As surnames were adapted from these patronymics, sometimes "ap" was slurred into the following name, so that "ap Rhys" became Price, "ap Owen" became Bowen,

Dear Linda,

At the top of the 10th page of the October 1998 issue you quoted an article from the *Pickens Sentinel* of Mar 1873 regarding the proposed settlement of the estate of Gideon Ellis and discharge of his Executors. This is a welcome addition to my collection of data on this ancestor, also known as Rev. Gideon Ellis Sr.

You may be interested to know that Gideon's estate was NOT settled in 1873; although he died late in 1859, final settlement was not made until early 1883--over 23 years later!

I had ordered his estate papers from the SC Archives, and was intrigued by the vast amount of information. Ellis researchers have long been aware of his very detailed will, which names his six living sons, his two deceased sons, and his five sons-in-law, plus several grandchildren. What none of us were aware of, until the estate papers made it clear, is that after Gideon signed his will, and after his wife Lucy Easley Ellis died, he remarried, and left a widow, Susan _____ Ellis.

The sequence of events pertaining to Gideon's estate is thus:

During the 23 years between Gideon's death and the final settlement of his estate, the Executors had to contend with a change of government and of currency, a war of invasion and devastation, and another change of government and of currency; papers were lost and an economy was destroyed; some of the original heirs died. Perhaps in the end, widow Susan considered herself much more fortunate with her immediate \$1000 than the other heirs, some of whose portions were not distributed for a generation.

I'd love to share data with other descendants of Rev. Gideon & Lucy Easley Ellis. Also, I'd like to hear from anyone who may be able to identify Gideon's second wife Susan.

THE TANNERYS, YOUNG AND OLD

THOMAS TANNERY, PENELOPE FOSTER & SON, ZOPHAR'S OFFSPRING

Zophar Tannery was Born in Huntington, Long Island, New York in 1748 to Thomas Tannery and Penelope Foster. His father died circa 1750 and Zophar was "put out" to live with another man until he attained the age of 14. At this time his step father came for him and took him home to "New Polls" (New Paltz) New York. Zophar fought during two tours of duty, in the Revolutionary War, from New York state. He then began a wandering odyssey that took him all up and down the Hudson River Valley, then down the Holston River Valley to the head of the river in Virginia. He was there for two or three years, then he went down to the fork of the Holston and French Broad Rivers in Tennessee (now Knoxville). He was there four or five years until "--- the indians became troublesome and I moved into the State of South Carolina and settled in the Pendleton District ---. " Zophar established a permanent home in the Pendleton District and his progeny is scattered from South Carolina to California, with the major concentrations in South and North Carolina, Texas and California.

The Tannery surname is very rare. The author found four other Tannery families in the United States but has found no genealogical linkage. It appears that they all originated in Southeastern New York State. These families are also included in the book.

Allied families include: Adams, Bagley, Ballenger, Barnett, Blair, Boggs, Bright, Brock, Dickey, Fricks, Huff, Hughes, Jenkins, Kennedy, Lemmons, Marcengill, Moore, Pickens, Smith, Sublette, Wilson and Williams. There are many other surnames but are too numerous to mention on this single page flyer.

Lewis Redmond by Jerry Hughes

It was doubtful that he intended to include the bad revenue officials in that statement thus leaving the impression that the officials in Columbia saw only 'moonshiners and outlaws' in the Upstate. Before summer was over they would know All the excitment over the jail break otherwise. appeared outlawish to those far away. For the local people it was a correction to an injustice. Two of the supposedly distillers were a sixty year old man and his sixteen year old son, Milton and James Stansel. Mr C McKinley revealed the rest of the story. "They had been arrested at their homes, handcuffed, carried to Pickens and there lodged in jail to await trial. Their neighbors released them and they returned to their homes and resumed their daily labor on the little farm from which they had been torn and marched off in disgrace. Re-arrested a little later by the county officer they were carried before the commissoner and discharged, there being no evidence against them."

THE RAID AGAINST GARY and HENDRICKS

Also on the Monday following the "jail delivery" there was a raid by "Redmond's gang". He probably never lead a gang and only rode with a dozen or so of his friends for his own protection against those desiring to collect the reward offered for his capture. On this occasion he didn't even want to ride with them.

Redmond's words. "It was not my doing, I did not lead the party and at first refused to go with them. They said they had gone with me when I needed them and now I refused to help them when they needed me. So I went.

"Gary had broken up a still and behaved badly. The man the still belonged to collected the crowd and sent to thrash him. I said to them, 'He has done nothing to be killed for, this thing of killing a man won't do. But I will go with you if you wish me, to get satisfaction for cutting up the still.' They said they did not intend to kill him but only to put the withe on him (whip him). This was distinctly

understood before we started.

"We did not chase any revenue officers but went directly to Gary's house at Liberty. He was not there and we returned home. We started one Monday afternoon about 1 o'clock and came back through Pickens Court House by 10 o'clock next morning.

"There would not have been anything said about this raid but for what done at Hendrick's house. He was a brother of Van and the boys hearing that the overcoat and shawl which they had stolen from me were in the house determined to take them away.

"They found an overcoat which several said was mine, but I did not think so and would not take it. They tried to persuade me to do so but I told them I would not wear another man's coat as long as I could buy one for myself. The shawl was not there and one of the party was about to seize a saddle blanket in place of it. But I stopped him and made him leave it where he found it. I told them that the officers had not stolen anything of the kind from me and I would have nothing but what I knew was mine. I kept them from taking away several other things and took nothing at all myself. The court met a few days after this and a bench warrant was issued for me for stealing the two overcoats!"

THE WARRANT AGAINST REDMOND

Getting the warrant, it was the only one ever issued against Redmond in Pickens Court, was not an easy matter for Judge Mackey. When the charge of leading this raid and taking the overcoats was presented to the Grand Jury and they having examined the witnesses, they returned a verdict of 'No Bill'. Judge Mackey at once sent them back with other witnesses and again they returned 'No Bill'. The Judge remarked, 'I suppose, gentlemen, you have not had enough witnesses' and for the third time sent them away to reconsider. This time the jury based a 'True Bill' verdict on two facts, the overcoats were taken from Hendrick's house

by a group of men and the next day Redmond was seen in Pickens with the same group.

Judge Mackey had arrived in Pickens on Sunday 17 March 1878 and had received a telegram from Governor Hampton on Monday. In his reply the following Thursday Mackey gave another version of the jury verdict. In his first charge to the jury he said, "Gentleman of the grand jury, if upon the testimony of a creditable witness, it should appear to you that there is probable cause to believe the accused guilty of the offense charged, and you wilfully fail or refuse to find a true bill, then you declare to the world that in the county of Pickens the trigger finger of Lewis R Redmond's right hand is stronger than the arm of the law!"

The jury returned the first 'No Bill' verdict, where upon Mackey concluded there was insufficient evidence and witnesses and had the solicitor send them more the next morning. As he made his second charge to the jury he also informed them of information he had obtained from "a tustworthy" source.

"(information) to the effect that one of their body was the close ally and intimate associate of Redmond, the person accused in the bill, who was then having his headquarters at the house of the grand juror referred to, and that if these statements were not denied by the grand juror on oath, he must be excused from acting during the cosideration of this case and should at once retire from the grand jury."

He then named the juror who withdrew from the jury without stating whether the accusation was true or false. The jury then found the verdict of 'True Bill.'

After the warrant was written for Redmond's arrest the first posse was formed on Tuesday 19 March 1878, and was composed of a hundred men plus fifty from Captain Griffin's Hampton Home Guard company. The sheriff was ordered to do this by Mackey. All were "well armed, equipped and mounted" according to Mackey's telegram. There were rumors that some

John Wesley Beaty, my great great great grandfather, was born on 6 October 1811 in Pendleton District to *William Beaty* and *Ann Broadbelt*. John was married on 31 March 1833 in Pendleton District to **Mary T. Bowie**. She was born on 14 April 1833 in Abbeville to *Charles Bowie, Jr.* and his wife *Catherine*.

Interesting, Mary's father Charles witnessed the will of John's father William. John received from the will in 1847 a part of his father's land leading to Good Hope Church, and "a negro boy Jacob and girl Jane."

John and Mary had nine children. All of the children were born in Pendleton District.

- 1) Martha Ann Miriah Beaty was born 25 April 1835, was never married, and died 9 August 1915 and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County.
- 2) Benjamin Franklin Beaty was born 5 November 1838, married about 1855 to Jane E. McAdams, was a farmer, was a member of Company D, Orr's Rifles, and he died 16 June 1862 of typhoid fever in a Confederate hospital at Richmond, Virginia.
- 3) Albert Chesterfield Beaty, my great great grandfather and the subject of the presentation that I gave last year at the OPDC meeting, was born 23 January 1842. He was also a member of Company D, Orr's Rifles, he was married in 1864 Lucinda Haseltine Burton, and died 28 June 1894 in Oconee County and was buried 30 June 1894 in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County.
- 4) Malissa Caroline Beaty was born 17 January 1844, also was never married, and died 28 July 1862.
- 5) Margaret Catherine Beaty was born 1 August 1846, also was never married, and died 1 August 1916 and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County.
- 6) Charles Wesley Beaty was born 6 June 1847, married Myra Allethia Fricks, and died 7 October 1891 and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County.
- 7) Elizabeth Jane Beaty was born 17 August 1851, lived only eleven years, and died 17 August 1862.
- 8) Sarah Francis Beaty was born 27 November 1853, married John Miller, and died 7 May 1921.
- 9) John McLin Beaty was born 28 November 1855, also was never married, and died 10 August 1923 and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County.

John died on 26 November 1890 in Oconee County and was buried in the Bethel Presbyterian Church in Oconee County. Mary died 3 December 1897 also in Oconee County and was buried next to her husband.

Taliaferro N. "Tally" Simpson (1839-1863) 3rd South Carolina Volunteers, C.S.A. Killed at Chickamauga September 22, 1863

- John Craig Gibson was a son of
 Hiram and Catherine Gibson. He
 served in the 1st S. C. Rifles
 and was seriously wounded August
 29, 1862, at Manassas, Virginia.
- Joseph J. Gibson enlisted in Co. E, lst S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was about 18 years old. He attended the 19th reunion of Orr's Rifles on August 14, 1901, at Sandy Springs near Pendleton.
- R. W. Gibson (1845-1887) survived the Civil War. In 1930, his wife, Samantha Gibson, was the recipient of an annual widow's pension for her husband's Civil War service.
- Thomas Gibson, Jr. died of disease

 March 1, 1862, while serving in
 Co. E, 1st S. C. Rifles at
 Sullivans Island, South Carolina.
 He was 24 years of age at the
 time of his enlistment.
- Thomas A. Gibson served as a private in Co. K, 12th S. C. Infantry and was discharged from the army in 1862. In 1902, he was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- William Gibson was a member of Co. C, 4th S. C. Cavalry, C.S.A. He was transferred to Fort Sumter, South Carolina, in 1864.
- William Gibson was killed near Weemsburg, Virginia, in Oct. 1864.

- William Harrison Gibson (1840-1890)

 was a son of George Washington
 Gibson and Nancy Alexander Gibson.
 He served in Co. E, 1st S. C.
 Rifles (Orr's). He was a brother
 of Abselom Gibson, who also served
 in the Confederate Army.
- Zachariah W. "Zack" Gibson was a son of Hiram Gibson (b. 1807) and Catherine Brown Gibson (b. 1812). He served in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's) and was killed in an accident while at home on a furlough from the army.
- Gibson (first name unknown). In 1899

 M. I. Gibson, a Confederate
 veteran's widow, was the recipient
 of a Civil War pension in Oconee
 County, South Carolina.
- Gilbert (first name unknown). In 1902, Malinda Gilbert, widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S. C.
- Greenlee Gillespie (1824-1894) was a son of William and Lavinia Castleberry Gillespie and a grandson of Paul Castleberry, a Revolutionary War soldier. His first wife was Susan Lewis; his second wife was Charity Shelton. He was buried at Flat Rock Church near Liberty, South Carolina.
- James Christwell Gillespie (18331862) was a son of Jeremiah Gillespie (b. 1798). He served in Co. F, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's) and was killed in Virginia during the Civil War.
- Moses Clinton Gillespie (1830-1899)
 served in Co. F, 2nd S. C. Rifles
 and was wounded in battle. He
 was a son of Jeremiah Gillespie
 (b. 1798) and the husband of
 Emmeline Kelley Gillespie.
- David James Gilliland (1828-1892)
 was a member of Co. K, 2nd S. C.
 Rifles (Moore's). He was discharged from the army on March
 26, 1864.

- John M. Gillison (1823-1909) was a member of Black's Cavalry, C.S.A. and was once stationed at John's Island, South Carolina. His wife was Sarah B. Gillison (1841-1919). Both were buried at Richland Presbyterian Ch. in Oconee County.
- George P. Gilliam was husband of
 Nancy A. Banks Gilliam, who resided in Central, S. C., in 1922
 and received a Civil War widow's
 pension at that time.
- James M. Gilliam served in the 1st
 S. C. Cavalry, and he survived
 the Civil War. According to oral
 traditions of his family, J. J.
 Palmer saved Gilliam's life during
 the Civil War. This Confederate
 veteran died in 1891.
- J. J. Gilmer served in Co. G, 1st
 S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He
 attended the 19th reunion of Orr's
 Rifles at Sandy Springs in 1901.

She was from Lunenburg Co. Removed about 1805 to Greenville District S.C. He settled about 12 miles south of Greenville and lived there for his life.
- 3 Alice LESTER b circa 1793 and d circa 1852. She married Daniel Beacham, born circa 1783 and died circa 1838. Daniel was the son of William Beacham of Ireland. Alice and Daniel are buried at Archibald Lester's burial Ground on Gilders Creek near Greenville
- 3. <u>Hartwell Lowrie BEACHAM</u>- born about 1818 and died-March 1892. Hartwell is buried at Greer's Depot He married Louise **Shepherd** of Greenville. Note: On the 1850 census, Hartwell Beacham's wife is listed as Maria. Note: In <u>The Old Free State</u> the name Lowrie is spelled Lowery However other family resources indicate the name was spelled Lowrie and I Will change the spelling in my documents to reflect that.
- 4. Archibald Lester **BEACHAM** born May 1850 and died July 16,1928. He married Elizabeth Anne FOWLER. Elizabeth Anne FOWLER was born 6 August, 1853. She was the eleventh child of Americas FOWLER and Martha **PEARSON**. She and Archibald BEACHAM had eight children. Their fifth child was Carrie Alice **BEACHAM SMITH**. She was born on March 3, 1882 and died on Feb. 25, 1971. Carrie married Robert Grady Smith and they had

Bryant **LESTER** presumed to be descended from one of three men. Possible ancestors are a John Lester who was master of the ship *Blessing* date 1635. The other is Thomas Lister age 22 who came in 1635 in the *Pamle*. The other is Thomas Leister, 33, who was a resident of James City. These may have been grandfathers due to the dates.

The spelling of the name is a corruption of Leicester. But the original form of the spelling is not found very often in America, and so far as the authors observations was never used by the family in Lunenburg, or, indeed in Virginia. The name is sometimes spelled Lister, or Leister.

Hotten's Lists show that in June and July, 1635 John Lester was the master of the ship Blessing. Thomas Lister, age 22, came to Virginia in July, 1635 in the Paule. In February, 1623, Thomas Leister, age 33, was a resident of James City, Virginia. Bryant Lester, whose parents are not known but who was presumably descended from one or the other of the above named, had a brother Andrew Lester, of whom very little is known. Nothing is known of his posterity, if he left any descendants. Bryant Lester (b. circa 1730-35), appears in the records of Lunenburg County, about the time of the French and Indian wars.³ and rendered service therein. In 1787 he was elected a vestryman of Cumberland Parish. He married, about 1750, Sarah Winbush. His will is dated May 25, 1795 and was probated June 9, 1796 in Lunenburg Co. Va. From his will the place of his residence appears to have been on Juniper Creek, and he owned thereon a mill and a saw scaffold. Bryant Lester and his wife are buried there, about four miles southeast from Double Bridges, and about four miles from Lunenburg Court House. The had 11 children, order of birth is unknown

Dear Brother and sister I take the present opertunity to try to write to you to let you hear from us we are in comon health I am not very well I am up stiring a round I hope this will find you all well we are having some dry weather now we had the bigest hail storm the first of this month the larges hail i ever saw the old people heare say they never saw the like it looked like ever thing would be ruined the people had a good stand of cotton it was mashed mitely there was enough left and looks tolerable well Thomas has rented his land all out but a few acres he is tending his self corn is seling at twenty five per busel Webster has sold over two hundred bushels at that lately that is mitey little to take for corn better to do that than to have the weavels eat it up Webster has bin in bad health all the winter and spring he is ?--- able to work a little now I don't think he ever will be stout any more he has rheumatis kidney diseas catrrh of the head he has bin doctering for catarrh several year I dont think It can be cured I was a fraid he was not going to be able to work a day in the first this year he is not able to do much dear sister I wish I could see you all now i want to see you wors than ever if posible I often think of our ---- hours last year the time was too short oh what grate satisfaction in life if we lived where we all could see each other it is a satisfaction to hear from each other I receved a letter from Othela she said Antnetts baby was about to die I was so sorry she said she write soon if they did not get better I havent herd from her since I hope the baby has got well I would love to hear how is geting a long my love to the children remember me when you kiss the sweet I would love to see her my love to Ms Cooper Eva I guess you and the peach tree is all rite let me hear from you Eva I would be so glad to see you all a gain Sanford you and Mat must come to see us in a year or two if we all live write when you can your afectionate sister til death. 

of Redmond's followers were part of the posse but Mackey denied that this was true. Also, at Sheriff Mauldin's suggestion, the revenue officials were not part of the posse and were "sent in the opposite direction."

REVENUE OFFICIALS LOOK FOR REDMOND

While going in this opposite direction the revenue officers conducted their own method of searching for Redmond.

Samuel Neal who lived on the Twelve Mile river near Central was one of their victims. On 12 March two men arrived at his house who said they were revenue officers with instructions to detain any who they found there. About a half hour later Wm F Gary and five others arrived, all were armed. Gary told the men that he wanted Neal and another man who lived there. Hammett, arrested. He and Wm Springs then entered his house and searched it upstairs and downstairs. His wife was confined to bed with their four day old baby, yet they searched her room including under the bed.

This search they did while using insulting and obscene language, their clothes dripping wet and their boots covered with mud. They carried their guns about the house with hands upon the locks. His wife became frightened and he went to comfort her. He demanded their authority for these acts but they only said they had it but refuse to show it.

They then ordered him go with them to Pickens. Along the way he prevailed on their leader, Hoffman, to allow him to give bond and return to his wife and baby. Hoffman accepted and let him go. Two days later he appeared before Commissioner Thornley and was discharged for lack of proof and warrant.

Mr Micajah Hudson's experience at the hands of the revenue officers was similiar. On Friday night 15 March 1878, near one o'clock in the morning, he was awakened by sounds of men outside his home. Five or six armed men

entered his house and surrounded his bed. They ordered him up and to get dressed. They then searched his house and smokehouse after breaking down its door. After this they ordered him to go with them. He chased down his horse and saddled it. He rode with them about five miles when they summonly dismissed him without reason.

Mr Hudson was a mailcarrier between Pickens and Fall Creek. He was in Pickens twice a week at which time he could have been arrested by the revenue officers whom he saw there.

U S CIRCUIT JUDGE T J MACKEY

By eleven o'clock Wednesday evening Mackey had received word by courier that the posse had reached Redmond's usual headquarters but had not found him and were still in pursuit. He was informed from other sources that "this is the first time that any officer of the law has ever penetrated Redmond's stronghold, which is a natural fortress in the mountains, at an almost inaccesible point know as Reedy Cove." [This is now known as Twin Falls in the Eastatoe Valley.]

In other parts of the same communication to the Governor, Judge Mackey described the latest events, the jail break and raid on Gary, according to his interpretation. The phrases and wording painted 'a reign of terror' picture of Redmond. "... after due inquiry, that the outlaw, Lewis R Redmond, had practically organized a reigh of terror throughout the county, which has fast paralyzing the manhood of its best citizenship, who observed that he and his armed band of reckless followers were standing day by day in open defiance of the laws of the State and the United States.... (the posse) were evidently alarmed, being apprehensive that Redmond would make an incursion into the town at the head of his force, which was reported to number about seventy-five men, well armed and mounted."

Judge Mackey also reveals how he saw himself in 'this

crisis.' "I saw at once that this people were in the supreme crisis of their fate, and that they could only meet it successfully by bringing them face to face with their duty by an instant and fearless discharge of mine, and by thus quickening their sentiment of obedience to law, to set in motion a counter current against the lawless men who stood in armed array against the constitutional authorities."

He contined on in flourishing language to describe how he would "make an example of Redmond", "isolate the chief criminal from his followers", and avoid public sympathy for his cause by prosecuting him for force entry and robbery rather than jail breaking. Even he had recoginzed that the prisoners freed from jail were respected farmers arrested without warrant and had been mistreated by the revenue officials.

Judge Mackey, upon hearing the continued complaints of citizens about revenuer raids, did instruct the grand jury to prepare an investigation into these matters as well. The outrages committed against Porter, Neal, and a Mr Micajah Hudson were testified to before the jury. In the resulting presentment the jury denounced illicit distilling "... as not only violative of the laws of the land,..., but as grossly demoralizing in its influence and an unitigated evil to society."

They also found that "While we believe that the nefarious business of illicit distilling of intoxicating liquors is not carried on in this county to the extent that is currently reported, we are satisfied that some persons on the border of the county are, or have recently engaged in it."

In relation to their instructed objective, revenue outrages, they stated that they have not had sufficient time "....to prosecute our investigation of this matter to the extent which its importance demands; but sufficient facts

"The man who fired the First Shot of the War."

William Mauldin born July 18, 1843 - died 1873.

William Mauldin of Pickens County, S.C. was the man who shot the first gun in the war between the States. A simple slab marks a hero's grave. In the old Mansell family burying ground is a simple marble shaft, marking the grave of one of the gallant heroes of South Carolina, and the man who fired the first shot that opened that memorable struggle between the North and the South.

The following simple but appropriate inscription is on it, "In my father's house are many mansions, William Mauldin born July 18, 1843, died November 18, 1873. He fired the first shot at Fort Sumter that opened the Civil War. He was faithful to every duty."

Although no towering monument tells of his deeds to posterity, and although no poets have immortalized him in verse, yet the pine trees stand as proud sentinels about his grave and Pickens County is proud that his ashes mingle with her soil. Possibly few people in the County and State know of the life and career of this hero of the South.

When by chance the writer found his grave, he made inquiry about Mauldin's record and claim that he had the distinction of firing the first gun. It will be recalled that South Carolina seceeded in December 1860 at the time Major Robert Anderson was in charge of Fort Moultrie, but after Christmas withdrew to Fort Sumter.

Early in January when the war clouds began to thicken, Young Mauldin then only 16 years of age, joined the "Regulars" before volunteers were called for. He was sent to Charlston and on April 12th, 1861 when Beauregard ordered the attack, William Mauldin, it is said fired the first shot. The battle lasted until the 14th. when the Fort surrendered, without losing a life, on either side. But this battle brought the doubtful states of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Arkansas on the side of the Confederacy, and from that time the North began to prepare for War.

But some will doubt the right to this claim. Of course such incidents are hard to verify by written records, but the word of reputable men who were with him ought to be taken. Mr. W. M. Ligon, of Greenville after the War was over, declared that Mauldin fired the first shot, and other men from this section said that he was given this honor. After serving his term of enlistment, which was twelve months, he came home for a few weeks, then volunteered his services again. He was with Longstreet in many of his campaigns. He also fought with

distinction in the Battle of Seven Pines, Seven Days' Battle, Petersburg and in the fight around Chattanooga. He was with Robert King and William Jameson when they were killed. These men went from Pickens County also.

It is said that he was a fine marksman. He was of fine physique and manly bearing. He had a reputation as a boy of being an expert boxer. He was fearless and composed in times of danger.

It is remarkable that he went through the entire war without receiving the slightest wound. He was captured the night before Lee surrendered.

William Mauldin was moved from the Mansell family burying ground to my grandfather's lot by the Daughters of the Confederacy, May 12, 1920. This was in the Easley Cemetery. Elias Day paid tribute to William Mauldin that day. After the war was over William had come back to his native County and married. He lived near Easley until his death in 1873.

Allen said that he knew that his brother William fired the first shot of the Civil War.

This eaving I am blest one time more by the kind hand of the Almighty with the pleasure of seating myself to try and fullfill the pleasant duty of responding to your well beloved letter which reached me this morning but as for me trying to describe the pleasure The pleasure of reading your letter was to me it is more than I am to writ or tell by the pen To read a letter from one that I adore above all others and one that my happiness of life is in the heart off And one that I do believe dos wish to make me happy in future days to come if it is the Lord wil for us to ever meet again on earth.



James Matthew Gilstrap was born about 1831 and was a son of Bright Gilstrap (b. ca 1799) and Anna Morgan Gilstrap (b. ca 1793). He died of disease in the War of the Rebellion.

- John M. Gilstrap (1847-1929) served in Co.C, 4th S. C. Cavalry, C.S.A. His wife was Idabell B. Gilstrap (1857-1932), and they were buried at Shady Grove Baptist Church in Pickens County, South Carolina.
- Lewis Gilstrap (1832-1863) was a bro. of James Matthew Gilstrap (see above). He resided on Little Eastatoee Creek and married Polly Nix. This Confederate soldier died in Virginia during the war.
- P. E. Gilstrap was a private in Co. C, 4th S. C. Cavalry, C.S.A. He died of disease at Pocotaligo, South Carolina, during the Civil War.
- Peter Gilstrap (1827-1905) served in Co. C, 4th S. C. Cavalry, C.S.A. His wife was Elizabeth James Gilstrap (b. 1827). This soldier was wounded during the war and lost a limb. In 1886, he received a voucher for the purchase of an artificial limb.
- Rufus Wiley Gilstrap (1844-1924) was a son of Yancey B. Gilstrap (1820-1864). His mother was Nancy E. Gilstrap. This soldier's father also fought in the Civil War and was killed in 1861. After the Civil War, Rufus moved to Arkansas and married Arianne Dulcinee Sutherland.
- William Maxville Gilstrap (1842-1891)
 was a son of William and Delilah
 Durham Gilstrap. He served in Co.
 K, 3rd Georgia State Troops and
 Co. D, 56 Georgia Volunteers. He

Residents of a S.C. town believe this family graveyard anchors their history.

POWDERSVILLE, S.C. - Members of Powdersville's Orr family like to say that if Thomas Orr had stayed in Ireland, Powdersville would be half its size, so many of his descendants populate the area.

Despite his abundant progeny, the story of Orr, who settled here seven generations ago, is being threatened by the sands of time - and by vandals, who recently wrecked part of the family's isolated cemetery.

Some of Orr's descendants are trying to preserve a bit of Powdersville's history by restoring the cemetery, bringing it

out of hiding and into the view of the new wave of immigrants, many of whom don't know the area's past.

The tombstones tell a story of two families who became intertwined with the history of the area's transformation from American Indian country to pioneer farmland to bustling suburb.

The tale begins in 1804, when Thomas Orr left the Emerald Isle and settled in the part of old Pendleton District that is now northern Anderson County. He married Sarah Wilson from Georgia, and they had 12 or 13 children, depending on who is telling the tale.

One of their sons, Civil War veteran John B. Orr, married Elizabeth Ann Wilson. She was not related to her mother-in-law, but since then the Powdersville Orr and Wilson families have been one, said **Powdersville historian Lowry** Wilson, who is not related to the family.

Halloween pranksters partying in an overgrown cemetery on State Highway 81, where about 50 Orr and Wilson family members and slaves are buried, broke the two large tombstones marking John's and Elizabeth's graves. Other tombstones were toppled.

"It was a wake-up call," Lowry Wilson said.

He and J. Paul Orr, a great-grandson of John B. Orr, are cleaning brush and lighting the cemetery to discourage further vandalism and preserve the history chronicled there.

"It means quite a bit, that cemetery," Wilson said. "The last time they cleared it off was about 20 years ago. The idea was, if you were in the country what you tried to do was hide a cemetery. People were wrecking them."

Now the family has reversed its strategy to protect the ancestral graveyard.

The 13 readable tombstones there belong to Orrs, Wilsons, Clardys and Merritts, Wilson said. Some of the Wilson kin spelled their surname "Willson."

Thomas and Sarah may be builed there, Wilson said, but their graves have not been found. John's and Elizabeth's broken tombstones will be repaired.

John's grave will get a Confederate veteran's marker. He was a private in Company D. Garys Brigade. Hamptons Legion, which was made up of men from Anderson County. He was wounded in Richmond, Va., and returned home. The oldest grave discovered so far belongs to William Mattison Willson, who was born 1819 and died in 1859, said Paul Orr's wife, Erlean.

At a time when many of the old ways are being lost as the growing suburban neighborhoods of Powdersville fill with people from other places, Erlean Orr hopes the stories of the early settlers will live on.

"My real concern is that the traditions and the heritage will be lost," she said. "I'm not against people coming in. They have added and done wonderful things for the community. But I wish they knew the heritage and the history of the land here."



Beacham and Archibald Beacham, my ancestor. See census information 1850 for more children. In census, information, Hartwell's wife is listed as Maria and Louise. (Her name is Mariah Louise Shepherd. Hope Beacham relates that the pronunciation is Maria but the older spelling is Mariah. In the 1850 census she is listed Maria but in 1860 and 1870, she is Louise or Louiza. Her tombstone has Mariah L. Beacham.
- 4. Philip Franklin Beacham, who married Nancy Wright of NC. Both died 1862 in Alabama.
- 5. Amanda Adeline Beacham, who married Wm Laird of Alabama.

This name conflicts with <u>The Old Free State</u>, which lists his wife as Louisa Shepherd, but her name is Mariah Louise and later census shows Louise and her tombstone shows Mariah L. Beacham. Hartwell's occupation is hard to read but looks like Mechanic (?) Children are:



BIT'S and PIECE'S

SOME PORTER FAMILIES OF UPSTATE SOUTH CAROLINA

The last issue of the Old Pendleton Newsletter contained data on some Porter families with ties to the upstate area of South Carolina. Since the article there has been a continual discussion among some Chapter members via E-mail as to the accuracy of the data. It has been decided to document as many of the facts as are currently known and annotate those areas that are questionable with the hope and expectation that interested members would share information they posses concerning this family.

The Pennsylvania Connection

Hugh Porter b 1715, Londonderry, Ireland, m.2 May 1736 in Ireland, Violet Mackey b 1717 Northern Ireland, d 23 Jan 1791, SC. Hugh died 1808 SC. Birth and death dates for Hugh and Violet Mackey Porter are taken from the American Compendium of Genealogy. They came to America ca 1740 as a part of the wave of immigrants, which came to be known as "Scotch/Irish" and/ or "Scots/Irish". They are reported to have brought one or more children on the original voyage and settled near Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The chart associated with this article shows one version of the number and names of Hugh's children. They lived in Pennsylvania for some 17 years and would have had ample opportunity to have additional children.

O. Are these correct names and DOB of their children?

The North Carolina Connection

Hugh and Violet removed to Granville District / Orange County, North Carolina and purchased 393 acres of land on 14 February, 1757, on the East Side of the North Fork of Haw River and High Rock Creek. Hugh Porter was commissioned a Justice of the Peace for Orange County in 1757. Land purchase records show purchases in this area for Hugh Porter Jr., William Porter, and Adam Porter. This area of NC is near the site of an anti British

uprising, which came to be known as the "Alamance Regulators". A story has been circulated that Hugh Porter was arrested and sentenced to prison for some infraction against the British. Hugh supposedly made arrangements for his youngest son, Phillip to serve part of this sentence.

The British retaliation was quick and severe. Involved settlers fled to the mountains of NC and southward into South Carolina. There are also reports of James and William Porter, of Irish extraction, who came out of Pennsylvania and fought against the British at King's Mountain, N C. A sizeable contingent of Porters settled in what is now Mecklenburg County, NC- including a Hugh who died in 1801.

Phillip Porter is reported to have been born to Hugh and Violet in Guilford County (actually Orange) in 1763 as recorded in his petition for a Military pension.

Q. Is Phillip Porter the son of Hugh and Violet?

The Abbeville Connection

Phillip Henley Porter b 1862, Pickens County, Pickens, SC is quoted as saying that Hugh Porter made several trips back to Ireland to bring other family members. South Carolina enacted special legislation to attract settlers by offering free land. Records in Abbeville, SC indicate that a ship bearing "poor Irish immigrants" arrived Charlestown, SC in 1767. Passengers included Hugh, Archibald and Alexander Porter, who were awarded land grants in the now Abbeville area.

There are reports that Ulsterman Hugh Porter; a noted Indian fighter was killed in 1780 in a skirmish with the Indians and Tories. His wife Elizabeth petitioned the State for a widow's pension. The census report for the Old 96 District showed only one Hugh Porter in 1790. Reports indicate that Hugh and Violet had removed from North Carolina and had settled in the Abbeville area ca 1774. Reports indicate that Violet died in 1791 and is buried near the present Belton, SC. Reports exist that Hugh died in 1795 and also 1808.

What was the relationship between the various Porter families of Abbeville?

Tentative Conclusions

The will of Hugh Porter d 1808 names children who are currently credited to Hugh and Violet, including Phillip. This lends some credibility to the supposition that the named children on the chart are actually theirs. There are troubling questions concerning the will and the relationship of those listed to Hugh and Violet.

appear to satisfy us, in addition to those within the knowledge of many of our members, that these officers have, for several years, committed the grossest outrages upon the persons and property of many of our law-abiding citizens, on the merest of legal proof whatever that they were in some way connected with the illicit distillation or sale of intoxicating liquors."

Judge T J Mackey, after reading the grandjury's report and being impartial toward any lawlessness, issued warrants for the offending revenue officials along with that issued for Redmond.

Judge Mackey also initiated discussion, among appropriate officials, about amnesty for the illicit distillers and whiskey dealers. Upon written assurances given him by Commissioner Thornley and pending negotiations between Governor Hampton and President Hayes, he issued the first document offering amnesty.

It contained in part, "I hereby guarantee that if any person, who has been associated with the outlaw Lewis R Redmond, in violating the laws of the State, shall surrender himself to the Sheriff of Pickens County within five days, and shall give his own bond, without surjeties, in the sum of one hundred dollars, henceforth to to keep the peace shall not be prosecuted for any such violation of the laws of the State.

"... that if any person who surrenders himself as herein stipulated, shall be chargeable with any offense against the revenue laws of the United States, he shall not be arrested, and all proceedings against him shall be suspended..."

This action by Judge Mäckey was intended to further isolate Redmond from his associates. Mackey considered him the sole cause of all the troubles in the Upstate. He also set an irreversible precedent, even after the events of the following months would indicate it should have been

otherwise.

Judge Mackey left the Pickens the first of April to return to Charleston. The KEOWEE COURIER in its 4 April issue noted his departure, "Judge Mackey found the county in a state of general confusion and left it in peace and order. He exhibited both firmness and sound judgment under the circumstances surrounding him and produced a good impression on the people and a wholesome influence on the future administration of the county." 'Peace and order,' if it ever existed, did not last long.

Almost before Mackey left, the PICKENS SENTINEL had heard rumors that Redmond was willing to surrender and accept the terms imposed on the other violators. He even stated, ".... The killing of Duckworth in North Carolina was self defense and is willing to take his chances in that state."

The KEOWEE COURIER 28 March article continued, "By those who know Redmond, he is spoken of as a peaceable, quiet citizen, though he is fearless and will not be insulted, robbed and oppressed without offering resistance."

OFFICIALS REACT TO NEWS REPORTS

With the recent happenings at the jail and Hendricks house the revenue collector E M Brayton, over in Spartanburg, sent a telegram to the Washington authorities. His version of the events were "that the party which rescued the illicit distillers from Pickens jail was composed of about thirty-five men under the leadership of the notorious Redmond, who shot officer Barton a few months ago and who, it will be remembered, is a fugitive from North Carolina, where there is now a reward of \$1,000 offered for his apprehension as a murderer.

"It is stated that after the rescue Redmond and party went to the house of Wm Gary, who has incurred the enmity of the distillers by acting as guide to several revenue raiding parties, for the purpose of killing him, but ascertaining

that he was absent on a raid with Deputy Collector Hoffman, the rescuers started in pursuit and yesterday chased Hoffman, Gary and a posse of seven men with them across the country to Easley Station on the Air Line Railroad, where they now are."

From such wording the Washington authorities returned orders "to organize as large a force as necessary and capture Redmond and his gang at all hazards." The force was organized from Greenville, Spartanburg and Pickens Counties to pursue Redmond's "well organized band, well armed and equipped and as he defies arrest." Collector Brayton sent a telegram to the Columbia office reporting the latest developments, "Am on my way to Pickens County. Deputy Jillison reports that Redmond with thirty-five men pursued the revenue force all day yesterday. Two additionaly illicit distilleries were destroyed. The revenue force is being reinforced and Redmond and his gang of jail-breakers will be captured or driven to the mountains."

REDMOND DENIES PART IN JAIL DELIVERY

Redmond, however, had nothing to do with the jail break. He was in North Carolina that Saturday with, as Mr C McKinley reported, "plenty of witnesses to prove that he was in North Carolina at the time. And if this is not enough Sheriff Mauldin is ready to testify that he was not in the party who rescued the prisoners from his keeping. But the timorous revenue officers declared that 'Redmond and his gang of forty or fifty men' had chased them across the country for two days until they found them safely within the walls of Easley Station; someone had evidently stolen their overcoats from the (sometimes) inviolate sanctuary of a private dwelling.

"Judge Mackey and all the mighty revenue departments were excited for the fate of the country. An example must be made of somebody! Who so suited for the sacrifice as Redmond, the official revenue scapegoat, the raging ram

Archibald Lester Beacham was born May 1850 and died 16 July 1928. Elizabeth Anne Fowler Beacham was born August 6, 1853 and died 1942. They are buried beside Hartwell and Mariah L Beacham in the Edgewood Cemetery in Greer, SC.

Archibald Lester and Elizabeth Anne Fowler Beacham married in 1872 had 8 children:

- 7. Miriam Beacham born Aug. 1885 (Miriam Stewart) married Jacob Stewart (had 11 children)
- 8 Paul Franklin Beacham born Sept. 18 1888 married Sara Nell (had 2 children) These dates are from census reports and The House of Fowler.

Note: In 1900, daughter Mary Beacham is listed in the household of Archibald Beacham as a Smith and a granddaughter of Archibald is listed as Lela Smith age 2. The House of Fowler lists her as Mary Beacham Egan with Lelia Egan and Ed Egan as her children. Ed is a biological Egan and Lelia is a Smith Egan. Lela was probably adopted by Mr. Egan or used his name. Mary later married a Mr. Lackey. The Grady Smith family remembers her by this name. Hope Beacham relates that Mary married a Mr. Garrison last. Unknown is these husbands died. Hope thinks she divorced Mr. Egan.⁷

In the 1880 census Archibald is listed as A.L. Beacham age 30 living in Greenville County, Bates Twp. He lists Elizabeth as wife age 26. Both born in S.C. Children are:



- J. G. Good served in Co. F, 1st S. C. Cavalry Regiment, C.S.A. He resided in the western division of Pickens District, South Carolina.
- S. D. Goodlett was the husband of
 Mary L. Goodlett who died in 1876.
 After the Civil War, this Confederate veteran practiced law in Pickens, S. C., and resided on a two-acre tract of land immediately west of Pickens Presbyterian Ch.
- John S. Goodman (1847-1910) ran away
 from home during the Civil War
 and joined his father in Virginia.
 The elder Goodman was sutler of
 Co. D, 14th S. C. Infantry, C.S.A.
 This Confederate veteran was an
 early employee of Clemson A. & M.
 College.
- William Pulaski Goodman was captured by Union troops at Falling Waters, Maryland. He was later exchanged as a prisoner of war. After the Civil War, he moved to Texas, where, on May 4, 1873, he was scalped and killed by Indians.
- William Wallis Goodman (1822-1901)

 was the husband of Annetta S. Cole
 Goodman (1827-1902). He entered
 the Confederate Army when he was
 forty years of age and the father
 of eight children. He served as
 sutler of Co. D, 14th S. C. Inf.
 He was buried at the Old Stone
 Church near Clemson, S. C.
- H. R. Goodwin was the husband of Elizabeth Goodwin (1828-1903). He lost a limb as the result of a Civil War battle wound. In 1886, he resided in Oconee County, SC, and was the recipient of a voucher for the purchase of an artificial limb.
- Douglas E. Gosnell (1827-1906) was the husbamd of Susan A. Gosnell (1846-1928). They resided on waters of Rices Creek in Pickens County, S. C., and were buried at Bethlehem Methodist Church. In 1922 the widow was the recipient of a Civil War pension.

- L. Franklin Graham (1829-1911) resided in Oconee County, S. C., in 1899, and was the recipient of a Civil War pension. His wife was Mary M. Abbott Graham (1839-1914). This Confederate veteran enlisted in the army as a private July 1, 1862, at the age of thirty.
- William Washington Graham enlisted in Co. K, 4th S. C. Volunteers, C.S.A. on June 2, 1861. In 1899, he resided in Oconee County, S. C., and was the recipient of a Civil War pension. His name was also on the 1902 pension list in Oconee Co.
- Graham (given name unknown); in 1899, Temperance J. Graham (1814-1907), widow of a Confederate veteran, was the recipient of a pension in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- W. M. Grahl (1828-1905) was the husband of Emily Grahl, and in 1902 his name was on the pension list in Oconee County, S. C. This Confederate veteran and his wife were buried at Walhalla West-view Cemetery in Walhalla, S. C.
- Edmund W. Granger (1843-1926) served in Co. B, 16th S. C. Infantry, C.S.A. On October 6, 1872, he married Martha Susan Gossett (1849-1928). He was a son of Abraham Granger (1801-1885) and Mary "Polly" Allen Granger.
- James A. Granger (1837-1862) was a brother of Edmunh W. Granger (see above). He served in Co. K, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment) and died of typhoid fever at Lynchburg, Virginia, in 1862.
- Spartan B. Granger (1833-1910) served in Co. A, 16th S. C. Regiment and married Mary J. Alexander (1831-1911). He was a brother of the two Grangers listed above.
- M. B. Granger was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Pickens Co., South Carolina in 1899. Additional information could not be obtained for this listing.

Folks Today Ignorant Of Hard Times, Says County Woman, 18As War Begun

"Aunt Frank" Brown, 92, Has Never Taken "Drop Of Doctor's Medicine"

By BETH ANN WILES.

"Aunt Frank" Brown settled back in her rocker by the fire and said, with a shake of her head, "I'll tell you, people nowadays don't know anything about hard times. They might think they do, maybe, but if they'd lived through same of the days I have-" she looke off with another shake of her head, and her blue eyes became thought-

Miss Frances Brown, who is more familiarly known as "Aunt Frank," is 92 years young, and certainly the most remarkable person in the Concord section. Though she has lived for nearly a century, feebleness of old age has miraculously passed her by. A blue-eyed, white haired little woman. Aunt Frank is about five feet, at two inches tall and weighs around 120 pounds. She has never taken a 'drop of doctor's medicine" in her life, and only once has a doctor ever come to see her. That was a year or two age when she cut her leg and had to have the diessed properly. She has never known what it is to be on a diet. As a matter of fact, her appetite is as sharp now as it has ever been, and she eats whenever and whatever she wants to. If she happens to have a touch of indigestion, she merely takes a "pinch of sody." Soda is her one only stand-by.

NOT ONE MEAL IN BED.

Aunt Frank declares that she has never eaten a meal in bed in her life. According to her statement, she has always occu able to get up-and cook the meal herself, if necessary. ... She walks outdoors on the average of from two to three miles a day. She has a Jersey cow that she has milked for 16 years, and when she was 88 and 89 she had her own cotton patch which she herself worked. No one else was permitted to touch it. Each year she picked 1,500 pounds of seed cotton.

In addition, this energetic old lady still cuts out and makes her cwn dresses with her fingers, declining any help that is offered her. She also insists upon helping with the cooking. Then one of her favorite pastimes is reading. On a clear day Aunt Frank can read fine print easily without the aid of glasses, though when it clouds up, she says regretfully, she can't make it out plainly! It was a cloudy day upon the occasion of our interview and Aunt Frank was disappointed because she couldn't read about the governor's inaugRecalls Old Days



worse than any depression the present day generation has known. Women and children went out to work in the field. She and her mother and younger sister did the plowing and hoeing, and when trees were cut down for stove wood, they hauled the wood to the house themselves and cut it up. Plain, coarse food was the fare upon which people lived then. In order to obtain salt, which could not be purchased, they shoveled up the dirt from the smoke house floor where the brine from the meat had dripped and boiled the salt out of it.

Fortunately, the Brown was never raided by the Yankees.

"One day," Aunt Frank related, "we had started out to the field to hoe the corn when we saw a soldier standing in the road nearby. He called to us to come back. but we were frightened and went on without paying any attention. But the farther we went the louder he called to us to come back. and we decided we'd better do as he said. When we reached him we saw that it was only my uncle. It was a relief because we had thought he was a Yankee. Yankees rode up into our yard several times, but they never en-tered the house. They told us nach time not to be frightened. Once

TELLS OF EARLY DAYS This remarkable Anderson county women has lived at the old home place beyond Concord church for 60 years or more. It is now the residence of Mr. and 'Mrs. Monroe Smith with whom makes her home. Aunt Frank has an unusually keen memory and en joys talking about early times when she was young.

"I was born seven miles below Anderson near Dean's Station. she said. "Before the Civil War. my father, John M. Brown, was an overseer of slaves for large slaveowners. I recall that some of those for whom he worked were Uncle Mose Denn, Dick Baker, Elijah Webb, Milford Burriss, and James Daniel. Elijah Webb and Milford Burriss owned around 50 or tlaves aplece."

Large slave-owners in those days always employed overseers to look after their negro slaves, and their

work on the plantation.

"Whenever a negro on the farm wanted to go somewhere off the place, he came to my father and asked him for a pass," Frank related. "The slaves' houses were always built in a long row. Every Monday, my father would measure out three pounds of meat, six pounds of flour, a quart of molasses and a peck of meal to each head. That was the supply of food furnished each slave, both children and adults."

The first school which Frank attended was at old Fellowship church, later changed to Unat Generostee. Her teacher, she recalls, was Alec Mc-Kinney. Where the present Union Paptist church stands today there was also once an old field school which she attended as a child. It was taught by Hose Hayes. The old lady tells of the rude building, the slab benches, the shuttered windows, and doorless entrance that was the school which she remembers.

18 WHEN WAR BEGAN.

She was 18 years old when the Civil War began. John Brown and his wife and three children were still living near Dean's Station, where Brown was overseer on the plantation of Jack Jones.

"I remember that it was on a Saturday when the Fourth regiment received its orders." Aunt Frank said. "Charlie Mattison was colonel and Tom Dean captain of the company in which all the men in that section were enlisted. My father marched off to war with the rest of them. My brother, Rev. William Brown, was a cripple, however, and remained at home with mother, my sister and me."

Civil War days, she states, were

tered the nouse. They told us caels time not to be frightened. Once a group of them had just been routed by the Confederates and at another time they came and searched the barns for a man who had run away. When the Yankees were raiding this section, we heard that they went into one house not far away and, ripping open e feather bed, scattered the feathers up and

down the road."

AND Prank has woven many thousands of yards of cloth in her lifetime. The oldtime method of making clothes is one of her favorite topics of conversation.


"I never went to town when I was a girl," she told us. "Everything that we wore was made at home then. The women wore cotton dresses and stockings and pasteboard bonnets, and we were just as proud of our new bonnets as if they had been bought at some of these fine stores of today. Everything was done by hand. At night the neighbors would come in or we would go over to a neighbor's house and all the women would sit around the fire and talk while they picked the seed out of the cotton by the light of tallow candles. During the war when tallow was scarce, candles were made by drawing strings through bees wax. Pine knots were frequently used, too."

The next day the cotton was carded and spun. Aunt Frank did lots of fancy weaving. "I did lots of double weaving," she explained. "It took four treadles for that, you see. We dyed cloth by boiling the thread with different barks like red oak, maple bark, and green eedar. But for indigo blue we used a dye pot. It was lots of trouble, but the cloth was pretty. Some wore white stockings, not bothering to dye them, but I always liked them dark. Our shoes were made out of red leather tanned at the tanyard. My brother made the shoes for our family. We lined them with cotton cloth, made a facing around the top and blacked them with copras and sweet milk."

After the war, John Brown was warden at the county home for three years. He then purchased the farm in the Concord section and moved his family there. It has been Aunt Frank's home ever since. This old lady loves her simple life, and although she has no objection to the hurry of modern life, she prefers to live quietly at home, busying herself with chores around the house and yard. bed by seven o'clock, up in the morning at six or six-thirty, and a day that is fully occupied. In such a manner does Aunt Frances Brown, alert and active at 92, spend her days at the old homeplace out at Concord.



The memorial will include:


- ★ A life-size bronze statue of General Andrew Pickens, the namesake of our county.



THOMAS B. SMITH- A friend at Easley Station has enclosed to us, two letters from a Mrs Elizabeth (Day) Smith, dated at Youngsville Postoffice, Talapoosa County, Alabama and directed to the Postmaster at that place, making inquiries about one T.B. Smith who she said is her husband and who deserted her last winter without cause.

Smith lay around Easley for some time, representing himself as a widower having recently lost a wife in Alabama, and endeavored to marry again. He also claims to be a Mason and fequently appeals to members of the fraternity for pecuniary assistance. He is about five feet nine inches in height, wears a long red beard, which he occasionally dyes black, closes his eyes when talking to any one and looks off in another direction when he opens them. Since the reception of Mrs Elizabeth Smith's letters by the Postmaster, he has left for parts unknown. He is doubtless a base imposter and we trust our exchanges will hand him around. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 16 Sept 1875

Additions by Linda G. Cheek: Elizabeth Day b. 11 November 1837 Easley, Pickens Co SC d. 29 Aug 1908 aged 70 years 9 mo and 18 days d/o Bradwell and Elizabeth Cansler Day m. Thomas B. Smith died aged 80 years, Confederate Soldier and a Mason, they are both buried in Day Family Cemetery. Both Charter Members of Zion United Methodist Church in Easley, SC in 1828. It is likely that Thomas B. Smith b. 1830 d. 1910 age 80 was a son of Hampton Smith Jr. and Mattie Smith who were also Charter Members of this church.

SIDI H. BROWN- (His picture was in the March 1999 Newsletter) -- the Rev. Sidi H. Browne, one of South Carolina's most distinguished citizens, the oldest minister of the State Methodist conference and the oldest newspaper man in the State, the venerable and esteemed editor of the Christian Neighbor, died at his home in this city last night. The news of his death was most unexpected and was a shock to his friends. He lacked but 19 years of living a full century. But few of his friends dreamed of his impending dissolution.

Sidi Hamet Browne was the son of Elijah and Sarah McPherson Browne. He was born in Old Pendleton District, now Anderson County, SC. 23 Sept 1819. He grew to young manhood working on his father's farm, occasionally attending a neighborhood "Old field" school, which constituted all the educational advantages be enjoyed. Private, unaided study enabled him to qualify himself for school teaching, which vocation he followed until he became a Methodist preacher. He was admitted to the South Carolina conference in December 1845, after which his ministerial work was as follows:

Mr Browne became a "supernauate" at converence held in Spartanburg Nov 30 to Dec 5, 1887 and sustained that relation from that time until the end.

Mr Browne was a delegate to the general conference of the Southern Methodist church held in 1862, 1868 and 1874 and represented his conference as a special delegate to the meeting of the Universal Peace union held in New York in 1891.

Becoming impressed with the sinfulness and horrors of war and its antagonism to the teachings of Jesus Christ he established the Christian Neighber in Columbia on 2 April 1868 and from that time until the day of his death he conducted it in the interest of "Peace and Arbitration." Christianity and Methodism. It's term of consequitive editorial service was longer than that of any other southern Methodist editor. In October 1872 Mr Browne organized the South Carolina Peace society and ever afterwards was its president.

He was twice married-first in 1838 to Miss Eliza Emeline Geer who born him two children, she died in 1844 and on 3 Dec 1850 he married Miss Amelia Martha Bass, daughter of Rev. Henry Bass. Four sons and two daughters were the fruits of this union. All of his children are dead except a daughter by his first wife and a son by his second. His second wife died in 1895. The funeral services will be held at the Washington Street Methodist Church on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

Mary Beacham, daughter of Archibald and Elizabeth Anne Fowler Beacham was born March 3, 1879. In the 1900 census, she is listed with the family of Archibald Beacham as Mary Smith with a child Lela Smith, born January 1898. In the House of Fowler, she is listed as Mary Egan with two children.

- 1. Lela Egan, born February 17, 1898. Lela married Harrison Slatton and they have 5 children: James, born 1918, Ralph, born 1920, Mary Lane, born 1924, Hattie, born 1932, and Carl, born 1935.
- 2. Ed Egan, born April 17, 1906. He had not married. Ed Egan is reported to be living in California.

Mary Beacham married first a Smith, then Egan, then Lackey, and lastly Garrison.

presently to be caught in the thicket!"

It has not been determined how much, if any, truth there were in reports of Redmond attacking and chasing revenuers across the upstate. It seemed to be in his nature to 'stay out of the way' rather than lead a dozen friends against fifty or more men with fire in their eyes.

After the conduct of the revenue officers became well known, some, if not many, offered Redmond morale support. The SENTINEL reporter for Central, he went by the name Rover, expressed it simply. "Rover was roving about the 'scene of action' in the mountains trying to gather some dots. He didn't get but two, 'Redmond' and 'Revenue'. He tried to get a 'squint' at the famous King 'Red' but failed. If you see anything of him, tell him to come down to Central for 'Old Rover' and several other chaps would like to see him and shake his 'paw.'"

By the middle of April the \$1,000 reward for his capture had shrunk to \$500. Governor Vance of North Carolina raised the original from \$200 to \$300, the one for the Duckworth killing, and Governor Hampton added \$200, for his supposedly jail break and coat stealing. The HENDERSONVILLE VINDICATOR commented about the rewards for Redmond. "It is probable that the President will also offer a large reward for his body. When the aggregate amount reaches one thousand dollars, it is propable that some fool will try to take him and get killed for his trouble."

REVENUERS MAKE MISTAKEN RAID

During March. April and May 1878 with Redmond 'branded by the revenue officials as renagade', the officers deemed few citizens innocent of being part of his gang or providing aid and support for his cause. The revenue officials took out their fustration on those who were easier caught, innocent or guilty, warrant or no warrant.

In one incident, on 15 April, a man was returning home when Gary, Springs and ten others passed him in the road.

When he saw them turn, throw down his fence and ride into his field he hurried to catch up. They fired their guns as they rode. They were shooting at his 16 year old son who they wounded and left hollowing and bleeding in the field. When he caught up with them at his house, he asked who they thought they were shooting. Gary said 'Redmond.' He told them that Redmond was not near there and that they shot his son. Gary said that it made no difference and pushed open the door and searched the house. No authority was ever presented.

This almost fatal mistake appeared in the papers as "Redmond Reported Shot." The GREENVILLE NEWS reported 'the rumor' as happening on a Sunday which would have been 14 April. It continued, ".... a party of gentlemen, while riding seven miles above Pickens C. H. came upon the desperado Redmond. Several shots were fired simultaneously from both sides and Redmond was wonded in the hips and side of the head but not seriously. Redmond's friends appeared on the scene and carried him off after he was shot. The rumor may be regarded as true execpt as to results."

The PICKENS SENTINEL version was this way. "They went to his home in Oconee County, some twenty miles from this place. They found Redmond at work in a field and approached within forty or fifty yards of him before they were discovered by him. He started to run when he was halted by the party. He did not stop but kept up his run when the deputy sheriff (Mason) and party fired at him twelve times. He ran up a mountain and made his escape. The party thought they hit him but were not sure."

The SENTINEL followed up by stating that other accounts indicated he was not wounded. It also stated, "We would have noticed this last week but was requested by Mr Mason not to say nothing about it." This could have been an effort to cover up the 'mistake.'

On 20 March Thomas McKinney, the postmaster for the

Eastatoe valley, was repairing a fence when about twenty men rode across his field toward him. They arrested him and carried him off to Walhalla based on one of them saying. "I know you, you g-d d--n grey bearded son of a ----; arrest him, he has a still house up the branch." They showed no warrant until the next day in Walhalla, supposedly sign by Thornley. He later meet Thornley who assured him that he never issued a warrant and if such was out it was a forgery.

While these revenue officers were in Walhalla their conduct left much to be desired. The KEOWEE COURIER, 28 March 1878 issue, reported ".... The conduct of these revenue officers and men was anything but becoming to those who are enforcers of the law, and who should be exemplars by showing that they themselves are ready to obey the law.... The contraband whiskey captured by them was freely drunk in broad daylight in the streets of Walhalla.... The characters of those who have heretofore been the executors of the internal revenue laws have been such as to bring the law itself into disrepute. The law to be respected must be executed by respectable men whose character and conduct is above reproach."

HOFFMAN REACTS TO NEWS AND COURIER

The conflict between the revenue officers and the citizens of Pickens County attracted the interest of the NEWS and COURIER in Charleston. They reprinted the incidents involving Neal and McKinney from the PICKENS SENTINEL in their paper. This got the attention of deputy collector Hoffman in Spartanburg. In his letter of 1 April 1878 to the NEWS and COURIER, (Source: KEOWEE COURIER 11 April 1878 issue), he defends his position.

"As long as the matter rested with the SENTINEL I only considered it loss of time to pay attention to it, but when it is laid before the public in your widely circulated journal it becomes my duty to beg space to vindicate the man I have the honor to command. The SENTINEL is either

Cherokee heritage discussed at meeting

People who are looking for information about their Cherokee roots have a source that is not far away.

That was the message that Bo Taylor of the Museum of the Cherokee Indian brought to the monthly meeting of the Old Pendleton District Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society.

Taylor told members the museum has an archive of more than 1400 published volumes and collections of manuscripts, photographs and microfilm concerning Cherokee history. The archive is available to tesearchers by appointment.

The museum also publishes the Journal of Cherokee Studies, which researches the history and culture of the Cherokee people.

Speaking of the history of Cherokees in the Upstate, Taylor said that the Indians that lived in Upstate South Carolina and Georgia were more advanced than the mountain Cherokee. "They had large farms and plantations. Some even had slaves," Taylor said. "The mountain Cherokee were thought of as being backward. We were sort of the hillbilly Indians. We pushed a plow through fough land."

The desirable land that the lower Cherokee possessed was the downfall of the lower Cherokee, Taylor said, because the white men wanted their land. Eventually the Cherokee were removed from the area.

The mountain Cherokee were not all removed. "Our land was so hard to farm, nobody really wanted it," Taylor said. "People today are putting up mansions on that mountain, but back then they didn't want it."

Responding to a comment that the Cherokee tribes were the most civilized of all the Indians, Taylor said that popular notion is only partially true. Looking back in Cherokee history, there are many savage and brutal events.

"We didn't get branded as the civilized tribe until we adopted the European culture," Taylor said. "I don't

like that. I shouldn't have to adopt somebody else's culture to be considered civilized. None of us should."

For that feason, Taylor said, it is very important for him to learn as much about Cherokee culture as he can, and to share that knowledge with the younger generation of Cherokee. Taylor speaks fluent English — in a southern mountain dialect that includes the term, "y'uns" — but he also speaks Cherokee. "Speaking the language makes hie feel closer to my ancestors," Taylor said.

Taylor applated the genealogical society's efforts in preserving local history. "Y'uns have the right idea," he said.

"I'm proud to be Indian. I'm proud of thy afficestors. Those of you who are part Irlsh, part Scottish, or whatever, must feel the same way about your ancestors."

When will my order be filled?

For any revision of the Old Pendleton Database (usually monthly), for which I have as many as 20 orders, I will make an update to the CD and fill all open orders prior to the 20th of the same month. If there are fewer than 20 orders, I will wait to make a CD revision until 20 orders have accumulated.

Can it be used on Macs?

Not currently. We are still working on that.

What if your CD-ROM can't read the disc?

These CD-r should be readable except by the very oldest CD-ROMs. I have successfully read them on an old 4X Mitsumi CD-ROM. If your CD-ROM will not read them, it really needs replacing. But you will get a chance to check the CD on your equipment before you pay for the CD. I am told that some DVD drives cannot read a CD-r disc, either, so you should check the documentation that came with your drive.

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You will be asked to agree to send a check immediately upon receipt of the CD (once you have verified it readable by your equipment). If it were not to readable by your PC (highly unlikely), you will have agreed to return the CD immediately.

How current will the data be when I receive my CD?

Very! I will ship out copies of the current version until 3 weeks after the release date. After that, any remaining orders will be filled with that for the following month.

Will there be a new version of the CD each month?

There will be a new version of the CD for any monthly revision of the database for which I have received 20 or more orders. If there are less than 20 accumulated orders for the CD, I will wait until 20 are received, then make a CD revision and fill the orders.

After I buy the CD, can I get just the additions later?

Sorry, no. GEDCOM include the relationships of all persons listed. The addition of new names provides not only additional information on other persons, but establishes previously unknown relationships for several-fold the number of persons added.





- John Gravely was a son of John Hensley Gravely and Margaret "Peggy"

 John L. "Squire" Gravely (18481924), who helped his mother take

 what is today Oconee County, S. C.
 He served in Co. C, 1st North Carolina Battalion (?). His wife was
 Mary E. Madden Green (1861-1938),
 who was the recipient of a Civil
 War widow's pension in Oconee County,
 S. C., in 1930.
- William L. Green (b. ca 1843 d. 1917)
 served as a private in Company D,
 Gist Rifles and was wounded during
 the First Battle of Bull Run on
 July 21, 1861. He was discharged
 because of a disability on Sept. 10,
 1861, but he re-enlisted in Co. H,
 1st S. C. Regulars (Artillery) on
 7 February 1863.
- Daniel Grice served to the rank of major in the Confederate Army. His wife was Isabella C. Boggs (b. 7 Aug 1836 d. 20 Mar 1909). Major Grice was born on July 20, 1826, and he died May 19, 1896. He was buried at Carmel Presbyterian Church in Pickens County, S. C. He was a teacher and an attorney in Pickens District.
- Abner Teague Griffin (1835-1864) enlisted in the army on December 26, 1861. He was a son of Elihu Griffin (1800-1877) and Elizabeth Gary Griffin (1805-1873) of Pickens District, S. C. This soldier died while in the army (on 4 Jul 1864), and his widow Sarah Dean "Sallie" Ferguson Griffin married William A. McFall.
- Anderson "Andy" Griffin (1821-1887)

 was a son of Sargeant and Avarilla
 Barton Griffin. He lost an arm
 while fighting in the Civil War,
 and in 1880 he received a voucher
 for the purchase of an artificial
 limb. He was once described in The
 Pickens Sentinel as a "gallant onearmed Confederate soldier." He
 married the Widow McKay.
- Benjamin Pinkney Duckworth Griffin was an African-American (slave of Elihu H. Griffin of what is today Pickens, S. C.). He entered the Confederate Army on September 14, 1863, and later received a pension.



Dear Mother [Mrs. Anna Hallum] February 21, 1817

It is with love and respect to you that I take my pen in hand to write to you to let you know how I have passed these lonesome days and nights of grief and wonths of woe. I seek repose in vain. I am often made to cry and say within myself, where is my kind husband, my bosom friend, my children's tender father, who so often has kissed and embraced us. He is now cold and silent in the tomb. I trust I shall meet him in heaven where I shall rest in his bosom like I azurus in Abraham's bosom.

Dear mother you can't think how glad I would be see you. I am very unwell at this time with a bad cold. Your little grandchildren as well. Elvira talks about you all very often. Joel is very fat and hearty. My little John has had a rising in his ear that made blue sees as a second and well and I think he will be the picture of his dear father for me to look at.

I had heard that sister **Betsey** is married. Tell her that I wish her all the happiness that this world can afford. Mother sends her love to you. Remember me to all my dear sisters and brothers and all inquiring friends. I have nothing more at present and must conclude with my sincere affection for you my dear mother until death. **Sally Hallum**

I Tillman Miller of Pickens County State of South Carolina, being of sound mind etc. First after all my lawful debts are paid and discharged and my funeral expenses are settled the residue of my estate real and personal I give and bequeath and dispose of as follows: To my beloved wife Sarah Caroline, I will that whatever of property or money that may now be due her or me or may hereafter be coming to her from her fathers Estate she is to possess enjoy and dispose of as she may see proper and futher one horse, wagon and harness, one good set plow gear and two bridles, two plow stocks with three bits or plows to each, three hoes mattock and sprouting hoe and iron, chisil, drawing knife, horse to be selected by my Executors at the time with regard to its suitableness for the use of my wife, one cow and calf and large heifer or two cows to be selected by her, three eve sheep that may belong to the estate at the time to be selected by her, five head of stock hogs also a sufficient amount of bottle provisions both for man and beast that will enable her to make the next succeeding crop. Also four hundred dollars in cash to be invested by my Executors according too their best skills and judgement and in conjunction with the money I will my minor children ___ land as a home for my wife and minor children during the life time or widowhood of my

wife. My Executors use only what may be absolutely necessary of my minor childrens money in the purchase of a home for them and my wife. To my wife what household and kitchen furniture as she and my executors may determine. My land if _____ by me at the time of my death be divided by my executors into four tracts said division to be made judiciously so as if possible to give each tract the benefit of Woods and Water and so that it may bring as much unto the estate as possible when sold. These four tracts of land so divided with all my personal effects my executors are to sell on the place with lease expense practical and upon such terms and conditions as my executors may at the time deside proper. The proceeds of this sale whatever it may be I will that it be divided equally amonst all my lawful heirs of children share and share alike until the estate is expended. Provided that those of my children who have heretofore received property or money are to have nothing until the rest of my heirs who have received nothing or not so much as the others are brought up equal with the rest. I appoint my son Alexander Miller and my son-in-law John S. Thackston to be Executors Sg. Tilmon Miller. Wit by: R.E. Bowen of Georges Creek SC, L.S. Brazeale of Georges Creek, SC and John R. Gosett of Georges Creek, SC. Prob. 29 Oct 1871.

JOHN SWORDS AND ELEANOR SWANCY SWORDS:

Will of John Swords Sr. Land on Cuffy Creek and 5 negroes to be sold and money put out at interest for use of wife as long as she remains widow. Then divided as follows: To son Andy, son-in-law John Pilgram, son John, daughter Esther Moore all \$1.00. After these payments rest equally divided among following: son William, son Jonathan, son-in-law William Elrod, son-in-law William Swords and son-in-law William Elrod. Dated and proved 15 Jan 1834 Sg: John Swords X wit: E.B. Benson, Fair Kirksey, John S. Sloan. Anderson Co SC Will Bk A pg 498-499

John Swords enlised in Rev War while residing in York District SC enlisted in the spring of 1777 in Chester, SC under Mr Johnson into Capt George Warleys Company of the 6th Reg of Infantry of the SC line of the Continental

Army for term of 3 years and was in the Snow Campaign. He was on the Florida Expedition and in the battles at Beaufort and Stono. He was in the seige of Savannah for 9 weeks under Capt. Boyce who was slain in the battle He assisted one of his fellow soldiers to carry off his Captain was taken prisoner by the British and kept 2 weeks before he escaped and would have starved but for the charity of some Americans who divided their provisions with him made his way home and remained at home a while. Col. Bratton requested him to assist to turn the militia out which he did and was in the battles at Rock Mount, Hanginig Rock and Eutaw Springs. He was at Laurens Ferry on Santee when the VA regiment were ordered home and passed on after peace was made. He was 2 years and 8 months in the regular service before he was taken prisioner --His father who was in the service at the same time was made a prisioner at Charleston --he reared a family by manual labor.

On 3 Sept 1819 Elijah Brown of Pendleton District stated in 1777 Gen or Col Sumpter was appointed to raise the 6th Regiment and soldiers was to assemble at the Cross X-road now a part of Chester District then York District, SC. My father Wm Browne lived in 2 miles and Major of the Regiment, this is where I became acquainted with John Swords mustered as a soldier of the Reg. enlisted by Lt John Montgomery and enrolled in Capt George Warleys Co. In 1778 he was in the Florida Expedition.

26 Oct 1847 John Swords (his son) made application a resident of Anderson District SC and son of John and Eleanor Swords dec'd, aged 52 states his father and mothers family records that they were married 24 April 1782 and lived together until his death 28 Sept 1834 and his mother remained a widow until her death 3 May 1841 as appears from the family records. The heirs at law of said dec'd are: William Swords, Isabella Pilgram, Dorcas Elrod, Elizabeth Elrod, Ruth Newton, Esther Moore, Mary Morris having died 30 March 1841 and Jonathan and Andrew Swords having moved to the far west and knows but little about them and has small hopes of ever seeing them again. misinformed or it wilfully perverts the truth. Mr Lanford's version of the Neal affair, published in the GREENVILLE NEWS, is to my personal knowledge the true one. The SENTINEL's reply proves nothing except the writer's malice.... The story concerning Mr McKinney is equally false and as this gentleman has already declared the statements untrue in the presence of reliable witnesses I will only mention this fact."

He continued by stating that the deputy collectors selected by Brayton were specially instructed to perform their duties with as much leniency as possible. He also stated that "every consideration was shown the prisoners" even allowing them to ride while the deputies walked. Commissioner Ladd was selected so as not to interfere with the work of the regular commissioners and provide persons to obtain a release 'on the ground' if proper bond could be given.

He considered that the troubles began with the fact that Pickens and Oconee counties had not been "molested by revenue officials" for the preceding two years. (His choice of words). And that when he did, he interfered with what a majority of the mountaineers considered a legitmate business, then a howl was rasied. "The action of the SENTINEL did much to increase the dissatisfaction. It obstructed the work of the revenue officials by publishing their movements and its openly expressed support encouraged violations of revenue laws."

He closed the letter with his example of what the common folk of Pickens County thought of revenue officers. "Nothing will probably illustrate the feeling against revenue officers plainer that the reply of a boy, about five years old, who was seated in front of a school house when the revenue force recently passed through Pickens. When asked which he deemed worse, a revenue officer or a horse thief, he promptly responded, 'A revenue officer.'

The KEOWEE COURIER presented Mr McKinney a copy of Hoffman's letter, as it appeared in the NEWS and COURIER, for the purpose of obtaining his response to be published in the same issue. McKinney responded in part, "Fearing that Mr Hoffman's memory is short, [he again describes the events of his arrest, without warrant, and the twenty mile journey to Walhalla.] Commissioner Ladd provided the 'on ground' release in Walhalla the next day so as to 'lessen their hardships'".

The KEOWEE COURIER also offered its commentary on the revenue matters. "We do not know that revenue officials have grossly oppressed our citizens or violated the law by transcending their authority, but we have heard this from good citizens both here and in Pickens. Whether those reports be literally true or not, all must feel that the United States has men holding these offices who should not be premitted to fill them, and that there must be some cause for so much complaint."

By the first of May 1878 the complaints brought action by Judge T J Mackey. He appointed a committee of three Grand Jurors to take testimony in regard to outrages committed by revenue officials. They held their first meeting on 4 May. "All parties in possession of any information concerning outrages committed by said officials are requested to come forward and give their testimony."

REDMOND RUMORS

Also in the 2 May 1878 issue of PICKENS SENTINEL is a report about Redmond's activities. "It is rumored that the revenue officials run up with Redmond one day last week and that Redmond refused to surrender and attempting to make his escape, the officers opened fire upon him. Redmond returned the fire still retreating. The skin on the back of one of the officer's nect was cut by a ball from Redmond's gun. One Mr Fisher, a citizen, who was with the officers (whether as a prisoner or acting in another capacity is not

known) had his arm broken by a ball from the same gun. Mr Fisher's horse was shot from under him. We have not heard the particulars of the shooting, nor do we know whether there is any truth in the statement. We have been told this, however, and publish it for what it is worth."

This probably is the only public account of a battle between Redmond and the revenue officers. And, as noted, it was then only rumored to have happened.

How the rumors flew and how printed reports were taken as gospel was best typified by the announcement of Sheriff Mauldin's latest newborn son. Leland O Mauldin was born about the last week of May 1878. In the social column of the PICKENS SENTINEL 30 May issue was this play on words. "Redmond (redman, as in a pink newborn) is now in jail and if any one desires to see him they can do so by calling on the sheriff who is quite proud of this new acquisition to his list of boarders and takes great pride in showing him."

Colonel D Wyatt Aiken had just begun his speeches in Congress about the conduct of the revenue officials, their abuse inflicted upon the citizens of his district. He had undoubtedly been keeping up with the news as reported in the local papers and his 1 June speech included the following comments.

"... Sir, the local newspapers received but yesterday tell me that an outlaw from an adjoining commonwealth...is confined in one of the jails there and put on exhibition, as Barnum would exhibit the hairy man, by one of these revenue officials as a curiosity because they accuse him of having violated the revenue laws time and again."

Other papers may have reprinted this social item from the SENTINEL as a genuiue news account with the heading of "Nortorious Outlaw Redmond Caputred!", and it was these local papers he referred to. If he had seen the SENTINEL he probably would have recognized the item for what it was intended to be.



Frank G. Mauldin Was Pickens County's First West Point Graduate By Charles H. Busha, Ph.D.

The United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, was founded in 1802. It was originally an engineering school but gradually evolved into a national military academy similar to those in Europe. Sylvanus Thayer (1785-1872), an early superintendent at West Point, became known as the "father of the Military Academy." He was a member of the institution's class of 1808. Thayer also served as an engineer during the War of 1812. Between 1817 and 1833, he completely re-organized the Military Academy and breathed new life into it. Moreover, John C. Calhoun (1782-1850), the noted statesman from South Carolina, played an important role in strengthening the U. S. Military Academy between 1817 and 1825. During those years, Calhoun was Secretary of War in the administration of President James Monroe (1758-1831).

The academy's corps of cadets is maintained by appointments made by several sources, particularly by elected national officials. The first person from Pickens County, S. C., to have received an appointment to West Point was Frank Gratin Mauldin. He was born August 16, 1864. In 1890 he was graduated with honors at West Point. By the time the First World War began, Mauldin was serving in the grade of colonel in the U. S. Army, and he was soon promoted to brigadier general. Frank Gratin Mauldin died January 25, 1940, and was buried in Sunrise Cemetery in Pickens, S. C. He was a son of Joab Mauldin (1839-1897), Confederate veteran, and Deborah Reed (Hollingsworth) Mauldin (1840-1911). Joab was a son of Milton "Major" Mauldin (1817-1860) and Sarah (O'Dell) Mauldin (1821-1905). Joab's wife was a daughter of James Ivy Hollingsworth (1811-1859) and Cynthia (Clayton) Hollingsworth (1812-1884). At least two of Joab's brothers also served as Confederate soldiers, and they were Elbert Mauldin (1841-1862), who was a member of Company E, 2nd S. C. Rifles and who died of disease in Virginia during the Civil War; and Elias Earle Mauldin (1848-1925), who was only sixteen years of age when he entered Company D, 1st S. C. State When Pickens and Oconee counties were created out of the old Pickens District in 1868, Joab Mauldin became Pickens County's first sheriff, and he remained its chief law enforcement officer until 1872. Then, from 1876 until 1884 he served again as sheriff of the county.

While Joab Mauldin's son, Frank, was still a cadet at West Point, a second Pickens County native entered the cadet corps there. He was Andrew Erwin Williams, who was born July 11, 1869, at Salubrity (Liberty) and was a son of William Stanton "Bill" Williams (1811-1880)---a merchant, farmer and postmaster of Salubrity Post Office---and his second wife, South Carolina (Feaster) Williams. The cadet's paternal grandparents were Jeremiah Williams, Jr. (1787-1855) and Charity Elizabeth (Stanton) Williams (1796-1873), both of whom were buried in the old Williams Family Cemetery, situated on Five Forks Road at Liberty. Andrew Erwin Williams was a half-brother of Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams (1844-1890), (continued on next page)

a Confederate veteras whose mother, Harriett (Worthington) Williams (1817-1847), was Bill Williams' first wife who died when Hub was three years old.

In 1889, the year of his appointment to the U. S. Military Academy, Andrew Erwin Williams, formerly of Pickens County, was living in Milam County, Texas, where his father had moved at an advanced age with his second wife and family. After his father's death in 1880, the young son made his home with the older and prosperous half-brother, Hub Williams, who had served as a second lieutenant in Company I, Palmetto Sharp Shooters, C.S.A. In the fall of 1866, Hub Williams had gone to Texas with his close friend **Manson Sherrill Jolly** (b. ca 1840 - d. 1869)---better known today as Manse Jolly---the legendary ex-Confederate soldier and "unreconstructed rebel." Manse Jolly was a native of the Lebanon community of Anderson District, S. C. He and several close friends, including Hub Williams, fled from South Carolina while being pursued by Frederal officials who were investigating hostile actions taken against occupation troops stationed in the Upstate shortly after the Civil War had ended.

On June 12, 1893, Andrew Erwin Williams was graduated at West Point and appointed a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army. For several months in 1895-96, Lieutenant Williams was on military leave. During that period, he made a semi-official bicycle tour of Europe and prepared a report on the practicability of the bicycle's use by European military forces. During the Spanish-American War, the lieutenant participated in the Santiago Campaign (July 1898); he also took part in action against Spanish forces at San Juan, Puerto Rico. For his service during the war, Lieutenant Williams was awarded a Silver Star Citation. He was promoted to first lieutenant in the cavalry the following year and later served a tour of duty in the Philippine Islands. In 1901 he was promoted to the rank of captain and placed in command of Troop H, Third Cavalry, with which he served for twelve years.

Captain Williams married Nelly Edwards of El Paso, Texas. The couple eventually become the parents of three daughters. In 1916 this career military officer received a promotion to major. He was also elevated to the rank of lieutenant colonel the following year. Then, as commander of the 313th Train and Military Police unit of the 87th Division at Camp Pike, Arkansas, Williams held a temporary commission as an infantry colone (from 1917 to 1920). During the First World War, he accompanied his military unit to France for duty with American Expeditionary Forces. After the war, Williams was promoted to the permanent grade of colonel (on July 1, 1920). Later, he was commander of the General Intermediate Depot at Atlanta, Georgia. He was subsequently transferred to the field artillery. Afterwards, and until his retirement on April 16, 1928, Colonel Williams was detailed with the Organized Reserves, Fourth Corps Area. Williams and his family moved to San Antonio, Texas, after his retirement. He died November 19, 1932. The following comments about this Pickens County native were made in a letter written by General Douglas MacArthur, Chief of Staff of the United States Army: "The records show that Colonel Williams was a loyal, fearless, and conscientious officer, whose long and faithful military career extended over a period of nearly thirty-five years' active and commissioned service. His death is deeply regretted."

Dear Brother & Sister

June the 4th 1862

Its with great pleasure I embrace the present opertunity of droping you a few lines to let you no that I am well at the present hoping when those few lines comes to hand They will find you all well and doing well received the letter which you sent me and Brother Milton was glad to hear from you all and to hear you was all well Milton has not got the letter yet the reason why he is at Richmond or Petersburgh in the hospitle & I dont no for certain which of the places he is at yet he has not wrote to me cince he went to that hospitle where he is at now and I dont no where to send the letters to for him to get it till he write to me I dont no how he is getting along for I have not heard from him cince I saw him last he was not so but what he could go about it is the same old disease that working on him his side and back hurts him so he cant muster nor he says he cant toat his Knapsack he has done a days service cince came in the Service nor I dont think he ever will be any service here at all for the rest of the neighboring boys They are all well except Anderson he has been very sick for some days past got the typhoid fever he is in the hospitle at Richmond I heard from him to day one of our men went to the city to he said he saw a man that stayed with him last night and he told this man that I told you went to the city that he was very bad off last night and he expected that he was dead by that time but I dont no whether it is so or not William Anderson went there this morning to see about him not got back yet if he gets back before I close this letter I will tell you the truth of it & if he dont get back before I close you must not tell his Ma about it nor you must not tell no other person so she can get hold of it for I dont no whether it is so or not nor if it aint so I dont want you to tell it at all I wanted to get to go with William to see him but there was no chance for he had to beg pretty hard to get to go by himself I went to the hospitle at Ashland with him and waited on him till he was caried to Richmond and then I had to return to my Regt I hated to have to leave him but I had it to do a man has to do just as he commanded to do he can't do as he pleases if could to of got to stayed with him I could a waited on him a heap better than he was I (k) now and a nother thing I would to of been a heap better satisfyed

I will tell you Something about where we are camped and what sort of situation we are in we are stationed on the Chickahominy River and we have got no tents only just our blankets streched up and that is a bad makeshift shure our Regt has been marching nearly all the time for two weeks in the mud and rain it has been raining ever night for two or three nights and it has been raining here to day nearly all day it has rained some as hard a rains as generly rains for the last week (cont.)

(continued) some of us can keep sorter dry and some dont they cant keep dry under a little blanket stretched up are stationd on one side of the Chickahominy and the yankys on the other side we are in a piece of wods and we can go out in the field two or three hundred yards from our camp and they bombed a piece of see the yankys out the other side woods on this side of the river yesterday they thought that some of our men was in the piece of woods they threw a good many bombs in that piece of woods we could stand and the smoke from their canons They threw some over our heads the other eavning and our men sent som back but the yankys did no harm nor I dont no whether our men did any or not they have been fighting a good deal below Richmond I cant tell you mutch about that fight but our loss was very heavy in killed and wounded but we whiped them badly from what I can hear the fireing was in hearing of us the loss on their side was supposed to be double of ours and the prisnirs You will be apt to hear of taken about six hundred Wm Anderson fight in the paper if you take the paper just arrived he says Anderson is not dead but he is very you can tell his Ma that he is very bad off but Anderson thinks that there is hopes of his recovering yet Brother I dont no whether I will ever which I hope he will see you nor sister nor none of the rest of you again or not but if it is not the lords will hope we will be prepaired to meet in heaven where there is no wars nor rumors of wars but I hope it is the lords will for us all to meet again on earth You must write to me as soon as you get this letter

You must write to me as soon as you get this letter and fail not we are looking for a battle here at any hour but I am not able to say when it will come off. Our troops is all around Richmond and whenever the fight dose come off it will be one of the bloodest battles that ever was fought to my opinion & I think it will last for severl days. So I must come to a close for This Time. So when this you see remember me though many miles apart we be

Another Great Great Grandfather

Peyton Thompson Burton, my great great great grandfather, was born 21 February 1807 in Georgia to Blackman Burton and Jane Yancey (Jinsey) Saxon. Peyton was probably married to Mary (Polly) Wiles. Polly was born in 1818 in South Carolina, probably to Freeman Wiles, a native of Danville, Virginia.

Peyton and Polly had seven children. I think that all of the children were born in Pendleton District.

- 1) Martha Ann Burton was born in 1833 and was married twice, to Jesse M. Simpson and to John Cunningham.
- 2) Elizabeth J. Burton was born in 1836.
- 3) Lucinda (Lou) Haseltine Burton was born on 28 April 1840 in the Pendleton District. The story was that Lou, a red-haired beauty, was engaged to another man, but broke it off because he was hiding from the war, known as a slacker. Lou's father had found out while he was hunting. He stopped at the slacker's house and saw him eating breakfast. So later, Lou was married about 1864 to Albert Chesterfield Beaty. [Note: A.C. Beaty, my great great grandfather, was the subject of the presentation that I gave two years ago at the Old Pendleton District Chapter meeting. One year ago at the same meeting, I presented a story about A.C.'s father John Wesley Beaty, another great great grandfather.] Lou died 28 June 1910 in Oconee County and was buried in the Bethel Presbyterian Church cemetary in Oconee County.
- 4) Sarah E. Burton was born in 1842 and was married to A. A. Freeman.
- 5) James William Thompson Burton was born in 1844. During the War Between the States a minnie ball hit him in the knee at Gaines Hill. He was noted as a cripple in the 1870 census.
- 6) Amanda C. Burton was born about 1847.
- 7) Caroline Medera Burton was born 27 January 1848 and was married twice, to William D. Scott, and on 11 January 1870 to George Middleton McKee. She lived with Mr. McKee in Walhalla. He was the executor for Peyton's will. Caroline died 17 August 1921.

Jesse Wiles, Polly's brother, age 45, was in the household in the 1850 census, and was noted as *insane*. Jesse does not appear in the subsequent census.

Incidentally, Peyton became a private in Capt. Andrew P. Butler's Company G, 1st Regiment of the South Carolina Volunteers of the Confederate States of America. On 16 August 1861 he joined at the age of 54! Peyton was wounded by a shot in the chest on 03 October 1862, and remained on the Muster Roll until 31 December 1864.

Peyton was also a big-time foxhunter. The story was told that Polly called for him from her sick bed "Are you going fox hunting? Are you going and let me die?" He called back "I'm going fox hunting!"

Peyton executed his handwritten will by the county clerk on 03 March 1886. He signed the instrument "P T Burton" in a shaky hand. Peyton died 06 March 1886 and is buried in Union Baptist Church cemetery near Iva. Polly died in 1894 and is buried there also.





Capt William Lynch aged 78 years died on the 15th ult. He was an old Revolutionary Soldier and a good farmer. Pendleton Messenger Issue: 2 Aug 1820

Mrs Ann and Capt William Lynch. Ann Moon b. 21 Feb 1754 in VA d/o Gidion and Mary Hudson Moon. Ann Moon m. 1st Ashwell Stone. They had children, Dicey, Mary and Bannister Stone. This Bannister Stone was the Capt Bannister Stone who married Elizabeth Kilgore and lived in Greenville, SC. After Ashwell Stone died, Ann married 2nd Capt William Lynch. They lived in the Old Pendleton District. Capt William Lynch was apparently given special "powers" by the VA Officials during the Rev. War. He captured, tried and in some cases executed prisoners. Thus the terms lynch, lynching, and lynch law came into usage. ______

LONG CANE MASSACRE: Submitted by Margarette Swank, 415 N. Main St Apt. 9-Q, Greenville, SC 29601 and sent to her on the Web by: Tom Calhoun of Charlotte NC:

1 Feb 1760, yesterday se'night the whol of the Long Cane settlers, to the number of 150 souls, moved off with most of their effects in waggons to go towards Augusta in Georgia and in a few hours after their setting off, were suprised and attacked by about 100 Cherokees on horseback, while they were getting their wattons out of a boggy place. They had amongst them 40 gunmen who might have made a very good defence but unfortunately their guns wree in the waggons. The few that recovered theirs fought the Indians half an hour and at last were obliged to fly. In the action, the lost 7 waggons and 40 of their people killed or taken (including women and children). The rest got safe to Augusta whence an express arrived here with the same account on Tuesday morning.

The South Carolina Gazette: 23 Feb 1760 interview with Mr Patrick Calhoon:

Mr Patrick Calhoon, one of the unfortunate settlers at Long-Canes who were attacked by the Cherokees on the 1st instant as they were removing their wives, children and best effects to Augusta in Georgia for safety, is just come to town and informs us that the whole of those settlers might be about 250 sould, 55 or 60 of them fighting men. That their loss in that affair amounted to about 50 person, chiefly women and chilfen, with 13 loaded waggons and carts. That he had since been at the place where the action happened in order to bury the dead and found only 20 of their bodies, most inhumanly butchered. That the Indians had burnt the woods all around about, had left the waggons and carts there empty and unhurt and that he believes that all of the fighting men would return to and fortify the Long Cane settlement were.....etc.

We have no late advises from Fort Prince George or any consequences from places in that route but from Fort Moore we learn that a gang of about 18 Cherokees divided into 3 or 4 parties on the 15th instant, way-laid, killed and scalped Ulrie Tobler, Esq, a Captain of militia in those parts, as he was riding from his father's to that Fort and shot Mr William Calhoon, who was with him in the hand...the Indian who killed Capt. Tobler left a hatchet

sticking in his neck with three old notches cut in the handle and three new ones.

The location of the Massacre site is on the Road from Abbeville to Troy about three quarters of a mile from Long Cane Creek (Pattersons Bridge) and two and a half miles from Troy. No know published list exist of the victims of the massacre, however there are three stone markers on the site. Two were placed by Patrick Calhoun to honor his mother and the 22 others who were killed there and the other marker of recent vintage was placed there by the Norris family to honor their dead. Sg: Tom Calhoun, Charlotte NC.

He did a tremendous work laying out the different lineages and showing their connections. Now we can work to refine our information and document it as much as possible. But only if you forward to us! We ask that whenever possible, you include the SOURCE of your information, and as much detail as you want to give about the source. Tell us whose family Bible and where the person lived. Tell us the name of the grandmother who remembered. Tell us the book and page number of the Courthouse document, and which Courthouse. Photocopies, photographs, copies of old letters, checks, memos. Things like that!

HOWEVER!

If you have good information, and no time to gather all the documention –please just send us the information anyway. Later, perhaps we can find the source and add it. Or you might send it later. We can report it as unsubstantiated but reasonable information.

THE REASON

There is a lot of genealogy on the internet. You may have heard! There is a good amount about Bartons—but some of it is BOGUS! (If you are new on the net, be cautious. If you've been looking there already, you probably know this.) We want to keep our history as accurate as possible. Otherwise, it will have no meaning for our descendants. This is why it is important to add documentation now.

We have begun to post Indexes for Barton Bulletins on Debby Black's Website, and expect to have our own site by summer. Debby (Tulsa, OK) hosts a wonderful website. Bonnie Butler (Alexandria, VA) is developing a site that will include many Bartons! (Get URLs from the e-mail address given above.)

M. O. BARTON

Thanks to Frances Armaly, North Highlands, CA –we've learned that M. O. stands for Manelius Oliver! M. O. (1828-1864) is a descendant of Benjamin Franklin and Dorcas

Anderson Barton. Frances has forwarded much excellent information that was omitted from The BBk. We would like to know more about Dorcas! We know that she is a daughter of John Anderson and Sarah Carney, and that Dorcas met Benjamin during the Revolutionary War while she was under protection in Earle's Fort near Landrum, SC. In 1783 they were married at her home on the Pacolet River in what is now Spartanburg Co, SC. Benjamin died in 1818 in what is now Pickens Co, SC. If you know anything more about Dorcas Anderson and Benjamin, please let us know. One person especially interested is Malcolm Jones (105 Overlook Dr, Brevard, NC 28712)—a descendant who also actively seeks information on the Carney family.

ALLEN BARTON SEARCH

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
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September 1999 MEETING

YOUNGBLOOD: Mrs Nancy Jane Youngblood came and made oath that she did assault Sarah White to which she has pleaded guilty. That her husband William A. Youngblood was a carpenter employed by the contractor at the tunnel in this district, that then indigence required her to labor with her own hands to aid in the support of the family consisting of three small children. That she with the consent of her husband opened a boarding house at the tunnel for the laborers on the work force. That she did nearly all the cooking and washing from 10 to 25 boarders. That she hired a woman called Sarah Busclark and after the woman had been in her employ about 2 or 3 weeks she learned that her true name was Sarah White and that she was a loose woman. She dismissed Sarah White at the expiration of her month. That the manner of her husband changed very much towards her about the time the woman left and insisted that Sarah White should be retained of which she would not assent to. About two weeks after Sarah White left she learned that her husband was constantly visiting Sarah White. Then her husband left his own home, his wife and children and she learned engaged board for Sarah White at a house at Kuthans Copper mines. He was planning to take Sarah, steal away the oldest child of this desponent and go to South America to work on a contract which it was said Humbird had there to build a railroad. She had no food to eat and did not eat from Sunday to Thursday, but borrowed food to feed her children. She was sure Sarah White was the cause of her want. She went to the home where Sarah was staying and invited her to come and stay all night with her. The next morning this desponent rose early and went into the room where Sarah White was sleeping and began whipping her with some hickories she had gathered previously. She told Sarah White this was what you get when you go a fishing with a married man, you have parted us. When this desponent had given her what she thought she deserved Sarah White said "I intend to make you shed tears as big as tea cups, I have the money you worked for I intend to break you up, then this desponent commenced upon Sarah White again and inflicted upon her a severe chastisement, using only a hickory switch. Sarah White left.

Since the occurence her husband has returned to his home and has treated her with a tenderness, kindness and consideration worthy of his duties and obligation. Dated 20 March 1860. James Lawrence and F.N. Garvin made oath that Sarah A. White formerly Busclark is reported to be a common prostitute. Affidavits for Mrs Youngblood by Wesley Pitchford that he has known her for near seven years of being a good woman. Ambrose J. Smith states that he has known Mrs Youngblood from her infancy and she was a member of the Methodist church. Clerk Court Records Pickens Co SC Pack 227 No 15

CRYMES: Mrs Nancy Crymes wife of Mr George Crymes aged 75 died in Anderson District SC on the 19inst. A member of the Methodist church for many years. She has been married near sixty years, had six children and a large number of grand and great grandchildren. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 27 June 1845

Mr George Crymes departed this life at White Plains, Anderson District, SC on the 4th inst in the 80th year of his age. He was born in Lunenburg Co., VA and at the early age of 16 entered the Revolutionary Army and was present at the surrender of Lord Cornwallis to General Washington at Yorktown. He emigrated to this state in 1796 and lived the last 57 years in this district except the last year when he lived in Anderson. A member of the Baptist church. Will of Jacob Lewis dated 4 May 1837 prov 4 Jan 1858

Being in sound mind and reflecting on death I think it proper to make a will. My property to be sold at publick sail giving 12 months credit as much as seems not of use to my wife Ails Lewis. All just debts paid, to wife Ails during her lifetime or widowhood to whole of my home plantation with the addition of that Nix tract below the mill to my son Jacob and after my death that Jacob take possession of the mill, that he grind for his mother during her life time free, and that Jacob be good to my estate one hundred dollars, and that Jacob have every nessisary privilage that will be right so that my executors can rent the land that I leave to be rented for the support of my wife and cut and clear and make any improvement that will be necessary for his use. My wife have the power to keep all the house furniture and one horse as long as she is able to ride and some cows and watsoever may seem good. She to keep her girl Pheby as long at it may suit her and should she sell her etc. I also leave her 100 dollars for her use and pleasure and any money left to be divided among all my heirs viz: David, Abner, Joab, James, Jacob and dtrs: Mary Baker, Ann Beson Alexander, Elizabeth Stewart, Catharine Alexander. Sg. Jacob Lewis wit: Jacob Guyton, Micajah Alexander and Mary Wood X. Pickens Co SC Wills 1st Bk pg 239-240

DIED: Mr Lesley a young man living on the farm of Dr W.T. Field one day last week while falling a tree was caught under the falling tree. His head was severely crushed and he died instantly.

DIED: On Saturday afternoon Mr John Gilstrap an aged man died suddenly. He was apparently in perfect health and even just before his death, had walked out from his house a considerable distance. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 2 March 1876

GOODLETT: Departed this life at her residence in this District (Greenville) on North Saluda River on the 25th inst Saturday evening, Mrs Nancy Goodlett consort of the late William Goodlett, Esq deceased, aged 81 years and 2 months. She was Nancy Hooper before marriage and born on the 25 Jan 1762 in Mecklenburg Co VA from where her parents migrated to Spartanburg District SC during its early settlement, where she was married to her late husband on the 14 Feb 1786. She and her husband were among the first settlers of this District a few years after their union, at the place where they both died and their remaind are deposited within a few years of their first home. Her husband was severly afflicated with rheumatism. She was a member of the Baptist Church. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 31 March 1843.

DIED: Thomas M. Sloan died at his residence in Pendleton on Saturday the 8th inst at 7 o'clock in the morning in the 51st years of his age, after an illness of two weeks of bilious fever, leaving a wife and a number of children. He was a member of the Baptist church 20 years. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 21 Sept 1849

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A Pickens man, 'brother Speights', picked up on the joke and offered this comment. "Ish dot so? The real old simon pure blockade Redmond? Tell us now, friend Bradley (editor of the SENTINEL), have you got him! We know one or two revenue officers who will breathe free once more, and who would not be breathing now if Redmond could have got in his work."

Bradley explained the real circumstance. "He is not 'the simon-pure blockade Redmond,' but a new Redmond (redman) about three weeks old. We expect some of the revenue officers will faint when they read this explaination."

COLONEL AIKEN IN CONGRESS

Colonel Aiken did have more serious comments and points to make on the House floor. The debate was about repealing the infamous Section 3276 of the revenue statues, the source of searching private homes without warrant.

"There is no section of the Union in which the undue exercise of a little power has created greater confusion in communities and brought more opprobrium upon the whole people than in my own district.... They (revenue officials) never consider the constitutional requirement of having things done according to law; they must have a warrant or writ...."

He continued on siting incidences of abuse upon two or three of their victims after which he concluded, ".... That is the way your revenue laws are adminsitered and executed in portions of my district, and such instances are of frequent, almost daily occurrence."

REACTION TO AMNESTY OFFER

The initial response to Judge Mackey's tentative offer of amnesty back in March resulted in a 'fallen out' between Governor Hampton and the citizens of Eastatoe. The 30 May issue of the PICKENS SENTINEL stated this situation. The illicit distillers and sellers currendered themselves and

gave bond believing the amnesty was ineffect. Instead they were afterwards arrested and incarcerated by the revenue authorities who did not recognize the offer. The article went on the discuss that Governor Hampton was not aware of the agreement between Judge Mackey and Commissioner Thornley but was assumed to then be using his influence to gain the amnesty from federal officials and the President.

AMOS LADD

On the weekend of 8 and 9 June 1878, the affair of the revenue officials' zealous search for Redmond reached its fatally serious climax. It was the critical point on which the 'official view' turned from 'the common folk of Pickens and Oconee counties are mostly illicit whiskey distillers and supporters of an outlaw' to 'maybe it is true the revenue officials are themselves violators of law and order.' It was on this weekend that the killing of Amos Ladd took place.

Adeline Ladd was living was living in or near Rocky Bottom during the summer of 1878. Adeline and Redmond had developed a romantic interest over the months since he moved into the area during the winter of 1876 and 1877. Amos and Solathiel lived with their sister along with mother, Millie, who moved there from Sunset after Thile Ladd died.

Redmond made visits to the house as best he could with the revenue officials, lawmen and bounty hunters constantly hunting for him.

U S Deputy Marshalls Hugh P Kane, William Durham, and revenue officers George W Moose and Robert P Scruggs knew of this and on Saturday afternoon rode to the Rocky Bottom area. By that evening they had hidden themselves in the neighborhood near the Ladd home and setup watch 'to see What passed at that house.'

About late dusk, just before getting really dark, they saw a man come out of the woods and up to a fence near the house. He whistlad and rapped on the fence. This was

answered by a woman in the house who came out to meet him. They talked for some time but the man left to return to the woods and she to the house.

The officers did nothing but continued in their hidding for the night. Sunday morning they saw a man return to the house and was soon joined by a second.

Amos had just returned from a neighbor's house where he had either delivered or picked up something. Like most men of the time he had taken his 'squirrel rifle' along just in case some squirrel, rabbit or other game crossed his path. He put the rifle in a corner near the door. His brother Solathiel was busy around the home with other chores and they went into the house. Solathiel sat in a corner to shuck corn. Amos got a cow bell, one or two plough points and put them in a haversack which he slug over his shoulder and headed for the door. He was on his way back out to the neighboring blacksmith shop to have them mended.

Just as he reached the door he stopped to get his rifle; he may have dropped something which he bent to pick up. The officers by this time were charging the house from four directions. Without warning or commands to halt or identifing himself Kane fired upon the figure in the doorway. Durham just rounded the corner of the house to see Amos fall, but in his mind "he rushed towards me" and fired two more shots into Amos.

Solathiel upon hearing the gunfire rushed out the back door but was met by another of the officers who had a cocked gun in hand and ordered him back. This he did and they returned to the front of the house.

Mrs Milly Ladd saw the officer shoot "as soon as he could" and while she was crying to him "don't shoot." Amos had an arm upon the door as he fell.

Adeline, seeing Kane's approach, called out to him "Don't shoot! don't shoot for it is my brother." He made no halt but fired on him immediately.

He lived here continuous'y until his death. 1862, when the call was made for men of his age he enlisted in the confederate army in the 63 Ga. regiment and did service in the coast ar.itlery stationed at Thunderbolt, until his health gave way when he was honorably discharged for physical disability. He was the oldest member of the Calhoun Baptist Church, having joined soon after its organization in 1847 or -8. He was married to

Elvina A, Cobb, daughter of William Cobb, of Cherokee county, wife removed to that county from Pickens District, S. C. about the time that his father came to this county. She died May 4, 1892. He is survived by four sons, towit: Dr. W. M. Curtis, of this county, J. A. and Joseph E. of Atlauta, and N. C. Curtis of Calhoun; thirteen grandsons and ten granddaughters. He was the oldest son of his father's family of seven sons and survived them all except probably one, L. D. Curtis, who went west several years ago and has not been heard of in some time. produce legal interest I desire that my exectors and Executrix after named do keep my property together and plant my lands for four years if the produce of the four years crops should amount to the legal interest of sixty thousand dollars for four years then it is my desire that my property be still kept together as long as it shall in each and every four years be successfully and put to legal interest until my sons attain the age of twenty one years my daughter marriage or her attaining the age of twenty one year but if my property shall not in the first few years after my decease or in any four years thereafter produce the ammount of legal interest on sixty thousand dollars then the whole of my estate real and personal shall be sold to the highest bidder on such terms as my executors may think best for the interest of my Estate and the proceeds of such sale to be invested in such funds or stock as my said exors may deem most advantagious the interest and proceeds of such funds to be for the use and benefit of my heirs for their support so that the principal shall not be injured. Should it be necessary to sell my estate then I give unto my wife Ann J. Miles one fourth part of the proceeds of the sale thereof for her sole use and the residue I give unto my daughter Kezia and sons John and Jeremiah equally my daughter shall be given hers on her marriage or attaining the age of twenty one years, my sons shall be delivered to them as soon as they attain the age of twenty one years but if it shall not be necessary to sell my estate te interest required then I give the whole of my personal property to my wife and childred to be equally divided between them. My wife to have her share thereof on the day of her marriage in case she marries again and should she not marry again she is to receive it on my daughter marriage or attaining the age of twenty one years. I give my plantation whereon I now live to my wife until she marries again or dies and after her marriage or death I give the said plantation unto my son Jeremiah should he be living. I give unto my son John my other plantation called Greensboro should it not be necessary to sell.

Should any of my children die without issue I give unto the survivors the shares of my estate etc and my wife is to take no part of such deceased childs share by right of inheritance and should all my children die without issue then I give one half of my property herein divised to my children to my wife and her heirs forever and the other half I give unto my sisters and in case of there death to their children.

If my sons takes the lands bequeathed to them then in such case they must pay to their sister, Kezia, Two thousand dollars on the day they shall take properties and on their refusing to do so it is my will that said two plantation shall be sold and the proceeds thereof be equally divided between my sons and daughter.

I desire that my children receive good educations. I wish that my sons should be classically educated after which I desire that my sons John and Jeremiah shall have the benefit of some possession or trade which they may choose and of which they must make themselves fully masters if possible. My Executors and guardians of my said sons are to draw upon the proceeds of my property it is presemed that the surplus of interest or income which will arise in the early period of life will be sufficient to effect the purpose for the time being then and in that case the defienceny must be supplied from the said child.

Whatever property my daughter shall receive by my will shall be settled on her previous to marriage. The property given my wife is in Lieu of all Dower in my lands. I appoint William Postell, P? M. Matthew Mullinax Was a Revolutionary Patriot

A ceremony to dedicate a memorial for the Revolutionary War soldier Matthew Mullinax (b. ca 1760) was held October 24, 1982, in Pickens County, South Carolina. The dedication took place at the soldier's grave in the cemetery of Smith Grove Baptist Church, located about halfway between Easley and Liberty, near Whispering Pines sub-division. Sponsors of the event were members of the Gifted Students Program (PROBE) at Easley's Forest Acres Elementary School, of which Gwen Anne (Campbell) Sheriff of Central was the teacher, and the Fort Prince George Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of which Julia Jean (Harrison) Woodson of Liberty was regent. Among the persons present at that simple---but moving--dedication ceremony were Jay C. Young, Kate (Mullinax) Ellison and Elizabeth Ellison, all of Pickens County and all of whom are direct descendants of Matthew Mullinax. Also in attendance was the late Faith Clayton, who resided at Clemson Downs. She took part in the program by relating historical facts about the Revolutionary soldier. In addition, Verna (Gravely) McCravy of Easley was also there, and she pronounced the benediction.

Prior to the dedication ceremony, the new tombstone for the grave of the Revolutionary patriot was obtained from the U. S. Veterans Administration. Then, it was erected by Jay C. Young, a resident of Norris and a longtime member of the South Carolina Genealogical Society. Previously, the soldier's grave was marked only by a fieldstone containing a brief, weathered and virtually illegible inscription that was probably carved almost a century and a half in the past. When this veteran of our nation's struggle for independence died on January 27, 1837, his body was interred in what was then a family burial ground on the Mullinax farm. After a church was established nearby in 1913, the old private cemetery began to be used by the church congregation and other people in the community. Unfortunately, the passage of almost fifteen decades, plus the lading memories of his descendants, had obscured the exact location of Matthew Mullinax's grave in the cemetery. But, the last resting place of the old soldier was again positively identified in the 1970s by Thomas "Tom" Wilkerson of Greenville, South Carolina, a genealogist and direct descendant of the soldier, being in the line of Matthew Mullinax's first child, Edith (Mullinax) Martin, and her husband, Absalom Martin. After Tom Wilkerson found old fieldstones containing the roughly carved initials and dates for Matthew Mullinax and his wife, he knew that the site of his ancestors' graves had been substantiated.

Matthew Mullinax was a son of Emanuel Mullinax and a brother of Peter Mullinax, both of whom also served as militiamen in Sumter's Brigade during the Revolutionary War. Matthew Mullinax was a militia private in McKenzie's Troop, Hill's Regiment, Sumter's Brigade during the War of Independence, by which the American colonies untied the knot that had tethered them to Great Britain. At that time, Mullinax was about twenty years of age, and the Carolina upcountry was torn by strife among American patriots (Whigs). Loyalists (Tories) and British troops. The Battle of King's Mountain, which took place on the border between North and South Carolina, was fought October 7, 1780. On the American side it was engaged entirely by militiamen, rather than members of the Continental Army. Their antagonists, the Loyalists, were supporters of the English Crown and opponents of independence for the American colonies. At King's Mountain the Loyalists were screening the left flank of British forces commanded by General Charles Cornwallis. Because the Mullinax family resided at that time relatively close to King's Mountain and in the area of the Carolina frontier which became Spartanburg District, Matthew Mullinax, his father and an uncle more than likely participated in that engagement. militiamen who fought there were backwoodsmen to the core; they were also expert marksmen who had adopted the flexible techniques of warfare used by Native Americans. They easily defeated the bayonet-wielding Loyalistroops, killing half of them in the process. As a result of their victory, American patriots acheived revenge for the Loyalists' earlier success at Camden, South Carolina, in August 1780. Moreover, the Americans?

victory caused Cornwallis to retreat with his redcoats, who soon took up winter quarters in the interior of South Carolina By a resolution of the South Carolina General Assembly, dated March 11, 1783, Matthew Mullinax was paid ninety-four pounds, with interest, for his service in the militia. Perhaps some of that service was preformed at King's Mountain. In 1787, Matthew Mullinax married Ruth Kennemore, and they became the parents of at least twelve children. Ruth Kennemore was a daughter of George Kennemore (b. ca 1745 - d. 1828), who also fought in the Revolutionary War and later settled in Pendleton District. He was probably buried in the same district, but his grave has not yet been discovered. Some local historians have speculated that Kennemore's burial site might be unmarked and in the Kennemore, Mauldin, O'Dell Cemetery, which is situated atop a commanding hill east of Beverly Quarry near Liberty. Matthew and Ruth (Kennemore) Mullinax had these children: (1) Edith "Edy" Mullinax (b. ca 1795), who married Absalom Martin; (2) Elizabeth Mullinax (b. ca 1797), who married John O'Dell; (3) Martha Mullinax (7 Apr 1799 - 28 Apr 1891), who married William W. O'Dell (7 Apr 1798 -29 Aug 1883); (4) Sarah Mullinax (b. ca 1802), who married David Hendricks; (5) Nancy Mullinax (b. ca 1804), who married William Smith (b. 1803), son of Job/Jobe Smith (b. 1759) and Sarah Susannah (Clayton) Smith (d.1853); (6) Fields Mullinax (1806-1872), who married Mary "Polly" Smith (1809-1892); (7) Elias Mullinax (b. 1808-1859), who never married; (8) Louvicy "Vicey" Mullinax (1812-1892), who married George Hendricks (1802-1881); (9) Abner Mullinax, who married Lucinda A. Hamilton; (10) Katurah V. Mullinax (b. ca 1815), who married John P. Young (b. ca 1816 - d. 1856); (11) Judy Mullinax, who married Zodac Anderson; and (12) Rhoda Mullinax, who married Joel H. Hendricks.

Martha (Mullinax) O'Dell, widow of William O'Dell, passed away in 1891 at the home of her son, Frederick O'Dell, in Banks County, Georgia. She was ninety-one years of age and was survived by several children: (1) Sarah O'Dell Mauldin of Pickens; (2) Melissa O'Dell Byers; (3) Abner O'Dell of Liberty; and (4) Perrin O'Dell (8 May 1832 - 5 Nov 1907). Martha (Mullinax) O'Dell was buried at Enon Baptist Church near Easley, and her tombstone contains a death date of April 8, 1892. But the date of her death was correctly reported as April 28, 1891, in the May 7, 1891, issue of The Pickens Sentinel. Fields Mullinax's widow, Mary (Smith) Mullinax, who was widely known as "Aunt Polly," was a sister of William "Billy" Smith, one of the early magistrates of Pickens District. "Aunt Polly" Mullinax died at the age of eighty-four years in April 1892 at the home of her son, J. D. Mullinax. She was buried in the Mullinax Burial Ground. Louvicy "Vicey" (Mullinax) Hendricks, widow of George Hendricks and a resident of the Griffin Baptist Church community, died October 20, 1892, at the age of eighty-two years. She was buried in the Hendricks Cemetery on Dacusville Road, near Highway 8, in Pickens County, South Carolina. Abner Mullinax died August 26, 1893, at the home of Jay Smith in Liberty. He was eighty-one years of age and was buried in the Mullinax Burial Ground. Katurah (Mullinax) Young and John P. Young became the parents of Elias Marion Young (1839-1913), Abner M. Young (1845-1905), Millie Ann Lafayette Young and Martha Elizabeth Young.

In 1826, Matthew Mullinax deeded 153 acres of land on Eighteen Mile Creek to his son Elias Mullinax. Three years later, he deeded 236 acres on Eighteen Mile Creek to Fields Mullinax, another son. After the death of Matthew Mullinax in 1837, this Revolutionary soldier's estate was appraised at \$906.01, plus three slaves and a legacy from the estate of **John Mullinax**, a brother who had died in Spartanburg District.

Although only one Revolutionary War soldier was featured in this article, many others were also early settlers of the old Pendleton District, out of which present-day Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties evolved down through the years. Revolutionary partiots who settled in the area greatly enriched what is sometimes reterred to as South Carolina's "Golden Corner."

Franklin Jenkins "Frank" Hall was born in 1837 and enlisted in Co. E, 4th S. C. Infantry at Columbia, S. C. He was killed at Cold Harbor, Virginia. He was a son of William "Buck" Hall and Sarah Hall of the Bounty-land section of Pickens Dist.

David S. Hall served as a private in Co. F, Ist S. C. Rifles and surrendered to Union troops at Appomattox, Virginia, in 1865. His wife was Caroline Jenkins Hall, a daughter of Francis Jenkins.

David Hall was wounded at the 2nd
Battle of Bull Run at Manassas,
Virginia. He died of disease
on August 30, 1862. He was a
son of Zachariah Hall, Sr. and
Ruth Jenkins Hall of the valley
of the Tugaloo River. His wife
was Sarah Harris Hall. At least
two of his brothers also served
in the Confederate Army, and
they were Francis M. Hall and
Thomas J. Hall.

Pennuel Price Hall (1830-1863)

was captured by Union troops in
the Civil War. He was taken to
a prison and died there in 1863.
He was buried in Cypress Hills
National Cemetery in Brooklyn,
New York. He served in Co. K,
12th South Carolina Infantry.

Stephen Hall (1842-1903) was a son of

Pinkney Hall and Jane Hughes Hall.
He was a grandson of Andrew Hughes, a
Revolutionary War soldier. Stephen Hall
married Rhonda Stepp (1848-1922) in
Hall County, Georgia, on December 18,
1867. This Confederate veteran died
October 10, 1907, and was buried in
Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in Dekalb County,
Alabama. His brother, Yancey Hall. also
served in the Confederate Army.

- Thomas J. Hall (1831-1888) served to the rank of second lieutenant in Co. E, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's). He resided west of the Keowee R. in Pickens District, S. C. He was a son of Zachariah Hall, Sr.
- Thomas Jefferson "Jeff" Hall was born in 1847, a son of William "Bunk" Hall of the Bountyland community of Pickens District, SC. He served in Co. E, 1st S. C. Rifles, C.S.A.
- W. B. Hall served in Co. G, 2nd SC Rifles (Moore's Regt.) He attended the 19th reunion of Orr's Rifles on August 14, 1901, at Sandy Springs near Pendleton, SC.
- William Francis Hall was born about 1838. He studied medicine at the University of Virginia before the Civil War. He enlisted in Orr's Regiment in which he became a surgeon. He was fatally wounded during the Second Battle of Bull Run at Manassas, Virginia, and died in a nearby hospital. He was an uncle of Dr. C. W. Walker and a great uncle of Dr. Thomas Gaston Hall (1893-1973) of Westminster, South Carolina.
- William Hall of Pickens District,
 S. C., enlisted in Co. B, 37th Bm.
 Virginia Cavalry, C.S.A. He was
 captured by Federal troops in
 Braxton County, West Virginia, on
 March 10, 1865, and sent to Camp
 Chase as a prisoner of war.
- Yancey Hall (1835-1917) was a son of Pinkney Hall and Jane Hughes Hall. His maternal grandparents were Micajah Hughes and Mary Johnson Hughes. This Confederate veteran died March 18, 1917, in Alabama.
- John Mitchell Hallum (1847-1923) resided in the Salubrity (Liberty) area of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. He enlisted in Co. A, Perryman's Regt., S. C. State Troops under Captain James Long. His wife was Melissa L. Madden Hallum (1835-1919).

- James Hamby served as a private in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He was a son of Uriah Hamby (b. ca 1805) and Elizabeth Hamby.
- Augustus M. Hamilton (1829-1891) was a member of Co. D, Gist Rifles, Hampton Legion, C.S.A. He was a son of Mary Hamilton (b. ca 1794). This soldier was transferred to Beauregard's S. C. Artillery Battery on October 4, 1863. He survived the Civil War and died December 29, 1891, at the home of his son, Cyrus Earle Hamilton of Liberty, S. C. He was buried at Old Slabtown (Six and Twenty) Baptist Church in Anderson County, South Carolina.
- J. H. Hamilton enlisted in Company C,
 4th S. C. Cavalry at Pocotaligo,
 South Carolina, on 12 February 1863.
 In April or May of 1864 he was transferred to Company D, Gist Rifles,
 Hampton Legion. At the end of the
 Civil War, he was paroled "dismounted" and while on his way home
 from the battlefield he was killed
 in a railway accident in April 1865.
- John Archibald Hamilton III served to the rank of second lieutenant in Co. I, 4th S. C. Infantry (Vols.). He was a son of Lemuel Greenlee Hamilton and Climaelia Abigail Ariail Hamilton. He was a grandson of Archibald Hamilton (1745-1835). This soldier was born in 1836, and he lost his life during the Civil War (in 1862).
- John C. Hamilton (1831-1861) enlisted.
 in the 22nd S. C. Regiment (Vols.).
 He died of "pneumonia fever" at
 Charleston, S. C., on April 28,
 1861, at the age of 29 years. He
 was a member of Enon Baptist Ch.
 situated near present-day Easley.
- Leonard Jefferson Hamilton was a member of the Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, S. C. His unit became Co. K, 4th S. C. Infantry (Vols.). He also served in Co. H, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was promoted from ranks to 2nd lt. He was wounded at Wilderness.

Beachams in the War Between the States

In the Captured Documents in Washington D. C., there is a barely legible affidavit, which begins "City of Richmond-State of Virginia, July 31, 1862". It continues in the following language: "Personally appeared before me, H. L. Beacham, who being duly sworn, deposes and says that he is the father of Private W. V. Beacham, deceased, of Company B, Palmetto Sharpshooters, C.S.A." The claim was for the back pay and allowances owing to the said W. V. Beacham, deceased. Hartwell Lowrie(Lowery) Beacham received \$56.16 for 3 months pay at \$11 per month, plus allowances. The voucher went through many channels and at last on Feb 20 1863, H. L. Beacham signed acknowledgement that the payment had been received from Capt. F. W. Kilpatrick of Company B Palmetto Sharpshooters.

This was in the middle of the War Between the States and Hartwell was to lose another son to the War of the Rebellion, and have a third son wounded. Two other younger sons would serve in the later part of the war. How this affected Hartwell, we do not know. We can only imagine the reasons why the 44-year-old millwright and his sons would take up the cause of the South. They were not plantation or slave owners. They went to war as so many others to champion States Rights and loyalty to their home state. We have some letters, but no diaries to offer their thoughts. We can only study history and hope to find an answer.

My own great grandfather, Archibald Lester Beacham was too young to fight. Being born in 1850, he was only a boy of 11 when the war began. He had also lost an arm in a mill accident when he was six. His two next older brothers Dallas (Phillip Dallas) and Worth (Worth Butler)

Page 1 of 1 Sherrie Heyse were at home during the first of the war but joined in the latter days. His younger brother Belton Knox Beacham was also too young to fight. We can again only imagine what life was like for Archibald's mother, Mariah Louise Sheppard Beacham. With her husband and three older sons at war and a family of eight children at home, life must have been very difficult. We do know her brother B. F. Sheppard was in the war and wrote a letter to Mariah from Knoxville after her son James Daniel had died. B. F. Sheppard wrote to say that he found James Daniel's grave and marked it.

Hartwell Lowrie Beacham was born in 1817 in Batesburg SC. He was the son of Daniel Beacham and Alice Lester. Daniel Beacham is said to be the son of William Beacham (who emigrated from Ireland) and Margaret Lowrie(Lowery). Alice Lester came to South Carolina with her family in 1804 from Lunenburg Co. VA. Daniel and Alice Lester Beacham are buried at the Lester Burial Ground in Greenville, SC. Among Hartwell's brothers was a William Archibald Beacham (This is the first son of Daniel and Alice Lester Beacham and is named for his grandfathers, William Beacham and Archibald Lester). The records show three William A. Beacham's who served in the Confederate Army but I do not know if one of these was Hartwell's brother. Hartwell Lowrie was named for his uncle, Hartwell Lester and Lowrie for the maiden name of his grandmother, Margaret Lowrie¹.

Hartwell married Mariah Louise Sheppard in 1836. She was born in 1817 in Batesburg SC. Hartwell named a son William and a son Archibald. Alice Lester Beacham's father was named Archibald Lester, which is my ancestor's name (Archibald Lester Beacham). Many of the names have been carried on to the next generation, which causes some confusion. Hartwell and Mariah had seven sons and four daughters. They are:

James Daniel born 1838, Thomas Lowrie (Lowery) born 1839, Ann Melissa born 1842, William Vardee born 1843, Phillip Dallas born 1846, Worth Butler born 1847, Archibald Lester born 1850, Alice Leticia born 1853, Belton Knox born 1855, Mariah Louise born in 1857, and Ida Lee born in 1859.

Of the girls, Ann Melissa never married and is buried in Raleigh, NC. I have copies of letters between Ann and James Daniel's wife Eugenia Douthit Beacham. Alice Letitia married Wiley Thomas of Franklin Co. GA in 1871. After he died she married a Coogan, died in 1929 in Wilkesboro NC, and is buried in Raleigh, NC. Ida Lee married Morris Doyle. I have not located a record for Mariah Louise who was called Louisa or Lou.

James Daniel Beacham, oldest son of Hartwell and Mariah Beacham was born in 1838. He married Eugenia Douthit in c. 1858/59. Their first child William Chandler Beacham was born in 1859. A second son, James Daniel Beacham, Jr. died at 10 months of age. James Daniel was



NOTE BY EDITOR: I have been finding in different people's research death dates on different indiviuals vary. Like one researcher had 9 Aug 1800 as death date and another has 15 Aug 1800. I have wondered how this happens. I think I can explain some of it as I have been finding where a person has an obit in a newspaper, people are taking the date of the issue of the newspaper and putting it down as the death date. I have found many of these lately. Joseph Jolly being a good example. I was sent this material on him and his death date listed as 3 Dec 1808 which was the Obit in the Newspaper date. It plainly stated in this obit that he died 27th last (27 Nov 1808).

Also have found Mrs Jane Wilson aged 50 wife of Mr William Wilson died on TUESDAY last. Pendleton Messenger Issue: 20 Aug 1808...her death in material is listed as 20 Aug 1808 when in truth she died on Tuesday (16th Aug 1808). Please keep the calender that was run in the September 1999 Newsletter for reference to these dates and you will have no problem finding the correct day. Linda G. Cheek......Editor

I have a Jane Moorehead (d/o John Moorehead) in my records as being born in 1775 (think should be 1735?) and married to Joseph Jolly who d. 3 Dec 1807, but in reality this is the Joseph Jolly who d. 27 Nov 1807 and was listed in Pendleton Messenger Issue: 3 Dec 1807.....so the two Joseph Jolly's been mixed up???

Beachams in the War Between the States Submitted by: Sherrie Heyse

graduated from the Eclectic Medical Institute in Cincinnati, Ohio (May1859). At the time there were only 2 Medical schools in the south, one in Virginia and one in South Carolina. Most Doctors in the south were trained by the apprentice system and there was no standard testing of learning. The Northern medical schools were considered the best and Cincinnati was the "Mecca of the new Medical training". There were several Medical schools in Cincinnati at that time. The Eclectic physicians did not believe in bleeding, purging, or giving Mercury to patients in the treatment of disease. The Eclectics believed in botanicals and pharmaceutical medicine for illness. They were the new wave of medical practice replacing older ideas. The Eclectic Medical School was in operation from 1845 until 1939 when it merged with the Cincinnati Medical School and then the University of Cincinnati, College of Medicine. Medical training consisted of 2 years after local schooling. Most Doctors received no training in the surgery required on the battlefields of the War Between the States. We know that after his graduation, James Daniel practiced medicine in Franklin Co. GA and Mississippi. He was 22 years old and a Medical Doctor in the census of Franklin Co. GA in 1860. I have a copy of some of his early accounts including a poem thought to be original. He joined the Confederate Army on May 3, 1862 in Corinth, Mississippi. Records have been found to indicate that he was in the Mississippi 32 Infantry, Company B. He was enlisted by Colonel M. P. Lowry (not known if he is a relative). He served as a Field Surgeon (all Doctors in the War Between the States were called Surgeons) at the Battle of Louisville, KY. One source says he died of blood poisoning but B. F. Sheppard (brother of Mariah) writes to Mariah Beacham that the records and Doctors in Knoxville say he contracted thypoid, then pneumonia and so died of thypoid pneumonia (This is a term for Typhoid fever complicated by pneumonia). He died in a hospital in Knoxville, Tennessee on Nov. 21, 1862. B. F. Sheppard (brother of Mariah Sheppard Beacham) found the grave in a large Confederate gravevard in Knoxville and said it was marked. He broke a large cedar limb from a tree nearby to additionally mark the grave in case someone could come for the remains. B. F. Sheppard (serving with the Confederate Army in Knoxville at the time) could not get a furlough to bring James Daniel home to his mother, Mariah Sheppard Beacham. Since that time the gravesite has been lost in the family records.

Eugenia returned to SC and died in 1866, reportedly of a broken heart. William Chandler Beacham was raised by his uncle, Eugenia's brother Samuel Douthit of Greenville SC. He became a prominent Banker and devoted citizen of Greenville.

We know that Hartwell Lowrie/Lowry² Beacham (born 1817/18) moved around with the building of new mills in the south (he helped his Uncle Phillip Lester build mills in Batesburg). By family story he was a gifted mechanic and was in demand to set up the looms. On August 22, 1861 Hartwell and Thomas enlisted in the Confederate Army at Carnesville, Franklin Co. GA where the family was living. They joined company I of the 4th S. C. Infantry. In the following spring they

joined the Palmetto Sharpshooters (Company B) under Micah Jenkins. The Palmetto sharpshooters were organized from units, which had previously been in the 4th, 5th and 9th Regiments of the S. C. Infantry. The Sharpshooters were activated April 16, 1862 when the army was reorganized after many of the volunteer soldiers enlistment was finished. William Vardee Beacham is shown as a member of the Palmetto Sharpshooters and enlisted on March 18, 1862 in Anderson SC. Micah Jenkins' Palmetto Sharpshooters took a prominent part in many battles of the war beginning with Williamsburg VA in May 1862 through the Retreat from Petersburg to Appomattox in April 3-8, 1865.

The records show that on May 26, 1862, William V. Beacham was admitted to the Episcopal Church Hospital of Williamsburg, ill with measles. (Note: 1862 was a peak for epidemic diseasestyphoid, malaria, measles, smallpox and diarrhea-which ravaged both armies) William was evacuated to the South Carolina General Hospital at Petersburg, VA. On June 10, 1862 he died at age 19. By these dates, William Vardee Beacham would have been in the battle of Williamsburg before he became ill. The Battle of Williamsburg was fought with the Armies of the Confederate General Joe Johnston and Union General McClellan. In rain and mud up to their knees, the Confederates fought to defend Fort Magruder (near Williamsburg, VA). After four companies of comrades abandoned a redoubt, Micah Jenkins and the Palmetto Sharpshooters, along with six companies from the 5th SC Volunteers, successfully defended Fort Magruder. Perhaps the rain and conditions caused William V. Beacham to be susceptible to measles. One soldier in Anderson's brigade described the march to Williamsburg by saying: "of all the mud I ever saw we trudged through it that morning. My overcoat dragged in it. It was about the consistency of fritter batter. There was no way of getting around it." At some points the mud holes were "belly deep to the horses and mules". The Confederates had meager rations of hard biscuits. Notwithstanding the harsh conditions, The Palmetto Sharpshooters had fought so hard and well that General Longstreet presented a battle flag, commemorating the Williamsburg engagement, to them at their camp outside Richmond. The Battle of Williamsburg was on May 5, 1862 and William V. Beacham was admitted to the hospital on May 26 and died June 10.

I am adding a few details of some of the battles of the war in which Hartwell and Thomas fought. Hopefully this will not cause confusion. For more depth of information, please read the books in the bibliography from which the information is taken.

On the first day of the Battle of Seven Pines (May 31, 1862), Jenkins regiments had overrun four Federal Lines and had repulsed a fifth. By facing federal lines and firing straight at the foe, Jenkins Palmetto Sharpshooters helped win the Battle of Seven Pines but suffered many casualties. General Joe Johnston was severely wounded and was removed from the field. General Robert E. Lee was assigned command of the Army of Northern Virginia for the remainder of the

Jane Smith petitioned for letters of Adm with the Will Annexed on 8 March 1847, sureties on her bond recorded in Bk 1 pg 189 Aaron Smith--Bartlett White Wit: D.L. Cox. Letters of Adm were issued to Jane Smith Adm of Nimrod Smith Sr on 22 March 1847 and recorded in Bk 1 pg 274

Petition for letters of Adm dated and filed 31 March 1854: The petition of the undersigned sheweth that Mrs Jane Smith late of Anderson District dec's lately who in her life time and at the time of her death was the Adm with the will annexed of Nimrod Smith Sr dec'd and in order to carry out the futher Execution of the said will your petitioner at the proper time will be willing to accept of the Adm submitted 31 March 1854 by Robert Smith.

Mary Elliott made an affidavit 5 Oct 1854 that she deposited with Jane Smith, now dec'd widow of Nimrod Smith Sr dec'd, about Dec 1850 and that certain money to be loaned out and never recieved the same. That Jane Smith departed this life sometimes in March last past.

According to an article written by Caleb Smith, son of Nimrod and Lettice Nicoll Wyatt Smith, in May 1875 and left to his church in Ooltewah, TN. Nimrod and Lettice Nicoll Wyatt Smith had

nine sons and 7 daughters all of the same mother and father. (Letter abstracted)

I Caleb Smith was born 30 June 1790. My father and mother's people were very numerous on the day I was born, and have been rapidly on the increase from that day until this. I have sixty-two brothers and brothers-in-law, sisters and sisters-in-law, and thirty of that number were of my own brothers and sisters and their comrades, and fourteen of that number were of the Swain family and their conrades, and eighteen of that number were of the Morrison family and their conrades. I was the first born of NINE BROTHERS AND SEVEN SISTERS, ALL OF ONE FATHER AND MOTHER. I have been married the second time, have raised two sets of children, mothers both dead, Children seventeen in number all dead or married and left me. My children andgrandchildren and great grandchildren and their conrades, are so numerous and scattered over the world that their number cannot be known. But few of the old ones are alive to-day, not one as old as I now am-and never was-and my departure is at hand. I am living in a house alone by myself, under the watch-care of my youngest daughter and family. The rest of the letter contains a beautiful testimony for his savior the Lord Jesus Christ. Caleb Smith's special request left with his church and people.

As they gathered around Amos, he was killed instantly, Solathiel said to the captain, "You ought not to have killed him, he was my brother." The captain replyed, "I couldn't help it." The mother had Amos in her arms weaping, the officers of the law made no effort to take the body inside or offer any remose.

Instead, as soon as it dawned on them what had happened, they turned and left the house. They retreated to a small hill where they concealed themselves in the brush for the afternoon and consulted among themselves what they would do. They then went to Mr King's store some four miles south where they tried to hire him to take them to Easley Station. Mr King told them he could not carry them that evening but could the next morning. They said, "that they had pressing business to attend to and could not wait." They hired one mule which Kane took and rode on to Easley that evening. The others made their way on foot to Greenville.

Kane passed around Pickens by a back way about dusk and arrived at Easley just in time to take the 9 o'clock going north. He gave a black youth ten cents to carry the mule to the livery stable with instructions to send it back to a Mr Baylis Hendricks where the officials had told Mr King they were going.

Mr John L Gravely went to Pickens Sunday night and informed Trial Justice Taylor of the murder. He at once issued a warrant and placed it in the hands of Sheriff Mauldin who immediately left for Easley. There he learned that Kane had already left. Monday morning, as soon as the telegraph office was opened, he sent off a dispatch alerting police chiefs in Greenville. Spartanburg, Charlotte and Columbia of the fleeing suspect.

Kane went only as far as Greenville where he and the other surrendered themselves to Sheriff Gilreath.

The PICKENS SENTINEL (13 June 1878) concluded its

report of the killing with, "From all the facts gathered by us, we pronounce this one of the most fiendish. cold blooded murders ever committed in this county." It also made the assumption that Kane did the killing since he "left immediately on the train and it appears that two shots were fired at Ladd, the first taking effect and killing him."

Colonel Aiken on the floor of Congress quoted from the SENTINEL the account of Amos Ladd's death. He added his own conclusions. "It will be seen that the man who most probably did the shooting took the first train 'going North,' and no doubt to day is here, assuring the department of the impossibility of enforcing compliance with the revenue laws in that disloyal section.

"His confederates attempted also to leave the country, but later information advises me, that seeing a Ku Klux in the trunk of every tree, they went only to the adjoining county and delivered themselves up to the sheriff. If they are innocent oficials, the surmise may at least be excited that they would have surrendered in the county in which they were attempting to execute the law."

The COLUMBIA REGISTER {11 June 1878} obtained their version of the killing from collector Brayton, who received it from the revenue officials involved, and some gentleman who traveled by train from Greenville. "From two reliable sources we learn that there is more trouble and excitement over the attempt of two revenue officers to arrest an illicit distiller in Pickens County on Sunday last. The officers in search of the game were Messrs Kane and Durham, Deputy United States Marshals, and the distiller was Amos Ladd, a sort of brevet-brother-in-law of the famous Redmond.

"When the officers saw Ladd he was in the lower end of Pickens County, and as they advanced to arrest him, they state that he placed himself in an attitude of defense, drawing his pistol and leveling it at Kane. Both of the Deputy Marshals, seeing the situation, fired simultaneously

upon Ladd, who fell mortally wounded, and expired several hours later.

"There was considerable excitement among the people of the neighborhood when the news spread that Ladd had been killed, and which we have been informed, might have led to greater violence and bloodshed, had not the officers made their way out of Pickens County, and gone to Greenville, where they surrendered themselves to the Sheriff of that county yesterday morning."

There was no record describing Amos Ladd's funeral. But this much might be assumed. He was killed at Rocky Bottom, the procession from there back to the old homestead near Sunset was along a winding, mountain road. Friends and neighbors either solemnly stood by as they passed or joined. At Sunset they had the services graveside next to his father's. After the family and friends left, probably even after darkness set in, a lone figure walked down from the wooded hillside, one who had followed in the trees and brush beside the road. He knelt beside the newly covered grave and wept for a while. Then he disappeared back into the woods.

NEWS AND COURIER SEND MCKINLEY

When the news of the Amos Ladd killing reached Charleston, the NEWS and COURIER dispatched Mr C McKinley with the commission "to go and find Redmond." He arrived in Pickens about 20 June and spent the first few days making inquires and contacts. After two days he was compelled to abandon this method of search since "the good people of Pickens have learned to be suspicious of strangers." He also learned "that no man knew of his whereabouts and that it changed with every sun."

Through the gentleman who had helped him around the mountains, he was placed in contact with two of Redmond's most trusted friends. He prepared a note explaining his purpose in seeking an interview with him, "at any time and



ANDREW PICKENS:

Revolutionary War Patriot of the South Carolina Frontier

It is reprinted here in consideration of current interest in the forthcoming dedication of the Veterans Memorial Garden and Wall of Valor at the Pickens County Conrthouse, to be held on Veterans Day, November in 1999, the memorial will contain a newly-scalable of Seneral Andrew Pickens



Among the notable historical figures of our region and state, General Andrew Pickens (1739-1817) has been sadly neglected, even though Pickensville, Pickens District, Pickens County and the town of Pickens were all named in the general's honor. Indeed, the level of local public knowledge and recognition concerning the Revolutionary War hero appears to be low. For example, members of a large group of recent visitors to the Pickens County Museum could not agree as to whether Andrew Pickens made his mark in the War Between the States, War of 1812 or War of Independence. Also, not until very recent years could a portrait of the county women sake be found on the walls of any local public building. Furthermore, in the 170 years that have passed since Andrew Pickens' death, no statue has been erected to commemorate the Revolutionary iscates a contributions to his state and nation.

Although some public leaders probably deserve to be forgotten and to be locked away in the silent halls of oblivion, I feel that Andrew Pickens should not be given such treatment. In Washington Irving's work titled "The Sketch Book" (1818) the journalist and author declared: "Man passes away, his name perishes from record and recollection; his history is a tale that is told, and his very monument becomes a ruin." Unfortunately, Irving's fatalistic assessment of man's ultimate fate in this world might apply to the majority of us, but we know that some great men and women will be remembered as the generations come and go. In my opinion, Andrew Pickens ought to be one of those rare individuals whose name and deeds are kept alive throughout the years. Ralph Waldo Emerson, the famous American lecturer of the 19th century, once said, "There is probably no history, only biography." That was his way of suggesting, perhaps, that history consists merely of accounts of the lives of certain persons. If we accept Emerson's declaration, the life of Andrew Pickens must be viewed as an important facet of our heritage.

Luckily, the noticeable absence in Pickens County of any known portrait of "The Fighting Elder" (as Andrew Pickens has been described) came to an end in 1982. James P. Rouleau, a direct descendant of General Pickens and a resident of Greensboro, North Carolina, donated a large portrait of the county's namesake to the County Museum. Mr. Rouleau had commissioned Martin Mugar, a Yale-educated artist, to paint the gift portrait. Because of the portrait donor's generosity and the successful efforts of a well-known and talented painter, an impressive likeness of Andrew Pickens is now proudly and prominently displayed in the County Museum, located at the corner of Pendleton and Johnson streets in Pickens. Many historical objects pertaining to the geographic region are preserved and exhibited on the ground floor of that historic building, which once served as a county jailhouse. Notwithstanding the gift portrait of General Pickens, I feel that more should be done, especially by the county's own citizens, to honor a great but relatively neglected past historical figure of the upstate. Andrew Pickens certainly played an important role in securing the freedoms that we presently enjoy. His efforts were exerted when our country was evolving into a new and independent nation. Thus the outstanding leader of the Carolina frontier is due more widespread recognition, especially in the geographic area where he once lived and in which he was laid to rest (at the Old Stone Church near Clemson, South Carolina).

I feel that a statue of General Pickens should be erected somewhere in Pickens County, if for no other reason than the frontier fighter's role in the Battle of Cowpens, which took place within present-day Cherokee County, South Carolina. There, with the rank of colonel in the militia and under the leadership of General Daniel Morgan (1736-1802), Andrew Pickens was second in command. The Battle of Cowpens, fought in January 1781, has been described in the Oxford Companion to American History as "one of the brilliant American victories in the War of Independence and a military classic." During that decisive military engagement, which culminated in an American victory, Colonel Pickens and his frontiersmen conducted an onslaught on the enemy's left flank. Their attack helped to entrap and overpower the Redcoats, who were led by Banastre Tarleton, a British colonel noted for his haughtiness.

The American force at Cowpens was made up of 940 untrained and fairly undisciplined settlers of the upcountry. Many of them were farmers. On the other hand, the British force consisted of 1,150 regular soldiers. Even so, 200 Englishmen were killed and 600 prisoners were captured in the engagement. Only 72 Americans lost their lives or were wounded during the battle. Later, Andrew Pickens was promoted to the rank of brigadier general, chiefly through the efforts of John Rutledge, president of the general assembly. Then, when the government of the new nation was formed, Congress authorized the presentation of a sword to the militia leader. Eventually, Andrew Pickens was also promoted to the rank of major general in the state's militia. America's eventual success in the war brought an end to General Pickens' active role as a military leader—a role that began in earnest in 1761. At that time, the frontier leader was a twenty-one-year-old militia lieutenant attached to Lieutenant Colonel James Grant's massive expedition against the Cherokees.

Even though attention has been focused thus far on military exploits of Andrew Pickens, The Fighting Elder's accomplishments were not limited to the battlefield. In 1782, General Pickens was elected to the state legislature. The following year, the legislature presented him a gold medal as a token of the state's appreciation for his service in the War of Independence. (It should be noted that Andrew Pickens served without pay throughout the war.) The former soldier soon became prominent in state politics. His popularity as a political leader increased with each passing year of his life.

In 1783 Congress chose General Pickens as a treaty negotiator with Indian tribes of the Southeast. Throughout most of the subsequent two decades, the former Indian fighter represented the Federal government in various affairs with Native Americans. Then, after the state legislature approved the removal of South Carolina's capital from Charleston to a more central and accessible location, Andrew Pickens was selected to serve on a committee to locate a new site for the state's seat of government. General Pickens and other members of the committee chose a two-square-mile area near Friday's Ferry on the Congaree River. The new capital was given the name Columbia.

As the United States is presently celebrating the bicentennial of its Constitution, we should remember that Andrew Pickens was a strong supporter of the adoption of that document. As a delegate to the May 1788 Constitutional Convention in South Carolina, General Pickens used his popularity and political influence to bring about the approval of the basic law of our nation. The delegates voted 149 to 73 in favor of the adoption of the U.S. Constitution. Today, that instrument of law is the world's oldest written constitution. It is certainly something of which all Americans should remain proud. Moreover, South Carolinians should not forget the part that Andrew Pickens played in gaining its approval in the state. In 1789, Andrew Pickens was elected the first state senator of Pendleton County, which eventually evolved into Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties. And from 1793 until (continued on nest page)

1795, he served in Congress as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives.

In the final analysis, we know that more than one hundred years ago the citizens of Spartanburg County honored General Daniel Morgan, one of the heroes of the Battle of Cowpens. They erected an impressive statue of the general, even though the Continental Army leader was not a South Carolinian. (In 1780 General Nathanael Greene, commander of American troops in the Carolina campaign of the War of Independence, sent General Morgan to the state from Virginia.) Some readers of this article might recall recent news reports concerning the refurbishing of General Morgan's statue, as well as plans to return it, in January 1988, to its original pedestal in Spartanburg's Morgan Square. That news should remind the citizens of Pickens County that they have not honored the other hero of Cowpens, General Andrew Pickens, with a similar statue.

To help erase the long-standing neglect of a deserving American patriot, I propose that a life-size, or greater, heroic bronze statue of Andrew Pickens be erected in a public place in Pickens County. Perhaps the monument could be placed in our county seat---possibly even on the square of the Pickens County Courthouse. Money needed for the project could be obtained by means of a highly publicized and well-coordinated fundraising drive. Oversight and sponsorship of the project could be provided, perhaps, by the Pickens County Historical Society. As a bronze statue would be costly, the fundraising drive might be extended throughout a period of many years. Additionally, time will be required to select a sculptor and to design, create and erect the monument.

The 21st century will be upon us in only 12 years. If a statue of Andrew Pickens could be erected by the year 2000, what better way could citizens of the county begin the new century on January 1, 2000, than by holding a dedication and unveiling ceremony for the proposed statue? Indeed, an impressive carving or casting of the likeness of Andrew Pickens, made possible by donations from thousands of citizens of the county—and even by clubs, civic groups and other organizations—would be a fitting memorial to a partisan leader who helped, in no small measure, to subdue the Cherokees and to drive British soldiers from South Carolina.

Additional Facts About Andrew Pickens

- (1) Andrew Pickens was born September 19, 1739, in Paxton County (now Bucks County), Pennslyvania. His parents were Andrew and Nancy Pickens, who had come to America from Ireland.
- (2) In May 1761, as a young lieutenant in Carolina Provisional Troops attached to His Majesty's Expeditionary Force Against the Cherorees, Andrew Pickens camped for a while with his unit at Fort Prince George, situated on the Keowee River in what is today Pickens County. (The site of the fort now lies beneath the surface of Lake Keowee.)
- (3) In March 1765, when he was twenty-five years of age, Andrew Pickens married Rebecca Calhoun (1745-1814), daughter of Ezekiel and Jane (Ewing) Calhoun.
- (4) During the War of Independence---in June 1779 to be exact—Colonel Andrew Pickens covered the retreat at the Battle of Stono, at which his horse was killed under him.
- (5) Andrew Pickens was seriously wounded on September 8-9, 1781, during the Battle of Eutaw Springs, the last major engagement of the War of Independence in South Carolina.
- (6) After the Revolutionary War, Andrew Pickens purchased 573 acres of land at Cherry's Ford on the Seneca River, near the present-day campus of Clemson University. General Pickens named his plantation Hopewell.
- (7) Andrew Pickens died August 11, 1817, while sitting in the yard of his "Red House" at Tamassee, South Carolina, in what is presently Oconee County. The General was buried at the Old Stone Church (Hopewell), where he served as an early elder. The church, which is still standing, is situated in present-day Pickens County, South Carolina.
- (8) Francis Wilkerson Pickens (1805-1869), grandson of General Pickens, served as U.S. minister to Russia in 1858-60, and he was governor of S.C. when it seceded from the union.

WILL OF JAMES KILLGOAR

Cumberland Co., Pa., Will Book B, p. 156

In the name of God, Amen. I, James Killgoar. of the Township of Newton in County of Cumberland, Farmer, calling to mind the uncertainty of this transitory life do make and ordain this instrument to contain my last will and testament in form and manner following: that is to say I will and allow unto my true and loving wife, Elizabeth Kilgoar, the whole use of all my paantation, goods and chattels, implements of husbandry, and household furniture while she remains my widow for the paying all lawful debts and for the bringing up and educating my six youngest sons during their minority. But if she marries I allow her to live (on) the plantation and give up all the above-named goods and chattels, only one horse and saddle and bridle-workh twenty-one pounds and her little and big wheel and kiln, one featherbed with the clothing and I will and allow that at the time of her marriage or decease that my executions hereafter to be named, shall sell all my estate, real and personal that I am possessed of, know, or shall be possessed of at the time of my decease only the particulars above bequeathed and desired it in form and manner following: that is to say, I will and bequeath unto my sons: Hugh, Benjamin, Joseph, Patrick, David, and to my daughter Mary five shillings sterling I likewise give and bequeath unto my son Oliver five pounds Pennsylvania currency. And all the rest I allow and it is my will to be equally divided between my youngest sons: Ezekial, John, Jonathan, William, Josse, and Robert. But if any of the above-named youngest sons should turn prodigal, and not inclined to work but to waste the estate, it is my will and I allow him or them to lose their part and a it be given to the rest as above. But I allow none of the abovenamed legateesd to be paid until sale be made of the above-named promises or chattels. And further I do nominate, constitute, and appoint my true and loving brother, Charles Kilgoar, and my dear and loving wife whole executors of this my last will and testament sereby revoking and dimannulling all former wills and testaments by no made and also this to be my last. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this twenty-third day of August, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one.

"TURN OF THE TIDE." THE BATTLE OF KINGS MOUNTAIN

H. Leroy Flewert

218TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION HELD WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1998 AT KINGS MOUNTAIN NATIONAL MILITARY PARK, SOUTH CAROLINA.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT WROTE, "SUDDENLY AND WITHOUT WARNING THE WILDERNESS SENT FORTH A SWARM OF STALWART AND HARDY RIFLEMEN, OF WHOSE VERY EXISTENCE THE BRITISH HAD HITHERTO BEEN IGNORANT. RIDERS SPURRING IN HOT HASTE BROUGHT WORD TO THE KING'S COMMANDERS THAT THE BACKWATER MEN HAD COME OVER THE MOUNTAINS. THE INDIAN FIGHTERS OF THE FRONTIER. LEAVING UNGUARDED THEIR HOMES ON THE WESTERN WATERS, HAD CROSSED BY WOODED AND PRECIPITOUS DEFILES, AND WERE POURING DOWN TO THE HELP OF THEIR BRETHREN OF THE PLAINS."

FIRST, LET US RECALL THE EVENTS AND BATTLES THAT LEAD UP TO THE "TURN OF THE TIDE" AT KING'S MOUNTAIN.

BUFORD'S MASSACRE - THE FIRST EVENT THAT AROUSED THE UPCOUNTRY PARTISANS OCCURRED SOON AFTER THE FALL OF CHARLES TOWN. WHEN LT. COL. ABRAHAM BUFORD HEARD ABOUT THE FALL OF THE CITY, HE TURNED BACK TOWARD NORTH CAROLINA. HE WAS OVERTAKEN BY A FORCE LED BY COL. BANASTRE TARLETON. GREATLY OUTNUMBERED, THE AMERICANS SURRENDERED. THEY EXPECTED TO BE MADE PRISONERS OF WAR. INSTEAD, THEY WERE CRUELLY BUTCHERED IN THE HEART OF THE WAXHAWS, NEAR THE PRESENT TOWN OF LANCASTER, SC. STIRRED TO FURY BY THE MASSACRE, THEY BECAME MILITANT REVOLUTIONISTS FOR THE FIRST TIME.

THE BATTLE OF CAMDEN - GEN. GATES NOW DECIDED TO ATTACK THE BRITISH POST AT CAMDEN. HE DID NOT KNOW THAT CORNWALLIS WAS ON HIS WAY FROM CHARLES TOWN WITH HIS FRESH TROOPS AND SUPPLIES.

CORNWALLIS MET GATES AT DAWN ON AUGUST 16, 1780, AND A BATTLE TOOK
PLACE. GATES WAS DISASTEROUSLY DEFEATED. HE FLED THE BATTLE LEAVING HIS
TROOPS BEHIND.

BATTLE AT FISHING CREEK - THOMAS SUMMER MAKING CAMP AT FISHING CREEK, IN WHAT IS NOW CHESTER COUNTY. HIS MEN CARCLESSLY STACKED THEIR ARMS AND WENT DOWN TO THE CREEK TO BATHE. SUMTER HIMSELF CRAWLED UNDER A WAGON AND FELL ASLEEP. TARLETON'S MEN SURPRISED THE CAMP AND CAPTURED THE STACKED RIFLES AND SUPPLIES. SUMTER ESCAPED. BUT HE LOST A LARGE NUMBER OF MEN AND MOST OF HIS SUPPLIES.

MUSGROVES' MILL - AFTER THE VICTOR OF A MARK ALLED WAS SURE THAT THE WAR IN SOUTH CAROLINA WAS ALLED TO TAKE INTO ACCOUNT THE FACT THAT THE AMERICANS REFUSED TO STAY BEATEN. ON THE NIGHT THAT SUMTER SUFFERED A DEFEAT AT FISHING CREEK, MEN FROM NORTH CAROLINA, SOUTH CAROLINA AND GEORGIA WERE RIDING HARD TOWARD THE BRITISH POST AT MUSGROVE'S MILL., AT CROSS ANCHOR, SC. THOUGH OUTNUMBERED TWO TO ONE, THEY ATTACKED AND DEFEATED THE BRITISH, THEN THEY FLED INTO NORTH CAROLINA, PURSUED BY COL. PATRICK FERGUSON'S TORY BAND.

THE BATTLE OF KING'S MOUNTAIN - COL. FERGUSON NOW SENT THE VISITORS OF MUSGROVE'S MILL A MESSAGE THAT HE WOULD BURY THEIR LEADERS, BURN THEIR HOMES, AND LAY WASTE THEIR COUNTRY UNLESS THEY LAID DOWN THEIR ARMS. THE AMERICANS WERE DETERMINED TO FIGHT TO THE DEATH. THEY SENT MESSENGERS TO BRING TO THEIR AID THE MOUNTAIN MEN OF NORTH CAROLINA. TENNESSEE AND KENTUCKY.

ON SEPTEMBER 25, 1780, OVER 1,000 MEN "MUSTERED" AT THE SYCAMORE SHOALS OF THE WATAUGA RIVER IN CURRENT DAY ELIZABETHTON, TN. FROM

THERE, THEY CROSSED THE HIGH MOUNTAINS AND DROPPED INTO THE PIEDMONT OF THE CAROLINAS TO PURSUE MAJOR PATRICK FERGUSON AND HIS TORY ARMY

BY OCTOBER 6, 1780, A LARGE FORCE HAD GATHERED AT THE COWPENS IN WHAT IS NOW CHEROKEE COUNTY, SC. THE PATRIOTS CHOSE AS THEIR COMMANDER COL. WILLIAM CAMPBELL OF THAT PART OF VIRGINIA THAT LATER BECAME KENTUCKY

THROUGH THE LONG, RAINY NIGHT OF OCTOBER 6 TH, THEY MARCHED
TOWARD KING'S MOUNTAIN. THEY FINALLY CAUGHT THEM ON THE AFTERNOON OF
OCTOBER 7TH ATOP KING'S MOUNTAIN IN SOUTH CAROLINA. WHEN THE BATTLE
ENDED, EVERY TORY SOLDER HAD BEEN KILLED OR CAPTURED. THE BATTLE
BECAME KNOWN AS THE TURNING POINT OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

THOMAS JEFFERSON WROTE. "IT WAS THE JOYFUL ANNUNCIATION OF THAT TURN OF THE TIDE OF SUCCESS WHICH TERMINATED THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR WITH THE SEAL OF OUR INDEPENDENCE."

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION AND SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION WERE THERE WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1998 TO PLACE WREATHS AS A MEMORIAL TO THESE GALLANT MEN AT THIS SACRED PLACE.

CHALKEY WRITES, "ONE OF THE EARLIEST FAMILIES RECORDED IN THE UPCOUNTRY WAS LUSK, WHOSE HISTORY HAS BEEN DOCUMENTED TO 1742 WITH THE MUSTER OF NATHAN AND HIS SON, JAMES LUSK IN AUGUSTA COUNTY, VIRGINIA."



I have found four or five ancestors and relatives who all died about 1939 to 1943. One died in the 1950's. When I looked at the Social Security death index records, I find only one or two of these, and the name of the beneficiary and location of last payment. Does anyone have the Social Security CD? or does anyone know if the Application of any person is available from Government records? In other words all of these persons were over 65 by the beginning of Social Security, which was about 1935 or 1937? As such people had to fill out a form to obtain moneys. Is that application available to read? What information do we have to know to obtain that record?

My problem is that three or four of these persons do not have full information on their death certificates that I have been able to locate. There is no family Bible record for these persons that I know of. I happend to think of searching the US Draft records for military service and found that one person born 1848 and another born 1852 could have served in the Civil War? What application records are available for that war? would any have personal information? So far I have found no war service record for these two brothers, who are thought to have lived in the Pickens Co., SC area or in the Hall Co., GA area. Has anyone tried to find these applications from the 1930's? I would expect that they had to fill these out at the very beginning of the system as they were already old enough to receive funds when the progam started. When did it start in GA or SC? Any help appreciated.

BIT'S and PIECE'S

PICKENSVILLE BURNED IN 1816, GIVEN LOTTERY FUNDS:

There is much richness and romance in the story of our nearly forgotten old towns. Although the tale of a fallen town if tragic, it is nevertheless one of perculiar interest. Like Goldsmith's "Sweet Auburn" we now see our ancient county seats as "loveliest villages."

I have often tried to imagine the life in Old Pickensville in its day of influence. Pickensville existed as a court town only eight years, 1792-1800. At that time it was the seat of justice for Washington District, which included both Greenville and Pendleton counties. It rivaled Greenville and Pendleton in size and importance, and its future must have been far rosier than that of either of the subordinate county seats.

But fate, thought the District act of 1798 changed the course of events. Washington District was abolished and the county courts at Greenville and Pendleton became district courts. That was the death blow to Pickensville in 1826. Only twenty-five years after the removal of the court, it is stated by Mills in his statistics that the town had lost its importance and consisted of only a few houses. Yet if remained of a village of several plantations until it was absorbed by the town of Easely in 1874. Now the only reminder of its former existence is the fast decaying old hotel or tavern near McCoy's store. Recently there came to my notice, while looking through a volume of South Caroline statutes the record of an incident of which I had never before heard and which I am sure will be of interest to the readers of The

Progress.It seems that in 1816 there was a very disastrous fire at Pickensville. In the same year a petition was addressed to the Legislature "praying for the benefit of the sufferers from the late fire." In December 1816 the Legislature did take notice of the petition and by Act No. 2115, A.D. 1816, suyhotized the lottery and appointed commissioners to administer it.

The fire loss must have been considerable for the profits of the lottery were to be ten thousand dollars, a large amount of money in those days. Upland was then worth from .50 cents to \$10 an acre and the best bottom land was not worth over \$50.00. This money was to be distributed to the sufferers according to their loss, and any remainder given to some charitable institution. The commissioners were: John T. Lewis, Joseph Gresham, James C. Griffin, Robert Anderson and Walter S. Adair, Esquires.

Public Lotteries are gone now. In those days in the absence of great insurance agencies they were necessary as well as entertaining. But Alas! The complicated insurance system of today has pushed the lottery to the dark grave even as Bevo has overcome the famous mint julip. Will not the reader join me in a sigh for those days of long ago? Sg: Julien D. Wyatt. The Easley Progress Issue: 12 Oct 1921.

MARRIED: By Rev. T.S. Arthur on the 7th of May, Mr Elias Roberts of Greenville and Miss Eliza A.B. Gunter of Pickens District, SC. Southern Enterprise Issue: 23 June 1854

FIELD--Death of Dr John M. Field a prominent physician and citizen of this county died of Colic at his residence five of six miles east of this place between four and five o'clock on Sunday evening last the 17th instant. He was a member of the Masonic Fraternity and was burried with the honors by the Greenville Lodge of which he was a member and of Easley Station Lodge. He was buried at the burial ground on the plantation of the late Gen Easley in this county on Tuesday last at 12 o'clock. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 21 Oct 1875 NOTE: Where is this Cemetery in Easley? LC

GAULT-WILLIAMS- On Sunday night last a colored boy broke open the tool chest of Mr James Baswell at Easley Station and stole a hand-saw and several other tools and decamped Monday morning for this place. Mr Baswell hearing of him at once started and beat him to this place and had a warrant issued and when he arrived was prepared to take charge of him. Cuffie did not see the propriety of surrendering at first and depended upon his legs to give him a safe deliverence. He was soon overhauled however by a gentlemen on horse back and brought back and lodged in jail. He gave his name as Tom Gault, but Pinkney Smith, colored, says he knows him and his proper name is Frank Williams. Frank says he was raised by a Mr Bennett in Laurens Co., SC has worked at Seneca City and lastly at Piedmont Manufactory. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 30 Sept 1875.

MARRIED: Mr William E. Blassingame married on Tuesday the 21st ult by the Rev. Lewis Rector to Miss Eliza Towns only daughter of William Towns, Esq all of Greenville District. Pendleton Messenger Issue: 6 May 1818

WILLIAM HUGHES: Pension S21311 Pickens District, SC. He applied for a Rev. Pension on Oct 1834 while a resident of Pickens Co., SC. He was born near Georgetown Maryland 14 Oct 1758 and stated the record of his age is in the Family Bible in Newberry, SC where his Father moved when he was seven or eight years old and that he lived in Newberry until 1805 when he moved to Pendleton District now Pickens District. He entered the service at the age of 16 in Newberry as a volunteer in Captain Thomas Duggan's Company one of the Lt. being Carey and served under Lt. Col. Hardy McCreary, Col. Williams, General Williamson in the Flordia Expedition and marched to Augusta,

Midway, Sunmary, Cherokee Hill, St Tilley, St Mary;s, into Florida and remained there a few days and returned home in all nearly four months. In 1776 or 1777 he volunteered under Captain Dauggan then marched to Brown's Station in Reedy River near Tumbling Shoals to guard the frontier for four months.

In the spring of 1779 he volunteered under Captain Carey, Lt. John Bergin, Col. Hays and joined General Pickens in Mobley Settlement, Fairfiled District SC and on to Ninety-Six then dismissed for three months. He enlisted the same year under Captain McCracken, Col. Smith then marched to Orangeburg SC., Ashepoo and Bacons Bridge where they joined General Green, for three and one half months returning home about the time the British evacuated Charleston. He volunteered under captain Stark, Col. Casey to go against the Tories then went down to Bush River toward Augusta and up and down the Saluda River, most of the Tories being on the Bush River. He served about six months. Out subsequently for short periods of time but always found his own horse and clothes. Benjamin Neighbors was with him in Florida Expedition. William Morton, Clergyman and Joseph Grisham stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary Soldier. He wrote the letter 7 Sept 1835 signed by a mark and witnesses by Carter Clayton requesting pension Cert. To be forwarded to Col. Joseph Grisham, Falls, SC. Certificate Issued 22 Oct 1835.

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HOLDEN: Jacob Alexander and his wife Polly Alexander who was formerly Polly Holden states that James Holden her father died in May 1854 intestate. That he owned 585 acres of land on both sides of Big and Little Crow Creek, waters of Keowee River adj. lands of E. Alexander and others and 250 acres on Big Crow Creek adj. lands of Henry Grogan and the home tract and others and known as the Humphries Tract, also owned 152 acres on Little and Big Crow Creek adj. lands of William Alexander and others. Subject to distribution among his children as follows: Joshua Holden who resides in Pickens District, Lucy Maloy who married Andrew Maloy and resides in Louisiana, the husband however has not been heard from for many years. The children and reps of Malinda Roe formerly Malinda Holden viz her husband Watson Roe and her children: David Roe, James Roe, Ruthy Roe names and numbers of the others not know now in Alabama, Salina Alexander formerly Salina Holden who married James Alexander and risides in Alabama, Jannetta Ray formerly Janetta Holden who married Emory Ray and resides in Georgia, Anadoe Holden a minor who resided in Alabama, John Holden who resides in Alabama, Nancy Moody formerly Nancy Holden who married Abraham Moody and resides in Alabama, Letty Nix formerly Letty Holden who married Tyre Nix and resides in Alabama, Elizabeth Ann Nix formerly Elizabeth Ann Holden who married Daniel Nix and resides in Alabama, Fanny Bynum formerly Fanny Holden who married Elijah Bynum and reside in Alabama. filed 12 April 1856. Pickens Co SC Clerk of Court Pk 68 Equity

HANGED: Dyer McJunkin, prisioner at the bar, having been convicted of the murder of James Trotter the sentence of the Court's that he be taken hence to the place whence he last came and closely secured in the County jail of Pickens Co. Friday the 23 June 1876 he will be hanged by his neck until dead. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 16 March 1876 The Governor commanded the sentence of Dyer McJunkin from hanging to ten years at hard labor in the Penitentiary.

This due to all our people and we feel it necessary to review the Governors reasons for his actions:

The State vs Dyer McJunkin--murder--The Defendant was tried and convicted for murder at the March 1875 term of the court for Pickens County and sentenced to be hung: his pardon is now asked for by numerous persons who present the case by five separate petitions aggregating in number fully one thousand citizens of Pickens Co.

Special statements of the case in support of the application for pardon are made by Hon R.E. Bowen and D.F. Bradley, Esq., Representatives of Pickens Co by Stepehn D. Keith, Clerk of the Court, J. Riler Ferguson, Sheriff, by Hon. W.C. Keigh Senator for Oconee Co and attorney for the Defendant, by R.A. Childs another of the attorneys for the Defendant and by other officers and leading citizens of Pickens Co. A special and favorable review of the case is likewise made by William E. Earle, Esq.

His Honor judge Cooke who presided at the trial and Mr Solicitor Blythe who prosecuted the case each join in a recommendation that the sentence be commuted from death to imprisonment for a term of years. These recommendations under all the circumstances seem to me conclusice as to my duty and I therefore decline to grant a pardon, but commute the sentence from death to imprisonment in the State Penitentiary at hard labor for the period of ten years. Sg: D.H. Chamberlain, Governor of South Carolina 17 April 1876. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 27 April 1876.

JOHN MORRIS: Another Revolutionary Hero Gone! Departed this life on the 26th of Feb last at his residence in Anderson Co age 91 years. He was a native of East Jersey and moved with his parents to Virginia when quite young. Came to South Carolina were he has been a resident for 49 years. When about 15 he was engaged in a skrimish with

the Indians and taken prisoner, released by exchange of prisoners at Keowee Old Fort. In the Florida Expedition, was a scout and pilot for Gen Andrew Pickens, was at the Battle of Cowspens. Member of the Methodist Church. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 13 June 1835

BIBLE: One of our members, Jay Young, brought to the meeting in October a Bible that he had bought at a yard

sale. He is looking for the family that this Bible belonged to and for Postage, he will send.

This Bible is dated 1843 printed in New York. On the first page is written J.G. Stevenson's book and looks like Albaion SC? The last name is very difficult to make out. It looks like an H, could be a fancy C or K and I really don't believe that it is an M for Martin? The T is crossed so not Harbin. Comparing this letter with the name Hubbard and Hillard, in these records, I have went with the letter H.

- Old Pendleton Database CD-ROM

I had a chance to use an interesting new CD-ROM this week, called the "Old Pendleton District." This Windows and Macintosh CD-ROM contains information on 226,000 individuals and 77,000 families with roots in the Old Pendleton area of South Carolina. The information on the CD-ROM states, "For individuals the Database will show names and dates and places where born, married, died and buried. There will be links to spouses, children, parents and siblings."

First of all, I will point out that this is not a slick, commercial product in a glossy, shrink-wrap package that is mass-produced by the thousands. Instead, it is an effort of love produced by a small, nonprofit group of genealogists. The interface is a bit "Spartan" and there is little documentation. What the disk does have is data... lots of data! Quoting from the on-disk documentation:

The data for the file came from member contributions and many other sources. While we do our best to assure data consistency and integrity, we cannot verify the information submitted to us by others. For that reason the Database should be viewed as a research tool and ready reference and as a guide to further research and genealogical proof. This is very much of an ongoing project and as new information becomes available, not only will individual and family records be added, but also information contained in existing records may change. So, as new versions are posted, the old version should be deleted and the new one used for reference.OK, so what fancy program do you have to learn to use in order to view these 226,000+ individuals? You may be surprised at the answer: your present genealogy program. There are seven copies of the database on this CD-ROM; each copy is in a different format.

Those seven formats are:

- 2. Family Origins for Windows
- 3. Personal Ancestral File version 4.0
- 4. Family TreeMaker for Windows version 5.0
- 5. Family TreeMaker for Windows version 6.0
- 6. Family TreeMaker for Windows version 7.0
- 7. GEDCOM

If you use any of the first six programs in the above list, you simply transfer the appropriate database to your hard drive. Then you use your own genealogy program to view the data. If your genealogy program isn't listed amongst the first six programs above, you can open your favorite genealogy program, create a new database, and then import the GEDCOM file from the CD-ROM into your fresh database. If you use The Master Genealogist, you can import directly from some of the first six formats listed above; you do not have to use the GEDCOM file.

Regardless of which genealogy program you use, the data is available to you in a program that you are already familiar with. If you find data that you believe to be accurate and that you want to import into your main database, the more powerful genealogy programs will let you "prune" a branch from the CD-ROM database and "graft" it onto your primary database. Keep in mind the earlier disclaimer, "We cannot verify the information submitted to us by others." Treat each piece of information on this CD-ROM disk as something that might be true, not something that is proven.

I first used Family Origins for Windows version 8.0 to look at the data. The Family Origins database supplied on the Old Pendleton Database CD-ROM disk is compressed as a self-extracting ZIP file. I double-clicked on the file in Explorer and answered a couple of questions, after which the file was extracted to my hard drive. Next I went to Family Origins, selected FILE, then OPEN DATABASE, and then clicked on the Old Pendleton Database. Voila! I was looking at the data of 226,000 people.

As always, I went looking for individuals with my surname. I found a few. The data available varied quite a bit. For some records, dates and places of birth, marriage and death were displayed. For others only a single date or fact was shown. I was able to use Family Origins' normal commands to find individuals and to "walk" up and down their family trees.

I then switched to The Master Genealogist and did almost the same thing. The one difference is that there is no Master Genealogist database included on the Old Pendleton Database CD-ROM. Instead, I used The Master Genealogist's GenBridge utility to import the Family Origins database. I did not need to use the GEDCOM version. The import process required about 20 minutes to run while I was also typing this article in a different window on the same

PC. The results were the same: I could use The Master Genealogist to navigate around the Old Pendleton Database.

Macintosh users will be pleased to hear that the CD-ROM also will operate properly on their systems if certain settings are made. I suspect that Macintosh genealogy programs will only be able to use the GEDCOM file, however. Still, that seems like a minor limitation. There is no printed instruction manual, so the instructions for using the Macintosh version are included on the CD-ROM. That seems a bit strange since a Mac user who cannot read the disk also cannot access the instructions! Luckily, the same instructions are available online at: http://www.shelby.net/jr/olpend/#macs.

In addition to the database, the Old Pendleton District CD-ROM disk contains a number of other "goodies", including:

- * a trial version of shareware genealogy program Brothers Keeper
- * demo (limited feature) version of Family Origins for Windows 7.0
- I 5-day (full features) trial version of Family Origins for Windows 8.0.
- * Family Tree Maker version 6.0 Family Archive Viewer
- * Family Tree Maker version 6.0 15-day trial version
- * Text file of all surnames contained in the database
- * Text file of places and genealogical events listed in the database
- * Text file of unique locations listed in the database
- * A map showing the Old Pendleton District in reference to modern South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia counties.

The price of the Old Pendleton District Database CD-ROM is quite low: \$15.00 U.S. funds for the initial order and then only \$10.00 for updates. The producers plan to create updates semimonthly. You can order updates at any time you please, you do not have to "subscribe" to all of them. For more information, look at: http://www.shelby.net/jr/olpend/

The Old Pendleton District database is also available in GEDCOM

format at:http://www.geocities.com/BourbonStreet/Delta/8155/site2.html. You can download the entire database from that location at no charge and import it into your genealogy program. However, you may prefer to purchase the CD-ROM version anyway. The online version is huge and will require 30 to 45 minutes to download, depending upon the speed of your Internet service provider and the speed of your modem. You will need to download the database in several parts and then re-assemble it on your PC.

Also keep in mind that the online version is only available in GEDCOM format, while the CD-ROM contains the same data in the native format of several genealogy programs. This will be very important to anyone using Family Tree Maker; the producers of the Old Pendleton District database report that Family Tree Maker is unable to handle this large GEDCOM file when running on Windows 95 or Windows 98. Yet the same program will import the GEDCOM file properly when operating on Windows NT. Obviously, the GEDCOM problem will not be an issue for anyone who purchases the CD-ROM containing native Family Tree Maker databases.

I was pleased with the Old Pendleton District Database on CD-ROM. It is available at low cost or even for free. It contains valuable genealogy data that can be used in your favorite genealogy program. Remember that this is all secondary data without source citations. Users will be well advised to consider this data to be "possibilities" and always verify everything you find in the database. This CD-ROM disk is a "must have" for anyone researching ancestors in the Old Pendleton District.

under any restriction he should choose to impose."
Redmond's verbal reply granting the request was received
Monday 24 June. He was directed to accompany Probate Judge
W G Field of Pickens C H "wheresoever he might lead." He
found Mr Field without delay and they made their plans to
leave that night.

About dusk he walked quietly out of town, alone and by a circuitous route, reached the first rendezvous point appointed for the night and where Mr Field joined him. There they rested the few remaining hours of darkness. At the light of dawn on Tuesday morning they started northward for the mountains which could dimly be seen. Again they avoided the town and the more frequented roads and drove rapidly until the afternoon hours.

Mr McKinley's words. "The road was all that a road. even a mountain road, ought not to be. At the end of it we stopped at a cottage in the hills and after a kind reception and excellent dinner we were joined by another guide. We resumed the journey on foot with little knowledge of where we were going. Even the guide only knew that we were to follow a certain trail until halted by 'the Major' at such point as he might choose.

"The trail seemed to lead directly upward to some vertable land of the sky. At times it took a direct 'cut' as it were in direction by 'leading up a tree,' as such paths are said to do when they disappear in the undergrowth or at the foot of a cliff.... Mr Field and I paused to rest while the guide pushed on ahead to find Redmond and inform him of our near presence."

They rested for a short while then moved on themselves. They were nearly "broken down again" by the climb when Mr Field whispered back to Mr McKinley, "Yonder he is. He always keeps his word." A hundred yards beyond sat two men at the base of a pine, one was the guide, the other Redmond.

"The dreaded outlaw rose up to meet me with extended hand and pleasant smile as I advanced. A cheery 'Good morning' let me know I had nothing to fear. Of that I was well assured from his friends. Shaking my hand cordially, he invited me to sit beside him on the rock. Mr Field introduced me 'as the gentleman who had come three hundred miles to give you an opportunity to say something in your own behalf.' He replied, 'I am very glad to see you but I am afraid it was hardly worth the trouble for you to come so far to see me.' The response was with modest speech and modestly delivered."

Mr McKinley described the Major as little more than a boy though he was twenty-three. He was of siender build and one of the handsomest men he ever saw. "graceful, active form," coal black hair, long flowing moustache and small goatee. He had a frank and open manner, innocent looking eyes, honest sun-browned face and pleasant smile. "which no man could wear and yet be a villian." It was claimed for him that he could always discern between a friend and a foe at sight by looking in one's eyes. Mr Mckinley did not hesitate to let him study his face and look into his eyes. He was able to gaze deeply and see "a friend."

McKinley was confident now to comment, "You don't look like a very bad man, sir." He replied, "I don't believe I am one. I have only been badly treated and accused of many things which I never did." "He is one of the very best fellows in the world," said the guide.

"After a few minutes' rest we climbed around the mountain side until we came to a particular steep place down which we stumbled and fell and scrambled and slid. We reached the bottom of a glen where foot of man or beast hath never or rarely been. And where certainly deputies cease from troubling and even a moonshiner may be at rest. We halted on the brink of a falling, foaming stream....

"It was a singulary wild and beautiful spot even for a

mountain glen. The element of romance was fully supplied by the presence of the outlaw in our midst. Whose somewhat picturesque garb was not out of keeping with the character of the scene....

"Admist such surroundings the hunted outlaw told his story while we sat and listened until the setting of the sun behind the mountain's crest. The approach of darkness admonished us to return to the outer world while as yet the devious path might be safely tracted."

"Leaning his gun against a tree, but retaining his formidable sidearms, and keeping a bright eye on guard the while, he began his story: 'I was born in Georgia....'"

Tuesday afternoon Redmond told McKinley of the raid on his parents and their death, of the circumstance leading to his killing of Duckworth, of his capture, escape and rescue of Amos Ladd, and of the so called raid on Barton in Easley. He denied having anything to do with the jail break, he was in North Carolina that day. And he told how he reluctantly went with his friends to Gary's and Hendrick's house.

McKinley noticed, as the interview progressed, the inflection and tone of voice which Redmond used at times.

".... 'I will be twenty-four on the 24th of next October--if I live,' he added with a smile that was sadder than a sign and reminded us that the speaker's life was at the mercy of any man who chooses to take it....

"The story (of his parents death) was told as quietly as though none of the circumstances narrated were matters of any special wonder in a mountain district. My two companions seemed to listen to it in like spirit as to be a thrice told tale..."

At the end of the Duckworth shooting Redmond said he had received word from Duckworth's father recently. "....

He told Jim Cantrell the other day, 'that his son was high strung and had done wrong. That when he was first killed he wanted them to get me, but since I had been so persecuted he

LETTER FROM EX-SLAVE IN TEXAS REVEALS SECRETS OF UPSTATE S. C. SLAVEHOLDER



The well-publicized historical episode of miscegenation in which Thomas Jefferson, the third President of the United States, and his slave mistress, Sally Hemings, participated might seem paltry (perhaps innocuous) in comparison

with an apparent wanton and enduring sexual liaison that existed in the mid-1800s between a South Carolina slaveholder and his paramour, as reported by a former slave. In a letter sent from his home in Maysfield, Texas (and transcribed within this article), the ex-slave, a quadroon, wrote that he and five siblings had been born in Pickens District to a beautiful mulatto woman who was purchased in Newberry, then held in bondage and impregnated repeatedly by Elias Mullinax, her owner.

as they attempt to trace and record the history of a family's ancestories. One of these obstacles (or perhaps challenges) is the matter of those children born to unmarried couples. Begetted under spouseless circumstances, these children are sometimes described as illegimates, or babies born out of wedlock or products of common-law marriages. In many old court records such offspring were frequently classified as "bastards." In the not-too-distant past when paternity problems were taken to court for legal action, the presumed father could be presented a "bastard warrant" and possibly then convicted of "bastardry."

The numerous published and unpublished records that genealogists utilize contain many cases of out-of-wed-lock births. For example, while thumbing through one set of genealogical reference books, namely A Collection of Upper South Carolina Genealogical and Family Records, edited by James E. Wooley (Easley, SC: Southern Historical Press, 1979), the following spouseless births were quickly noted: (1) Nancy Padgett delivered a female baby in 1849, and she claimed that (continued on next page)



Alvin Algood was its father; (2) Nathaniel Reid was judged to have been the father of a male baby born in 1852 to Mary Phillips; (3) in his 1901 will, William Hunter of the valley of the Twelve Mile River expressed a desire for his eight children who were born to Sarah Ellenburg to change their names from Ellenburg to Hunter; (4) Lilly and Samuel Whitmire made oath March 4, 1829, that their unmarried daughter, Delilah, gave birth to a baby in 1825 and that Robert Cobb was its father; and (5) Ellen Marshall, a single woman, appeared before Magistrate J. W. Singleton in 1860 and claimed that Lewis Carroll was the father of her blue-eyed, towheaded girl who was born in 1854.

Another example—among the many that could be enumerated here—is the following which appeared in the September 1999 issue of the Newsletter of the Old Pendleton District (S. C. Genealogical Society): Frankey Turner took out a bastard warrant January 12, 1850, for Archibald Anderson, who, she claimed, was the father of her two offspring.

Notwithstanding the above out-ofwedlock births among Caucasians---all of which are examples of potential problems for persons in pursuit of family history---the mixed offspring of various slaveowners and their female Negro slaves cause even more genealogical perplexities. Throughout the years in which slavery flourished in the United States, the practice of interracial mating (also known as miscegenation) was quite common. Raciallymixed children were sometimes fathered by slaveholders, their sons or overseers of plantations. At times, interracial sex became a source of tension in the antebellum South. however, it was publicly condemned---but privately tolerated. (Also, South Carolina did not outlaw interracial marriages until after the Civil War.)

According to the Dictionary of Afro-American Slavery, edited by Randall M. Miller and John David Smith (New York: Greenwood Press, 1988), the longtime practice of miscegenation in the nation has contributed to the "hybridization" of the Afro-American population, and one observer of the racial scene claimed that the majority of blacks in the United

States now have some non-Africian ancestry (p. 476).

Sexual contact between whites and blacks eventually declined appreciably because of adverse social, political and economic effects of the armed conflict between the North and South, as well as the passage of discriminatory statutes ("Jim Crow laws") in the former states of the Confederacy. Those laws tended to separate and drive a wedge between the races; they also had the effect of virtually isolating Afro-Americans with respect to the white population.

Before the Civil War, rarely were acts of miscegenation the subjects of legal scrutiny in South Carolina. Although births which occurred as a result of sexual encounters between whites and blacks were topics of some gossip and whispers at the local level, they were generally not matters for legal action—thus not recorded in official records. Slaves were possessions, and what took place between them and their owners typically did not become public issues. More often than not births of racially-mixed babies became common knowledge only through word of mouth—that is by means of oral traditions—and then usually only in the immediate community in which such births occurred.

This article focuses on questions of parentage in an alleged sexual relationship between a white slaveowner in Pickens District. South Carolina, and one of his slaves. This local example of miscegenation which apparently took place down on the farm came to light neither by means of gossip nor revelations in public records, but as a result of a letter written by an exslave who wanted to identify his parents and to tell the truth about the circumstances of his birth. In effect, the case at hand resulted from pure serendipity; it was uncovered accidentally in the course of my research concerning a family that was not blood related to any of the parties involved in the parentage episode reported herein.

In 1987, I was involved in research concerning William Stanton "Bill" Williams (1811-1880) and his son, Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams (1844-1890), both of whom migrated to Texas from the Salubrity community of Pickens District, South Carolina, after the Civil War. In

an attempt to obtain more information about these men and their families, I wrote to Elliott Williams Atkinson (b. 30 May 1901), who, I learned, was a direct descendant of the two men about whom I needed information and who will be referred to as E.W.A. in the remainder of this article. A resident of Shreveport, Louisiana, E.W.A. was in the eighty-sixth year of his long life. But he promptly and graciously provided much useful family data for my research effort.


E.W.A. and his wife, Mildred Elizabeth (DeWoody) Atkinson, had a labor of love in preserving the history and heritage of the Williams and Atkinson families and their large homestead in Milam County, Texas. The couple also played key roles in organizing and planning family reunions, which were held annually on Labor Day at the Little River Baptist Church near Maysfield, Texas. Many members of the Williams family (along with some of their close friends who came to Texas from South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama) were laid to rest in the cemetery.

The Little River Baptist Church cemetery was also the end of the trail for the legendary Manson Sherrill "Manse" Jolly (1840-1869), the ex-Confederate soldier and "unreconstructed rebel" from the Lebanon community Anderson District. Jolly had fled from South Carolina to Texas in the fall of 1866, while being pursued by Federal officials who announced a \$10,000 reward for his arrest. His tombstone in the Texas cemetery contains a Masonic emblem and the following brief inscription: "Sacred to the memory of Manson S. Jolly, Aged 29 Years." Jolly and his horse were accidentally drowned July 8, 1869, as they attempted to cross rainswollen Walker Creek near Maysfield, Texas. E.W.A.'s grandfather, Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams, had Jolly's body buried next to the Williams family's cemetery plot. The two men were Confederate veterans, natives of upstate South Carolina, and very close friends.

While corresponding with E.W.A., the elderly scion of the Williams clan requested information about Elias Mullinax, a nineteenth-century planter in Pickens District. According to my correspondent, Mullinax had resided near the home of William Stanton "Bill" Williams,

who was E.W.A.'s great-grandfather and a longtime postmaster of Salubrity Post Office. In his letters E.W.A. appeared to have been attempting to establish a connection between the Williams family and Elias Mullinax.

E.W.A. also wrote at length about Hub Williams, his grandfather, who had been a Confederate soldier during the Civil War. noted that Hub received an excellent preparatory education at Thalian Academy, situated in the Slabtown community of Anderson District and headed by the Reverend John Leland Kennedy, a well-known and highly-respected Presbyterian minister and educator of the upstate. Hub also briefly attended South Carolina College in Columbia (now the University Carolina), but he left that institution in April 1861 when the Civil War broke out. The sixteenyear-old then enlisted in the Confederate States Army over his father's strong objections because of the son's youthfulness. In spite of his father's misgivings, Hub became a good Confederate soldier and quickly rose to the rank of brevet



Manse Jolly's Tombstone at the Little River Baptist Church in Milam County, Texas


lieutenant. Later, he was also promoted to second lieutenant. E.W.A. wrote that Hub had been succeeded as a brevet lieutenant in his company by another young soldier identified only as "E. Mullinax."

My kind correspondent in Shreveport, Louisiana, thus assumed that the new brevet lieutenant who followed Hub was Elias Mullinax, a person who had often been mentioned by Bunk Rosemond, who was born into slavery back in South Carolina and later became an employee and close friend of the Williams family in Milam County, Texas.

In my response to a letter from E.W.A, I wrote that one Elias Mullinax who had resided in Pickens District was a son of Matthew Mullinax, a Revolutionary War veteran. This man operated a farm situated on waters of Eighteen Mile Creek, and he died unmarried in 1859 at the age of about fifty-two years. I also noted in my letter that Elias' grave is situated in what is now the cemetery of Smith Grove Baptist Church, which was originally the Mullinax burial ground on the family's farm.

Moreover, I wrote that, because Elias Mullinax expired before the Civil War, he could not have been a Confederate soldier. speculated in writing that the E. Mullinax in question most probably was Emanuel R. Mullinax of Anderson District, an enrollee in Company I, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers, C.S.A. That soldier entered the Confederate States Army April 14, 1861, at Pickensville. Hub Williams, the grandfather of my correspondent, had also enlisted in the same military company on the same day and at the same place. Both men also served subsequently in the Palmetto Sharpshooters, which was organized April 16, 1862, from several former companies of the 4th, 5th, and 9th South Carolina Infantry regiments, all of which had been activated for a period of service of only twelve months.

E.W.A. had written a biographical sketch of the previously-mentioned Bunk Rosemond, the ex-slave who had spoken often of Elias Mullinax. Typed copies of that sketch were distributed in 1974 to various members of the Williams and Atkinson families by my

correspondent, who also sent me a copy more than a decade later. Titled "Bunk Rosemond, Maysfield, Texas," the biography is too lengthy to be transcribed here in its entirety, but the following selected excerpts of the document throw much light on the subject of this article:

"Last night...I was reading a book Deep Summer by Gwen Bristow. The story includes a character, the son of the plantation owner by his quadroon slave, and that reminded me of Bunk Rosemond. To most people, Bunk has passed from memory and with my passing, I doubt that very many, if any, people would ever know who Bunk was. Therefore, I shall herewith write what I know about Bunk and his relation to my family...

"My grandfather, Thomas H. Williams, rode from South Carolina to Texas by horseback in 1866. He settled in Milam County, Texas, and in 1874 his father William Stanton Williams, who was living in Liberty, S. C., moved his

family to Texas and brought with him some of his former slaves and other freedmen who wanted to come with him...

"My grandfather gave Bunk fifty acres of good river land when he came to Texas and Bunk worked it and increased his acreage to several hundred acres until he got too old to farm...

"Bunk always celebrated the Juneteenth (that's the 19th, Emancipation Day) with a barbecue. He would kill a pig and a goat and barbecue it and we would always look forward to getting some of that fresh barbecue. Also he would always try to have watermelons ripe out of his patch by the 19th, and that also was something to look forward to...

"My mother and Aunts told me about how Bunk was called to the bedside of my grandmother, Emma Massengale Williams, when she was dying, and she made Bunk promise to look after her five daughters that she was leaving on her farm as orphans at her death. To my knowledge, he was true to his promise because he was most devoted to the family for as long as he lived...

"Around Maysfield, scuttlebutt had it that Bunk was related to the Williams family. I had a great aunt, Amelia Williams Massengale, who had a rather sharp tongue at times, and once some of her unfriendly acquaintances in Maysfield sent word to her that they sure would hate to be kin to a nigger. She sent back word that she would rather be kin to a Negro than a son of a bitch. As to Bunk, I felt that way too. But Bunk settled the question of his birth when he got drunk at his home and wrote my father a letter... In the letter Bunk told him that he was the son of a beautiful mulatto and a white man by the name of Elias Mullinax...

"Evidently, Mr. Mullinax was a friend of the Williams' in South Carolina. I have lately become acquainted (by correspondence) with Marshall Williams... He is a descendant to W. S. Williams' brother. I asked him about the Mullinax family in or near Liberty, S. C., and he told me that he had heard of a man by that name who was a planter and he said that he never married, and it had been rumored that he lived amongst his slaves. Apparently, Bunk was a product of that living. Anyway, that's Bunk's

story of parentage, but Bunk wasn't one who would be ashamed...

"He lived as a Negro. He married a Negro woman, Sophie... They lived together until they died. Bunk and Sophie had several children---There's Bass, Purne, Tobe, Red, Julie, Roxie. That's all that I can remember...

"Once Uncle Ben took him into the new dining room of the Kyle hotel in Temple, Texas. He almost had to pull him in, but Bunk was whiter than a lot of white men and had long straight white hair. He would pass for a white man most anytime. He drank, did his cutting up, but all in all, he was a good citizen in his community."

The exact date of Elias Mullinax's birth is presently not known, but available evidence points to the period 1805-1808. (An obituary in the July 30, 1859, issue of The Keowee Courier listed his age as fifty-four years, but an age of fifty-two years is carved on his tombstone.) Elias Mullinax was a son of Matthew Mullinax (b. ca 1760 - d. 27 Jan 1837) and Ruth (Kennemore) Mullinax. Persons who need additional information about this family may want to read the "Matthew Mullinax Was article titled Revolutionary Patriot" in the September 1999 (Vol. 13, No. 7) issue of the newsletter of the Old Pendleton District chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society.

In the 1840s and 1850s, Elias resided about three miles west of Pickensville and on waters of Eighteen Mile Creek. In the 1850 census of South Carolina, this farmer was listed as the only white person residing in his household, but fourteen slaves in the household were enumerated as follows: one female mulatto, age 23; one female black, age 33; one male black, age 19; six male blacks, ages between seven years and one month; one female mulatto, age two years; and four female blacks, ages between nine years and four months.

Elias Mullinax died unmarried July 10, 1859, and his body was interred in the Mullinax burial ground on his farm. Many years later (in 1914 to be exact), the land on which that cemetery was situated was owned by Tillman Nathan Smith (1877-1954), and he gave it that year to the congregation of a newly-organized Baptist church. As the church was established in

1914 on donated land and near a prominent grove of trees at the edge of cultivated fields, it was named Smith Grove Baptist Church in honor of the contributor.

The following obituary for Elias Mullinax appeared in *The Keowee Courier* of July 30, 1859:

"Died, at his residence, in Pickens District, near Pickensville, on the 10th inst., of Billious Typhoid fever. Mr. ELIAS MULLI-NNIX, in the 54th year of his age. His illness was very painful and protracted, being five weeks and some days confined to his bed. The deceased leaves a large circle of relations and friends to mourn his loss. He was a man of high moral worth, of industrious habits economizing, by which means he accumulated much of this world's goods. Though close in his dealings, he was strictly honest, charitable and obliging to those by whom he was surrounded. He made no profession of Religion, yet we mourn not for him as though we had no hope; for while he retained his proper mind during his illness, he appeared to be much concerned about the salvation of his soul, and was often ---?--- hath said in his word, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God for he will abundantly pardon". Yes, he pardoned the thief upon the cross, and we hope that he heard and answered the prayers of our deceased friend, and pardon all his sins, and that while worms are preying upon his lifeless body, his immortal spirit is with the Angelic Choir praising the Lord for redeeming grace and dying love in the Paradise of God. A Friend"

On September 14, 1859, the heirs of Elias Mullinax agreed to sell, at auction, the real and personal property of the estate and to then divide the proceeds of the sale equally without an administrator. As Elias had neither a legitimate wife nor a child, his heirs were two of his brothers, several sisters and brothers-in-law.

An estate sale was held September 15-16, 1859, at the deceased's former residence. In addition to Elias' 420-acre farm, the following property was offered for sale: twenty-two Negro slaves, a liquor distillery and set of utensils, two barrels of whiskey, five mules, one mare, a lot of

corn, household furniture and miscellaneous articles. As there is no known record of who bought what at the estate sale, we can only assume that the slaves were purchased by other farmers of the area. Quite possibly, some slaves could have been bought by William Stanton Williams who also kept slaves and resided at Salubrity, situated a short distance downstream on waters of Eighteen Mile Creek.

Bunk Rosemond was a young man--perhaps a teenager---when he left the Palmetto State, and he spent the greater part of his life in the so-called Western Wilds of the Lone Star Because the former slave was threequarters white and closely associated with the Williams family of Milam County, Texas, some residents of Maysfield circulated a rumor that the light-skin man was a blood relative of descendants of Bill Hub or Apparently, the persistent rumor became a source of contention and irritation for Bunk. Shortly after the Christmas holidays of 1926, he decided to reveal who his parents were in a handwritten letter addressed to Hubert Leland Atkinson (1877-1952), the father of E.W.A. Mr. Atkinson had married Harriett Emily Williams, daughter Hub Williams of and Emma (Massingale) Williams, and he had assumed the management of the large Williams homestead. The following is an unedited transcript of Bunk Rosemond's revealing letter:

> Maysfield Texas Dec. 30 19-26

Mr. H. L. Atkerson

Dear Friend and brother in Christ this is to inform you of my present health. I am not feeling the best. How are you this Frosty morning? I know it looks Pretty to you. I had the best time Xmas evening I had since I left South Carolina. I was as Rich as Jau Gul was for 5 hours then I got poor again. Made me think I was at the blue Ridge Mountains. I was born at Pickens County. My father was name Elias Mullinax. Bought my mother at Newberry near the Seaport towns at the negro trading. Kept her as a wife until the war was over. He was the father of six Children by my Mother. He

owned a farm close to Bill Williams and plenty of slaves. We lived 14 miles from Walhaller and 10 miles from Greenville once. She was a malader woman, a pretty girl whend he bought her. Left me 3 quarts with good white blood, one quart black blood in me & could have Run a way from but I thought to much of my good blood to mix up with the negroes. If you want to find my folks write to South Carolina, Pickens County. You will find out all about my folks. I left there in 1871 and I am use to slaves where they whilp negroes. Now its slavery again. Have been for 5 years and will 10 years longer and the Rich man will whilp the negro and poor white man. differnet slave. I will have now meat on my bones and you wont have any bones you will be just in to Rex jellie, you know that jellie in glasses. Thats the way you will be. I has a pain, I dont Know what Kind to call it. Must be after birth pains for it aint before birth for I did not have any pains. They talking about sueing me. I dont know about meeting all this jurdment. One here, one after Death. What one shall I try to be Ready for. This is your Xmas gift. William Freeman to copy this so you can carrie it along with you. This is a song intild E Zema E Zema you cant join the union for 1927 for you is a scab. A brother in Christ. Bunk Rosemond P.O. 144

In his letter Bunk displayed lack of a clear understanding of his native state's geography, this because Newberry, South Carolina, is not near the seacoast as he claimed. Bunk was quite young when he left South Carolina. Newberry must have been perceived by him then as a very distant place. But he correctly recalled the Blue Ridge Mountains, which are visable from many foothills of the former Pickens The rich man "Jau Gul" who was District. mentioned by Bunk was undoubtedly Jay Gould (1836-1892) or his son George Jay Gould (1864-1923), both of whom were legendary capitalists who controlled a number of major railroads in the United States and amassed huge fortunes. The "William" Freeman also mentioned in Bunk's letter was probably Herbert Williams Freeman (b. 11 Jan 1911), son of Hub Williams'

daughter, Virginia Kentucky (Williams) Freeman (b. 10 Jan 1887), and her husband, Andrew Clifford Freeman of Cameron, Texas. Bunk's reference to his mother having been kept as a slave by Elias Mullinax until after the Civil War is in need of clarification. His mother was held in bondage by Elias until his death in 1859 and then apparently sold as property of his estate. Her new owner more than likely was the person who kept her until all slaves were freed at the close of the Civil War.

In summarizing this anatomy of a parentage issue that involved offspring of a beautiful mulatto slave and her white master, it is apparent that the biographical sketch of Bunk Rosemond, which was written by Elliott Williams Atkinson; the letter penned in Texas by Bunk, an ex-slave; and the census data household Elias Mullinax's concerning Pickens District have all spoken for themselves. These documents were evaluated in terms of their genuineness and reliability; they were found to be factual, free of falsifications and not distorted. At this point, consequently, there is little that I, the present narrator, can add to or take away from the written record that has been presented herein. To conclude, I would like to note my agreement with the ancient Romans when they uttered the old Latin maxim Verba volant, scripta manent (Spoken words fly away, written words remain). Moreover, in reference to Elias Mullinax's somewhat sad and ill-fated life that spanned only a little more than five decades, I would also agree had the Romans added knowingly, Nemo liber est qui corpori servit (No one is free who is a slave to his body).

Beachams in the War Between the States Submitted by: Sherrie Heyse

War. Jenkins and the Palmetto Sharpshooters had a special liking for General Lee and his army but were detached from him several times to fight in other parts of the war. The Palmetto Sharpshooters were at Appomattox Courthouse at Lee's surrender.

The fighting along the defensive lines outside Richmond at Oak Grove on June 25,1862 was the first in a series of battles, which was destined to continue for a full week. This became known simply as "The Seven Days" campaign and it would prove to be one of the bloodiest one-week military campaigns ever recorded. In R. H. Anderson's Brigade of Longstreet's division, Colonel Jenkins' Palmetto Sharpshooters and the 5th SC played a conspicuous role during two of the battles that week: Gaines' Mill and Frayser's Farm. It was at Frayser's farm that Thomas Beacham was wounded, how seriously we do not know. He recovered to return to fight with his regiment. Thomas wrote that he was in 42 battles ranging from famous ones such as Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Second Manassas, to many obscure and forgotten ones. He was elected Lieutenant three times and refused a commission each time. Lowrie Beacham (in his manuscript) surmises the reason may have been that he did not want to command his father and kinsmen in the regiment. Whatever the reason, he finished the war as a Pvt. The Battle of Frayser's farm was the next to last engagement in the Seven Days. It was a savage afternoon fight in which Lee's army failed to carry out his plan for a coordinated attack against McClellan's retreating column. In this battle, the Palmetto Sharpshooters and the 5th SC played a prominent but bloody role. Gallant Jenkins charged a Federal Battery and captured it. When the First Pennsylvania Light Artillery started moving their artillery, Jenkins yelled, "Shoot down their horses" and as the horses fell, the Federal gunners abandoned their battery. The battle was costly as Jenkins South Carolinians were exposed to murderous musket fire from other Federal guns. The losses in the Palmetto Sharpshooters were the highest of any Confederate regiment in the battle: 211 wounded, and 49 killed out of 375 who entered the action. Company C lost 80 percent of its men. Colonel Jenkins wrote his wife that the Palmetto Sharpshooters, with a total of 563 casualties since May 30, had "suffered more than any regiment in the service" during the battles around Richmond in May and June of 1862. Micah Jenkins was promoted to Brigadier General for his valor. The Palmetto Sharpshooters received additional Battle Flags to commemorate their service.4

In November 1862, Hartwell L. Beacham was assigned to drive the ambulance for the Brigade. Whether or not Hartwell asked to be assigned here we do know. He was 44 years old and perhaps not in condition for the marching Infantry. (Note: The Confederate Congress did not establish the Ambulance Corps until 1864) However, as an ambulance driver, he saw the horrors of war first hand. I can only imagine driving a lumbering wagon full of screaming, injured and

dying men from battlefields to primitive field hospitals for the "surgeons knife". How many times did he think of his son James Daniel, a field surgeon in the Mississippi Infantry? Micah Jenkins was mortally wounded in Virginia by "friendly fire" and I wonder if Hartwell drove the ambulance, which carried him to his deathbed. This army job had to be the most grueling job of all. I only wish Hartwell had written a diary. The story of War Between the States Medicine is a book of it's own. Please see Bibliography for further reading. The Good news of the "war medicine" is that it pushed medical practice of the day to more modern approaches, enriched training practices of doctors, changed ideas about hospitals and treatments, and helped the United States build the Medical Corps in the Army today.

For the next year, Hartwell and Thomas fought with the Brigade through Virginia to Maryland, back to Virginia and then to Tennessee. In Virginia, President Jefferson Davis had Jenkins brigade assist in the defense of Richmond while General Lee marched to Gettysburg. Micah Jenkins wanted to be with General Lee and wrote to him personally. Instead of sending Jenkins and the Palmetto Sharpshooters to Gettysburg, President Davis sent his nephew's untested brigade to Lee. Lee could do nothing but write Jenkins a letter:

I regret exceedingly the absence of yourself and your brigade from the Battle of Gettysburg. There is no telling what a gallant brigade, led by an efficient commander, and might have accomplished when victory trembled in the balance. I verily believe that the result would have been different if you had been present.⁵

In another source the assistant adjutant and inspector general of Pickett's division wrote after the war:

With these two brigades (Corse's and Jenkins'), Pickett's Division, in its Celebrated charge at Gettysburg, would have been over eight thousand instead of only forty-seven hundred strong. Whether the presence of these two large brigades, of as good and proved fighting material as any in the Army, would have materially affected the result of that terrible day-the very turning point of the war-is not for me to say.⁶

Even with all his trying to rejoin Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, Jenkins brigade was assigned to Hood's division under General Longstreet to reinforce General Bragg's army near Chattanooga. It would be another 8 months before the Palmetto Sharpshooters
