

# FROM CIVIL WAR BATTLEFIELDS TO BAPTIST PULPITS: NOTES ON THE LIFE OF REV. TERRY F. NELSON

Terry Freelin Nelson was born September 4, 1839. He was a son of Freelin Nelson (10 May 1802-1 Aug 1892), who was killed when struck by lightening at the age of ninety and was buried at Secona Baptist Church in Pickens, South Carolina.

This Confederate soldier enlisted as a private in Co. "F" (Bozeman Guards), Hampton Legion, C. S. A. He was enrolled as a member of that regiment June 12, 1861, at Columbia, S. C. (The regiment was also known as Hampton Legion Cavalry and Mounted Infantry.) The Confederate military unit was organized, equipped and commanded by Colonel Wade Hampton, III (1818-1902), a prominent planter and statesman. Col. Hampton was a member of a very wealthy and influential family at Columbia, S. C. During the U. S. Civil War, he rose in rank to major general and eventually commanded the entire Confederate cavalry corps. (Although Hampton owned many slaves, he did not favor the secession movement in South Carolinayet gave himself and his resources to the Confederate States of America when it was established.)

Private Terry F. Nelson, the subject of this biographical sketch, took part in the First Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas) in Virginia on July 21, 1861. The battle was a concisive Confederate victory. Then, in the following August, Nelson was transferred to Company "E" of his regiment in exchange for another soldier, R. B. McDougle. In November and December 1861, he was sick and absent from duty at Chancellorsville, Virginia. Nelson was granted a furlough during May and June 1863 in order to take care of personal matters in South Carolina. Then, on October 7, 1864, his left middle finger was shot off by a Union minie ball during an engagement on Darbytown Road in Virginia. He was admitted to Jackson Hospital in Richmond and was a patient there until October 26, 1864. Then, he was granted a thirtyday medical furlough. This soldier's name was subsequently listed on the muster roll of Company "E" for the months of November and December 1864, but Nelson was deemed to be unfit for duty because of the injury to his hand. Despite sickness and injury, Nelson survived the U.S. Civil War, after which he returned to Pickens District, S. C.

Terry F. Nelson was married twice. He first married Susan Louise Lenderman (25 Sep 1841-27 Dec 1893). She was a daughter of Jacob Lenderman who resided in the Fork Shoals community of Greenville County, S. C. After his marriage, Nelson joined a business operated by his father-in-law, who manufactured horse-drawn buggies and horse harnesses. But the Confederate veteran soon decided that he should become a minister of the gospel. He moved his wife and two young children to Tennessee and enrolled there

in a Baptist seminary.

Nelson graduated from that institution in 1872 and then returned to South Carolina, where he and his family resided for several years in the northern part of Pickens County. In 1880, he was pastor of Enoree Baptist Church, located near Travelor's Rest, S. C. In 1888 and 1889, he served as the minister at Mountain Grove Baptist Church in Pickens County. In September 1892, the Rev. Nelson was living in Liberty township of Pickens County, S. C. One year later, he moved his family to Piedmont, spread out on both sides of the Saluda River, the dividing line between Greenville and Anderson counties of South Carolina. This pastor's first wife, Susan, died at Piedmont in 1893. She was buried there in Rose Hill Cemetery (in Greenville County).

The Rev. Nelson and Susan Nelson had the following offspring: Louella Nelson; Robert Washington Nelson (25 Sep 1866-4 Jun 1947), who married Susan Burris; Sally B. Nelson (14 Sep 1872-3 Jun 1905), who married Percy M. Robinson in October 1894; Gussie Nelson, who married William Norris in November 1894; Nancy Nelson; Gracy Ola Nelson; and Nettie Francis Nelson (5 Sep 1875-6 Nov 1964), who married Elbert Robert Waldrop (7 Mar 1872-2 Aug 1955).

In 1893, the Rev. Nelson moved to Pelzer, S. C., and during September 1894, he married his second wife, the widow Frances Consadia (Perry) Rampey (b. ca 1855-d. 13 Aug 1917). She was a daughter of William Hayne Perry (1833-1906) and Sarah Ann (Mann) Perry. She had four teenage sons and a daughter from her first marriage. In July 1895, this Confederate veteran's wife gave birth to triplets. They were named Estella, Lizzie Bell, and Mathais W. Nelson. Lizzie Bell, the only one of the triplets who reached adulthood, married a Kay.

In 1891, the Rev. Nelson represented the Twelve Mile Baptist Association on a mission trip through Oconee County and part of the adjacent mountainous section of western North Carolina. Then, in September 1892, he baptized eight converts in the Twelve Mile River and preached at Golden Creek Baptist Church near Liberty and Norris, S. C. Moreover, seven converts to Christianity were baptized at Concord Baptist Church by this minister in September 1899.

From 1895 until 1900, the Rev. Nelson worked for the Baptist Home Mission Board. He became known as a God-fearing "fire and brimstone" evangelical who delivered emotional, stirring sermons at backwoods Baptist churches. He participated in the missionary movement of the South Carolina Home Mission Board between 1900 and 1918.

The Rev. Nelson's name was listed on the 1899,

1901 and 1911 Civil War pension rolls for Pickens County, S. C. He resided in Easley township of Pickens County, S. C., in 1901. His brother, Robert M. Nelson (28 Aug 1836-1 Apr 1910), also served in Co. "E" of Hampton Legion during the Civil War. The brother was a resident of the Grove Station community, situated near Piedmont in Greenville County. He was buried there at Grove Station Baptist Church. The Rev. Terry F. Nelson served in the S. C. House of Representatives from Anderson County in 1913-1914.

Frances C. "Fannie" Nelson, second wife of the Rev. Nelson, died August 13, 1917. She was sixtytwo years of age, and her body was buried at Secona Baptist Church at Pickens, S. C. On March 14, 1918 (seven months after Fannie's death), the Rev. Nelson passed away at the age of seventy-eight, and his body was interred at Secona, along-side his second wife's grave.

A tribute to the Rev. Nelson was published in the March 28, 1918, issue of *The Pickens Sentinel*. It was written by the Rev. B. F. Murphree (1869-1920), who served as a Baptist preacher for thirty years during which years he baptized 3,000 people. He wrote the following comments about the subject of this sketch:

"Sacred to the memory of Reverend T. F. Nelson: The death of this good man removes the last landmark preacher of the old school type from the Twelve Mile River Association. It is said that death loves a shining mark, so as we were paying the last tribute of love and respect to Brother Nelson, we could only think of his associates and yoke fellows in the ministry who had gone on before. They were Holder, Lewis, Grogan, Hudson, Littleton, Colley, Hunnicutt, and Morton. These bretheren with others, felled the forest and laid the foundation of the Baptist churches among the mountains of Pickens and Oconee and Western North Carolina. For the past fifty years these good men have been going up and down the country preaching the pure gospel in this section. With the death of Brother Nelson, they are all gone, but the world is better because they lived here. He spent the greater part of his life in Pickens County, but later moved to Anderson County where he was elected to the [state] legislature."




- Nathaniel H. Newton was born about 1829. He served in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment) and was accidentally killed on a train during the Civil War. He was a brother of John Thomas Newton and Joel B. Newton, both of whom also served in the C. S. A.
- Alexander Nichols was a member of Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry and was killed in 1864 at South Anna, Virginia. He was a son of James Nichols (b. ca 1799) and Martha Nichols (b. ca 1812). He was a brother of James Nichols, Jr., and John Nichols, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. (see below).
- James Nichols, Jr. (1840-1921) served in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He was wounded at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, and lost the use of his right arm. Then, he was discharged from the army. In 1880, he received a voucher for the purchase of an artificial arm. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C. He resided in the Tamassee section of Oconee County in 1901 and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. His wife was Mary J. Nichols (30 Oct 1850-31 Jan 1921). This Confederate veteran died June 10, 1919, and was buried at Cheohee Baptist Church in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- John Nichols was born about 1838 and was a son of James and Martha Nichols of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. Before the Civil War J. H. Beck of the western division of Pickens District, S. C., claimed that James Nichols and his son, John Nichols, marked his hogs with their mark without his consent. Subsequently, John Nichols made oath that his three sons were volunteers in the Confederate military service and were stationed at Lightwood Kot Springs. He also stated that the sons material witnesses in his defense. (Source: Clerk of Court's office, Pickens District, S. C., No. 7, Pack 165 - Unlawfully Marking Hog)
- Nichols (given name unknown). In 1899, Nancy Nichols, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, S. C.
- Elijah A. Nicholson was wounded at Fredericksburg, Virginia, while serving in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He participated in the Battle of Gaines' Mill in Virginia on June 27, 1862, according to the Ci-

- vil War diary of John L. Brackenridge, another soldier from Pickens District, S. C.
- Priestly Nicholson (1835-d. ca 1905) served in Co. B, 3rd Confederate Cavalry. He was captured by Union troops during the Civil War. He survived the war and became a Methodist minister.
- Silas Nicholson was a private in Co. C, 43rd Georgia Infantry, C. S. A. He was captured by Union troops during the Civil War, but was exchanged at Cumberland Gap on September 17, 1862.
- Silas Kirksey Nicholson was said to have died during the Civil War. (Question: Is this soldier the same man as listed above?)
- Nicholson (first name unknown). In 1902, Jane A. Nicholson, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- David Nimmons was born about 1826, a son of Nelly Nimmons (b. ca 1803). He served in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. His wife was Narcissa "Sis" Nimmons (b. 1837-d. 11 Apr 1909), and the couple had the following children: Franklin O. Nimmons (b. 1854), Charles W. Nimmons (b. 1856), Mary E. Nimmons (b. 1858), Ellen M. Nimmons (b. 1860), Allison Nimmons (b. 1862), Sallie Nimmons, Martha Nimmons (b. 1864), Susan Nimmons, Henry Nimmons (b. 1868), Fanny Nimmons (b. 1875) and Weyman Nimmons (b. 1880). In 1901, he resided in the Oakway community of Oconee County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. His age was listed in pension records then as 76 years. This Confederate veteran's name was also included on the 1902 pension roll for Oconee County, S. C. He was a brother of William Joseph Nimmons, who also served in the C. S. A.
- William M. Nimmons served in Co. B, 10th Battallion South Carolina Cavalry. (Question: Is this soldier the William Nimmons who died July 27, 1895, husband of Hester Nimmons who died August 16, 1894, both of whom were buried in the Ellenburg, Nimmons, Alexander, Barton burying ground, situated in the Eastatoee community of northern Pickens County?)
- **David M. Nix** was a resident of Hurricane township in eastern Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry.

- E. J. Nix served in Co. B, 3rd South Carolina Reserves. In 1901 and 1902, his name appeared on the Civil War pension roll of Oconee County, S. C. This soldier is believed to have also served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- **Edward J. Nix** received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County, S. C. He served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- Elisha M. Nix died at Charleston, S. C., on December 13, 1863 and was buried there in Magnolia Cemetery. He served in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry and had lived in Hurricane township of Pickens District, South Carolina.
- James Nix was a soldier in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). No additional information available.
- Thomas J. Nix died of typhoid fever in 1862 while serving in the C. S. A. He was a member of Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His death took place at Laurel Hill (VA?). This soldier's wife was Elizabeth (Gassaway) Nix, daughter of W. W. Gassaway. In 1888, Elizabeth Nix, widow, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension.
- William D. Nix (1843-1917) was wounded during the Civil War while serving in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). His wife was Mary Ann Nix (27 Jun 1851-5 May 1919). This soldier was born May 8, 1843, and died December 18, 1917. He was buried at Mount Bethel Methodist Church in northern Pickens County, S. C. Some additional facts: He was a member of a home guard company organized at Anderson's Mill in Pickens District, S. C., on June 23, 1861. He was a son of John Nix (b. ca 1819) and Alcy Nix (b. ca 1822). In 1901, he resided in Hazel township of eastern Pickens District, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension.
- Nix (first name unknown). In 1902, Mary C. Nix was a recipient of a Civil War pension. She resided at that time in the Fair Play section of Oconee County, S. C. Her deceased husband had served in Co. B, 3rd South Carolina Reserves during the Civil War.
- James P. Nixon was born in 1844 and served in Companies D and F of the 6th South Carolina Cavalry. He enlisted at Abbeville Court House, S. C., on June 20, 1862, and on May 1, 1864, he

- was transferred to a unit of the Cadet Rangers. He was wounded in action at the Battle of Trevilian Station in Virginia on June 12, 1864. Nixon survived the Civil War, after which he became a store clerk and farmer.
- Jessie P. Norris (1842-1862) died of disease while fighting in the Civil War. Norris' death occurred at Pocotaligo, S. C., while he was serving in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. At the time of his death, this Confederate soldier was unmarried. He was born on June 2, 1842, in Pickens District, S. C., and died May 6, 1862. His parents were Robert Norris and Elizabeth (Pilgrim) Norris (27 Mar 1802-14 Dec 1875).
- L. W. Norris served as a private in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves from June 1862 until January 1863.
- Robert E. Norris (1831-1918) was born April 12, 1831. He served to the rank of corporal in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His wife was Eugenia Norris who died June 25, 1882, at the age of 43 years and 6 months. She was survived by her husband and seven children. This soldier was wounded at Chancellors-ville, Virginia. He survived the Civil War and died January 6, 1918. His grave is situated in the cemetery at Westminster First Baptist Church in Westminster, South Carolina. Note: In 1915, this Confederate soldier's name was not included on the pension roll of January 1st.
- Thomas R. Norris enlisted in July 1861 and served in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). As a result of a combat wound, he lost a limb during the Civil War. In 1880, he received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, this Confederate veteran was a resident of the Tugaloo River valley in Oconee County, South Carolina.

These inquests were typed under the Roosevelt Administration in the 1930s. There were retyped by G. Anne Sheriff from a copy found in the collection of Pauline Young in the basement of a store in Liberty.

### Pack 138. Inquest No. 3

Pickens District, South Carolina

An inquest was held May 5, 1844 at the house of Matthew Youngblood over the dead body of Jane Youngblood. Rebecca Durham sworn says that she head Matthew Youngblood say that he would kill his wife if he did not do it in one way he would in another. That Jane Youngblood said that her husband treated badly when in liquor. Sarah Chambers saith that she told her 3 times that her husband was good to her when sober but abused her when drunk and she was afraid of her life. She says that she had helped to lay out 10 to 12 bodies before but never saw one look like this one, but thought maybe it was the anguish of the pain that caused the blood to settle over her body as it has. . . Rachel Sargeant states that she told her that Youngblood layed a stick on her head 8 or 10 times and swore he would knock the light out of her and then he struck her on the side and she would have fell if she had not caught hold of the door. This happened 7 weeks before her death and that she did not feel right in that hip for 10 days. When she dressed her, she thought she saw a scar that was often right in the morning, she found she was mistaken . . . Rebecca Durham Senr. says that she heard Youngblood say he had 2 or 3 little pipes? At one time he gave her a lick with a sprout the 2<sup>nd</sup> time he struck her with his hand the 3d time she says she waked in the night and his wife asked him if he recollected what he had been doing the fore part of the night, he said no, he did not what he had been doing, she replied that he had struck her and punched her in the side. . . Emily Durham says that the decd. said to her that Youngblood had struck her and punched her in the side and that it seemed like something broke loose in that side and that she had never been well since and that she felt like she never would get over it and that he said as he did not kill her that time, take care of the next time . . . Nicy Donald said that she told her, that the day after the lick was given, that he had given her a very hard lick on her right side and would have fallen if she had not caught at the door, that she attended to her business the same since as before. Never heard her speak of the lick affecting her but once . . . Sally Gilstrap said that she and the deceased were very friendly. Told over their afflictions to each other, never heard her say that he abused her much. The jury brought it out that she came to her death by wounds inflicted on her by her husband Matthew Youngblood . . .



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# Easley Messenger 19 Feb 1884

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The **Pumpkintown** road is also blocked by trees, but hands have been already ordered out and the fallen timber will soon disappear.

At **Looper's** at 5:30 p. m., the tornado struck, and traveled from Northwest to Southeast, taking everything in its track, about one-fourth of a mile wide, destroying houses, barns, cribs, and fences. No lives as yet reported lost.

From the Anderson Intelligencer but printed in the Easley Messenger.

About half past five o'clock on Tuesday evening, the attention of our citizens was called to the fact that a shower of rain was approaching by several vivid flashes of lightning, and sharp peals of thunder. At the first approach of the cloud a slight shower of rain, in large drops, mixed with hail fell, accompanied by a severe blow, which, however, did not harm. Back of this cloud, which was black and threatening, a clear streak of golden light appeared, and persons thought a clear sunset would follow.

In a few moments, however, another cloud followed and rapidly assumed a more angry and threatening appearance—the great currents of wind and rain flying in every direction, with black clouds above crossing white strata, which seemed to be boiling up beneath.

Two or three clear reverberating claps of thunder in quick succession seemed to form the storm center a little southwest of the city of Anderson, and all the seething mass of clouds rushed to join the devastating force, and forming a huge black mass dipping down nearly to the earth, in a funnel shape, shot off in an easterly direction, revolving and roaring in a fearful manner. It came with perfect torrents of rain, and leveled trees, fences and houses in its track. Soon after it started the cloud burst and formed into two or more funnels, each of which carried devastation and ruin before it. The tornadoes proper, passed about one and a half miles North and four miles south of Anderson and proceeded East and Northeast

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A large tree fell across Miss Wilcox's house. The furniture was broken and scattered in every direction. Mrs. Chatfield, Miss Wilcox's sister, was the only person in the house at the time. She heard the storm approaching and got up to close the door, when in an instant the crash came. It seems impossible for her to have escaped a horrible death. However, she came off with only a slight bruise.

Mr. Fant's house was left in about the same condition as Mr. Todd's. His household goods are also badly damaged and broken. His family were all in the house, but none of them injured. Mr. Fant's stables were uplifted and torn asunder, but he escaped without a scratch.

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
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# Confederate Veteran Was Early Mayor of Salem, South Carolina by Charles H. Busha


Thomas M. Littleton of the western division of Pickens District, South Carolina (now Oconee County), was born December 25, 1840. He was a son of Asa Littleton (b. 1810) and Nancy (Nix) Littleton and a grandson of Savage and Anne (Edwards) Littleton. He enlisted in Company "G", 12th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers early on during the U. S. Civil War and served to the rank of third corporal.

The company in which this soldier served was commanded by Captain Archibald D. Gaillard, a native of Pendleton, S. C., who served as an early elder of Bethel Presbyterian Church near Tamassee in present-day Oconee County. The captain survived the U. S. Civil War and died in October 1897. Another captain who fought during the war as a member of Company "G" was John M. Moody. Two first lieutenants in the same company were James Alexander Ballenger (1820-1893), son of John Lewis Ballenger and Mahalia (Foster) Ballenger; and Wesley Bowie White (1829-1898), son of William H. White (b. ca 1795) and Nancy (Bowie) White (b. ca 1803).

The following two second lieutenants were also members of Company "G": L. Armistead Garvin (1836-1864), who was killed in action May 5, 1864, during the Wilderness campaign in Virginia and was a son of Thomas D. Garvin (b. 1810) and Mary (Rankin) Garvin (b. 1811); and Nathan Boone Lusk, Jr. (b. 16 Apr 1833), a son of Nathan Boone Lusk, Sr. (1793-1872) and Rosannah (Capabart) Luck (1800-1803)

(Capehart) Lusk (1800-1892).

The 12th South Carolina Infantry was organized September 1, 1861, to serve for the duration of the U. S. Civil War. The regiment took a very active part in the North-South armed conflict—until the surrender of General Lee's army at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9, 1865. Initially, this unit of troops was assigned to Gregg's Brigade, Hill's Division, Army of Northern Virginia (that is, during May and June 1862). Among the numerous engagements and battles

which the 12th S. C. Infantry fought were Port Royal (7 Nov 1861) in South Carolina; Seven Days Battles in Virginia (June 25-July 1, 1862); Second Manassas (28-30 Aug 1862); Antietam in Maryland (17 Sep 1862); Fredericksburg (13 Dec 1862); Chancellorsville (1-4 May 1863); The Wilderness (5-6 May 1864); and the Petersburg Siege (Jun

1864-Apr 1865).

Corporal Thomas M. Littleton lost the use of a limb during the war, and in 1880 he received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C. He married

Flora Marah "Fannie" Shedd (14 Nov 1849-12 Nov 1903), and the couple had the following twelve offspring: Annah Littleton (2 Feb 1866-14 Aug 1954), who married Judson Joshua Wilson (2 Apr 1852-19 Jul 1897); Samuel M. Littleton (1869-1950), whose wife was Eliza A. Littleton (1869-1939); William L. Littleton (18 Oct 1873-30 Dec 1949), whose wife was Belle F. Littleton (13 Dec 1871-30 Jul 1964); Alice Littleton, who married a Davis (Question: Was this child Alice E. Davis, 1873-1851, wife of Clifton E. Davis?); Ida Littleton Holden (18 Aug 1875-7 Jul 1958), who married the second time to Joseph H. Smith (12 Jan 1880-16 Aug 1922 or 1927); Lula Littleton (24 Apr 1877-11 Dec 1964), who married James W. Wilbanks (5 Jan 1873-22 Sep 1936); Emma Littleton (b. 13 Oct 1886), who married Richard K. Clark (17 Sep 1880-7 Dec 1957); Myra Littleton, who married a Holden; Paul Littleton; Harrison Little-Verner Littleton; and Carrie Littleton, ton: who married a Fenley.

This Confederate veteran was part owner and operator of Littleton Brothers' Store, in Salem, S. C. He also served as an early mayor of Salem, a town that was first incorporated in 1907. His name was listed on Oconee County's Civil War pension roll in 1901 and 1902. Littleton's wife, Fannie, died on November 12, 1903, and her body was buried at Fall Creek Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C. On August 15-16, 1921, this Confederate veteran attended the 49th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Walhalla, S. C., even though he and other veterans who were there did not serve in that regiment. Littleton was a resident of Salem, S. C., in 1921; he died about five years later (on December 28, 1926). His body was interred alongside his wife's grave at Fall Creek Baptist Church in Oconee County. Thomas M. Littleton was a younger brother of the Rev. Daniel Littleton (18 Aug 1837-17 May 1911), who also served in the C. S. A.

Tyre L. Norris (1840-1918) served during the last two years of the Civil War. He was a member of Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. He was born January 17, 1840, a son of Thomas and Elizabeth (Mann) Norris. He was reared in Anderson County, S. C. He married Frances Kelley, and the couple had six children. In June 1917, he applied for a Confederate Cross of Valor. At that time, he resided in Liberty, S. C. He was a member of Liberty First Baptist Church. He died February 13, 1918, at the age of seventy-two years in Liberty (Pickens County), S. C. Norris' funeral was conducted by the Rev. John C. Bailey, and his body was buried in an unmarked grave at Smith Grove Baptist Church, situated between Liberty and Easley, South Carolina.

The second of the second of

**Richardson Norton** lost his life at Fredericksburg, Virginia, while serving in Co. B, 25th North Carolina Infantry.

Virgil Norton was a son of Elias and Mary "Polly" (Holden) Norton, and he lost his life while serving in Co. D, 62nd North Carolina Infantry during the U. S. Civil War.

Wyatt Norwood died at the age of thirty-two on February 15, 1862, while serving in Co. K, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His wife was Mary Jane Davis (b. 1843); they were married July 22, 1858. This soldier's wife was a sister of Wiley S. Davis (1843-1919), who also served in the C. S. A. Norwood's wife was a daughter of Joseph Henson Davis, who also fought in the Civil War, and Elizabeth J. "Betsy" (Cummings) Davis. The widow of Wyatt Norwood married Lum Patterson (d. May 11, 1904).

**Fielding Oakley** enlisted as a private at the age of 22 years in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He died of disease at Petersburg, Virginia, during the Civil War. He was buried at Blandford Church at Petersburg. His home was in the western division of Pickens District, S. C., (now Oconee County).

Leroy Oakley served in Co. I, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was born about 1837. In 1901, his name appeared on the Civil War pension roll, and he resided in Walhalla (Oconee County), S. C. His age at that time was recorded as sixty-four years in pension records.

John Mason Oates was born about 1846 and was the only child of Rufus Oates, who was born in 1812 in North Carolina, and his first wife Catherine (Cargil) Oates. This Confederate soldier died of typhoid fever at Charleston, S. C., during the Civil War. His father owned 1,200 acres of land situated at present-day Easley, S. C. The land was between Highway 8 and Brushy Creek Road, and the Oates family home was located on the present-day site of Geer Memorial Baptist Church in Easley (Pickens County), S. C.

Caleb C. O'Bryant was killed during the Civil War. He was a son of John O'Bryant (b. ca 1792-d. 10 Nov 1880) and Elizabeth (Morgan) O'Bryant (b. ca 1795). He was a grandson of Benjamin F. Morgan (b. 1762-d. 6 Sep 1835). O'Bryant served in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry,

and his brother, John H. O'Bryant, also served in the C. S. A. (see below).

- John H. O'Bryant served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. He was a brother of Caleb C. O'Bryant (see above) and his maternal grandparents were Benjamin F. Morgan and Frances (Perry) Morgan (b. ca 1773-d. 30 Jun 1845). This Confederate soldier died before 1880, and his brother, James C. O'Bryant, purchased his 150 acres of land for \$425.00.
- **Timothy O'Bryant** served as a private in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months from June 1862 until January 1863.
- William H. O'Bryant (1840-1912) served in Co. F, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). As a result of a battle wound, he lost a limb, and in 1880 he received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, he was a resident of Oconee County, S. C. He filed for a Civil War pension in Franklin County, Georgia. William H. O'Bryant's wife was Sue O'Bryant (30 Oct 1857-6 Feb 1911). She and her husband were buried in Franklin County, Georgia. (Note: A Confederate veteran named William O'Bryant served in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Artillery. Same man?)
- Alvin O'Dell (1830-1876) was a son of William O'Dell (1798-1883) and Martha (Mullinax) O'Dell (1799-1892). He was a soldier in Co. H, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). This Confederate veteran's wife was Mary A. O'Dell (3 May 1832-19 Sep 1899). Alvin O'Dell had three brothers who also served in the C. S. A., and they were Perin O'Dell, James A. O'Dell and Frederick Garvin O'Dell. He died in 1876 and was buried in the Kennemore, Mauldin and O'Dell cemetery, situated between Liberty and Easley in Pickens County, South Carolina.
- Frederick Garvin O'Dell served in Co. E, South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He was a brother of Alvin O'Dell (see above).
- James A. O'Dell was born about 1826. He served as a private in Co. H, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He became ill during the Civil War and died on April 27, 1863, at Petersburg, Virginia, and was buried there at Blandford Church. This soldier was a son of William O'Dell (1798-1883) and Martha (Mullinax) O'Dell (1799-1892). He was a brother of Alvin O'Dell, Perin O'Dell and Frederick O'Dell, all of whom also served in the Confederate Army.

- Perin O'Dell (1832-1907) was born May 8, 1832. He served in Co. I, Hampton Legion. His first wife was Elizabeth (Mauldin) O'Dell (1831-1868), daughter of Allen and Obedience Mauldin. His second wife was Laura (Folger) O'Dell (3 May 1839-12 Jan 1923). This Confederate veteran died November 8, 1907, and was buried in the Easley City Cemetery in Easley (Pickens County), South Carolina. He was a brother of James A. O'Dell, Alvin O'Dell and Frederick Garvin O'Dell, all of whom also served in the C. S. A. (see above).
- Benjamin Franklin O'Kelley (1823-1915) was a son of Solomon O'Kelley (9 Sep 1785-5 Jun 1856) and Nancy (Harrison) O'Kelley (6 Dec 1791-18 Aug 1871). He married Ara Lucinda Knox (b. Nov 1825-d. 17 Mar 1915). This Confederate veteran and his wife had the follow-John O'Kelley (b. ca ing three offspring: 1847), Miles F. O'Kelley (b. ca 1858) and William Harrison O'Kelley (b. ca 1852). Benjamin Franklin O'Kelley served in Co. E, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. In 1901, he resided in Westminster township of Oconee County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. At that time, his age was listed as seventy-eight years in pension records.
- John T. O'Kelley (1847-1920) resided in the West Union area of what today is Oconee County, S. C. His wife was Josephine D. O'Kelley (1867-1948). This Confederate veteran died in 1920, and his body was interred at Wolf Stake Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C. O'Kelley's widow received an annual pension of \$160.00 in 1930.
- John O'Leary was a resident of the Tamassee section of norhtern Oconee County, S. C., after the war. He served in Co. C, Blanchett's (?), C. S. A. and was wounded during the Civil War. In 1899, 1901 and 1902, O'Leary was a recipient of a pension for his military service. This Confederate veteran's wife was Johanna O'Leary, and the couple had a son, John J. O'Leary (1861-1929), who married Julia C. Harkins (1877-1934).
- Joel Thomas O'Neal (or Oneal) was born about 1840, a son of Simon O'Neal (b. ca 1802) and Matilda O'Neal (b. ca 1800). He enlisted in the C. S. A. at Pendleton, S. C., on March 8, 1861, and served in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regiment). He was a resident of what today is Oconee County, South Carolina.

Andrew Jackson Orr was born May 23, 1844, and enlisted in the C. S. A. at Columbia, S. C. on July 20, 1862. He served in Co. I, 2nd South Carolina Infantry. Orr was listed as present on muster rolls of his company up until June 30, 1864. This Confederate veteran once lived in the Tamassee section of northern Oconee County, S. C. In 1901, Esther Orr, his widow, was a recipient of a Civil War pension. At that time, she resided in the Mountain Rest community of Oconee County, S. C. Her age was listed in pension records as eighty years. Before the Civil War, Andrew Jackson Orr was a farmer at Tunnel Hill in Pickens District, S. C. A grave marker for this veteran (without dates) was placed in the cemetery of Cheohee Baptist Church in northern Oconee County, S. C.

Patterson Orr was born about 1822. He resided in what today is Oconee County, S. C., and served in the C. S. A. His wife was Esther Orr (1821-1900), and she was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in 1899 in Oconee County, South Carolina.

Robert S. (or F.) Orr (1847-1939) was born January 22, 1847. He served in Companies E and D, 7th North Carolina Cavalry Battalion during the U. S. Civil War. In 1922 he resided in Pickens township of Pickens County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension for his service in the Civil War. He came to Pickens County from the Ashville area of North Carolina where his wife died. He was the father of at least one child, Emma Orr (31 Jun 1879-21 Oct 1965), who married Julius M. Bolding (9 Jun 1873-27 Mar 1953), son of George Washington Bolding (1844-1887), who also served in the C. S. A. Robert S. (or F.) Orr died June 3, 1939, and was buried at Prater's Creek Baptist Church in Pickens County, South Carolina. Note: There appears to be a possibility that another Robert Orr from Pickens District, S. C., also served in the C. S. A. Can anyone help with this man?


Thomas Caswell Orr (1829-1918) was born December 27, 1829, in South Carolina. During the U. S. Civil War, he served as a second lieutenant in Co. G, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. He enlisted in the C. S. A. in Pendleton, S. C. Orr's wife was Hannah Harrison Golden Orr, and his parents were Thomas Orr (b. 1787-d. 1 Jan 1866) and Sarah (Wilson) Orr (b. 1796). In 1901, this Confederate veteran was a resident of the West Union community of Oconee County, S. C., and he was a recipient of a Civil War pension. His age was listed in pension records as sixty-one years at that time.

Orr (first name unknown). In 1902, Martha M. Orr, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, South Carolina.

Turner Richardson Osborn enlisted in the C. S. A. at Pendleton, S. C., on June 2, 1861, and was mustered into Confederate service as a private on the following June 7th at Columbia, S. C. He served in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regiment) but was discharged on September 8, 1861.

Leander A. Osborne (1847-1918) served in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Infantry (Butler's). He was born May 4, 1847. In 1915, Osborne resided in Oconee County, S. C., but his name was not listed on the Civil War pension roll that year. This veteran's wife was Susannah Osborne (29 Mar 1854-5 Mar 1933). Leander A. Osborne died May 8, 1918, and was buried at Hopewell Baptist Church in Oconee County, South Carolina.

Henry Osgood enlisted as a private in the Fort Hill Guards at Pendleton, S. C., when the company was first organized. That unit became Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. No additional information available.

### 21 Oct 1829

The Militia Reviews commenced in our district last week and ended yesterday. Some of the Regiments, we understand, were complimented by His Excellency the Governor, and probably with justice. We cannot forbear remarking however, that we regard the militia as being rather at a low ebb. Not because we have not the materials for making both soldiers and officers equal to those of any other country; but because military pride has so much subsided, that the officers elected seldom retain their commands more than a few months, and frequently resign them without having ever appeared in Uniform; and because the militia law is seldom enforced against defaulters. There are some companies, which have not a single commissioned officer, and refuse to elect. We do not know certain whether the Legislature of Delaware has not done wisely to abolish the militia system entirely; but we do know that it should either be abolished in every state in the nation or the law rigidly enforced. Soldiers and officers are not to be made by halfway measure, and the time now taken up in posturing we regard as little better than lost. [Author believes this article is written about Pendleton District.]

During the latter years of his life, it is said he renounced his profession, became a member of the church and acknowledged the imposition, which he had long practiced on the miracle-loving community.



### Another Great Great Grandfather

Peyton Thompson Burton, my great great great grandfather, was born 21 February 1807 in Georgia to Blackman Burton and Jane Yancey (Jinsey) Saxon. Peyton was probably married to **Mary (Polly)** Wiles. Polly was born in 1818 in South Carolina, probably to Freeman Wiles, a native of Danville, Virginia.

Peyton and Polly had seven children. I think that all of the children were born in Pendleton District.

- 1) Martha Ann Burton was born in 1833 and was married twice, to Jesse M. Simpson and to John Cunningham.
- 2) Elizabeth J. Burton was bom in 1836.
- 3) Lucinda (Lou) Haseltine Burton was born on 28 April 1840 in the Pendleton District. The story was that Lou, a red-haired beauty, was engaged to another man, but broke it off because he was hiding from the war, known as a slacker. Lou's father had found out while he was hunting. He stopped at the slacker's house and saw him eating breakfast. So later, Lou was married about 1864 to Albert Chesterfield Beaty. [Note: A.C. Beaty, my great great grandfather, was the subject of the presentation that I gave two years ago at the Old Pendleton District Chapter meeting. One year ago at the same meeting, I presented a story about A.C.'s father John Wesley Beaty, another great great great grandfather. ] Lou died 28 June 1910 in Oconee County and was buried in the Bethel Presbyterian Church cemetary in Oconee County.
- 4) Sarah E. Burton was born in 1842 and was married to A. A. Freeman.
- 5) James William Thompson Burton was born in 1844. During the War Between the States a minnie ball hit him in the knee at Gaines Hill. He was noted as a *cripple* in the 1870 census.
- 6) Amanda C. Burton was born about 1847.
- 7) Caroline Medera Burton was born 27 January 1848 and was married twice, to William D. Scott, and on 11 January 1870 to George Middleton McKee. She lived with Mr. McKee in Walhalla. He was the executor for Peyton's will. Caroline died 17 August 1921.

Jesse Wiles, Polly's brother, age 45, was in the household in the 1850 census, and was noted as *insane*. Jesse does not appear in the subsequent census.

Incidentally, Peyton became a private in Capt. Andrew P. Butler's Company G, 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment of the South Carolina Volunteers of the Confederate States of America. On 16 August 1861 he joined at the age of 54! Peyton was wounded by a shot in the chest on 03 October 1862, and remained on the Muster Roll until 31 December 1864.

Peyton was also a big-time foxhunter. The story was told that Polly called for him from her sick bed "Are you going fox hunting? Are you going and let me die?" He called back "I'm going fox hunting!"

Peyton executed his handwritten will by the county clerk on 03 March 1886. He signed the instrument "P T Burton" in a shaky hand. Peyton died 06 March 1886 and is buried in Union Baptist Church cemetery near Iva. Polly died in 1894 and is buried there also.

### mtDNA Searching for **Susanna**

### Background

For many years and by many people the ancestors of Moses Hendricks b ca 1754-1757 d 1837 Pickens District, SC wife <u>Susanna</u> have been written about and researched.

In the beginning many thought Moses Hendricks was from Virginia. Moses was thought to be originally connected to the Virginia Hendrick clan (late 1600s) from old King and Queen Co., VA. This being the Hance Hendrick wife Jane group now known as the Pamunkey (Virginia) Hendrick. There certainly were a number of Moses Hendrick in South side Virginia where the Hance Hendrick clan migrated over time. However as records became more available the chances dimmed. The Moses Hendrick son of James Hendrick d 1760 of the Halifax Co., VA area proved to be from the Pamunkey (Virginia) Hendrick clan, was a RWS and married Nellie Overby in 1796 in Lunenberg Co., VA which was all documented in Virginia records and from Moses Hendrick RW pension application from KY.

Within the past two years Moses Hendricks m Susanna has seen more documentation concerning Y-DNA testing. Two of Moses Hendricks m Susanna sons descendants of Moses Jr. m Hannah Trout and David Hendricks m Mourning Hill have had Y-DNA testing. A descendant of the third son Larkin Hendricks m Millice Cantrell is currently being tested. In the meantime we also tested four Pamunkey (Virginia) Hendrick men. The Moses Hendricks descendants and the Pamunkey (Virginia) Hendrick descendant came no where even near matching. In fact their Haplotype, the area of the world your ancestors came from in the last 400-600 years, were even different. The Pamunkey (Virginia) Hendrick descendants were "I", Nordic, [Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Iceland, etc.] while Moses Hendricks descendants were "R1a, Eastern Europe, {Belisarius, Russia and Baltic Countries]. Also note none of these designations are exact it is just a type of averaging based on testing of your DNA.

So we simply sit and wait for a match at the Hendricks DNA Project where we now have 52 participants, with results back from 42. Out of this 42 we have 22 different Hendricks or variants groups, easily separated by the DNA tests. For Moses Hendricks, the two descendants are R1a and we have only one other R1a, a supposed descendant from Francis Hendrickson of early 1600s Eastern North Carolina. This being another remote chance for connecting Moses Hendricks to another family of Hendricks.

### Searching for Susanna

So what is the fuss about <u>Susanna</u>? Well a lot of time just a single clue when searching your ancestors will bread down the brick wall you have been facing. For a number of years Susanna was proposed to be a Glenn. However from others searches and some that I did in Virginia there show little chance of this being true. So what and how could you possibly tell what <u>Susanna</u>'s maiden name was? There is being collected every day an mtDNA data base in which, if you have a descendant from one of Susanna's daughters, daughters of, daughters of, on down to a daughter of living today you might get some names to match the mtDNA pattern to.

I posed this question to Bennett Greenspan of FTDNA. Here is the answer I got. "The best you could hope for in this case would be a match on the mtDNAPlus test that gives you about a 50% chance of sharing a common matrilineal ancestor within the last 28 generations with a person who has traced their genealogy back to the same area around the same time period, in which case you would know that there is a possible connection" Since not many things are exact a search for a living person to have an mtDNA test upon seemed a reasonable thing to do. So we proceeded forward.

### What is the mtDNA plus test?

mtDNAPlus: tests the mtDNA HVR1 and HVR2 of females and the female lineage of males, and also verifies possible Native American and African ancestry. This is the mtDNA test that includes the most number of base pairs offered anywhere: 16001 to 16569 and 00001 to 00574, for a total of 1143 base pairs. Results are placed in FTDNA's mtDNA database and when 2 people show the same identical polymorphism, FTDNA informs both parties if they have both signed the FTDNA Release Form. The customer receives a report generally describing mtDNA, the meaning of polymorphism, and your differences from the Cambridge Reference Sequence and the meaning of probability between matches. I made a search of FTDNA's mtDNA data base records which contain 16257 records at this time and growing. The search engine at FTDNA showed 32 names with Glenn. Now this does not mean we are just searching for Susanna's surname as Glenn it was just a search to test the data base. So with this type of information in hand it seemed plausible to proceed to the next step.

### What Do You Need to do to Find a Living Person Who has the Right mtDNA?

How do you find a living person to run the mtDNA test on? You study the ancestors of the daughters of Moses Hendricks married **Susanna**. Below is just one of many people who satisfy this condition of having the mtDNA, which is passed down generation after generation, for **Susanna**.

Note: In the following lineage chart the first number is the generation and the second number is the family identification number taken from the Old Pendleton Data Base file for Moses Hendricks.

Any living female in the above chart would be a candidate for the mtDNA test.

Now one of the problems of doing a lineage search of this type is that a family must know and have a good record of their ancestors because what I have presented is only as good as this is known.

### Moses Hendricks m Susanna Daughters

A quick look at Moses Hendricks m Susanna daughters (Old Pendleton data base) reveals;

- 1. Elizabeth had 3 daughters
- 2. Rosanna had 3 daughters
- 3. Temperance no daughters
- 4. Polly 2 daughters
- 5. Mourning no data
- 6. Barbara 3 daughters.

Any path thorough the above daughters of **Susanna** into one of the many grand daughters could lead you down to a living candidate today. Remembering that there could be dead ends and many other multiple paths in 10 generations.

### 1. Susanna's Daughter Elizabeth m Alexander Clark

- 2. Elizabeth's daughter Susan m Clark 10 generation lineage above.
- 3. Elizabeth's daughter Mourning Clark no record dead end.
- 4. Elizabeth's daughter Amy Clark m William G. Trotter 2 daughters two more paths
- 5. Amy Clark's daughter -Nancy M. Trotter m Riley Simmons 3 daughters 3 more paths
- 6. Amy Clark's daughter Mary Caroline Trotter m William C Harbin 1 daughter 1 more path.

So this can go on and on. What we need is to trace the path down to a living person to have an mtDNA test done. Can you find another living person in Pickens who is descended from Susanna's daughter, daughter of, daughter of, daughter of, etc.? If so, can you ask that person to contact Herb Hendricks for an mtDNA test? We would like to bread down the brick wall in finding Moses Hendricks ancestors. Having a probability of knowing Susanna maiden name from the mtDNA data base may lead to the break through.

The Providence *Journal* of the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. says, "Mr. Booth, the celebrated tragedian, arrived in town yesterday, in a state of mental derangement, having traveled on foot from Boston. His feet were much swollen, and it is said he slept in the woods on Wednesday night, covering himself with leaves of the forest. He is now in the care of his friends, and we are happy to add, appears to be recovering fro his illness." [Is the Booth who killed Abraham Lincoln or a relative?]

### MARIAH HARDIN'S GRAVE IS DESCREATED

Usually, if relatives or friends did not arrange to pay for burial elsewhere, inmates of the Poor Farm were simply buried on its property. The cemetery area was often called the "Pauper" or "Potter's Field."

The historic Oconee County Poor Farm is located 3.9 miles North of Westminster. It's located at 320 Camp Road, which is several miles west of Highway 183. Lakeview Rest Home is currently occupying the building.

The 19-bed Lakeview Rest Home is a state-licensed, non-profit "residential care" facility that houses the county's elderly and disabled people. (Somewhere along the line, a 9-bed addition was added to the original 10.) Lakeview is not a nursing home and does not house residents with acute health needs.

Initially, the building that the rest home now occupies was called the Poor Farm. Then it became part of the County's prison system. A nearby cattle barn is currently being used by the Oconee County Humane Society. There is also an old jail that is still located behind the rest home. A sign above the door says 1911.

What were Poor Farms? Poor Farms were tax-supported residential institutions to which people were required to go if they could not support themselves. They were started as a method of providing a less expensive (to the taxpayers) alternative to what we would now call "welfare" - what was called "outdoor relief" in those days. People requested help from the community Overseer of the Poor (sometimes also called a Poor Master) - an elected town official. If the need was great or likely to be long-term, they were sent to the poorhouse instead of being given relief while they continued to live independently. Sometimes they were sent there even if they had not requested help from the Overseer of the Poor. That was usually done when they were found guilty of begging in public, etc.

During the second quarter of the 19th century, as the industrial revolution had its effect on the United States, the importation of the factory system from England was followed almost immediately by the full scale adoption of what seemed to be an inherent component of that system -- the Poor Farm System. These Poor Farms were built with great optimism. They promised to be a much more efficient and cheaper way to provide relief to paupers. And there was a fervent popular belief that housing such people in institutions would provide the opportunity to reform them and cure them of the bad habits and character defects that were assumed to be the cause of their poverty.

By mid-century, people were beginning to question the success of the Poor Farm movement. Investigations were launched to examine the conditions in Poor Farms. They had proven to be much more expensive than had been anticipated. And they had not significantly reduced the numbers of the "unworthy poor" nor eliminated the need for "outdoor relief".

The Civil War was the major preoccupation of American society during the third quarter of the century. Major systematic changes in social welfare policy had to await calmer times. Ironically, the faltering Poor Farm system was sheltered from the impact of the poverty produced by the war itself. The war created widows and orphans, and it deprived elderly members of families of the support they might have had in their old age had their sons and grandsons lived or remained able to work. However, a relatively small proportion of these casualties of the war ever wound up living in Poor Farms.

By 1875, after the regulation of Poor Farms in most states became the responsibility of the State Board of Charities, laws were passed prohibiting children from residing in poorhouses and removing mentally ill patients and others with special needs to more appropriate facilities.

The Poor Farm population was even more narrowly defined during the twentieth century when social welfare legislation (Workman's Compensation, unemployment benefits and Social Security) began to provide a rudimentary "safety net" for people who would previously have been pauperized by such circumstances. Eventually, the poorhouses evolved almost exclusively into nursing homes for dependent elderly people. But poor farms left orphanages, general hospitals and mental hospitals -- for which they had provided the prototype -- as their heritage.

Somewhere along the line, a superintendent of the Oconee Poor Farm decided that his Potter's Field was hard to maintain and not very attractive. The weeds around the field-stone grave markers could not easily be cut - in those days they didn't have

Weed Whackers. So he removed all the field-stones, plowed the cemetery, and planted grass. Now the area looked good and could be included with their normal lawn cutting.

One nearby resident reported that pigs were being kept in this area and that their rooting for food caused the field-stones to become scattered. So the superintendent collected the stones and threw them in what is now called Lake Hartwell.

As you face the rest home, the cemetery is located on a knoll to its far left side. There is a 15' high pear tree that basically marks the cemetery's center. Over the passing years, approximately 15 grave shafts/cavities have collapsed into the ground.

Next to this pear tree is a beautiful large stone grave marker with the following inscription on it: HARDIN, Mariah, Born 24-Feb-1837, Died 24-May-1925, Husband T.W. Land

For some reason, vandals felt a need to desecrate Mariah's grave by pushing over the top section of her tombstone - it's laying on the ground near its mounting base. Fortunately, the inscription side is facing upward. Because of its weight, it can't simply be lifted by several men and put back into place.

It should be noted that the vandal's action is a criminal offense and punishable by South Carolina. Vandalism IS NOT something that teenagers want to do in this day and age. They can be tried as an adult, heavily fined, and sent to jail.

- 1. 19-Sep-2002, The Greenville News/Associated Press in Columbia has reported that a funeral home has been charged with damaging grave sites at the Taylor Cemetery. The Richland County Sheriff's Department says that the owner has been jailed and charged with willful intent.
- 2. 18-Oct-2002, The Seneca Daily Journal/Greenville (AP) has reported that a Greenville couple has been convicted of damaging graves and taking body parts from a cemetery in Greer. One of the couple was convicted of malicious damage to property over \$10,000, conspiracy, and two counts each of desecration of a human burial ground. Circuit Judge John Kittredge sentenced them to 15 years in prison.

By writing this article, I'm hoping that a Hardin descendant will have the mechanical means to lift this heavy stone and take it upon himself or herself to cement it back in place.

### World War II Enlistment Records Online

One great resource available from the U.S. National Archives is the World War II Enlistment Records. These records have been transcribed and made available on the National Archives web site. These records are especially valuable as many of the personnel papers of these soldiers and sailors were later destroyed in a fire.

The National Archives scanned War Department microfilmed punch cards on enlistments to support the reconstruction of the military personnel records at its National Personnel Records Center. That strikes me as a sad commentary about technology: the data was originally stored on punch cards which, once upon a time, could be read by machines. I haven't seen a punch card reader in operation for many years, however. The cards were eventually microfilmed for long-term preservation.

Nine million records were later transcribed manually by humans who sat and read the microfilms and transcribed the information onto keyboards. Due to the condition of the microfilms, approximately 1.5 million records could not be scanned. Scanning problems when the microfilms were created also contributed to the errors. Despite these challenges, information about a majority of sixteen million World War II servicemen and women is available via the web site.

I went to the web site and did a search for an uncle of mine. Thanks to his unusual last name, he was easy to find: he was the only person of that name in the database. Finding him took less than a minute. Looking for someone with a more common surname will take longer, but you can use the site's "Advanced Search" to use Boolean terms. For instance, all the men named Jones who enlisted in Maine or something similar.

The final record that I was able to see was a transcribed entry, not an image of an original form. That's okay in this case because the online transcriptions were made from another transcription: the original punch cards that were made from original records. In other words, I was looking at a transcription of a transcription.

The U.S. National Archives says spot checks show that approximately 35% of these records have an error. However, only 4.7% of the sample had an error in the name column, and only 1.3% had errors in the serial number column. Therefore, the National Archives made the determination that a lot of valuable information is available in this database, even with the errors. The database was released and placed online.

I didn't notice any errors in the data I saw about my uncle and about a few others that I found.

Each record provides the enlistee's serial number and name, state, and county of residence, place of enlistment, date of enlistment, grade, branch, term of enlistment, place of birth, year of birth, citizenship, race, education, civilian occupation, marital status, and component. I did see a few items left blank or listed as N/A (not available). However, most of the records I saw were filled in completely.

Because the records are for Army enlistments during World War II, the file does not include records for those who enlisted as Army officers. It does, however, have records for those who joined as enlisted personnel and then later were promoted to commissioned officers, as in the case of my uncle. Just because your relative served as an officer, do not assume that he or she is not in this database. The question is, what was the grade upon enlistment, not on discharge?

This online database also contains information on more than 130,000 women who enlisted in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps.

The Electronic Army Serial Number Merged File can provide much information of interest to genealogists. It is especially useful for date and place of birth, even though it does not show parents' names. At least you will find out where to look for a birth record.

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### **Inquests**

These inquests were typed under the Roosevelt Administration in the 1930s. There were retyped by G. Anne Sheriff from a copy found in the collection of Pauline Young in the basement of a store in Liberty.

### Pack 138. Inquest No. 5 Pickens District, South Carolina

An inquest was held July 25, 1834 over the body of Lemuel Morgan at the house of John Couch in Pickens District. Robert Wilson sayeth that on the 17<sup>th</sup> day before the death of the said Lemuel Morgan that he in the company of Enoch Payne were passing by the house of Robert Couch and heard a noise like some person whipping another. That he saw Robert Couch whipping the said Lemuel Morgan and cursing him at the same time; likewise, saw Couch kick the boys backside. I thought the whipping unmerciful, the stick with which Couch whipped the boy was about the size of I think a willow and appeared to about 14 or 15 inches long and frazzled at one end.

On Saturday evening before **Lemuel's** death on Monday I was at **Robert Couch's** house, saw **Couch** kick the boy, and call him a dammed trifling, lazy son of a bitch, that he would never try to do anything. I went from there to Mr. **Montgomeries** and on my return back the same day, saw maggots [on the boys feet and legs. I did not see any wound or bruises where the maggots were.

On Sunday evening before he died on Monday I went to **Robert Couches** in company with **William Benson** and found **Lemuel** lying on the floor alone, in the house of said **Robert Couch**, without any clothing on but a shirt and flys blowing in his house and on his but. I noticed that his but appeared black and all over of that appearance. I examined the boy and discovered a black stripe on the pit of his stomach extending all over around the body to the backbone and about the width of my hand. Saw no place where the skin was broke, but had the appearance of switch marks. Saw a blue spot on the boys head and one on his hand. The boy told me that he would die, and that **Robert Couch** whipping him would cause his death. Noticed also that he appeared to be swollen during the whole time he was acquainted with him and was under the character of being a dirt eater.

**Enoch Payne** says that he was in company with **Robert Wilson** and went by **Robert Couches** house. Heard one person apparently cursing another and on advancing saw Couch motioning his hand as if he was whipping some person and heard **Lemuel Morgan** beg, that it was getting dark and he couldn't see what was going on. Saw the boy walk off. This was about 17 days before his death . . .

Richard Nalley states that he worked for Couch the Monday and Tuesday week before Lemuel Morgan died, during that time he did not know of Robert Couch in any way abusing and mistreating the boy. I went back to couches house on Sunday night before the boys death and remained there until the next Saturday morning. Did not see Couch abuse him at any time.

Alfred Jones states that he saw Couch raise up Lemuels Morgans shirt and strike him two licks with a small switch. Believes it was on a Saturday week before the boy died. On the same day when going out to work the boy turned out of the path and said that he wanted to rest. Couch took him by the hand and said [expletive] it come into the road and go along what in hell do you stop here for, the boy then fell down. Couch then poured water on his head and laughed and said he had like to have lost all his water. The boy told me that he done quit eating dirt but that Mr. and Mrs. Couch had whipped and abused him so bad he would rather die than live and that he began eating dirt again to kill himself.

Jesse Jones said that he saw the boy two weeks before his death. He appeared swollen like the dropsy, yellow water water was running out of his feet and legs . . . Jane Jones said that she was at Robert Couches house on Sunday evening and saw Lemuel Morgan, he appeared very low, she thought he was dieing, he became better and she left there. Returned next morning, found him very bad, he became better again and had several spells of getting better and worse for several hours. At length appeared to fall into a quiet sleep. Awoke and asked Robert Couch to lift him up into a chair, he done so, saw the water gushed out of his mouth. I left the room and understood he died immediately. Robert Couch appeared kind to the boy. She never heard the boy complain of bad treatment. Was satisfied he died of dropsy.

Saphia Holyfield states lived with Robert Couch from the middle of March last. Lemuel Morgan lived there when she went there. He looked very sickly and saw him eat dirt. She heard Couch tell him to go for a hoe, the boy replied that he would be damnd if he did go. Couch took a willow switch and struck him about three licks across the bust. She knew he was given to telling falsehoods. She caught him in them.

The doctor brought it out that dropsy was the cause of his death. . . His body was taken up on the 14<sup>th</sup> day after his burial for examination.


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Amos O'Shields died of disease in 1863 while serving in Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He was born about 1842 in Spartanburg, S. C., a son of Aaron O'Shields. He married Sarah Ann King on December 27, 1860, when she was twenty-six years of age. She was a daughter of Thomas King and a resident of Anderson District, South Carolina.

Seaborn O'Shields served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months from August 1863 until February 1864. He also served as a sergeant in Co. H, 3rd South Carolina State Troops between June 1862 and January 1863.

Willis O'Shields was a soldier in the Confederate Army. He served in Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). No additional

information available.



George W. Owens (1841-1914) enlisted as a private in Co. H, 4th South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A., at Belton, S. C., on October 10, 1861. He was listed as present for duty on his company's muster roll of December 31, 1861. This soldier also served in Co. K, Hampton Legion. In 1899 and 1911, his name was listed on the Civil War pension roll of Pickens County, S. C. George W. Owens married Elizabeth Jones (b. ca 1845-d. 1880), daughter of Bennett Cooper Jones (1821-1864) and Nancy Hill Jones. This Confederate soldier and his wife, Elizabeth (Jones) Owens,

had the following children: Tilman Bennett Owens (7 Mar 1871-1924), who married Sara Lou Cantrell (5 Jul 1875-1935); Joseph Lawrence Owens (b. 5 Aug 1873), who married Mary Ann Cantrell; Roxie Owens (3 Mar 1875-26 May 1913), who married Robert Moore; and Vada Owens (8 May 1876-14 Dec 1912), who married Jay Bates. In 1901, this Confederate veteran resided in Easley township, and he was sixty-two years of age, according to pension records. He died February 6, 1914, and was buried at Fairview Methodist Church, situated a few miles south of Easley in Pickens County, South Carolina.

Duke W. Owens enlisted as a private in Co. H, 4th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment) at Belton, S. C., on October 10, 1861. He was among a group of thirty-one men from the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C., who rode by Pickens Court House (Old Pickens) on the Keowee River to demonstrate their willingness to participate in the North-South armed confrontation.

Henry Clay Owens (1845-1927) served in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was a resident of the Warsaw section (now the Richland area) of what today is Oconee County, S. C. He was born about August 25, 1845, in the Clearmont section of Pickens District, S. C. His first marriage was to Mary Jane Milford (12 Jun 1839-1 Nov 1912) on November 30, 1865, Ellen (Edgar) and his second marriage was to Timms, the latter of whom received a Civil War widow's pension in 1930 in Oconee County, S. C. This Confederate soldier was a son of Buck Owens, a native of Virginia, and Martha (McGuffin) Owens. He was captured by Union troops during the U.S. Civil War and imprisoned at Hart Island in the harbor of New York City. He was released as a prisoner of war after the Civil War ended. Then, he walked all the way from New York to his home in Pickens District, S. C. This Confederate veteran and his first wife had seven children -- four sons and three daughters. Henry Clay Owens resided in the Westminster/Oakway area of Oconee County. He died February 1, 1927. Owens was a member of Westminster First Baptist Church, and he was buried there.

- James Mulkey Owens (1839-1862) married Permalia Barton (1836-1920), daughter of Bailey Barton. He was killed during the Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas) in Virginia. No additional information available.
- **R. Owens** served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864. No additional information available.
- T. Owens, a Confederate veteran, was buried in the cemetery of the Old Stone Church, situated between Clemson and Pendleton, South Carolina. Question: Could his marker be a memorial, rather than the site of this soldier's grave? This because a man named T. Owens served as a private in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment) and died at Richmond, Virginia. He was buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (Grave W-484). Also, a man named Thomas Owens of Pickens County, S. C., had a daughter named Mamie Owens who married D. Couch in 1899 at her father's residence. The wedding ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. T. Dobson. Same man?
- William Harrison Owens (or Owen) (1842-1907) served in Co. I, 1st South Carolina (State Troops?). One source listed his unit as Co. G,

Butler's Regiment. He was shot in the head during the Civil War. In 1899, he resided in Oconee County and was a recipient of a pension. On January 4, 1866, he married Elizabeth Harbert (10 Dec 1844-10 Jul 1905). The wedding ceremony was performed by the Rev. Andrew W. McGuffin in the western division of Pickens District, S. C. This Confederate veteran was born April 29, 1842, a son of William Owen and Susan (McGuffin) Owen. This veteran's name appeared on the 1902 pension roll for Oconee County, S. C. He was a resident of Westminster township of Oconee County, S. C., and farmed there most of his life after the Civil War. He was the father of seven children. He died August 7, 1907, and his body was interred at the First Baptist Church in Westminster, S. C.

- Melmouth Owings served as a private in Co. K, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months between June 1862 and January 1863. No additional information available.
- Alexander Lafayette "Fate" Pace (1845-1917) married Mary Susan Roper (1855-1932). He served as a private in Co. I, 3rd Battalion (Palmetto), South Carolina Light Artillery. He enlisted in the C. S. A. at Greenville, S. C., on November 20, 1863. He was transferred to Co. D, 16th South Carolina Infantry on June 16, 1864. On the muster roll of his company, dated June 28, 1864, this soldier was listed as absent without leave as a deserter. This soldier was a son of Richard King Pace (1816-1891) and Nancy (Barton) Pace (1819-1871). He was buried at Enon Baptist Church, situated near Easley (Pickens County), S. C.
- Columbus W. "Lum" Pace (1842-1916) was a brother of Alexander Lafayette Pace (see above) and Joseph Warren Pace, both of whom also served in the Confederate States Army during the Civil War. He was born February 5, 1842, and served to the rank of corporal in Co. D, 16th South Carolina Infantry. He enlisted on November 22, 1861. He married Malinda "Linda" Williams (11 Oct 1840-d. Jan 1924). He was captured by Union troops on April 20, 1865, at Macon, Georgia. After the U. S. Civil War, this Pace family migrated to Missouri and settled there in Rolla and began to farm. Eventually, he purchased 240 acres of land east of Rolla and lived there the remainder of his life. His two oldest children were born in Pickens County, S. C. They were Ella Pace (b. 1868) and Lizzie Pace (b. 1871). Columbus W. Pace died September 2, 1916, and was buried in St. James Cemetery in St. James, Missouri. March - Hage 15

- Richard King Pace (1816-1891) served in the 3rd South Carolina Reserves for ninety days. He also served in the 1st South Carolina State Troops and was discharged from the C. S. A. at Charleston, S. C., because of disability. His wife was Nancy (Barton) Pace (1819-1871), who was buried at Tyger Baptist Church in Greenville County, S. C. Three of this Confederte veteran's sons also served in the C. S. A. They were Alexander Lafayette Pace, Columbus W. "Lum" Pace, and Joseph Warren Pace. Richard King Pace was born March 29, 1816, and he died June 8, 1891. He was buried at Griffin Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C.
- William Pace served in the Confederate States Army during the Civil War. He was buried at Mt. Carmel Church in Pickens County, South Carolina.
- J. M. Padgett was killed in action during the big explosion at the Crater near Petersburg, Virginia, on July 30, 1864. No additional information available.
- **Terrell Padgett** served as a private in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He survived the war and was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, in April 1865. No additional information available.
- John Henry Page served to the rank of corporal in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). No additional information available.
- William R. Page (1837-1907) was a private in Co. C. 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He also served in Co. A (Washington Light Infantry), Hampton Legion in which he enlisted on June 1, 1863, at Columbia, S. C. He was twenty-five years of age at enlistment. As a result of acute rheumatism, he was a patient at a hospital in Petersburg, Virginia, from June 28 to August 2, 1863. He was either captured or became a derserter on June 10, 1864, and then sent north of the Ohio River. He was described in official records as being six feet tall. Page survived the Civil War, after which he moved to Georgia where he settled in Cass (now Bartow) County. He was born December 13, 1837, and died May 11, 1907. His body was interred in Riverside Cemetery at Canton (Cherokee County), Georgia.
- N. Pair (?) was a private in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, during the Civil War.

- Chandler Palmer enlisted in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regiment) on June 2, 1861. On his company's last muster roll of December 31, 1861, he was listed as present for duty. Note: The 1903 pension roll for Pickens County, S. C., contained the name C. Palmer, who served in Co. D, 6th South Carolina Infantry. His age was recorded then as sixty-two years, and the listed address for this man was Clement Post Office, Pickens County, S. C. Was this man Charles Milton Palmer or Chandler Palmer?
- Charles Milton Palmer enlisted at Pendleton, S. C., on June 2, 1861, and served in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry. He received a discharge from the C. S. A. on October 26, 1861. No additional information available.
- John A. Palmore (or Palmour) served as a private in Co. C, 6th South Carolina Infantry. He died April 4, 1865, while being held as a prisoner of war at Point Lookout, Maryland.
- Solmon (or Solomon) Palmour (Palmer?), a Confederate soldier, was a son of John Palmour, who fought in the War of 1812. (No additional information available).
- William R. Palmer was a farmer in Walhalla township of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. He was born about 1841. He enlisted in the 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment) on November 1, 1861. But he was transferred to the 2nd South Carolina Rifles on December 18, 1862. He was captured by Union troops at Cold Harbor, Virginia, and taken to Point Lookout Prison in Maryland. On July 12, 1864, he was sent to Elmira Prison in New York State. Then, he took the oath of allegiance to the United States, claiming that he had been conscripted at the age of forty-eight years and was a Union man at heart. He also stated that his desire was to be released as a prisoner of war so that he could go to relatives in East Tennessee. He was released from Elmira Prison on May 29, 1865, and was described in POW records as being five feet and eight inches tall with fair complexion, blue eyes and brown hair.
- Thomas Parkins served in Co. D, (Gist Rifles), Hampton Legion. He participated in the First Bull Run Battle (First Manassas) in Virginia on July 21, 1861, and fought throughout the Civil War. On April 9, 1865, he was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia. After the U. S. Civil War, he resided in Liberty (Pickens March-Page 16

County), S. C. In 1881, this Confederate veteran put up a steam-operated cotton gin on his farm near Liberty, S. C. In October 1884, one of his sons, Tom Joe Parkins, picked 320 pounds of cotton in one day. On September 29, 1892, a notice in The Pickens Sentinel reported that Parkins and his wife were planning to travel on a prospecting tour to Swisher County, Texas, where the Rev. J. T. Richardson resided. Then, Parkins rented his farm to a Mr. Gravitt and moved to Texas where he rented a farm in Grayson County. Another son of this Confederate veteran was Oscar Parkins (1865-1885) who was buried in Liberty Cemetery at Liberty, S. C. Thomas Parkins married Susan Hollingsworth, sister of Columbus Lafayette Hollingsworth, a Confederate veteran who became a prominent lawyer in Pickens County, S. C. Susan (Hollingsworth) Parkins was also a sister of Mrs. Joab Mauldin, a prominent resident of Pickens, S. C. This veteran's wife, Susan, died in Texas on July 7, 1899, at the age of forty-eight years. She was survived by her husband and several children.

J. S. Parrott served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864.

Orange Parrott was born on June 3, 1833, and served in Co. D, 22nd Georgia Infantry. He is believed to have been a son of Josiah Parrott of Pickens District, S. C.


F. C. Parsons (1828-1905) was a member of Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. He served to the rank of second lieutenant. He was born September 5. 1828. He married Mary Jane Allgood (16 Feb 1845-18 Mar 1909). He resided in Hurricane township of Pickens County, S. C. He died January 1, 1909, and was buried at Mile Creek Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C.

Frederick V. G. Parsons was born about 1837, a son of Samuel Parsons and Sarah Matilda (Garvin) Parsons (1812-1893). He served to the rank of corporal in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment) and was wounded during the Civil War. He married Phoebe Herd on August 1, 1858, in a ceremony performed by W. J. Parsons, Esquire in Pickens District, S. C. His wife was a daughter of John F. Herd. This Confederate veteran was a brother of Samuel A. A. Parsons who also fought in the Civil War.

James Chaney C. Parsons (1824-1893) was a son of James and Marie L. Parsons. He served as a private in Co. K, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months from June 1862 until January 1863. His wife was Mary Parsons (b. ca 1824). This Confederate veteran was born April 18, 1824, and he died in February 1893. He was buried in the Parsons family cemetery in Pickens County, South Carolina.

John Benjamin F. "Ben" Parsons (1842-1862) was a son of Samuel Parsons (1806-1883) and Sarah Matilda (Garvin) Parsons (1812-1893). He was born August 28, 1842, and served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). His company was commanded by Capt. Robert Anderson Thompson of Pickens District, S. C. On September 17, 1862, John Benjamin F. Parsons was killed at Sharpsburg, Maryland. His widow was Hannah R. Parsons (b. 1840-d. 1 Oct 1899). She died in Pickens County at Sunny Dale and at the home of J. H. Hudson with whom she lived during the last seven years of her life. She was buried in the cemetery at Concord Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C. She and her husband had at least one child, namely Lowery D. Parsons (b. ca 1862).

Thomas J. Parsons enlisted in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters at Pendleton, S. C., on March 22, 1862 and served in that command until his death from disease on August 21, 1862. He served under Capt. Frederick L. Garvin. This soldier's estate was administered in Pickens District, S. C., by Mary A. Dobson on February 17, 1864. His widow was Mary A. Parsons (b. ca 1840), who later married a Dobson. On April 10, 1919, Mary A. Dobson applied for a Civil War widow's pension. At that time, she was 79 years of age and resided on Postal Route One, Central (Pickens County), S. C.

Born December 1858 to William "Billy" Nix and Elizabeth Littleton of Oconee County, SC, died December 21, 1926. Buried in unmarked grave somewhere in the "old" Rocky Knoll Graveyard across the road from Rocky Knoll Baptist Church, the cemetery is known as the Neville Cemetery in Walhalla, SC. Married May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1875 in Rabun County, Georgia to C. J. Alexander. (Was he the son of Chamberlain Alexander of Persimmon Ridge, Rabun County, Georgia? Do not know what happened to him). Nicy was later listed in the 1880 census living in the household of Alexander Nichols of Persimmon Ridge, Rabun County, GA. Mr. Nichols' grandson, Jedson Thurmon Bradshaw was also living in the household. Nicy had two living children: John Henry Nix and Emma Nix and lived in Oconee County, SC until her death.



### There Were Three Brothers And...

Genealogy newcomers often trip over the "three brothers" story. It has been repeated thousands of times. I have yet to see one instance in which it is accurate.

The story always starts with something like this:

There were three brothers who immigrated to America. One went north, one went south, and one headed west, never to be heard from again.

It is an interesting story, and you might almost believe it. After all, how else can you explain the fact that the same surname pops up in so many places?

What fascinates me is that there are always three brothers, never two or four or five or six. And didn't they have any sisters? Why did they go in three different directions? Couldn't two of them go someplace together while the third struck out on his own? Why does each one take a different trip?

An examination of thousands of immigration and naturalization records shows that brothers usually remained close-knit and usually resided near each other after immigration. The "three brothers" myth apparently was invented and repeated by lazy genealogists who could not be bothered to find the truth. It is a poor excuse for rationalizing why the same surname appears in multiple locations.

When searching for surnames in immigration records, you normally will find more than one immigrant of the name. In many cases, each immigrant did not know the others and moved to wherever he pleased. Later genealogists tried to justify the appearance of one surname in multiple locations and assumed something that is not documented in any records.

Be wary of the three brother's myth. You always want to confirm such claims to establish that indeed there were three brothers instead of three unrelated men with the same last name. Yes, someplace in history there probably were three brothers somewhere who split up and went separate ways. But 99.9% of the "three brothers" stories you will hear are fictitious. Before you accept the "three brothers" story in your family tree, do yourself a favor: find documentation that proves the names of their parents.

### Insects Provided Foe in Civil War's Epic Struggle, Scientist Finds BY TOM HOWELL JR.

WASHINGTON - Twice as many Civil War soldiers died from insect-related disease than direct combat - an obscure fact Gary Miller has discovered in his unique, decades-long hobby.

Since the 1970s, Miller, 48, of Laurel, Md., has pored over books, soldiers' letters and regimental histories for insect references. He found that mosquitoes, body lice and flies were a constant nuisance to Union and Confederate soldiers. Roughly 60,000 soldiers died from malaria on the Union side alone, he said.

"I think the beauty of looking at the insects is it's a topic that we all can relate to," he said. "Few of us can relate to combat."

Miller is a professional entomologist who describes new species for the United States Department of Agriculture. His blend of bug expertise with the War Between the States is strictly a hobby, he said. The bugs-and-war fascination started in college, he said, when research for a Civil War course paper on "soldier life" led to an unexpected trend.

"Here were all these references to insects," he said. "You find out insects played a role in every part of soldiering."

Civil War soldiers were encamped in conditions that were awful for humans, but great for insects.

"One of the things that most people aren't aware of when they think of the Civil War is the number of people and associated animals," Miller said. "(Armies) weren't mechanized. They had to rely on horses and mules."

Soldiers would sometimes travel with 8,000 to 10,000 head of cattle, providing plenty of food for flies, he said. Soldiers already wracked by diarrhea or dysentery often had to deal with mosquito-borne malaria as well. If that wasn't bad enough, he said, soldiers' food was usually infested.

Miller owns an original letter by a soldier after the fall of Vicksburg, who wrote there were insects in "every biteful of food."

Desperation led to quirky delousing methods. Soldiers practiced "skirmishing," squishing bugs and lice with their thumb and forefinger on their bodies. Often, they boiled their clothes.

Historians say the Civil War was the last major war fought before scientists realized microbes carried disease, so treatment was limited, Miller said. Quinine imported from South America was the best treatment for malaria, but the Union blockade on the coast led to price gouging.

In 1862, an ounce of quinine cost about \$5, Miller said. By the end of the war, the going price in some places was \$500 to \$600 per ounce. The average Union private made \$16 per month.

Miller will share his research Friday evening in a public presentation titled "Insects and the Civil War" at the Locust Grove Nature Center in Bethesda, Md.

In his presentation, Miller will show Civil War-era photographs that depict these harsh conditions. Viewers must look closely to notice the details, but the suffering of battle will be evident.

"I try not to sugarcoat things," Miller said. "I'm not overly graphic with the info, but the topic is war and it's not fun and games."

Geri Drymalski, a naturalist with the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, saw Miller present his research to the Maryland Entomological Society 10 years ago. She had him present his work at Locust Grove then, and now Miller is back. "Well I think it's really amazing," she said. "We are so ignorant of how directly and indirectly insects are part of our lives. There's so much more to this whole drama of fighting a war than guns and bullets."

"It's a connection to the past and that's what you build upon," Miller said. "When I can bring natural history into our national history, the picture becomes more colorful."







Robert Warren Johnson Parsons was a private in Co. I, Hampton Legion, C. S. A. No additional information available.

Andrew L. Patterson served as a private in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Cavalry. He attended the September 1884 reunion of his Civil War military unit at Pickens, S. C.

Elisha Patterson was a son of Asa Patterson, Sr. (b. ca 1813) and Eleanor Nix Neely Patterson (b. ca 1827). He grew up in the Jocassee area of northern Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. K, 62nd North Carolina Infantry. He died at Manassas, Virginia, after the Second Battle of Bull Run (Second Manassas).

Erwin Patterson served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864. No additional information available.

George C. Patterson (1847-1921) resided in the area of the western division of Pickens District that became Seneca township after the Civil War. He was a son of Clary Patterson (b. ca 1803) and Elizabeth Patterson (b. ca 1813). He married Susan Sanders (b. 20 Dec 1851-12 Sep 1936). This Confederate veteran was born March 5, 1847, and died May 18, 1921. He was buried in Mountain View Cemetery at Seneca (Oconee County), S. C. (Note: A man named George Patterson served in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Cavalry. Also, a George Patterson served in Co. C, Holcombe Legion. Were either or both of these men the George C. Patterson listed above?)

J. R. Patterson was a private in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was killed in action at Frayser's Farm (Battle of White Oak Swamp) in Virginia on June 30, 1862. He was laid to rest in Hollywood Cemetery at Richmond, Virginia (Grave No. M-11).



- Thomas A. Patterson was a second sergeant in 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He was transferred to the 22nd South Carolina Infantry during the U. S. Civil War.
- **T. D. Patterson** was killed in action in the Crater explosion at Petersburg, Virginia, on July 30, 1864.
- **Samuel W. Patton** was wounded in action at Fredericksburg, Virginia while serving in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- R. M. Pearson is believed to have been the Robert Pearson who served in Co. A, 3rd South Carolina Reserves and in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Infantry. After the Civil War, R. M. Pearson resided in the Pacolet area (?) of Oconee County, S. C., and received a \$240.00 annual Civil War pension in 1930.
- John Peaty was a private in Co. H, 4th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment). His home was in the Dacusville area of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C.
- James M. Peek (b. ca 1842-d. ca 1886) served in a Confederate military unit from North Carolina during the U. S. Civil War. After the war, he and his wife, Emma, plus their children, resided in Central (Pickens County), S. C. Their home was situated on the town's lot number 12. This Confederate veteran owned and operated a store in Central, S. C. Two of his storehouses were destroyed by fire on December 30, 1886. Later that year (in December), N. M. Madden made suit for letters of administration for the estate and effects of James M. Peek, deceased. During his life, this soldier had several brushes with the law. He was found guilty and fined for selling whiskey without a license, was charged with assult and battery with intent to kill, and was arrested for violating a town ordinance by firing a weapon in the streets. In 1930, Emma Peek, widow of James M. Peek, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension. She was a resident of Central, S. C., and died May 6, 1935.
- Dread Pelfrey (1830-1912) enlisted in Co. F, 52nd Georgia Infantry at Clayton, Georgia, on March 4, 1862. On his company's muster roll of December 1, 1862, he was listed as absent without leave, but he returned to duty March 17, 1863. He was taken prisoner of war by Union troops at Vicksburg, Mississippi, on July 4,

- 1863. However, he was paroled the following July 7th. Then, he returned to duty -- but was again captured by Federals on July 20, 1864, near Atlanta, Georgia, and then sent to a military prison in Louisville, Kentucky. On July 30, 1864, he was moved to Camp Douglas, Illinois, as a prisoner of war. By April 15, 1865, the Civil War had ended, and Dread Pelfrey then enlisted in the 5th U. S. Army Volunteers. At that time he was 32 years of age and claimed that his birthplace was Pickens, S. C. While in the U. S. Army, this soldier served as a company tailor. On November 13, 1866, he was mustered out of the U.S. Army at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Dread Pelfrey is believed to have married as many as five times. His first wife was Elizabeth Pelfrey, who was born in Georgia about 1830. After her death, he married Elmira Deal (b. 1840-d. 6 Jul 1906). Then, in 1886, he married Luisie Deal. By 1912, his wife was Patsey Pelfrey.
- Josiah Pelfrey (1839-1863) served in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He died of disease on January 22, 1863, at Lynchburg, Virginia. This soldier was born in Pickens District, S. C., in 1839. He married Martha Hinton. He enlisted in the Confederate States Army on May 10, 1862, at Walhalla, S. C.
- **James Jackson Pell** is believed to have served in the C. S. A. from Pickens District, S. C. No information is available about this man.
- William M. Pell was born about 1848 and once resided in Walhalla, S. C. He is thought to have served as a teenager in a unit of the S. C. Reserves or S. C. State Troops during the Civil War. In 1930, Pell's widow, Carrie (Walker) Pell (1861-1947) was a recipient of a Civil War widow's annual pension of \$160.00. A marker to the memory of William M. Pell was placed in the Pell family cemetery at Mountain Rest in northern Oconee County, S. C.
- J. W. Pendleton was one of the twenty Confederate veterans honored on January 20, 1907, at Clemson College, Clemson, S. C., when the 100th anniversary of General Robert E. Lee's birthday was celebrated by the John C. Calhoun Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy. Mr. Pendleton and the other honored veterans marched down the aisle of Clemson's Memorial Hall while the college band played "Dixie." No additional information is available about this Confederate veteran.

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- Andrew J. Pendley served as a first sergeant in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was a resident of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County).
- **S. Penn** was a private in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He died in 1862 at Richmond, Virginia.
- R. A. Pennington was conscripted into the C. S. A. on July 1, 1862, in Columbia, S. C. He once lived in Anderson County, S. C. He survived the Civil War and was paroled at Augusta, Georgia, on May 28, 1865.
- N. C. Penny was a corporal in Co. F, 2nd South Carolina Reserves (?). He died at the age of seventeen at Columbia, S. C. The date of his death was January 20, 1865. He was buried at Elmwood Cemetery at Columbia, South Carolina.
- Augustus G. Perkins (1838-1893) entered the army as a volunteer in July 1861 and served in Co. F, South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He married Harriet A. Jenkins (1 Feb 1838-6 Jul 1893). This soldier resided in the valley of the Tugaloo River in what today is Oconee County, S. C. His parents were Joshua Perkins (b. ca 1812) and Hannah Perkins (b. ca 1813). His widow applied for a Civil War widow's pension in Stephens County, Georgia. This veteran's brother, Josiah Perkins, also served in the Confederate States Army (see below).
- Daniel Perkins (1839-1862) died of pneumonia at Winchester, Virginia, on September 30, 1862. He was twenty-three years and four months of age at that time. Perkins served in Co. D, (Gist Rifles), Hampton Legion in which he enlisted June 7, 1861. This soldier was reared in the household of an aunt and uncle, Felix and Casey Rogers, having lost his parents while he was a youngster. Before the U. S. Civil War began, he joined Enon Baptist Church (on August 14, 1860), situated near what today is Easley in Pickens County, S. C.
- Josiah Perkins was born about 1834 in the valley of the Tugaloo River in what today is Oconee County, S. C. He served in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He survived the U. S. Civil War and was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia on April 9, 1865. He was a brother of Augustus G. Perkins (see above) who also served in the C. S. A.

- Moses Perkins was born about 1842, a son of Joshua Perkins (b. ca 1812) and Hannah Perkins (b. ca 1813). His father owned 309 acres of land situated in the forks of the Tugaloo River and Chauga Creek in what today is Oconee County. This soldier was a brother of Augustus G. Perkins, who also served in the C. S. A. His additional siblings were Josiah Perkins, William Perkins, Samuel Perkins, Harriet Elizabeth Perkins and Martha Adeline Perkins.
- Samuel Perkins died of disease at his home in the Tugaloo River valley of Pickens District, S. C. He was a member of Co. E, 1st South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers. He entered the C. S. A. in July 1861. He might have also served in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment).
- William Perkins died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, on June 4, 1862, and was buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (Grave #P-122). He was a member of Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment).
- Jesse R. (or P.) Perry (1833-1866) served in the 68th North Carolina Infantry. He was a son of Lemuel Anderson Perry (1802-1878). This soldier's wife was Jane Perry, and their children were Frances "Fannie" Perry (b. ca 1857), Lemuel "Anderson" Perry (b. 1859), and Eubla Catherine "Kate" Perry (b. 1861). This soldier was wounded in action and then hospitalized in Richmond. He was then sent to South Carolina to recover and was admitted to a hospital in Columbia. Later, he was sent to his home in the area that is now Easley township of Pickens County, S. C., where he died shortly after the U. S. Civil War.
- John Davis Perry (1842-1920) enlisted in Co. E, 4th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers at Columbia, S. C., on May 14, 1861. He was a private and, according to a company muster roll dated October 31, 1861, was absent from duty because of sickness. On November 7, 1861, he was discharged from the C. S. A., but later joined a cavalry company. His wife was Permalia Burt Moorhead Perry (1853-1925). This soldier was born February 25, 1842, and he died October 24, 1920. He was buried at Richland Presbyterian Church in Oconee County, S. C. He was a son of Nathaniel J. L. Perry (b. ca 1799) and Elizabeth Perry (b. ca 1804).
- **Ervin Phillips** received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County, S. C. According to oral

tradition, he served in Co. A, 21st South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. No additional information available.

Evan Phillips was born about 1829, a son of Charlotta Phillips (b. ca 1790). He was killed in action at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, on June 27, 1862. A memorial marker for this soldier was placed in the cemetery at Double Springs Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C. (Was he buried there?)

Franklin Phillips served as a private in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He died of disease at the age of twenty on December 5, 1862, at Lynchburg, Virginia. His body was interred in Richmond, Virginia, at Oakwood Cemetery (Grave #145, row L, Div. A).

Henry Phillips enlisted at the age of 32 in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He survived the Civil War, and in 1866 paid his general tax of \$1.58 in Pickens District, S. C. He was a resident of what is now Oconee County, S. C.


Hampton Phillips was a private in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters, C. S. A. He died of disease on June 15, 1862, at Petersburg, Virginia. His wife was Adeline (Morgan) Phillips, who died January 14, 1904, at the age of 68. She was buried at Oolenoy Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C. She received a Civil War widow's pension in 1888. This soldier's home was in the Table Rock area of what today is Pickens County.

Jeremiah Phillips enlisted in Capt. William King Easley's Cavalry Company. He was a corporal and was promoted to first sergeant on May 26, 1862. His unit became Co. F, 2nd South Carolina Cavalry, in which he was elected a second lieutenant on October 24, 1862. The company was later designated as Co. A, 4th Battalion South Carolina Cavalry.

Joel S. Phillips was a son of Jefferson Phillips (b. ca 1825) and Jane Phillips (b. ca 1827) of what today is Oconee County, S. C. He served in Co. E, 1st South Carolina State Troops.

James B. Phillips has a grave marker in the cemetery of Long Creek Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C. He served in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles. He survived the Civil War, and in 1866 paid his general tax of \$1.75 in Pickens County. His grave marker does not have birth and death dates.

Iohn E. Phillips was born February 2, 1842. He served in Co. G, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. This soldier enlisted in that unit on April 22, 1862, under Capt. J. Jamison, and served in the C. S. A. until he was paroled at Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865. On October 22, 1912, Phillips applied to the U.D. C. for a Confederate Cross of Honor, and his application was endorsed by Confederate veterans T. J. Werner and A. S. Davis. On September 20, 1919, this former soldier of the C. S. A. applied for a Civil War pension. The application was attested by A. S. Davis, who served in Co. L, 1st S. C. Rifles, and by B. J. Johnston, who served in Co. I, 62nd North Carolina Infantry. The wife of John E. Phillips was Julia A. Phillips (d. 23 Sep 1938), and the couple had at least two children. This veteran of the Civil War resided in Central township of Pickens County, S. C., and he died January 30, 1921. He was buried at Corinth Baptist Church #2, which today is known as Bishop Branch Baptist Church in northern Anderson County, S. C.



#### OLD GRAVEYARD SPARKS LOCAL INTEREST

Jennie Boggs, JoAnn O'Kelley, and Rolann Lee, out of interest and curiosity, visited with Benny and Helen Burton last Tuesday afternoon, March 14, 2006, to find out about an old cemetery located on the Burton property. After following the directions written in an article from an old Tugaloo Tribune dated March 30, 1926, actually 80 years ago, the three found the graveyard about as described in the article. However, over the years from 1926 until now weather and nature have taken a toll on the old rocks. Some graves are just marked with field rock.

Mary Doran's and J.A. Lemar's are still legible. The group found none of the other stones with inscriptions. The old chimney is not recognizable. Benny and Helen Burton did not know about the chimney. "It probably was gone years before our owning on this property," they concluded.

Jennie Boggs found the following article about the cemetery, but didn't know exactly where it was located until recently. Paul Kankula and Gary Flynn had located and recorded it for the Oconee County GenWeb Tombstone Inscription Project at <a href="http://www.rootsweb.com/~cemetery/southcarolina/oconee.html">http://www.rootsweb.com/~cemetery/southcarolina/oconee.html</a>. Boggs has been intrigued with the Doran family for a long time. "I love the articles about them living in Westminster," she said. Boggs added, "Another interesting writer is Oliver M. Abbott. Also, an interesting article, "In Days of Yoe" by William I. Dickson is very good." The following article appeared in the Tugaloo Tribune March 30, 1926:

#### AN OLD GRAVEYARD

To the left of the road from Westminster to Toccoa, about three miles from Westminster, as one looks he sees a large dead poplar standing some 400 yards to the left of the road. About 200 yards beyond the poplar, on the crest of the hill, and lying between the poplar and tall dump of saw dust, marking the site of an old saw mill, lies an old cemetery, in which there are at present twenty graves marked with stones gathered from the surrounding section.

One grave has a tomb stone some three feet tall and some two feet wide, made by hand by some crude artist, and it ahs the following inscription: "Here lies the body of Mary Doran, wife of James Doran. Departed this life on June 6th, 1805, in the 47th year of her age." This grave has a tomb erected over it of stones gathered from the surrounding section about two feet tall and four feet broad. The tomb is still in a good state of preservation, considering that it was built over a century ago, perhaps. Next to the above tomb there is a stone of similar size with following inscription: "Here lies the body of Juannah Nichols, daughter of J. & H. Nichols, died in the fourth year of her age." Still another tomb stone has the following: "Here lies the body of J. A. Lemar.

Frost and snow and time and erosion and moss and decay and perhaps other things have erased the remainder of the inscription.

Still another smaller stone has the following: "1813 DIED June." And one other has the following: "D.J., March 1, 1835." On the hill side further over from the road and closer to the poplar are the remains of an old chimney, apparently indicating the location of a former residence or of an old church.

The foregoing facts would indicate to an observer that as early as 1805 and as late as 1835 the old grave yard was used for interment. Below the old chimney site is a pool which is perhaps furnished with its water by a spring now hidden or covered. This was no doubt the residence of an old settler who located here during the early days of the history of the section. It is possible that an old church was located on the site. The country was early settled by Irish and Scotch who came in from the north, and removed westward with the encroachments of population.

The March winds now sigh over the tombs and the pine and oak trees sing a dirge over the old chimney site. Here over one hundred years ago, the primitive settler raised his Indian corn and pumpkins and potatoes. Here before the hearth of the old chimney he warmed his toes on frosty nights. The virgin forests around furnished plenty of good wood. The hillsides were alive with turkeys, squirrels, and quails. Mussels and catfish were found in Chauga and Tugaloo. Deer lay in the shades of the undergrowth. Venison furnished savory dishes for his repast. Opossum was caught in the fall. He would not stop to eat a ground hog. Who would eat ground hog when he could have venison? I heard a man say some time since that a ground hog was good to eat when properly cooked. His son partly denied it. The old gentleman said it was as good as coon. But how good is that? Would not a dog be about as good? Let those who know speak. I tried coon once, but it was burned until it was bitter, and it was not very savory. Dog was a popular food with the Indians. They also perhaps ate groundhog. But, it would appear that the ground hog should be saved to prognosticate the weather.

Who were the neighbors of Mary Doran and Juannah Nichols, J.A. Lamar and D.J?. Old Fort Madison had its population, large or small, either then or later. Old Chauga church was not far away with its membership as early as 1818. Report has it that this church was formerly, and before the Civil war, located beyond Chauga creek and near the Tugaloo.

It is evident that beyond Tugaloo on the Georgia side there resided about 1818 near Oaky Grove the Brantleys, Wylies, Suttons, Martins, Meeks, Thompsons, Woffords, Dobsons, McCraries, Englands, Clarkes, Camps, Sanders, Robertsons, Blairs, Smiths, Balls, Whites, Bryants, Starrets, Holders, Holmes, Taylors, Clevelands, Machins and others. Rev. Littleton Meeks was a Baptist minister. He was held in high repute. He was among the founders of old Tugaloo Association.

Dobson and Garrett had a store house on the Georgia side where they sold silk, cotton, linen, thread, groceries, rum, whiskey, cider, cordial, gin and bounce. All these articles if merchandise are mentioned in their old account book and others besides. Pocket books, mirrors, and other household necessities were recorded as charged to the accounts of the settlers.

Sometimes a man would buy a half pint of cordial and a half pint of "bounce" the same time. He perhaps mixed these ingredients. They no doubt made him "bounce". Rum was very popular. But even that would not give a man the "Jim-Jams" like this modern potash, tobacco juice, poison concoction that is slipped around the barn and drunk in secret to one's destruction. by: Walter M. Lee.

#### A Brief History of Courtenay Manufacturing Co. and the Village of Newry

I think I would be amiss to write a history of any town that was not, and suddenly became one, in one year, without recognizing the founders and the driving events that led to its existence. Anything that exists has a determined connection, and Newry's began in Charleston, SC. after a certain family, named Courtenay, chose to immigrate to America in 1791. They came from a small town called Newry on the Clanrye River in Northern Ireland. Mr. Edward Courtenay and his wife had several children, one of whom, William, born in 1831, eventually became the founding father of this little town called Newry. After his formal education.

William Courtenay became a book seller and publisher in Charleston. He later became the Head of the Business Department of The Charleston Mercury Newspaper. William Courtenay joined the militia in Charleston County early on, and as a result, was called to the defense of The Confederacy at the very beginning of the Civil War. He saw action both in Virginia and South Carolina. However with the fall of The Confederacy, he had nothing left but faith and hope. General Sherman had destroyed most of the railroads, further delaying the South's recovery. So Mr. Courtenay seized the first opportunity that came his way, which was carting raw cotton between Newberry and Orangeburg, SC. From this base he began his upward climb.

In 1865, William Courtenay started a shipping business in Charleston. This business grew and soon had freight moving to the main ports in the Northeast and also overseas. From this venture he procured enough capital to expand beyond his shipping interests.

Mr. Courtenay entered the political arena and was elected Mayor of Charleston in 1879. He was reelected in 1883, and during his second term, was faced with the tremendous challenge of restoring the city to normalcy after the deadly earthquake of 1886. This tragedy caused the deaths of twenty-seven people, inflicted many injuries and wreaked much property damage within the city. With his, and other citizens' judicious efforts, the city soon recovered.

Mr. Courtenay later was instrumental in influencing the State Legislature to establish the State Historical Commission, which has served the citizens of South Carolina well for many years.

After his two terms as mayor of Charleston, Mr. Courtenay was ready to accept a new challenge. His experience in the shipping business made him acutely aware of the advantage of having the manufacturing process as close as possible to the raw product, hence, the idea of a textile manufacturing plant was born. He was as well aware of the topographical requirements of such a large undertaking. Taking this into account, he selected the Piedmont section of South Carolina and narrowed his choice to Oconee County with its untapped water resources flowing unhindered out of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Among other criteria he considered was the expanding rural population with its eagerness for "real pay" and more favorable living conditions. He knew that a new, clean village with more conveniences and steady pay would draw the sharecroppers like iron to a magnet. The land was available, the site was selected and the dream evolved as a reality.

On April 21, 1893, Captain William A Courtenay. Frances J. Pelzer, William B. Whaley, R. C. Rhett, W. B. S. Hayward, and John C. Carey filed with the Secretary of State, J. E. Tindale, a petition that they be commissioned to form a corporation and this was immediately granted. This new corporation was issued a license to manufacture all goods of every kind pertaining to textiles-cotton, wool, and other fibers. They were permitted to perform spinning, weaving, dyeing, finishing, and the selling of all goods manufactured. An allowance to grind and mill wheat, corn and other grains, along with the making of any tools and materials deemed necessary to the construction and manufacturing process was granted. This allowance included the clearing, sawing, and finishing of timber prevalent at the site of the new village and attendant property. The charter became the birth certificate of a factory, a village, and a community that was destined to mold the lives of thousands of individuals for almost one hundred years.

So the construction of the Courtenay Manufacturing Company began in 1893. Two or three seasoned construction engineers had been brought in to oversee the project. Ground was being leveled, virgin pine and oak timber was falling and brick was being kilned, and all things directed toward the fruition of a dream were moving expeditiously. The cooperation of management and labor, along with a ready source of materials from a pristine wilderness, much like the Cherokee had left it, was becoming a factory and a village.

The mill dam on Little River was completed, the head and tail races finished, and the water wheels installed. Anticipating the installation of all the pertinent machinery, the engineers primed and activated the water wheels on June 14. 1894. With a large quantity of cotton on hand, many laborious hours were given to the completion of the spur railroad. A steam locomotive, later to be affectionately called "The Dummy" by the locals, was furnished by the R & D Railway Company.

The village was slowly taking on the character of a small town. Four eight-room houses had been built along with forty-seven six-room ones. Most were of the salt box design. Others would be built soon, along with a boarding house. Necessary out buildings were

finished. A mill office was constructed, as well as the company store with a large meeting hall above and a storage building behind. Pastures were cleared, and barns were built. A village "calaboose" was erected, and a town constable was hired. All diverse elements of the village construction were speedily taking form. Soon, a schoolhouse, a church, a post office, and a barber shop would be built. The cotton gin was being erected to accommodate the local farmers and afford the plant a ready supply of cotton without the added cost of freight.

The employees were growing in number, and some were already moving into the new, comfortable houses, soon to be equipped with electricity and water flowing sewer system. Teachers, hired for the new grammar school would teach in the community hall while the new schoolhouse was being built.

The main road, of course, had already been prepared and was in constant use. Mr. John Boggs and a Mr. Kelly were in charge of setting out elm trees on both sides of Main Street. These trees would grow to a majestic, uniform height, adding much comfort and beauty to the village.

Wells were dug and installed with iron hand pumps, but in short time, were replaced with a modem pump driven water system supplying household water and water for the sewer system. This was a tremendous improvement for the benefit of the employees in those early years.

The company store, a village "gem" itself afforded the inhabitants a ready source of almost all their needs. If one were asked what goods were available, the answer was "Everything". With everything now in place, a unified symbiotic relationship was agreed upon between the management and the employees. Therefore, the new factory in the backwoods and the residents of the village of Newry became one in effort and purpose. The factory began its initial production in September, 1884 and even though it changed owners three or four times, it maintained steady production until May, 1975, a period of eighty-one years.

In the early years of operation, a goodly number of setbacks were experienced, causing major drops in production. Several droughts occurred, reducing the water flow through the races and depleting the effectiveness of the water wheels. But on several occasions the setbacks were caused by too much water. Early in June, 1903, a late spring freshet of enormous proportion fell on the mountains and Piedmont of South Carolina, resulting in a flood of such magnitude that was before unheard of in this part of the country. The Courtenay Plant, as most all textile plants were, was located adjacent to the river. This resulted in a major inundation of the lower levels of the plant. The water stood nine and one-half feet in the lower weave room. The warehouse was washed from its foundation and bales of cotton water-born downstream. Three village houses, distinctly of a lower elevation than the village proper, were victims of the flood. The tenacious efforts of management and labor soon overcame this historic calamity. Over the years high water was an occasional problem, but nothing of this magnitude would recur. Although in 1915, nature's unpredictable forces would try again, the damage was nowhere near that of 1903. Among other setbacks beyond Management's control and affecting plant production was an outbreak of small pox in 1910. This deadly disease was kept in check by bringing in some experts in this field from other areas of the state and country. The records state that with the exception of about one hundred residents, all were vaccinated with a total of almost eight hundred having participated. Another health assault, more devastating to the community than the small pox outbreak, was the widespread influenza epidemic of 1918. This scourge caused numerous deaths and much suffering. From a population of nine hundred, seven hundred were stricken; one can only imagine what a deplorable effect this bad on the production of the plant. Nevertheless this adversity was overcome, as were the others. In earlier years, Mr. William Courtenay developed medical problems and consequently moved to Columbia. SC., where he died in 1908. The Board of Directors appointed Mr. Campbell Courtenay president of the plant, a position he held until it became necessary to sell the plant in April 1920. The transaction to sell Courtenay Manufacturing was executed forthrightly, with the chief stockholders being Mr. J. W. Cannon Sr., Mr. W. L. Gassaway, and Mr. Ralph Ramseur. Mr. Cannon and Mr. Gassaway were the chief Operators of Issaquenna Mill of Central, SC. On July 29. 1920, at a meeting of the Board of Directors, the following officers representing the new owners were duly elected: Mr. W.L. Gassaway as President and Treasurer, Mr. Ralph Ramseur as vice-president and Assistant Treasurer, and Mr. V.Q. Gregory as Secretary. Mr. James M. Alexander, the plant Superintendent, remained in that position. With the addition of two new Board members, identified as Mr. J. W. Norwood of Greenville, SC. and Mr. F. J. Haywood of Kannapolis. N. C., the inner operation of Courtenay Manufacturing began to take on a new direction. These changes were concomitant with the Great Stock Market Crash of 1929, leaving one to wonder whether or not a connection existed.

In December, 1929, Mr. W. L. Gassaway tendered his resignation as acting President and Treasurer with Mr. Ralph Ramseur being elected in his stead. At this time the "Great Depression" was in full sway, and curtailing and shutdowns were evident throughout the textile industry. The Newry citizens were compelled to exist on a bare minimum budget. Union organizers from the North flocked South to organize the mill workers, but without much success at Newry. Although the residents of Newly seemed to be always loyal to the management and owners, the organizers caused much unrest and lasting animosities in some of the mill villages.

With the National Recovery Act, the Wage and Hour Law, the implementation of three eight-hour shifts, and other FDR programs, the textile industry began to slowly emerge from the Depression. The people of Newry began to have greater hope for continued

employment, while all these programs were being implemented. Even so, most of the individually owned plants had a nip and tuck existence throughout the rest of the 1930's.

On February 9, 1934, the Cannon Mill Interest of Kannapolis, North Carolina purchased the Courtenay Plant with all additional properties. Because of a depressed textile market and a perceived lack of demand for goods woven on the narrow 'E model' looms, Cannon opted to liquidate the plant on March 19, 1939. Operations were halted at the plant, and it, along with its properties, was offered for sale. This portended bad times for the employees and citizens of Newry. While some employees sought employment at other plants, most remained, hoping for a new owner. And soon their hopes and prayers were answered by the Abney Mills Group of Greenwood, South Carolina, which purchased the plant, the village, and hundreds of acres of the surrounding properties. Having a plan to upgrade all obsolete machinery, the progressive Abney chain began ordering the latest spinning equipment available and initiating a complete overhaul of the weave room machinery. The owners eventually had all departments moving at top speed, while turning out a quality textile product. The Management was well pleased, and the inhabitants of Newry were even more pleased. Because of Abney's effort and dedication to purpose, the employees felt more secure than ever.

The start of World War Two brought about an inflated demand for all textile products, and so the Courtenay Plant operated at breakneck speed to fulfill all orders. This pace of supplying the needs of American and Allied industry lasted until the later months of 1946, but the good market demand actually did not end until the recession of the early 1950's. These years marked the genesis onslaught of foreign imports, and by the 1980's, the on-going appearement policy of Washington would almost guarantee decimation into the textile industry of such gravity the South had never known before.

But at least in the mid 1940's and throughout the 1950's, the small village of Newry would still benefit from the previous and lingering successes of the Abney textile industry. In the mid 1940's, Abney Mills began to spend many thousands of dollars to renovate and upgrade the entire village of Newry. All necessary repairs to the village domiciles were effected with new Paint jobs inside and out. Two complete bathrooms were installed in each house, and several new brick duplex houses were built with others being remodeled. Sidewalks were constructed, and all roads were upgraded with paving, curbing and drainage. Suffice it to say that the entire infrastructure and living conditions of Newry Village improved immensely in the '40's and '50's.

With this vast improvement of the village of Newry came more expenditures to increase production within the plant. Due to foreign imports and the highly competitive nature of the textile industry, Abney began revamping each department in the plant and replacing outmoded machinery. With the "Fifties" drawing to a close, Abney Management chose to sell the mill village in 1959. To this end were several contributing factors. The labor and material to maintain approximately one hundred twenty village houses were becoming progressively expensive. Also, the village responsibility having been removed, all energy and effort could be redirected toward the productivity and profitability of the manufacturing process. The sale of the village would as well provide a ready source of capital for the further modernization of the machinery. The disposing of mill villages by owner textile companies seemed to be a trend in the industry throughout the South.

In the hectic decade of the "Sixties", the textile industry was beset with OSHA regulations, civil rights laws, and environmental clean-up mandates. These new laws and regulations seemed to foretell the demise of all the old four-story, smokestack textile mills throughout the country. Not being very adaptive to the modern requirement of these federal laws, most of these mills were without sufficient cash flow to comply with the new laws and realize a reasonable profit expectation at the same time. In order to accommodate federal regulations, many plants, such as the one at Newry, effected expenditures of monies dedicated only to a lost cause.

In the early 1970's, with inflation plaguing the nation and interest rates bordering on twenty per cent, industry was reluctant to borrow money for investment. The prevailing doubt was whether or not a business could realize a profit large enough to pay interest on money borrowed. Consequently, the owners of Abney Mills decided to close the Courtenay Plant in May, 1975, and only four years later, the remaining eight plants of the Abney chain were closed. But there existed a greater ramification in the closings of these plants---a bell had tolled, signifying the end of a way of life for hundreds of thousands of textile workers throughout the South. Separated only by distance, every mill village of the past had merged with the other to form an entity, a common persona, never again to unfold the joyous experience shared in the textile community by so many generations of working people and dedicated family.

#### THE GRAVEYARD HILL

By J.L. Gaillard

On the Abney Mill property at Newry there are three old graveyards. Two of these are family burial plots and the other a community cemetery established sometime around 1895 for the employees of Courtenay Mill and their families. This cemetery has not been used in many years; the most recent marker being dated 1927, and to the best of my knowledge it has not been used since.

- 1.) C020 God's Acre / Graveyard Hill (Newry community cemetery)
- 2.) C210 Catherine Whitmire (1 grave from Newry ball park area)

- 4.) C211 Unknown Name-(211) (4 adult graves from Abney Mill area)

When I was a child this was known by parents and children alike as "The Graveyard Hill." All of the older employees of Courtenay Mill will vividly remember this, and others wWho have gone to the various Abney Plants from this community will also recall memories of those days. I can remember many times asking my mother permission to go over on "The Graveyard Hill" to play cowboy or just to romp and explore as children are apt to do. This general vicinity also comprised a large wooded area and a vast meadow known as "The Pasture Hill" which was also used as a golf course where the mill officials and their friends knocked cheap golf balls with old type wooden shaft clubs. We children never played in the graveyard but sometimes we would go inside the burial area to read the inscriptions on the tombstones. Incidentally, I still like to visit old cemeteries for the same purpose. I sometimes wonder who these people are, what their likes and interests were and what great revelations of life they could impart to one if this great chasm could be bridged.

When Mr. Clyde Cole, photographer for Quills magazine, called and asked if, I would accompany him to this cemetery. I naturally agreed since I knew he would never find it alone. After awhile, Clyde arrived and in a short time we began our journey. The graveyard is not too distant from the village but as the name our forefathers gave it implies, it is atop a quite steep hill. The trail leading there has grown steeper over the years. So Clyde and I elected to exercise wisdom instead of leg muscles and ride around the "River Road" a way, and then walk the more distant but less inclined saw mill road that winds its leisurely way upward to the cemetery.

It was a normal, humid, hot morning in July with the small talk of insects and birds, ever prevalent at this time of year. Slightly intruding on our thoughts, like background music being piped from some distant place. I could feel small beads of perspiration on my lip and forehead and I casually glanced at Clyde to see it he, too, was being affected so soon. He was, but I made no comment. The road rose gradually up the hill being lined on each side with lovely pines and other trees common to our area. Clyde remarked how nice it would be to live in a place like this, everything seemed so peaceful and serene. A short distance over the hill a hound pursued a rabbit that was unknowingly coming our way. As we were very quiet, as I always like to be when I am in the fields or woods, the hare nor the hound paid the least attention to us. We looked backwards along the way we had come and saw the hare cross in a leisurely sort of way. Shortly the hound crossed, too, with his deep resonant voice echoing across the valley. He, too, was taking his own good time as if the rules of this game had been predetermined as to pace and distance and what the ultimate outcome would be. Sometimes it seems this way with animals, but the thought ironically occurred to me that we humans were always rushing to the graveyard.

We stopped occasionally to remark to each other on the various items we noted along the way. The tracks of a vehicle that had been by long before, the almost obliterated footprint of some other sojourner who previously had passed this way, and of course, we had to dispense with the common conversation of two people who like to reminisce.

Upon our arrival at our destination I was much surprised that I could not walk directly to the place. The hands of time had been busy working while I slept. Where violets and daffodils once grew, pine trees, wild shrubs, and other vegetation had taken full sway. They grew at random, not honoring even one sacred spot. Even the tombstones were hard to find, but we managed. We moved from grave to grave reading each inscription, commenting on names and ages. Many of the family names were familiar to me, but of course I knew none of the people personally, since most had died before I was born. The one thing that we particularly noted was the high mortality rate of infants and very young children. In fact, a most startling percentage, perhaps three out of four of the graves belonged to children in the pre-school or early school ages. We thought this most horrifying, but Clyde did comment that a thing like this most likely was accepted with some expectancy in those days.

We ambled around awhile. Meantime, Clyde was making photographs here and there and commenting on points of interest concerning each grave. Soon he had seen enough. As we were leaving, I took one backward glance and immediately thought what a pity that no one seems to care for the condition of this old graveyard, and for some reason, perhaps because of a deep sense of guilt within me, I did not mention this to Clyde. Then the thought came to me, why could not people everywhere adopt a grave to tend where it was obvious that no one else could? I am sure that it would be a most gratifying avocation. Yet the preacher said long ago in Ecclesiastics 9-5, these words, "For the living know that they shall die but the dead know not anything neither have they anymore a reward; for the memory of them is forgotten."

Listed on the Francis Vernod Census of 1721 as Oakenni (Ukwu'ni, Oconee) having 57 men, 52 women, and 75 children for a total of 184. (Goodwin: 108-109)

Herbert's Journal. Saturday, February 24, 1727.

"We set away this morning from Keewohee & went to Oucony where We Stay'd till Munday the 26<sup>th</sup> day of Febry: 1727. Set away from Ouconey & went to Chagey. Munday the 5<sup>th</sup> day of March 1727. We went to Ouconey where We stay'd till Wednesday the 7<sup>th</sup> day of March 1727." (Herbert: 26, 28-29)

#### 1775. William Bartram

May 15. "The Savana, now called Keowee, above its confluence with the Tugilo, the west main branch. The country uneven, by means of ridges of hills and water cources, The hills somewhat rocky near their summits and the banks of rivers and creeks, but very fertile, as there is a good depth of a loose dark and most vegetative mould."

"The Cherokee town of Seneca is a very respectable settlement, situated on the east bank of the Keowee River, though the greatest number of Indian habitations are on the opposite shore, where likewise stands the council-house, in a level plain between the beautiful lofty hills, which rise magnificently."

"... to view the ample Oconee vale, encircled by a wreath of uniform hills...I began to ascend the Oconee Mountain. On the foot of the hills are ruins of the ancient Oconee Town."

#### 1787. Andre Michaux

"On my return I heard the news of hostilities between the Creek Nation and the Georgians. The residents remaining in the countryside around Seneca had assembled to construct a fort and retreat there. They are afraid that the Cherokees who don't have any chief except those who govern the individual villages would join the Creeks."

#### September 12, 1787. Andrew Pickens

"I have received a letter from Col. Anderson, of the 4th Inst. From his plantation near Seneca, informing that on the evening before, at the plantation of Samuel Isaacs, the uppermost on the west side of Toogolo River, Isaacs son about 13 years of age was killed and scalped with a woman child & little Negro taken prisoner, supposed to be done by Creek Indians, it appears this was but a small party of Indians and they went immediately off, and carried very little out of the house with them, this has allarmed the inhabitants on the Carolina side of the river very much... we can only expect to hear of the perpetration of such acts of savage cruelty, committed on the defenceless inhabitants, in all quarters of an extensive frontier...".

#### 1788. Committee of the State House of Representatives

"a post not exceeding 50 men be kept on the frontiers, and that the men receive the pay of infantry and be clothed in blue coats, waistcoats, and overalls, and well armed and accourted, and that the said men shall be enlisted for 6 months certain and 12 months if found requisite by the Governor and council, and that they be officered by the Governor".

#### 20 Sept. 1792. Robert Anderson

"I send you, enclosed, the affidavit of Jesse Spears, who will also be the bearer of this... This man escaped from the Cherokees in the year 1775, and came to our settlements, and gave us notice of a premeditated stroke then intended by the Cherokees against the frontier settlements. He was the only one who escaped... At another time in 1782 the same man came down, and gave notice of a strong party of Indians and Tories who were to rendezvous... to male a stroke in the frontiers settlements... I mention those circumstances to strengthen belief of his present information. I have ordered the people to build blockhouses, where they are exposed and intimidated, to fly to with their families, in case of alarm. I have frontier blockhouses built and building, at suitable places along our frontiers, at the distance of about eight or ten miles apart... I have ordered trusty spies to be constantly kept out at Tugalo and at the Oconee Mountain, as they are the spots (in all appearances) which will be most exposed. I have ordered a few men from the more interior part of the regiment, to each of the frontier post; but in some places, there is difficulty in providing them with provisions, the settlements being thin on the frontier, the people poor, and their improvements and crops small."

#### April 1792. Grand Jury of Washington District (Judicial district for Pendleton and Greenville Counties)

"We bear testimony to the vigilant spirit by which both officers and men were actuated during the late alarm from the Indians. We gratefully acknowledge the attention of the legislature (knowing the importance of its frontier counties) to their personal safety and property from the depredations of the Indians – at the same time we lament and believe, they have been instigated, supported and encouraged by unprincipled white men who associate with them".

#### April 29, 1793. Governor Telfair, Gov. of Georgia

"Blood has been spilt in every direction on the extended frontier of this State, and one man killed in the State of South Carolina."

#### May 9, 1793. The Georgia Gazette

"... a general Indian uprising and war on the frontiers of the Southern states seems inevitable... a man was killed and scalped by the Creeks on the SC side of the Tugalo River on April 8".

#### 1793. Henry Knox, US Secretary of War

"...a few scouts, or spies who are formed of the hardiest and best hunters, and who shall be advanced a few miles of the settlements, traversing incessantly, at right angles, the paths most used by the Indians, are better calculated to give the alarm to the settlers, and secure them from danger, than any other species of troops whatever."

#### December 16, 1793

A report? SC State Records? Located in PRT overview of Oconee Station. "Captain Blake Malden is due payment " Lieut. Stephen Willis 4 horsemen & 12 Infantry doing duty at the Oconee Station from the 5th to 19th October."

#### October 12, 1793 - January 12, 1794. Payroll records

Lieutenant William Bennett, 4 spies, 3 sergeants, 1 drummer, 10 privates of infantry.

#### December 1793. SC State Legislature

"The Committee have considered the expediency of the Governors having kept up the post on the frontiers, tho " no actual violence had been committee by the Indians on any citizens of this state, and they are of opinion that the present unsettled state of the minds of the Indians and the actual state of hostility existing between our adjacent sister states & the Indians might expose our frontiers to depredations unless covered by some respectable post on the frontiers, made it highly proper for the governor to keep up the posts on the frontiers, and that the expenses ought to be provided."

#### 1794

Henry Knox, U.S. Secretary of War In a letter to Andrew Pickens" beef up the guard at Oconee Station."

#### Flynn, The Militia in the Backcountry. 1783-1799

"The group would increase the force from its present strength of one captain, one lieutenant, and thirty noncommissioned officers and privates with 20 of them horsemen to a force of one captain, two lieutenants, four seargents four spies and 46 privates with 30 of the privates mounted. The men would be divided between 2 post toogalo and Oconee Stations. Pay for foot soldiers would be 6.50 a month with rations and some clothing provided. Horsemen finding horses and arms at their own risk would receive three shillings a day with rations and forage. Spies would get \$1 a day."

#### December 19, 1794. SC State Legislature (paraphrased)

Too much money is being spent on the frontier defenses. The federal government is requested to provide reimbursement for sums that the state has already spent. Federal garrisons are established in Georgia.

#### January 1795

The guard on the frontier is reduced to:"1 lieutenant, 30 noncommissioned officers and privates, 12 of whom are horsemen."

#### November 19, 1796. Benjamin Hawkins, Principal Temporary Agent for Indian Affairs South of the Ohio.

"there are several traders down from the Cherokees who have come to the Ocunna Station with pack horses, and taken their skins and furs, about 30 wagon loads, from thense to Charleston; the price of wagonage is 2 dollars, 12 cents per horse; the average price for some years past is \$2.50. There are at that station 20 militia, 4 of them mounted. The distance from the Ocunna to Hopewell is 23 miles, and from this to Charleston 240 miles."

#### November 21, 1796. Hawkins

"I set out from General Pickens to the Ocunna station, after having been fited out with whatever was necessary by most friendly hospitality of the General and his lady. I crossed the Keowee near his house and traveled W.N. W. up the river

through an uneaven broken country 11 miles to Cane Creek. Here I met a trader from Pine Log, and Notetsenchanssaie with his brothers, halfbreeds; they have uniformly supported a fair character. He sent his nephew, Tom Pettit, a decent, orderly young man with me to Ocunna to provide a pilot and interpreter for me, 8 miles father I crossed a small creek and arrived at William Richards, a trader who lives the station; he was from home, but his clerk, Mr. Cleveland, was there, and furnished me with such accomodations as he had, being pretty good. There I added to my traveling stock a bear skin and some things necessary to procure provisions from the Indians on my way."

#### November 25, 1796. Hawkins (paraphrasing Lt. Moseley commanding officer of Oconee Station Garrison)

"... every other day a scout is sent out from the Ocunna station as far as the Tugalo River, and this has had some effect in lessening depredations in the area".

#### 1796. Hawkins

"David Moseley is unconcerned about encroachments by settlers on Indian Land...When I informed him of the law and the necessity for enforcing it Moseley responded that although he has heard of the law, he had never seen it."

#### 1796. Hawkins

"...met two Indian women on horseback, driving 10 very fat cattle to market."

#### 1796 - 1797. Garrison size

Lieutenant David Moseley, 1 sergeant, 5 horsemen, 13 infantry

#### 1796-1807

William Richards purchases 8 tracts of land totaling 3,548 acres

#### 1798. The Militia committee of the senate

"recommended that the guard be discharged and the arms conveyed to the magazine at Abbeville... The expense of maintaining forts and guards on the frontier is unreasonable and enormous and should be born by the federal government."

#### 1802. John Drayton

"...it has become unnecessary to continue any longer the guard at the station at the Oconee Mountain."

#### Drayton (date unknown)

"waggons and sledges, are principally of the middle and upper country; the first, for transporting heavy articles to a distance...The wagons carry a load of from two to three tons; their wheels are narrow; and they are drawn by five or six horses. These carriage bring the greater part of the upper country production to market; and fifteen or twenty of them are seen, following each other in the same track."

#### 1804. The City Gazette of Charleston

Margaret Richards Died of a short but painful illness, Miss Peggy Richards, aged 32 years , sister of Mr. William Richards, Merchant, at his store in Pendleton District.

#### 1807. John Lyon

"...near the old military station called the Oconee Station which is now the property of a Mr. Richards where he keeps a store etc. And has extensive dealings with the Indians."

#### 1828. Cyrus Stuart

"Oconey Station, once the resort of many people, now presents a dismal spectacle to the beholder, there is one brick, one stone, and several wooden buildings there yet, with the remains of twain brick houses, which were annihilated by the influence of that element called fire."

#### 17 Feb 1830

The workmen had left the house for a few minutes, and it is supposed that a spark from the chimney caught some shavings on the floor. The wind was high, and all attempts to extinguish the flames were unavailing. The Court House about 200 yards distant, but directly to the windward, was at one time in great danger. A spark was conveyed to the roof and a smoke had just commenced when it was discovered. **Mr. Reid, the Sheriff**, who was also the contractor, had two or three prisoners confined in some of the rooms which were finished, and with some difficulty as we understand, succeeded in saving them from the flames. The loss of Mr. Reid is severe, as we have been informed that his contract, at 2500 dollars, would not under any circumstances, have been a profitable one. We hope however, that the state will grant him relief, as the accident from what we have understood, was one, which could not have been foreseen or prevented.

A few days ago, the horse of Mr. **David Attaway**, a citizen of this District, living on Saluda river, while on his way home from the house of a neighbor, accidentally took fright, and the bridle-bit breaking, left the road, and running through the woods, threw him against a tree which occasioned his death in a short time. Copied from *Edgefield Carolinian*.

Campbell has not been arrested, though it is supposed he is still lurking in the vicinity. He is described as being about 5 feet 6 inches in height, of slender make and sallow complexion. The deceased left a family consisting of a wife and four small children. We received the particulars from a very respectable source, and the murder is described as having been one of the most unprovoked and aggravated character.

Several persons infected with the gold fever have recently gone from this section of country to the Cherokee nation to dig the precious metal. We saw some of them a few days ago on their return home and they confirmed the intelligence previously received, that the Agent, by instruction from the General Government, had ordered the hands employed in the gold business, to leave the Indian territory without delay. Most of them did so, but a few who claimed a lease from the Indians had not gone at the latest accounts. It was said that a detachment of the US troops was on the march for gold region. It is supposed that near 2000 persons have been employed in digging for gold with the limits of the nation, and that a very considerable amount has been found.

Near \$9000 worth has been purchased within the last three weeks by Messrs. **Reers**, **Booth**, and **St. John**, besides what has been bought by the jewelers and others. Copied from *Augusta Chronicle*.

Owner must prove their property and pay costs. **Samuel Reid**, Sheriff.

#### 7 Apr 1830

A merchant in Gwinnett county, we are informed, recently bought one hundred and twelve dozen spades, said to be all in Charleston, for the use of the gold diggers in Habersham. Reprinted in Pendleton Messenger from Georgia Courier.

The commanding officer at Fort Mitchell, Major **P. Wagner**, has issued an order in pursuance of instruction from the War Department, for all white men living in the Creek nation, without permits, or who are not married to Indian women, and entitled to remain there under their laws, to leave the Indian country by the 25<sup>th</sup> inst. Those who fail to obey the order, are to be arrested, and delivered over to the civil authorities of Alabama. Reprinted in Pendleton Messenger from Charleston Courier, March 27, 1830.

Death of **Stephen Elliott** Esq. He died suddenly on Sunday evening the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. of gout in the stomach. **Mr. Elliott** was highly esteemed for his private virtues, and his public services have contributed much to the interest and character of his native state. As a literary man he was distinguished, being the founder of, and one of the principal contributors to the Southern Review, a work which is taking a high stand among the periodicals of the Union. He also published a few years ago a botanical history of South Carolina. He was at the time of his death Professor of Natural Philosophy in the Medical College of Charleston, and President of the Bank of the State. His age was 58.

Hardy is of yellow complexion, about five feet \_\_ inches high, stout made, wearing \_\_ broad cloth coat. **Moses**, who says he belonged to **John Symmes**, living in Oglethorpe Co., GA. **Moses** is rather of a yellow complexion, about five feet, 6 inches high, stout made, wearing a mixed gray coat. **Samuel Reid**, Sheriff.

#### 14 Apr 1830

A writer in a late Washington paper says, "if when a chimney is built, the mortar with which it is to be plastered, be mixed with a little salt, there will be no necessity for sweeping it, as in every damp spell of weather, the salt will deliquesce, and the soot will of course fall down." The theory is plausible.

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
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
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John Marshall Phillips (1836-1920) was a son of George Washington Phillips (b. ca 1812) and Ari (Abbott) Phillips (b. ca 1818). He was born in the western half of Pickens District, S. C., on June 25, 1836. At the age of 25 years, he joined Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment), C. S. A., in which he was promoted from ranks to second lieutenant. His company commander was Capt. Joseph Jeptha Norton (1835-1896) of Walhalla, S. C. He served in the C. S. A. until the end of the U.S. Civil War and rose to the rank of captain while in service. He was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9, 1865. Phillips left Virginia on foot on April 12, 1865, but he found a stray mule on an old battlefield and rode it part of the way home. On December 20, 1865, he married Marie Frances (Sullivan) Burrussnee (7 Apr 1839-20 May 1914), a widow of Anderson District, S. C. He moved his family to Franklin County, Georgia, in 1870 and settled in Carnesville township. He was a farmer there and also served as justice of peace and as clerk of superior court for several terms. He also served as judge of the county court. Phillips was a Baptist, and he served as a church deacon and was once superintendent of its Sunday school. John Marshall Phillips and his wife had at least the following five offspring: Phillips; John J. Phillips; Arie Phillips, who married an Alexander; Martha Phillips, who married an Isbell; and Zelia Phillips. This Confederate soldier's wife died in 1914, and by January 1919, his health failed. Thus he moved into the household of a daughter, Arie (Phillips) Alexander, who resided in Laurenceville, Georgia. About one year later (in December 1919), he was admitted to a hospital in Birmingham, Alabama, and died there January 29, 1920. He was buried in Carnesville City Ceme-

tery in Gwinett County, Georgia, on January 31, 1920.

Jonas Phillips, Jr. was born about 1826, a son of Jonas Phillips, Sr. (b. ca 1791) and Elizabeth Phillips (b. ca 1796). In 1860, he or his father received a land grant of 544 acres in Pickens District, S. C. During the U. S. Civil War, he served in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles, and he was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9, 1865.

Manning Phillips was killed in action on White Oak Road in Virginia on March 30, 1865. He served in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment) and was a resident of what is presently Oconee County, S. C.

Nathaniel Phillips (1845-1920) was born May 21, 1845. He served in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment) and in Ferguson's S. C. Artillery. For a while, he was unaccounted for during the U. S. Civil War. His wife was Tabitha (Wilbanks) Phillips (b. 28 Jul 1844). His parents were Joel L. Phillips (b. ca 1817) and Sarah Phillips (b. ca 1830). This Confederate soldier survived the U. S. Civil War. In 1915, Phillips was a resident of Oconee County, S. C., but his name was not listed on the Civil War pension roll at that time. He attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Rifles in November 1916 at Seneca, S. C. At that time, he resided in Walhalla, S. C. He died January 17, 1920, and his body was interred in the Phillips family cemetery in the Long Creek section of Oconee County, S. C.

O. L. Phillips was a resident of the Dacusville area of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Pickens County). He is believed to

have served in Co. K, 8th S. C. Cavalry (Wade's). His wife was Mary Phillips (b. 1861-d. 29 Dec 1948), who was buried at Nine Forks Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C.

Peter Phillips was about 28 years of age when he enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He was a son of Charlotta Phillips (b. ca 1790) of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County). He died September 1, 1865. (Note: A man named Peter Phillips served in Co. F, 15th S. C. Infantry and died January 1, 1864, at Point Lookout, Maryland, where he was being held as a prisoner of war. Same man?)

Reuben Phillips died of disease at Petersburg, Virginia, and was buried there at Blandford Church. He served in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters.

Wesley Reubin Phillips (1842-1919) served in Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regiment) and in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters. He is listed in some records as Reubin Wesley Phillips or R. W. Phillips. He was born August 13, 1842, and died October 11, 1919. A resident of the Pumpkintown section of Pickens County, S. C., he was buried there at Oolenoy Baptist Church.

W. W. Phillips served as a private in Co. K, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months between June 1862 and January 1863.

William H. Phillips was born about 1835 and was a son of Elizabeth Phillips (b. ca 1784). He served in Co. G, 2nd South Carolina Rifles and in Co. C, 4th S. C. Cavalry. He was transferred to Fort Sumter in 1864. In 1866, he paid his general tax of \$1.90 in Pickens District, S. C. He was buried at Long Creek Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.

Amon Philpot died of disease at Richmond, Virginia on June 15, 1864. He was a private in the 19th South Carolina Cavalry.

Irvin Hutchinson Philpot (1837-1912) lost a leg during the Civil War. He served in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and held the rank of corporal. Then, he served to the rank of captain in Co. H, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was born October 25, 1837, and was a son of Joseph and Emily Vaughn Philpot of the Dacusville community of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Pickens County). He married Jane "Jen-

nie" McBee Alexander (1841-1884), and their children were Mary A. Philpot, Sarah E. Philpot, Mamie V. Philpot, Lula M. Philpot, Jane Philpot, Emma J. "Daisy" Philpot, and Joe Ammon Philpot (1882-1958). In 1893, this Confederate soldier received a voucher of \$26.00 for the purchase of a prosthesis to replace his lost leg. In 1873-1875, he was probate judge of Pickens County. He died February 23, 1912, and was buried at Dacusville Methodist Church in Pickens County, South Carolina.

James Philpot served as a private in the 7th South Carolina Cavalry. He died of disease February 17, 1865, at his home in Pickens District, S. C. He was buried in Mt. Zion Cemetery in Central, S. C. (Pickens County).

Andrew Pickens (1815-1911) had the same name as General Andrew Pickens, the Revolutionary War hero of upstate South Carolina. This Confederate soldier was born March 15, 1815, and he served in Co. D (Gist Rifles), Hampton Legion. His wife was Sarah Pickens (1824-1903). He died August 17, 1911, and was buried at Hopewell United Methodist Church in Oconee County, South Carolina.

Andrew Monroe Pickens (1839?-1862) served in Co. D (Gist Rifles), Hampton Legion. He was a son of Robert and Nancy (Pegg) Pickens, and he died unmarried in Virginia during the Civil War. A memorial marker for this Confederate soldier was placed in the old Pickens Chapel cemetery situated in northern Anderson County, S. C., and it contains the following in-



scription: "Andrew Monroe Pickens of Hampton Legion Co. mortally wounded during the Peninsular Campaign. Thomas Jefferson Pickens, 18th S. C. Reg. died in camp. June 16, 1839-May 17, 1862. Feb 13, 1841-July 30, 1862. Sons of a Unionist father, they died under the Confederate flag defending the principles of the United States Constitution, having loved both nations. Article IV, Amendment X."

John Miles Pickens (1836-1918) was a son of Thomas James Pickens (1808-1894) and Kezia A. (Miles) Pickens (1810-1889). He was a grandson of Ezekiel Pickens and Eliza (Barksdale) Pickens (1782-1859). He served as a private in Co. K, 2nd South Carolina Cavalry. He was born April 27, 1836. This Confederte soldier was a direct descendant of General Andrew Pickens. John Miles Pickens died unmarried at the home of his brother, William P. Pickens, at Easley, S. C., on September 23, 1918 or 1920. He was buried at the Old Stone Church (Hopewell Presbyterian) in Pickens County, South Carolina. This Confederate soldier was a brother of Samuel Bonneau Pickens who also served in the C. S. A. (see below).

Samuel Bonneau Pickens was a son of Thomas Tames Pickens (1808-1894) and Kezia A. (Miles) Pickens (1810-1889), who lived near Pendleton, S. C. This soldier was also a direct descendant of General Andrew Pickens. He served in the 12th Alabama Infantry. He was appointed lieutenant of an infantry in the C. S. A. in March 1861 and rose rapidly in the officer ranks. By the age of only twenty-three years, Pickens was promoted to colonel of his regiment and became known as the "boy colonel." This Confederate soldier was a grandson of Ezekiel and Eliza (Barksdale) Pickens (1782-1859). He was also a brother of John Miles Pickens (see above) who also served in the C. S. A.

**Thomas J. Pickens** served as a third lieutenant in the 16th South Carolina Infantry. He died of disease on July 30, 1862, at Columbia, S. C., and was buried at Pickens Chapel in northern Anderson County, S. C.

Thomas Jefferson Pickens (1841-1862) served in the 18th South Carolina Infantry Regiment, C. S. A. He was a son of William Smith Pickens (6 Feb 1823-20 May 1907) and Julia Ann (Welborn) Pickens (29 Oct 1825-17 Jun 1857). This Confederate soldier was born February 12,

1841. He died unmarried in Virginia on May 17, 1862. He was a brother of John Miles Pickens, who also served in the C. S. A.

John Birdsey Pickett (1842-1912) was born January 11, 1842, in Knoxville, Tennessee. He served in Co. I, 26th Tennessee Infantry under Confederate General Simon B. Buckner (1823-1914). He married Martha Cornelia McFall (18 Dec 1843-30 Dec 1925) on February 17, 1869. The wedding took place in Pickens County, S. C., and was performed by the Rev. William McWhorter. This soldier's wife was a daughter of Samuel R. McFall (6 Mar 1803-27 Jun 1862) and Anna (Warnock) McFall (25 Aug 1801-1 Sep 1873). John Birdsey Pickett died November 30, 1912, and was buried at Richland Presbyterian Church in Oconee County, S. C. This Confederate veteran's wife, Martha Cornelia, resided in Oconee County in 1915, but her name was not included in the Civil War widow's pension roll at that time.

William J. Pickel enlisted in Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment) at Pendleton, S. C., on June 2, 1861, and was mustered into service at Columbia, S. C. He also served to the rank of sergeant in Co. A and Co. K, 6th South Carolina Cavalry. He married Martha C. (Craig) Ariail (18331-1908), widow of John H. Ariail (1833-1862). In 1882, he established a saw mill about two miles west of Pickens, S. C. (Note: A man named William Pickel died in the Pickens County Poor House on June 23, 1896, at the age of about 62. Was he this Confederate veteran?)

William Royer Pickerel served as a private in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry Volunteers at Pendleton, S. C., and he was listed as present on the company's muster roll of December 31, 1861.

Frederick W. "Fred" Pieper was a member of the German settlement at Walhalla, South Carolina. He was born in Hanover, Germany on July 10, 1846, and arrived at Charleston, S. C. on November 20, 1853. Then, on October 20, 1856, he applied for U. S. citizenship. At the age of sixteen years, he enlisted in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He survived the Civil War and died December 3, 1903. This Confederate veteran was buried at St. John's Lutheran Church in Walhalla (Oconee County), South Carolina.

Henry William Pieper (1836-1894) served in

Co. A, South Carolina Light Artillery (Wagener's Co.). He was a member of the German settlement at Walhalla, S. C. He was born on November 10, 1836, in Prussia (Germany) and came to the United States in 1853. On October 17, 1860, he applied for U. S. citizenship. He married Johannah Ahrens (28 Oct 1835-1 Apr 1923) on March 8, 1859, in Walhalla, S. C. The wedding ceremony was performed by the Rev. C. F. Bansemer. After the U. S. Civil War, this Confederate became a well-known merchant in Walhalla, S. C. He was elected mayor of the town in 1867. He died June 24, 1894, and was buried at St. John's Lutheran Church in Walhalla (Oconee County), South Carolina.

Isham Pierce was a son of William Pierce (b. ca 1794) and Nancy Pierce (b. ca 1810) of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County). He served as a private in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles. He was a brother of James Pierce and Martin Pierce, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. (see below).

James Pierce was born about 1843, a son of William Pierce (b. ca 1794) and Nancy Pierce (b. ca 1810). During the U. S. Civil War, he served in Companies C and K of the 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He was killed in action at Sharpsburg, Maryland during the Civil War. He was a brother or Isnam Pierce (see above) and Martin Pierce (see below), both of whom also served in the C. S. A. Note: In one source, this Confederate soldier was listed as having died of disease at age twenty at Richmond, Virginia, on October 15, 1863. Does anyone know the exact cause and place of this soldier's death?

Martin Pierce was born about 1837 and served in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). He was unaccounted for during the U. S. Civil War, according to his company's records. This soldier was a brother of Isham Pierce and James Pierce, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. (see above).


Mitchel Pilgrim served as a private in Co. K, 3rd South Carolina State Troops for six months between June 1862 and January 1863.


Samuel J. Pilgrim was born about 1844, a son of Jefferson Pilgrim (b. ca 1801) and Hannah Eades Pilgrim (b. ca 1815). His mother was a half Cherokee Indian (Cherokee Claims #16173, Eastern Cherokees). He enlisted in the C. S. A. at Pendleton, S. C., on April 14, 1861, and served in Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regt.). After his initial one-year enlistment ended, he served as a private in Co. I,

Palmetto Sharpshooters and was wounded during the war. He was paroled at Appomattox, Virginia, on April 9, 1865. After the war, he resided in Central township of Pickens County, S. C. This Confederate veteran's wife was Eliza M. Pilgrim. The couple had a daughter, Corrie L. Pilgrim, and she married H. Sergent on August 3, 1890, at her father's residence and in a ceremony performed by L. C. Reid, N. P. Samuel J. Pilgrim had a brother, William J. M. Pilgrim, who also served in the C. S. A.

Sidney Pilgrim died of pneumonia at Leesburg, Virginia, on July 5, 1861. His death was reported in a letter written by Private J. W. Reid and published in that soldier's *History of the Fourth Regiment of the S. C. Volunteers* (1892). Sidney Pilgrim enlisted in Co. D, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers, on May 6, 1861. His estate was administered March 21, 1862, by Jefferson Pilgrim and Samuel Chapman in Pickens District, S. C.

Thomas F. Pilgrim (1833-1863) was born July 3, 1833. He enlisted in Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) on April 14, 1861. In August 1862, he was transferred to Co. G, 5th Virginia Cavalry, and on January 9, 1863, he was transferred to Co. K, Holcombe Legion. He died February 20, 1863, at Lynchburg, Virginia, and was buried there in Confederate Cemetery (Grave 3, Section R-1). He was a son of Jefferson and Hannah Pilgrim. Two of his brothers, Samuel J. Pilgrim and William J. M. Pilgrim also served in the C. S. A.

William H. Moore served in home guard during the Civil War between 1861 and 1865 Hattie wrote: "Papa had only one eye like myself and he was a home guard in war." It would be interesting to know what Hattie meant by "one eye". Was there some sort of disability that kept William from serving?<sup>14</sup>

Children of William H.2 Moore and Emily Sophronia Taylor were as follows:

- James Richard<sup>3</sup> Moore<sup>10,10,14</sup> was born, son of William H. Moore and Emily Sophronia Taylor, on 28 JUN 1853 at Pickens Co., SC.<sup>10,15</sup> James Richard married Jane Elliott circa 1872 at possibly, SC.<sup>15,16</sup> At age 84, James Richard Moore died on 21 MAY 1938 at Fulton Co., GA.<sup>17,18</sup> He was laid to rest Antioch Bapt. Church Cem., Atlanta, DeKalb Co., GA, after 21 MAY 1938.<sup>15</sup>
- ii. Mary Matilda Moore<sup>10,14,10</sup> was born, daughter of William H. Moore and Emily Sophronia Taylor, on 26 NOV 1857 at Pickens Co., SC.<sup>10,15</sup> Mary Matilda married John Pete Werner circa 1890.<sup>15,19,20</sup> At age 65, Mary Matilda Moore died on 1 OCT 1923 at Anderson Co., SC.<sup>21</sup>
- iii. Joseph Chesly Moore 10,14,10 was born, son of William H. Moore and Emily Sophronia Taylor, on 26 MAR 1859 at Pickens Co., SC, . compiled from several sources. 10,15
   Joseph Chesly married Corrie Jane Mounce, daughter of W. H. Mounce and B. J. (--?--). 15 At age 78, Joseph Chesly Moore died on 19 NOV 1937 at Anderson Co., SC. 22,23

# Who Was the Confederate Soldier Listed Only as "T. Owens" in Old Stone Church Cemetery Records?

For many years, local genealogists and other interested persons have wondered about the true identity of a man described only as "T. Owens, C. S. A." and was listed in Peggy Rich's compilation titled List of the Dead in Old Stone Church Cemetery. After having published this soldier's name in my March 2006 O. P. D. Newsletter installment of local Confederate soldiers, I received a very welcomed and interesting letter from Jerry D. Owen, a member of our S. C. G. S. chapter who resides in Norris, S. C. In his letter, Jerry wrote that his aunt, Ressie Owen (1901-1995), stated that the soldier in question was Thomas Ollie (or Oliver?) Owen, who was born about 1824 and died in 1864. My correspondent also said that the soldier's second wife, Sarah (Anderson) Owen (born about 1824 and died at the age of eighty years), was also buried in an unmarked grave alongside her husband's last resting place at the Old Stone Church.

Some of Jerry's relatives further revealed that a Southern Cross of Honor and a field stone containing the inscription "T. O." once marked the soldier's grave. Apparently the iron cross has been stolen, as it is no longer there. Jerry's brother, M. J. Owen, also recalls having seen a rock at the gravesite in question when he was taken to the Old Stone Church Cemetery many years ago by his father, Bill Oliver Owen (22 Sept 1905 - 14 July 1987), who was a grandson of the Confederate soldier and a son of Thomas Lee Owen (23 Nov 1863 - 7 Jan 1941). Based upon all this information, the mystery of T. Owen's identity

has finally been solved.


Thomas Ollie (or Oliver) Owen, the Confederate soldier, married his first wife, Mary Ann (Waters?), in about 1846. She was born in Alabama about 1828 and died in about 1850. The Confederate soldier and his first wife had the following three children: (1) Narcissus "Sis" Owen (6 Jul 1847 - 30 Mar 1925), who married William B. Pressley (3 Aug 1854 - 21 Feb 1931)-both were buried at Six Mile Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C.; (2) John Ojie Owen (6 Dec 1848 - 12 May 1909), who, on February 9, 1871, married Margaret Ann Massey (29 Oct 1848 - 12 Feb 1930) both were buried at Corinth #2 Church in Anderson County, S. C.; and (3) William Berry Owen (29 Nov 1850 - 1 Jan 1916), who married Barbara Clymelia "Cly" Massey (11 Sept 1858 - 22 Apr 1928)—both were buried at Ruhamah Baptist Church near Liberty, S. C.

In 1851, the C. S. A. soldier-to-be married his second wife, Sarah Anderson (b. about 1824 in Mississippi - d. 8 Apr 1904 in Anderson County, S. C.). Five offspring were born to Thomas Ollie (or Oliver) Owen and his second wife, and they were: (1) Lucretia Owen (b. ca. 1852); (2) James Edward Owen (5 Jul 1853 - 19 Feb 1936), who married Addie Lee Thomas (27 Jul 1865 - 13 May 1935) -- both were buried at Ruhamah Baptist, Church near Liberty, S. C.; (3) Ella Elizabeth Owen (21 Feb 1860 - 8 Feb 1902), who married Walter Beauregard Williams (22 Apr 1860 - 29 Jun 1901)—both were buried at Lebanon Baptist Church in Anderson County, S. C.; (4) Matthew C. Owen (18 Jul 1862 - 27 Feb 1919), who married Rebecca Cartee (Sept 1863 - 5 Sept 1936)—both were buried in Springwood Cemetery in Greenville, S. C.; and (5) Thomas Lee Owen (23 Nov 1863 - 7 Jan 1941), who married Amanda Eugenia "Gene" O'Shields (28 May 1865 - 7 Feb 1941) - both were buried at Flat Rock Baptist Church near Liberty, S. C.

Unfortunately, the names of the military company and regiment in which this Confederate soldier served during the U. S. Civil War are presently not known. Several men named either Thomas Owen or Thomas Owens served from South Carolina during the Civil War. Thus, the search continues to determine which one of those soldiers

was the subject of this article.

Thanks to Jerry Owen for helping to solve this longstanding mystery and for providing the information contained herein about the family of his Confederate ancestor.

Young J. H. Pitts (1829-1911) served in Co. D, 19th South Carolina Infantry. He was born April 1, 1829, and died April 8, 1911. His wife was Martha Pitts (13 May 1831-9 Jan 1907). This soldier was buried in East View Cemetery at Westminster (Oconee County), S. C.

Pitts (first name unknown). In 1899 1902, Rachel C. Pitts, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War pension. She was listed in pension records as a 66year-old widow whose husband served in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry.

John Pointer served in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry, and he survived the Civil War. No additional information available.

Pointer (first name unknown). In 1902, Elizabeth Pointer, widow of a Confederte veteran, was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S. C.

H. M. Polk died during the Civil War in Winchester, Virginia on October 15, 1862. His body was buried there in Stonewall Cemetery. No additional information available.

Perry Pollard served in the 2nd Company H, 7th South Carolina Infantry. He was killed September 16, 1862, at Sharpsburg, Maryland. His wife was Caroline (Lesley) Pollard (1839-1881).

George R. Ponder was a member of Co. F, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers. His company was known as the Tyger Volunteers, and most of the men who served in it were from Greenville County, S. C. This soldier was slightly wounded during the Civil War. On his company's muster roll of October 31, 1861, Ponder was listed as absent from duty since October 25, 1861, because of sickness. On the muster roll of January 1, 1862, he was listed as being hospitalized in Charlottesville, Virginia.

James Martin Ponder (1845-1876) served in Company D and Company B, 37th Battalion Virginia Cavalry. He was from Pickens District, S. C., and is believed to have been a resident of the Dacusville community. He was a son of James Mattison Ponder and Eliza Elvira (Hunt) Ponder. This soldier's father also served in the C. S. A. James Martin Ponder died in 1876 and was buried in the Ponder family cemetery in Pickens County, S. C.

C. F. Pool died of disease during the Civil War


while serving in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles. No additional information available.

James W. Thomas Poole (1837-1914) enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) at Camp Pickens, Sandy Springs, S. C., on July 20, 1861. He was captured by Union troops at Petersburg, Virginia. Then, he was sent to Hart Island in the harbor of New York City. After he signed the Oath of Allegiance to the United States on July 20, 1865, he was paroled. He was described in prison records as having a fair complexion, dark hair and eyes and as being five feet and eleven inches tall. This Confederate veteran was a son of Clayborn Poole (b. ca 1798) and Frances (Pace) Poole (b. ca 1807). His wife was Mary Alice (Keasler) Poole (10 Mar 1859-24 Feb 1952), daughter of Lemuel Keasler (1831-1891), who served in the C. S. A., and Harriett (Hembree) Keasler (1831-1904).

R. J. Poole attended the 19th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Sandy Springs in northern Anderson County, S. C., on August 14, 1901. He served in Co. D, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.).

Seth M. P. Poole (1836-1891) served to the rank of third lieutenant in Co. F, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. He died December 26, 1891, at his home near Travelers Rest in Greenville County, S. C., and was survived by his wife and one child. He was buried at Enoree Church in Greenville County, S. C.

J. H. Porter was born about 1842. He enlisted in the Citadel Cadet Rangers at Conwayboro, S. C., on June 12, 1862, and was discharged on October 4, 1862. He also served in Co. H, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers. In 1908. his widow received a Civil War pension, and she resided then in Pickens township of Pickens County, S. C.



- Riley Pitts of the Tugaloo River valley of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County) entered the C. S. A. in July 1863. No additional information available.
- Seaborne Pitts was born about 1827, a son of William and Francis (or Frances) Pitts of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. He served as a private in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles and died of disease in Virginia. His wife was Catherine Pitts.
- Thomas J. Pitts served as a private in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was born about 1845 and was a son of William R. Pitts (b. ca 1822) and Mary Pitts (b. ca 1820). He lost a limb during the Civil War, and in 1880 received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C. In 1899, he received a Civil War pension, also in Oconee County.
- W. H. Pitts was a recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S. C., in 1899. (Question: Is this William Pitts who served in Co. E, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers?)
- West Allen Pitts (1833-1862) enlisted in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.) on December 2, 1861. His company commander was Capt. Oliver M. Doyle. He was listed as a casualty of Jenkin's Brigade in the engagement of August 29-30, 1862 at Bull Run (Second Manassas) and died August 31, 1862. This soldier's wife was Isabella "Ibey" (Davis) Pitts, daughter of Thomas Davis. Sometime after the death of this widow's husband, she married Anthony Stewart. West Allen Pitts and his wife, Isabella, had the following children: Amanda J. Pitts (b. 1855), who married a Newell; Louise Ellen Pitts (b. 1857); Melmith Allen Pitts (7 Jan 1860-26 Nov 1926), who died in Summerville (Texas County), Missouri; Lawrence Clifton Pitts (d. 3 Dec 1879?); Effie M. Pitts (b. Dec 1875-d. 28 Jul 1948); and Florence Pitts, who married Billy Adams. Another child in this family was named Tony Stewart, and he might have been an offspring of Isabella's second marriage.
- William C. Pitts (1836-1896) was a son of Joel Pitts, Sr. (1796-1867) and Charlotte Pitts (b. 1805). This soldier served in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers in which he enlisted July 11, 1861, under Capt. A. D. Gailliard. On September 1, 1862, he was admitted to General Hospital No. 8 (St. Charles Hospital) in Richmond, Virginia. His diagnosis was typhoid

- fever. Then, he was granted a medical furlough for twenty days on the following September 10th. Later, he was promoted to the rank of 3rd corporal (on November 1, 1864). He was captured at Appomattox, Virginia, by Union troops on April 3, 1865 (three days before Lee's surrender of Confederate forces). Pitts was then sent to Hart Island in New York City's harbor, where he arrived on April 11, 1865, from City Point. After he signed the Oath of Allegiance to the United States, he was released from prison on June 16, 1865. His wife was Rachel Caroline (Youngblood) Pitts (1834-1921), and the couple had the following eleven children: David Newton "Dave" Pitts (b. 14 Oct 1858); Oliver Joyle Pitts (b. 17 Jun 1860); Nettie Pitts (b. 1861); William Joel Pitts (b. 14 May 1862-d. 1878); Genetta Frances Pitts (b. 17 May 1866); Thomas Joel "Jo Tom" Pitts (b. 3 Oct 1867); Robert Hill "Bob" Pitts (b. 3 Jan 1869); Julius Andrew "Jule" Pitts (b. 7 Mar 1871); Lugenia "Lou" Pitts (26 Mar 1873-18 Aug 1910); Presley Clifton Pitts (b. 24 Apr 1875); and Sarah Elizabeth "Sally" Pitts (23 May 1877-31 Jan 1939).
- William Pitts served in Co. B, Palmetto Sharp-shooters. He was wounded in action at Williamsburg, Virginia. After being wounded he was captured by Union troops and died as a prisoner of war on May 5, 1862. (Note: A William C. Pitts served as a corporal in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry. Same man?)
- William M. Pitts (1849-1937) was a son of John B. and Elizabeth Pitts of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. He was born June 23, 1849. He enlisted as a private (and as a teenager) in Co. E, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) at Fair Play, S. C. He was mustered into Confederate service on June 7, 1861, at Columbia, S. C. He was absent from duty because of illness, according to Co. E's muster roll of August 31, 1861. Then from October 31, 1861, until December 31, 1861, he was reported as on furlough. Later, he was captured by Union troops at Williamsburg, Virginia. He survived the Civil War and died August 26, 1937. He was buried at Laurel Springs Methodist Church in Oconee County, S. C. His wife was Delilah R. Pitts (14 Mar 1842-30 Dec 1925). (Note: This Confederate soldier is often confused with the William Pitts listed above. If readers have additional information that could make the biographical sketches of these two men more accurate, their help will be appreciated.)



Abel P. Pitts (1844-1861) enlisted in the 1st South Carolina Infantry (Butler's Regt.) on February 28, 1861, at Pendleton, S. C. He died November 17, 1861, during the Civil War. He was a son of Joel Pitts, Sr. (1796-1867) and Charlotte Pitts (b. 1805). Three of his brothers also served in the C. S. A., and they were William C. Pitts, West Allen Pitts, and Joel Pitts, Jr.

Charles "Charley" Pitts (1824-1909) was born in Pickens District, S. C., on August 1, 1824. He became a farmer and once resided near Walhalla in Oconee County, S. C. He was a son of Joel Pitts, Sr. (1796-1867) and Charlotte Pitts (b. 1805). On April 6, 1863, he was enrolled at Columbia, S. C., in Co. A (Washington Light Infantry), Hampton Legion, C. S. A. At that time, he was thirty-eight years of age. During September and October 1863, he was given a medical furlough. Then, from May 16 to July 21, 1864, he was a patient at Farmville Hospital suffering from "general dropsy of six months standing, resisting all medicines employed." He was then furloughed to Waltonsford (Habersham County), Georgia. From September to October 1864, he was present for duty. On November 13, 1864, he was transferred to Co. B, 1st South Carolina Rifles. He was captured by Union troops on April 3, 1865, at Appomattox, Virginia, and sent to City Point and then to Hart's Island, situated in New York Harbor. On June 16, 1865, he signed the Oath of Allegiance to the United States and was released from prison. This soldier was described in release papers as having a dark complexion, dark hair, and gray eyes. Moreover, his height was listed as 5 feet and 6 1/2 inches. Apparently, Charles Pitts was married twice. His first wife was Artelissa (Stubberfield) Pitts. This Confederate veteran was the father of at least the following six children: Martha A. Pitts (b. ca 1846); William Riley Pitts (b. 1847); Charles E. Pitts (b. ca 1850); Lemuel K. Pitts (b. May 1850); Amanda Jane Pitts (5 Mar 1852-25 May 1946), who first married Sion Robinson and who later married Samuel Taylor; and Joseph D. Pitts (b. 1855-d. 28 Jun 1933). In 1872, this family moved to Rabun County, Georgia, where Charles Pitts died near Clayton in 1909. His body was buried there in Mountain Grove Cemetery.

Elijah Andrew Pitts (1824-1909) served in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry in which he was enrolled on June 10, 1862. This soldier was a son of Charles Martin Pitts (b. 1798) and Mary Ann (Standridge) Pitts, and he became a minister of the gospel.

Henry M. Pitts was a son of William R. and Mary Pitts. He was named after Henry Martin Pitts (see below), who also served in the C. S. A. This soldier was a member of Co. A, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). No additional information available.


Henry Martin Pitts was born in June 1828, and he served as a private in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was a son of Charles C. Pitts (b. 1798) and Mary Ann (Standridge) Pitts. He became a wheelwright in McGowan's Brigade, C. S. A. He survived the Civil War and was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9, 1865. In 1901, he resided in the Battle Creek township of Oconee County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension at that time. His age then was listed as 75 years.

J. Hardin Pitts received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County, S. C. No additional information available.

Jesse J. Pitts enlisted as a private in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) on April 14, 1861. He was promoted to 4th corporal on October 15, 1861. On his company's muster roll of December 31, 1861, he was reported as being under arrest. No additional information available.

Joel Pitts, Jr. (1839-1862) served in Co. G. 12th South Carolina Infantry in which he enlisted in July 1861 at Walhalla, S. C. His company was commanded by Capt. A. D. Gaillard. His home was in the Tugaloo River valley, situated in what today is Oconee County, S. C. He was a son of Joel Pitts, Sr. (b. 1796-1867) and Charlotte Pitts (b. 1805). This soldier was killed on the field at Sharpsburg, Maryland in 1862. His wife was Sarah Pitts.

Lemuel K. Pitts enlisted in the C. S. A. when he was a teenager. He served in Co. B and Co. D, 1st South Carolina Rifles. His father, Charles Pitts (1824-1909) also fought in the Civil War. Lemuel K. Pitts first married Nancy S. Brown. Then on September 27, 1908, he married Lucinda "Cindy" Oliver. He might have also married a third time, possibly to Ester H. Grant. The children of this Confederate soldier were as follows: Henry Pitts (b. Nov 1875), Bertie Pitts (b. March 1881), Alice Pitts (b. 1874), Billy Pitts (b. 1874), Mary B. Pitts (b. 1875), and Buddy Pitts (b. 1879). (Note: This soldier is believed to have also served in Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.).



William J. M. Pilgrim (b. ca 1862-d. 1864) died in a field hospital at McPhersonville, near Charleston, S. C., on July 16, 1864. This soldier was survived by his wife, Mary Adeline A. (Bolding) Pilgrim (1835-1886), whom he married on January 16, 1859. He was also survived by two children, Mary Ellen Pilgrim (b. ca 1860), who married Jim "Hamp" Gilliam and moved to Georgia, and by William Daniel "Dink" Pilgrim (b. May 1861-d. 10 May 1927), who married Martha Elizabeth Cothran (25 Oct 1860-23 Mar 1938). William J. M. Pilgrim was a son of Jefferson Pilgrim and Hannah (Eades) Pilgrim. His maternal grandparents were John Eades and Deletha (Pilgrim) Eades. This Confederate soldier served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry.

W. H. Pilgrim died at Stony Creek, Virginia, on August 12, 1864. He was a private in Co. G, Holcombe Legion. No additional information available.

Roger Pinckney served in Co. K, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.). He enlisted at Pendleton, S. C., on June 2, 1861. On July 21 of the same year, he was captured by Union troops and held as a prisoner at Washington, D. C., until December 31, 1861. (Question: Did he have a brother named Hobson Pinckney who served in Co. I, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers and who died during the Civil War? Hobson Pinckney was buried at Warrenton, Virginia.)

John Pinson died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, during the Civil War. He was a private in Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). No additional information available.

Copied from the Georgia Courier who copied it from the Milledgeville Statesman. An account of a riot among the Gold hunters in the Cherokee Territory. Similar battles, we are told, are very frequent. There are said to be now, not less than 3000 people in said Territory looking for the precious metal. If one party is fortunate in finding a spot rich in golden ore, it must keep it by the strength of its members, or yield it to a stronger rival in the same pursuit. At night, we are informed, they collect in parties and by a pine knot fire over a bottle of whiskey, play cards for the earnings of the day, and then, those who have more cunning than strength, acquire by night, a great portion of what the improvident laborers gathered in the day. The country presents a shocking scene of drunkenness, fighting and gambling.

Gold has recently been discovered in the section of country lying between the Chilhowee and Unacoi mountains, about six miles south of the Tellico Plains. It extends for about 10 miles in length, and 5 or 6 in breadth. It exists in small particles, from the size of millet seed to that of fine sand, dust. There is no doubt of its being one of the richest gold regions in the United States, and probably the most extensive. The number of persons at present engaged in it, is about 1200, increasing rapidly; so much so, that it would not be a value assertion, to suppose there would be 2000 engaged by the first of August. Copied from Hiwassean.

- but where, from the dispersed situation of the inhabitants, in some divisions, \$1.25 will not be sufficient for 100 persons, the Marshals, with the approbation of the judges of their respective districts or territories, may make such further allowance to the assistants, in such divisions, as shall be deemed an adequate compensation; provided, The same does not exceed \$1.75 for every 50 persons by them returned.
- The compensation of Marshals themselves is to be from 100 to 350 dollars. Copied from Richmond Comp. Newspaper.

#### 21 Apr 1830

Some few of the Gold diggers in the Cherokee Nation have respected the notice given them by the Agent for Indian Affairs to desist, but the far greater part continue their operations regardless of his warning. Several thousand persons, from North and South Carolina, and this State, are engaged in the business. The prospect of gain is so alluring, that it will be difficult, if not impracticable, to put a stop to intrusions on the Indian lands in search of Gold; and it is to be fear that something of more serious and evil consequence than mere trespass will yet grow out of this inordinate desire to grasp the hidden treasures. Copied from *Milledgeville Recorder*.

The Commissioners of the Roads and Bridges of Greenville and Pickens, or that portion of them in whose Division may be situated Hagood's bridge over the South Fork of Saluda River, are informed that the said Bridge is impassable without considerable danger; that if they will take the trouble to refer to the act of 1825, they may become fully acquainted with their power, duties and responsibility and that they will be called on at the next Court of Sessions to show cause why the said bridge has not been repair. Copied from the *Greenville Mountaineer*.

Jesse Bill, a citizen of this District, was killed on the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. at the store of Mr. Lewis Dickie, in a fight with John McCrary. The deceased was the aggressor. He gave the first blow, and was much the stouter man of the two. McCrary struck him once only, and gave him a kick on the neck, which caused him to expire instantly and without a groan. This unfortunate circumstance occurred at a muster, and in the presence of many persons. We understand McCrary has not yet been arrested, although a warrant was taken out for him. Copied from the Greenville Mountaineer.

It will be seen that Gov. Miller has offered a reward of \$300 for the apprehension and lodging in Greenville jail, of John Campbell charged with the murder of William Browning. The Governor, we presume, was not



#### 21 Apr 1830

New Census. We have before us, the "Act for taking the fifth census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the United States passed the dult. It directs the Marshals of the US, in the several States and Territories, to make under the instruction of the Secretary of State, an enumeration of all the inhabitants, except Indians not taxed.

- This enumeration is to be very explicit. It is to "distinguish the sexes of all free white persons, and ages of the free white males and females, respectively, under five years of age; those of five and under ten years of age; those of ten years and under fifteen; those of fifteen and under twenty; those of twenty and under thirty; those of thirty and under forty; those of forty and under fifty; those of fifty and under sixty; those of sixty and under seventy; those of eighty and under ninety; those of ninety and under one hundred; those of one hundred and upwards;
- and shall further distinguish the number of those free white persons included in such enumeration, who are deaf and dumb, under the age of fourteen years; and those of the age fourteen and under twenty-five, and of the age of twenty-five years, and upward;
- and shall further distinguish the number of those free white persons included in such enumeration who are blind.
- The said enumeration shall distinguish the sexes of all free colored persons, and of all other colored persons bound to service for life, or for a term of years, and the ages of each free and other colored persons respectively, of each sex under ten years of age; those of ten and under twenty-four; those of twenty-four and under thirty-six; those of thirty-six and under fifty-five; those of fifty-five and under one hundred; and those of one hundred and upwards;
- shall further distinguish the number of those free colored and other colored persons, included in the foregoing, who are deaf and dumb, without regard to age, and those who are blind.
- To assist the Marshal in this labour, he is authorized to employ one or more assistants in each city and county, & c.
- The Census is to commence on the 1st day of June next, and to be completed within six calendar months. Every assistant is to receive at the rate of \$1.25 for every 100 persons, by him returned, where such persons reside in the country; and where such persons reside in a city of town, containing more than 3,000 persons, such assistant shall receive at the same rate for three thousand, and at the rate of \$1.25 for every 300 persons over 3,000, residing in such city or town;

- 1868 Voter Registration Oconee and Pickens S.C; specifically Wolf Creek. I found there were 3 African American on the list; Samuel Fields, Emanuel Fields, Joseph Fields. I am trying to find out if there are connections with my family?
- The Rosamond family. I would like some information about the family. And or a contact of someone/relative I could talk to about my research? Below are details about the Rosamond family.

Sammuel Field born in S.C about 1833 death? He married Violet Briggs (mulatto) about 1860 in Easley, Pickens, S.C, daughter of Jackson Briggs and mother unknown. She was born Jan 14, 1846 in S.C. and died Jan 8, 1916 Village township, Jackson county, Arkansas. They have 11 children but I could only find 8.

#### Confederate Soldiers from Enon Baptist Church near Easley, SC Enon Church Minutes from the collection at Furman University, Greenville, SC.

- 25 Dec 1865. **George W. Bradley** was born 29 Jul 1839 and died 28 Oct 1865, aged 24 years 2 months and 30 days. Bradley volunteered in the early part of the struggle between the United and Confederate States. He was a member of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Regt. of Rifles. He was instantly killed in the Battle near Lookout Mountain, TN. He sought religion in his youth, joined the church and was baptized on the 1<sup>st</sup> Sabbath in August 1859. He was a dutiful son, an affectionate husband, a tender and loving father and kind brother.
- 25 Dec 1865. **Nathan C. Carson** died at hospital in Richmond, VA in Sept 1864, aged about 20 years. He was a member of Hampton Legion, CO D. His death was from a severe wound in the thigh that in a few weeks of extreme suffering, proved fatal. But we learn from his kind nurse and visiting companions that he bore his affliction with Christian patience, professed his willingness to depart and be with Christ. It was his misfortune to lose both his parents when quite small about the age of 13. He was taken in the family and watch care of **Samuel A. Gary** where he received a common education and a moral and religious training. He professed Christ and was baptized at Enon Church.
- 25 Dec 1865. **Samuel J. Gary** was born in Pickens District, SC on 3 May 1845 and died at Richmond, VA on 7 Jun 1862, aged 17 years, 1 month and 4 days. He volunteered his services in behalf of Southern rights in the 16<sup>th</sup> year of his age, connected himself with the Hampton Legion, Gist Rifles, CO D commanded by Capt. Smith of Anderson Dist. True to himself and idolized by his brother soldiers and the officials of the Hampton Legion and while making a charge on the enemies battery in that memorable Battle known as the Seven Pines fight near Richmond. He received a wound in his thigh that terminated in his death. He suffered a few days and quietly and calmly fell asleep in Jesus. He related his Christian experience to Enon Church on Friday evening 27th and was cordially received on Sabbath 29<sup>th</sup> and was baptized on a public profession by Rev. John Ariail.
- 25 Dec 1865. **Thomas N. Gary**, son of **Samuel A. and Lucinda Gary** was born 3 Dec 1847 and died 1 Jan 1865, aged 17 years and 28 days. Thomas was quite small at the commencement of the war between the United and Confederate states but as he grew up he often experienced a desire to join his youthful companions and fathers in their great struggle. But his parents unwilling to give him up he being their only child, he calmly submitted and remained quietly at home until his age was called for which order he promptly obeyed and was organized with the 1<sup>st</sup> Regt. SC Militia CO D. His many friends gave him the position of Lieutenant in that command where he gave entire satisfaction until his death. This command left home the last days of November 1864 and was ordered to the coast near Pocataligo where many of them soon sickened and died. Among that number was our much esteemed young Brother after about 8 days of extreme suffering with typhoid pneumonia and died at the 1<sup>st</sup> Louisiana Hospital, Charleston, SC without earthly friends except strangers to administer to his wants or to give him a word of comfort on his dying couch or carry his dying words to his afflicted parents and kind friends and loved ones. His remains was interred in the Magnolia Cemetery was afterwards removed and brought home on the
- 25 Dec 1865. **Abner Griffin** was born 29 Oct 1835 and died 4 Jul 1864, aged 22 years, 8 months, and 6 days. He volunteered on 26 Dec 1861 with the Colhoon Troops which was attached to the 4<sup>th</sup> SC CAV CO C. His patriotic zeal and general deportment gained him the position of orderly sergeant. He died at Jackson Hospital, Richmond, VA after a protracted illness of 23 days of chronic diarrhea. His remains now rest in the cemetery with many of his comrades who fell in the same cause. He professed Christ, was baptized in Georgia on 16 Oct 1858 and was received by letter to Enon Church in March 1859. . . . Beseeching him to protect and bless his absent and devoted wife and loving child and aged parents. . .
- 23 Dec 1865. **John Gillstrap** was the son of Hardy & Caroline Gillstrap. He was one of the first that responded to the call of his country attaching himself to the 4<sup>th</sup> Regt, SC Volunteers. He went with his command to Virginia where he remained a brave and patriotic soldier until he received the fatal wound on the last days of June 1862 while engaged in the (7) seven day's fight around Richmond. He joined Enon Church in July 1859.
- 23 Dec 1865. **John C. Hamilton** was born 27 Sep 1831 and died 28 Apr 1861, aged 29 years 5 months and 1 day. He died of pneumonia fever at Charleston, SC. He belonged to the 22<sup>nd</sup> Regt., SCV volunteering his services in

- the early part of the recent struggle between the Confederate and United States. Member of Enon Church for twelve years.
- 23 Dec 1865. Warren Hamilton was born August 1835 and died at Ashland, VA 12 Apr 1862 with pneumonia fever, aged 26 years and about 8 months. Enlisted in the war between the Confederate and United States in the Hampton Legion CO D. Member of Enon Church for two years. He made a public profession of Christ on the 9<sup>th</sup> day of Sept 1860.
- 23 Dec 1865. **John Anderson Hinton** was born 30 Apr 1831 and died at Petersburg, VA on 30 Jul 1964, aged 33 years and 3 months. Hinton was reared up by pious parents and early religious training. Joined church at Enon July 1859, where he lived a consistent member until his death of which we are unable to give the particulars, as he has not been heard from since the memorable blow up or explosion at Petersburg, VA. Mentions a loving wife and children in a poem.
- 25 Dec 1865. **M.D.L. Howard**, son of **Joseph L. and Ann Howard**, was born 6 Jan 1839 and died 28 Jun 1862, aged 23 years, 5 months and 22 days. He was among the first to volunteer in the Confederate Service as a member of the Hampton Legion CO D. He fell on the battlefield while engaged in the 7 days fight around Richmond, VA. He joined Enon Church on 27 Jul and was baptized on 5 Aug 1860.
- 25 Dec 1865. William F. McWhorter, son of James and Judy McWhorter was born 13 Apr 1844 and died 23 Aug 1862, aged 18 years, 4 months and 10 days. He was a member of the Hampton Legion, CO D and while engaged on 31 May 1862 a the Battle of Seven Pines, he received a severe wound which caused his death. He died at home where he had the attention of his mother and kind friends. He became a member of Enon Church on 2 Aug 1860 and was baptized on the 5 Aug 1860. Mentions a widowed mother, brothers and sisters.
- 23 Dec 1865. **Daniel Perkins** died after a painful illness of pneumonia fever at Winchester, VA 30 Sep 1862, aged 23 years and 4 months. Perkins volunteered his services with the Hamption Legion CO D. He left home and friends on 7 Jun 1861 to battle for the rights of his Country. "Brother Pirkins had the misfortune to loose his parents while in childhood. But was reared up by his \_\_\_\_ uncle and aunt Felix and Casey Roggers [Rodgers]." Perkins professed faith in Christ on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1860.
- 25 Dec 1865. Charles P. Richardson, son of Noah and Hester Richardson, was born 7 May 1839 and died 30 Apr 1864, aged 24 years, 11 months and 23 days. He was a member of the Palmetto Sharp Shooters SC VOL CO J. He received a severe wound on 30 Jun 1862 while trying to rescue and administer to his brother William who had just fell mortally wounded. They were both rescued and Charley succeeded in getting home where he had a mother care during his severe illness before his wound was fully well. He took consumption, which soon told to his many friends that he must die. But death was no terror to him after bidding kind friends farewell, he told them he was going to meet his Sainted Father and Brother who had just gone before him and calmly fell asleep in Jesus. Brother Richardson was baptized at Big Creek Church, Anderson District, in the Fall of 1853, was received by letter into Enon Church on February 1860.
- 23 Dec 1865. **L. P. Whitten** was born 27 Dec 1829 and volunteered as soldiers in the recent war between the United and Confederate States he attached himself to the Hampton Legion . . . his command was ordered from VA to the West in the fall of 63 being quite indisposed he gave out on a march and has not since been heard from. #### **Captain Samuel Earle Historical Marker Dedication**

Article Taken from Pendleton District Digest, published by the Pendleton District Historical, Recreational and Tourism Commission, Pendleton, SC. Summer 2006 Newsletter.

On May 20<sup>th</sup>, the Pendleton District Commission, along with the Colonel Robert Anderson Chapter of the sons of the American Revolution, sponsored the dedication of the Captain Samuel Earle South Carolina Historical Marker. Earle's Grove Baptist Church in Oconee County hosted a dedication program that featured descendants of Captain Samuel Earle, state legislators, and others. After the program, the descendants of Captain Earle, officially unveiled the marker off Highway 59. Wreaths were also laid in the nearby Earle Family Cemetery.

The South Carolina Historical Marker honors the life of Captain Samuel Earle (1760-1833). An officer during the American Revolution, Captain Earle was a member of the South Carolina House of Representatives and served in the Fourth United States Congress during the time of George Washington. A native of Virginia, Earle lived at Beaverdam Plantation in Oconee County in his later years.

The marker erection and dedication ceremony have been a long term project of the Pendleton District Commission and Mr. Tim Sloan of Covington, TN, a fourth great-grandson of Captain Earle. Mr. and Mrs. Sloan provided a generous donation to the Pendleton District Commission for the historical marker and dedication ceremony. Mr. Sloan also gave the keynote address at the dedication ceremony, in which he recognized the descendants of Captain Earle who were present.

Sandra Eichelberger of seichgen@yahoo.com (Douglasville, GA) notes a correction to Nimrod Kelly Sullivan in Confederate Army. Dr Busha's article lists an incorrect Nim Sullivan in Company C. My gggrandfather, Nimrod Kelly Sullivan, was 1st Lt. in that company, not Nim Kelly Jr. My ancestor was born in 1829 in Anderson SC and died there in 1881. He was captured at Falling Waters in July of 1863 and was confined to Johnson's Island, a prison for officers, until the end of the war. A family member has Nimrod's autograph book from his stay there, and he signed at least one other officer's autograph book during that time. The Nim Kelly, Jr. listed was a distant relative of my ancestor, probably from Greenwood. There were many Sullivans in the area, and they were all related. This Nim was a private. He was KIA in the battle of Cold Harbor. The South Carolina Archives and History Center reports that Nimrod K. Sullivan was a 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. in 1 (Orr's SC Rifles). He enlisted at Camp Pickens, Sandy Springs, SC on July 20, 1861 at 33 years old. He was captured at Falling Waters, MD on 14 Jul 1963. He was promoted to 1st Lt., September 1, 1862. Signed Oath of Allegiance and released at Johnson's Island, Ohio, June 11, 1865. Resident of Anderson Court House, SC, age 35 (in1865), light complexion, dark hair, grey eyes, 5 ft. 11 inches tall. I also have pictures of Nimrod in uniform and after the war. The one in uniform was taken while they trained at Sullivan's Island. She is also researching Eichelberger, Dickson, Sullivan, Bewley, Proctor, Pipkin, McCarley, Dobbins, Hart, Hale, Douglas, Wallace, Cobb. Shuman, Long, Gary, Mattison, Stark, Anderson, Gantt, Shirley, Wilson, Harvey, Summer, Shealy, Kelly, Cannon.



## FROM CIVIL WAR BATTLEFIELDS TO BAPTIST PULPITS: NOTES ON THE LIFE OF REV. TERRY F. NELSON

Terry Freelin Nelson was born September 4, 1839. He was a son of Freelin Nelson (10 May 1802-1 Aug 1892), who was killed when struck by lightening at the age of ninety and was buried at Secona Baptist Church in Pickens, South Carolina.

This Confederate soldier enlisted as a private in Co. "F" (Bozeman Guards), Hampton Legion, C. S. A. He was enrolled as a member of that regiment

June 12, 1861, at Columbia, S. C. (The regiment was also known as Hampton Legion Cavalry and Mounted Infantry.) The Confederate military unit was organized, equipped and commanded by Colonel Wade Hampton, III (1818-1902), a prominent planter and statesman. Col. Hampton was a member of a very wealthy and influential family at Columbia, S. C. During the U. S. Civil War, he rose in rank to major general and eventually commanded the entire Confederate cavalry corps. (Although Hampton owned many slaves, he did not favor the secession movement in South Carolina—yet gave himself and his resources to the Confederate States of America when it was established.)

Private Terry F. Nelson, the subject of this biographical sketch, took part in the First Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas) in Virginia on July 21, 1861. The battle was a concisive Confederate victory. Then, in the following August, Nelson was transferred to Company "E" of his regiment in exchange for another soldier, R. B. McDougle. In November and December 1861, he was sick and absent from duty at Chancellorsville, Virginia. Nelson was granted a furlough during May and June 1863 in order to take care of personal matters in South Carolina. Then, on October 7, 1864, his left middle finger was shot off by a Union minie ball during an engagement on Darbytown Road in Virginia. He was admitted to Jackson Hospital in Richmond and was a patient there until October 26, 1864. Then, he was granted a thirtyday medical furlough. This soldier's name was subsequently listed on the muster roll of Company "E" for the months of November and December 1864, but Nelson was deemed to be unfit for duty because of the injury to his hand. Despite sickness and injury, Nelson survived the U.S. Civil War, after which he returned to Pickens District, S. C.

Terry F. Nelson was married twice. He first married Susan Louise Lenderman (25 Sep 1841-27 Dec 1893). She was a daughter of Jacob Lenderman who resided in the Fork Shoals community of Greenville County, S. C. After his marriage, Nelson joined a business operated by his father-in-law, who manufactured horse-drawn buggies and horse harnesses. But the Confederate veteran soon decided that he should become a minister of the gospel. He moved his wife and two young children to Tennessee and enrolled there in a Baptist seminary.




- Nathaniel H. Newton was born about 1829. He served in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment) and was accidentally killed on a train during the Civil War. He was a brother of John Thomas Newton and Joel B. Newton, both of whom also served in the C. S. A.
- Alexander Nichols was a member of Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry and was killed in 1864 at South Anna, Virginia. He was a son of James Nichols (b. ca 1799) and Martha Nichols (b. ca 1812). He was a brother of James Nichols, Jr., and John Nichols, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. (see below).
- James Nichols, Jr. (1840-1921) served in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He was wounded at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, and lost the use of his right arm. Then, he was discharged from the army. In 1880, he received a voucher for the purchase of an artificial arm. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C. He resided in the Tamassee section of Oconee County in 1901 and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. His wife was Mary J. Nichols (30 Oct 1850-31 Jan 1921). This Confederate veteran died June 10, 1919, and was buried at Cheohee Baptist Church in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- John Nichols was born about 1838 and was a son of James and Martha Nichols of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry. Before the Civil War J. H. Beck of the western division of Pickens District, S. C., claimed that James Nichols and his son, John Nichols, marked his hogs with their mark without his consent. Subsequently, John Nichols made oath that his three sons were volunteers in the Confederate military service and were stationed at Lightwood Kot Springs. He also stated that the sons were material witnesses in his (Source: Clerk of Court's office, Pickens District, S. C., No. 7, Pack 165 - Unlawfully Marking Hog)
- Nichols (given name unknown). In 1899, Nancy Nichols, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, S. C.
- Elijah A. Nicholson was wounded at Fredericksburg, Virginia, while serving in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). He participated in the Battle of Gaines' Mill in Virginia on June 27, 1862, according to the Ci-

- vil War diary of John L. Brackenridge, another soldier from Pickens District, S. C.
- Priestly Nicholson (1835-d. ca 1905) served in Co. B, 3rd Confederate Cavalry. He was captured by Union troops during the Civil War. He survived the war and became a Methodist minister.
- Silas Nicholson was a private in Co. C, 43rd Georgia Infantry, C. S. A. He was captured by Union troops during the Civil War, but was exchanged at Cumberland Gap on September 17, 1862.
- Silas Kirksey Nicholson was said to have died during the Civil War. (Question: Is this soldier the same man as listed above?)
- Nicholson (first name unknown). In 1902, Jane A. Nicholson, widow of a Confederate veteran, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, South Carolina.
- David Nimmons was born about 1826, a son of Nelly Nimmons (b. ca 1803). He served in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. His wife was Narcissa "Sis" Nimmons (b. 1837-d. 11 Apr 1909), and the couple had the following children: Franklin O. Nimmons (b. 1854), Charles W. Nimmons (b. 1856), Mary E. Nimmons (b. 1858), Ellen M. Nimmons (b. 1860), Allison Nimmons (b. 1862), Sallie Nimmons, Martha Nimmons (b. 1864), Susan Nimmons, Henry Nimmons (b. 1868), Fanny Nimmons (b. 1875) and Weyman Nimmons (b. 1880). In 1901, he resided in the Oakway community of Oconee County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. His age was listed in pension records then as 76 years. This Confederate veteran's name was also included on the 1902 pension roll for Oconee County, S. C. He was a brother of William Joseph Nimmons, who also served in the C. S. A.
- William M. Nimmons served in Co. B, 10th Battallion South Carolina Cavalry. (Question: Is this soldier the William Nimmons who died July 27, 1895, husband of Hester Nimmons who died August 16, 1894, both of whom were buried in the Ellenburg, Nimmons, Alexander, Barton burying ground, situated in the Eastatoee community of northern Pickens County?)
- David M. Nix was a resident of Hurricane township in eastern Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry.

- E. J. Nix served in Co. B, 3rd South Carolina Reserves. In 1901 and 1902, his name appeared on the Civil War pension roll of Oconee County, S. C. This soldier is believed to have also served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- **Edward J. Nix** received a Civil War pension in 1899 in Oconee County, S. C. He served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment).
- Elisha M. Nix died at Charleston, S. C., on December 13, 1863 and was buried there in Magnolia Cemetery. He served in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry and had lived in Hurricane township of Pickens District, South Carolina.
- James Nix was a soldier in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). No additional information available.
- Thomas J. Nix died of typhoid fever in 1862 while serving in the C. S. A. He was a member of Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His death took place at Laurel Hill (VA?). This soldier's wife was Elizabeth (Gassaway) Nix, daughter of W. W. Gassaway. In 1888, Elizabeth Nix, widow, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension.
- William D. Nix (1843-1917) was wounded during the Civil War while serving in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regiment). His wife was Mary Ann Nix (27 Jun 1851-5 May 1919). This soldier was born May 8, 1843, and died December 18, 1917. He was buried at Mount Bethel Methodist Church in northern Pickens County, S. C. Some additional facts: He was a member of a home guard company organized at Anderson's Mill in Pickens District, S. C., on June 23, 1861. He was a son of John Nix (b. ca 1819) and Alcy Nix (b. ca 1822). In 1901, he resided in Hazel township of eastern Pickens District, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension.
- Nix (first name unknown). In 1902, Mary C. Nix was a recipient of a Civil War pension. She resided at that time in the Fair Play section of Oconee County, S. C. Her deceased husband had served in Co. B, 3rd South Carolina Reserves during the Civil War.
- James P. Nixon was born in 1844 and served in Companies D and F of the 6th South Carolina Cavalry. He enlisted at Abbeville Court House, S. C., on June 20, 1862, and on May 1, 1864, he

- was transferred to a unit of the Cadet Rangers. He was wounded in action at the Battle of Trevilian Station in Virginia on June 12, 1864. Nixon survived the Civil War, after which he became a store clerk and farmer.
- Jessie P. Norris (1842-1862) died of disease while fighting in the Civil War. Norris' death occurred at Pocotaligo, S. C., while he was serving in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. At the time of his death, this Confederate soldier was unmarried. He was born on June 2, 1842, in Pickens District, S. C., and died May 6, 1862. His parents were Robert Norris and Elizabeth (Pilgrim) Norris (27 Mar 1802-14 Dec 1875).
- **L. W. Norris** served as a private in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves from June 1862 until January 1863.
- Robert E. Norris (1831-1918) was born April 12, 1831. He served to the rank of corporal in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His wife was Eugenia Norris who died June 25, 1882, at the age of 43 years and 6 months. She was survived by her husband and seven children. This soldier was wounded at Chancellors-ville, Virginia. He survived the Civil War and died January 6, 1918. His grave is situated in the cemetery at Westminster First Baptist Church in Westminster, South Carolina. Note: In 1915, this Confederate soldier's name was not included on the pension roll of January 1st.
- Thomas R. Norris enlisted in July 1861 and served in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regiment). As a result of a combat wound, he lost a limb during the Civil War. In 1880, he received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, this Confederate veteran was a resident of the Tugaloo River valley in Oconee County, South Carolina.






- Richard B. Porcher (1826-1893) was a Civil War veteran who resided in what today is Oconee County, S. C. His wife was Esther (Gasque) Porcher (1832-1910). They were both buried in Seneca Mountain View Cemetery in Oconee County, S. C.
- J. H. Porter was born in 1842. He enlisted in the Citadel Cadet Rangers at Conwayboro, S. C., on June 12, 1862, but was discharged from the C. S. A. on October 4, 1862. He was a farm laborer who later became a merchant in Westminster, S. C. Apparently, he also served in Company H, 4th South Carolina Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.). In 1908, he resided in Pickens township and received a Civil War pension. (Question: Is this James H. Porter?)
- J. H. Porter was a private in Co. B, 2nd S. C. Rifles, and he died during the Civil War. (Question: Is this man the same one listed above?)
- John M. Porter was born about 1836. He is believed to have been one of the sixteen children of Samuel Gibson Porter (1807-1889) and Martha "Patsy" (Prince) Porter (1812-1889). He once resided in the Holly Springs community of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Pickens County). His sister, Rebecca Melinda Porter (1847-1933) married William Nelson Bolding (1842-1926), another Confederate soldier. John M. Porter married Mary Ann Lewis, daughter of Jake and Catherine (Stewart) Lewis of Pickens District, S. C. This Confederate sodier was killed during the Civil War,

and his widow reportedly moved to Burbon, Missouri, in the 1870s. (Note: John M. Porter is believed to have served in Co. F, 1st S. C. Cavalry.)

- Joseph 'Porter served in the C. S. A., and in 1911 his name was listed on the Civil War pension roll in Pickens County, S. C.
- S. J. Porter served as a private in Co. K, 3rd S. C. Reserves between June 1862 and January 1863.
- **Newton Posey** was a private in Co. D, Hampton Legion, C. S. A. He was killed in action at Will's Valley, Tennessee, on October 28, 1863. No additional information available.
- A. Lewis Powell was enrolled in Co. C, 22nd South Carolina Infantry Regiment on October 15, 1863, in Columbia, S. C. His enrollment officer was Lt. Dean. This soldier's middle name was sometimes written as Louis. He was a son of Harris Powell who owned 800 acres of land at Rocky Bottom in the northern section of what today is Pickens County, S. C. A. Lewis Powell was wounded and captured by Union troops at Petersburg, Virginia, on July 30, 1864. Then, on August 8, 1864, he was sent to Elmira Prison at Elmira, New York, where he was held as a prisoner of war and died August 14, 1864. He was buried in grave number 125 in Elmira in Woodlawn National Cemetery. Some members of his family believed that he survived the Ci-

vil War and participated in the plot to kill President Abraham Lincoln. But that notion proved to be false. A. Lewis Powell's mother died when he was very young, leaving the following five children: Lou, Yount, Laydia, Elizabeth and Lewis. His father later married Angeline Thomas, and that couple had eight offspring: Narcissa, Ben, Bannister, Folger, Ervin, Belton, James and Maggie.

- Ansel Powell (1819-1874) was a son of Almon Powell (d. 1 Nov 1857) and Elizabeth (Gordon) Powell (b. 1791-d. 1862). His father owned a 1,000-acre farm in the Tugaloo River valley in what today is Oconee County. In July 1861, this soldier volunteered in the Confederate States Army, and he survived the Civil War. His wife was Emily (McDaniel) Powell.
- Henry A. Powell enlisted as a private in Co. C, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was wounded in action in Virginia during the Civil War. His home was in the western division of Pickens District, S. C.
- Jeremiah Powell served as a private in Co. I, 3rd S. C. Reserves (Elford's) between June 1862 and January 1863. In 1902, this Confederate veteran's 68-year-old widow, Catherine Powell of Sunny Dale was to have received a Civil War pension. But the pension was not claimed in Pickens County, S. C., and the money was returned to Columbia, S. C.
- Joseph B. Powell enlisted in Co. C, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was seventeen years of age. This soldier, who was usally called "Joe", lost his life June 27. 1862, at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, during the Civil War. His father was Abraham Powell who resided west of the Keowee River in Pickens District, S. C.
- Robert Powell (1820-1898) was born February 16, 1820, a son of Almon Powell (d. 1 Nov 1857) and Elizabeth (Gordon) Powell (1791-1862) who resided in what today is Oconee County, S. C. He enlisted in the C. S. A. in July 1861, and survived the Civil War. He married Polly Ann Black (1826-1897), and they resided near Prathers Covered Bridge in the Tugaloo River valley of the western division of Pickens District, S. C. They were buried at Old Liberty Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C. Robert Powell was a brother of Ansel Powell and Thomas Almon Powell, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. (Note: Two soldiers named Robert Powell served in the C. S. A. from Pickens District, S. C. See below).

- Robert Upson "Ups" Powell (1846-1912) was an adopted son of Robert Powell (1820-1898) (see above). He married Sarah A. "Sally" Deaton (13 Mar 1853-7 Jan 1926), who was a daughter of Capt. William B. Deaton (4 Sep 1812-22 Dec 1905) and Eleanor Deaton (b. 13 Nov 1818). This soldier served in Co. C, 2nd S. C. Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was born February 28, 1846, and died December 26, 1912. He was buried at Old Liberty Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.
- Sampson Powell served as a private in Co. I, 3rd S. C. Reserves between June 1862 and January 1863. He also served in Co. B, 1st S. C. State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864.
- Wesley Powell was the recipient of a Civil War pension in Pickens County, S. C., in 1911. (Question: Is this W. J. Powell, 1845-1916, who served in the C. S. A.?)
- William Keith Power (Powers) enlisted as a private in Co. K, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers at Five Mile in Pickens District, S. C., in April 1861. His enlistment officer was Lt. John W. Daniels of Anderson District, S. C. This soldier was a son of Drewy and Mariah Power (Powers). During the Civil War, William Keith Power was present at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, when the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia surrendered to the Union Army of the Potomac. In August 1899, this Confederate veteran shot and killed John Richey. Then, in March 1900, he was found guilty of murder and was sentenced to life imprisonment.
- James Thomas Powers (1847-1917) was born July 1, 1847, at Pickens Court House on the Keowee River in Pickens District, S. C. He served in Co. I, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.), having joined the army at a very young age. He served in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and was wounded in action at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, on June 27, 1862. His first wife was Jane Chesney Powers, and the couple had six children, including James H. Powers, Joseph B. Powers, Bennett H. Powers and Van B. Powers. On January 19, 1882, he married Sallie Clark Boggs (5 Sep 1858-6 Jul 1928), daughter of Henry W. Monroe Boggs. In the 1890s, this Confederate veteran operated a ferry service on the Keowee River. James Thomas Powers died in 1917 and was buried in the Powers Family Cemetery. In the early 1920s, his widow, Sallie, was the recipient of a Civil

War widow's pension. She married W. T. Aiken sometime after the death of James Thomas Powers.

- James W. Powers served in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). His wife was Martha (Fant) Powers. This soldier was buried in the Powers Family Cemetery, situated near the intersection of Hwy. 183 and King's Grove Road in Pickens County, S. C.
- Tillman B. Powers was born about 1843, a son of Zachariah Powers (1811-1878) and Ruth (Chapman) Powers (b. ca 1802). He served in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and was wounded at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, in 1862. He survived the Civil War, and in 1883 he sold seventy-three acres of land in Central township of Pickens County, S. C. Then, during the following year he moved to Georgia.
- W. H. Powers received a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S. C., in 1899. No additional information available.
- Zachariah Powers is believed to have been the Z. H. Powers (1811-1878) who was born in Spartanburg District and died July 22, 1878, in Central, S. C. He served in Co. A, 1st Georgia Reserves (Symond's) and was a son of James Powers who was born in Virginia in 1780 and died at Old Pickens on the Keowee River in South Carolina in 1862. Moreover, Z. H. Powers was a grandson of Joseph Powers, who was born about 1760 in Virginia and died in Spartanburg District, S. C., in 1840. This Powers family came to America from Kilkenny, Ireland, and settled in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. Zachariah Powers' first wife was Nancy D. Arnold (1811-2 Nov 1840), daughter of William D. Arnold and Susannah (Gaines) Arnold. Zachariah and Nancy were married December 12, 1833. Their children were Joanna Powers (b. 1833), Naomi Powers (b. 1839), and James W. Powers. Zachariah's second wife was Ruth (Chapman) Powers. This Confederate soldier died July 22, 1878, in Central, S. C., and was buried in Mt. Zion Cemetery in Pickens County, S. C.
- Henry Prather served as a private in Co. K, 3rd S. C. Reserves between June 1862 and January 1863. He also served as a private in Co. B, 1st S. C. State Troops between August 1863 and February 1864.
- Henry Prather served as a private in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters, Jenkins Brigade, C. S. A.

- (Question: Is this Henry Prather, Jr., son of the previously listed soldier?)
- William J. Prather served as a private in Co. I, Palmetto Sharpshooters. (Question: Could this be William A. Prather, 1848-1919, who married Lucy A. Ellison, 1855-1945, and was buried in East View Cemetery in Westminster, Oconee County, S. C.?)
- Henry Presher was killed in action at Secessionville, S. C., on June 16, 1862, while serving in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A.
- Berry M. Pressley (b. ca 1825) served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry, having enlisted in November 1861 when he resided in Anderson District, S. C. He was wounded in action at Cold Harbor, Virginia, but survived the Civil War. He was discharged at Bentonville, North Carolina. In 1899, he was a recipient of a Civil War pension in Pickens County, S. C., and in 1901 his name was included on the Civil War pension list. His age was listed as seventy-six years on pension records of 1901. On January 20, 1904, he resided in Norris township of Pickens County, S. C., and made application to the United Daughters of the Confederacy for a Confederate Cross of Honor. His application was endorsed by J. H. Ballentine. During his lifetime, this Confederate veteran attended several reunions of Civil War soldiers. In 1892, he and M. P. Rogers were the only two former soldiers present at a reunion of Co. B, 4th S. C. Cavalry, which was held at Pickens, S. C.
  - M. Alexander Pressley died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, during the Civil War. He was a member of Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.), C. S. A.
  - W. B. Pressley was a private in Companies F and K, 1st South Carolina Cavalry. He survived the Civil War, and paid his 1866 general tax of \$2.60 in Pickens District, S. C. In 1884, the property of this Confederate veteran was sold at the suit of James E. Hagood. Pressley owned 309 1/2 acres of land on the Oolenoy River adjoining lands of Tempy Chastain, James Keith and others.
  - C. A. Price was killed in action at the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia, on July 30, 1864. He served as a sergeant in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A.

CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS OF PICKENS AND ANDERSON DISTRICTS, S. C. (continued)

Elijah A. Price resided in the Holly Springs of what today is in northern Pickens County, S. C. He was a son of Thomas R. Price (1818-1909), who also served in the C. S. A., and Emilissa (Stewart) Price (1816-1908). Elijah A. Price was a sergeant in Co. F. 22nd South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. and was killed at Petersburg, Virginia, in July 1864 when Union troops dug a tunnel under Confederate breastworks and set off an explosion using 8,000 pounds of gunpowder. This Confederate soldier's father owned 1.000 acres of land near Table Rock Mountain. That land is now the site of the Gauley Falls Subdivision and Golf Course. (Ouestion: Is this soldier the same man as the C. A. Price listed above?)

Harrison Price served in McMillan's Company, North Carolina Infantry during the Civil War. He was a son of John G. Price (b. ca 1817) and Frances Price (b. ca 1817). On August 15-16, 1921, he attended the 49th reunion of Orr's Rifles, held at Walhalla, S. C. At that time, this Confederate veteran was a resident of the Townville area of Oconee County, S. C.

Jeremiah Price served as a private in Co. H, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). No additional information available.

Joseph W. Price (1828-1907) was a private in Co. C. 4th South Carolina Cavalry (Butler's). He was transferred to Fort Sumter in Charleston harbor of S. C. in 1864. He resided in the Hurricane township of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C., and was a son of Harden Price (1799-1864) and Elizabeth (Alexander) Price (1864-1896). This soldier married Elizabeth Jane "Eliza" Trammell, and their children were Rachel F. E. J. Price (1870-1957), who married a Cox; Martha "Mattie" S. M. E. Price (1880-1947); and Joseph S. H. Price. In his will dated December 8, 1903, this Confederate veteran bequeathed a 350-acre tract of land on the Keowee River to his wife, Eliza. Joseph W. Price died in 1907 and was buried at Keowee Baptist Church in Pickens County, S. C.

S. W. Price served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. He survived the Civil War and died in 1880. No additional information available.

**Stephen P. Price** served in the Civil War during which he lost a limb as a result of a battle wound. In 1880, he received a voucher for the purchase of an artificial limb. At that time, he resided in Pickens County, S. C. (Is this the Ste-


phen Price who served in Co. A, 4th S. C. Reserves?)

Thomas K. (or R.) Price died while being held at Point Lookout, Maryland, in a prisoner of war camp. The date of his death was February 24, 1865, and his burial took place there in Confederate Cemetery.

T R. Price served as a corporal in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves between June 1862 and January 1863. No additional information available.

Warren R. Price was born about 1843, a son of Thomas Price (b. ca 1810) and Caroline Price (b. ca 1820). He is believed to have been a resident of what today is Oconee County, S. C. He was killed in action at Malvern Hill, Virginia, while serving in Co. C, 2nd South Carolina Rifles.

Berryman Prince (1843-1865) served as a private in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles. He was a son of John Prince (b. ca 1785-d. Dec 1862) and Rutha Prince (b. 1807-d. after 1870). This soldier enlisted in the C. S. A. in Pickens District, S. C., on October 30, 1861, for a period of three years or the duration of the war. On December 31, 1863, he was listed on his company's rolls as being in the "hands of the enemy." This soldier was sent to Point Lookout Prison in Maryland and was then transferred to Elmira Prison at Elmira, New York, where he died April 15, 1865. The cause of his death was chronic diarrhea. This soldier was buried in Woodlawn Cemetery at Elmira, New York (grave #1413).



Whilst the proprietor of the Habersham gold mines was one day overseeing his Negroes, he thought they lost too much time in scratching their heads; and the weather being warm, and their hair long, he humanly had them close-shaved. On shaking out the wool, after this operation was performed, he was no less surprised than delighted at finding several ounces of pure gold amongst it, which they secreted there while at work. Copied *from Macon*, *GA Telegraph*.

Comment on Garden's book called *Anecdotes of the Revolution* and **LaFayette**. Talking about Lafayette and his exploits, the editors writes, "One of the actors and sufferers in that daring adventure is now an estimable citizen of our district, and the other, **Dr. Bolman**, died a few years since in the service either of the Colombian, or Mexican Republic."

On page three of newspaper is a letter to Samuel Maverick about the tariff.

The Savannah Republican says: "We understand from a gentleman who left Fort Mitchell a few days since, that a Council of Chiefs, Headmen and Warriors of the Creek nation, are to meet at Watumka on the 14<sup>th</sup>, for the purpose of receiving a talk from the US Agent, on the subject of their removal west of the Mississippi. Great hopes are entertained that a majority of the Chiefs will consent to the removal of the balance of the nation the ensuing year."

It is believed, that one of the objects of the President's visit to the Hermitage, is an interview with the Cherokee Chiefs. If any man can dispose of the Indians to a peaceable and voluntary emigration, that man is **General Jackson**—he has more influence with them than anyone living. We wish him full success. It will be the best for all parties concerned. The Indians themselves will reap the great benefit. This subject requires no elucidation. It is plain enough already. *Georgia Courier*.

On Sunday morning the 25<sup>th</sup> ult. near this place, the **Rev. Henry Gains**, in the 94<sup>th</sup> year of his age, died. He was born in **King & Queen Co.**, **VA** and removed to this State when about 60 years old. He resided a few years in **Newberry and Abbeville**, but has been for about twenty years a resident of this neighborhood. He was a pious and exemplary member of the Methodist church, and for more than 50 years a preacher of the Gospel of Christ. His children, thirteen in number, and the number of his descendants though not precisely known, must be very large. He was married three times. His first wife, the mother of his children, lived to see them all married. The last two he married in his old age, but survived them both. Mr. Gains was remarkable for his quiet, peaceable, and Christian like disposition; and it is a singular fact that during his long life, and intercourse with the world, he never sued a single person, and was only once sued. In every neighborhood where he lived, he enjoyed the esteem of all around him, and died in the comfortable assurance of a happiness without end, beyond the grave.

#### **Pickens County Inquests**

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 1. An inquest was held at the house of William Clayton Senr. 27 Jun 1829 upon the dead body of Elizabeth Clayton. The jury brought it out that Elizabeth Clayton came to her death in her kitchen by the fall of a certain chimney made of wood and dirt which struck her on the head and her skull in one place broke her head in two other places mortally cut and knocked into the fire from which she recd. mortal burns with the aforesaid strokes caused her untimely death.

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 2. An inquest was taken at the mill of William Nicholson 21 Apr 1830 upon the dead body of Polly Elbertson. The jury brought it out that she came to her death by an accident by being caught by some wedges in the shaft of the mill which thereby caused her death. . . .

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 3. An inquest was taken near Peters Creek Meeting House in 7 Jan 1838 on the dead body of Moses Lesly then and there lying dead in the woods. The jury brought it out, that not having God before his eyes but moving and seduced by the instigation of the devil did in the woods near the said decd. house, shoot himself thru the head with his own rifle gun, supposed by holding the luffle [muzzle] of the gun to his forehead with one hand and throwing the trigger with a forked stick which he held in his other hand with both stick and gun lying on his body when found.

**Inquest. Pack 139. No. 4**. An inquest was held 20 May 1829 at the **Widow Smiths** on the dead body of **Absolem Martin** there lying dead. The jury brought it out that he came to his death by violence that he was struck with some weapon which broke his skull in two places and other wounds on his head which was the cause of his death.

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 5. An inquest was taken at the dwelling house of John Rankins in Pickens Dist. 20 Feb 1850 on the dead body of Nathaniel Rankin. The jury brought it out that on the evening of the 19 Feb 1850 the said Nathaniel Rankin took a shot gun from the dwelling house of John Rankin situated on Little River in Pickens Dist. proceeded to the corn crib of the said Rankin about 50 yards from the dwelling house, and then by the means of a twig of a small tree and thru the guard of the said gun drew the trigger having first placed the muzzle of gun to the right side of his head and in that position fired the same. . . .

James Eaton sworn says, that on the evening of the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. the sun about 2 or 3 hours high, he left the decd. in the door of his dwelling house. I told him to shut the door and lie down, that I was going to work. He said he would. I left him and went to my work about 200 yards off. After being at work about an hour, I heard the report of a gun, which he supposed to be at the Falls. About an hour after hearing the gun, I came back to the house, missing the decd. I made a search for him and soon found him lying dead. I found that he had not been moved, that the gun and all things remains he found there except a few fragments of the skull and brains which were picked up and laid near the body. Does not think that the mind of the decd. was as good as it had been many years ago. I immediately went to Hiram Kelly who had been at work with me, told him of the decd. and asked him to go and tell his mother. (In one place written James Eaton and another James Heaton.)

Ann Calhoun states that her son Hiram came and told her of Nathaniel Rankin's death. Saw the decd. yesterday after breakfast, shook hands with him, he seemed more active and more at himself than when she saw him about 2 weeks ago. Decd. was a nephew. He did not know me yesterday or when she first saw him, have been gone away a long time, had not seen him except the time before stated since he left this country. I made my self known to him, he said that he did not know her, don't know how he came to his death. . . .

Silas K. Calhoun states he had been with decd. a good deal lately, seemed to be as much at himself as usual.

**John Rankin** states that the decd. returned to his country some time before Christmas, had been away from it twenty odd years. I brought him back to this country. After his return, the decd. seemed to be low spirited lately. Talked more than when he first returned. I brought him back to this country to take care of him. He had no property; he was between 60 and 65 years old. . . .

**Inquest. Pack 139. No. 6.** An inquest was held at **Toxaway Bridge** 1 Oct 1838 on view of the bodies of three persons, one a man supposed to be 45 years, and a girl supposed to be 15 years, and a boy 13 years of age. The jury brought it out that they were murdered by a Negro who was in company with them with an ax on the night of 30 Sept. No names given. . . .

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 7. An inquest was held at Mrs. Martha Lawrence 1 Oct 1846 on view of the dead body of Jack a slave belonging to her. The jury brought it out that he came to his death by violence inflicted by the hands of a slave Willis also the property of Mrs. Martha Lawrence. That the slave Willis did slay Jack by striking him on the left side of his head with an oaken stick weighing about three pounds, about two feet nine inches long and about 8 inches in circumference, thereby fracturing the skull on the right and left side of the head. . . .

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 8. An inquest was held 16 Feb 1833 on the dead body of Berry Benson Lesley of Pickens Dist. The jury brought it out that he came to his death at his house. The said Lesley being a lad of about 11 years of ago and being left alone in the house on the evening of the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. and whiskey being in the house, and within the command of said boy, and he not having sufficient prudence or command over himself, did drink the said whiskey until he became intoxicated and in that situation fell out of the door on a cold rainy night, which we believe occasioned his death. . . .

**Inquest. Pack 139. No. 9.** An inquest was held 8 Aug 1834 on the dead body of **Lawrence Symmes** of **Pickens Dist**. The jury brought it out that he came to his death on the evening of the 5<sup>th</sup> inst. by being struck with lightning under the providence of God. The body having lain so long before found, rendered it unnecessary for clean examination, the body being found lying against a tree apparently struck with lightening at that time, and a part of his clothing forced into the tree where the lightening struck. . . .

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 10. An inquest was held 3 Feb 1833 on the dead body of Levy Young. The jury brought it out that he came to his death from exposure & perhaps an excess of intoxication from the use of illiterate (sic) spirits and a fall from his horse.

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 11. An inquest was held 13 Mar 1854 on the dead body of Henry Henson of Rabun Co., GA then and there on said Callas Mountain. The jury brought it out that he came to his death by voluntary intoxication and while drunk falling from his horse into a small rivulet which wet him very much and then rolling the distance of 25 or 30 steps down the muddy road. This with the cold atmosphere of the night of the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. extinguished his life. He was 65 years of age. Inquest was held in Pickens Dist.

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 12. An inquest was held at the house of James Daw decd. late a tenant on Lewis Eaton's land on the west side of Little River, one mile and ¼ below the High Fall on said river in Pickens Dist. on 13 Jun 1855. The jury brought it out that he came to his death by hanging himself with a rope to the eave bar of his dwelling house at his residence on Little River below the High Falls,

sometime between the hours of 3 o'clock on Tuesday the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. and 12 o'clock on Wednesday the 13<sup>th</sup> inst.

**E.B.H. Gibson** sworn says that the decd. had been working at house yesterday. Thinks about 2 hours and half by the sun. Seemed to work with more diligence yesterday than common. Complained of being sick. Head decd. say that if his wife **Nancy** did not do better than she had been doing he intended to put himself where she would not see him any more. Thinks decd. was a weak minded man. Heard him say that his life had been threatened by **Mr. Hollis** the old man. **Hollis** was not drinking when he said that he threatened his life. His objections to his wife's conduct seemed to be because she was often from home and would not make him clothes. Yesterday he said that **Hollis** would always be abusing him when he was drinking but was good to him when sober.

Alexander Bryce Jr. sworn says he heard the alarm about 12 o'clock this day by Mrs. Nancy Daw wife of the decd. Was down on Little River when the alarm was given. Thought Mrs. Daw was near the house when she made the alarm. I runned to Mr. Crenshaws to learn what caused the alarm. Saw Mrs. Daw near Crenshaw's house. She said that **Jim** had hung himself. Wanted me to go with her to see. I first refused, then I said I would go after some body, did not want to go by myself. Mrs. Daw said that when she first came into sight, she thought the deed, was looking at the sun. She came a little closer and found that he had hung himself. I came in sight of the deed, and saw him handing. Mrs. Daw was with me, she had been crying when she saw the deed, hanging, cried vehemently and slapped her hands, approaching the dead body. I stopped her, told her I would go after some body, but head some one near by. Waited and saw it was Mrs. Daw's brother E. Hollis who said to Mrs. Daw come on, I am not afraid. After coming nearer Mrs. Daw said to me don't let E. Hollis go to the decd. as she thought he was drinking. E. Hollis came to me and said that he thought the decd. had one of them spells. Saw him standing out there and thought Mrs. **Daw** was afraid deed, would hurt her. I was informed that he subject to fits. Soon after E. Hollis came up, Moses Hollis his father came up to. Saw deed, hanging and said it was awful. Seemed to be very much affected, was trembling. Mrs. **Daw** seemed greatly troubled and said she had no body to take care of her. E. Hollis said yes you have. If James Daw has hung himself, you cannot help it. E. Hollis was her brother....

Moses Hollis sworn says, that Mrs. Daw the wife of decd. stayed at my house last night. Left there some time after breakfast. Heard nothing of the death of James Daw till he came to the house of decd. Came because he heard some one hollowing as if in great distress. Took it to be Nancy my daughter, the wife of said decd. I live about three fourths of a mile from the house of the decd. in a strait course, has often heard people hollow from the house of decd. to his house.

**Inquest. Pack 139. No. 13.** An inquest was held in the death of **Alexander Kuhtman** in Pickens Dist. The jury brought it out that he came to his death by shooting himself with a pistol discharged by his own hand at his own house near **A. Ivester's** on the morning of the 5<sup>th</sup> of April 1856. . . .

**Inquest. Pack 139. No. 14.** An inquest was held at **Elam Sharps Mill** on the waters of **Tomassee Creek** in Pickens Dist. on the 12<sup>th</sup> Oct 1853 on the dead body of **Mary McDanniel** being dead in said mill. The jury brought it out that she came to her death by accident by the act of God by being caught between the log wheel and turned? head of said mill and was crushed to death. . . .

Inquest. Pack 139. No. 15. An inquest was held 12 Jan 1851 on the dead body of Sarah Moss at the house of Alfred Moss near the Station. Elihu Moss says, he saw his mother Sarah Moss on Saturday morning last, she was then well, was not subject to any sudden attacks. Saw her last night. The family was not present when the body was first discovered. Miles Moss said that one of the little children cried to come out, kept calling for its mother, then the baby cried. Mr. Moss then called for his wife she did not answer, continued to call, at length he said surely she must be dead and ordered a light to be brought, the light was carried and Sarah Moss was found dead. Alfred Moss the husband of the decd. was in bed with his wife. About an hour before he heard his father talking, did not hear his mother speak, his mother did not complain when she went to bed. Father had been

drinking. No harsh words were passed between mother and father during the evening. Went to bed at the usual hour. Was not awake during the night. Do not think any violence was done to her, was not subject to fits, she was a healthy woman.

Cresswell Moss said that he was here last night. His mother was well. All went to bed at the usual hour. Heard the child Eliza cry in the night then Lotty. Miles took the child Elisa and carried her out. Lotty cried and called her mother. The baby kept saying she wanted to suck. Alfred Moss then called his wife and ordered his son Wilson to make a light. Turned over to his wife and said she was dead.

Mary Todd said that she has examined the body particularly. It is very much marked, does not know whether it is from the settling of the blood or not, marked on the left side in clear and dark spots, don't know whether it is bruises or not. Also marked on the back, like them on the side only smaller. Also a mark on the left cheek, looks like it had been a strike by something and not long inflicted, not more than a few days. I came to the place last night about 3 o'clock, saw nothing when she came to arouse suspicions. Reports says that Moss was not a kind husband, heard Moss tell about whipping his wife. Moss said today that he knocked his wife with a chair about Christmas.

Nathaniel Reid vs. Allen Keith. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 140. The complainant states that some 14 years ago, he purchased from the defendant a tract of land of 116 acres, that a small portion of the tract containing 14 acres and running up near the dwelling house was particularly represented by the defendant as part of the land to be sold, that under these representations the complainant went into possession of the premises and for the last 13 years has cleared and under cultivation a portion of the said 14 acres, as part of his property. That within a short period the defendant purchased a tract of land from Dr. Lewis which on a resurvey was found to include the 14 acres thus held by the complainant and was under an older title. The defendant has instituted a suit against the complainant to recover the land. Filed 15 Oct 1845.

Larkin Hendricks. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 141. Larkin Hendricks states that about the 6<sup>th</sup> Jan 1842 he with Abel Hendricks and Bennett Hendricks entered into a co-partnership for the purchase of purchasing a cotton yarn and other articles in South Carolina, trading and selling the same in the western states, where the same could be done with profit and advantage of the said parties. That in pursuance of the objects of the said co-partnership the said partners purchased a large quantity of cotton yarn from one Vardy McBee of Greenville District in the said states and made to the said Vardy McBee their joint and several sealed note for the sum of one thousand and twenty two dollars, payable one day after date bearing date the 6<sup>th</sup> Jan 1842. They further show that in purchasing the said cotton yarn the said Abel and Bennett Hendricks took the same to Alabama or Mississippi. To sell and trade in accordance with their partnership, and was sold in Ala. and Miss. at very profitable and advantageous prices. That the said Abel and Bennett Hendricks recd. payment for the said cotton yarn sold by them. Larkin Hendricks states that the said Abel & Bennett Hendricks out of the proceeds of the sale of the cotton varn paid \$280,00 on the said note to Vardy McBee and that all the remainder of the proceeds of the said cotton yarn have been kept them and appropriated to their own use. That he has been compelled to pay by suit and otherwise from his own private means very large sums of money about \$700.00 upon the said note to the said Vardy McBee, besides the costs and expenses in and about the same. That he has recd. from Abel and Bennett Hendricks any portion of the proceeds of the sale of the cotton yarn. That shortly after this sale Bennett Hendricks left this state and has since remained and is now absent from and without the limits of this state. That about 25 Sept 1851 David Hendricks the father of Bennett Hendricks deed, in Pickens Dist, leaving personal estates amounting to about three thousand five hundred dollars and leaving real estates amounting to about two thousand dollars. Admr. of his estate was granted to George Hendricks who has possessed of himself of the same. File April 1, 1853.

William L. Keith. Clerk of Court. Equity. Pack 142. Elizabeth B. Keith, Elliott M. Keith, Thomas J. Keith states that William L. Keith died on May 20, 1856. Before his death, he was appointed to represent Adaline D. Lawrence in her share of her decd. father's estate, Stephen C. Reid who died in 1845. That at the time of the inter marriage of Benjamin F. Lawrence to the said Adaline D. Lawrence which marriages was greatly against the will and desire of her father Stephen C. Reid. Filed 22 May 1860.

#### Miscellaneous Records, Clerk of Court Office, Pack 143

**Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 1.** On May 3, 1861 L. D. Justice appeared before Abel Robins a Magistrate for Pickens Dist. and after being sworn sayeth that he good reasons to believe and doth believe that Jacob Butt Senr. did sell spirituous liquors on or about the 20<sup>th</sup>. Decr. [December] last passed by the quart and allowed it to be drank at his own house. He was arrested for Retailing without Licenses. And also keeping a disorderly house.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 2. L. D. Justice appeared before Abel Robins a Magistrate for Pickens Dist. and on being sworn sayeth that he has good reason to believe that Jacob Butt Sr., David Fowler, Jacob Butt & Elizabeth Teasley on or about the 13<sup>th</sup> Sept. last passed did play cards for whiskey.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 3. On Oct. 18, 1866 Sarah White appeared before the magistrate and being duly sworn saith that she has good reason to believe that Berry Gooden did on the 11<sup>th</sup> Oct. 1866 did feloniously take steal and carry away two pair of pants from her.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 4. On Oct. 23, 1872 a complaint was made unto J. W. Singleton trial justice by Harvey C. Hunt that Allen Ponder P. C. did on the 19<sup>th</sup> Oct. inst. willfully and maliciously throw a stone at a cow the property of the said H. C. Hunt, and broke on of her hind legs thereby injuring the said cow, so he had to kill her. . . . Allen Ponder was sentenced 20 days in the county jail.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 5. On Sept. 8, 1871, Ella King made complaint to Joab Mauldin the Sheriff that Washington Stegall, Patrick Stegall, John Stegall, Andrew P. Jameson, Wm. Stegall and Sidney Stegall did on the night of Sept. 3 of Sept. inst. break into her house by pulling off the plank off, nearly one half of two squares of the house and did lay violent hands upon her and she jumped out of the house and John Stegall dragged her off and beat her. Washington Stegall laid violent hands on her by striking her in the face and as she jumped out of the house John Stegall took hold of her and threw her over the fence and dragged her 20 paces and beat her severely.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 6. A warrant was taken on Warren Anderson on Feb. 26, 1870 by Phillip B. Martin who sworn says that on the night of Nov. 11, 1869 one Warren Anderson did steal, take and feloniously carry away from his premise a certain amount of corn which he supposes to be one half bushel.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 7. On Decr. 10, 1868 a warrant was taken out for John Westly Vickery by Elisha Alexander who states that he believes that the said John W. Vickery did on or about the 8<sup>th</sup> Decr. 1868 commit an assault & battery upon Elizabeth Vickery the wife of the said John W. Vickery. Also, a warrant was taken out by Mary Holden, Elizabeth Vickery,

Adeline Alexander & Milly Alexander did on or about the 8<sup>th</sup> Decr. 1868 come to the house of said Mary Holden in a riotous manner and committed an assault & battery upon the said Mary Holden.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 8. A warrant was taken out by Jacob Collins against Theodore Forester and Harmon Gregg that they did steal and take away one yellow or sandy colored barrow hog and make meat of him on Aug. 27, 1869.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 9. On Dec. 17, 1868 Judith Sutherland appeared before J. B. Reid a magistrate and had a warrant taken for Greenberry Allison that he did on Wednesday evening 16<sup>th</sup> inst. violently assault and beat her by throwing a large rock at her which struck her on the arm causing her arm for the time to be disabled, as also the rock at the same time hitting her small child. That he then beat her as also beat several of her children and swearing that he had come to kill her, and abusing her in divers ways and her begging for mercy all the while. She says that it was all done by the said Allison with out any provocation on her part.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 10. On March 24, 1870 Julius A. Daniels of Anderson County states that his wife Sarah A. A. Daniels was at the time of said court confined to her house by sickness and from this cause was deterred from attending without great risk to herself. She was required to attend as a state witness in the case of the state vs. John Donnally and Amanda Donnally charged with stealing chickens and burglary. ...

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 11. On April 12 1869 Hester Moore took out a warrant against William Moore, Charles Graham, James M. Gwinn that they did commit an assault and battery on the person of her son Harvey Moore about the 8<sup>th</sup> April 1869.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 12. On Sept. 9, 1870 Ellen Rackley took out a warrant against Thomas Williams, Lidia Ann Williams, Henry Williams, and that she fears that they will do her some bodily harm.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 13. John T. Anthony states on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. Thomas Griffin did commit an assault and battery upon his person by striking him with his fist and drew his knife in striking distance and swore that he would cut his throat. Dated June 14, 1869.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 14. On Mar. 24, 1871 a warrant was taken out for Kate Hill by Patrick Stegall who sworn states that he has reason to believe that the said Kate Hill did on the 29<sup>th</sup> July 1870 did steal \$90.00 of his money by abstracting the same from the pocket of his brother James Stegall.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 15. On Jan. 13, 1872 George Cannon, Clinton Cannon sworn says that they believe that one James Ladd did on the night of Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> Jan. 1872 in Pickens County commit an assault and battery upon their brother Thomas Cannon with a knife by stabbing said upon their brother Thomas Cannon in the back and inflicting a serious and perhaps a mortal wound from which the said Thomas Cannon is deemed to be in a critical condition and that they believe that Jeptha Crain & David Gilstrap are material witnesses to prove the same.

Miscellaneous Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 143. No. 16. On June 1, 1870, Whitman Neighbors states that he has reason to believe that Charles Austin of Pickens County has been retailed spirituous liquors. . . . without a license.

#### WILLIAM KING EASLEY

Mrs. H. D. Earl (Lila Easley), Greenville, S.C., Granddaughter of William King Easley

The first member of the Easley family to come to the state of South Carolina was Robert with his wife Mary Allen, who moved to the state from Virginia. The exact date of their arrival is not known but in 1786, they bought a tract of land of 100 acres, extending along George's Creek to the Saluda River. Here they made their home and this land remained the Easley Homestead through several generations. One of Robert's sons was John Allen whose wife was Elizabeth King. They occupied the family home, which had been named River Side. There were six children in their family. The second son was William King, who was born January 28, 1825.

The children attended private schools, the first of which was taught by Mr. Charles McGregor of Charleston. This school was known as the "New Hope Infant School" and was located about one mile from River Side. In describing the school in later years, William King Easley said that his brother became initiated in the rudiments of spelling and arithmetic, that he was initiated in the mysteries of juvenile mischief, and became an expert climber of trees for birds' nests and was not a mean hand at marbles. In his youth, William King Easley developed a great love for literature. He had a wonderful memory and it was said that when a boy of sixteen, he memorized the fifteenth chapter of Exodus in fifteen minutes. He was a student of science and history as well as law and was considered a fine classical scholar, although he was not a graduate of any college. He was admitted to the bar when quite a young man.

He went to New Orleans for the purpose of practicing his profession. When yellow fever became an epidemic in the city, he returned to South Carolina and opened an office in the Pickens County Court House. After a few years, he moved his office to Greenville but retained his home in Pickens County. He was elected to the state Legislature from Pickens County. He was instrumental in helping to organize the State Militia and was made the first Adjutant General of the State. From that time, he was known as General Easley.

William King Easley was one of the signers of the Ordinance of Secession and his name with that of R. E. Thompson of Walhalla is inscribed with the names of the other signers, on the walls of the State House at Columbia. When the war came on he raised a company of cavalry in Pickens and Greenville Counties and was received into the Confederate Army at Charleston, with the commission of major. After serving a short time, he was forced to resign his commission because of typhoid fever and he returned to his home.

In 1865 he again was elected to the State Legislature and took a very active part in the affairs of the state. In 1869 or 1879, he represented Pickens County in the State Senate. The Legislature of the State chartered and franchised the building of the Charlotte and Atlanta railroad, giving the counties the right of bond themselves to help build the road. This charter was in the form of a bill and passed the lower house of Representatives and went to the Senate. It appeared on the face of it that the railroad would be built from Charlotte through Spartanburg, Greenville, Anderson, Athens and on to Atlanta.

Senator Easley got the Senator from Anderson to agree to something like the following: as an amendment to the charter; "Provide that the said railroad shall be constructed or built north of the headwaters of Eighteen-Mile Creek." This provision made it impossible for the road to be built further south than it is. Eighteen-Mile Creek starts from a spring in the city limits of the town of Easley. For this work of getting the road through this section, the people of the little town that sprang up there named it Easley.

General Easley married Caroline Sloan of Pendleton, South Carolina. There were nine children in the family. The oldest was John Allen Easley of Greenville. Their summers were spent at River Side but during the winter they lived at Greenville General Easley was never a strong man and during the latter years of his life his health became very poor, having been impaired by long hours of study. His custom was to remain in this office till late hours.

He died in 1872 after a few days of illness in the city of Atlanta, where he had gone on business for the railroad. His wife died a few months earlier, leaving eight children, the oldest of whom was then a lad of seventeen. (At this time his younger brother Samuel Allen Easley, moved from South Carolina to Texas, taking with him several of his brother's orphaned children.)

Although General Easley was only forty-seven at the time of his death, he had a reputation as an orator, many of his speeches being on political subjects of the time. He was also an artist and a musician, his favorite musical instrument being the violin. Among his private writings were many of his speeches, also interesting accounts of the family's early life in the State. He talked much of his childhood in Pickens County. He also wrote beautiful descriptions of the mountains, forests and hunting in the country.

His untimely death was mourned by his many friends, one of whom was S. S. Crittendon, who wrote of him, "Endowed by nature with rare gifts of mind and oratory which he cultivated with the ardor of a student and inspired by noble ambition, he quickly rose to the top of his profession. Possessed also of noble and generous principals, he had the faculty more than anyone the writer had ever known, of attaching to himself, by hooks of steel, the friends with whom he associated."

## Revolutionary War Pension Application, Richard Carver S.21679

**Richard Carver** of Pickens in the State of South Carolina was a private in the company commanded by Captain **Tate** of the Regt. commanded by Col. Buford in the Virginia line for 6 months. Inscribed on the Roll of South Carolina at the rate of 20 Dollars [and no] cents per annum to commence on the 4th day of March 1831. Certificate of Pension issued the 16 day of May '33 and sent to Col. **J. Grisham**, Falls P. O. Pickens Dist., S.C.

State of South Carolina. March Term 1833 Pickens District.

On this the twelfth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & thirty three personally appeared in open court before the Hon. **Josiah J. Evans** in the Court of General Sessions & Common Pleas now sitting for the District aforesaid. **Richard Carver** a resident of Pickens District in the State aforesaid aged sixty nine years, who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.


That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. He substituted & took the place of **James Carver** (who was drafted) under Capt. **Nathaniel Tate** of Bedford County Virginia and served under Col **Buford** - He was marched into North Carolina first to Hillsboro then to Haw & Deep Rivers pursuing the American Army but was unable to join them until they got to Hillsboro, he was out three months. He does not recollect the exact time but he was discharged sometime after **Gates**' defeat in 1780.

He afterward in 1781 volunteered under Capt. **Saml. Ewen** of Col. **Joseph Martin's** Regt. of Washington County Virginia & was after the Cherokee Indians, and guarded Chaistman's old Station in Powels Valley — won in some skirmishes with the Indians under Col. **Martin**. He served out the term of three months was dismissed in the wilderness & the Col. was to meet at the Station and give a discharge, but he never came to the Station

This declarant has no documentary evidence of his services - He has a friend who can prove that he was in the service & -- the first term of duty - he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can further testify to his service - This declarant was born in **Albermarle County in Virginia**. [A]t twelve years of age he came to **Bedford County** where he lived at the time he entered service- he moved to **Spartanburg** about 1792. He lived there upwards of 20 years. [H]e then moved into **Pendleton District** where he has lived ever since and since the Division he has lived in **Pickens District**. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension roll of the agency's of any State -

We, **Benj. D. DuPre**, a clergyman, residing in the District of Pickens & state of South Carolina, and **Col. J. C. Kilpatrick** residing in the same hereby certify, that we are well acquainted with **Richard Carver**, who has subscribed & sworn to the within declarations; that we believe him to be sixty nine years of age; that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution.

Pickens District. **Joseph Carver** appeared & made oath that he took a horse & carried the above named **Richard Carver** to the Army in Bedford County VA where he was taken as a substitute & this deponent does verily believe he did serve as he has stated in there. 12 Mar 1833.

I want to make all biographical sketches as free of errors and as complete as possible. Thus, I urge readers to help in this effort. Thanks very much. C. H. B.

J. Franklin Prince was born about 1842, a son of Jonathan Prince (b. ca 1787 in Edgefield County, S. C.) and Jane (Gilliam) Prince (b. ca. 1808-d. ca. 1880). He enlisted as a private in Co. I, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) on April 14, 1861, at Pendleton, S. C. His company was commanded by Capt. W. W. Hollingsworth. This soldier died of measles in a hospital at Culpeper, Virginia, on August 26, 1861. On March 24, 1863, his father, Jonathan Prince, was paid \$24.53.

James E. F. Prince served as a private in Co. I, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers. He enlisted in Pendleton, S. C., on April 14, 1861, for a period of one year. This soldier was reported on his company's muster roll of July 1, 1861, as sick in general hospital.

William Patrick Prince was apparently from Anderson County, S. C. He served in Co. A, Beauregard's S. C. Artillery, C. S. A. (A man named William P. Prince served in Co. G, 5th S. C. Reserves and Co. G, 10th S. C. Infantry. Same man as above?) This Confederate soldier was buried at Good Hope Presbyterian Church in Anderson County, S. C.

William M. Prince was born about 1841. He was a son of John and Rutha Prince who resided on waters of Twelve Mile River in Pickens District, S. C. He first served in Co. H, 4th S. C. Infantry (Sloan's Regt.). On his company's muster roll of December 31, 1861, this soldier was listed as in general hospital. Then, on April 15, 1862, he enlisted at Richmond, Virginia, in Co. B, 37th Battalion Virginia Cavalry. At that time his age was recorded as 21 years. On a muster roll of November 1863 - August 1864, this soldier's name was listed as a trooper who was absent without leave.

- Seth/ Thornton Prior, Jr. (1840-1927) was a resident of the Dacusville area of eastern Pickens District, S. C. He served to the rank of first sergeant of Co. B, 1st South Carolina Cavalry. This soldier's father, Seth Thornton Prior, Sr., also served with his son in the same military unit during the Civil War. The junior Prior married Mary Jane Latham (28 May 1853-21 Apr 1930). In 1922, this Confederate veteran was a recipient of a Civil War pension. He died in 1927 and was buried at Dacusville United Methodist Church in Pickens County, S. C. The following dates are included on his tombstone: Born Oct. 2, 1840 Died Dec. 26, 1927.
- Seth Thornton Prior, Sr. served in Co. B, 1st S. C. Cavalry, C. S. A. He was the father of the soldier listed above. No additional information available.
- Seaborn Celly Pritchard enlisted as a private in Co. E, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers (Sloan's Regt.) at Fair Play, near Pendleton, S. C., on April 14, 1861. He was mustered into Confederate service the following June 7th. He was seriously wounded and then hospitalized at Culpeper, Virginia, between August 31 and October 31, 1861. Then, on December 11, 1861, he was discharged from the C. S. A. His discharge papers contain the phrase "incapacitated by gunshot wound." After the Civil War, this man migrated to Adairsville, Georgia.
- William Anderson Pritchard was born about 1833, a son of Henry Pritchard (b. ca 1792) and Sarah Pritchard (b. ca. 1794). (Note: A man named William Pritchard served in Co. A, 25th South Carolina Infantry, and another man with the same name served in the 1st S. C. Mounted Militia (Kirk's Company). Are all these the same man?) William Anderson Pritchard married Eliza Adaline Hutchins (12 Oct 1828-23 Dec 1886). She was a daugter of Abner Franklin Hutchins (b. 5 Apr 1805) and Lucinda (DeViney) Hutchins (b. 24 Dec 1804-d. 21 Nov 1859). This soldier's wife died in 1886 as a result of an accident in which she was seriously burned while making a fire with kerosene. She was buried at Bethel Baptist Church in the Oakway community of Oconee County, S. C.
- Zachery C. Pulliam, Jr. served as a 2nd lieutenant in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.), from which he was transferred to the 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.) in which he served to the rank of captain in Co. H. He was wounded at Manassas, Virginia, and died of those wounds. In his will of July 16,

- 1861, this Confederate soldier wrote, "I desire that after the payment of my just debts the balance of my estate be distributed among the widows and orphans of the members of the Keowee Rifles." He appointed James E. Hagood executor of the estate. The will was proven on February 16, 1863, in Pickens District, S. C.
- N. P. Pulling served as a private in Co. K, 12th S. C. Infantry. He died of battle wounds at Chester, Pennsylvania, on July 28, 1864, having been wounded at Champion Hill. No additional information available. (Note: Could this man's surname have been Pulliam?)
- Samuel A. Purdy served in Co. G, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Regiment, held at Seneca, S. C., in August 1916. At that time, he was a resident of the Iva section of Anderson County, S. C.
- David Quarles (1840-1894) enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was twenty years of age. He was a son of Hubbard Quarles (b. ca 1784) and Artemissa Quarles (b. ca 1812). He was also a brother of Jackson Quarles and George Quarles, both of whom also served in the C. S. A. David Quarles married Margaret Richey (1841-1891) in 1859 in Pickens District, S. C. The wedding was performed by D. P. Robins, Esquire. This Confederate veteran died November 2, 1894, and was buried at Double Springs Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.
- George Quarles enlisted as a private in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and was transferred to another unit during the Civil War. He was a brother of David and Jackson Quarles, both of whom also served ine the C. S. A. (Question: Is this soldier the G. W. Quarles who served as a 2nd lieutenant in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry and was killed in action at Petersburg, Virginia on July 24, 1864?)
- Jackson Quarles was born about 1836 and resided in the northern section of what today is Oconee County, S. C. He served as a private in Co. H, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.) and died July 23, 1862, at Richmond, Virginia. He was survived by wife Sarah Ann (Dunn) Quarles and two children, Arty M. and James J. Quarles. Jackson Quarles and his wife were married by D. P. Robins, Esquire, on May 22, 1859. This soldier was a son of Hubbard and Artimissa Quarles and a brother of David and George Quarles, both of whom served in the C. S. A. (see above). In 1902, Sarah Ann Quarles

was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, S. C.

- James Hamilton Rackley was a son of Reddin Rackley (b. 1819) and Elizabeth (Looper) Rackley (b. 1817). He enlisted as a private in Co. H, 4th S. C. Infantry (Sloan's Regt.). He also served in Co. B, Palmetto Sharpshooters. On October 10, 1861, he and thirty other local men rode past Pickens Court House on the Keowee River on their way to defend their homeland. This soldier died of disease in Virginia on June 1, 1864 (or 1863?).
- L. Rackley (or Racklen) was a private in Co. G, 12th S. C. Infantry. He died at Richmond, Virginia, and was buried there in Oakwood Cemetery (Grave #27, Row J, Div. B). No additional information available.
- William Rackley served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864.
- William B. Rackley enlisted as a private in Co. B, Palmetto Sharpshooters at Pendleton, S. C., June 28, 1862. He was captured by the enemy, held in a prisoner-of-war camp and died there during the Civil War. He was a son of Warren R. Rackley (1829-1870) and Mary C. Rackley (b. ca 1823). He was a grandson of William Rackley.
- W. Rockley (or Rackley) was a private in Co. A, 20th South Carolina Infantry. He died June 18, 1864, at Richmond, Virginia, and was buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (Grave #U330). No additional information available.
- Joseph Hamilton Raines (1840-1913) was a son of Stephen Raines (b. 1812) and Falbie (or Fablie) "Polly" (Hardin) Raines (b. 1814). He was born in Greenville District, S. C., and once resided in the Peters Creek Church community in the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. During the Civil War, he served in Co. H, 62nd North Carolina Infantry and in Co. G, 16th S. C. Infantry. He married Millie (Mary) Fortner (b. 1838-d. 3 Sep 1917), who was a daughter of Jackson Fortner and Polly (Hood) Fortner of Pickens District, S. C. Joseph Hamilton Raines and his wife were the parents of at least nine children who were born between 1862 and 1882. In 1899, his name was listed on the Civil War pension roll of Pickens County, S. C. In 1902, this Confederate veteran resided near Looper Post Office in Pickens County, S. C., and

- received a Civil War pension. He died February 1, 1913.
- A. R. Ramey resided in the Westminster community of what today is Oconee County, S. C. His wife, Mary A. Ramey (1878-1941), received an annual Civil War widow's pension of \$160.00 in the 1930s. (Question: Is this soldier Andrew Ramey who served in Co. C, 21st North Carolina Infantry?)
- Albert Ramey was a member of Beauregard's South Carolina Light Artillery, C. S. A. A memorial marker without any dates was placed in the cemetery of Holly Springs Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C., for this Confederate soldier. His wife was Margaret Ramey.
- David Ramey (1845-1930) was born February 2, 1845, and he served as a private in Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. As a result of a battle wound, he received a voucher in 1880 for the purchase of an artificial limb. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C. His wife was Mary C. Ramey (d. 1932). This Confederate veteran became a minister of the gospel. He died January 9, 1930, and was buried at Boone's Creek Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.
- James W. Ramey was a member of Co. K, 12th South Carolina Infantry, and he was wounded in action during the Wilderness campaign in Virginia. He survived the Civil War and returned to his home in the northern section of western Pickens District (now Oconee County). As the result of a battle wound, he received a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis in 1880. This Confederate veteran was buried at Mt. Carmel Baptist Church at Jocassee, S. C., but his grave was moved to Hillcrest Memorial Park at Pickens, S. C., during the construction of Lake Jocassee in the 1970s.
- Joel L. Ramey (1833-1862) married Mariah Carver (b. 7 Jun 1836), a Cherokee Indian. He was a son of James R. Ramey (b. 1788 in North Carolina) and Margaret Ramey. Apparently, this Confederate soldier served in Co. K, 24th Georgia Infantry during the Civil War. Ramey and his wife had four children: Martin Ramey (b. 1856); Margaret J. Ramey (b. ca 1858 and died between 1870 and 1880); Sarah Jane Ramey (19 Jun 1854-13 Jun 1929), who married William Andrew Ramey; and William David Ramey (b. ca 1862), who married Dicie (or Disa) Woodall. Joel L. Ramey was a twin brother of Josiah Ramey, who also served in the C. S. A. (see below). The twins' birth was the twelfth one for their mother.

Josiah Ramey (1833-1863) was a twin brother of Joel L. Ramey (see above), who also served in the C. S. A. He died one week after having entered the Confederate Army. He was a son of James R. Ramey (b. 1788) and Margaret Ramey.

Thomas Ramey served in the 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, on July 24, 1863. He was buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (Grave #U24).


Ramey (given name unknown). In 1899, F. Caroline Ramey, a 91-year-old widow of a Confederate veteran was a recipient of a Civil War pension. She resided in Whetstone township of Oconee County in 1901. Her husband served in Co. G, 12th S. C. Infantry.


John Franklin Rampey (1842-1913) was born October 22, 1842, a son of John "Jackson" Rampey (1811-1891) and Mary Elizabeth (Dowis) Rampey (1824-1889). This soldier resided in the Salubrity area (now Liberty) of the eastern division of Pickens District, S. C. At the age of eighteen he enlisted as a private in Co. E, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.) at Pickensville (now Easley), S. C. He was seriously wounded during the Wilderness campaign in Virginia when hit by a ball that embedded in his head. The ball remained there throughout the remainder of his life. He returned to Pickens District after the war and lost an ear in a syrup mill accident. This Confederate veteran's first wife was Carolina (Smith) Rampey (1840-1875), and his second wife was Mary Frances (Youngblood) Rampey (1853-1908). In 1883, he attended a reunion of his military company at Easley, S. C., and in 1891 this veteran's name was listed on the Civil War pension roll of Pickens County, S. C. In 1891, he made suit for letters of administration for the estate of John Rampey, deceased. Then, in 1892, he was involved in the suit of J. F. Rampey, et. al. vs E. Toccoa Rampey, et. al., as a result of which 102 acres of land was sold to J. M. Rampey for \$310.00.

Andrew H. Ramsay (1832-1909), a native of South Carolina, entered Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) as a first lieutenant when he was twenty-nine years of age. Then, in August 1862, he was promoted to captain and made company commander following the death of Capt. Miles Moore Norton who was wounded in action and died August 30, 1862. Orr's Regiment was attached to A. P. Hill's division of the Army of Northern Virginia. Capt. Ramsay resigned from the Confederate Army May 1, 1864, after which he returned to his home in the

western division of Pickens County, S. C. His home was situated on the Tugaloo River; he became a merchant at Jarrett's Bridge where he remained for nine years. On July 3, 1867, he married Sallie A. Jarrett, and the couple eventually had nine children. In 1874, shortly after the town of Toccoa, Georgia, was established on the Charlotte-Atlanta Air Line Railroad, Ramsay and his family moved to the new town. There, he established a new mercantile business and a livery stable, both of which he operated until his retirement. In 1875, Capt. Ramsay, assisted by Dr. Owen Doyle, organized the First Presbyterian Church in Toccoa, and he was elected one of its elders, an office he held in the church until his death in 1909. Ramsay was survived by his widow and children and by the following two brothers and two sisters: William J. Ramsay and Mrs. T. Swift Davis, both of Toccoa, Georgia; G. Jule Ramsay of the Madison community of Oconee County, S. C., and Mrs. W. R. Rankin of Calhoun, Georgia. According to a front-page obituary published in the Toccao Record of December 16, 1909, Captain Ramsay was also survived by the following children: Robert A. Ramsay of Greenville, S. C.; Doyle H. Ramsay of Birmingham, Alabama; Mrs. G. W. Ramsay, Sumterville, Alabama; Miss Mabel Ramsay, Cornelia, Georgia; Misses Lyda and L. D. Ramsay, Mrs. Rollo Franklin, and Messrs. George and Edwin Ramsay, all of Toccoa, Georgia. Captain Ramsay's funeral was held at his church and was conducted by the Rev. E. L. Siler. Pallbearers at the funeral were John W. Owen, W. A. Matheson, W. R. Bruce, D. J. Simpson, W. Calvin Simpson and John H. Busha.

**T. G. Ramsey** enlisted as a private in Co. E, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was twenty-two years of age. During the Civil War, he was transferred to the 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He resided in what today is Oconee County, S. C.

#### **September 15, 1830**

I received a letter from Major Eaton, dated yesterday, in which he says, "the Chickasaws are here, and the Choctaws are expected today. The Chickasaw consist of 16 or 18 Chiefs, and the Choctaws of about 60. I have not heard anything of the Cherokees or Creeks." (Copied from *U.S. Telegraph*)

U. S. Troops, one from Charleston, one from Augusta, and one from Fort Mitchell to Georgia gold fields in Cherokee country "to repress the working of the mines." (Copied from the *Recorder*)

The Columbia Times reports that Hon. Robert Stark died at his residence near that place on the 4<sup>th</sup> inst. He was a soldier of the Revolution, having joined the standard of his country at the age of 15 years. He fought at Kings Mountain, Cowpens and Eutaw. After the war he became a successful and honest lawyer, was for a number of years Solicitor on his circuit, and at the time of his death, Secretary of State. He was sixty-six years old.

The Columbia Times reports that Hon. Robert Clendinen, Senator from York district died.

There were probably seven or 800 persons at the Barbacue [sic] at Pickens Court House on Friday last, and we are happy to state that propriety and good order prevailed generally. The Hon. Warren R. Davis addressed the citizens in a speech of considerable length about the Tariff. Letters were read from Baylis J. Earle and W. Thompson Esqrs. and Dr. William Butler of Greenville.

On the first Monday in the month, some of the candidates for the State Legislature addressed the citizens of Anderson C. House.

#### **September 22, 1830**

Gold. Not withstanding all the efforts made by both the State and United States authorities, to prevent intrusion on the gold lands in the Cherokee country, multitudes of people still resort thither for the purpose of plunder. Lately, report says, a number of Tennesseans attempted to drive the Georgians and Carolinians from certain pits which they had occupied for some time quietly and peacefully. The Georgians resisted, and a battle commenced, which lasted, with occasional interruptions, from 9 o'clock in the morning till four in the afternoon, without arriving at a definite decision on the rightful claim to the pits. It was then agreed to select a champion from each of the parties to decide the matter. A fight ensued, which resulted in favor of the Georgians. But it was subsequently ascertained that the champion on the part of Georgia was a native of Tennessee; and on this ground the Tennesseans refused to abide by the result of the battle. The matter was finally adjusted by an equal division of the pits between the contending parties. (Copied from the *Georgia Journal*)

Andrew Jackson. Our paper being printed in the district in which the worthy Chief Magistrate was born, and enjoying, as we do, the advantage of holding social converse with those of his companions in youth with whom he has to school – with whom he has wrestled - and with whom he has hunted and fished, it will be expected of as that we report, as they to illustrate either the virtues, the faculties, or the habits of his early life. We promise to do this; and to this end, we solicit the communication of any such as may be interesting. In the first place, we deem it important that the question of his birth place - long a bond of contention betwixt North Carolina and this State - and to this day unknown to many thousands of his most ardent friends - should be finally settled. The following extract, taken from a letter written by the General himself to Col. James H. Witherspoon, of this district, will put the question, we think, beyond farther quibble or doubt: -- "As to the question asked, I with pleasure answer - I was born in South Carolina, at the plantation whereon James Crawford lived." about one mile from the Carolina road, where it crosses the Waxhaw Creek – was born on the 15<sup>th</sup> of March, in the year 1767 – and left the State in the year 1784." \*Plantation now owned by Mr. Geo. Wren; to the left of the road as you go on from Waxhaw Creek to Charlotte, N.C., about 9 miles from the village. This plantation of Jas. Crawford (now owned by Mr. Geo. Wren) was always in South Carolina, before and since the new line was run." (Copied from Lancaster Beacon)

## Historians Blaze Path to Detail, Preserve Local Black History Pair Treks Through Back Country to Find, Document Long-Forgotten Cemeteries

Undiscovered family stories lie in the hills of the Upstate as two Seneca residents forge through the overgrown brush to reveal the history that lies beneath residents' feet.' Paul Kankula and Gary Flynn have trekked through Pickens, Anderson and Oconee counties in search of lost cemeteries in an effort to preserve forgotten heritage.

In documenting these cemeteries in the tri-county area, the pair realized that no one has ever touched on the history of Black cemeteries in the Upstate. "Most of the old cemetery survey books, they didn't do Black churches. They only did the White churches," Flynn said.

"We're trying to find all the churches," he said. "The problem we're having is that nobody has ever done the Black churches and we have very little information to go on." While most White cemeteries were easy to locate because they were well maintained, Kankula and Flynn have at times spent more than eight hours searching for a single Black cemetery.

The pair are 40 percent finished with their undertaking, which will be added to the online database on GenWeb, a national genealogical research project. It's something that should be preserved," Kankula said. "You know 1,000 years from now, somebody will be able to see what their family's cemetery looked like back in 2000. They'll be able to read something on their family history and they'll be able to read the tombstone inscriptions." Abel Bartley, director of the African-American (Americans of African decent) Studies program at Clemson University, said that finding information on Black cemeteries can be a difficult task, but the documentation of them is vital to history.

"You'll need to know who those people were, what type of economic activity they were involved in, how they came here and why they came here," Bartley said. "That's often the information you can find by copying names from grave registries." In Pickens County, about 24 Black cemeteries have been recorded by Anne Sheriff and Robert Dodson, who are working with Kankula and writing a book that documents the history of each cemetery.

"We are trying to preserve the names of the Black people in Pickens County who have died," Sheriff said. "It's just never been written down for some reason. It's not just Black history, it's a lot of family history and church history that hasn't been written down." "You hate to see somebody who has gone through their entire life and left no documentation of their life," Sheriff said. "This is a way of documenting that they did live and that they lived in that community. They had children and lives."

Kankula, Flynn and Sheriff dig through old library books, analyze aged maps and listen to people nationwide for leads on where other cemeteries may be. It started out as charity work for Kankula, but turned into a full-time job, where he spends six to 12 hours, six days a week compiling information.

About 900 cemeteries, Black and White, in Pickens, Anderson and Oconee counties have been documented and permanently preserved in the US GenWeb Tombstone Project Archives.

The jury found him not guilty.

On June 17, 1879, Elisha Skelton made oath that he believes that Nancy Ann Hammond and Jane Couch will do him some personal injury or procure the same to be done, that he knows that they have repeatedly made threats of violence against him and he craves a warrant for the peace against them.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 144. No. 5. On May 14, 1879, Jasper L. N. Hawthorne made oath that he believes that **Benjamin Wallace** will do him some personal injury or procure the same to be done and he craves security for the peace.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 144. No. 6. On Oct. 2, 1879, Thomas Westly made oath that he has good reason to believe that **James Hunter** will do him some bodily injury or cause the same to be done and that has threatened to kill him, and he craves securities for the peace.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 1. On June 28, 1873, Thomas G. Boggs made oath that he has reason to believe that Susan Boggs, Dick Hadden, Wesley Johnson, and Charles Lemmon? did on the night of the 26<sup>th</sup> June inst. did break and enter his meat house and take there from eight pieces of bacon and otherwise commit burglary and theft all within the cartilage of his mansion or dwelling, and he believes that the said stolen property is now concealed and in the possession of the above and he craves a warrant to search their houses for the stolen property.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 2. At the court of sessions at Pickens on March 1, 1890, Ervin Ellison & Corbin Medlin did on the 5<sup>th</sup> Oct 1889 did willfully and maliciously disturb and interrupt a congregation convened for the purpose of religious worship at Twelve Mile Camp Ground in said county by then and there fighting and talking in a loud tone of voice.

State of South Carolina Pickens County

To the Tent holders at Twelve Mile Camp Ground in Pickens County.

Having heard that certain parties have been presented by the grand jury for misconduct &c. As Irwin C. Ellison is one of the number and I being a neighbor of his and know this to be the first time he has been guilty of such misconduct, and his father being a member of our church in good standing, and I cannot think the young man Ellison at fault from the fact that he was assaulted by two men and had to defend himself. I think he is to be pitted for being caught in bad company and hope you brethren will sign this petition to be presented to the Hon. Solicitor in his behalf. E. N. Merritt – Pastor, W. B. Mauldin, A. E. Kelley, W. Gravely, L. B. Gravely, B. D. Mauldin, and J. H. Mullinnex.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 3. On March 21, 1884, a complaint was made by W. S. Kirksey that Frank Crane, a citizen of Pickens Township was assigned to the section of road running from H. B. Hendricks to ford of Wolf Creek and snake road and was legally warned to work said road on March 21, 1884, said notice was given by virtue of authority vested him by a commission as overseer, and that Frank Crane did willfully refuse to work said road. ... In court Frank Crane stated, "I am an entered or subscriber student at Miss Hudgens school. Was regularly attending school until I was taken sick, as soon as my health will admit I intend to resume school for the remainder of the year."

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 4. On Sept. 8, 1879, T. W. Young made a complaint that one Jack Connor did unlawfully & unwillfully refuse to labor on Public Highway. In court V. A. Ferguson stated that he went to the house of Jack Connor to warn him to work on the road and Jack was not at home and told his wife to tell him, she said that she would. I heard Jack say he would not work the road any more as long as Mr. Young was overseer. Jack did not work when I warned him. The court found Jack Connor guilty and sentenced him to 5 days in jail or fifty dollar fine.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 5. On Dec. 18, 1882, a complaint was made by B. D. Garvin that at J. J. Garvin's in Pickens County on the 18<sup>th</sup> Dec 1882 one Jobe Smith did abduct & forcibly take from the custody of J. J. Garvin, 2 minor children Nettie & Cora Smith. [In one place written Nettie & Mary Smith.] J. J. Garvin states that he had in his custody the 2 minor children Mary & Nettie Smith age 2 and 3 years [the 2 years also looks as a 3] & that they were abducted from him by Job Smith on or about Dec. 18, 1882, he states that he was not in the house but the children were & that he saw Smith coming out of the house with the children and they were crying & saying that they did not want to go. He had gotten near his horse with the children, I told him to let the children alone and he said mind your business and the last he saw of them they had the children in their arms carrying them away. [The word they might have been meant for he.]

Mary Collins sworn said that she and Lizzie Jameson were sitting by the fire in the house of J. J. Garvin and that Job Smith came into the house and carried the children away, they were crying and saying that they did not want to go.

**J. J. Garvin** said that the children are his daughters and were left in his custody at her death and that he was served with a writ of Habeas Corpus & the case was tried & the court held that he the said **J. J. Garvin** was the proper person to take the children in charge.

Warrant. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 145. No. 7. On June 1, 1882 John W. Ellis & Mary Pilgrim was arrest for adultery.

Court Records. Clerk of Court Office. Pack 150. No. 1. James P. Brooks states that on June 13<sup>th</sup> 1889 Joseph Sloane did commit an assault upon his wife Amanda Brooks with intent to ravish by getting up out of his room where he was sleeping and going into her room & to her bed and taking hold her.

Amanda Brooks sworn saith, "I live in Pickens County, SC. I know Joseph Sloane. On the night of the 13th of last June between 12 & o'clock, Joseph Sloane got up out of his bed in the dining room at my house and came into my room where I was and took hold of my arm. I was in bed. I jerked loose from him & struck at him & hit him on one of his shoulders & called to Mr. Brooks (my husband). Mr. Brooks was in another bed in another portion of the house, asleep. I could not wake him by calling, then I got up and went to his bed and waked him up, and told him what had happened after I struck Sloane, he went back into the dining room and layed down. My husband said that he would get up and fix him, I begged him to consider my condition & not to raise any fuss, in my presence. I was pregnant. Mr. Brooks went off to see a doctor that day and never came back until near 10 o'clock at night. I had done ate supper and gone to bed before he got back. There was no one at my house except myself and small children and Joseph Sloane until my husband came back. I heard him ask Sloane the next morning what he went into my room for last night. He said he went in there to get his knife, said that he had left it in there at dinner time the day before on the lounge. He did not leave his knife on the lounge that evening & I didn't see any knife for I spread the cloth on the lounge that evening, and I saw him have his knife in the dining room that night while I was fixing supper.

James P. Brooks sworn sayeth, I live in Pickens County, SC on Dr. Doyles plantation. I know Joseph Sloane. On the 13<sup>th</sup> of last June between 12 & 1 o'clock my wife came to me where I was lying in bed, asked me why I didn't come to her when she called me. I told her I didn't hear her and asked her what was the matter. She said that Sloane had come to her bed and taken hold of her and tried to pull her out of the bed. I told her then to lie down in my bed and keep quiet & I would get up and settle it with him. She begged me to remember her condition and get some one else. I got up then and lit the lamp and set it on the fireboard in the room where me and my wife was at that time to make a fire in the kitchen. He was sleeping in the kitchen, he was in his bed when I called him, the kitchen is an adjoining room to my wife's room. He got up and made a fire. I went in to the kitchen and stayed in there 10 or 15 minutes, then I went back into my wife's room and set down on the side of the bed where my wife was. She seemed to be scared. I tried to quiet her. I sat on the side of the bed till 4 o'clock the next morning. I called Sloane then and told him to take a plane that I had borrowed of [?] and carry it to him. When he started with the plane I went after Mrs. Alfred Holcombe & found Mr. McKeer? there and asked them both to go down home with me & when Sloane came back I asked him what he went in to my wife's room for. He said that he had went in there to get his knife that he had left on the lounge the day before at dinner time. I asked him then if he was hunting his knife what business he had with his hands on my wife, he said he stumbled and got his hands on the bed, said he wanted his knife to open some sores on his legs, then I told him to get his clothes on and leave & he done so. He pulled up his pants and said he could show us where the sores was, but I didn't see any. I had been away that day and it was about 9 o'clock or a little after when I got home. I did not see any thing of Jo when I got home nor hear any thing of him. On being cross examined Brooks said, I don't know recollect of Jo asking me any questions when I went into the kitchen after he had made a fire. I might have told **Jo** that I had the headache but I don't know, but I know that he had his knife open in his hand and went back and layed down on the pallet with it open.

Indictment for Larceny. Clerk of Court. Pickens, SC. Pack 150, No. 2. On Nov. 15, 1865, John D. Verner made oath that he has good reason to believe B. Franklin Honea & T. Waddy Honea were unlawfully engaged in stealing and carrying away three sides of leather the property of Malinda Verner on the night of Oct 9. The jury found a true bill.

Indictment for Grand Larceny. Clerk of Court. Pickens, SC. Pack 150, No. 3. On Sept. 28, 1863, a complaint was made by James W. Livingston that James Kennedy did feloniously steal and carry away from the plantation of F. W. Kilpatrick in Pickens Dist. on or about the 30<sup>th</sup> day of July 1863 two bags of cotton belonging to the said F. W. Kilpatrick. A true bill was found.

Clerk of Court. Pickens, SC. Pack 150, No. 4. On June 27, 1866 Sarah Matilda Lesley made oath that one Samuel N. Jones did on Thursday the 21<sup>st</sup> day of June 1866, commit an assault upon her and attempted to rape her by making insulting propositions to her, in the woods near by her father's residence and by laying violent hands upon her and throwing her upon the ground. A true bill was found.

Bench Warrants. Clerk of Court. Pickens, SC. Pack 150, No. 5. A true bill found against John Chastain on Oct. 28, 1861 for unlawfully trading with a slave. On April 2, 1860, a verdict of guilty rendered against Jasper N. Beck for retailing . . . On March 25, 1867, guilty was found against James Dunbar for hog stealing.

Schedule of Alfred Harris. Clerk of Court. Pickens, SC. Pack 151. Label 1, No. 41. I, Alfred Harris so Solemnly swear in the presence of Almighty God that I have been a prisoner in the Common Jail of this State from the time of my being arrested or within ten days after the suit of Leonard Towers without my consent or prosecutment and without any fraud or collusion whatsoever and that the account by me delivered unto this Honorable Court doth contain a true and full account of all my real and personal estate with out exception debts credits and effects whatsoever without exception which I or any person in trust for me have or at the time of my said petition had or am or was in any respects entitled unto in possession remainder or reversion and that I have not at any time since my being said arrested or imprisoned or before directly or indirectly sold leased assigned or otherwise deposed of or made over in trust for myself or otherwise other than as mentioned in such account any part of my lands estates goods stock money debts or other real or personal estate whereby to expect any benefit to myself or to defraud any of just creditors to whom I am indebted and that I will to the utmost of my power endeavor to collect all and singular the title deeds to lands together with the remainder of my goods and effects contained in my said account and the vouchers relating to or concerning the same wheresoever or in whosesoever hands they may be in this province and will surrender the same to my assignee or assignees as soon as possible after my discharge and that I have not expended more than six shillings and three pence out of my estate for my substance since I have been a prisoner as aforesaid, so held me God. Sworn to before me this 29th July 1838. W. L. Keith, C. C. Signed by Alfred Harris

She had the child at her father's house. Ellender & Riley Marshall made a bond of \$150.00. George W. & Joseph Burns made bond for \$100.00. George W. Burns was to appear in court at Pickens on the 5<sup>th</sup> Monday in March next.

Indictment for Riot and Assault. Clerk of Court, Pickens, SC. Pack 151, No. 3. On July 1, 1852 Larkin Nix sworn made oath that Claborne Wilkinson, Tandy Wilkinson and William Sergant were engaged in stoning his house on the night of the 20<sup>th</sup> of June. A true bill was found Nov. 1, 1852.

Miscellaneous File. Clerk of Court, Pickens, SC. Pack 151, No. 4. On December 16, 1850 Eliza A. Caradine made oath that on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of this inst. at her fathers house in Pickens Dist. that one John M. Young of said dist. did at the time and place aforesaid and against her wish and consent and by force did commit a rape on her person, and sayeth that at the same time there was none of the family at home nor no person in hearing as she knew of but saith that she was held and worried down until she was past resistance and that she succeeded in throwing him off as many as 3 or 4 times. A true bill was found on April 1, 1851. A bond was signed by James F. Caradine, William B. Caradine, Simon Hembree who were indebted to the state in sum \$250.00.

I would be glad you would see **James Caradine** and his daughter and if they want the law put in force against me concerning the oath that was sworn by his daughter against me tell them I will be redy for them at next cort that is in March next. I want you if you can write to me direct your letter to **Carnesville Post Office**, Geor. I am living five miles north of Carnesville and am ditching at this time. I would knot of moved if I had known that I had as many friends as I have in that country. I came out here and maid the araingment to move. I would knot of left at commensment of warrant only the lady swore pretty hard against me. It was knot a bailible case. I suppose if it were I could give a hundred good securetys for my appearance at cort. I did knot want to go to jail upon a unjust case. The case as it is I must come out or by in the attempt of trying it will be a discredit to me to move at and do nothing. Write as soon as you can that I may have my witnesses supend? in time [illegible]. But remains yours for ever till death.

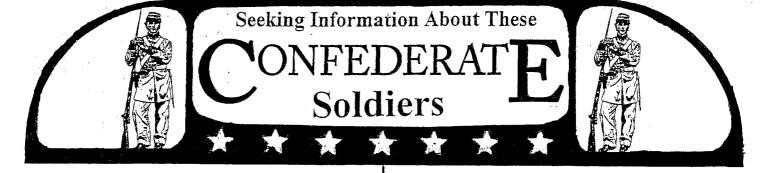

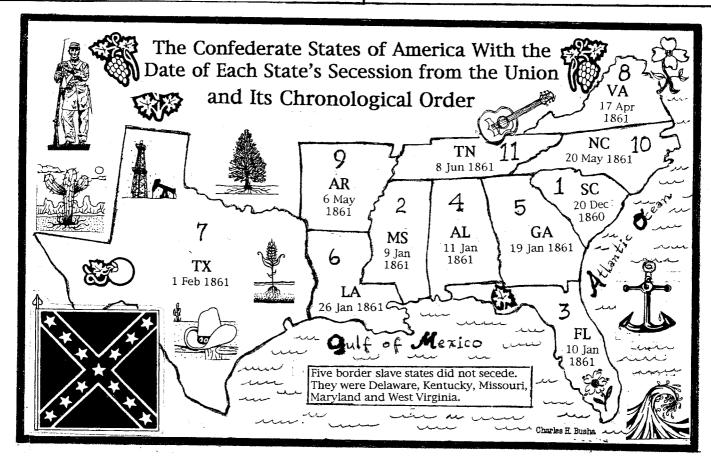

- W. J. Ramsey served in Co. K, 3rd North Carolina Cavalry, 41st State Troops. He enlisted in July 1861. He once resided on waters of the Tugaloo River in what today is Oconee County, S. C. (Question: Is this Walter Jones Ramsey who served in Co. K, 14th North Carolina Infantry?)
- S. H. Randolph was a member of Co. D, 22nd S. C. Infantry. He was severely wounded in the hand during the Civil War. For many years, the wound gave the Confederate veteran much trouble, and finally his hand had to be amputated. Randolph died of cancer of the shoulder November 20, 1899, in Toccoa, Georgia, where he was also buried. A widow was among his survivors.
- David C. Rankin was born about 1838, a son of Edward Rankin (b. ca. 1794) and Mary Rankin (b. ca. 1808). He once resided in the western division of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County). At the age of about 21, he enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). During the Civil War, he was wounded and died of those wounds July 21, 1862, at Richmond, Virginia. He was buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (Grave #H166).



### CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS OF PICKENS AND ANDERSON DISTRICTS, S. C. (continued)

- George Rankin once resided at Slabtown in northern Anderson District, S. C. He served in Co. A, Perryman's Battalion, S. C. State Troops. According to oral tradition, he witnessed the accidental shooting of John Mitchell Hallum of Salubrity (Liberty), S. C., by John M. Dow while the men were searching for army deserters at Pott's Cove.
- J. G. Rankin was 26 years of age when he enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was wounded during the Civil War and lost a leg, after which he was discharged from the C. S. A.
  - John M. Rankin was wounded during the First Bull Run Battle (First Manassas) and at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, and died of wounds November 12, 1862, or December 1, 1862, at Winchester, Virginia. His wife was Eliza "Eddie" (Moss) Rankin. They were married December 11, 1859. This soldier was buried at the Confederate Memorial, Manassas Cemetery, in Warrenton, Virginia. His estate was administered in Pickens District, S. C., December 19, 1864.
- Joshua Rankin died of disease August 31, 1862, at the age of twenty-three years, at Richmond, Virginia, while serving in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). No additional information available.
- William Rankin enlisted at the age of thirty in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was captured by the enemy and taken to Elmira Prison in New York State. He died there January 30, 1865, and was buried in Woodlawn National Cemetery at Elmira, New York (Grave #1785). His home was in what today is Oconee County, S. C.
- G. Wade H. Ranney served in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry and was lost during the Civil War. No additional information available.
- John C. Ransom served as a private in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.), having enlisted in that regiment at the age of eighteen. He was captured by the enemy during the Civil War and was released from a prisoner-of-war camp at the end of the conflict.
- William N. Ransom enlisted at the age of eighteen in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was wounded at Manassas, Virginia, and was captured by the enemy. His home was in what today is Oconee County, S. C.

- William B. Ray served to the rank of 2nd corporal in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He died in Virginia during the Civil War. This soldier's widow was Ann (Deal) Ray whom he married in Pickens District, S. C., on July 23, 1857. Their marriage ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. R. Hunnicutt. Both Ray and his wife once lived in Georgia.
- John W. Reagin was a member of Co. A, 3rd South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. As a result of a battle wound, he lost a limb during the Civil War and in 1880 was given a voucher for the purchase of a prosthesis. At that time, he resided in Oconee County, S. C.
- Felix Reames died of typhoid fever at Sullivan's Island, S. C., November 12, 1861, while serving in Co. A, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was a son of Josiah and Mary Reames and a brother of William Reames who also served in the C. S. A.
- John Reames was a private in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. His home was in Hurricane township of the eastern division of Pickens District, (now Pickens County), S. C. No additional information available. (Question: Is this soldier a brother of the William Reames listed below?)
- William Reames served as a private in Co. F, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. His home was in Hurricane township of Pickens District, S. C. (Question: Could this soldier be the same man as the William Reames listed below?)
- William Reames enlisted at Pendleton, S. C., in Co. K, 4th S. C. Infantry, Volunteers on June 2, 1861. He was listed as sick on the company's muster roll of August 31, 1861, but was present for duty on the roll of December 31, 1861. He also served in Co. L, Palmetto Sharpshooters. He was mortally wounded May 31, 1862. He was a son of Josiah and Mary Reames and a brother of Felix Reames, the latter of whom also served in the C. S. A.
- **J. S. Reed** served as a private in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Cavalry, and he survived the Civil War. No additional information available.
- John B. Reed was born about 1844 and served in Co. C, 1st S. C. Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He resided in Pickens County, S. C., in 1924 and was eighty years of age at that time. (Question: Is this man the John B. Reid who was born in 1846, died in 1926 and served in the C. S. A.?) Note: A John

Reed of Oconee County, S. C., enlisted in the C. S. A. at the age of eighteen. Same man?

- Joseph J. Reed died while being held as a prisoner of war on August 30, 1864, at Elmira Prison in New York State. He was buried at Woodlawn Cemetery at Elmira, N. Y. (Grave #95). He served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry. (Note: According to one source, Joseph J. Reed lost his life in Virginia in May 1864. That claim appears to be wrong.)
- **R. E. Reed** was a Confederate veteran living in Oconee County, S. C., in 1899 and was a recipient of a Civil War pension that year. No additional information available.
- W. A. Reed resided in Oconee County, S. C., in 1899 and also received a Civil War pension. No additional information available.
- W. Massey Reed was killed in action at Strasburg, Virginia, October 13, 1864. He served as a private in Co. A, 20th South Carolina Infantry, C. S. A.
- **William W. Reed** served to the rank of sergeant in Co. G, 12th South Carolina Infantry. He survived the Civil War.
- Lewis T. Reeder served as a first lieutenant in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and survived the Civil War.
- Thomas M. Reeder was born about 1842 and was a member of Co. F, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was captured by Union troops during the Second Battle of Fredericksburg in Virginia. He was a son of Thomas Reeder (b. ca. 1815) and Elizabeth Reeder (b. ca. 1820).
- Enoch Reese (or Reece) served as a private in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months between June 1862 and January 1863. He also served as a private in Co. B, 1st South Carolina State Troops for six months between August 1863 and February 1864.
- Jefferson Reese was born about 1845. He served in the C. S. A. and in 1899 received a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S. C. His wife was Adaline Reese (b. ca. 1845), and the couple had the following children: William Reese (b. ca. 1860), Melachia (?) Reese (b. ca. 1862), Martha Reese (b. ca. 1864) and Jefferson Reese, Jr. (b. ca. 1870). The Reese family resided in Keowee township of Oconee County, S. C.

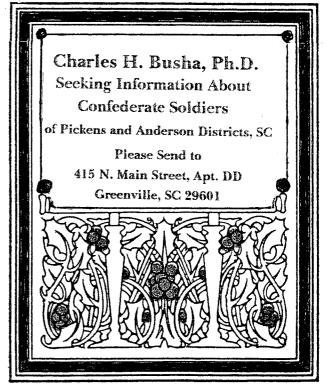
- John Reese (or Reece) served as a private in Co. I, 3rd South Carolina Reserves for six months between June 1862 and January 1863.
- Jeptha Reese was born about 1837. He served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He enlisted for three years in the C. S. A. October 31, 1861, at Pendleton, S. C., under Lt. J. B. Sloan. On his company's muster roll of July-August 1862, he was listed as absent from duty because of illness. On August 9, 1864, this soldier was discharged from Jackson Hospital in Richmond, Virginia, where he had been treated for diarrhea. Then, he was granted a 30-day furlough. In 1864, he married a Miss V. Wilson. This Confederate veteran resided in Walhalla township of Oconee County, S. C., in 1901. At that time he was seventy-one years of age and received a Civil War pension. According to some of his descendants, this Confederate veteran might have been buried at Salem Baptist Church in Oconee County, S. C.
- Levi Reese was a private in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Cavalry and in Co. B, 10th Battalion S. C. Cavalry. He was born about 1828, and his wife was Rachael Reese (b. ca. 1842). Their children were Narcissa Reese (b. ca. 1861), Cornelia Reese (b. ca. 1869), Delia Reese (b. ca. 1871) and Laura D. Reese (b. ca. 1874). This Confederate veteran was a farmer in Keowee township of Oconee County, S. C.
- Sydney Reese (or Reece) served as a private in Co. I, 3rd S. C. Reserves for six months between June 1862 and January 1863.
- Thomas Erastus Reese (or Reece) (1841-1923) was a resident of the Pumpkintown section of eastern Pickens District (now Pickens County), S. C. He was born April 27, 1841, a son of Enoch Reese (or Reece) (b. ca. 1793-d. ca. 1882) and Sophia (Galloway) Reese (b. ca. 1801-d. July 1882). In about 1868, this Confederate veteran married Nancy Trotter (15 Jan 1842-18 Jul 1927). She was a daughter of Henry Odus Trotter (22 Dec 1813-2 Jun 1862) and Susan (Hendricks) Trotter (3 Aug 1818-28 Jan 1897). This Confederate soldier served as a private in Co. K, 62nd North Carolina Infantry, C. S. A. He survived the Civil War and in 1922 was living in the Oolenoy community of Pickens County, S. C., and was a recipient of a Civil War pension. He died March 21, 1923, and in 1924 his wife was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension. Among this Confederate veteran's offspring was a son, Thomas Sylvester Reese (27 Apr 1880-29 Apr 1939) who married Tamer

Elmira Aiken (6 Jan 1883-1 Mar 1975).

- A. D. Reeves was a private in Co. I, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. He died during the Civil War and was buried in Stonewall Cemetery at Winchester, Virginia.
- Andrew Jackson Reeves (1847-19190 served in Co. E, 51st Georgia Infantry. He was born April 22, 1847, and died May 5, 1919. His wife was Louise (McDowell) Reeves (19 Mar 1849-5 Sep 1909). Among the couple's children were Charles Kindred Reeves (21 Jan 1886-19 Oct 1908) and Maude McDowell Reeves (24 Dec 1884-11 Jan 1959). This Confederate veteran was buried in Easley City Cemetery, Easley (Pickens County), S. C.
- Hiram K. Reeves of Eastatoee township of what today is Pickens County, S. C., served in Co. C of the S. C. Cavalry (?). He owned almost 200 acres of land on Cove Creek waters of Big Eastatoee Creek. His land joined property of Harrison Powell. His wife was Liddie Reeves, and the couple had the following children: Sarah A., Thomas, W. J., D. H., L. S., John H., A. C., R. T. and H. R. Reeves. The son John H. Reeves, 17 years of age, was arrested in 1891 for manufacturing moonshine at an illegal still. Hiram K. Reeves died in 1886 and was buried in the Reeves family cemetery, located off Highway 178, and near Sugar Liker Road in northern Pickens County, S. C.
- Joseph Reeves (b. ca. 1840-d. 1916) was a resident of the Cedar Rock community of what today is Pickens County, S. C. He served in Capt. Beauregard's company of S. C. Light Artillery in which he enlisted April 6, 1863, in Pickens District, S. C. He was marked present on all muster rolls of his company until December 1863. He was paid a bounty of \$50.00 (for enlistment or reenlistment?) during the Civil War. Joseph Reeves married Dillie Evatt (26 Feb 1844-14 Jan 1929) on February 18, 1859. She was a daughter of Hunley Evatt (b. ca. 1790). Joseph Reeves and his wife had three children, Mary Reeves (b. 1863-d. 6 Aug 1951 in Liberty, S. C.), who married James M. Spearman; Nancy Jane Reeves (25 Jan 1864-11 Mar 1935), who married David H. Riggins; and Rebecca Reeves (b. ca. 1865), who married a Bradley. In 1899, Reeves' name was listed on the Civil War pension roll in Pickens County, S. C. In 1901, he resided in Praters township of Pickens County, S. C., and received a Civil War pension. At that time his age was listed in pension records as sixty-four years.

- **Levi Reeves** served as a corporal in Co. I, South Carolina Reserves for six months between June 1862 and 1863.
- W. Davis Reeves was a member of Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He was wounded June 27, 1862, at Gaines' Mill, Virginia, and died shortly thereafter of those wounds. His home was in what today is Oconee County, S. C.
- John George Reichel enlisted as a private in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was thirty-four years of age. He was a resident of what today is Oconee County, S. C., and is believed to be a member of the German settlement at Walhalla, S. C. He survived the Civil War.
- C. N. Reid (1826-1912) served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). He was present at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9, 1865, when the Confederate army of Northern Virginia surrendered to the Union army of the Potomac.
- Christopher Reuben Reid (1837-1885) was born April 7, 1837, in Newberry County, S. C. He served in Co. E, Hampton Legion. He was seriously wounded during the Civil War and was unable to return to duty. His wife was Elizabeth (Townsend) Reid (5 Jun 1828-17 Jan 1901). They were married in 1855 and had four children, three of whom reached adulthood.



### AFRICAN AMERICAN LIFE IN SOUTH CAROLINA'S UPPER PIEDMONT, 1780–1900

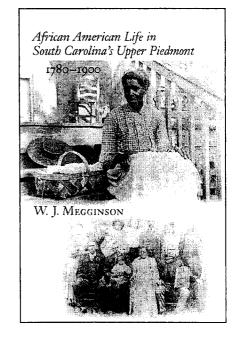

Encyclopedic in scope yet intimate in detail, African American Life in South Carolina's Upper Piedmont, 1780–1900 delves into the richness of community life in a setting where blacks were relatively few, notably disadvantaged, but remarkably cohesive. W. J. Megginson shifts the conventional study of African Americans in South Carolina from the much-examined lowcountry to a part of the state that offered a quite different existence for people of color. In Anderson, Oconee, and Pickens counties—occupying the state's northwest corner—he finds an independent, brave, and stable subculture that persevered for more than a century in the face of political and economic inequities.

Drawing on little-used state and county denominational records, privately held research materials, and sources available only in local repositories, Megginson brings to life African American society before, during, and after the Civil War. He portrays relationships—variously cordial, patronizing, and harsh—between African Americans and whites; the lives of free people of color; the primal place of sharecropping in the post—Civil War world; and the push for education and ownership of property as the only means of overcoming economic dependency.

Megginson's work joins a growing chorus of books that demonstrate the success of Reconstruction across the South. Black Republicans and even some black Democrats took up the rights and duties of leadership and made great strides in redressing antebellum wrongs. He underscores the fact that although the white Democrats' "redemption" of South Carolina government in 1876 greatly curtailed the black political movement, African Americans in the upper piedmont quietly continued to assert their place in the political realm.

Through detailed vignettes of individuals and families coupled with deft analysis of overarching social contexts, *African American Life in South Carolina's Upper Piedmont, 1780–1900* adds a new dimension to our understanding of the African American experience in South Carolina and in the South.




A native of upstate South Carolina, **W. J. Megginson** has lectured at Arkansas State University, Hendrix College in Arkansas, Drexel University, and La Salle University. He is the author of *Tracing Your Family Roots*, Before Slavery and Shortly Thereafter, and Black Soldiers in World War I: Anderson, Pickens, and Oconee Counties, South Carolina.

The following exerpts were taken from the People's Journal and Pickens Sentinel Newspapers books by Peggy Rich and Marion Whitehurst. The People's Journal Newspaper. Taken from The People's Journal. Pickens, SC, 1894-1903, Historical and Genealogical Abstracts. Compiled by Peggy Burton Rich and Marion Ard Whitehurst.

- 17 May 1894. Mrs. Nannie Smith, wife of W. A. Smith died the 14 (May) at her residence in Pelzer, SC. She was buried at the **family cemetery in Central Township**. Mrs. Smith leaves a husband and several children.
- 13 Sep 1894. William U. Hunt died Monday at his home in Easley Township. He was buried at the **Martin Hunt Family Cemetery**. Mr. Hunt was about 64 years old and leaves 5 sons and 4 daughters.
- 18 Oct 1894. Mrs. Ella Robinson, wife of T. C. Robinson, died last Monday of consumption at the age of 39 years. She was buried at the **family burying ground Liberty**, SC. Mrs. Robinson leaves a husband and six children.
- 11 April 1895. Betsy Rackley is expected to die at her home near Nine Forks Church (Dacusville). She was buried beside her husband at **the family burying ground**.
- 31 Oct 1895. Ed Arail, colored, age about 13 years died the 23 Oct 1895 and was buried near Enon.
- 6 Feb 1896. Mrs. Elizabeth Hester nee Whitmire, widow of the late Carr Hester, died at her residence in this county Sunday on 26 Jan 1896 at an advanced age. She was born 21 Mar 1798 and was almost 98 years old. Mrs. Hester was a member of the Methodist Church and was buried in **the family burying ground at Jocassee**, SC. (Keowee Courier)
- 26 Mar 1896. Mr. Baylus Stephens died last Friday at the residence of his son L.D. Stephens about three miles from town and was buried in the **family cemetery**. He was 81 years old and leaves seven children.
- 28 May 1896. John I. Williams was buried at the **family cemetery near his home**. (Cross Roads Baptist Church.) Cedar Rock, SC.
- 4 Jun 1896. Mrs. Durham, wife of Buck Durham died 29 May in the Mile Creek section at the age of 83 years. She was buried the next day in the **family burying ground**.
- 24 Sep 1896. Miss Lillie Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B.H. Williams of Cedar Rock, SC died last Tuesday morning and was buried in **the family burying ground**.
- 17 Dec 1896. Charles S. Robinson died at his home at Twelve Mile last Monday at the age of about 56 years. He leaves a widow and a brother Dr. G.E. Robinson of Liberty. Mr. Robinson served in the Confederate Army, 1<sup>st</sup> SC Sharpshooters, later Quartermaster, 2<sup>nd</sup> Rifles, Orr's Regt. He was buried at the **family burying ground**.
- 10 Aug 1899. Miss Amanda Nix died at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. W.D. Nix of Eastatoe on 30 Jul 1899. Burial was at the **family burying ground**. She was a member of the Baptist Church.
- Mrs. Nancy Wooten (need Pressley) died 10 Jan 1901. Burial was at New Friendship Cemetery. Where is this?

### Taken from The Pickens Sentinel. Compiled by Peggy Burton Rich and Marion Ard Whitehurst.

- 22 Feb 1877. Mr. Van B. Hendricks a citizen of the county was shot and killed about 15 miles from Greenville Court House by Hubbard Garmany on Monday the 12<sup>th</sup> instant. He was buried at the **family burying ground at** Liberty Station. Mr. Hendricks had been wounded by Redmond a few weeks ago. (Details.)
- 18 Mar 1886. The town council of Liberty purchased a lot between the Baptist and Presbyterian churches for a cemetery.
- 1 Jul 1886. Sam Hallums, colored of Liberty Twp., departed this life on the 25<sup>th</sup> ult. at the age of 75 years. During slavery he belonged to Thomas Hallams, who provided in his will that Sam should be allowed to choose whose servant he would be. Upon the death of his Master, Sam chose to remain on the old homestead with his maiden Mistress, and he continued to serve faithfully and honestly as long as he was able. In return, he was rewarded with a good home, friendly hands, who carefully ministered to his last wants and saw him decently buried in their family graveyard. Sam's life and character speaks well for the faithfulness of the old issue of the colored race.
- 21 Oct 1886. Abraham, the 7 year old son of Mr. R.A. Hester died last Thursday. He was kicked by a mule two weeks ago. He was buried in **the family burying ground**. Dr. Riley preached the funeral.
- 18 Nov 1886. Miss Rebecca Boroughs, the 15 year old daughter of Mr. James E. Boroughs, died on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. Burial was in the family burying ground.
- 24 Mar 1887. Harriett, wife of Charles Rosamond, colored, of Hurricane Twp. died last Sabbath. She was buried near her home.
- 28 Apr 1887. Mr. Edward Gillespie, son of Mr. Jason Gillespie of Hurricane Twp. died the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. He was 15 years old and was buried in **the family burying ground**.
- 23 Jun 1887. Ann Clayton, colored, died on the 14th inst. Burial was near Glassy Mountain.
- 6 Oct 1887. Frank, an 8 year old son of D.J. Taylor of Slabtown, died the 28th ult. Buried at the new church.
- 3 Nov 1887. Mrs. Martin Curry died at her home in the upper part of Easley Twp. last Saturday. Her remains were interred at the **burying ground near Duke's Shop**.
- 3 Nov 1887. Mr. Jack Walker of Eastatoe Twp. has recently buried three children, two last week in one grave. It is thought they died of diphtheria.
- 5 Jan 1888. Arthur a nine year old son of Mr. E.F. Looper died last Sunday of meningitis. Burial was at the **Baker** burial ground.
- 26 Apr 1888. Miss Bettie Watson, a sister of Mrs. O.W. Garrison, died in Walhalla on the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. She was about 70 years old and was buried in the **Watson family burying ground**.
- 3 May 1888. The new grave at the top of the hill beyond Mr. Abe Mauldin's hard by the road excites curiosity and comment.
- 24 May 1888. Mrs. Nettie Turner, wife of Lewis Turner, died of paralysis on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. at about 75 years of age. Her remains were interred at the **family ground near William Sizemore**.
- 3 Oct 1889. Miss Sallie Smith, daughter of Mr. Benson Smith of Piercetown, died on the 25<sup>th</sup> ult at the age of about 14 years. She was buried at the **Mullinex burying ground**.

- 6 Nov 1890. Matthew Ferguson, an old and respected colored man of Liberty Township, died at the A. O'Dell place last Saturday. He was 65 years old and was **buried at the Ferguson graveyard**.
- 13 Nov 1890. Mrs. Catherine Lewis relict of Jacob Lewis died at her home on the Lewis Homestead Tuesday the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. at the age of 76 years. Burial was at the **family burying ground**.
- 20 Nov 1890. Col. J.E. Hagood presented the town with an acre lot just outside the corporate limits on the Glassy Mountain Road for a cemetery.
- 19 Feb 1891. Mr. James A. Alexander died at his home in the Crow Creek Section last Sabbath at the age of 43 years. His remains were interred at the **Herd burying ground**. Mr. Alexander leaves a wife and six children.
- 19 Mar 1891. The lot donated by Col. J. E. Hagood to the town for a **public cemetery** was staked off last Monday. It is located just outside the corporate limits of the Glassy Mountain road.
- 27 Aug 1891. Mrs. Polly Bates, widow of the late Joseph Bates, died Friday at the age of 84 years. Burial from Ebenezer Baptist Church. *Daily News*, 23<sup>rd</sup> inst.
- 17 Sep 1891. 17 Sep 1891. Capt. James A. Griffin has had nice monuments erected over the graves of his father E.H. Griffin, Sr., his brothers J.C., Edwin, William and his sister Mrs. Susan Wyatt, all buried at Twelve Mile graveyard on Col. Hagood's farm. The work was done by Capt. Thomas White of Anderson and Mr. Willie White superintended the work.
- 1 Oct 1891. Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Dickson died, at the home of her son D.S. Craig, Esq. in Walhalla, the 21<sup>st</sup> inst. She was born the 4 Jul 1937 near Old Pickens where her father the late Fountain Alexander lived. Her mother having died when she was very young, she for many years lived with her uncle Pleasant Alexander at Pendleton. She married W.H. Craig and he died the 30 Dec 1876. By this marriage she had one son who survives. **She was buried at the new cemetery** (details).
- 8 Oct 1891. Clemson College now has at work 147 Negro convicts. They are required to work but are well cared for. The stockade has been increased in size and there is a hospital. - 10 Dec 1891. Dr. John W. Crymes, a dentist of Williamston, died yesterday at his home at the age of about 60 years. He married a daughter of E.J. Pickle of Williamston and leaves a widow and 4 children. The remains were buried in the family burial ground in the lower part of the county. Daily News

- 17 Dec 1891. Mr. E.A. Hunnicutt, son of Mr. J.B. Hunnicutt, died the 7<sup>th</sup> Dec of typhoid fever at the age of 21 years. Burial was at **the family cemetery**. *Keowee Courier*
- 31 Dec 1891. A child of Lawrence Lathern died last Sunday night and was buried in the family burying ground near Enon.
- 7 Jan 1892. Caline Bowen, colored, died at the home of her son William Bowen on the 31 Dec 1891 at the age 84 years. She was buried at Tabor. She was a former family servant of the late John Bowen.
- 21 Jan 1892. Jimmie Johnson, the 19 year old son of Mr. S.M. and Mrs. Ellen Johnson, died near Major on the 12<sup>th</sup> instant. He was buried at **Shannon graveyard** by Rev. T.C. O'Dell.
- 10 Mar 1892. Notice. The Pickens Cemetery is to be used exclusively for a burial place for bodies of white citizens of the town of Pickens. The bodies of others cannot be interred there without a special permit from the town council previously obtained and paid for. The terms of the deed by which the lot is held require this. G.W. Earl, Intendant.
- 31 Mar 1892. Mrs. M.D. Cantrell died at the home of her husband the 27<sup>th</sup> inst. Burial was at the **family burying ground of the late Jacob Lewis**. (Buried New Mountain Grove Cemetery).
- 31 Mar 1892. Mrs. Evans Nicholson a daughter of M.D. Cantrell died last Monday. Her husband survives but is seriously ill. Burial was at **Lewis burying ground**. (Buried New Mountain Grove Cemetery)
- 7 Apr 1892. Mrs. M.D. Cantrell and Mrs. Evans Nicholson were not interred at the Lewis burying ground but at Mountain Grove Church.
- 21 Apr 1892. Miss Lizzie Gillespie daughter of Mr. John Gillespie died the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. She was about 15 years old and was buried at the **family burying ground near Borrough's Mill**.
- 5 May 1892. Jim Duke, colored, was killed on the Air Line Railroad the 29<sup>th</sup> ult. He was buried at **Tabor beside his** father William Duke.
- 26 May 1892. The wife of James Lankford, colored who lives near Easley, died last Monday and was buried in the burying ground near town. There were 39 vehicles and about 200 footmen in the funeral procession.
- 23 Jun 1892. Clarisa Leona, the eldest daughter of Mr. Lemuel C. Reid of Gates, died on Friday the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. at the age of 9 years. Her remains were interred in **the family burying ground**.
- 13 Oct 1892. Malinda Lofton, colored, was accidentally killed in Atlanta last Friday. Her remains were brought to **Old Pickens and interred**. She was the daughter of George Jenkins and for many years a servant to Mrs. S.P. Bruce (details).
- 27 Oct 1892. Cato Edens died last Friday of typhoid fever and pneumonia and was buried at Oolenoy (details).
- 1 Dec 1892. Mrs. Jane Hendricks, wife of George K. Hendricks, died last Monday at her home three miles north of Pickens. Her remains were interred at the **Gilstrap burying ground**.
- 5 Jan 1893. Mrs. W.U. Hunt, wife of W.U. Hunt, died at her home near Dacusville on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. She was buried in the family burying ground. Mrs. Hunt was a sister of Capt. A. Blythe of Greenville, SC.
- 16 Feb 1893. Mr. James Robinson died at his home 1 ½ miles from Easley Tuesday on 7<sup>th</sup> inst. He was raised in Anderson Co. and was about 60 years old. Mr. Robinson married 1<sup>st</sup> Miss Harper and 2<sup>nd</sup> Mrs. Darcus Jamison. There was no issue. He was buried at **Jamison graveyard**.
- 2 Mar 1893. J. Mattison Leach, who lived on Crow Creek, died the 21<sup>st</sup> ult. at the age of 73 years. Burial in the family burying ground.
- 27 Apr 1893. Mr. L.A. Slaton's son that was badly kicked in the stomach by a mule died the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. He was buried in the **family burying ground**.



The city of Richmond is now the second largest metropolis in the mid-Atlantic state officially known as the Commonwealth of Virginia. Since 1779, it has been the state capital, having replaced colonial Williamsburg as the seat of government in the tidewater region. Throughout most of the four years of the U. S. Civil War, Richmond also served as the ephemeral capital of the Confederate States of America. An historic Southern city, Richmond is located at the falls of the James River in the eastern part of the state. That river is a tributary of Chesapeake Bay near the Atlantic Ocean. In 1637, a trading post was established at the present-day site of Richmond. Then, in 1739 a hamlet, or town, was laid out there and named after Richmond on the Thames River in

During both the American Revolution and the U. S. Civil War, Richmond played weighty roles in our nation's development. Patrick Henry (1736-1799), a Virginia-born leader in America's pursuit of independence from Britain, delivered his celebrated "... give me liberty or give me death!" oration at Richmond's St. John's Church in 1775. The church was raised in 1741 and still stands today at East Broad, between 24th and 25th streets. Thomas Jefferson (1743-1826), a native of Virginia and the third U. S. president, designed the Virginia State Capitol in Richmond, having based his depiction of the building on La Maison Carree in Nimes, France. The cornerstone of the capitol was put in place in 1775, and the building was completed three years later. Virginia is famous for the many U. S. presidents born there. The graves of two of them, James Monroe (1758-1831) and John Tyler (1790-1862), are situated in Richmond's well-known Hollywood Cemetery, located at Cherry and Albemarle streets. Jefferson Davis (1808-1889), president of the Confederacy, was also buried there. John Marshall (1755-1835), a native of Germantown, Virginia, who served for 34 years as chief justice of the United States Supreme Court, raised his children in the oldest brick house in Richmond. Built in 1790, the dwelling still stands at Ninth and Marshall streets in the city.

When the Civil War began in 1861, Richmond's population numbered about 38,000 persons, and the city was then one of the few substantial commercial, industrial and medical centers of the South. In the second half of the nineteenth century, the city's railroads were already well connected to many sections of the Southeast. Among the dominant diversified industries in the state capital was Tredegar Iron Works, which was destined to become an essential producer of military armaments for the Confederacy during the Civil War.

In 1861, the Confederate senate passed legislation authorizing the transfer of the capital of the Confederate States of America from Montgomery, Alabama, to Richmond, Virginia. President Jefferson Davis signed the legislation into law July 21, 1861. Subsequently, President Davis also moved to the new capital where he and his family resided at Twelfth and Clay streets in a fine house that is now the Museum of the Confederacy. The removal of the Confederate capital to Richmond was launched despite the fact that the new seat of the Southern government would be only 106 miles due south of the Union's capital of Washington, D. C. Consequently, Richmond became a prime target of Federal troops during the greater part of the North-South military conflict. For almost four years, battles raged around the city as Confederate troops gallantly defended their nation's capital in battles fought at the following places near Richmond (and at the dates indicated): Drewry's Bluff (May 15, 1862), Mechanicsville (June 26, 1862), Gaines' Mill (June 27, 1862), Beaver Dam Creek (June 26, 1862), Malvern Hill (July 1, 1862), Parker's Battery (May 1864), Cold Harbor (June 3, 1864), and Fort Harrison (September 29, 1864).

Because of Richmond's strategic location, and its importance to the Confederacy, it became a primary supply depot for Southern troops in Virginia. Moreover, its hospitals overflowed with sick and wounded soldier's who were transported from surrounding battlefields. Richmond's population soon swelled to more than 100,000 persons

as government officials, military troops and support elements, opportunistic exploiters, prostitutes, camp followers and Yankee prisoners of war arrived in the city. In order to hold captured Union soldiers who were brought in from nearby battlefields, some tobacco warehouses in Richmond were converted, and the infamous Libby Prison was established there to house thousands

of captives. Chimborazo Hospital in Richmond, the largest military hospital ever established, treated 76,000 sick and wounded soldiers during the war. It was located atop Church Hill near the city. Samuel Preston Moore (1813-1889), Confederate surgeon general, played a key part in establishing the hospital. He was educated at the Medical School of South Carolina in Charleston. (The surgeon general was buried in Hollywood Cemetery, and his grave is very near Jefferson Davis' last resting place.) Another South Carolinian, Phoebe Pember, who once resided in Aiken, South Carolina, was a Confederate nurse who served as head matron in one of Chimborazo's medical units. She held that demanding and gut-wrenching position from December 1862 until the end of the Civil War. Her parents were Jacob and Fanny Levy, residents of the early Jewish community of Charleston, South Carolina. Many soldiers from Pickens and Anderson districts of South Carolina were patients at one or another of Richmond's military or civilian hospitals. Some of those troops died at the city and were interred in Hollywood Cemetery or in another of the numerous close-by necropolises for Confederate soldiers.

Sergeant Frederick Bischoff, Jr. (1837-1896) of the German settlement at Walhalla in Pickens District, S. C., was wounded in action while serving in Co. "C", Orr's Rifles. He was then admitted to Chimborazo Hospital. In February 1863, this very literate soldier penned a letter (in German) and provided his eyewitness description of the hospital. An English-language translation of part of that letter is provided below:

This hospital is in the open on a hill several miles from Richmond, and a half-mile from a stream called the James River. It is divided into five divisions of 16 wards or houses, 80 feet long by 30 feet wide and six feet high. There is no ceiling and the flooring is planks laid together. Each ward has 40 beds arranged in rows of ten. In the center there are two stoves to heat the entire place. Among the curiosities here now are the biggest rats I have ever seen in my life. They are so bold they come into the hospital during the daytime. At night they jump upon the beds, tables, and benches making terrible noises. Several of the fellows set

traps and catch them at night, skin and pull the fur over their ears, and then salt and fry them on the stoves. They say the rat is tastier than a squirrel, and judging from their appetites, it does seem so. However, my appetite is not so ravenous.

In addition to the previously mentioned Hollywood Cemetery, six national cemeteries at or near Richmond contain the graves of Civil War soldiers, and they are as follows:

City Point National Cemetery at 500 North 10th Avenue, Hopewell.

Seven Pines National Cemetery, located at 400 East Williamsburg Road.

**Cold Harbor National Cemetery**, located east of Richmond on State Road 156 and contains about 2,000 graves of soldiers.

Richmond National Cemetery at 1701 Williamsburg Road. This is the largest of these national cemeteries, and it contains the graves of 7,100 soldiers, most of whom are unknown.

Fort Harrison National Cemetery, located eight miles southeast of Richmond and on Varina Road. It contains the graves of soldiers who died at about forty sites in Virginia.

Glendale National Cemetery on State 156 (Willis Church Road) and near the site of the Battle of Malvern Hill.

General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia played an important part repulsing Union forces during the Seven Days' Battles before Richmond. Union troops once pushed to within four miles of the city, but they failed in that effort and did not capture the city until the final days of the Civil War. On April 2, 1865, the last remaining members of the Confederate government abandoned the city and followed orders to burn the remaining stockpiles of Confederate arms and other military equipment. Their fires destroyed a large part of the city. On the following day, Union General Ulysses S. Grant and his troops took Richmond. Today, Richmond has a population of over 200,000, and it is a vibrant commercial, cultural and government center. But many footprints remain, and they reflect the city's historical role during the U. S. Civil War.



### MORE CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS

- David C. Reid (b. ca. 1843) enlisted in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was eighteen years of age. He was captured by Union troops in 1864. This soldier also served in Co. B, 2nd South Carolina Rifles (Moore's Regt.). His home was in the western half of Pickens District, S. C. (now Oconee County).
- Evan Reid (b. 1836) was a son of Thomas Baskin Reid and Sarah (Nicholson) Reid. He served in Co. A, 20th South Carolina Infantry and lost his life during the Civil War. His family moved from Pickens District, S. C., to Mississippi prior to the Civil War. Five of this soldier's brothers also served in the Confederate Army.
- George Reid (b. 1843) was a brother of Evan Reid (see above) and is believed to have served in the 25th S. C. Infantry. He died during the Civil War.
- George T. Reid (b. ca. 1845) was a son of Samuel Reid who also served in the Confederate Army. This soldier's grandfather, Joseph Reid, fought in the Revolutionary War, after which he settled at the forks of the Keowee and Little rivers in what became Pickens District, S. C., and was later Oconee County. This soldier entered the Confederate Army with other sixteen-year-old youths and served in Captain C. L. Hollingsworth's company. After the Civil War, he became a prosperous merchant in Chappells, South Carolina.
- H. T. Reid served as a private in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry and was killed in action at the big crater explosion at Petersburg, Virginia, on July 30, 1864.
- J. Pink Reid is believed to have been the Pinckney Reid of Greenville County, S. C., who married Talitha Hendricks of Loopers, S. C. in 1895. J. Pink Reid served in Co. C, Palmetto Sharpshooters and survived the Civil War. In 1901, he attended the 19th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Sandy Springs near Pendleton, S. C.
- James B. Reid was wounded during the Wilderness Campaign in Virginia while serving in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.).
- James T. Reid (1834-1912) enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he

- was about 27 years of age. He rose to the rank of captain during the Civil War, which he survived. On January 4, 1866, he married E. Caroline "Carrie" Stribling (1835-1916), daughter of William H. Stribling. This soldier was a son of Samuel Reid, who also served in the C. S. A. despite his advanced age.
- John Reid, Jr. (b. ca. 1829) was a son of John Reid, Sr. (b. ca. 1785) and Elizabeth Reid (b. ca. 1795). He served in Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) and was captured by Union troops during the Civil War.
- John Bennett Reid (1846-1926) enlisted in Co. F, 1st South Carolina Cavalry when he was sixteen years of age. His unit was commanded by Col. John Logan Black. After about one year, he was transferred to Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.), commanded by Capt. Joseph Norton. He was captured by Union troops during the war and taken to Fort Delaware, where he was held until June 11, 1865. He returned to South Carolina after the war on July 1, 1865. On his parole certificate, this soldier was described as being six feet tall and with fair complexion, light hair and hazel eyes. After the Civil War, he resided in Easley, S. C., where he received a Civil War pension in 1922. In 1927, his widow, Lucy Reid, also received a pension. She died June 9, 1942.
- Joseph "Joe" Reid (1842-1922) was a son of Thomas Baskin Reid, Sr. and Sarah (Nicholson) Reid who moved from Pickens District, S. C., to Mississippi about 1835. He served in Co. H, 11th Mississippi Infantry. He died January 3, 1922, and was buried in the Reid family cemetery, located about six miles north of Houston, Mississippi.
- Joseph J. Reid (b. ca. 1839) was a son of Samuel Reid (b. ca. 1802). He was captured by Union troops during the war and taken, as a prisoner of war, to Point Lookout, Maryland. From there this soldier was sent to Elmira Prison in Elmira, New York, where he died of typhoid fever August 30, 1864. He was probably buried in the prison's cemetery.
- Reuben Christopher Reid (1837-1885) was born near Newberry in Laurens District, South Carolina, on April 7, 1837. He first served in Co. E, (Bozeman Guards), Hampton Legion, from which he was discharged because of "carditis and general ill health."

Then, on November 11, 1863, he was conscripted into Co. A, 15th South Carolina Infantry. While serving in that unit near Cold Harbor, Virginia, he was wounded in action by a mini ball that struck his right side and arm about June 9, 1864. He was then a patient at Jackson Hospital from June 10th to June 16, 1864, after which he was granted a 30-day wound furlough. Rueben C. Reid survived the Civil War. after which he worked on the Charlotte-Atlanta Air Line Railroad and helped to lay the rails that were put down through the southern part of Pickens and Oconee counties. This Confederate veteran settled in Oconee County, S. C., where he resided in the Westminster area and farmed. In 1855 he married Elizabeth Townsend (1828-1901), and the couple had four children, one of whom died in infancy. The other children were John Townsend Reid (15 Jul 1862 - 7 Dec 1923); Robert Reid; and Ida Alice Reid (12 Jul 1859 - 2 Aug 1909), who married Henry M. Simpson (21 Mar 1856 - 3 Aug 1900). This Confederate veteran died near Westminster (Oconee County), S. C., on July 23, 1885, and was buried at Westminster Baptist Church.

K. B. Reid was a brother of John Bennett Reid who also served in the C. S. A. K. B. Reid was a member of Co. C, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He survived the Civil War and attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Regt. at Seneca, S. C., in August 1916. At that time he was a resident of the Easley area of Pickens County, S. C.

Lemuel Reid (1834-1901) is believed to have served in Co. H, 5th South Carolina Reserves. He was a son of Thomas Baskin Reid and Sarah (Nicholson) Reid. Five of his brothers also served as Confederate soldiers. In 1875, this Confederate veteran married Victoria McCullum of Cherokee County, Georgia.

Samuel Reid (b. ca. 1805) enlisted in Co. E, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.) when he was 56 years of age. He was discharged on account of his age during the Civil War. He was a son of Joseph Reid, who was a soldier in the War of Independence. Three of this Confederate soldier's sons also served in the C. S. A. Samuel Reid was the first sheriff of Pickens District. He served one term and then was engaged in farming on a large farm at the forks of the Keowee and Little rivers in what today is Oconee Counnty, S. C.

Samuel Reid (1832-1921) was a son of Thomas Baskin Reid and Sarah (Nicholson) Reid who moved from Pickens District, S. C., to Mississippi in 1835. During the Civil War, this soldier served in Co. H, 11th Mississippi Cavalry. He was seriously wounded at Gettysburg, Virginia, and was then captured by Union troops. During the remainder of the war, he was held as a prisoner-of-war. After the conflict, he went back to Mississippi where he died unmarried and was buried there.

Stephen C. Reid was a private in Co. A, 1st South Carolina Rifles (Orr's Regt.). He participated in the Battle of Gaines' Mill on June 27, 1862. Then he was wounded in action in Virginia on August 29, 1862. By October 11, 1862, he rejoined his company and was looking "very well", according to the Civil War diary of John L. Brackenridge, another soldier from Pickens District, S. C.

Thomas Baskin Reid, Jr. (1831-1862) was born in Pickens District, S. C., and served in Co. H, 11th Mississippi Cavalry. He died of battle wounds on June 27, 1862, which he received during the Battle of Gaines' Mill in Virginia.

Thomas J. Reid died while being held as a prisoner-of-war at Elmira, N. Y., on August 30, 1864. He had been captured by Union troops during the Battle of Trevilian Station in Virginia. That engagement was one of the most confusing and ferocious cavalry fights of the Eastern theater of the Civil War. This soldier served in Co. C, 4th South Carolina Infantry (Sloan's Regt.) and in another Confederate unit.

W. A. Reid was born about 1839 and served in Co. D, 22nd South Carolina Infantry. He survived the Civil War. In 1902, his name was included on the Civil War pension roll for Oconee County, S. C., and his age then was recorded as 62.
