for human consumption - all other ASCII files are primarily for internal computer or program use only.

EZRA CROMER (1847-1909), married Amanda E. Leathers (1845-1894) and resided in Oconee Co. G. A. CROMER, served in Co. K, 12th SC Infantry and was discharged in 1862. SALATHIEL HOPE CROMER, joined Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, SC, in 1861. ELIAS CROOKS (1839-1905), son of James and Jane Crooks, resided west of the Keowee River. THOMAS D. CROOKS (1844-1917), served in Co. C, 4th SC Cavalry and received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee Co. WHITNER CROOKS, killed at Battle of Antietam on Sept. 17, 1862. Dacus (1825-1911), who was buried at Nine Forks Baptist Church in Pickens Co. A. JACKSON DALTON, served in Co. F, 1st SC Rifles and survived the war. ELIJAH DALTON, born ca 1837 and died of disease at Richmond, VA. JESSE DALTON, died of disease in Virginia during the war (Was this J. M. Dalton, husband of Mary N. Dalton (1842-1910)?). LEWIS HARRISON DALTON (1823-1902), husband of Martha W. Paine Dalton (1824-1900). LEWIS (or LOUIS) DALTON (1846-1914), served in Co. F, Hampton Legion. COLUMBUS ALPHONZO DANIELS, enlisted in Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, SC. F. A. DANIELS, participated in the engagement at Gaines' Mill, VA, on June 27, 1862. JOHN WILLIAM DANIELS, born in 1833, he served as a 2nd lieutenant in Co. K, 4th SC Infantry, Volunteers. THOMPSON DAVIS, served in Co. B, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and resided in Hurricane Township of Pickens District. W. D. DAVIS, listed on 1897 roll of Civil War pensioners in Pickens Co. W. N. DAVIS, served in Co. A, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and died of disease on the SC coast. W. B. DAVIS, served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and in a cavalry company during the war. W. H. (or N.) DAVIS, died July 17, 1862 while serving in Orr's Rifles. W. R. DAVIS, JR., husband of Elizabeth Cleveland Davis, served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles. WILLIAM P. DAVIS (1846-1933), enlisted in Co. D, 1st Regt. SC State Troops on Sept. 14, 1864, and was discharged at Spartanburg, SC on April 26, 1865. WILLIAM FRANKLIN DAVIS (1844-1929), a son of Richard and Jane Davis, served in Co. F, 2nd SC Rifles and received a severe head wound at Frayser's Farm, VA. WILLIAM A. DAVIS, was buried at Townville Presbyterian Church; his marker has no dates. DAVIS (first name unknown), in 1888 Lucretia A. Davis, wife of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a Civil War widow's pension; she resided at Dacusville, SC. AUSTIN DAWKINS, received a Civil War pension in Oconee Co. in 1899. ALLEN DAY (1843-1864), son of Bradwell Day (1806-1870) and Elizabeth Cansler Day (1813-1891), served in Co. C, 4th SC Cavalry and died at Point Lookout, MD, while a prisoner of war. FRANCIS MARION DAY (1836-1909), served in Co. K, 4th SC Infantry, Volunteers and Co. K, 2nd SC Infantry. MARTIN VAN BUREN DAY, (b. ca 1838) was a son of Austin Day (b. ca 1802) and Rebecca Day (b. ca 1810) and was seriously wounded during the war. NATHANIAL DAY, (b. ca 1840), was a son of Bradwell Day and Elizabeth Cansler Day and was killed at Haws' Shop, Spotsylvania, VA. REID DAY (or STEPHEN AUSTIN REID DAY or STEPHEN ALBERT DAY?), served in Co. E. 2nd SC Rifles and might have been a son of Austin Day (1800-1877) and Rebecca S. Day (1810-1873). S. R. DAY, his name appeared on the 1899 list of Civil War pensioners in Pickens Co., and he was the father of Zarah Annis Day (1888-1947), who married George Washington Griffin (1871-1946). DAY (first name unknown)--Millie Dorr, sister of George Washington Dorr, married a Day who was killed during the Civil War; her first husband was a Mr. Riley. HENRY DEAL, served in the SC artillery during the war; a memorial marker for him was placed at Rocky Knoll Baptist Church in Oconee Co. MARCUS EMMETT DEAL (1847-1933), whose wife was Missouri Annie Deal (1851-1933), received a Civil War pension in 1930 in Oconee Co. PRESTON L. DEAN, enlisted under Capt. F. W. Kilpatrick during the war. DeARMOND (b. ca 1843), served as a private in Co. E, 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and was killed at Gaines' Mill, VA, on June 27, 1862.

RESOLUTIONS OF CAMP JASPER HAWTHORNE: Whereas, We the members of Camp Jasper Hawthorne No. 285 Confederate veterans of Easley, SC believing that partiality is being used among the old veterans of the State, in that, a portion of our number are pensioned and the balance are not and: Whereas We believe that all worthy soldiers and their widows should receive a pension, Therefore, be it: Resolved, That we heartily indorse a bill which was introduced by one of our comrades, Hon. T.J. Strait, in the Senate of South Carolina during the last session, which had for its purpose the pensioning of all worthy veterans and their widows. The majority who are drawing pensions are no more entitled to it than those who have labored hard for self maintenance and to build up our State. No southern state excells according to population, ours in property value, yet she pays less in pensions to her old soldiers that any other state. We therefore put ourselves on record as favoring equal rights to all old soldiers and special privileges to none. We therefore pray that at the State re-union some action will be taken favorable to the Strait Bill or some other bill that will pension all worthy veterans and their widows. Sg: B.C. ELIJAH W. BROWN: a young merchant in Anderson was assaulted by footpads on Friday night week. He had closed his store for the night and was going home. When passing through some woods on the outskirts of the village, two men, evidently strangers in the place, who had a momment before asked the direction of some house, suddendly confronted him and demanded if he had any money. He succeeded in breaking away from them and escaped to the village, not however, until several blows had been aimed at him with a knife, which fortunately injured his clothing. Keowee Courier Saturday 24 Oct 1857.

WILL: THOMAS GASSAWAY--of the State of SC Pickens District to my beloved wife Darcus during her life or widowhood a negro woman named Juliet and her future increase, also the use and possession of my dwelling and other buildings where I now live the use of the lands which I own on the east side of 12 Mile River together with the Mills as are necessary for the comfortable support of herself and negroes. Also my household and kitchen furniture as she may select from what I may own. To my son Sameul F. a negro boy William, To my son James D. a feather bed and furniture and a Bureau and the tract of land on which he now lives containing about one hundred and fifty acres. To my daughter Lucinda the wife of Allen C. Harbin during her life time a negro girl Amy and her future increase and after her death to the heirs of her body if any if not then the said Woman Amy to revert to the three surviving children of my deceased son John W. Gassaway. To my son Thomas H. a negro boy Elijah and a Book Case. 



I want to recommend a book I believe is very relevent and important to everyone whose roots are Scotch Irish. "THE SCOTCH IRISH" a social History by Dr. James G. Leyburn PhD (deceased). Former Professor of Sociology, Washington and Lee University 1962 University of North Carolina Press. (recently reprinted) I found it through inter-library loan (South Carolina) This seems to be a scholarly, well done work. While it does not address genealogy issues per se, it provides valuable background. It addresses the Socio/cultural, political, religous and historical background of these people. It begins in 1600 with these people in their native Scotish Lowlands. Their immigration to Ulster beginnins in 1610, and to America beginning about 1714. It gives tremendous detail and background about why these events ocurred when they did. In America, it details the 700 mile crescent from Philadelphia, through Pennsylvania's Cumberland Valley, The Valley of Virginia, The Piedmont of the two Carolinas, to the Savannah River and Augusta. 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

Anthony STEWART and Elizabeth LEWIS were both born in the Keowee Valley of the Pendleton District in what is now Pickens County. Both had Grandfathers who had served in the Revolutionary War and had brought their families into the newly opened Indian land, Robert STEWART from Georgia and David LEWIS from North Carolina. Although no white families were in the area until about 1790, both families had been in the area many years when "Toney" and Elizabeth were married around 1829.

Toney had bought a farm in 1838 from his uncle, Abraham STEWART, near where Town Creek meets the Twelve Mile River. In 1850, this is the way the family looked in the census of the Eastern Division of the Pickens District:

In 1870 he and Elizabeth sold that farm to C.L. Hollingsworth and moved to Mr. HOLLINGSWORTH's farm on Toxaway Creek in Oconee County. Their youngest son and his family, Joab Franklin, moved with them. In 1877, Toney bought the farm from Mr. HOLLINGSWORTH where they had lived since 1870. Joab Franklin lived in the house that still stands by the big red barn. Toney's house was across the road.

Elizabeth died in 1884 and her body was carried about 20 miles back to Pickens to be buried at a church her father helped found, Mountain Grove Baptist Church.

Toney married Mrs. Ibby PITTS. Joab Franklin and his wife Harriett PERKINS had several children, but one, Joab Lewis "Tig", would live just a few yards up the hill and raise

his family there. Three generations of STEWARTS would raise their families along the Toxaway Creek.

Toney had a "stroke of paralysis" and died on 5 June 1894. The papers stated at his death, "He was born in Pickens county on January 21, 1810. He married Miss Elizabeth LEWIS in the 19th year of his age. They raised nine children living together until 1882, when she died. Mr. STEWART moved his family to Oconee in 1871, where he resided until his death. During all his long life he was noted for his thrift and industry, his strict integrity—being as strictly honest as mortal man is ever expected to be. The kindness of his heart and the hospitality of his home stands with scores of his friends today, as a lasting monument to his memory."

The 28 June 1894 issue of The People's Journal said, "Anthony STEWART died at his residence in Oconee County, S.C. the 5th (June). He was a resident of Pickens County until 1890 [sic]. Mr. STEWART leaves a brother."

Toney was buried maybe thirty or so yards from his house in deep woods in what is called the PERRY Cemetery. Three monuments are there-PERRY, STEWART, and HOLLINGSWORTH. Several other fieldstones are there. The PERRY is Nathaniel PERRY, the brother of Benjamin PERRY, governer of South Carolina during reconstruction. The graveyard is beside a stagecoach road on a hill overlooking Toxaway Creek. The mountain land is rather isolated and has forests, meadows, and streams and perhaps looks much like it did to Toney and Elizabeth as they moved to their new home in 1870.

Elizabeth LEWIS was the daughter of Jacob LEWIS and Aulsie LEONARD. Jacob was a farmer and a Preacher in Pickens County. He was pastor at Secona Baptist, one of the oldest churches in the area for 15 years until his death in 1838. He was instrumental in forming several other churches in the area including Mountain Grove where Elizabeth was buried in 1884. Elizabeth's grandfather, David LEWIS, was a Revolutionary War Soldier and is buried at Old Stone Church in Pendleton, S.C.

I am replying to Jessie Carr's comment in your April Newsletter asking for information on Ruth Ann Stewart Stephens. I am replying in hopes of learning more of her brothers and sisters who stayed in Pickens County.

Elias Earl Dillard, C.S.A. WARREN D. DILLARD served in Co. A, 1st SC Rifles and was a son of Tobias Gibson "Gip" Dillard (b. 1801) and Sarah "Sallie" Stephens Dillard (b. ca 1796 - d. April 1, 1892). W. F. DILLARD was killed during the Civil War. B. F. DILWORTH (1828-1901) served in a cavalry company commanded by Capt. John Westfield; he married Mary E. McAdams (1827-1895). ROBERT H. DILWORTH (1838-1904) was husband of Mary A. Dilworth, who received a widow's pension in 1930 FRANKLIN M. DODD (1842-1862) served in Orr's Rifles and died of measles in VA. GEORGE WASHINGTON DODD (1829-1898) joined Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, SC, in 1861 and served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers; he first married Elizabeth Amanda Hunnicutt (d. Nov. 14, 1870) and later married Ida Susan Compton (1862-1943). JAMES J. DODD served in 4th SC Volunteers and in a cavalry company. JOHN J. DODD enlisted at Pendleton, SC, on April 14, 1861, and served in 4th SC Volunteers. R. E. DODD received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee Co. W. FRANKLIN DODD (1835-1894) was husband of Sarah J. Dodd (18 37-1926), who received a widow's pension in Oconee Co. in 1902. WILLIAM P. DODD was born about 1839 and served in the Palmetto Sharpshooters; he was pardoned on April 9, 1865, at Appomattox Court House, VA. DODD (first name unknown), in 1902 Millie Dodd, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a pension in Oconee Co. HENRY DODGENS served in Co. G, 12th SC Infantry. ELIJAH DODGENS served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles and resided in Pumpkintown area of Pickens Co. WILLIAM R. DODSON (1824-1906) survived the war and resided in Rocky Bottom area of Pickens Co.; he was buried in the Powell-Alexander-Dodson Family JAMES H. DONAHUE (or DONAHOE) served in Moore's Rifles and in Ferguson's JOHN DONNALD (or Donald) served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regiment). WILLIAM M. DORSEY served in Co. L, 1st SC Rifles; on Dec. 29, 1899, a William Dorsey married Lizzie Mauldin of Central Twp. in Pickens Co. (Same man?). DOTSON (or DOBSON), in 1899, Mary Dotson, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a pension in Oconee Co. JAMES G. DOUTHIT served in Co. C, 4th SC Cavairy; in 1891, his daughter, Rebecca Douthit, married Samuel J. Pickle. JOHN DOWELL served in Co. H, 2nd SC Rifles and was killed in Virginia; his home was in the Pumpkintown area of Pickens Co. JOHN M. DOWIS (1834-1909) married Sarah Abbott; he lost a limb in the war and received a pension in 1902 in Oconee Co. BENJAMIN DOWNS (1832-1917) served in Co. A, 22nd Virginia Regt. and was buried in Westminister East View Cemetery in Oconee Co. DAVID THOMPSON DOYLE (1837-1864) was a son of James Alexander Doyle; he was killed Nov. 15, 1864, at Florence, AL. JAMES J. DOYLE served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles and moved to Texas after the war. WILLIAM H. DOYLE (1842-1915) was a 1st sergeant in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles; he surrendered to Union troops at Appomattox Court House, VA, in April 1865. BENJAMIN F DRIVER (1834-1921) was the husband of Letie E. Driver (1838-1913). DALLY (or Dolly) DRYMAN served in Co. F, 22nd SC Regt. and resided in Hurricane Twp. of Pickens Co. LEONARD DRYMAN was born about 1826 and was killed at Jackson, MS: he served in Co. F, Evans' Brigade, 22 SC Inf. LOUIS (or Lewis) DUCK served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles. WILLIAM M. DUCK died of disease at Morristown, TN; he served in Co. C, 2nd SC Rifles. JOHN WESLEY DUCKETT (1842-1916) was a son of James West "Jim" Duckett and Marcella Massingill Duckett. BEN W. DUCKWORTH (1845-1907) served in Co. A, 1st SC State Troops under Capt. James Long; he was buried at Enon Baptist Church. RUBEN L. DUFFIE (1840-1919) served in Co. I, 6th SC Volunteers; he became a minister and resided in Oconee Co. JAMES MARCUS DUKES served in Co. K, 4th SC Volunteers and was wounded in his left arm on July 21, 1861. Once a reporter from the Durango (Colorado) Weekly Democrat got him to tell some of his early life. A portion of the interview appeared in this paper, Nov. 8, 1929. It reads as follows:

"Eighty-five years old and with a memory as keen as that of able to read without glasses is the remarkable record of Mr. Smith who has led a very active life. He was born in 1844 in Pickens a man in his prime is Samuel R. Smith. No physical ailments and Co., S. C., ten miles from Pendelton.

On January 13, 1863, he joined the first Carolina Cavalry, enlisting at the Culpepper Courthouse, Virginia, having accompanied his brother, Silas Smith, who had been home on a furlough, to that place.

In 1870 he moved to Leasburg, Missouri and in 1885 he then to Catskell, N. M. In 1901 he moved to the Upper Pine River moved to Carlton, Arkansas, moving from there to Oklahoma and Valley and for the past 27 years has made his home in south-western Colorado. When asked about his experiences during the Civil War this morning, he said: "I served during the last two years of the war with the Confederate army and was in the Gettysburg campaign. I was personally acquainted with Brig. Gen. continued the old veteran. "Lincoln offered to pay for the slaves Wade Hampton and Gen. J. B. Stewart. After the Gettysbung surrendered under Cap. Mr. Smith was married in Carrollton, Arkansas in 1887 and his wife is still with him although she has been blind for the past lifteen years and an invalid for the past six, Mrs. Smith is 81 years

"Well, I guess I better be going,' the aged man said. 'It keeps me pretty close to home to look after Mother. Now don't go and put too much in the paper about me.""

THE ALEXANDER FAMILY

Malinda Jane Barton, daughter of John Milton and Sophia (Kytle) Barton, at was born in South Carolina, March 2, 1835. She married August 23, 1865, George Washington Alexander who was born in Henderson County, North Carolina, April 9, 1839 and died April 2, 1915. She died August 13, 1917. Both are buried at Cross Roads beside their many relatives and friends with whom they had worked and workinged when this country was young.

Unfortunately, nothing definitely is known of the early Alexanders, though the name is an old one throughout the Carolinas. George Alexander's childhood was spent apart from his people and he knew little about his immediate family. After his marriage, he left Hendersonville for a while and lived in Tennessee, but later returned to Carolina. During the Civil War he was a member of the 25th North Carolina Regiment.

He early joined the Cather's Creek Missionary Baptist Church in Transylvania County, North Carolina and he was ordained deacon there.

The family came to Forest Hill in 1881, the year that became known as the "bry year of the Locusts". With them came the Francis M. Barton family. There were seventeen in the party and they arrived unexpectedly at the William Barton home. Imagine the scurrying around to accomodate so many people in a very small log cabin.

Times were hard during those first years and, of course, money was scarce. They first lived in the old O'Brian cabin that was in the field below the later school, but the next year they removed to the George Knight place. Here George Alexander lad typhoid fever and nearly died. By the next year (1883) he was again strong and he homesteaded that portion of eastern Forest Itill still known as the "Old Alexander place" (A. Larsen farm). Here they built their log home and here they lived the rest of their lives, enjoying improved conditions year by year. For a while George was miller at old Dowler Mill, but he was a farmer at heart. The original home still stands in excellent condition, though it has undergone alterations.

They were among the founders of Forest Hill Church and he was deacon for many years. With his death, the church lost one of its most faithful supporters.

There were six children. Their youngest, Laura Jane, born in 1877 died the next year. The others came with their parents to Forest Hill. At the time Pink, the oldest, was tifteen and Dovie, the youngest was six.

He had the finest grapes in the countryside. Two varities- a large blue grape, as well as a white one—were unusually delicious.

"He was also noted for his flowers garden. He planted about as many flower seeds as he did vegetables. He raised all kinds of 10x52 and his yard was a mass of flowers. He also loved music. He bought Walter (Alexander) his first violin and he bought a mandolm for me so I could

In 1967 George C. Smith celebrated his ninetieth birthday at his home in Paradise, California. The Sacramento Bee carried a picture of this remarkable and hardy man and stated, in part:

"When he was twenty-one he and his young wife set out with four other families to cross the plains in a wagon to northern New Mexico. They settled at Raton, where they had heard lumber business was good and they lived here until they moved to California. He worked in the mills in Forbestown, Weaverville and Paradise before retiring when seventy-five.

He still drives wherever the couple want to go and three years ago was granted a five-year license with no restrictions."

Ga., where he was living in 1850 with his wife Margaret. Elijah F. Langston married (evidently his second wife) Mahala, daughter of Ferdinand Stewart in Jackson Co. Ga. 4 Jul 1847. Elijah was born in Georgia in 1814. Samuel Langston obtained headright land in Jackson Co., Ga. in 1810 but was there at least as early as 1806.

The Burch Family- Henry Burch of Pendleton was the only person of the name enumerated in South Carolina in 1790, although Gerrard Berck of North Orangeburg perhaps should be Burch, the name Gerard being found frequently in the Burch families in Southside Virigina and across the line in Northern North Carolina in the period during the Relolution John Burch, born in Va. 1750, served in the Henry Co., Va. regiment of Col. Abraham Penn, company of James Tarrent---a family that moved from Henry (Franklin) county to Greenville District, S.C., after the war. John Burch married Sarah Phillips, and died 1818 in Hancock Co., Ga his oldest son, Gerard, was born in Henry Co. 1782, and there was a Gerard of age there in 1782, perhaps a brother of John Burch. Henry of Pendleton, is believed to have been of a family in Surry Co., N.C., just over the line from Henry Co., Va., as early as 1771, and with relatives in nearby Granville Co., N.C. Burch was a justice of pease and lived on Cornhouse Creek of Little River of Keowee in Pendleton.

COMPUTER AND ON-LINE CLASS by Herman Geschwind

Genealogy programs basically are specialized database programs. To satisfy the objectives of (1) speed, (2) safety and (3) storage efficiency program designers have the choice of many options. The result is that as far as internal structure and files systems are concerned, most genealogy programs are incompatible one from another. Thus, for instance, the dataset of Family Origins is incompatible from Brothers Keeper, and vice versa. Were it not for GEDCOM, the only way for users of these programs to exchange data would be to create print output from program A and to re-type the data from the print output into program B.

The drawbacks to such a limitation are obvious: time consuming and laborious keyboard work and the ever present danger of introducing errors.

The LDS [Mormon] Church about 15 years ago was faced by a similar dilemma. For religiousreasons for years the Church had solicited genealogical information, usually in the form of Group Sheets. In Salt Lake City these submissions had to be key-entered into their mainframe computer where the data where converted into micro-fiche output. A very labor-intensive and error-prone process.

When small computers first arrived on the market, the LDS Church saw a way to simplify this process. At a nominal fee the Church passed out a computer program called Personal Ancestry File or PAF for short which was easily adapted to run on many different small computers then on the market. One component of PAF was GEDCOM which stands for Genealogical Data COMmunications and Exchange.

It very quickly became obvious that GEDCOM offered possibilities of data exchange between otherwise incompatible programs and computer systems in addition to LDS submissions. Programmers adopted the LDS GEDCOM standard and at first offered GEDCOM as an extra-cost add-on utility to their programs [Roots III, Family Edge, etc,]. Presently GEDCOM import and export are a routine part of just about any genealogy program on the market.

What GEDCOM does is set up a standard way to output data and if the receiving program follows the standard, data and links to parents, children and spouse will be preserved. For example, Program A has a field called Surname and Program B for the same purpose has a field called Last Name. The GEDCOM standard defines a line with the tag NAME and other specifications such as number of characters, case, etc. Thus, Program A will write the data in Surname to the tag NAME and when Program B reads the tag NAME it will know that the information following the tag has to go into the Last Name field. This is a very simple illustration of the GEDCOM standard. Programs can vary widely in the information that can be entered and the GEDCOM specifications can accommodate a wide range of tags.

Once the GEDCOM concept was adopted by the genealogical research community, GEDCOM or GED files started to proliferate and networks [FIDO Net as an example] were organized to exchange GED files between interested parties. Today, there are large libraries of GED files on the Internet and the computer networks such as AOL, CompuServe, Prodigy and MSN.

When coming up with the GEDCOM format and standard, the LDS Church very wisely adopted a text format for the file with fixed line lengths of 79 mono-spaced characters followed by a carriage return and line feed [computer old timers will recognize this as a typical IBM punch card format of the "Do Not Fold, Staple or Mutilate" variety]. The advantage is that a file of this format can be written or read by many main-frame, mini and personal computers, regardless of make or operating system. Being a text file, it is possible to read or print a GED file but it is really meant for computer and not human consumption.

This record of the life and parentage of Benjamin Bristol Fagan, and his wife, Mary Smith Fagan and their children, is as nearly correct as the records I have, and trusting in part to my own memory and things that my Mother told me, will permit me to make it, and is for the information of their children and grandchildren.

Benjamin Bristol Fagan was born in North Carolina, March 12, 1812. His father's farm was located where Shelby, N.C. now stands. His father died while the children were quite small, there being six of them. Their mother, in those primitive days not being able to hold the place, it passed into other hands and the children received no benefit from it. His father was of Irish descent; his mother French, her maiden name being Mary Luquire. Benjamin was the oldest of the six and must have resembled his mother, he being of the brunette type, medium build, while his brother William was distinctly the type of the Irish, florid complexion, blue eyes and crisp curling hair. The names of the children were - Benjamin, John, William, Kattie, Lucinda and George.

There are many descendents in different parts of the country, but I only follow the line of my father. He went to South Carolina, when he grew to manhood, which at that time was the queen of the states to the south-land. He lived in Pickensville, now Easley, S.C. where he met and married Mary Smith. He was a carpenter by trade, also a farmer. He and his little family moved to Georgia in 1845(a new country) and settled in Forsyth County, first living in Cumming, the county seat, then bought a farm two miles out of town, where the welly lived for nineteen years, all the children being born there except the wooldest and one born in Marthasville in 1855. He sold the farm and moved to DeKalb County, Ga. when the youngest child was too small to remember. When Benjamin Fagan and his wife Mary moved to Georgia in 1845 there were no rail-road trains, so they moved in two horse wagons and were three weeks making the trip.

Mary Smith was born in South Carolina, daughter of James Smith; her mother having been Francis Smith before her marriage. Though of the same name they were not related. The grand parents on the paternal side were Hampton Smith and Susie Posey, both born in South Carolina about 1762. On her maternal side were Nicholas Smith and his wife who was Elizabeth Johnson, born in Virginia.

My mother's father, James Smith, was born in South Carolina in 1796, and died in Atlanta, Ga. in 1868. Her mother, Francis Smith was born in Virginia and died in 1883. They are both buried in Oakland Cemetery in Atlanta Ga. There were eight children born to this union, and I only give the names: Hampton, Bluford, Mary commonly called Polly, Betsey, Martha Jane called Patsey, Nancy, Vames and Terissa who was the last of the family and died in the summer of 1921, aged 84.

Benjamin Fagan and Mary Smith were married March 24, 1841 in Pickensville. Ten children were born to them, the oldest Francis Jane was born at January 9, 1842 in Pickensville, S.C. James Danelly Fagan was born at Pickensville, S.C. April 4, 1844. Martha Catherine Fagan was born in Forsyth County, Ga. January 1, 1847. Mary Elizabeth Fagan was born in Forsyth County, Ga. March 9, 1849. Nancy Amaltha Fagan was born in Forsyth County Ga. November 26, 1850. Alonzo Lafayette Fagan was born, I suppose in 1853 in Forsyth County, Ga. and died in infancy in Marthasville, now Atlanta. The in Forsyth County, Ga. and died in infancy in Marthasville, now Atlanta. The family had left the old home and moved to the little town, living just opposite the little church(Wesley Chapel) which occupied the spot where the Candler Building now stands.

Terissa Rosalie Fagan was born in Marthasville June 18, 1855. She was married to William Nathun Sheridan October 27, 1875. Six children were born to this union - John Edgar, Benjamin Trammel, William Nathan, Jr., Laura Christine, Annie Cleo and Charles Smith. She is the only member of this large family whose circle remains unbroken, and as this mother has manifested in her life the power of the Christ to save and to keep, may she have an unbroken family in that home where there will be no good-byes.

Susan Asalée Fagan was born March 9, 1858; Alice Eveline Fagan was born June 10, 1862; Laura Bell Fagan was born December 9, 1864.


(This record of the family of Benjamin Fagan and Mary Smith Fagan is as nearly correct as the records I have will permit. I want to say to the future generations that they lived consistent Christian lives, and were members of he Methodist Church, Mother Fagan being a member for sixty years. St. James Church, Atlanta, had its beginning in their home; after the last child married and left the home in 1884, and Father Fagan was too feeble to go to church Rev. John M. Bowden would come to the home and administer the Bacrament of the Lord's Supper to him, and then would hold services, and later when they had moved to the home of Rose Sheridan, their little home was used as a place to hold services. St. James Church was organized in 1886 from this small beginning, and many precious souls have been saved through her influence. Rev. C.M. Dunnaway found Jesus in sanctifying power while a member there, and has swung around this nation, a flaming evangel for Christ, but only eternity will tell the story. The children and grand children unto the fifth génération rise up to call them blessed, and as so many familiarly called them Uncle Ben and Aunt Polly have gone to their remard and their works will follow them.)

Benjamin B. Fagan died November 7, 1885 in Atlanta, Ga. Mary Smith Fagan died June 8, 1910 in Atlanta, Ga. They were buried in West View Cemetery, Section Pinewild, Lot 15, Atlanta, Ga. They died in the Christian Faith.

Lowry Wilson (not confirmed, but could be a Wilson cousin) provided a detailed commentary on each locale we visited and took us directly to the Orr-Wilson Cemetery, which we otherwise would not have found. His knowledge of the history of various communities has been very helpful in getting a feel for how and where my ancestors lived. Lowry remained cheerful, optimistic and full of information in spite of the fact that it was a really hot day (2 September). Kerry Reese Harding (another Orr cousin) drove down from Gaffney and brought copies of her information to share, as did Barbara.

It was a splendid day! I would say that I've gotten my money's worth from this year's membership dues, but neither the day nor the people can be measured in mere dollars. I can't wait to get back to South Carolina and meet more living relatives.

It has been more than sixty-five years since this story has been told. Even then it was another fifty years before that the actual events happened. This is a true story from a hundred and fifteen years ago. Least it's the best possible reconstruction from news accounts of those times. Even then the news reports seem to shade the truth one way or another, depending on the political views of the publishers. And the oral traditions passed down from 1878 to 1927 had become a mixture of fact and fiction. So really the true happenings may never be known.

Anyway, the story is about the then 'new' tax on liquor, some Revenue Officers and their conduct, the common folk of the Upstate, and of course Amos Ladd and Lewis Redmond victims of political circumstance. For a proper understanding of the story, the conditions during the twelve years following the war between the states must be told first.

RECONSTRUCTION PERIOD

The men who fought in that war returned to homes and farms, mostly neglected for four /ears, some destroyed by the Union Army during the last months. General Sherman's march from Atlanta to Columbia and Charleston skirted the

foothills and there may have been some excursions into Pickens and Oconee counties to burn crops and a few buildings. The particulars of the distruction can be found in history books but the following sampling is from Colonel R W Simpson's HISTORY OF OLD PENDLETON DISTRICT. [Parts of Simpson's work was also included in the 13 January 1927 issue of the PICKENS SENTINEL when the Redmond story was last told.]

"... lone chimneys of once happy homes standing like tomb stones over the graves of the dead. Were all that was left to mark these sacred spots. Columbia was burned to the ground, and thousands of old men, widows and orphans made so by the war, were cast out, homeless and without a place to cover their heads, and destitute of clothing or necessities of life. Huddled together in shanties, they subsisted for a time on the scraps of food thrown away by the soldiers. Imagine if you can the feelings of the ragged and half starved heroes when returning from Appomattox to what were once happy homes to find their dear ones surrounded by such harrowing conditions.

"Notwithstanding the ruin and desolation which surrounded them, these brave and heroic men at once peaceably set to work to build new homes for themselves and families. Although they had lost all of their property, and dire proverty universally prevailed, yet they were not embittered thereby. The negroes too suffered like their former master, and the kindest feelings continued to exist between the two races. The white people honestly accepted the results of the war and the freedom of the negroes."

However people interpret the cause and outcome of the war, all the common folk, white or black, had to eke out a living among post war devastation. In the upstate that meant repairing old barns and homes, plowing fields and planting crops, feeding chickens, hogs and cattle. Hunting squirrel and rabbit. Chopping firewood for the Winters to

P. R. DePriest (1825-1909) was husband of Elizabeth DePriest, who received a widow's pension in 1922, at which time she resided in Easley, SC.

Deveaux, Devaux or Devore (first name unknown); in 1888 this soldier's wife, Sarah, was the recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Pickens County.

William M. Dickard (1825-1907) was a son of Henry Dickard and Sarah Wicker Dickard; he was buried at Enon Baptist Church in Pickens County.

James R. Dickerson received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Pickens County.

David Dickson joined Co. C, Orr's Rifles when he was was about 44 years of age; he married Frances Hughes (1820-1879) on June 11, 1848.

Henry F. Dickson (1834-1903) served in Co. F, 2nd SC Cavalry and married Ruth J. Cannon.

James A. Dickson (1837-1906) served in Co. F, 1st SC Rifles and was buried at Retreat Presbyterian Church in Oconee County. CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE

COMPUTER AND ON-LINE CLASS by Herman Geschwind

Last month we started our discussion of GEDCOM and GEDCOM files with an overview of the purpose and benefits of GEDCOM files. Now let us delve into the GEDCOM file structure and, hopefully, give some suggestions how to handle these files.


Below is a typical example of a GEDCOM or .GED file, except for the purpose of illustration we limited it to only one person. The first thing to note is that all the lines in the files start with abbreviations in capital letters [HEAD, SOUR, etc.] These are known as GEDCOM "Tags" and are very strictly defined by the GEDCOM standard. Everything following a "Tag", usually in mixed case, was added by the exporting program.

Note that the file starts with the Tag HEAD and ends with the Tag TRLR. Here now is our first tip: When exchanging files over the Internet there is a good chance that the GEDCOM will be imbedded into a text message. So, here you are with the information that you so anxiously were waiting for and your genealogy program refuses to read the GEDCOM file. The reason is that there is message text preceding the HEAD Tag and probably some mail routing information following the TRLR Tag. To make the file useable: (1) make a copy of the entire message. (2) Rename the file from whatever it was as a .TXT file. (3) Load your word processor. (4) Open the .TXT file. (5) Delete all the message text right up to the line where HEAD starts, then delete all the gook that comes after the line with the TRLR tag. Now all that is left should be a clean GEDCOM file, starting with HEAD and ending with TRLR. (6) Save this file with a Save As, give it a new name and the extension .GED. Be sure that the Save As file format is ASCII Text or MS DOS Text [consult your Word Processing Help File or Manual when in doubt].

For a genealogy program to accept a GEDCOM file there are three conditions (1) the GED file must be pure ASCII Text, (2) it must start with HEAD as the first line and (3) end with TRLR as the last line.



BIT'S AND PIECE'S

SILAS MASSEY: We learn from the True Carolina that on Saturday night an attempt was made to shoot Mr Silas Massey a citizen of Anderson District. About 11 o'clock Mr Massey happened to go out on the piazea of his home, when a pistol was suddenly fired at him, the ball of which just missed him and struck the ceiling of the piazea. So near was the pistol to Mr Massey that he was burned by the powder of the charge. It was thought that a negro belonging to Mr Massey was guilty of the attempt, and was lodged in jail on Sunday. Keowee Courier Saturday 30 May 1857

MARRIED: on Thursday evening the 7th inst. by Rev. E.F. Hyde, Captain R.Q. Anderson of Greenville District, SC and Miss Fannie L. Smith of Anderson District, SC. Southern Enterprise Issue: 14 Jan 1858

MARRIED: on the 27th December by the Rev. A.B. McGilvery, Mr Colbert Barret of Pickens District to Miss Mary Lenhardt of Greenville District. Southern Enterprise Issue: 3 Jan 1856.

YOUNG: Carrollton Patriot 17 May 1901: Uncle Philip Young: His recent death at Bridgewater brings out a War story. The venerable PHILIP YOUNG, who died at Bridgewater on the 1st instant, was a man whose life history entitled him to more than the few brief lines which give notice of his death in the county papers. Born near Pickens Courthouse, SC 25 March 1815, he lived there until 1857 and then went with his family to Alabama. There he acquired 240 acres of land and was becoming prosperous when the Civil War broke out. A wing of the Union army swept across the country, and when it had passed he was ruined. Everything was destroyed, his home was gone, even the coat was taken from his back. General William P. Carlin, who was in command of a brigade operating in that section, had seen the farm before it was laid waste and noted its well-kept appearance. He also saw it and its owner after the ruin had been wrought and he was moved with compasion. He gave Philip Young a passport through the Union lines and sent him to his own farm in Walkerville town, this county. He was married in South Carolina in 1834 to Elizabeth BEECH. There were twelve children, 9 of whom are living: Abraham, James, Elkanah, Ira, William. Emma wife of J.G. Chapman and Oma wife of I.R. Kinser, are all living near Bridgewater. Laban is in Oregon and Margaret wife of John Hoselton lives in Kansas.

Carrollton Gazette 3 May 1901: Philip Young died at Bridgewater Wednesday 1 May 1901 at 7:45 o'clockpm. He was born in Pickens District. SC 25 March 1815. In 1857 he removed to Alabama and in 1863 to Illinois where he has lived ever since. His only surviving relatives are 4 sisters. Funeral services were held at the late residence at 2pm yesterday and the interment was in the Bridgewater cemetery.

White Hall Register 2 July 1920 Oakdale: Ira T. Young an old resident of our locality died at home of his daughter, Mrs Austin Hoggett, of Gillespie, Sunday 27 June. Had resided here for many years, moving here from Alabama. For the past few years he had lived with his children. Funeral held at Pleasant Dale Church, Wednesday with burial in Kinser Cemetery. 9 July 1920: Ira Young aged 81 was born at Pickensville, SC 8 May 1839 where he lived at the beginning of the Civil War, when he enlisted in the Confederate Army and served 4 years, in Co A. Third Confederate Regiment. After close of war he went to Ft. Payne AL where on 10 Oct 1865 he and Miss Mary La? were married. In 1869 they came to Greene County, locating in Walkerville Township. REV. PENSION: BENJAMIN GRIST W1170 North Carolina:

2 Oct 1832-State of South Carolina, Pickens District, personally appeared Benjamin Grist a resident of Pickens aged 73-he enlisted in army of US in (Rowan NC) 1779 as well as recollected, with Capt Peter Hendrick and served in the Reg. commanded by Col. Maban in NC line. At the battle at Catawba NC under Capt Claudenow? and Col. Tedford-at the battle at Lindleys Mill under the same officers where he was wounded in the head--in the skirmish at Jacob Heads Mill and at Col Ralstons in drowning creek of Little River--he was dissmissed on 4 July 1782 for ten days and was never called on again nor was he ever discharged. He served over two years and could have served out the third year but for the peace. Wit for Benjamin: Joseph Grisham, Robert Gaines, Samuel Maverick who state they have known him for a long time.

2 Oct 1832 Afidavit by Buckner Smith X: of Pickens District, I was well acquainted with Benjamin Grist, we served together at Lindleys Mill where both of us was wounded.

Teague swear that I saw Benjamin Grist and Catherine Grist married at my fathers house in Pickens District South Carolina by William Woten a Baptist Minister several years since I further swear that Catherine Grist who executed the foregoing declaration is the same person I further swear that she is a widow at this time. Wit: N.S. Mozeley, Hiram Ganes, Thomas K. Forrester.
- 4 Oct 1853--Rabun Co, Georgia, I Mary Collins do swear that I was well acquainted with Benjamin Grist and Catherine Grist before they was married and was at the house of Mr League\Teague in Pickens District South Carolina when they was married--that Wm Woten went in the house to marry them and I did not go in several persons when they came out told me that they was married. I was acquainted with them until Benjamin Grist death which was about the year 1836 and they lived together up to his death as man and wife. Sg: Mary Collins X.
- 4 Oct 1853--Rabun Co Georgia, Came Catharine Grist a resident of Rabun Co in Georgia age not known but very old who stated on oath that her husband Benjamin Grist of Pickens District SC drew a pension at Eighty dollars per annum under the act of 1832 and drew his pension at Charleston, SC. She futher declares that she was married to him on 2 April 1834 that her husband died on 2 Feby 1836 and that she was still a widow.

W.T. FIELD who did service for the Confederate State and served in Co H under Capt Griffin 4th SC. Mrs W.T. Field applied 26 June 1915. I have never drawed a pension being barred by the property qualifications. I am now a resident of Pickens Co and have been a resident since Feb 1915.

C.B. FINELEY did service for the Confederate States and served in Co C under Capt J.J. Horton in 1st Orrs Rifles. 19 June 1918.

I have never drawed a pension being barred by the property qualifications. I am now a resident of Pickens Co and have been a resident since Feb 1915.

C.P. FIELD did service for the Confederate States under Co K under Capt Broom 19 June 1915.

I have never drawed a pension being barred by the property qualifications. I am now a resident of Pickens Co and have been a resident since Feb 1915.

ELIZABETH FISHER--Oconee, Wallhalla 24 Dec 1921 Transfer to Pickens County Board of Honor. Elizabeth Fisher widow of James Fisher who served in Co A--20 Reg. She born on 15 June 1847 married to him 15 Oct 1865. Sg. V.F. Martin Judge of Probate.

Examble's below on what Dr. Charles Busha is compiling:

COLONEL TONEY SMITH name not rank, b. 1841 Pickens District SC and resided in the northermost section of what is today Oconee Co SC. He enlisted at the age of 20 years in Co A 1st SC Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was wounded during the Battle of Fredericksburg in VA 13 Dec 1862 in the woodlands above Fredericksburg. s/o Washington Smith b. 1810 and Elizabeth Betsey Smith b. 1816 who owned land on Chauga Creek. His wife was Burnetta Pearson Smith. They are buried in the Long Creek Baptist Church Cemetery in Oconee Co SC. Issue: Leander David Smith b. 10 March 1866 m. Serena Harriet Hunnicutt b. 12 June 1866 d/o Meredith Manson Hunnicutt, William Smith b. 1864 m. Fannie Hilbuion Hunnicutt b. 3 June 1869 d/o Meredith Namson Hunnicutt, Sara E. Smith.

COMPUTER AND ON-LINE CLASS by Herman Geschwind

After the general overview of the GEDCOM file system and its structure, now let us turn to some practical applications. Please note that the following discussion will deal with Family Origins for Windows, either Versions 5.0 or 6.0. The steps might be different for other genealogy programs.

The easiest part is to add family information in GEDCOM format. Let us assume that you have received a GEDCOM file from a correspondent and you are not too sure yet "what is in it". To check it out, CREATE a new database, call it TEST and then from the FILE menu, click on GEDCOM import. The program will prompt you for the location of the GED file. Browse until the file has been located and then double click on the file name. If all is well, a panel will show the import progress, i.e. number of individuals and families processed.

How long the import process will take is a matter (1) the size and complexity of the GED file, and (2) your hardware. With a fast Pentium and a fast hard disk system the import rate could very will be 2,000 records per minute. With a 486'25 maybe the rate will drop to 300 records per minute, or less. Patience is the word, always remember how much longer it would take typing in the information from a stack of Group Sheets!

Once the import into the Test Database is complete, you can use the Tools to check the file for errors and duplicates, edit the Place Names, etc. etc. Let us assume that everything was fine and checks out and that it really is the information that is new and needed.

Now it is time to delete the Test database and open up your main database and repeat the GEDCOM import process. This time the GEDCOM Import will show a panel requesting confirmation that it is OK to append - or add - the GEDCOM file to your existing database.

The important point is that Family Origins uses the Import function for two purposes (1) if the database is empty, a new dataset will be created, and (2) if there already are data in the database, the content of the GEDCOM file will be added or appended to the already existing records.

The benefit of the "append" function can be as follows: The Test database that you created as described above shows that much of the information you already have except for one couple with their sixteen offspring and their descendants which is "new" information. You now can "split" the Test database [again using a GEDCOM function which we will cover next month] to extract only that particular couple and all their descendants.

The "split" will be a normal GED file which now can be "merged" into the Main database as explained but without duplicating all the other information.

In summary, GEDCOM import is easy and will either create a new database or add all or only selected records to an already existing database.

The good news is that Family Origins adheres to the most up-to-date GEDCOM standard and no special tricks are required to import many possible "tags" which can be found in GED files created by other programs.

Nelus Dunn participated in the Walhalla Semi-Centennial celebration in 1900 and marched in a parade of more than forty Confederate veterans.

Berry Durham was husband of Nancy Durham; apparently, he was the father of William O. Durham, who also served in the Confederate Army.

At the time of his death, he owned lots 43 and 44 in Williamsburg. On 12/10/1725, son Robert sold these lots and buildings to John Blair, Merchant. He owned at least three slaves which his Will distributed to his children.

Wife---Elizabeth could not read or write and signed documents with her 'mark'.

All children except Thomas eventually moved away from York County. Thomas did inherit land on Queen's Creek in that part of Henrico County that later became a part of Chesterfield County, per his father's Will. Thomas left this same land to his sons.

Halifax Co was formed from Husband---Robert received lots 43-44 in Williamsburg, per his father's Will In 1756, he bought 400 acres in Lunenburg Co, VA, Lunenburg Co in 1752. Accumulated a considerable estate including slaves, in Halifax County.

In 1754, a Robert Cobb, Gentleman, was appointed Captain of a company of foot soldiers by the "Honourable Governor", in the southern district of Lunenburg County

All Henrico Co, VA locations are Bristol Parish.

In 1749, Robert also purchased 395 acres on Staunton River, in Lunenburg County. This land he left to his son Samuel, who died there.

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keep the family warm while mending harnesses and plows. Staying alive to keep the kids feed and warm was the common man's main concern. Politics became a concern when it hampered survival.

And the politics did become a concern over the next ten years during Reconstruction. Again the particulars of that period in South Carolina are left to the history books. Let it suffice here to simply state that the Northern political powers oppressed all of the South and used the blacks elected to office after the war to make themselves wealthy in the process.

From Simpson's work there is this summary of the situation by 1876. ".... [the legislators] they constituted an object lesson to the thousands of Northern tourists who visited Columbia during the sessions of the legislature to view for themselves the prostrate State. They saw South Carolina, the once proud and respected State--the leader alwars in the struggla for self government, for liberty and right--one of the original thirteen states that contributed all she had to secure the independence of America, and because she dared maintain her construction of the Constitution, and because she was then powerless, having submitted her cause to the arbitrament of arms, and surrendered, this proud and still glorious State was subjected to the most degrade position to which any people on earth had ever been reduced. These Northern tourists saw what their politicians had done to subdue a sister state, and through them when they returned home the truth began to dawn upon the minds of the real North, and eventually prepared them to understand the awful conditions existing in the State, when the revolution of 1876 wrenched the covering off, and exposed lying beneath the vile, stinking, putrid mass of corruption."

It is in this setting that this story takes place. For the common folk, years of rebuilding livilyhoods after a

devastating war and during an oppressive political government.

REVENUE LAWS

The excise tax on liquor was a product of the war. The Federal government's necessities of war caused it to be established along with stamp duties. Excise tax and stamp duties were unfamiliar to the folk, except for hearing their fathers or grandfathers talk of the Whiskey Repellion of 1794.

Alexander Hamilton who was secretary of the treasury prosed the tax to pay for the national dept. The act was passed by Congress in 1791. Three short years later the small farmers in the back country of western Pennsylvania revolted against the liquor tax. They had always converted their surplus grain into whiskey. A few gallons of whiskey was much easier to transport than a wagon load of corn. It also brought better money. The rebellion was quickly and forcefully put down, some 13,000 militiamen against 500 farmers. Fortunately without any bloodshed.

The act was repealed some years later and forgotten by most, till the 1860's and 1870's when history repeats itself except with ploody consequence.

The revised statues of revenue laws included Section 3275. It is power conferred on revenue agents to enter suspected premises and make searches without warrant of law. This was in contradiction with the fourth amendment of the U S Constitution. "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause,"

Most of the excise taxes enacted during the war were repealed at its end. except the liquor tax. Thus with revenue laws come revenue officers and some of them were bad characters appointed by who else, the Carpetbagger

politicians. And with the contradiction between Section 3276 of the revenue laws and the fourth amendment came conflict between the revenue officers and the people of the Upstate.

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ILLICIT DISTILLERS and WHISKEY DEALERS

Meanwhile, a few of the farmers in the foothills and mountains continued to do what they had done for decades, operate a still. Mostly because it was a matter of tradition, but in 1870's the tax on a gallon of whiskey was 90 cents, a large enough sum to risk its evasion. And like the country farmers in Pennsylvania, it's a long, winding road over some mountain to take a wagonload of corn market. Just a few dollars for the corn when two or three gallons under the seat would add three or five dollars to the family income. After all the sweat and work from Spring to Fall, from plowing the side of a hill to pitying ears of sorn, a few extra dollars tears a lot.

Of course there were those who mostly worked the whiskey business after the fall harvest. They would buy their neighbors corn, saving them that long road trip over a mountain, pay a man to run the still, then haul the product to selected buyers. Even then there was care taken who one did business with. It is into this trade that Lewis Redmond went to earn his living.

REDMOND'S FIRST ENCOUNTER WITH REVENUERS

[Lewis R Redmond's words come from a June 1878 interview with him by C McKinley, a staff correspondent of the CHARLESTON NEWS and COURIER. For the previous 18 months the raids by revenue officers on innocent citizens and two incidents with Redmond had gained national recognition. The NEWS and COURIER sent C McKinley to find Redmond and obtain his side of the events. Redmond's words will be quoted as this story follows the sequence of events.] (Source: PICKENS SENTINEL series January thru April 1927.)

The Reverend Andrew McGuffin was born 23 Jul 1811 in Pendleton District SC and died 3 Dec 1901. He married Martha Jane O'Kelley on 22 Jan 1835. Martha Jane was born 10 Apr 1813 in Pendleton District and according to her tombstone, she died 2 Nov 1856. The Keowee Courier reads 1857, but at this point in time, what difference can it possibly make? Martha was buried in Chauga Baptist Church Cemetery. Reverend McGuffin was thrice married. By 1860 he was married to Ara Carver who had a daughter, Amanda Jane. She was adopted by Andrew. Ara and Andrew had no children. He later married Mary Wilbanks on 16 Aug 1888. He fathered his last child, Jimmy, at the age of 77 on 4 Jul 1889. (A double reason to celebrate). Reverend McGuffin was buried at Coneross Baptist Church Cemetery.

The ministry of the Reverend McGuffin spanned a number of years in the churches of Pickens District and a large segment of the later population of that area came from marriages performed by him. Beginning as the Kilpatrick branch of the Old Hepsibah Baptist Church, the Return Church was constituted on 18 May 1848. Even though there have been several meeting house sites, the general location of the church has always been within the triangle formed by Seneca, Westminster, and Oakway. The Kilpatrick Branch was located on the south side of Coneross Creek. Still later, 15 members met back at the original Kilpatrick Church site to organize the Return Baptist Church (hence it's name). During the years of the Perkins Creek Church, Reverend McGuffin was pastor during 1836-1838 and 1842-1843. He was pastor of the Return Church in 1848. Holly Springs Meeting House was located on what is now Highway 76, about five miles northwest of Westminster. It was a log structure which stood a short way from the present church. It later burned, and a frame structure was erected nearer the road, which stood until 1956, when a modern brick church with spire was erected. The Reverend McGuffin was pastor at Holly Springs during the period 1841-1850. The Reverend McGuffin and Martha Jane O'Kelley McGuffin had eight known children: John H., William, Nancy Elizabeth, Sarah A., Martha Jane, Mary Matilda, Thomas Franklin, and Andrew Lewis. (It may be well to note repetition of names).

So went the times of the Reverend Andrew W. McGuffin. May be continue to rest in peace.
