I am trying to find someone that has researched the STEPHENS and TROTTER families and would be willing to talk or help me with these lines.

For sometime I have been confused about the true parents of my great Grandmother, Nancy Laler Childress STEPHENS, born 9 Jan 1876, died 27 Feb 1920 in Pickens Co., SC. She is buried at Secona Baptist Chruch Cemetery. Her death certificate #2502 lists her parents as Berry CHILDRESS and "Lizzi" SUGS, both of Pickens Co., SC. I think the confusion is that she is listed in the family line of Charles CHILDRESS and Mary Elizabeth McADAMS in the Pickens Co., Data Base. She was very possibly the last child born to William Berry CHILDRESS and Sarah Elizabeth SUGGS. One family member tells me that a Pickens County 1880 census record shows her listed with William Berry CHILDRESS and Elizabeth family line. This would make Charles an older brother. Documents are always the best proof. Any help would be appreciated.

NOTE: Nancy Childress died in 1920 Pickens Co., SC. If you could find the Funeral Home that buried her it would probably shed some light on her. The Dillard Funeral Home is the only one that I know of in Pickens at this time. There were two others in Pickens Co.: Easley area (Robinsons) and in Liberty (Gantt) now Liberty Mortuary. Dillard and Robinsons are easy to deal with, but Liberty is very difficult, they will not let you look at the old records. They stated they are their private files and will stay that way. LC

MARRIED: Robert R. Pilgram of Pickens age 32, Farmer, born Pickens son of Amos Pilgram married 1 March 1859 to Telthea Averelle Yates of Pickens age 26 daughter of William Yates. Probate Court Pickens Co SC

MARRIED: G.W. King born Pickens age 21, Farmer, son of Thomas J. King and Sallie King married 5 May 1859 Mary J. Fennell age 22. Probate Court Pickens Co SC

MARRIED: Elias M. Young born Pickens age 20 son of John and K. Young married 11 Sept 1859 M.A. Smith age 17 daughter of Joseph Smith born Anderson SC. Probate Court Pickens Co SC

MARRIED: On Thursday evening 12 inst by the Rev. D. Humphries at Anderson Village, Mr B.F. Crayton to Miss M.E. daughter of Capt J.P. Benson, all of Anderson, SC. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 20 Jan 1843

MORGAN: Died in this District (Greenville) on the 28th ult Mrs Elizabeth Morgan widow of Mr Jesse Morgan dec'd in the 66th year of her age. She was a member of the Baptist church and has left 8 children. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 6 Jan 1843

OATS FAMILY: As told by Annabel Oates Tollison for the Easley Progress Issue: 12 Sept 1929 She was the daughter of William Rufus Oates s/o Rufus and Mary Ann Germaine Oates:

Robert Oats and Fannie Reed Oates (English and Scotch) and their six children came from Cumberland Co PA in the winter of 1777 or 1778 to North Carolina. One son William Oates (1731-1815) married Jane Sloan (1744-1819) and settled on Muddy Fork Creek in Cleveland Co. NC. They had nine children. One son William Oates (1777-1856) married Elizabeth Epsey in 1806 and settled in Cleveland Co NC. They had 14 children.

Rufus Oates (s/o William and Elizabeth Epsey Oates) b. 1812 NC d. 1876 Easley, SC married Catherine Cargil in 1845. They had one son, John Mason Oates who died from typhoid fever while fighting in the War between the states. In 1852 Rufus m. Mary Ann Germaine and came to Pickensville, SC from Shelby NC when he was 21 years of age. His sister Fannie Oates m. William McMahan was already living in the Georges Creek Community (Easley SC) Rufus was a magistrate, millwright (mechanic) and one of the largest land holders in the upstate of colonial SC. Rufus Oates purchased 1500 acres of land between Hwy 8 and 135 and Brushy Creek Roads. His home site was located on the spot where Geer Baptist Church now sits.

Grandmother owned slaves because I saw a picture of the home where she and two very tall and very black women were standing in ghe backyard of the home working. These two women are buried in the Oates Cemetery (on Hwy 123 behind Qunicey's Restaurant) One man slave was named Mose

Rufus and Mary Ann had 13 children.

Of Rufus Oates children: Sarah Oates m. Samuel Roper, Fannie Oates m. John O. Sheck, Jasper Oates m. Louella Fowler and then Janie H. Welborn and had no children, Newton Oates m. Ester Margaret Stott and Mandy LaBoone, Little Sis died while a baby, Joseph Oates m. Fannie Tanner, Jesse Oates m. Wallie Watson, John Oates never married, William Rufus Oates m. Fanny Williams of Easley SC, Mary Roxie Oates m. Jay Smith, Samuel Oats m. Miss Harris of Central SC, Henry Oates was killed while a young man, Augusta Oates m. William Johnson of Easley.

Rufus Oates b. 13 Nov 1812 Cleveland Co NC d. 18 April 1876 Easley, Pickens Co., SC Wife: Mary Ann Germaine b. 29 June 1830 VA d. 8 july 1897 Easley, Pickens Co., SC. Both buried in the Oates Cemetery in Easley.

Margarette Swank submitted the following: From History of Brecknockshire, England/Wales by: Theophilus Jones 1930-- In Brecknockshire, England is located the Merthyr Church and if I am reading this correctly in Vanoleu Parish: is found the graves of: David ap David Morgan departed this life 1602, Roger_____sonne to John ap Llew ap Morgan ap Sir David Game of Peyton, knight, he had issue, children now living VIII, Watkins, John, Rowland, William, Margaret, Anne, Elizabeth and Roland, he died 1600. The daughter of John Games of Aberbran and not legible. This tombstone certainly covers the remains of Roger Vaught a great grandson of the first Watkin Vaught of Merthyr who married Sibil the d/o John Games of Aberbran son of Llewelyn ap Morgan ap Sir David Gam. (Gaines in America)

NOTE: Explanation of the ap in the names above: means son of and in the early English days the son did not carry the name of the father but his last name changed. Very difficult to put on a data base.

Llandevailog Church: Anne wife of William Powell of Dan-yr-eglwys in this parish who died 7 Jan 1788 aged 52 years: Jennett d/o William Powell d. 29 July 1802 aged 40 years. William Powell died 6 Jan 1810 aged 88 years. John Powell of Gloandwr in this parish d. 23 July 1826 aged 61 years. Also of William Powell of Dan-yr-eglwys d. 19 June 1829 aged 67 years. Mary wife of William Powell d. 26 Sept 1831 aged 84 years. John Jones of this parish son of the late Thomas Jones of Pitingwyn d. 12 May 1835 aged 68 years There is more on the Jones if you are interested contact Margarett as the dates are in the 1850's.

Richard Watkins of this parish and remains of his wife John and three children viz: Thomas d. 30 Jan 1772 aged 22, Elizabeth his daughter and wife of Edward Prythereh d. 18 Dec 1773 aged 30 and William d. 11 June 1777 aged 30. Also Richard Watkins d. 20 Sept 1780 aged 66 and Joan his wife d. 17 Feb 1782 aged 68. Also Isabella relict of David Thomas late of Glan-dwr in this parish d. 7 Oct 1808 aged 80. In this history we find the mention of Rowland Hughes who married Mariana the daughter of Dr Timothy Awbrey the issue of this marriage died young their mother m. 2nd John William Awbery. (NOTE: Rowland Hughes is in the early Bucks Co PA Records). There is much in this book on the Gam Family (Gaines and the ancestors of the Gaines in SC).

BOWEN FAMILY: Thomas J. Bowen was born in Pickens Co., SC near Easley, 20 June 1844 and is the son of John and Elvira Hunt Bowen. He was reared on his fathers farm and at seventeen years of age enlisted as 2nd Sergeant of Co E 2nd SC Rifles. He was promoted to orderly sergeant after the battle of Wills Valley and as such served to the end of the war, surrendering at Appomattox. During the entire time of the war he returned home but twice in each case on account of wounds. He participated in the battles of Gaines Mill, Frayer's Farm, Second Manassas, Will's Valley, Knoxville, Wilderness, Fort Harrison and the seige of Petersburg. He was severly wounded at 2nd Manassa being shot through both thighs and lost four months service consequently and again at the Wilderness he was put out of the combat for about three months by a wound in the right arm. He still has in his possession the balls with which he was shot on these occasions each being an ounce minnie. At the Wilderness his clothes were pierced fourteen times. Since the war Mr Bowen has followed farming in Pickens County having a pleasant home, about 2 miles south of Easley. He is a member of Hawthorn Camp U.C.V. He was married 20 Dec 1866 to Miss Emma C. Briggs, and they have seven children, five sons and two daughters. From Confederate Military History. Pickens Sentinel 25 June 1891

HAGOOD-HOLDER: The confusion of: Benjamin Hagood and Benjamin Luther Holder. I may have uncovered some info that will help on this matter: Benjamin Hagood b. 1 Dec 1788 Edgefield SC d. 28 Feb 1865 Pickens District SC m. 1st early in 1823 JANE ROPER b. 1805 Pendleton District, Pickens Co SC died in late 1823 Pickens District (issue unknown but believe she had Zacheriah Hagood) and probably died at his birth. Benjamin then had an illegitimate son by Sally Holder viz: Benjamin Luther Holder b. 23 March 1825 Greenville SC d. 29 Jan 1918 Pickens Co SC. Figuring the 9 months delivery, his affair would have taken place about June of 1824, just before his marriage on 4 July 1824 to Adaline Ambler.

Aaron Roper Sr--Pickens Co Equity Pk 70 states daughter Jane Hagood with heir Benjamin Hagood and issue if any unknown. That Jane Hagood died some years before the parents. Aaron Roper d. 17 Sept 1855 Pickens and his wife, Rachel Meredith Roper died 20 Sept 1855.

NOTE Herman: The Old Pendleton Data has Aaron Roper Sr. daughter Jane listed as Mary A. (Jane) who died 1919 in Georgia. This may be Mary A. but not Jane Roper Hagood as Equity states she died many years before her parents. Now folks doesn't this just drive you crazy wondering why he did not marry Sally Holder? Maybe one day this will surface. Linda Cheek

Cousin, Clyde Kelley has pictures of the Holder and Davis family in his possession and gave me permission to use: one of Rev. Benjamin Luther Holder a Baptist Minister for 60 years and one of his wife Caroline Malinda Ferguson (names on back). Clyde's wife Lucy Davis was related to this Holder family throught her dad Arthur Demetrius Davis who was son of Demetrius Hampton Davis and Addie Holder Davis. Clyde also brought pictures of Demetrius H. Davis's brother Ewell Euphrates Davis and his wife Annie Holder Davis. The Holder girls Addie and Annie were sisters and daughters of Benjamin Luther and Caroline Malinda Ferguson Holder.

MARRIED: Samuel Cherry Esq, merchant of this Village, married on this evening (5th) by the Rev. Mr. Brown, to Miss Susan Reese, youngest daughter of Mr Thomas Reese, deceased, of this District.

Dear Linda:

In reference to the location of the family cemetery of William King Easley (1825-1872), it is not located in the town of Easley. It is situated near Crosswell Baptist Church near the west bank of the Saluda River and not very far from the point where Highway 123 crosses the river.

The cemetery isovergrown with poison ivy and weeds---at least that's the way it was when I was there several years ago. It is near a trailer park.

About twenty years ago, William King Easley's grave and that of his wife were moved to Springwood Cemetery on North Main Street in Greenville. Dr. John M. Field's grave is still situated in the old Family Cemetery, along with several graves of various older members of the Easley family. The graves at the Easley Family Cemetery are listed on page 86 of Volume Three of the Pickens County S. C. Cemetery Survey. But there is no mention in that book that William King Easley's grave has been moved to Greenville.

Many thanks for publishing my article about Elias Mullinax and his illegitimate children by a slave. I've already had several favorable comments about the article from members of OPD.

OPEN LETTER TO KEEPERS OF THE GENEALOGICAL FLAME

January 1, 2000

Dear Friends:


I am pleased to announce that the Confederate history project has been expanded to include soldiers who served from the Anderson District of South Carolina. This enlargement of the scope of my research enterprise will allow coverage of all the geographic area within the westernmost tip of the state, which presently includes the counties of Anderson, Oconee and Pickens (the Old Pendleton District). This research undertaking has also been given a new title, CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA'S GOLDEN CORNER: ANDERSON AND PICKENS DISTRICTS, 1861-65.

Eventually, I hope to be able to disseminate preliminary lists of Anderson District's Confederate soldiers---just as the names of troops from Pickens District are currently being published in the *OPD Newsletter*. If you know of men who served in the Confederate States Army from Anderson District, I hope that you will let me know about them and share with this project whatever biographical information you might have concerning those soldiers.

Thus far, information has been collected about more than 3,000 Confederate soldiers from Pickens District (present-day Oconee and Pickens counties). But searches are still ongoing for additional data pertaining to some of those men. With the addition of soldiers from Anderson District, the total number of subjects in this project might very well ultimately exceed 5,000 men, all of whom served as Confederate soldiers from the Golden Corner of South Carolina.

In order to prepare biographical sketches of soldiers, the following facts are needed about each of them: complete name; birth and death dates; place of burial; names and dates of parents; name(s) and dates of wife/wives; names and dates of all offspring, as well as those of their spouses; date and place of entry into military service; name of the military unit(s) in which service was performed; any promotions and wounds received while in service; date and place of discharge from service; and any additional facts that ought to be included in the soldier's biographical sketch.

I realize, of course, that few readers of this letter are likely to have *all* of the above-listed needed data about any individual soldier. But whatever relevant information readers might have---and are willing to share---will certainly be welcomed and appreciated.



My sincere gratitude is expressed to the hundreds of members of OPDSCGS and other helpful persons who have already provided useful information. I am sure that many Confederate ancestors would be quite proud of their descendants and relatives who have helped to preserve family history and heritage. We should all bear in mind that love of their homeland guided and sustained most Confederate troops during their desperate defense of the South. My project is designed to honor those brave men who served from our area and to keep their military duty in remembrance. Please help me if you are able. Thank you very much.

(1839-1919) was a son
of William Harbin (b.
ca 1819) and Eliza
Jane Harbin (b. ca
1820). He served in
Co. E, 4th SC Volunteer
Inf. and in Co. F, 1st
S. C. Rifles. His wife
was Rhoda Harbin (18531907). He resided in
the western division
of Pickens Dist., SC.

J. L. Harden (or Hardin)
This Confederate vet's
name was listed on the
Civil War pension roll
in Pickens County, SC,
in 1911.

Mark Bernard Harden (or Hardin) (1838-1916) served in Co. E, 4th S. C. Volunteers, CSA. His wife was Mary M. (Payne) Hardin (1847-1901). This Confederate veteran died April 26, 1916, and was buried at the Old Stone Church near Clemson, South Carolina

Martin Benjamin Hardin
(or Harden) was born
about 1836. He enlisted in Co. E, 4th
S. C. Volunteers at
Fair Play, SC, on Apr.

JOHN CALHOUN CLEMSON (1841-1871)

Lieutenant, Co. H, 1st S.C. Artillery, C.S.A. He was a son of Thomas Green Clemson (1807-1888), the founder of Clemson College, and Anna Maria (Calhoun) Clemson (1817-1876). His maternal grandfather was John C. Calhoun, who served as Vice President of the United States. This Confederate soldier survived the Civil War. In 1871 he was killed in a freak railway accident near present-day Seneca, S.C., and was buried in Pendleton, S.C., at Saint Paul's Episcopal Church.

- Samuel Hardin (b. ca 1830) died of disease at Richmond, Virginia; he served in Co. C, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.), CSA. He was a grandson of Griffin Hardin. His wife was Sarah C. Hardin, and the couple lived near Snow Creek in Pickens District, SC.
- William Turpin "Bill" Hardy served in Co. D, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's).
 He attended Wofford College in Spartanburg, S. C., before the war.
- Charles Harkimer (or Harkhimer) was born in Welltbad, Germany, where he worked as a miner before coming to the United States and settling at Walhalla in Pickens Dist., SC. He served in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles. He was born in 1827, and he died at Sharpsburg, Virginia, during the Civil War.
- Bartin E. Harleston served to the rank of corporal in Co. C, lst S.C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He resided in the western part of Pickens Dist.
- James Bradford Harlow (1844-1925) was a son of Benjamin Franklin Harlow and Anne Berry Harlow. His father was a native of Massachusetts. This soldier served in Co. D, 5th Georgia Regiment, C.S.A. He was buried at Poplar Springs Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.
- William Ashley "Will" Harper (1844-1865) was a son of Thomas Harper (1817-1902) and Elizabeth Ann "Betsy" (Wilson) Harper (1822-1891). This soldier resided in the area that is now Seneca, S. C., and he died during the Civil War.
- Carter B. Harris enlisted in Co. H,
 4th S. C. Volunteers at Belton, SC,
 on October 10, 1861. He died at
 Charlottesville, Virginia, on Feb.
 1, 1862. His mother was Lucinda
 Harris who lived on Town Creek in
 the eastern division of Pickens
 District, South Carolina.
- G. Jesse Harris served in Co. F, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt), CSA. He

- was discharged from that unit at Sullivan's Island, South Carolina.
- Handy Harris was born about 1843, and he served in Co. C, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was a son of Sam Harris (b. ca 1822) and Nancy Harris (b. ca 1829). He survived the war and attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Rifles, which was held in August 1916 at Seneca, SC. At that time he resided on Route 3, Townville, South Carolina.
- J. P. Harris (Is this James Harris?)

 As a result of a battle wound, this
 Confederate veteran received a voucher for the purchase of an artificial limb in 1886. At that time he was a resident of Oconee County, SC.
- James H. Harris resided near Field

 Post Office in the eastern division of Pickens District, SC. He served in Co. H, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was present at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, when Lee surrendered on April 9, 1865.
- John Harris married Charlotte Jeanes in Pickens District, SC, on March 3, 1859. He was killed at Fort Harrison during the Civil War.
- John Andrew Harris (1838-1863) was a son of Allen B. Harris (b. ca 1809) and Winny B. Harris (b. ca 1814). He enlisted at Pendleton, SC, on June 2, 1861, and served in Co. K, 4th S. C. Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.). He died of disease at Richmond, VA, during the Civil War. He has a marker in the cemetery of the Old Stone Church near Clemson, SC.
- Joseph H. Harris was the husband of Mary M. Harris, and the couple had three children. This soldier was a member of Co. C, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.), and he was wounded at Gaines' Mill, Virginia. He died at Manchester, Virginia, in 1863 as a result of battle wounds.



My Great Grandfather

My great grandfather Reuben Winfield (Sock) Lee, Jr. ¹ was born on 05 April 1864 in Cheohee, which was then in Pickens District, to Reuben Winfield Lee, Sr. (1823-1910) and Gilly Caroline Ross (1828-1903). Sock was married on 27 December 1884 in Oconee County to Mary Catherine (Kate) Beaty. Kate was born on 31 July 1866 close to Iva in Anderson County to Albert Chesterfield (A.C.) Beaty (1842-1894) and Lucinda Haseltine (Lou) Burton (1840-1910).

Sock and Kate had nine children. They were all born in Oconee County.

- 1) Albert T. Lee was born on 11 February 1884. Albert married Clara Belle Vaughn. He died in 1957 and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church.
- 2) Mary Elmira Lee was born on 05 January 1888. Mary (see back page) married Burle Creighton Wood. She died on 12 April 1963.
- 3) *John J. Lee* was born on 20 June 1890. He was single and died of typhoid fever on 07 **September 1909** and was buried in Bethel Presbyterian Church.
- 4) William Austin (Bill) Lee was born on 18 August 1893. He served in the U.S. Army in World War I (see back page). Bill married on 01 June 1919 to Hattie Leona Taylor. Uncle Bill died on 03 July 1954 and he was buried in the Wolf Stake Baptist Church with Aunt Hattie. His daughter the late Sarah Elizabeth Lee (1924-1998), my first cousin, once removed, and her husband the late Buddy Roach co-authored Oconee County SC Cemetery Survey Vol. I and Vol. II which this genealogy chapter now offers for sale.
- 5) Charles Beaty (Charlie) Lee, my grandfather, was born on 24 October 1896. He served in the U.S. Navy in World War I. Charlie was a cowboy in Missouri and married on 23 August 1923 in Osceola to Dollie Edna Brissey and they had one son who was my father (see back page). They came back to Oconee County and he became a policeman in Seneca. He died on 02 March 1972 and was buried in the Wolf Stake Baptist Church just six weeks before Grandma was buried there.
- 6) Henry Mack Lee was born on 14 February 1899. Henry married Myrtle Mitchell. He died on 17 Jun 1983 in Lago, Florida.
- 7) Franklin Louis (Frank) Lee was born on 19 November 1902 (see back page). Frank was married to Rosa Chapell. He died on 23 May 1977 in Seneca.
- 8) Gilly Caroline (Carrie) Lee was born on 13 November 1905. Carrie was married to William Macon Huskamp. She died on 23 June 1934 and was buried in New Hope Baptist Church.
- 9) Ruby Edna Lee was born on 27 July 1908. Ruby married Leonard H. Bowers. She died on 21 October 1970.

You may remember that the third child John died from typhoid fever. Three other children and their father also caught the fever, ² but it was only the father who died from the fever. Sock died on 12 September 1909, only a few days after his son died. Sock's father-in-law A.C. Beaty said that Sock was "sorry and not a good provider." ³ Kate lived with all the children in Poplar Springs. She later died of consumption on 18 October 1915 ⁴ and she was buried next to her husband's grave and close to her parent's graves in Bethel Presbyterian Church.

¹A.C. Beaty, my great great grandfather, was the subject of the presentation that I gave about three years ago at this meeting. Almost two years ago, at this same meeting, I presented a story about A.C.'s father John Wesley Beaty, my great great great grandfather. Last April, at the same meeting, I presented a story about Peyton Thompson Burton, A.C.'s father-in-law. This meeting tonight presents a story about my great grandfather, A.C.'s son-in-law Reuben Winfield (Sock) Lee, Jr.

Kennemore Homeplace

The Kennemore home place was located between Easley and Liberty by the overpass. It burned in 1928. The original part of the home was the section around the chimney. There were only two small windows in this section of the original log cabin and the family defended themselves against attackers from these small openings. The added covering on the chimney was inscribed with the date 1792, but the cabin was much older than

this. Later generations added to the home and weatherboarded the outside, but the original cabin remained a part of the home until 1928. rejoined the grand old Army of Northern Virginia.

At the Battle of Chickamauga on September 19, 1863, Jenkins brigade missed the main action due to delays with the train travel. Jenkins brigade arrived late in the day and was only able to make it up to Chickamauga Creek by sunset, after the savage battle of Chickamauga was over and the Union army retreated. Jenkins was very disappointed but there were more battles to come. The Union army had retreated to Chattanooga. General Bragg then tried to starve the Union army out of Chattanooga. This turned out to be a disastrous course. This siege began in September and ended with three-one day battles starting on November 23, an assertive assault by the Federal army, which broke the siege of Chattanooga. These were the Battles of Orchard Knob, Lookout Mountain, and Missionary Ridge.

During the Siege effort, General Bragg decided to send General Longstreet and 15,000 troops to Knoxville in an attempt to reclaim the city from the Union Army. In November 1863 Longstreet took 5 infantry brigades including Jenkins to Knoxville. Between November 16 and December 4, Longstreet attempted to retake Knoxville. By poor judgement, bad weather and worse luck, this attempt was unsuccessful. On November 23, 1863, Thomas Beacham was captured. He was held in Knoxville until December 15 when he was sent north to a military prison at Louisville, KY. Along with 5,592 others (prisoners from the Battles of Look out Mountain and Missionary Ridge) he was sent to the Military Prison at Rock Island. Illinois. On January 6, 1864 he arrived at the prison to face another war of disease. This was a new Federal Prison and was later compared to "Andersonville" of the South. Prisoners had begun arriving on December 3, 1863. The temperature was 32 degrees below zero on the day of their arrival. Doctors found 94 cases of smallpox in the first contingents to arrive. There had been no hospital built and the sick had to remain with the healthy. Smallpox, pneumonia and diarrhea claimed 98 prisoners and 3 guards in the month of Dec. 1863. This death rate continued with 231 dead in January and 350 in March. A prison population of about 7,600 was reported in March 1864. By July 1864, the Confederate Cemetery had a population of over 1,300.7 General Robert E. Lee was one of the only Confederate Generals to try an ongoing program of smallpox vaccination. Most others did not consider vaccination a priority and this was the cause of the many outbreaks of smallpox in Federal prisons. Thomas was confined at Rock Island until the end of the war escaping death by disease (possibly he had been vaccinated in the Lee's Army of Northern Virginia). He took the oath of allegiance to the United States on June 17, 1865 and was released to return to his home in GA. In

later years he made his home in Asheville, NC and died there in 1929.

Hartwell and Longstreet's infantry left Knoxville after dark on December 4, 1863 and marched to Blain's Crossroads, about 18 miles away. From there they marched about 40 miles to Rogersville, Tennessee. After several skirmishes with Federal troops they marched to their winter location at Morristown, Tenn. Estimates of 3,500 of the men had no shoes, the winter weather during the march was torture and left a trail of blood. After several weeks a shipment of shoes was very welcome sight. Hartwell's spirits had to be very low at this point. Having lost two sons to the war, he now did not know the fate of his son Thomas. As the Confederates did not retake Knoxville, there had been no way to try to find the grave of James Daniel who had died in Knoxville in November of 1862. The army spent the rest of January in Morristown then moved to New Market, Tenn. until March 1864.

The Brigade rejoined Lee's Army of Northern Virginia in the spring of 1864 and continued to fight until the retreat from Petersburg and the Surrender at Appomattox. The Palmetto Sharpshooters were the largest infantry regiment surrendered a tribute to their devotion and lack of deserters 8

Hartwell was on the last roll Nov./Dec. 1863. He was detailed in the Quarter Master's Department. His name appears on roll of those employed for extra duty at different camps in East Tennessee during March. The nature of service was teamster. After this, he may have been transferred back to the Virginia front to finish the war. The records have been lost. We do know that he came home after the War and lived until 1891. He is buried in Greer, SC at the Edgewood Cemetery. The United Daughters of the Confederacy placed a marker at his grave in recognition for his service in the war.

The memoirs of the Palmetto Sharpshocters is presented in a well written biography of Micah Jenkins called The Struck Eagle: A Biography of Brigadier General Micah Jenkins by James J. Baldwin. Subtitled a History of the Fifth South Carolina Volunteers and the Palmetto Sharpshooters. Mr. Baldwin lives in Greenville, S.C.

The younger sons of Hartwell. Phillip Dallas and Worth Butler, had enlisted or been conscripted into what Thomas Beacham later referred to as "local commands". Worth Butler, born 1847, entered the service in June 1864 at 16 years of age. He entered the Georgia State Troops and was assigned to Company H of Regiment 2-A. When he was discharged on April 25, 1865, he was the 4th Sergeant of the Company. He was in the

would do anything he could to help me.' 'He hoped,' he said, 'that I would get out of the way.' He said, at the same time, 'that he supposed Redmond would kill him, too now, if he got a chance.' But I would not hurt him or any other man, unless they force me to do so. Cantrell told him as much and 'that I would come laughing and if I had anything to drink he would get it. He would be just as good to you as he would to me.'

In telling of his capture and escape from the revenuers in January 1877, McKinley noted, "I may say here that the 'Major' did not seem to think that under the circumstances there was anything particularly wrong in his single handed attack upon the dozen revenuers. He certainly enjoyed telling how poor Charlie White had tried to crawl into Amos and how his faithful black mare had 'fanned timber with her indignant heels.'"

At the close of this first session of the interview, Redmond accompanied them back to the foot of the mountain. While on the trail they were suddenly greeted with the summons to 'Halt and surrender! I am a revenue officer.' The voice came from bushes on their right and the sound of hoofs came down the road. It was two of Redmond's friends who brought news that revenuers had captured one of their friends. They told McKinley that the dozen or so revenuers had divided up for the purpose of 'heating up the neighborhood.'

A lookout was kept as they proceeded on down the mountain, Redmond accompanied them even though his enemies were near. He remained with them as they at supper that evening but returned to the mountain as darkness set in. McKinley, after resting for a short while from this unusally strenuous exercise of climbing mountains, decided to go and find him again Tuesday night.

It was so dark that McKinley could not see his hand in front of his face. But the guides knew the way by instinct

and lead him by the arm "deeper and deeper into the darkness." When they reached the meeting place, they lighted a small handlamp, which revealed that Redmond had been following close behind. The sat upon rocks or roots or grass as best they could find.

They had brought Redmond food for his supper and McKinley had carried a kettle of coffee, "at the risk of my neck." Redmond didn't drink coffee and seldom ate meat though there were plenty. He appeared thoughtful as he ate pieces of bread and vegetables. Once he said, "Who can stand this sort of life? It is enough to drive an honest man to do wrong."

McKinley described the scene that night, ".... We sat within a narrow circle of dim light, hedged in by a thick darkness that might have concealed an hundred enemies. The trees seemed to be whispering secrets to each other or warnings to us. The leaves looked strangely as they reflected the light from their under sides. The air was heavy and oppressive and seemed fraught with danger. We looked in each other's faces with feelings not unlike what we might have experienced had all. instead of only one, been under ban and expecting betrayal and a death-dealing volley out of the night at any moment.

".... It was shared in kind by every household for miles around us. One of our party said, 'There is not one man in ten in this neighborhood, be he guilty or innocent, who will sleep in his house tonight!' 'And you say true,' echoed every vote, but mine, within his hearing."

It was almost midnight when McKinley, feeling the ill effects of too much exercise again, concluded this second session. They again returned to the cottage of their host, Redmond with them. There he and Field retired for the night while Redmond and the secret host got blankets and went off into the woods to sleep.

About 1 o'clock McKinley was startled awake by the

young hostess whispering to Mr Field, "to get up, please and strike a light; the revenuers are all around the house! I have heard some one walking in the yard and they always come about this time of night!" Mr Field went to the window and called out, "Who is there?" A voice answered and a whispered consultation followed. Mr Field returned and informed them that it was not revenuers but their prisoner of the day before. Mr McKinley congradulated him within his heart upon his escape. "It was the old story of captors dozing, a sudden dash for liberty, a few bullets dodged, and freedom once more."

The hostess prepared him a late supper and he ate more than any had seen eat before in their lives. Then he departed and continued on his journey "over the hills and far away to his home.... Where he was, no doubt, welcomed as one risen from the dead.... How Redmond——nay, how the whole neighborhood rejoiced over the fact of his escape the next morning!"

Redmond and the host came in from their 'usual' night of sleeping in the woods instead of their own homes. The hostess prepared them breakfast and waited upon them. She could not seem to do enough for Redmond. "The simple-hearted women of the mountains admire him if they do not love him. Neither his name nor his presence have any terrors for them."

His benevolence was widely reported among the mountain folk. He paid off the taxes hanging over the heads of, no one knows, how many poor families. Taking as his pay, "chips and whetstones and other like valuables." One old lady gave him a ram which soon returned to her yard, but he never spoke a word about. He rode five days "working for Hampton" during the election of 1876. On election day he hitched his wagon and team and sent eight or ten old men, who hadn't voted in years and couldn't walk, from their homes to the poll in Eastatoe. He dare not go himself.

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

My purpose is to try to determine the father of my ggg-grandfather, John ROPER, who moved from Pickens Co., SC to Forsyth Co., GA. The multiplicity of John ROPER in Pickens County makes this hard. Here is what I know and guess concerning the early life of my John ROPER.

According to two censuses, he was born in South Carolina. According to one, he was born in North Carolina. I believe SC is correct. According to the censuses, he was born between 1790 and 1800. For various reasons, I believe around 1798 or 1799 is correct.

He married a woman named Tabitha, perhaps around 1826 or 1827. I believe Tabith's maiden name was Byrum (spelled several ways in the records). According to the 1850 census, Tabith was born ca 1810, which basically agrees with the 1830 and 1840 censuses. John and Tabitha had at least four children while living in South Carolina: Henry franklin ROPER b. 1828: Mahulda Carolyn ROPER b. ca 1821: Matilda ROPER b. ca 1834: James Hamilton ROPER b. ca 1837: Plus maybe a Lewis ROPER?

I believe I found John in the 1830 census in Pickens District, SC (page 313). Details on the census: A man named John ROPER 20-30. A woman 20-30: A boy under 5. If this is my John, he was pushing the top end of the the 20-30 range. He may even have been 31 or 32. The boy was probably Henry Franklin ROPER. Living next door to John is Peter BYRUM, whom I believe is his father-in-law (my John named one of his boys Peter Byrum Roper). Peter BYRUM is the right age to be John's father-in-law. Living on the other side of Peter BYRUM was Reuben ROPER, whom I believe is John's brother. Reuben and his wife are basically the same age as John (20-30 range) and also have a little boy under 5 plus a girl under 5. Living with Reuben are a 70-80-year-old man and a 70-80-year-old woman. I think John lived in the Oolenoy region of Pickens County, SC. At any rate, 20 March 1836, a John ROPER sold 100 acres in the Oolenoy area, on a tributary of the Saluda River. John Roper to Joel Jones. (Book D-1, pg 207 1836-1840), 100 acres Oolenoy and Carpenters Creeks. This would agree with the general time that my John left Pickens Co., SC.

John may have connected in some way to the Episcopal Church in Pickens Co. I base this possibilty on (1) the fact that the ROPERS were from England and info on other ROPERS has been found in Episcopal church records, and

(2) the fact that John did not join the Baptist Church by "experience" until he moved to Forsyth County, Georgia.

John moved to Georgia the latter part of 1838. He is in the Forsyth County censuses in 1840,50 and 60. He died the early part of 1866.

REUBEN ROPER:

Mu purpose is to try to determine the father of my ggg-grandfather, John ROPER, who moved from Pickens Co., SC to Forsyth Co., GA. In the above query i gave what information i have on John. Since there were many John ROPERS in Pickens Co., SC, a second line of query might be more productive: to see what can be found concerning Reuben ROPER, whom I presume to be a brother to John. Reuben is a less common name than John (it is sometimes spelled Ruben, and is misspelled many other ways).

According to the 1830 and 1840 censuses. Reuben was bern between 1800 and 1810. My guess is that he was born 1801 or 1802. His wife's name was Cynthia (spelled many ways). They may have married around 1828 or 1829. Cynthia was probably born ca 1807. I have no idea what her maiden name was.

Reuben is in the 1830 census in Pickens District. SC (page 313). Reuben and his wife are in the 20-30 range and also have a little boy under 5 plus a girl under 5. Living with Rober are a 70-80-year-old-man and a 70-80-year-old-woman. Living next door to Reuben is Peter BYRUM, who i believe to be my John's father-in-law. Living on the other side of Peter is my John ROPER.

Reuben and Cynthia were members of at least two Baptist Churches in the general Pickens County area: Reedy River and Peter's Creek.

I have some church minutes from the Peter's Crook Plante Church August 13, 1831, when the church "met in conference," Cintha ROPER was "received" by experience "along with Moses Fendley and James Hagood" (note James' name in the next paragraph). In the list of male members, "Reuben" Roper was listed right after Moses F. and James H., so he apparently became a member the next time the "church met in conference"-which would probably have been in October, 1831. 11 October 1934, "Brother Reuben Roper and Sister Cinthy Roper his wife applied for letters of dismissal-they were granted them."

Like my John, Reuben lived in the Oolenoy region. He bought 160 acres from Ezekiel Howard 23 December 1828 (Book C-1 pg 479 1828-1837). This was in the Oolenoy region, on a tributary of the Saluda River. I assume this was setting-up house time for Reuben and Cynthia. The land cost him \$150.00. James Hagood was the principal witness to the deal. This was probably the grandfather of James I owe Havgood who married a daughter of my John named Elizabeth. Old man James later moved to Forsyth Co., Georgia.

Reuben sold the land 28 Decmeber 1835, to Lewis Findley (Book C-1 pg 141–1835-1836). John ROPER was one of the witnesses. According to the record of the transaction, Reuben already lived in Forsyth Co., GA. He must have gone to Forsyth County to spy out the land (probably after receiving the letter of dismissal from Peter's Creek Church in 1834), liked what he saw, and then came back and sold his land.

One other reference I have to Reuben is in connection with the estate of Thomas Masters, Jr. In a sale held 26 January 1831: Reuben was one of the buyers (along with various other Pickens County Ropers). This is recorded in two different books of SC county records.

I should also mention that a Roper girl in the Pendleton area (Mary Jane ROPER, daughter of Benjamin ROPER) married Joel Martin KEITH-and named her first son "Reuben KEITH." There MUST be some connection here.

Reuben moved to Forsyth County, Georgia around 1834. He was commissioned Ensign for Militia District 575, 22 August 1836. He was on the Grand Jury list for February 1837. He is in the 1840 Forsyth County census (one index

lists him as: "Koper" in the 1840 census because part of the "R" in the original record faded). He and Cynthia were charter members of the Friendship Baptist Church in Forsyth County in 1840.

Reuben died in 1841, and Cynthia and the children moved to nearby Georgia Counties.

PETER BYRUM:

Peter is in the 1820 and 1830 Pickens County censuses. In the 1830 census, my John ROPER is listed just before him and Reuben ROPER is listed right after him. I believe that Peter was my John's father-in-law (John named one of his sons Peter Byrum).

CHARLES ROPER:

My purpose is to try to determine the father of my ggg-grandfather, John ROPER, who moved from Pickens County, SC to Forsyth County, GA. Three queries above were all aimed at moving back from my John to his father. Another approach would be to try to move from prospective fathers forward to my John. There are several candidates among John ROPER Jr's sons and grandsons. Little or nothing is known about the ones I have singled out as candidates.

I would start with a man who, at this time, seems the most likely prospect: a son of John Jr named Charles ROPER. (My John named one of his sons Charles). Charles is in the 1790, 1800, 1810 and 1820 Pendleton District, SC (pre-Pickens District or County, SC) censuses. According to those censuses, he was born before 1755. In the censuses, he has sons the right ages to be my John and Reuben.

(I should mention that, if my John and Reuben are listed in these censuses, Charles also had an older son. There are a lot of younger Charles ROPERS in Pickens County, SC. One of them might be Charles Jr.).

In the 1820 census, one of the two sons of Charles (one a little older than 20, I am guessing) has left home and one of the sons (a little younger than 20, I am guessing) is still home. I am guessing that the older son is John--although I have not found him living on his own (he may have been living with someone else as a farm hand). I am guessing that the younger son still home is Reuben.

It is possible that the 70-80-year-old-man living with Reuben ROPER in the 1830 census is his father Charles. (Charles is not found elsewhere in the 1830 census).

If the above is true, I would guess that Chares died around 1835-36 and that this is the time when Reuben sold his land and moved to Georgia.

I have guesses based on a minimum of information, but I have to start somewhere. It is prove-or-disprove time. If I find that Charles could not be their father, I start over with another possible ancestor--but I like Charles' chances.

It there is anything about this Charles ROPER in all the Roper research that has been done. I have not seen it. But the man lived in Pendleton District/Pickens District, SC for more than thirty years! He has to have left tracks somewhere. Any help appreciated.

P.S. Yes, I know that there is a John ROPER Jr. database on the Pendleton District Web Pageand much information regarding John Jr's descendants on the Pendleton District Database-but my John is not in either source.

I contend that Elsey HUNT (1759-1837) married 2nd Anna Cockerham, not Hallie Agnes Cochran.

Anna was the daughter of William Winn Cockerham and Edith Stone. William W. Cockerham and his family moved to Pendleton District, SC by Dec 1800. After his first wife, Edith Stone, died William married Nancy Estes, niece of Edith Stone.

C.T. MARTIN NOTES PLACES, PEOPLE IN CIVIL WAR FIGHT

The article in the last several issues of the Progress and Sentinel, the first from Mrs Vandiver of Anderson and one from Mr M.J. Welborn of Pickens, describing what they term as the "last shot of the Civil War," have been read by me with much interest. While I was not a citizen of this state at that time, having come to Pickens from Russell County, AL in December 1873, having since resided the greater portion of the time in Pickens county, yet I have it from good authority that a small engagement in which several shots were fired, took place at Turner's Hill in this (Pickens) County on the Easley Bridge Road between where the city of Easley now is located and the city of Greenville several days after the engagement of which they spoke took place.

The engagement at Turner's Hill which occurred after the first of May 1865, was betwen some ten or twelve exconfederate soldiers and a squad of Federal cavalry. The Federals were enroute to Greenville from toward Anderson and had a drove of horses and mules which they had taken from the farmers along the way. The small band of exconfederate soldiers from the Slabtown section who through one of their scouts were informed of their number and the depredations they were committing, resolved to try and overtake and kill or capture and retake the horses and mules they had taken from the citizens.

Having heard the direction the Yankees were going, the Rebels guessed that they were enroute to Greenville and that they would cross the Saluda River either at Easley's or the bent bridge. So after getting in front of the Yankees they picked Turner's Hill, at the junction of the roads leading from Anderson and old Pickensville, as a good place to make the attack. The Rebs left their horses in the woods nearby and hid behind a rail fence where they could command the road from Anderson. When the Yanks approached they were fired upon. One Yank was killed and several others wounded. The squad was thorwn into confusion and scattered in all directions, leaving a number of horses and mules which the Rebs captured and later returned to their owners.

A few days afterwards the Yanks returned to the vicinity and burned several farm houses, one belonging to Mr Turner and one to Mr Hugh Ellison. The soldier who was killed was buried near where he fell by citizens of the community and later his father from some one of the western states came and had his body disinterred and shipped to his home. At least one of the Confederate soldiers who was in the engagement is yet alive, the others are all dead. I have not the exact date of this battle, but know it was after the 1st of May as the same party of Yanks killed Mr Matthew Ellison on May 1st as they were going toward Anderson, and it was a few days later as they were returning to Greenville that this engagement occurred.

It is said that these wandering bands from the garrisons in Greenville and Anderson were piloted by one Farnk Blakely, a notorious character from this county. Blakely was later killed as Mr Welborn states, by a vigilence committee, headed by the late Col. R.E. Bowen. He was shot after he had shot and killed a young man by the name of Archer and had wounded Mr J.A. Higgins. Blakely's body was buried at Poplar Springs, just north of Ariail Mountain. 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W.W. RUSSELL DESCRIBES FIRST SHOT OF CIVIL WAR to C.T. Martin

On Saturday the 5th April 1924, the angel of death called from earth to Heaven the soul of William Walker Russell. At the time of his death he with his wife, was residing in Minneapolis, Minn, with a married daughter. They moved there about one year ago from Anderson, SC. Where they had been residing for a number of years.

In this article I wish to give a short sketch of his life as I, a kinsman, have known him for the past sixty or more years. Walker Russell was born and reared in the Slabtown section of Anderson County, SC. He was the third son of the late Major Thomas H. Russell and his wife, Martha Jane (Hamilton) Russell. He was born in 1844. In his youth he attended Thalian Academy, a noted school that was taught in the vicinity by Rev. John L. Kennedy. Naturally bright, he was not very studious, but was considered an average pupil.

When about sixteen years of age the war between the State began and with his two older brothers he joined one of the first companies of volunteers that was formed in the community and was soon enroute to the front at or near Charleston, SC. The command to which he belonged was soon transferred to Virginia, and young Russell was made a scout for the Hampton Legion. In this capacity he served faithfully and efficiently during the remainder of the War. He with others was in many during escapades: at times for several days, he screethimes alone, and at other times with one or two comrades, would be in the rear of the Union Army obtaining information as to the movements of troops, their numbers and other information that would be valuable to Generals Hampton and Stewart.

It was Walker Russell, I have been told, who discovered the place where the cattle that were meant to supply grant's Army were kept. He also found out that they were guarded by a small detachment of troops. He reported promply to General Hampton and in a very few hours these beefs, some twenty-live landred or more, were being slaughtered in the rear of their army to feed Confederate soldiers.

During one of these trips to the year of the Yankee Arany be was surroun ded and coptured and was imprisoned in a Federal prision in West Virginia. After being contined for several weeks he succeded as bribing the keeper of the prison by giving him fifty dollars in gold that a young lady, a southern sympathizer, had given him and was allowed to escape. He soon made his way back to the Confederate lines and continued in the service until the surrender, then made his way home and joined his brothers.

After Johnson surrendered at Greensboro, NC, the 28th April 28th, the country and villages of South Carolina were soon filled with Union troops and parties of them would go one are the country and rob the citizens of their horses, mules, silver and gold or anything of value they could find.

On the 8th of May 1865 a crowd of these boys who had just returned from the war were having a chicken supper at a neighbor's home when an old gentleman from the city of Anderson came in and informed them that a small detachment of Federal soldiers had just left the city that afternoon going in the direction of Greenville and that they were robbing, plundering, and burning houses as they passed

Six of these boys headed by Walker Russell, intercepted them at Turoer's Hill, a cross roads situated about 6 or 7 miles east of Easley on the Easley Bridge Road, on the morning of the 9th of May 1865, and shot into the crowd stampeding them, killing one and wounding several others.

They recaptured a number of horses and mules and took them to a pine thicker on the Old Carmel parsonage place where they kept them for several days when they were returned to their owners.

The Yankee soldier who was killed was buried in a negro graveyard near by and six or seven months later his father from Michigan came and had the body exhumed and shipped to his home. The young man who appeared to be about 18 years of age was named Harry Morrison. The late T.C. Spencer helped in exhuming the body, and the old gentleman on his return home sent Mrs Spencer a nice wool shawl.

This was probably the last blood shed in South Carolina and it was in defense of the homes and property of a people who had suffered enough during the war and were determined to protect the little they had left.

This same detachment of Federal troops accompanied by a few regulars had on May the 1st, while going from Greenville to Anderson burned several housese in the vicinity and shot and killed Matthew Ellison because he objected to their taking his horse that he was ploughing. This, Mr Ellison in consequence of this skirmish a large detachment of Federal Troops returned to the vicinity a few days later and burned Mr Starling Turner's residence and did other depradations in that section.

Soon after the war, Walker Russell married Miss Janie Sitton of Pendleton and settled near Autum. After he moved to Oconce County and resided on Conneross Creek. After the death of his first wife, he married Miss Minnie Edwards of Orangeburg, SC. And settled in Anderson. There was no braver man in the Confederate Army than Walker Russell. Like everyone, he had his faults, but was kindhearted and it is said was a good neighbor. Easley Progress Issue: 16 April 1924

BOWEN FAMILY: Col. Robert Esli Bowen of Pickens Co SC was born on the farm where he now resides 8 Sept 1830. His father was John Bowen a native of Pickens Co, a farmer and surveyor and a prominent man in his county. His mother's maiden name was Elvira Hunt, his parents were married in 1828 (8 Jan 1829) and Robert was the eldest of their eleven children, ten of whom are yet living. Of the six sons, five served in the War: Robert E., William Reese, John Hallams, Samuel Hunt and Thomas Jesserson Bowen. Of these two were commissioned officers, Robert Esli being a colonel and John Hallum a captain. The father and mother who had been called upon to give five sons to the cause of the South were so fortunate as to see them all come home safely at the end of the struggle. The father died 4 June 1871, and the mother survives. The family was of Revolutionary stock: and the father's granduncle, Reese Bowen was killed at the Battle of King's Mountain. Col. Robert E. Bowen was reared in his native county educated in one of the old field schools and followed a farmer's life until the outbreak of the Civil War, when he joined the state militia at the age of 16 as a member of the reigmental band. Col Bowen is a member of Hawthorn Camp U.C.V. of Easley's SC and served as its first commander. He was married 15 Oct 1857 to Martha Adlaiya Antoinette Oliver, daughter of Dr. James Oliver of Anderson Co SC and they have 2 children a son and a daughter. While on leave from the army in 1864 he was elected a member of the SC legislature and in 1865 was again elected and was a member of that body when it refused to ratify the 14th and 15th amendments to the US Constitution. Please help to preserve a record of the life and service of your ancestor or relative who fought in the Civil War. If you have additional information about any of these Confederate soldiers, please write to: Charles H. Busha, Ph.D., 112 Summit Drive, Liberty, SC 29657.

Robert Lafayette Harris (first name might have been Richard) died during the Civil War. His wife was Nancy (Singleton) Harris (1841-1924), who was the recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in 1899 in Oconee County, S. Carolina.

Robert A. Harris (1836-1866)
was a son of Jr. and Annie T.
Harris of the Townville area.
He was buried at the Old
Stone Church near Clemson.

Thomas N. Harris served as a private in Co. K, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment).

William Patrick Harris enlisted in Co. E, 4th S. C. Inf. (Volunteers) at Fair Play, S. C., on April 14, 1861. He was killed during the Seven Days' Battle before Richmond, Virginia.

Harris (given name unknown).
In 1899, Emily Harris, a Confederate veteran's widow, was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County.

Harris (given name unknown).
In 1888, Sarah Harris, wife of a Civil War soldier, was the recipient of a pension.



Francis E. Harrison was a captain in the

Confederate Army, and he served as the commander of Co. D, lst S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt). He was wounded in the leg during the war and was subsequently promoted to major, lieutenant colonel and colonel. On April 8, 1864, he retired from the Confederate Army because of ill health, and he returned to South Carolina and served in the state's reserve forces.

- George W. Harrison of the western div.

 of Pickens District, S. C., served
 in the Confederate Army. A marker
 in his memory was placed in the
 cemetery at New Hope Baptist Church
 in Oconee County, but it has no
 dates or service information.
- Lewis Harrison's name was listed on the 1897 roll of Civil War pensioners in Pickens County, S. C.
- Henry Hartmin (or Hartman) served in Co. E, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt) and he was a member of the German settlement at Walhalla, S. C. He was born March 17, 1830, in Wintenberg, Germany, and arrived at New York on May 1, 1849. He applied for U. S. citizenship at Pickens Court House (Old Pickens on the Keowee River) on November 6, 1858.
- C. Hunt Harvey (or Harvey C. Hunt???)

 was born about 1844, and he joined
 Co. F, 2nd S. C. Cavalry when he was
 only seventeen years of age. He
 survived the Civil War and was discharged from the Confederate Army
 in May 1865.
- James H. Hastie (or Hastey) served in Co. C, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment), C.S.A. He was wounded at Wills Valley, Tennessee, and was subsequently discharged from the Confederate Army.
- John Hatton was the recipient of a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- ed in Co. F, 4th S. C. Volunteers on April 14, 1861, at Greenville, S. C. On August 31, 1861, he was reported on his unit's muster roll as having been detailed to take the body of Lieutenant Hawkins home, by order of Colonel Taylor. Later, he was reported as sick in hospital at Culpeper, Virginia.
- H. G. Hawkins, a Confederate veteran, died in 1921 in Pickens County, SC. In 1911 his name was on the Civil War pension roll.

- John W. Hawkins served as a private in Co. B, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment), CSA. His name was listed on the 1899 roll of Civil War pensioners in Pickens County, S. C. He died February 24, 1911, at the age of about 72 years. His wife was Liza Hawkins (1833-1921).
- J. Wesley Hawkins was the husband of Mary S. Hawkins, who was living in Easley, S. C., in 1930. Her pension as a Civil War widow was transferred from Lee County, S. C., to Pickens County, S. C.
- J. S. Hawkins was born December 27, 1847. He enlisted in Co. A, South Carolina Reserves under Capt. T. H. Russell on December 1, 1864, and served in that command until May 3, 1865. He was a resident of the Dacusville area of Pickens County, S. C. He applied for a Civil War pension on April 10, 1909.
- James Hawkins was a recipient of a Civil War pension in Pickens County, S. C., in 1911.
- John Hawkins, husband of Caroline
 (Dodd) Hawkins, was the recipient of
 a Civil War pension in Oconee County,
 S. C. His name was on the pension
 rolls of 1899 and 1902. He and his
 wife were married in 1858 by James
 E. Hagood, Esq., in Pickens District.
- Thomas Hawkins died of disease in 1862 at Lynchburg, Virginia, while serving in Co. E, 2nd S. C. Rifles, CSA.
- William Henry Hawkins was born about 1841, and he enlisted in Co. G, 4th S. C. Inf. (Volunteers) in April 1861. One year later, he enlisted in Co. E, 37th Battalion Virginia Cavalry at Richmond, Virginia.
- Jasper Newton Hawthorn enlisted in Co. I, 4th S. C. Inf. (Volunteers) at Pickensville, S. C., on April 14, 1861He rose to the rank of first sergeant. He was born on January 29, 1829, and he died in the Civil War. His first wife was Martha Mathis Gilstrap Hawthorne, daughter of Hardy Gilstrap.

battle of Atlanta. His wife was named Annie?. They had no children. He died August 24, 1931 at the Confederate Soldiers Home in Atlanta, GA and was buried in the Confederate Cemetery at Marietta, GA. At the time of his enlistment, he listed his home as Greenville, SC.

After the war Phillip Dallas Beacham (who was called Dallas on the census of 1850/60) went to Texas and the family lost touch with him. I have found a census record of him dated 1880 in Bell Co. Texas. He is 33 and married to Mary age 27 who was born in Arkansas. He has 4 daughters under 7 years of age. They are named Willie, Louisa, Frances and Ida. The 1900 Soundex index of Texas shows no Phillip Dallas or Mary Beacham. The 1870 census is confusing concerning Phillip and needs more research.

Belton Knox Beacham, born 1855, moved to Abbeville, SC, and was a successful contractor and builder. He married Hester Miller in 1883 and had 4 children. He rode the success and failures of the reconstruction period until The Panic of 1893 brought bankruptcy. Having recovered his losses, he again became successful. He died of a Cerebral Hemorrhage in 1918 and is buried in Long Cane Cemetery in Abbeville S.C. His grandson Lowrie Miller Beacham, Jr. wrote a short family history, which I have used in the writing of this paper.

My direct ancestor Archibald Lester Beacham grew up throughout very troubled times. He saw his family pulled apart by a cruel war. His father was gone for his early teenage vears. What effect this had on Archibald is unknown. We do know that he grew to be a strong man who in spite of his disability was able to do anything. He was a schoolteacher when he met and married Elizabeth Anne Fowler, 11th child of America and Martha Pearson Fowler. Archibald worked in mills, as a farmer, and as a house painter. Hope Beacham, great granddaughter, remembers him as "Grandsur" (Grandsire). He was a great help to her grandfather, Hartwell (named for Hartwell Lowrie Beacham) on the farm because he could "figure" in his head and could add bales for market. In the photo we have of him, he is an imposing figure who is unsmiling (as they all are in that day) with white hair and a kind face. Archibald lived through the reconstruction of the south and the mill villages to raise 8 children. He named two of his sons for the soldiers of the family, Hartwell and James Daniel Beacham. His daughter Carrie Alice Beacham (perhaps named for her great grandmother or Archie's sister Alice) married Robert Grady Smith and they are the progenitors of my line. Archibald Lester Beacham and Elizabeth Ann Fowler Beacham are buried in the Edgewood Cemetery in Greer, SC. Their graves lie alongside the graves of Hartwell and Mariah (Louisa) Sheppard Beacham. Hope Beacham remembers that "Grandsur" always wanted to be buried under a Magnolia tree. We don't know who planted it, but a magnificent Magnolia tree shades his grave today.

A strong will to succeed and survive was passed along to the Beacham children by these incredible parents. Hartwell and Mariah Beacham were able to educate their children and give them the strength to survive some of the worst times in the history of our nation. These children were not only able to survive but to pass this strong moral fiber to each of us living today.

On another occasion a man had his oxen and four sheep levied upon for taxes. He met 'the Major' on the road and asked for help and got it. Only a small sum, \$6.25, but a large sum for the poor farmer and despised Samaritan. It was freely given and has never been returned or asked for. It was not money from illicit whiskey sales either, but produce grown on the outlaw's farm by hard labor. A home he seldom visits and only then by night at the risk of his life.

McKinley again remarked how Redmond told his story, "I declare that the story was not told boastingly or evasively, but quietly and, as I believe, truthfully. Whatever other crimes have been charged against him, no man has ever yet accused him of lying. 'What he tells you, you may rely on,' is the testimony of all.

"... He tries to keep the peace at all times. Never has a fuss with any one when he can help it. He is fair, will hold his end of the bridle, but when he starts, he is game. When he says 'that's enough' you may know it is a plenty. He is one of the most sensible men I know and only needs an education to make him a leader in this country. This may be poor logic, but it presents no bad picture of the character of its subject."

After breakfast they again went to the hillside for the third and last interview. McKinley asked about the war years. Redmond ran away the first time when he was thirteen to be with his brother. His father had told him if he did that he would go and bring him back and whip him half to death. He left one night with a pair of pants and a shirt, arriving the next morning at the company station. His brother and the other men begged him to return but he didn't. They hadn't gone nine miles when his father caught up with them. He was scared into tears as they all begged and pleaded with him to go back. He did.

His brother returned home later because he was sick.

When he was better Redmond went with his brother and stayed six months. His brother was shot and sent home, Redmond accompanied him. The "Yankees" captured him at home soon afterwards and took him back north where he died in prison. His other brother, the oldest, lost his hand and was badly wounded "by seven balls." Another brother lived in another state at the time of the interview. Redmond said, ".... but I never write to him now and he does not know of my trouble. If I were to tell him it would only distress him and he might come and get into a difficulty on my account."

Mr McKinley wrote, "The outlaw paused and looking up I saw that he was weeping and had buried his face in his hands. I had been intent on my note book while he was speaking and though I detected a slight tremour in his voice I did not suspect the cause or look up until he ceased speaking. I was both surprised and shocked beyond measure at such a manifestation of emotion in such a man. Looking up at me with a smiling, tear-wet face, he sobbed out in spite of all his efforts: 'I can't help it, I can't help it. I am not a crying man, but when I think of these things and of my father and brothers and how they were shot to pieces or died in prison or think of how I have been served, I can't help it. I can't help it.

"He spoke as if in ashamed apology for a weaknes he feared I would despise. I did not despise him, I was sorry for him... Bohemian and Brigand, we were there together, sitting apart with the mountaineers, looking wonderingly on, and it was all I could do to swallow something big and hard in my throat and keep my own tears back."

McKinley continued to record the interview. "Redmond, the outlaw. dried his sinful tears and the smile he always wears came back again to his face. Though his voice was very sad and came from his heart when he said, in his simple unaffected way.

"'It looks hard for me to go through all this. If I had done anything worthy of it I would not mind, but I have not done more than other people. Why should I have to bear it all? If they would only give me a chance like they give other men, I wouldn't mind it.

"'I have settled my troubles with Barton and Hendricks. This very week, Gary sent me word that if I would let him alone he would quit the revenue service and go to work on his farm. I have nothing against him or any other man. If they would let me alone I certainly would not trouble them. I sent word so to him.

"'I wouldn't have any trouble now, but for this reward that has been offered for my capture. They think they will get it if they kill me even.

"'I was for the Pickens jail deliverery but I was not there. And I was for the raid on Gary, with which I had nothing to do except (ride alone).

"'I only want peace so I can go back tomy farm and work for myself and my sisters, without being shot at every day like a dog. They have shot at me 26 times already and I think that ought to be enough.

"'I am willing to surrender myself and stand trial for killing Duckworth. I know they would acquit me. I have no money to pay a lawyer, but I suppose they would pay me the reward if I surrendered myself, and he might take that.

"'They say they are willing to give amnesty to all the other men and I don't see why they should leave me out.'"

McKinley concluded his interview with Redmond by asking what message he would send to Governor Hampton. Redmond replied, "Tell Governor Hampton I am a poor man and have worked for my living all my life. I have not had a fair chance since this revenue party came in and if he wants a recommendation of me, from my childhood up, I can give it to him. I would rather send him one than not. I will leave it to the citizens of the country, to Bradley, and Bowen and





Some Records From His Business Journal, Together With Selected Data From the 1865 Inventory of His Estate

Hagood Mill Pickens County, South Carolina

enjamin Hagood died February 28, 1865, at the age of seventy-six. He was a prominent citizen of the old Pickens District in the foothills of South Carolina. His death occurred two-score days before the Civil War came to an end. The affluent merchant and planter was survived by his wife, Adeline (Ambler) Hagood (1808-1877), and the following five children: (1) James Earle Hagood (1826-1904), whose wife was Esther Benson (Robinson) Hagood (1824-1889); (2) Elvira Caroline (Hagood) Robinson (1829-1905), wife of Dr. William Wickliffe Robinson (1827-1886); (3) Elmira Elkins (Hagood) Martin (1834-1911), wife of Dr. Phillip Bower Martin (1826-1871); (4) Eliza Elvina (Hagood) Miles (1830-1918), wife of Dr. Francis A. Miles (d.1903); and (5) John H. Hagood (1839-1921), husband of Elizabeth "Lizzie" (Goodwin) Hagood (b. ca 1843-d. 1891). Benjamin Hagood was buried in his plantation cemetery in Pickens District.

At his death, the large estate amassed by Benjamin Hagood was worth \$101,452.37---a considerable sum of money in the nineteenth century. Lands of the estate included a 1,289-acre residential plantation on headwaters of Twelve Mile River and situated a few miles north of the present-day town of Pickens.

Also included among the estate's properties was Hagood Mill, which was one of the area's early water-powered facilities at which corn was ground into meal for local farmers. The mill was constructed of hand-hewn logs. Its sides are unpainted clapboards set on a fieldstone foundation. The grist mill was owned by Benjamin

Hagood and his descendants for more than 140 years, according to oral tradition. Still standing today (i.e., in 2000), Hagood Mill is situated 3.5 miles north of Pickens and alongside of U.S. Highway 178. The mill was donated to Pickens County in 1972 by **James Hagood Bruce** (1892-1986), a direct descendant of Benjamin Hagood. It has been carefully restored and rendered back operational for demonstration purposes. Hagood Mill is one of the best-known and most popular historical relics in Pickens County. Since December 11, 1972, it has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Among Upstate planters, Benjamin Hagood owned a relatively large number of slaves. Thus he realized substantial advantages as a result of their forced labor. The planter's politics logically gravitated to the slave oligarchy that dominated public affairs and policies in ante-bellum South Carolina. He supported U.S. Senator John Caldwell Calhoun (1782-1850), the former Vice President of the United States who became widely known as a champion of nullification, states' rights and the institution of slavery. Calhoun resided at Fort Hill, a large plantation which his wife, Floride Bonneau (Colhoun) Calhoun (1792-1866), had inherited from her wealthy father, John Ewing Colhoun (1750-1802). The plantation was situated on Seneca River, a short distance south of the mouth of Twelve Mile River. (In the nineteenth century, Benjamin Hagood would have been considered as Senator Calhoun's neighbor). The political career of John C. Calhoun became indelibly linked with attempts to preserve plantation slavery, the backbone of the Cotton Kingdom. Thus the statesman's ear was especially attuned to the aspirations and concerns of Low Country planters who owned large numbers of slaves. As a consummate politician, Calhoun also catered to such prosperous Upstate planters as Benjamin Hagood.

Colonel Hagood, whose title originated from his rank in the 5th Regiment, South Carolina Militia, actively resisted the abolitionist movement while serving as a member of a Pendleton committee of vigilance, a group that attempted to prevent the circulation of anti-slavery literature prior to the Civil War. Moreover, in the 1850s, the aging colonel became a vehement advocate of secession, which he deemed necessary to safeguard states' rights against Federal government encroachment and to protect the institution of slavery.

The legal settlement of the large, valuable estate that Colonel Hagood left behind was initiated March 1, 1865, a little more than one month before the end of the Civil War. At that time, the heirs and representatives of the estate "...agreed that Mrs. Adeline Hagood should retain in her possession during her life the following negro slaves to wit: Joe, Buck, Amanda and Fannie which said negro slaves are now subject to division among us under the will of said Benjamin Hagood, deceased, which said slaves together with their increase if any shall be equally divided between us agreeable to the will of said decd at the death of Mrs. Adaline Hagood. Given under our Hands and Seals this the 1st day of March 1865. J. E. Hagood, W. W. Robinson, E. C. Robinson, T. B. Martin, E. E. Martin, F. A. Miles, J. H. Hagood." But shortly after this agreement had been reached, the Civil War ended and the matter concerning which heirs would get what slaves became a dead issue.

The outcome of the war resulted in the demise of the Confederate States of America and the ruination of the South's economy---both of which were consequences foretold by **Benjamin Franklin Perry** (1805-1886), an outspoken Unionist who was a native of Pendleton District and the editor of a pro-Union Greenville, South Carolina, newspaper, *The Greenville Mountaineer*.

By the time initial efforts were made to settle Hagood's estate, the South's losses as a result of the war had played havor with the values of some properties, especially those of slaves and monetary investments in the Confederate States of America. Colonel Hagood had enumerated as assets his slaves who had not been advanced to heirs. He assigned them a collective value of \$18,000.00. In the Colonel's meticulously-kept business journal, each slave who remained in his possession was listed by first name, followed by gender designation, age and individual pecuniary worth. In the same journal the total value of Colonel Hagood's bonds, certificates and notes of the Confederate States of America had also been scrupulously recorded as \$16,700.00.

Moreover, not long before his death, Hagood made advancements of a total of twenty-one slaves among his two sons and three daughters. The following seven slaves (with their appraised values enclosed within parentheses) were given to James E. Hagood: a boy, Jack (\$850.00); a girl, Rose, and her child (\$500.00); Dilce (\$400.00); Torrence (\$250.00); Tom (\$250.00); and Bill (\$350.00). The following four slaves were advanced to Elvira C. Robinson: a boy, Miles (\$800.00); a girl, Mary (\$800.00); a girl, Martha (\$250.00); and a girl, Emily (\$400.00). Three advancements were made to Elmira Martin, and they were: Harriett (\$700.00); Simon (\$850.00); and Jane, appraised at age of five years (\$362.50). To Eliza E. Miles advancements were made of the following slaves: Andy (\$800.00); a child, Harriett (\$200.00); a woman, Sarah (\$800.00); a boy, Frank (\$400.00); and a girl, Hannah (\$100.00). To John H. Hagood the following two slaves were advanced: a boy, Henry (\$800.00); and Mary, 10 years old (\$681.00).

In addition to the slaves who were given to sons and daughters before his death, Colonel Hagood had thirty slaves who remained as chattel in his estate. Twenty-six of those slaves are listed in a later section of this article. Hagood also had four elderly slaves who, because of their ages, were neither advanced nor assigned values, and they were: Gilbert, age 76, and his wife Clarissa, age 60; and Henry, age 95, and his wife Molly, age 70. Despite the careful plans that had been outlined by Hagood for the distribution or sale of his many slaves, by the time the estate was settled all slaves had been released from bondage. In addition, Confederate currencies and securities had been reduced to worthless pieces of paper.

Notwithstanding losses in and depreciations of the worth of some personal assets entered in the merchant/planter's journal (and also listed in an official estate inventory made in 1865 by Samuel Reid, James Burdine, James Lewis, William Hunter and John Ariail), the remaining real and personal properties that had retained exchange values after the Civil War were substantial. This was altogether befitting a prominent Upstate citizen who, in addition to having been the operator of a productive plantation, was also owner of a general mercantile store, tannery and grist mill; trader of fine horses; justice of the peace; commissioner of public buildings; appointee to help establish a clearly-delineated North Carolina-South Carolina boundary; and member of both houses of the South Carolina Legislature.

If his estate were to be appraised today (i.e., in 2000), Colonel Hagood, the owner of 4,535½ acres of land at his death, would undoubtedly be a multimillionaire. (According to one knowledgeable participant in our contemporary real estate market, Colonel Hagood's land alone, which consisted of thirteen choice tracts-including one at Caesars Head---would now be worth at least twenty million dollars.)

Benjamin Hagood's journal contains considerable information of value to local historians and genealogists. For example, the lists of persons who had accounts with Hagood's store and those persons who signed promissory notes for loans from the merchant/planter all document the presence of many farmers who resided in Pickens District between 1840 and 1865.

Colonel Hagood's journal was found among the papers of the late Gertrude Hagood Mathews (1876-1957). Sometime after her death, the journal became the property of George Cleveland Hagood (1916-1974). On August 1, 1957, Ben Folger Hagood, Jr. (b. 5 Dec 1926), son of Ben Folger Hagood, Sr. (1896-1975) and Margaret (Sellers) Hagood (b. 1897) and a direct descendant of Benjamin Hagood, issued a document containing selected excerpts from the journal and other materials pertaining to the estate settlement. In his introduction to the seventeen-page document, the compiler wrote: "I have copied it for distribution to various members of the family for historical purposes only." The information contained in the following sections of this article was extracted from that historical document.

At the time of his death, Benjamin Hagood held bonds, certificates and securities of the Confederate States of America in the amount of \$16,700.00. Because of the fall of the Confederacy only a few months after Hagood's death, these investments were rendered worthless. The same was also true concerning the value of his slaves, all of whom were set free at the end of the Civil War.

Field and other county officers here and in North Carolina.

"The sheriffs of Pickens and Transylvania counties will sign it. Every good citizen that knows me will sign it. Every man in Pickens will sign it and I will send it to him if he wants it.

"Tell him I only want to go home and live at ease. I would be willing to stand trial even in U S Courts if I thought I could only get a fair trial there. I am ready to surrender tomorrow and can give \$10,000 bail [from] good citizens, if allowed.

"Tell Governor Hampton all this for me and see what you can do for me. I will wait for news from you. I know you are my friend now and if you can do anything for me write or send me word and I will go and surrender myself."

Redmond and Mr McKinley parted company that afternoon.
Redmond walked off into the woods, McKinley rode down out of the mountains and back to Pickens. There he prepared his letters concerning the interview and sent them off to Charleston. The NEWS and COURIER ran the story in three parts, each a full page in length. What the PICKENS SENTINEL had not been able to do with its months of 'ignored reports' about the revenue outrages, the NEWS and COURIER did, it got the attention of the whole state and nation.

NATIONAL NEWS PICK UP COVERAGE

The next few months were filled with talk and news of Lewis R Redmond, the 'persecuted outlaw', amnesty for all but him, 'renegade revenuers', and the 'trial' of Amos Ladds' killers.

In the 13 June issue of PICKENS SENTINEL, there was a reprint from another paper, an article "Is There No Remedy?" In this article, the NEWS and COURIER pleaded the cause of the 'mountain people' before a larger public audience. It contained in part, "Notwithstanding the committee of the Grand Jury of Pickens County appointed to look after and bring to justice revenue officials who abuse their

privileges, outrages by brutes in human form, who armed with a little brief authority take delight in making power opressive, continue of frequent occurrence.

".... Surely there ought to be some way of putting a stop to this persecution of the people.... This is a crying shame, and one that will exist as long as the people in the mountains are left to their own feeble efforts to remedy it. There is no hope of redress from the United States officials."

The previous paragraph was in reference to the difference between arrest and prosecution of a citizen and a revenue official. In the former case, the citizen who forceably resisted an illegal search of his home was charged, convicted and sent to Albany penitentiary. In the latter case, officials charged with assualt and battery during an arrest, where quickly acquitted and freed.

The NEW YORK WORLD grouped the situation in Pickens with other examples of "encroachments upon the liberty of the citizen or the law...such encroachments being impartially for personal profit or for partisan advantage.

"The Ku-Klux prosecutions at the South, the arrest and intimidation of voters in this city (New York), the notorious raids upon dealers in Chicago, devised only to obtain fees for arrests and abortive trials—these are all of a piece with the 'affray with desperate illicit distillers' in Pickens County, which resolved itself into the murder of an unarmed, unchallenged and innocent man at his own door.

"The most charitable supposition is that the revenue officials mistook him for a notorious desperado of whom they were in search—and afraid. But even if the murdered man had been the redoubtable Redmond, and even if they had a warrant for his apprehension, there would have been no justification for the killing.

"They did not know who was in the house, which was,

till their errand had been declared, lawfully a sanctuary."

LEGAL JURISDICTION

The legal maneuvering on behalf of the defendants began immediately after the killing. Captain W E Earle, W M Mackey and Absalum Blythe were defense counsel. The first hearing was held in the Walhalla court on 17 June. Bail was refused for Kane, Durham, and Moose and they were returned to the Greenville jail. Scruggs was allowed \$1,000 bond and returned to his home. Affidavits were then taken from all the principle parties. And a change of venue, requested and granted, to the Anderson courthouse.

The defense began four days earlier with a letter of Earle's published in the GREENVILLE NEWS and telegrams sent to the NEWS and COURIER and to Collector Brayton. He represented "Ladd as being 'armed to the teeth', standing in the door and resisting their entrance, snapping a pistol at Kane as he entered the door, and firing the first shots at them."

The next two months were spent in having the case moved from State Court to Federal Court, the defendants being federal revenue officials acting in performance of enforcing federal law was sited as superseding state murder laws. Mr Earle obtained his writ of habeas corpus from the Clerk of Court but Sheriff Gilreath of Greenville County refused to recognize it. Mr Earle left for Washington to consult with the President, Attorney General and Revenue Commissioner Raum. He arrived there in late July.

Secretary Evarts was called into the meeting and took Earle's side. He recommended that the government act promptly and use whatever authority and power may be necessary to enforce recognition of the wirt.

While in Washington, Earle was asked by a POST reporter about the progress of his case. He stated that nothing conclusive had been reached concerning the jurisdiction. However the reporter asked other questions which were of



Civil War Governor of Georgia

This Southern statesman and lawyer was born in Pendleton District, South Carolina. He married Elizabeth Grisham (1826-1896). Popularly known as "Joe" Brown, he served as a Georgia State Senator (1849-50); a United States Presidential Elector (1852); Judge of the Georgia Superior Court (1855-57); Governor of Georgia for four successive terms (1857-65); Chief Justice of Georgia (1868-70); and a United States Senator (1880-91). Throughout the War of the Rebellion, this independently-minded governor of Georgia often stood in opposition to policies of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy. Joseph Emerson Brown's tombstone in Atlanta's Oakland Cemetery contains the following inscription: "His history is written in the annals of Georgia." (Sketch and bio by Charles H. Busha, Ph.D.)

HISTORIC HOME MAY BE OLDEST LANDMARK--Easley, Pickens Co SC.

About a mile out of Easley, just off the Dacusville Road, on the farm of J. Milton King, is the old Duncan or Trotter home, believed to be the oldest landmark in this vicinity.

The historic pre-Revolutionary dwelling is claimed to have been built in 1760 by John Reid Trotter. Mr Trotter married Jane Russell of Abbeville in 1760 and lived in this home. The descendants of this couple were J.R. Trotter Jr., Andrew Trotter, Martha Clementine and Arminda Trotter. Arminda Trotter married J.C. Duncan and lived in the ancestral home.

In 1932 Mr King bought the old home. At that time it still had for its exterior the fine old logs hewn from stalwart oak trees. Mr King later weaterboarded the outside and about a year ago put asphalt brick siding on top of that. He also added an annex at the rear of the home.

When the house was built this country was a rugged wilderness. Many Indians were to be found in this section and some think that is why the house has such a few windows. In the front there is none. On the side beyond the old chimney's a small one and there are one or two others in the house.

Just at the left of the front door in the room facing the front is a quaint old stairway, rather crude, but typical of the time when it was built. No one climbs these stairs we were told, for the dark attic is inhabited by snakes. Fortunately the stairway has a small door and can be closed. Close examination of the of the interior reveals fine old logs put together by pins, great old beams and the sturdiest of construction, evidenced in the way it has weathered the winds and weather for one hundred and eighty-seven years.

Just a little distance from the old house, about 500 years. Is a spring over which three giant oaks have kept sentinel for centuries. If one can judge by their size. It was at this spring that Bishop Francis Asbury stopped to eat his lunch and to rest a little in the shade one day in 1790 before he traveled over into Antioch community to preach.

In front of the ancient home of the Trotters and Duncans ran the old stage coach road. It came down from North Carolina, through the present Easley and on to Pickensville. Only a hollow in the pasture in front of the house is most evident of the old road, which after passing the house, went down past the spring, there making a slight turn to the right, past Mad Dog branch, winding around the hill and finally crossing it near the present city limits. After making its way into what is now the heart of the city, it reached the site of Old Mount Olivet Church which stood at the crest of the hill in what is now know as Westview Cemetery (now Easley City Cemetery). From this spot the road's path took its way to the spot in front of the W.W. Robinsons home and then made a sharp turn to the left, thence to Pickensville. The Easley Progress Issue: 25 Sept 1947

NOTE by: Linda Cheek-The home site of W.W. Robinson, at one time, was the home place of Govan G. Smith and his wife Cynthia Smith Smith. It was a log cabin which faced the Mt Olivet Church. Robinson Funeral home is located there now (2000)

GRIFFIN FAMILY: Pickens Sentinel Issue: 25 June 1891

Elihu Smith Griffin was born at the Griffin homestead on Rices Creek four miles south of the county seat, the 29 day of Oct 1837. His father the late Elihu Griffin came from Laurens SC about 1832 and settled at Rices. His mother was a daughter of John Gary of Laurens Co SC. The records show that Elihu Griffin was born 26 Oct 1800 d. 1 March 1877 aged 76. Mrs Elizabeth Griffin b. 10 Feb 1805 d. 16 Sept 1873 aged 68 years.

Elihu Smith Griffin remained under the paternal roof until he was 21 years of age working on the farm and attending school at Tabor Church wher he acquired a common education under the tutorage of the late Stephen D. Keith. In 1859 he went of Laurens Co SC were he stayed 1 year. Then to Dalton GA in 1860 and was in business when called to arms in 61. He enlisted at Dalton in Co I in Col. I.W. Avery's Cavalry (4th GA). In the fall of 65 he went to Arkansas and remained until Jan 1867 then returned to Pickens Co. On the 16 Sept of 1867 he m. Sallie M. Smith d/o the late Warren Smith of Liberty SC. They settled on the Eighteen near the Esquire Smith place for 3 years then moved to the homestead at Rices where he now lives and continues to farm. Last year he was called upon to bear the greatest loss of the beloved partner, his wife who had been his helpmate for 23 years. She passed away 26 Sept 1890 leaving a family of 13 children to their fathers care. Elihu owns the Mountain View Hotel and Park in Easley which is given to be one of the handsomest hotel sites in the famous Piedmont escarpment.

GRIFFIN FAMILY: Easley Progress Issue: 3 Sept 1931

George Washington Griffin was born near Dacusville in Pickens Co SC on 14 Feb 1850 the son of Alvy and Jennie Brown Barton Griffin. He married on 31 Dec 1874 by Rev. W.B. Singleton to Fanny Young b. 23 Aug 1855 in Pickens Co SC she being the d/o Clark and Carolina Bush Young. They had one child Jennie b. 8 Sept 1877 m. Thomas Hughes. George and Fanny moved from their home in Dacusville to the town of Easley. Mrs Griffin d. 21 Jan 1913. George m. 20 Jan 1916 Miss Mary O'Dell Jameson d/o McElroy and Margaret Ferguson Jameson by the Rev. Holler, Methodist. They lived together for more than 15 years when Mr Griffin d. 18 Feb 1931 and was laid to rest beside his first wife Fannie in the West View Cemetery (now Easley City Cemetery) on the 19 Feb 1931.



In March of 1985, I received a letter from Miss Faith Clayton in response to a letter I had written to her. In this letter, she told me of her doubts that William Clayton Sr's wife was Elizabeth LANGLEY. The following paragraph is quoted from her letter.

"We know that William Clayton Sr had a wife named Elizabeth and think she was a Langley. **This has not been proven.** However, William Clayton, Jr named his first daughter Elizabeth L. Why in the world he didn't write out what the L. stood for is a mystery. The grandchildren and great grandchildren of this Elizabeth, now live in Texas, claim that Elizabeth always said her name was Elizabeth Langley."

Does anyone have documentation that Elizabeth was a LANGLEY or documentation of any other maiden name? Any help would be appreciated.

Need proof Vashti, wife of Basil/Basewell Smith PORTER is a COOPER, daughter of Alexander COOPER. Basil Smith PORTER is found in the Pickens District SC Census from 1830 through 1860; Pickens County Census in 1870 and 1880. His wife's name is listed as Vashti in the 1850 through 1880 Census. He wrote a will in 1863, naming his wife Vashti. She must have predeceased him, after the 1880 census, as she is not mentioned in his estate settlement in 1894. Basil died in 1894 age 97 years of age. His obituary says, "He was born at the Sam Porter place about 1/4 mile from where he lived. Hence, all of the days of his long life was spent in Pickens

County. While he was once a respectively citizen of Pendleton District, Pickens District and Pickens County, SC.

EDNY KNEW SLAVERY DAYS: Endy Williams, 110 year old colored woman of Easley SC is probably the oldest person in this country. She had know the chains of slavery and also the exhileration of freedom, for "Aunt Endy" was a slave in the days before the end of the War Between the States, and she was a very valuable one too. She declares that when she was 15 years old she was sold for \$1.500. She was strong and could easily do as much as a man, hence she was used as a field hand. Her first master was Thomas Garvin, and later she was sold to Robert Johnson, both of Pickens County. During the days when she was in her prime she says she got up before dawn, took her horse out of the stable, watered and fed him, went to the corn field, where she ploughed until dark, with a bit of rest at noon. The plowing over she declared that she would then help carry water up to the house and after supper there would be the carding and spinning until midnight or later in the the white folks' house. That was what she termed a day's work. When there wasn't plowing there was rail splitting and other strenuous she says. Not all the slavery days were work days, Endy added. At the slave quarters there was some relaxation occasionally, and come Sunday there was preaching at the church. Two seats were reserved for colored people, but after these were filled, late comers would have to wait around in the church yard and get the sermon "rehashed" by some of their friends who were lucky enough to get seats. Endy has known good years and bad years. Now she is in the twilight of her life and is content to sit in her rocking chair by the hearth and watch her grandchildren play around her. Several months ago she suffered an attack of pneumonia and to the surprise of her physician she recovered. Since then, however she hasn't been able to get about much, only walking around a little in the house. With the exception of frequent attacks of asthma, she says she feels very comfortable most of the time. Easley Progress Issue: 14 Sept 1944

Elihu Halbert Acker (18281865) served first as a
3rd lieutenant in Co.,
Gist Rifles; at the unit's
reorganization 25 April
1862, he was elected 2nd
lieutenant; wounded 31 May
1862 at the Battle of
Seven Pines in Virginia;
because of wounds he resigned 29 Sept 1862, but
he re-entered the C.S.A.
31 Mar 1863; he died at
Williamston, SC, shortly
after the Civil War and
was buried at Shady Grove
Baptist Church near Belton in Anderson County, SC.

William W. Humphreys served to the rank of major in the C.S.A.; member of Co. B (Palmetto Riflemen), 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.). He survived the Civil War.

James Lawrence McCarley enlisted in Co. C, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.) at Anderson, SC, 14 Apr 1861.

Robert Moorehead was wounded during the war; served in Co. B (Palmetto Riflemen), 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.)

James Andrew Monroe Smith was promoted to 5th sgt. in 1861 while serving in Co. B, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.), C.S.A.




Colonel Francis E. Harrison (1826-1878)

A native of Andersonville in Anderson District, South Carolina, this Confederate soldier served first as a captain and commanded Company D, 1" South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment), C. S. A. He was wounded at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, June 29, 1862, and then personally excised a bullet from his leg. Later, he was promoted to major and then to lieutenant colonel. He was also appointed regimental commander. On May 2-4, 1863, his regiment participated in the Battle of Chancellorsville, a major engagement of the Civil War. He was promoted to colonel May 5, 1863.

- P. H. Pruitt was killed inside enemy lines at Franklin, Tennessee, 20 Nov 1864; he served in Co. F, 24th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.), C.S.A.
- G. Lucas King was killed at Petersburg, Virginia, 19 June 1864; he served as a private in Co. K, 2nd S.C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment), C.S.A.
- Augustus A. Dean (1842-1935) was buried at Cross Roads Baptist Church in Anderson County, SC; he was a Confederate soldier during the Civil War and a lifelong resident of the Starr community of Anderson Co., SC.
- W. C. Herndon served in Co. H, Palmetto Riflemen, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.) and was killed in battle.
- James Crawford Keys (1813-1895) served in Co. C, 1st S.C. State Troops in 1863-64, despite his advanced years. After the Civil War, he was arrested by Federal officials and tried for the murders of three soldiers from the state of Maine who were members of a company of occupation troops in the Anderson area. The soldiers were killed at Brown's Ferry on the Savannah River. Keys was convicted by a military tribunal in Charleston and sentenced to death. On July 26, 1866, his death sentence was commuted to life in prison by U. S. President Andrew Johnson. Shortly thereafter, Keys was released by writ of habeas corpus and was never retried. Four of Keys' sons also served in the Confederate States Army.
- James Marshall Dunlap (1841-1932) enlisted in Co. K. 1st S.C. Rifles
 (Orr's Regiment) 20 July 1861; he
 served as regimental color bearer
 and was wounded six times during the
 war; he was promoted to fourth sgt.
 22 Apr 1863; his wife was Mary Ann
 (Cox) Dunlap; three of this soldier's
 brothers also served in the Confederate States Army.
- John Long served to rank of first lieut.
 in Co. D, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.).
- S. H. Taylor was captured by Union troops at Missionary Ridge in Nov. 1863; he served in Co. F, 24th Regt.

- James A. Bigby (1831-1900) served in Co. K, 1st S.C. Rifles (Orr's) and survived the Civil War; he was buried at Honea Path Presbyterian Church in Anderson Co., SC.
- Benjamin Manuel Mitchell joined Co. D, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.) at Anderson, SC, and was eventually promoted to second sergeant.
- John Robert Richey (1844-1862) died during the Civil War; he was a private in Co. D, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.); he was buried at Fairview Methodist Church in northern Anderson County, SC.
- Henry J. Knauff of Pendleton, SC, served in Co. B, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.); he was a son of William Knauff, a furniture maker who crafted a number of furnishings for the John C. Calhoun home on the Fort Hill plantation; after the Civil War, Henry J. Knauff went to Milam County, Texas, with his good friend Manson S. "Manse" Jolly, the ex-Confederate soldier who became known as the "unreconstructed rebel." Knauff later returned to South Carolina.
- Joseph Allen Laboon (1840-1906) was a member of Co. D, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.), and he also served in Co. C, 4th S. C. Cavalry Regt. On June 10, 1863, he enlisted as a corporal in Co. B, 37th Bn. VA Cavalry; at the time of that enlistment, he was 23 years of age.
- H. Manley Darlington served in Co. B, 4th S.C. Volunteer (Inf.), and he died of disease while serving in the Confederate States Army.
- J. M. Hanks was a corporal in Co. E, 20th S. C. Regiment during the war.



- Thomas Jefferson Bratcher was enrolled as a private in Co. D, 4th S.C. Volunteers (Inf.) at Anderson, SC, 14 April 1861.
- William Felix Barr (1832-1895)

 Joined for duty and enrolled in the Confederate States Army 31 May 1861; son of Leroy Barr (1804-1877) and Matilda Ann (Jones) Barr (1810-1851); two of his brothers also served in the Confederate Army and they were: Samuel Andrew Barr and John Milton Barr.
- Spencer Gregory died of disease in March 1864; he served in Co. K, 2nd S.C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- John Lathan (b. ca 1820 d. 1907) served as a private in Co. E, 20th S.C. Infantry He was a hospital patient at Petersburg, Virginia, when he was discharged from the army 13 July 1864; he resided in Corner Township of Anderson District, SC.
- O. B. McAlister of Co. F, 24th S.C. Volunteers was killed in battle at Jackson, Mississippi, in May 1863.
- John Baylis Lewis (1848-1929)
 served in 1st Regiment S.C.
 State Troops; he survived
 the Civil War and became a
 merchant in Belton (Anderson County), SC.
- J. Berry Holcomb served as a private in Co. K, 2nd S.C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment).

I hereby warn all men liable to this call, between the ages of 16 and 17 years--all Teachers or School-masters under 40 years of age---all keepers of ferries, toll-bridges and toll grain mills, under the age of 45 years, as well as all exempts from Confederate service, to report to me forthwith at Anderson C. H., or they will positively be arrested and lodged in jail. Those persons who have already been warned by my detachment will report to me at Anderson C. H. on Saturday next, 18th inst.---failing to report then, they will do so on Monday next 20th inst.; or expect to be taken by force.







The valuation of all my and my wife's property does not exceed \$500.00. I was born on the 17 July 1844 and reside at Dacusville, SC RR 2, Pickens Co SC. I lost right leg above the knee on the 7 Oct 1864, present health medium. Sg: O.J. Jones X. Dated 12 April 1919. He has resided in this state for 75 years. He was a Pvt. Wit by: D.C. Thompkins of Co F State Troopers, and Riley Simmons of Co E 2nd SC Rifles.

interest. The reward for Redmond had been withdrawn by the governor and the reporter asked if it was done so "in obedience to a strong popular feeling?" Earle explained his answer this way.

"Hampton found he had been a little too premature in offering a reward...it was proven to him that Redmond neither led the party or sided in the rescue of illicit distillers.... Now people have a mistaken idea about Redmond. He is nothing but an ignorant, scrub mountain boy, with very little influence. Nor is it true that these distillers are popular heroes."

The administration of the President desired to avoid a conflict between Federal and State judicial courts. There were discussions of abandoning the previous announcement of the President "to assert the sovereignty of the Federal government" and move the case to U S Court. Judge Northrop, who was involved in these discussions, had taken the Federal side in past cases and influenced the decision to let the original announcement stand.

Earle then proceeded to Baltimore to confer with Judge Bond of the U S Circuit Court in order to hold a special term in South Carolina as soon as possible. This was done and the U S Marshal was again sent to enforce the writ.

PRISONER TRANSFER

The PICKENS SENTINEL issue of 15 August 1878 reports the encounter. "Mr Gilreath informed R M Wallace, the U S Marshal, that he would not volunteerly surrender the prisoners, but pointed to the keys where they were hanging. He said to him, 'if he took charge of the prisoners he would have to unlock the cell himself.' This Wallace did and after formally taking charge of the prisoners returned them to the custody of the Sheriff as United States prisoners."

Little if anything else was reported in the papers concerning the trial which didn't reach its conclusion till April 1882. This was almost four years after Amos Ladd was

killed and during a period in judicial history when the time from crime to punishment was six or seven months.

WASHINGTON REACTS TO REVENUE OFFFICERS

While the Ladd case was drawing the attention of Washington officials, it also drew attention to the revenuer raids on citizens. Commissioner Raum wrote letters to his subordinates and regional collectors emphasising a change in tactics.

In one letter to the Greensboro agent he wrote, "I earnestly desire that the internal revenue law shall be enforced peaceably and quietly and without the necessity of using an armed force. This can only be done where the officers are supported by a public sentiment favorable to the observance and enforcement of the laws."

He continued on in several paragraphs suggesting the agent visit the upstate counties, '... confer with leading citizens and endeavor to interest their sympathies.' He also emphasised that the government would enforce the laws.

He also stated, "his determination that the laws shall be enforced in an orderly and lawful manner, avoiding all unnecessary collisions, and by officers....(who are) men of respectability." In this connection he quoted a statue of the revenue laws "which enact that an officer who is found guilty of any extortion or wilful oppression under color of law shall be subject to indictment."

In another letter to collector Brayton, again in response to a NEWS and COURIER article, he stressed the importance of leniency. The article expressed concern that illicit distillers who had recently surrendered themselves under amnesty would, "be victims of misplaced confidence and will treacherously dealt with."

He wrote, "... that is is no gratification to me to have men punished. While violators of the law arm themselves to resist the officers in the enforcement of the law, I am unwilling to make terms with them, but when they

express a determination to abandon their fraudulent practices and submit themselves to the authorities, I am ready to deal with them with themost liberal spirit."

He contined to instruct Brayton to publicly announce the government's intentions of acting in good faith toward those desiring amnesty. With the exception of Redmond.

REDMOND STILL DENIED AMNESTY

In a 10 August 1878 letter to the local District Attorney he stated, "After consultation and due consideration, I have decided, that the case of Redmond is entirely execptional and should not be included with those of ordinary offenders."

Collector Brayton announced a reorganization of revenue officers 25 August 1878. He assigned new officials to the Pickens, Oconee and Greenville counties, Capt E G Hoffman, J O Ladd, J E Gyles, C A Carson and Wm Kennedy. Moved to Spartanburg, York, and Union counties were H D Byron, M W Watson, R P Scruggs, and C W Cummings along with Capt S P Landford. As part of the announcement they were "specially instructed to exercise prudence and leniency in the performance of their duties and will be held to a strict accountability for misconduct."

REDMOND CAPTURED TWICE

In the 17 October issue of KEOWEE COURIER there was this article. "REDMOND CAPTURED!—Redmond, the outlaw, had been captured, and as might have been predicted, a woman did it. He was married on Sunday night last (13 October 1878) at his home in Pickens County to Miss Ladd, sister of the deceased Amos Ladd, who was killed by the Revenue Officers. Probate Judge W G Field, of Pickens, tied the knot, to the satisfaction of all conceerned. A flask of genuine Redmond whiskey was sent to the PICKENS SENTINEL and another for the NEWS and COURIER, subject to order."

After almost two years of hardship and tragedy, the couple left Pickens and moved to the Great Smokey mountains







WILLIAMS-LATHAM FAMILIES: Written for the Easley Progress by Ruth Latham Gilstrap Issue: 22 Sept 1929

Isaac Williams (son of Williams Williams and Elizabeth Reid Williams) owned property in the Burdine Springs section along the Dacusville Road up to the Cross Road Community. He was a member of the famous Red Shirt group that campaigned for Wade Hampton in 1876.

In 1848 he married Eliza Ann Griffin the d/o Alva and Jennie Barton Griffin. They had 7 children: William H. B. 1868, Jennie m. 1871-1918, Mattie M. 1873. Arie Nioma 1876, Mary Browne 1880, A.G. 1883 d. Infant, George E. 1886-1920. A brother of Isaac, Elliot Williams built the Major Bradley house in Easley. Another brother Joseph m. Eliza William's sister.

James Robert "Jim Bob" Latham was a descendant of the Williams family. He was the s/o William Latham who died in Virginia during the Civil War and Eliza Bowen, William's first cousin.

Jim Bob Latham m. Sarah Elizabeth Davis who was the d/o a Mr Davis who was the overseer for the joint land holdings of the Latham Brothers. According to Uncle Hence (a body servant given to Isaac Williams at birth) the Davis family came to the Lathams looking for work. They did not give any information about their background. Toward the end of the Civil War according to Uncle Hence, a man came to the farm in a very handsome wagon pulled by a great horse and surrounded by guards, asking for the Davis Family. He begged Mr Davis to come with him, but Davis refused and the man quickly let. Uncle Hence who lived to be 117 always said that this visitor was Jefferson Davis.

Jim Bob and Sarah Davis raised 9 children at the family home in the Mt Carmel Community.

ELLISON FAMILY: Pickens Sentinel Issue: 25 June 1891

Columbus Jefferson Ellison was born in Anderson Co SC on 16 July 1861 three months after the outbreak of the Civil War to Hugh and Loucretia Young Ellison of Anderson Co., SC. He was the eldest of the four children.

Columbus met his wife Martha Lee "Mattie" Robinson, at an all day singing at Peters Creek Baptist Church and she was the sweetheart of George Lathem at that time. Columbus and Mattied married 2 years later at the

homeplace of her mother in Dacusville SC by Rev. Arthur Walker Methodist Preacher on the Williamston Circuit.

Mattie was born 5 June 1867 at Dacusville the 5th child of George Robinson and Elvira Griffin. She was named for General Robert E. Lee She possessed a talent for music and studied under Mrs Mack C. Smith of Greenville, SC.

MARRIED: Dr John Robertson married on Thursday last (3 Sept 1818) by the Rev. Lewis Rector to Miss Eliza Blassingame, daughter of Gen John Blassingame all of Greenville District.

ALEXANDER: Micajah Alexander died at his residence nine or ten miles northwest of this place last week. He was probably the oldest person in the County, being at the time of his death in his one hundredth year. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 3 Jan 1878

HAMILTON FAMILY: Written by Hugh Hamilton for Easley Progress Issue: 25 Sept 1921

Archibald Hamilton (1745-1835) was born in Scotland, married to Frances Calhoun. They emigrated to Augusta Co VA by way of Ireland and Pennsylvania. They settled there and had several children, one of whom was Major Andrew Hamilton who served in the Revolutionary War and other military engagements. Major Hamilton married Jane Magill in Augusta Co VA in 1764, they moved to Abbeville District SC and settled there and had eleven children. He died in 1835 at the age of 95 and he and his wife are buried in Long Cane Cemetery, Abbeville District, SC as are his daughter Catherine and her husband Major James Alston.

Archibald Hamilton the second son of Major Andrew Hamilton married Jeane Davis and moved to Pendleton District SC and settled in the Pickensville area. They were early members of Carmel Presbyterian Church, one of the earliest churches in the upcountry which is located about two miles southwest of Easley.

I, Linda Cheek, need some verification on this Hamilton family for my personal Data Base and the Old Pendleton Data Base needs to be corrected, as I have found a few things in this written history that could not possible be correct!

1st. The first Archibald Hamilton b. 1745 Scotland d. 1835 would have been 90 years old in 1835 m. Frances Calhoun b. Scotland.

2nd. His son Major Andrew Hamilton b. 1741 Augusta Co VA d. 1835 aged 94 in 1835 (three years difference in ages) m. Jane Magill in Augusta Co VA 1764.

The question here is? Are the dates on the 1st Archibald Hamilton wrong or was he a brother to Major Andrew Hamilton instead of being his father? Either way I don't think either of them would have been born in Scotland as Major Andrew Hamilton b. 1741Augusta Co VA-- 3 years earlier than Archibald stated as born 1745 in Scotland?? Were they both sons of Audley Harrison and Eleanor Adams Hamilton b. County Tyrone, Northern Ireland to Augusta Co VA??

Rev. Penison of Andrew Hamilton states b. 1741 Augusta Co VA d. 17 Jan 1835 Abbeville District SC. Haven't found a pension for an Archibald Hamilton.

Also the Frances Calhoun...any connection to the John C. Calhoun family? Linda G. Cheek

DIED: Moses S. Hendricks which sad event occured at his residence at Easley Station about 1 o'clock am on Tuesday last. He was a gallant soldier in the late war in which he lost a leg. He was at the time of his death engaged in merchandizing at Easley. Pickens Sentinel Issue: 14 Sept 1876.

DEATH OF MANSON JOLLY

The news will be received with regret by the many friends of this bold and daring Confederate soldier. We learn that a private letter has been received, stating that Manson Jolly was drowned on the 8th of July near his home in Texas. He was building a residence on the opposite side of the creek from where he lived, and had crossed over on horseback several times during the day. The stream was greatly swollen, and in attempting to cross for the third or fourth time, he was carried with his horse down the creek, and in the struggle which ensued both were drowned. Mr. Jolly had been married about one year, and leaves a young wife, the daughter of a former citizen of Anderson.

The thrilling exploits and adventures of Manson Jolly in this section of the country, immediately after the war closed, are fresh in the recollection of all. His name was a terror for a long time to the garrison of United States soldiers, especially the volunteer white and colored regiments stationed at this place. When the regular troops arrived, he removed to Texas, where he has since been leading a quiet and peaceful life.

Oliver "Duck" Bolt (1847-1922) was a native of Laurens County, S.C. and a son of Asa Bolt (1808-1876) and Hannah A. Bolt. He enlisted in the Confederate States Army at the age of seventeen years in 1864.

Additional Facts About "Manse" Jolly

Manson Sherrill Jolly (1841-1869), the ex-Confederate soldier who has been described as an "unreconstructed rebel" and who acquired the nickname "Manse Jolly," was born on a 300-acre farm in the Lebanon community of Anderson District, S. C. He was one of the eleven offspring of Joseph Moorhead Jolly and Anna Cole (Sherrill) Jolly. On February 5, 1861, he enlisted at Pendleton, S. C., in an infantry regiment organized by William Butler. Later, during the Civil War, he served with distinction as a first sergeant in Co. F, 1st S. C. Cavalry. Six of Jolly's brothers also served in the C.S.A., and five of them were killed during the war. The sixth brother committed suicide shortly after the war. In the fall of 1866, Jolly went to Texas, where two years later he married Mildred Elizabeth "Millie" Smith (1847-1924), a daughter of John Gray "Lightning Jack" Smith (1825-1880), who was a native of Anderson District, S. C. Jolly and his wife had only one child, Ella Manson Jolly, who was born in Robertson County, Texas in 1869, shortly after her father's accidental death---which was reported in the newspaper article reprinted above.

Charles Loafer served in Co. E, 20th S. C. Volunteers, C.S.A. He attended the August 1914 reunion of the company at Neals Creek Church in Anderson County, South Carolina.

Hut Loftis was a member of Co. I, 14th S. C. Volunteers, C.S.A. He was living in September 1896.


O. B. Campbell died in a military hospital in 1864. He was a member of Co. F, 24th S. C. Volunteers (Inf.), C.S.A.





in Swain County North Carolina. They wanted to leave their troubles behind them, now that they were married, and try to start a new life. Their friends and neighbors in the Upstate were happy for them and wished them well.

Unfortunately this was not to be. Mrs Adeline Redmond, in the 24 March 1927 PICKENS SENTINEL gave this account of what happened some few months after they were married.

"... at the time I and Mr Redmond was living a peaceable and law-abiding life, but the government was still offering a reward for him, dead or alive. About the only way you could get to our house easy was to cross the river in a boat. We kept a boat locked on our side of the river. One night Mr Redmond's cousin cut the top off the stobb where the boat was locked and slipped the chain off. I think it was 12 men that came across while we were asleep and they hid on the side of the mountain by our house.

"Next morning when Mr Redmond went out they shot him without warning. I think they shot him over 30 times. They thought they had killed him, but (with a tone of triumphant defiance in her voice) they couldn't do it. He got well, but a part of his lung was shot off and he never could talk loud any more. There were only two officers in the crowd that ambushed Mr Redmond, the rest were just men from town."

Mr J L Bell of Brevard N C gave a more colorful version in a letter he wrote in response to an inquiry by Mrs Cadwell of the CHARLOTTE OBSERVER. This was in October 1925 and probably came from oral tradition.

".... A large posse under command of Shelby Ray, of Yancey county, one morning before daylight, concealed themselves and about sun-up Redmond left the cabin, crossed a branch, and as he entered a cornfield a posse without warning fired, for he was an outlaw. He fell, the officers still firing.

"Shelby Ray told me himself he (Redmond) was the gamest man he ever knew, for lying wounded between 2 corn rows with

nothing but the smoke of the officers' guns to guide him, he shot as long as he was able to raise his pistol. He had 56 wounds on his body."

Mr Bell continued, "Redmond was carried to Asheville where he lingered a long time between life and death. Almost before he recovered he was tried in federal court (not for killing Duckworth but other violations, was never tried in either state or federal court for it. I suppose Duckworth had no warrant.) He was convicted and sentenced to penitentiary at Albany. N Y."

Redmond spent almost three years in Albany. Governor Hampton and President Hayes eventually pardoned him before their term expired in 1892. He spent one day in the state prison before being released.

MURDER TRIAL

The murder trial against Kane and Durham, the one's who killed Amos Ladd was still being posponed and moved during this time. A mid-April 1881 issue of GREENVILLE NEWS had this article.

"ONE OF THE VICTIMS.--Poor old Mrs. Ladd...was in the city a few days ago, expecting to be called upon as a witness in the trial of her son's murders at the court now in session here. The trial, however, having been removed to another circuit, the feeble old lady will have to travel to Charleston. Solicitor Cothran, with his usual large heartedness, saw that she was comfortably provided for while here."

The case was moved to Columbia in December 1881 before being posponed again till April 1882 in Charleston. The prosecution could not get their witnesses to Columbia.

The 6 April 1882 PICKENS SENTINEL issue noted travelers passing through town. "Mrs Adeline Redmond, wife of Lewis R Redmond, and her mother and brother, Mrs Ladd and S M Ladd. passed through this place last Thursday evening on their way to Charleston as witnesses in the case against Hugh P Kane.

et al, for the killing of Amos Ladd in a revenue raid three or four years ago. The case will be tried, we suppose, this week, but it will be a mere farce, as the whole machnery of the Court will be used to secure their acquital."

The trial finally took place about 10 April. Mrs Adeline Redmond provided her testimony which was supported by Mrs Milly Ladd and Salathiel Ladd.

The defence witnesses included Internal Revenue

Collector T M Brayton who "that owing to frequent acts of
lawlessness in the Rocky Bottom section, which were supposed
to have been committed by Redmond and Amos Ladd and others
of his band, the revenue force had been increased."

W F Gary testified about his part in Redmond's capture and escape in January of 1877.

William Durham testified, "When he entered the garden around the house he heard a gun fire in the house, and soon after he saw Eadd rushing out of the house towards him with a gun. He challenged him and told him to drop the gun. On his refusal he fired two shots in rapid succession and the man fell. Ladd had his gun raised in both hands, and he was obliged to fire in self-defence."

Hugh P Kane testified, "On approaching the door Salatiel Ladd rushed out. Amos Ladd stepped immediately to the north door, gun in hand, and was called upon by him 'to surrender.' Ladd raised his gun and attempted to shoot, but the gun missed fire then he fired and Ladd fell forward from the steps to the ground."

Judge Bond charged the jury, after defining murder and malice aforethought, with "... and (the defendents) were present at the homicide in the discharge of their duty, which was to arrest those there who had been engaged in violating the internal revenue law, and that from the peculiar perilous character of the place and the armed resistance theretofore made to the officers in the discharge of their duty in that particular place the officers were

My finger was shot--off with two other sight wounds. Sg: John Julian. Dated 1 April 1919. Wit by Riley Simmons of Co E 37th SC and S.A. Looper of Co F 37th SC.

BENJAMIN J. JOHNSTON: I enlisted in Co I 62nd Reg of NC Troops of Inft under Capt W.J. Wilson in Sept 1862 and served in that command until the 9 April 1865 when discharged at Asheville NC. I was born on the 1 April 1845 and reside at Central, Pickens Co SC. Sg: Benjamin J. Johnston Dated 1 April 1919. Wit by J. Neal of Co A Orrs Rifles and J.H.Ballentine of Co H Griffin Reg.

MARTIN JOHNSON: I am the widow of Martin Johnson who enlisted in Co A 29th Reg of NC Inft under Capt Anderson in April 1861 and served in that command until discharged 9 April 1865 at Appomattox. He died on 27 Aug 1875. I reside in Pickens Co SC and have lived there since eleven years. Sg: Celia M. Johnson. Dated 14 April 1919. Wit by James A. Griffin of Co J 4th Reg SCV and R.A. Bowen of Co E 2nd SC Rifles.

WILLIAM I. KENDRICKS: I am the widow of William I. Kendricks who did service for the Confederate State. Served in Co D under Capt R.J. Foster of 16th SCV Inft. Sg: Mary R. Hendricks. Dated 26 Sept 1916.

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

Some time's local booklets have noted local residence (i.e. Jenkins or Russell). I would be interested is she is listed on the 1790 census, with possibly older children living in close proximity. (Son Thomas Jenkins born ca 1769 is of particular interest).

armed, and that the deceased was armed also;

"and if they shall further find from the repeated acts of violence to the officers in that place, and from the conduct of the deceased when the officers approached, they had reasonable ground to fear that their lives were in danger, or that they were in danger of great bodily harm, and therefore fired and killed the deceaed, then the homicide was not murder, but was killing in self defence,..."

The verdict, "The jury after an absence of thirty-five minutes announced that they had agreed to a verdict, and Judge Bond was sent for. Upon his return to the courthouse, the jury ws called and rendered a verdict of 'Not Guilty' as to all the defendants."

During the course of the trial, Kane stated that he was born in Ireland and came to the United States in 1867 and that he had never been naturalized as a citizen. He came to South Carolina in 1869 as a body servant to ex-governor Franklin J Moses. At another time, during an election in which he was sworn in as a supervisor, he stated on oath that he was a naturalized citizen.

Some three and half years before in August 1878, the NEWS and COURIER had revealed that William Durham was convicted of a murder in May 1872 and sentenced to two years in prison. He was discharged after one month and pardoned by Governor R K Scott. After his discharge he became an illicit distiller but was promoted to the position of deputy marshal which held till after 1878.

The PICKENS SENTINEL issue 27 April 1882, noted this inconsistency concerning the trial. "In the Elleton riot trials. Chief Justice Wait ruled that the government could not reject jurors by standing them aside. In the trial of kane et al for the murder of Amos Ladd, Judge Bond made the same ruling. He desired an acquittal in that case. But when the election cases came up, a week after, he desired a

conviction—and ruled that the prosecution could reject jurors by making them stand aside. This gave the District Attorney a chance to pack the jury and secure a conviction. What a travesty on justice."

LAST YEARS

With this finial chapter in their troubled lives over, Mr and Mrs Redmond removed to the Seneca area of Oconee County. There they raised nine children, two sons and seven daughters. Mr Redmond worked for a Mr Bieman, he owned a government distillery and Mr Redmond supervised the production. He changed what was an almost unsellable product into one of high demand, "Redmond's Hand Mash." The 'barrels' had labels on the top with Mr Redmond's picture on it.

Lewis R Redmond died a "quiet, almost obscure death" on 5 April 1906 from pneumonia. The KEOWEE COURIER carried the obituary which included one final rememberance.

"We remember an incident connected with the man and his home life, which was one of the most pathetic we ever witnessed, convincing us that there was a big, warm, tender heart beneath the rough exterior of Redmond's character.

"Some years ago we were at the Southern depot here and Redmond was also there with his family, among them the little unfortunate deaf mute, a daughter. She was there to be taken by the mother to Cedar Springs. our institute for the deaf, dumb and blind. Although a child of probably ten years or older perhaps, the father held her closely embraced in his arms and during the long wait for the train, the tears never ceased in their flow down his rugged cheeks, gently fondling her, constantly smoothing her hair or patting her cheek or arranging her hat, totally oblivious to the crowd of curious faces about him.

"At last when the deep tones of the engine announced the late train's arrival the distress and grief of the broken hearted erstwhile outlaw was indescribable and we turned aside, leaving him with his grief, but with a sense of appreciation of the rough diamond that no other circumstance could have induced.


"We knew thenceforth that Lewis Redmond was not as 'black as he had been painted.'"

Mrs Adeline Redmond joined her husband again some twenty-seven years later on 7 February 1933.

DEATH OF MAJOR LEWIS RICHARD REDMOND-A Pathetic Incident that Spoke Volumes: Seneca SC 17 March 1906. The quiet almost obscure death of Lewis R. Redmond which occurred near Seneca last week was a striking close to a life that had for many years been given over to reckless outlawry for at one time the name of "Redmond the Outlaw" was a familiar one in SC. After his pardon however probably twenty-five years ago having been sentenced to life imprisonment at Albany Penitentiary he settled into a sober quiet life and has since been a changed man.

We remember an incident connected with the man and his home life, which was one of the most pathetic we ever witnessed convincing us that there was a big, warm, tender heart beneath the tough exterior of Redmond's character. Some years ago we were at the Southern depot here and Redmond was also there with his family, among them the little unfortunate deaf mute, a daughter. She was there to be taken by the mother to Cedar Springs, our institute for the deaf, dumb and blind. Although a child of probably ten years or older perhaps, the father held her closely embraced in his arms and during the long wait for the train the tears never ceased in their flow down his rugged cheeks, gently fondling her, constantly smoothing her hair or petting her cheek or arranging his hat, totally oblivious to the crowd of curious faces about him. At last when the deep tones of the engine announced the late train's arrival, the distress and grief of the broken-hearted outlaw was indescribable and we turned aside, leaving him with his grief, but with a sense of appreciation of the tough diamond that no other circumstance could have induced. We knew thenceforth that Lewis Redmond was not as "black as he had been painted." Keowee Courier Issue 18 April 1906. Submitted by: Judy Ballard

William Jameson III was the father of 6 children, Wesley Jameson was the father of 8 children, Carol Jameson was the father of 3 children two of whom are now living. Madison Jameson died in Georgia at the age of 80, he had 10 children, 5 of whom are now living. Wilkie Jameson died in Georgia, the father of 6 children, Joshua Jameson died in Anderson Co., SC at the age of 84, he was the father of 12 chldren, six of whom are now living. John Jameson born, lived and died in Pickens Co SC died at the age of 76. He was the father of 4 children only one of whom is now living. McElroy Jameson born lived and died in Pickens Co SC and died at the age of 82 the father of 8 children six of whom are now living. Pyramus Briggs Jameson died before the age of 20 and never married. 



Pickensville Had One Of Three Courthouses

Old Pickensville, at one time in the early history of the State, a notable place; from the fact that when the State had only three court houses within its borders, one of them was located at Pickensville.

Signs of the old jail can be seen there today, although it has been over a hundred years since the division of the State into smaller districts, the court house was moved to Pendleton.

The jail was built on a large flat rock that covers over an acre of ground, and a deep hole in the center of this rock which is said to have been used as a dungeon, marks the spot where the jail once stood. Several years ago this hole was cleaned out and several iron spoons and wrought iron nails were taken therefrom.

Pickensville remained as a small country village with a postoffice, blacksmith shop and several small stores, until the Atlanta and Charlotte Air Line Railroad was built in 1873; it was then completely dismantled. The postoffice and other business houses were moved to Easley, the new town that sprung up on the railroad just one mile further North.

But we are digressing from the object of this article, which was not meant to give a history of Pickensville, for it would take some one who is older and more familiar with the scenes of reveling, horse racing, prize fighting and other incidents of that nature that at one time gave the place an unenviable reputation.

All these things have long since passed into oblivion, and Pickensville, after remaining for years nothing more than an old field covered with stunted pines and Bermuda or Tom Bell grass, has within the past few years been cleared

again and waving fields of corn and cotton now white unto the harvest covers that historic spot.


But we are digressing again. Last week there occurred at Old Pickensville two incidents that remind one of the days of "Auld Lang Syne;" a horse race and a fracus.

It is said by some one who passed along the road at the time the race occurred, that it reminded him very much of the stories their grandparents used to tell them of the rowdy scenes that took place at Pickensville eighty or ninety years ago.

The fight or fracus occurred, however, a few nights before

this at a cabin nearby that is occupied by some disreputable people. A man by the name of Dalton is said to have been very badly carved up with a knife.

In these days of churches and schools let us not turn back and again take up those cruel sports for amusement and make night hideous with drunken reveling and broils similar to those that occurred on the outskirts of the eighteenth century, and that were even then considered a disgrace to the communities in which they occurred and a menace to the welfare and prosperity of the country. On old Federal Street in Pickensville there was a wooden shed which housed a winepress. Pickensville was one of three towns in the district wherewine was made from the grapes grown by local farmers. Grapevines brought from Delaware and Virginia grew exceptionally well here and many area farmers had vineyards. Pickensville wine was famous because of its clarity, which was produced by the winemaker adding a small amount of finely ground sea shells and limestone which would react with any vinegar or acid left in the wine. 

Recollections of Confederate Army Life During the War of the Rebellion: Part One



This is the first installment in a series of Civil War remembrances of Gus Dean, who enrolled as a private in the Confederate States Army and later rose to the rank of lieutenant. As a member of the Second S.C. Rifle Regiment, this soldier participated in many battles and engagements between 1862 and 1865. He survived the war without a scratch and came back to his home in the Starr community of Anderson District, S.C., where he lived a long and healthy life and wrote his recollections of military life during a tragic period of our nation's history. At the age of ninety-two, he picked 2,225 pounds of cotton, according to a report published in an Anderson County newspaper in 1934. This Confederate veteran was among the last of the Civil War soldiers of Anderson County.

INTRODUCTION

Seventy-four years before the Civil War began, ancestors of Confederate Army soldier Lieutenant Augustus Aaron "Gus" Dean (1840-1935) settled in the old Pendleton District of South Carolina. In 1787, Samuel Dean (1751-1826) and Gwendolyn "Gwenny" (James) Dean (1754-1835), the paternal grandparents of Gus Dean, arrived in the foothills of Upstate South Carolina, having migrated from Washington County, Maryland. They established a sizable plantation on Mountain Creek in what is presently southern Anderson County. The move of these ancestors to the Deep South was motivated, in part, by a desire of the Deans to escape from hostile Indians who sometimes attacked white settlements in Maryland. On their slow, southward journey, the Deans were accompanied by members of the Cummings, James and Leonard families, into which some of them had married while living in Maryland.

Samuel and Gwenny Dean had ten offspring. The first six of their children were born in Maryland; the last four were born in South Carolina. Many of these offspring and their descendants made their homes in the section of Anderson County that became known as Dean's Station---a community situated about two miles from the present-day town of Starr. Some of the Deans reside in the same community today (i.e., in 2000). And Gus Dean's old home is still standing there.

The maternal grandparents of Gus Dean were Major Lewis (1772-1837) and Elizabeth (Moorhead) Lewis (1780-1863). Major Lewis owned the water-powered facility at Rock Mills in Anderson District, and he was commissioner to survey the line to divide Pendleton District into Pendleton and Anderson districts. He also represented Pendleton District in the Twenty-sixth (1824-1826) South Carolina General Assembly. The father of Elizabeth (Moorhead) Lewis settled in Pendleton District before 1800. His son Alexander Moorhead, who was Elizabeth Moorhead's brother, was a member of the Public Buildings Commission that selected Anderson's courthouse site.

Gus Dean was born January 14, 1840. His parents were **Moses Dean** (6 Sept 1798 – 12 Mar 1878) and **Narcissa (Lewis) Dean** (30 May 1803 – 21 Oct 1883). They were married September 13, 1822. Moses Dean became a very successful farmer at Dean's Station, and all four of his sons answered the call for Confederate soldiers during the Civil War.

In addition to Gus Dean, the following were also offspring of Moses and Narcissa Dean. (1) Elizabeth Lewis Dean (b. 15 Sept 1823), who, on November 14, 1840, first married Marcus Motes (d. 31 May 1843) and who, on October 16, 1844, married her second husband, Fleetwood Rice, and moved later to Texas; (2) Mary Hillis Dean (b. ca 1825), who married her cousin Samuel Dean (b. ca 1817) and moved later to Texas; (3) Mariah Louise Dean (b. 4 Aug 1828), who married John H. Jones; (4) Major John T. Dean (b. 20 Mar 1831), who married Fannie Rice, served in the Confederate States Army and later moved to Texas; (5) Lucy Emily (Lucinda) Dean (11 Dec 1833 – 10 May 1892), who, on April 15, 1852, married her cousin Samuel Augustus Dean (21 Dec 1821 – 16 Oct 1895), who served as a sergeant in Company C, 1st S. C. State Troops during the Civil War; (6) Robert Baylis Dean (3 Feb 1837 – 18 Feb 1905), who married Sarah Amanda Burris (9 Feb 1840 – 24 Dec 1894) and served during the Civil

War in Company C, 4th S. C. Volunteers and in Company E, 13th S. C. Battalion (Infantry); (7) **Evaline N. Dean** (b. 13 Nov 1843), who married **Frank Morrow**; (8) **Waddy Thomson Dean** (18 Jun 1846 – 24 Nov 1910), who served as a seventeen-year-old scout in the Hampton Legion, C.S.A., and married **Sallie West** (b. 1850); and (9) Annie Eliza Dean (b. about 1849), who married **Rufus R. Beaty.**

On December 8, 1868, Augustus Aaron "Gus" Dean married Louisa Davis Allen (27 Mar 1849 – 23 June 1917), daughter of Charles Pinckney Allen and Sarah Ann (Clayton) Allen of Abbeville, South Carolina. Gus and Louisa Dean became the parents of the following children: (1) Charles Lewis Dean (6 Oct 1869 – 20 Apr 1926), who married Eloise M. Earle (b. 1875); (2) Lawrence Oscar "Ossie" Dean (6 Oct 1872 – 24 Aug 1928), who married Edna Driver; (3) Cora Clayton Dean (8 Oct 1876 – 8 June 1970), who married her cousin A. Eugene Dean; (4) Mary Love Dean (b. ca 1880 – d. ca 1887); and (5) Ella A. Dean (b. 11 Sept 1883), who married Frank Rhody.

Existing photographs of Gus Dean depict a small, wiry man with an air of distinction. Indeed, Gus' bearing was very upright and correct. Even when this Confederate veteran was in his eighties, he had excellent posture, was also quite fit and enjoyed exceptionally good health. Many tales about Gus' love of walking have been passed down by his descendants and in newspaper articles written about him. As an elderly man, Gus walked several times weekly from Dean's Station to the city of Anderson---a round trip of about twelve miles. And when Gus was in his nineties, one fall he picked more than 2,000 pounds of cotton.

After having served the Confederacy in the war and having participated in numerous battles and engagements, Gus Dean was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, shortly after April 9, 1865, when General Robert E. Lee surrendered the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia to the Union Army of the Potomac. Speaking to his troops at the surrender, General Ulysses S. Grant, chief of the Union Army, said, "The war is over; the rebels are our countrymen again." Then, a tired and war-weary Gus Dean made his way back to Anderson District and his home near present-day Starr. He became a successful farmer and was a lifelong resident of Anderson District and County. In 1876, he participated in the Red Shirt movement in support of the spirited gubernatorial campaign of General Wade Hampton (1818-1902), the former Confederate military leader who became South Carolina's first governor after Reconstruction. According to family oral tradition, Gus Dean always regarded his Confederate military service as a major, honorable and noble episode in his long life. And, until sometime in the first quarter of the twentieth century, Gus achieved both emotional satisfaction and physical comfort during cold winter days when he wore his Confederate Army greatcoat to Starr Baptist Church where he was a longtime member and a deacon. At the age of ninety-five years, this Confederate veteran died January 24, 1935. Gus was laid to rest beside his wife's grave at Cross Roads in Anderson County. He was among the last survivors who served in the Civil War from the county.

GUS DEAN'S RECOLLECTIONS



(Editor's Note: Words and phrases enclosed within parentheses were added to the following narrative to enhance reading and understanding. Moreover, the numbers enclosed within parentheses were added as references to footnotes at the bottoms of pages.)

I was mustered into the service of the Confederate States on January 11, 1862, at Anderson, S. C. Court House by **Major (Thomas H.) Boggs** (1). I was a member of Company G, 2nd S. C. Rifle Regiment (2). The company was required to take an oath to serve the Confederate States honestly and faithfully against all enemies or opposers whatsoever; I thought so often of the oath afterwards and (about) how many of the men lacked so much of doing what they were sworn to do.

The company left home a few days after being mustered into service. We went to Sullivan's Island (South Carolina) and remained there a few days. We then went to Johns Island (and) then to Wadmalaw Island. We then went back on the mainland and remained on the coast till the 26th of May (3). While on the coast, we did not do any fighting but had to drill and stand guard a great deal and sometimes (to) go on picket (4).

I recollect one night (that) **Berry Harbin** and I were on picket on the bank of a river. We had to go through a swamp to get to the place. There was another river just to the left, so we were in the fork of the two rivers. The swamp was all around us, and (there was) no way to get out of there but along a path, and the Yankees were camped not far from us, on the other side of

- (1) Major Thomas Hamilton Boggs, who was soon promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel, was the second officer in command of the 2nd S. C. Rifles when it was organized. He was a son of Thomas Gilliland Boggs (1795-1899) and Eleanor (Hamilton) Boggs (1795-1885) of Pickens District's Salubrity community (now Liberty). While serving in the Confederate Army, he fell victim to typhoid fever and died July 6, 1862, at home in South Carolina. He was buried at Carmel Presbyterian Church, situated in southern Pickens County, South Carolina.
- (2) In the spring of 1862, the 2nd S. C. Rifle Regiment was organized by the addition of a number of transfers and new army recruits to the earlier organized 5th S. C. Infantry Battalion, which has sometimes been incorrectly identified as the 1st S. C. Rifle Battalion. At the time of its organization, the 2nd S. C. Rifles consisted of seven companies. The regiment was also known as Moore's Regiment, Thompson's Regiment or Bowen's Regiment, depending on who the unit's commander was at a given time.
- (3) The regiment departed the coast of South Carolina after it received orders to proceed to Richmond, because Virginia had become the focus of military operations in the Civil War.
- (4) Military usage of the phrase "to go on picket" denoted going on guard duty at an outpost situated some distance from---and usually in front of---a company, battalion, regiment, brigade, etc.

the river. We were put there directly after dark and had to stay there till midnight. One of us had to be awake all the time. Berry Harbin was so uneasy that he was miserable for fear the Yankees would cross the river and come behind us and capture us. A porpoise, or large fish of some kind, came along and made a noise like someone had hit the water with a plank. It scared Berry almost to death, but I was asleep some of the time. Yet, Berry was a good soldier; I recall so well how he acted in the Second Battle of Manassas.

While on the coast we moved (our) camp often. Each company had a wagon (in which) to haul our tents and cooking utensils, besides a number of other wagons. But after going to Virginia it was very different, for we had no tents a great deal of the time, and we had to carry our cooking utensils with us ourselves or do without. We left the coast May 26, 1862, and reached Richmond May 30, about sundown (5). We stayed that night at the edge of the city and, oh my, how it rained that night! It came down in torrents, and as the men had no tents they had to stand and take it. **James Jones** and I got under an ambulance (wagon) and, though we did not keep dry, it was better than being out in the rain.

The next day, May 31, we were marched two or three miles in the direction of the Seven Pines but did not have to go into the battle. We were near enough to hear the firing though, and I was about as close (to it) as I wished to be. There was some fighting done Sunday morning, the first of June. We were fresh troops and had not had any hard service, so we were kept either on picket or near the picket line nearly all the time till the Seven Days' Battles started June 25.

It rained a good deal during June. Where the land was level, the water stood on the ground all the time in many places and made it very disagreeable for us. Our company stayed at some old houses a good deal. One of them had fallen down, but the boards were still on it. Some of the others and I would crawl under it when it rained to keep out of the rain, though we generally got wet. There were seven or eight dead horses within seventy or a hundred yards of where we stayed, that were killed in the Battle of Seven Pines. We had to endure the stench while we were there. We used water out of a well that was right by the road and which had no cover over it. It was so full we could dip the water with a cup. When it rained, muddy water from the road ran into the well.

A number of horses were killed in the Battle of Seven Pines (6). That smelled bad near us, but there were fields between our camp and the picket line where clover was growing. The road got so bad that the men (avoided it and) marched through the fields. Wagons, ambulances and artillery (guns) also went through the fields. It smelled worse to me than the dead horses; it was one of the most sickening smells that I ever smell(ed). Though it was less than a month from the

⁽⁵⁾ The 2nd S. C. Rifle Regiment arrived at Richmond, Virginia, during the night preceding the Battle of Seven Pines, but it did not participate in that engagement.

⁽⁶⁾ The Battle of Seven Pines/Fair Oaks was fought in Virginia on May 31 and June 1, 1862 at the intersection of the Williamsburg Road and Nine Mile Road and Fair Oaks Station, situated about eight miles east of Richmond. There, General D. H. Hill's division of Confederates attacked Colonel Erasmus Keyes' corps of Union troops. Fast-moving Confederates regiments overran four Union lines and repulsed a fifth line in the course of the battle. Confederate General Joseph E. Johnston (1807-1891), a Virginia-born graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, was seriously wounded on the first day of the battle. But the fight temporarily put Union troops on the defensive.

time our regiment went to Richmond till the Seven Days fight commenced, two-thirds of our company was sick by that time and a number had died.

The Seven Days' Battles commenced on Wednesday, June 26, 1862 (7). There was not much fighting done that day; more fighting (was) done the next day. A brigade that we belonged to until a few days before the fighting began was in the fight on Thursday and was pretty badly cut up (8). A good many of men (of the brigade) were killed and wounded. The three principal battles were Gaines Mill, on Friday, June 27th; Frasier's Farm on the 30th; and Malvern Hill on July 1. On Thursday evening about dark we crossed the Chickahominy River and camped not far from where we crossed. The next morning, Friday 27th, we started early and went down on the east side of the river. We passed through a number of camps where the Yankees had been but had left, though a few tents were about all they had left. About ten or eleven o'clock we were halted and stacked arms in a field. We were ordered not to leave our guns, though it was very warm.

There was a piece of woods not more than fifty yards in front of us where the trees were large, and (with) no undergrowth. The shade certainly looked tempting, but we were not allowed to go near it, (even) though there were no Yankees about. After remaining there for an hour and a half or two hours, we were ordered to fall in and take arms, march out into the road and turn down toward the (Gaines') Mill. After going a short distance, Col. (John V.) Moore (9) gave the command, "HALT, FRONT LOAD, LOAD AT WILL." What a feeling that produced in me. I knew it meant going into battle, or expecting to, and (that) I might be a corpse before night.

We marched on down to the mill and turned down the branch a short distance; then (we) went up the hill in the direction of the enemy. We were ordered to lie down. The firing commenced in front of us. It was about the heaviest infantry firing that I ever heard in my life (10). There were a great many cannon(s) firing too, and the minie balls passed over our heads by the hundreds. It seemed to me that a great many of them just passed over the hill and then

⁽⁷⁾ Having taken place between June 26 and July 1, 1862, the Seven Days'
Battles were part of the Peninsular Campaign in Virginia in which
Union troops, led by Major General George B. McClelland (18261885), threatened Richmond, the Confederate capital. In the battles,
General Robert E. Lee (1807-1870), chief of Confederate armies, made
an all-out effort to win the war by attacking Union troops at Mechanicsville, Gaines' Mill, Savage Station, Frayser's Farm and Malvern
Hill. These battles succeeded in turning back the Union drive for
Richmond and shifted the focus of the war from the doorsteps of the
Confederate capital to areas north of the Potomac River.

returned right towards my head. I was almost sticking my nose in the ground; I was so afraid that one of them would hit me. We lay there for some time while the battle was raging in front of us. While there, an officer rode up in front of our regiment and ordered us forward. A good many of the men jumped right up, but Col. Moore ordered us to lie down, and the officer ordered us forward again. Many of us got up the second time. Col. Moore ordered us to lie down, and said he was the officer to get orders from. After that we paid but little attention to that fellow. He may have been sent back to bring up reinforcements, but I think he was drinking and was trying to lead us into the battle and distinguish himself. He should have been with his own command. Soon afterwards, Col. Moore ordered us forward. I thought as soon as we get to the top of the hill, fifty or seventy-five yards distant, that we would see the whole face of the earth covered with dead men (as) the fighting had been so tremendous. We could not see a single one till we had gone nearly half a mile; the fighting was so much further (away) than I had thought.

It was while we were moving forward that the shells from the enemy's guns were flying and bursting around us, which made it extremely unpleasant for us. One shell passed very near us, and J. L. Humphreys jumped behind a bunch of sprouts not much more than knee high and not larger than my finger. This reminded me of the old saying that a drowning man will catch at a straw, and a man in battle will jump behind one when a shell comes near him.

The Yankees had their line formed along a branch where the firing was so heavy in front of us. The front line was close to the branch, and just behind it was another line. As the hill was steep, the rear line could fire over the heads of the front line. A little higher up the hill they had their cannons, which could fire over the heads of both, while our men had to advance across an open field for a long ways. I saw a few of our men dead there. The Yankees had left before we got there, and our men had followed them. We were halted, when we got to where the cannons were, to get the men in good line. There were two horses to a gun that I passed, and one was down. I think it was dead; the other (horse) was wounded in several places. It had turned with its head towards the gun and was standing there, squealing. He was badly hurt and so excited that he did not know what he was doing. We only stopped a minute but while (we were) there another line of our men who were coming behind us fired into us. The firing was still going in front of us, and those men behind (were) shouting at us. Some man fifty or sixty yards from me hollered, "Cease that firing, g-- d--- you; you're shooting your own men." Though there was so much shouting all around us, I could hear him as if everything had been perfectly quiet. I thought, "What in the name of common sense does the man mean by using such oaths in the battle?" But before the war was over, I heard it so often it did not surprise me at all. TO BE CONTINUED

equal size. Never before had so many Southern troops been concentrated on a single battlefield. About 8,800 Confederates were killed in the battle; approximately 6,800 Union troops also lost their lives. But several Confederate regiments achieved breakthroughs in the fight, collapsing the Federal lines. The Battle of Gaines' Mill represented the first victory of the Civil War for General Lee as chief of the Confederate Army. It also resulted in the capture of more than 2,000 Union soldiers and the seizure of twenty-two enemy cannons.

General Micah Jenkins:

COMMANDER


Throughout most of the Civil War, the Second South Carolina Regiment of Rifles was assigned to Jenkins' Brigade, which was commanded by Micah Jenkins, an outstanding and fearless Confederate military leader. Born December 1, 1835, on Edisto Island, S. C., Micah was a son of John Jenkins and Elizabeth Grimball (Clark) Jenkins. In 1851, the young Jenkins entered the South Carolina Military Academy, from which he was later graduated at the age of nineteen. In 1855, he and Asbury Coward, a close friend, founded King's Mountain Military School at Yorkville, S. C. Then, on July 2, 1856, Jenkins married Caroline Harper Jamison, daughter of David Flavel Jamison, who served as president of the S. C. Secession Convention.

Shortly after the Civil War began, Jenkins was elected colonel of the 5th S. C. Volunteers. One year later, he organized the Palmetto Sharpshooters and was made commander of that regiment. Among the early battles in which Jenkins took an active part were Williamsburg, Seven Pines, Gaines' Mill and Frayser's Farm. On July 22, 1862, when he was twenty-six years of age, Jenkins was promoted to brigadier general upon a recommendation of General Robert E. Lee, along with those of other high-ranking Confederate States Army officers.

After his promotion, this very capable and young general, who was highly respected and admired by his soldiers, participated in the following battles: Second Manassas, Fredericksburg, Lookout Valley and The Wilderness. He was seriously wounded at Second Manassas and returned to his home to recuperate. But by September 1863, Jenkins had returned to duty and was appointed acting commander of Hood's division, when General John Bell Hood was seriously wounded and lost a leg at the Battle of Chickamauga. In the campaign against Knoxville, Tennessee, Jenkins also accompanied Lieutenant General James Longstreet, his immediate superior officer and close friend. After Jenkins' return to the battlefields of Virginia, the general rejoined his old brigade and took part in the Wilderness Campaign in the wild and almost impenetrable region situated west of Fredericksburg.

It was in the confusing struggle at the Battle of the Wilderness that Jenkins was wounded and died on May 6, 1864, as a result of the mistaken "friendly" fire of Virginia troops. General Longstreet was also severely wounded in the same incident. Jenkins, the fallen warrior, was removed from the battlefield and returned to South Carolina where he was buried in Summerville (Dorchester County). His wife and the following four young sons survived: Micah John Jenkins, Robert Flavel Jenkins, William Edward Jenkins and John Murray Jenkins. A fifth son, Whitemarsh LaRoche Jenkins, died as a baby in 1863.

Does anyone have information on William ALLEN, John SHEARLY/SHIRLEY, Obadiah PINKSTON and Samuel REDDING. I believe that I have found a Hall Co GA record of possible intermarriages for these families or their brothers or children or related? Source 1800 Census of Pendleton District, SC a special publication of the National Genealogical Society #26, Washington D.C. 1963 compiled by William C. Stewart, reprinted 1979 pg 115.

One Moses PINSON (1762 Orange Co NC d. 1853 Cass Co GA) married Margaret HENRY (b. 1770 PA) and had know children named: Allen, Redding, John and Elisha Pinson. I expect that PINKSTON is a form of PINSON in this case. Also the sister of Moses PINSON married one Thomas SHURLEY, which spelling would be SHIRLEY, I think these names are in Pendleton District, SC.

Now to Pendleton/ Greenville Census or a geography question: I started out looking for one David PINSON b. 1772 age about 28 in the 1800 SC census. I was told that he was living and his houshold is listed in the Greenville SC census for that year. I just naturally though that in 1800 Greenville was part of Pendleton for census purposes. Was Pendleton ever part of Greenville?

Does anyone have access to the Greenville 1800 and 1810 census to find David PINSON'S household as I need the number of children and ages in his household for that year. He was in Pickens District SC in 1820 age 45+ with wife and a few younger children. I need the births of his older children listed in the 1800 census.

ANSWER FROM LINDA: Folks I hope I am telling this correctly and if not please be sure to correct me.

Pendleton District, SC was formed in 1784 and from my findings it was once included in Ninety-Six District and Abbeville District, SC. Some people will argue this. I have determined this from a deed of one of my ancestors (McAlister) who's land was early in Ninety-Six and Abbeville District and the same land is now in Pickens Co., SC. (Example: one of my gggg-grandfathers lived in NC in six different counties and never moved, the counties changed).

Pendeleton and Greenville Districts have never been connected except for a few years 1798-1804 when they shared the same Judicial Court, located at Pickensville in Pickens District, SC about 1 mile south of Easley, SC. This Judicial Court District was called: Washington District. Anne McCuen of Greenville, SC compiled a book of the Washington District Records that were found in the attic of the Greenville Co. Courthouse. I had the opportunity to go through these records.

NOTE: Think you might find the SHIRLEY family in lower Anderson Co, SC and around Turkey Creek, Abbeville Co SC (depending on which side of the creek you are standing on).

DON'T FORGET: to check out the SCGenWeb which will enable you to get to each county in SC for research.

BIT'S and PIECE'S

1835: MILITIA COURT MARTIALLED FOR PICKENSVILLE REBELLION by J.D. Wyatt

In Pickens and Anderson Districts John C. Calhoun had many zealous followers; but across the Saluda around Greenville he numbered more enemies than friends. In every election during the Nullification stir Greenville voted against States-Rights.

This article accounts an incident which is not only interesting locally, but also valuable for the light it sheds on the early period of the struggle between (Benjamin F.) Perry and the State-rights faction.

Up until the Civil War the State Militia was well organized and was the means of administration of the local government. There were only three distinct officers, the clerk, the sheriff and the ordinary. The local military companies supervised the roads and bridges had charge of elections and at their regular musters discussed the politics of the neighborhood.

In Pendleton and Greenville Districts there were some fifteen or twenty muster grounds. Of all of these Pickensville was the most important. We find records of musters there from 1800 down to the close of the Civil war. In 1835 it was the muster ground of the 5th regiment, in 1845 of the 4th and in 1857 of the 17th.

In 1835 the Nullification issue was becoming quieter, but there was still talk of fight in the air. Greenville felt that she was being imposed on by the larger States-rights district of Pendleton. In September the annual encampment of officers was scheduled to be held at Pickensville. All through the summer threats were heard of a rebellion of the Greenville Officers. Many of them had openly stated that they intended to disobey the call to the encampment. They alleged that the States rights men of Pickens and Anderson were attempting to mobilize an army for an independent South Carolina.

In this dissension Perry saw an opportunity to strike a blow at Calhoun and Thompson, who was at the time in command of the regiment. Accordingly a meeting of the Greenville officers was held in the office of B.F. Perry and there it was agreed that all Greenville Officers would disregard the summons to the brigade encampment.

The encampment was held at the appointed time. The Greenville officers did not show up.

COURT MARTIAL: The court martial was held at Pickensville September 4th by the order of Brigadier General Thompson. On the court he appointed Cols. Garvin, Hammond, McKinney, Norris and Hamilton. Col. Brockman the first Greenville officer to be tried was found guilty of wilful disobedience and sentenced to pay a fine of \$60.00 and to surrender his commission. Col. R.P. Goodlett, Col. McNeely and Major Smith were also found guilty and received similar sentences. It came out at the trial that the plot had been hatched in Perry's office.

Easley Progress Issue: 12 April 1922

Died on the 21 Nov at his residence on Tugaloo, Pickens District, SC, Benjamin Perry Sr in the 82nd year of his age. He was a native of Massachusetts, but for more than half a century past a resident of South Carolina. He heard the first guns fired in the cause of Independence at Concord on the 19th April 1775. At the age of 16 he volunteered his services. In 1784 he came to Charleston SC and to Greenville, SC. Some years afterwards purchased a farm on Tugaloo and removed there and spent the remainder of his days in seclusion. Greenville Mountaineer Issue: 23 Dec 1842. The cemetery is located behind Pleasant Grove, an old block church. 64 graves moved in 1961 many unmarked graves.

EVE OF 1860 WAR: Pickens District, SC, Easley Progress 17 May 1922

In 1860 the majority was overwhelming for States-rights, secession and even war. One of the first companies organized for state aervice was the Little River Rangers. And Dacusville had become foremost among the patriots. At a meeting of the citizens on 15 Dec 1860 a flag was raised with the inscription "Secession" and a palmetto tree, a military compamy was organized and the vote was unanimous for secession.

Just before the secession of South Carolina there was a meeting at Pickensville advocating war measures. Rev. J.C. Furman of Furman University was one of the ardent speakers in favor of immediate action. Among other speakers who were convassing the district for Secession was James L. Orr, later governor of the state, commander of Orr's regiment and Ambassador to Russia.

I have been unable to find no record of a dissenting voice in this campaign and movement for Secession.

After the war was over three appeared in the Keowee Courier an "I told you so" letter from a leading citizen of Pickensville. In that letter he admitted, of course with frankness as the Yankees were then in power, that he had persuaded young men from entering the State and and Confederate service.

Of course there were grumblers and traitors, but there was certainly no outspoken opposition to the action of the state in the Secession Convention. The Walhalla Germans were first among the defenders of the honor of their state. And even Ben Perry of Greenville threw his lot with his state.

E. P. McCravy

Edwin Parker McCravy, who died at the age of 68, was one of Pickena County's most widely known citizens.

He was born in Abbeville on October 6, 1873, one of 14 childred of James McCravy and Kitty Stark McCravy. In 1878 the family moved to Laurens County and later to Easley.

He served for eight years on the constabulary force of Governor Ben Tillman, went into business in Easley in 1906 and was elected mayor in 1907. During his term street paving, sewerage and other improvement programs were carried out.

In 1910 Mr. McCravy was elected to the state legislature form Pickens County and in 1912 he was re-elected, serving in his last term as chairman of the ways and means committee.

During the World Was he was chairman of the Pickens County draft board.

He was elected state senator from Pickens in 1921. For many years he was the chairman of the Pickens County Demogratic executive committee.

He was a director of Glenwood Cotton Mills, a director of the Bank of Easley, owned and operated the Easley Insurance Agency from 1906, and was president of McCravy and Freeman, dealing in fertilizer, cotton, ginning and related fields, organized and was for a time president of the Home Building and Loan association

and was one of the section's largest farmers.

Mr. McCravy was a Mason, Pythian and Woodman of the World. He was a member of the First Baptist Church. Last year he published a book entitled "Memories," available at the Pickens County Library. In 1907 he married Miss Elizabeth Robinson and had two children, Representative John Robinson McCravy and Mrs. Kitty Stark McCravy Willson of Easley

In 1931 he married Mrs. Margie Duckworth McMahan. (The Easley Progress, Jan., 29, 1942)





Columbia Chapter, SCGS announces publication of Founding Families of the State of South Carolina.

In 1997, the Columbia Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society sponsored a new heritage program titled *Founding Families of the State of South Carolina* in celebration of South Carolina's two hundred and tenth birthday. Membership in *Founding Families* was open to all persons who could prove direct descent from an ancestor who settled in South Carolina prior to May 23, 1788, the date South Carolina became a state. To qualify for membership, each applicant proved descent from the ancestor (male or female) by an acceptable record or records for each generation, including proof for the applicant. Acceptable proofs for this project included birth, death, marriage, bible, church and census records. Also, cemetery, probate, military records, and information from published family histories were accepted as proof documentation. Copies of these records are on file in the Columbia Chapter Archives. The information provided by applicants serves as a valuable resource for other researchers and genealogists and is a valuable addition to the history of South Carolina.

This book is in two sections. Section I contains the listing of ancestors, connecting family surnames and *Founding Families* member(s) who descend from that ancestor. An every surname index is included for this section. Section II contains a copy of the original descent charts submitted for membership in *Founding Families*. Each descent chart contains the names of the ancestor, *Founding Families* applicant and connecting families. Listed on the bottom portion of the chart are the documents used to prove each generation of descent. Not all descent charts are included. In the case of more than one application submitted for an ancestor, the descent charts are printed for the initial applicant and any other applicant whose line of descent changed by more than two generations.

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



The Rev. Basil Smith

The Rev. Basil Smith was born 1 May 1772 in Georgia, and his wife, Amelia (Milly) was born 12 June 1773 in Virginia. Their dates of birth were recorded in a bible that was originally owned by Basil and passed to his son Joseph. Several people copied the data from this bible, which included a listing of Basil's children along with their dates of birth. Also copied from this bible were the names of others, who are suspected to be the brothers and sisters of Basil. However, different individuals came up with different names from the bible for Basil's brothers and sisters. This could be the result of poor handwriting used in recording the data, the age and condition of the bible when the data was copied, errors on the part of those who copied the data, or a combbination of the above. It is speculated that Basil and Milly were married in 1794 since their first child, Mary, was born 22 Feb. 1795.

In a book written by Grace Smith Pettijohn in 1912, entitled "Smith-Pickens," it is stated that Basil's parents were Job Smith and Susannah Clayton. According to the noted genealogist, Leonardo Andrea, this book which primarily covers the Pickens family, has some information about Basil's brothers and sisters. The book states that Job Smith was of Scottish descent and that he came to the 3&20Creek area in Pendleton S. C. from Virginia. The Smith line is carried forward only through John, a son of Job. She list children of Job that she got from one of the eldest members of the family:

In a letter dated Feb. 24,1962 from David Smith of Spartanburg, S. C. to Patrick C. Smith, David reflects on an earlier visit and

conversation. He lists the following as th data from the bible:

Later in the letter he says he thinks there was one more entry after Thomas Smith that wasn't legible.

It is hard to know for sure exactly what names were recorded in the bible. If there were two Dorcas Smiths listed, one could have died young and a later daughter given the same name or the second entry could be a correction of the earlier entry. Also one of Basil's brothers could have married a Dorcas. The listing for Thomas Hallum could be Thomas Hallum Smith or one of Basil's sisters could have married a Thomas Hallum. There seemed to have been some Smith-Hallum marriages in the late 1700's. In fact a Joseph Smith, who was enumerated next to Basil in the 1800 census was reputed to have married Elizabeth Hallum. This same Joseph, who died around 1814, had a son Job, who was executator of his estate, and some believe Joseph was Basil's father.

Based on a careful review of all of the above, it is my belief that the following were Basil's children:

As stated earlier, Basil and Milly were enumerated 717 in the 1800 census next to Joseph Smith (over 45 and with one slave) 716. George Mc Gee was 718. Others close by were Matthew Mullinax 712, Moses Cannimore 714, Christopher Kirksey 723, Henry Garner 730, John Garner 729, John Mullinax 746, Enoc Smith 758, Job Smith 793, and William Hallum 803. Most of these individuals probably lived in the viginity of Golden Creek and 12 Mile Creek. An interesting side note is that a Phillip Porter was listed next to 2 Joseph Smith with one slave in the 1790 census. Phillip Porter is reputed to have married Mary (Mollie) Smith, a sister of Basil.

The f ϕ rst recorded purchase of land by Basil Smith was on Nov. 30, 1809, when he bought land (I believe to be 170 acres) from John Garner on Tarrancy Branch. The deed was witnessed by Hiram and Nancy Cochran. Basil and family must have lived in the vicinity of Golden

Creek and 12 Mile Creek, northeast of Liberty S. C. until sometime in 1831. Basil sold 170 acres for \$800, the same price he paid for it, to Nancy Pullum/Pullam on Tarranty Branch and James Borings Branch. Milly, wife of Basil signed her release with John Garner and Darcey Barton being witnesses. The deed was dated 9 March 1831. An interesting note is that on December 5, 1831, a Job Smith of Fayat Georgia, sold 100 acres on a branch below the old meeting house to Nancy Pullam. The deed was witnessed by Basil Smith and Jacob Guston. I speculate that this Job Smith was Basil's brother. Also it is probably just a coincidence that there were Nancy's involved when Basil bought his land and when Job sold his. It could have been a relative who remarried.

On Dec.15, 1831 Basil bought 282 acres on the Saluda River from William Slaton for \$1000. The deed was witnessed by Caleb Cartee and Aaron Welborn and released by Sary Slaton. Of interest is that Basil's son Phillip married a daughter of William Slaton. I never found where Basil sold this tract of land. It may have been given to some of his children. The location of this land isn't clear, but probably was in the Brushy Creek area or near Honea Path.

Basil purchased 480 acres for \$400 from Younger Wilburn on Oct. 20, 1832. This land was part of a 1000 acre grant to Micajah Clark in 1792 on the Pickensville Rd. on a branch of Hurricane Creek and another branch of Hurricane Creek and Big Creek. This deed was witnessed by Micijah B. Williams and John Harper. This parcel of land or a part of it (no acrage specified) was sold to William Harper on Sept. 2, 1837 for \$350 by Basil with a release by Amelia, wife of Basil. Witnesses were Spencer Cartee and William Elliott.

Then on Jan. 9, 1852 Basil bought 151 acres on 18 Mile Creek for \$1200 from Abner Odell and wife Mary S. Odell, with Robert C. Scott and A. M. Hamilton as witnesses. It is worth noting that Abner Odell and wife Mary were involved in the settlement of the estate of a Susannah Smith around 1855. Basil sold this parcel with the same witnesses to his son Joseph on March 18, 1852 for \$1200, paid or secured. There was no dower release, which probably means that Milly had already died. This deal was probably for Joseph and Anney to look after Basil in his last few years and not actually pay for the land. Joseph later sold this same tract to his son W. E. Smith in the late 1800's with the provisions that W. E. care for Joseph and Anney.

No estate settlement has been found for Basil, which means he probably disposed of his assets prior to his death.

Basil was a local Methodist Minister as indicated in the Smith-Pickens book. There are also a number of marriage extracts found in the Greenville Monitor and the Pendleton Messenger that lists Basil as the minister. The following was copied from the book "Early Methodism in the Carolinas" by Rev. A. M. Chreitzberg in 1897:

But to take up the old Keowee records. The Quarterly Conference for 1833, sixty-three years ago, had Malcolm McPherson for presiding elder, and John W. Mc Call as preacher in charge. Local preachers: Levi Garrison, Robert Gaines, R. Shockley, William G. Mullinax, Phillip Elrod, Willis Dickerson. Exhorters: William Rhodes, Samuel Hamby, James Shockley, Basil Smith. Class Leaders: Lawsom Mullinax, John Golden, Thomas Gassaway, Anderson Smith, Thomas Evitt, William Fleming, Robert Pickens, Joel Ledbetter, John Ledbetter, Wesley Earp, John Morris, Hugh H. Whittecur, Sidney Smith, Allen Harbin, John Adams,

James Holland, Thomas Carpenter, Dugal Me Kellar, James B. Clark, Washington Clark: and Garrison Linn, steward.

Of interest is that Phillip Elrod was a neighbor of Basil in both the 1840 and 1850 censuses. Of personal interest to me is the William G. Mullinax, who was my g-g-g-grandfather on my mother's side.

GEORG According to the 1850 census, Basil was 78 years old, born in , and owned \$1300 worth of personal property and real estate, of which part of this was four slaves. He was enumerated as head of household 634 in the Eastern Division of Anderson County, S. C. The following census data with ages was taken from the 1850 census and represents people who lived close to Basil: Phillip Elrod, age 63 and born in N. C. was #631. Other than him being a Methodis Minister with Basil, the only other reason to mention him is that a number of Elrods lived near this set of Smiths, and Milly may have # ## Elrod (no real reason to assume this.) Next to Basil, at #635 was Richard Fleming, 38 and Nancy, 40 , was 636. The reason for listing the Flemings as neighbors is that a James Fleming, 78, was in the home of William F. Cartee, 31, enumerated 979, and Fleming was William F. Cartee's father-in-law. Basil's daughter, Milly, married Spencer Cartee, whom I sure was a brother to William F. Cartee, and both sons of Reubin Cartee, 59, #741, born in Virginia. After Nancy Flemming was William Hallum, 62, NC, #637; Then #638 was William Wilborn, 53, SC (note land transactions.) George Elrod,58 NC, was #640 and Strother Kay, 49 was 644. Strother Kay lived near Neals Creek Church. I will list some other heads of households, that I found interesting in the general area. Some may be connected with Basil and others probably aren't.
