September 26, 1832

A public meeting at Pickens Court House on 3 Sept 1832 was held for the purpose of discussing the constitutionality and oppressiveness of the Tariff, the appropriate remedy, and the propriety of calling a State Convention. Col. **Robert Anderson** was elected chair and **Robert Creswell Esq.** appointed Secretary.

Micajah Webb Esq. announces his candidacy for Clerk of Court for Anderson District.

John B. Lewis announces his candidacy for Clerk of Court for Anderson District.

A barbeque will be given at Pumpkintown, Pickens District on October 6, 1832 in honor of Hon. **W. R. Davis**. Committee is: **Bailey Barton, Wm. Sutherland, Jos. B. Reid, A. Blythe and S.C. Reid**.

A Political Meeting will be held near Shockley's Ferry on October 4, 1832. Committee: **Major Gilmer, Thomas Skelton, Andrew McLees, Samuel Buchanan, David Sadler, Sr., Saml. G. Earle, Richard Shockley, James Gunnin and Andrew McDaniel**.

October 3, 1832

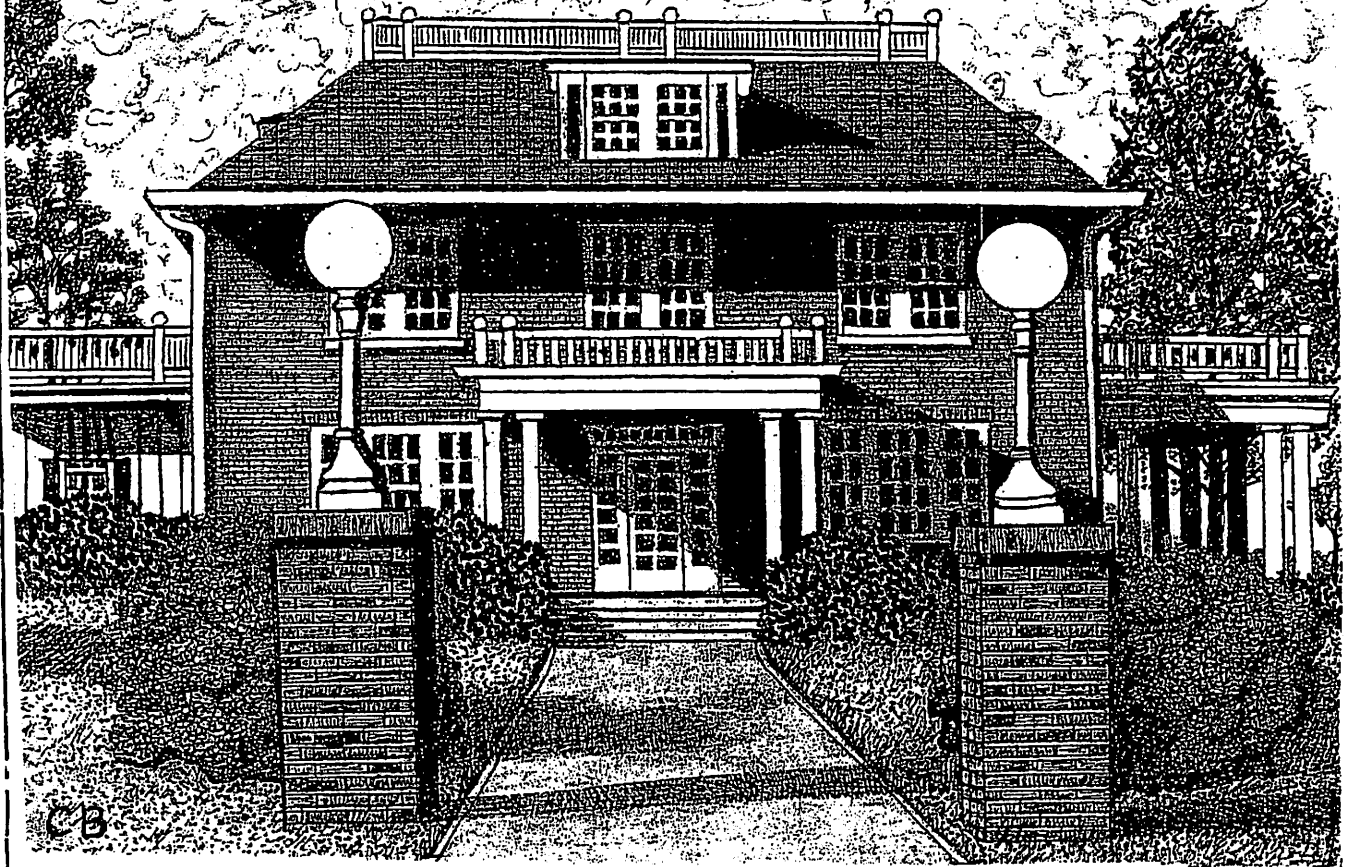

JOHN POSEY SMITH AND J. WARREN SMITH IMPACTED UPON THE TOWN OF LIBERTY, S. C.

The J. Warren Smith House in Liberty Is Listed on the National Register of Historic Places

The above imposing three-story house is situated on Liberty's Palmetto Street. It contains sixteen rooms, plus a basement and a rooftop sun deck. The dwelling was constructed in the mid-1920s for the family of Mr. and Mrs. J. Warren Smith. Mr. Smith founded the Liberty Light and Power Company in 1910. That utility produced and sold electricity to residents of the town. It continued in operation until 1927, when Duke Power Company purchased the business. Then, Mr. Smith became a Duke employee himself and served as the manager of the company's operations in the Liberty area. Later, he was transferred to Duke's facilities in Greenville, S. C. There, he was a member of the firm's Rural Electrification and Engineering Department. Mr. Smith was one of the eleven offspring of John Posey Smith and Margaret Ward Smith, both of whom were natives of Anderson County, South Carolina, but spent the greater part of their long and productive lives in Pickens County.

John Posey Smith (1861-1953) and Margaret Ward Smith (1861-1947)

John Posey Smith (1861-1953) was born December 7, 1861, in the Brushy Creek section of northern Anderson County, South Carolina. He was a son of Clark Wales Smith (1826-1880), a confederate veteran, and Mary Elizabeth Gambrell Smith (1826-1898). He attended a rural school in the Mountain Springs community. At the age of nineteen, he married Margaret Ward (7 Dec 1861-31 Aug 1947) of Anderson County. The couple soon moved from Anderson County to the Pea Ridge area of Pickens County. Pea Ridge extends roughly from Six Mile Mountain in the west to Glassy Mountain in the east. The Twelve Mile River flows near the ridge and then enters Lake Hartwell. In *Red Hills and Cotton*, a book by Ben Robertson, Pea Ridge is described as "fine rotton county between two lonely spars of pine grown granite." While living on Pea Ridge, John Posey Smith farmed and served as a miller at water-powered grist mills. He was also one of the founders of Fairview Methodist Church, situated near Norris, S. C. (Fairview is now a Baptist church.)

After living on Pea Ridge for almost three decades, the Smith family moved to the nearby town of Liberty. Mr. Smith built a two-story house in the town, and it was there that most of the eleven children of his family grew into adulthood. Mr. and Mrs. Smith moved their church membership from Fairview to Liberty Methodist Church, which was situated a short distance from their home at the intersection of West Main and Peachtree streets.

From 1904 to 1906, John Posey Smith served as a Pickens County commissioner. Later, he was elected to the South Carolina House of Representatives and served there in 1927-28 and again in 1931-32. He was also a member of Liberty Lodge 235 of American Free Masons. In addition, he participated in civic activities of the town and county.

In 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Smith celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary. A large assemblage of their descendants and other relatives was present for the celebration at the Smith's home in Liberty. A group photograph of the people present at the affair was taken and later published in a history of Liberty written by Julia Jean Woodson and G. Anne Sherriff. Titled *Liberty, South Carolina 1876-1976: One Hundred Years*, the book contains a list of the names of all the

people who appeared in the photograph.

On August 31, 1947, Margaret Ward Smith died at the age of eighty-six years. She was a charter member of the Order of Eastern Star. Thus, members of that organization served as escorts at Mrs. Smith's funeral, along with members of the Methodist Woman's Missionary Society. The funeral was held at Liberty Methodist Church, and the following grandsons served as pallbearers: Homer Boroughs, Terrell Rampey, William "Billy" Boroughs, G. Franklin Smith, Jr., Miller Smith, Calvin Smith, Joe Rampey and Harrison Smith. Margaret Ward Smith was survived by her husband, five children, one brother, thirty-six grandchildren, sixty-six great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.

After his wife's death, John P. Smith lived on for six years, and he died at the age of ninety-two on December 14, 1953, following several weeks of serious illness. He was survived by two sons, Joseph Warren Smith of Greenville, S. C., and Lawrence M. Smith of Atlanta, Georgia; three daughters, Mrs. Zora Boroughs of Liberty, S.C.; Mrs. E.A. Lewis of Pickens, S. C.; and Mrs. Fred B. Rogers of West Pelzer, S.C. Additional survivors were thirty-six grandchildren, eighty-four great-grandchildren, and fourteen great-great-grandchildren. Mr. Smith's funeral was conducted at Liberty Methodist Church. Pallbearers were the following grandsons: Olin Lewis, Harrison Smith, Franklin Smith, Jr., Joe Rampey, Billy Boroughs, and Miller Smith. The honorary escort was comprised of the official board of Liberty Methodist Church, along with Dr. J. W. Kitchen, H. E. Freeman, Jim Moore, C. E. Bush, Claude Hutchins, J.H. Boggs, J.R. Allgood, B.W. McWhorter, Walter Fowler, R.R. Roark, Clarence Watson and Henry Bolding. John Posey Smith was buried in West View Cemetery in Liberty, S.C.

The former Liberty dwelling of John P. Smith is now an apartment house owned by George I. Newton. His wife, Jo Nell Herron Newton (d.13 May 2008) operated the adjacent Liberty Bed & Breakfast for eighteen years prior to her death.

In the following sections of this article, the children of this Smith family are listed and discussed, along with some of their offspring.





Liberty Bells

Joseph Warren Smith (1880-1968)

Born on December 31, 1880, in the Mountain Springs community of Anderson County, S. C., this son of John P. and Margaret Ward Smith preferred to write his given names as J. Warren, rather than Joseph Warren. While still a young man, he moved from Anderson County to Pickens County with his parents, and they settled first on Pea Ridge. Later, the family moved to the nearby town of Liberty. J. Warren Smith married Mattie Kennemur (20 May 1884-21 Oct 1965). She was a daughter of Noah Kennemur and Kate Stewart Kennemur of Pickens County S. C. The following three girls and three boys were offspring of that union: Nellie Smith, who married J. C. Jones and once resided in Thomasville, N.C.; Jo Smith, who married Randolph J. Daniel and once lived in Lake City, S. C.; Ruth Smith, who married Wilson Page and once resided in Hartwell, Georgia; George Franklin Smith and Ladson Smith, both of whom once resided in Easley, S.C.; and T. Miller Smith, who lived in both Germany and in Manila in the Philippine Islands.

J. Warren Smith worked as a salesman for the International Harvester Company, a manufacturer of tractors and other farm equipment. In 1910, Smith established his own business in Liberty, namely The Liberty Light and Power Company. The utility firm provided residents of the town their first commercially available electric power. On March 24, 1910, the following news item from a Liberty resident appeared in *The Pickens Sentinel*: "Our little town does not propose to stay in the dark so have arranged to put in electric lights right away. The plant will be put up in the city." Then, in the August 4th issue of the same newspaper the following news appeared: "We also have fast nearing completion of a splendid electric light plant, which will soon be ready to light the little

city as bright as the day." Yet another brief notice appeared in the August 25th issue: "We are anxious to see Liberty by electric lights."

When it was operational, Mr. Smith's small power plant provided electricity for use by about 150 local residents. Power was first produced by two gasoline generators — one with a 110 horsepower capacity and the other capable of 150 horsepower. Customers were charged fourteen cents per kilowatt-hour of electricity that they used. George Franklin Smith, son of J. Warren Smith, was responsible for reading customers' electric meters each month. After two years of continuous use, the company's generators burned out, and they had to be rebuilt. In about 1920, the demand for electricity in Liberty had increased so much that Mr. Smith recognized the need for bigger and more powerful generators for his operation. Thus, he decided to purchase hydroelectric generators and to move his plant to the banks of nearby Twelve Mile River where he could take advantage of that stream's waterpower. He then leased a strip of land along the river from Frank Lenhardt and constructed a new plant there. The plant's site was about one mile north of the Norris community and a few miles from Liberty.

In 1928, when the demand for more electricity had almost exceeded the supply, Mr. Smith was forced to purchase additional power from Duke Power Company. Then, in the following year he sold Liberty Power and Light Company to Duke. In turn, Duke named Mr. Smith manager of its new branch office in Liberty and also constructed an electrical substation in the town.

Prior to becoming an employee of Duke himself, J. Warren Smith had a fine three-story home constructed at 21 North Palmetto Street in Liberty. The relatively large house was one of the first dwellings in the town to have been designed and planned by a professional architect. Its construction required two years and was completed in the late 1920s. The house contained sixteen rooms, a basement, a rooftop sundeck, central vacuum system and a steam heating system.

In 1937, J. Warren Smith was transferred from Duke Power Company's Liberty branch office to Greenville, S. C., where he joined the firm's Rural Electrification and Engineering Department.





On August 21, 1965, Mattie Kennemur Smith, wife of J. Warren Smith, died in a Greenville nursing home at the age of eighty-one years. Her death was preceded by an illness of two months. She was survived by Mr. Smith and six children. Also among her survivors were a sister, Lola Kennemur Evans (12 Feb 1881-27 Jun 1970), wife of Marion A. Evans (17 Aug 1877-16 Jan 1941) of Six Mile, S. C. Eighteen grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren were also among Mrs. Smith's survivors. Mattie Kennemur Smith was a member of Trinity Methodist Church in Greenville. When she resided in Liberty, Mrs. Smith was a member of Liberty Union Aid Society, which was organized in the town in 1909 to help local residents who were sick or in need of help. Following a funeral service conducted at a Greenville funeral home, Mrs. Smith's body was laid to rest in Liberty where she had lived for a number of years. In 1965 (shortly after his wife's death), J. Warren Smith moved from his Greenville home at 22 East Augusta Place to Easley, S. C., and took up residence there in Pecan Terrace Hotel.

J. Warren Smith died in an Easley hospital at the age of eighty-seven on June 6, 1968. He was a member of Liberty Methodist Church and the Woodmen of the World. He was survived by three sons, G. Franklin Smith and Ladson Smith of Easley and T. Miller Smith of Germany; three daughters, Mrs. J. C. (Nellie) Jones of Thomasville, N.C., Mrs. Rudolph J. (Jo) Daniel of Lake City, S. C., and Mrs. William (Ruth) Page of Hartwell, Georgia; a brother, Lawrence M Smith of St. Petersburg, Florida; two sisters, Mrs. Zora Boroughs of Liberty and Mrs. Fred B. (Marge) Rogers of Pelzer; eighteen grandchildren and thirteen great-grandchildren. Funeral services for Mr. Smith were conducted at an Easley funeral home, followed by a burial in West View Cemetery in Liberty, S. C.

**Emma Lee Smith Rampey
1883-1944)**

A lifelong resident of Pickens County, S. C., Emma Lee Smith was born on April 29, 1883. She married Henry Silas Rampey (9 Sep 1879-10 Feb 1969), and the couple lived in Central, S. C. Mrs. Rampey was active in church and community affairs. On July 20, 1944, she died at her home at the age of sixty-one and after having been ill for only a few hours. She was survived by her husband; three daughters, Mrs. Joyce Stansell, Mrs. J. R. Spearman and Mrs. J. C. Jewell;

five sons, Rev. Paul G. Rampey, L. F. Rampey, Opi Rampey, J. A. Rampey and George Harold Rampey; twenty-three grandchildren; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Posey Smith of Liberty, S. C.; and three sisters and three brothers. Mrs. Rampey's body was buried in Mount Zion Cemetery in Central, S. C. When Mrs. Rampey's husband passed away in 1969, he was buried beside his wife's grave.

**Dr. Clark Wales Smith
(1885-1927)**

At his birth on July 5, 1885, Clark Wales Smith was named after his paternal grandfather, Clark Wales Smith (1826-1880). In order to prepare for a medical career, this son of John Posey Smith attended and graduated from a medical school in Memphis, Tennessee. During the time that he studied medicine, there were three medical schools in Memphis. In 1911, the Memphis Hospital College and the College of Physicians and Surgeons merged into the University of Tennessee's Medical College. Which one of these medical schools Dr. Smith attended is presently not known. Dr. Smith first practiced medicine in the small cotton mill town of Newry in Oconee, S. C. Then, in 1915, the doctor moved his practice to Liberty, S. C., where he had once resided and where his parents were still living. Shortly after the United States entered World War I in 1917, Dr. Smith entered the U. S. Army as a medical officer with the rank of captain. He served in the 1st U. S. Division of the American Expeditionary Force on the European front. He was assigned to Field Hospital No 13. After the war, he returned to his hometown of Liberty where he practiced medicine and built a house on West Main Street. Later, he served as a medical staff member of the Camp Sevier Army Hospital in Greenville County, S. C. He then moved his family to Greenville, S. C., and the family occupied a house at 415 Jones Avenue in the city. Dr. Smith's wife was Leila Crenshaw Smith (9 Dec 1886-28 May 1936), and the couple had the following children: Harrison Smith, Feltz Smith and Clark Wales Smith, Jr. (13 Aug 1912-11 Jun 1915), the latter child, having died young, was buried in Liberty's West View Cemetery.

While practicing medicine, Dr. Smith fell ill with tuberculosis, a highly variable communicable disease. In the doctor's lifetime, there were no effective antibiotics to kill microorganisms. Thus, the disease

claimed Dr. Smith's life; he died at the age of forty-nine at his home in Greenville, S. C., on January 4, 1927. A funeral service for the highly regarded medical doctor was conducted at Liberty Methodist Church, followed by burial in Liberty's West View Cemetery.

The doctor's widow, Leila Crenshaw Smith, died in 1936 at her home in Greenville S. C. Like her beloved husband, Mrs. Smith was also forty-nine at her death. She was also buried in Liberty's West View Cemetery following a funeral service held at Liberty Methodist Church. She was survived by a sister, Mrs. Messrvey, and a brother, Dr. L. V. Crenshaw.

**Zora Smith Boroughs
(1890-1975)**

Born in Pickens County, S. C., March 2, 1890, Zora Smith married John Harvey Boroughs (10 Oct 1875-7Mar 1921). She taught school and worked as a salesperson at Sarlin's Department Store in Liberty, S. C. She was also a member of the Order of Eastern Star and Liberty United Methodist Church. For many years, Mrs. Boroughs resided at 110 South Hillcrest Street in Liberty, S. C. She died at the age of eighty-five on December 10, 1975. She was survived by a daughter, Grace Boroughs Watson of Rock Hill, S. C.; two sons, John Boroughs, Jr. of Liberty, S. C.; and James Homer Boroughs of Huntington Park, California; a sister, Mrs. Fred Rogers of West Pelzer, S. C.; four grandchildren and seven great-great grandchildren. She was predeceased by several offspring, including William F. "Billy" Boroughs (14 Jul 1921-24 Jan 1973).

**Henry Martin Smith
(1892-1944)**

A native and lifelong resident of Pickens County, S. C., Henry Martin Smith was born in 1892. He married Christine Boggs (21 Dec 1891-2 Jun 1968), daughter of Thomas W. Boggs (1848-1910) and Emma Willard Boggs (1854-1940). Mr. Smith died in 1944 at the age of fifty-two, and his funeral was conducted at Liberty Presbyterian Church where he was a member. Pallbearers at the funeral were John McKinney, Z E. King, Melvin Bolding, Dick Smith, John William Callaham, and H. E. Freeman. Mr. Smith was survived by his wife; his parents, John Posey Smith and Margaret Ward Smith; two sons, Calvin M. Smith and

Thomas Harrison Smith; one granddaughter; three sisters, Mrs. Zora Boroughs, Mrs. E. A. Lewis and Mrs. Fred Rogers; and two brothers, J. Warren Smith and Lawrence M. Smith. Henry Martin Smith was buried in Liberty's West View Cemetery.

In 1968, Mr. Smith's widow, Christine Boggs Smith, died at her home at 905 Anderson Drive in Liberty, S. C. She was a member of Liberty First Baptist Church and its Women's Missionary Union, Lake Circle. In addition, she was superintendent of the church's junior department for twenty-five years. Mrs. Smith also served as a church hostess and nursery supervisor at her church. Before her retirement, Mrs. Smith worked as a dietician. She was survived by two sons, Calvin and Harrison Smith of Liberty, S.C.; a brother, Leon Boggs of Liberty; a sister, Mrs. Gladys Langston; and three grandchildren. She was buried in West View Cemetery in Liberty, S. C.

**Maudie Smith Lewis
(b. ca. 1895-d. July 1964)**

The wife of Pickens County Probate Judge Eugene Alexander Lewis (d.1988), Maudie Smith Lewis died at the age of sixty-nine in 1964 at her home at 229 Ann Street in Pickens, S. C. She was a graduate of Six Mile Academy in Six Mile, S. C., and taught in Pickens County elementary schools for several years. She was a member of Grace Methodist Church in Pickens, S. C. Mrs. Lewis was survived by her husband; three sons, Olin C. Lewis of Allendale, S. C., Clyde B. Lewis, C. Alex Lewis of Greenville, S. C.; three daughters, Mrs. George Dunlap of North Augusta, S. C., Mrs. Feltz Reese of Laurens, S. C., and Mrs. Hugh McKinney of Easley, S. C.; and adopted granddaughter, Mrs. Marion Rhodes of Cross Hill, S. C.; two brothers and two sisters. Funeral services for Mrs. Lewis were held at Grace Methodist Church, followed by the burial of her body in Hillcrest Memorial Park in Pickens County, S. C. Pallbearers were Mrs. Lewis' nephews, Rev. Herman Bruce and Hugh Lewis, Joe Rampey, Calvin Smith and Tadson Smith. Members of the Susannah Wesley Sunday School Class of Grace Methodist Church served as honorary escort.



**Tennie Smith Alewine
(1900-1930)**

Born on February 24, 1900, Tennie Smith married Henry Earl Alewine in about 1918. The couple became the parents of three daughters, Margaret Alewine, Mildred Alewine and Anne Ruth Alewine; and one son, Henry Earl Alewine, Jr. Mrs. Alewine died on September 13, 1930, at the age of thirty. Her death occurred at the Chick Springs Hospital in Taylors, (Greenville County), S. C. Mrs. Alewine was a member of Liberty Methodist Church where her funeral was conducted, followed by the burial in Liberty's West View Cemetery. Active pallbearers were G.W. Alewine, Ansel Alewine, Boyce Shockley, Willie Taylor, Max Hawkins, and Jeff Hawkins. Honorary pallbearers were Dr. Leroy Brockman, Dr. William M. Long, Dr. W.A. Sheldon, W.B. Glenn, P. W. Shockley, and R.H. Bridgeman.

**Margie Smith Rogers
(b. ca. 1905-d. Mary 1983)**

This daughter of John Posey Smith and Margaret Ward Smith married Fred Bieman Rogers (b. ca. 1907-d. Dec 1974), who was a son of E. C. and Hattie Crenshaw Rogers. Mr. and Mrs. Rogers resided at 85 Main Street in West Pelzer; S. C. Mr. Rogers was an alderman of the town of West Pelzer in Anderson County. He was also a member of Pelzer Masonic Lodge 214, Hejaz Shrine Temple and the S. C. State Employees Association. In addition, he was a retired S. C. State LP Gas inspector. He was also a member of Pelzer United Methodist Church and served as a trustee, steward, and member of the official church board and the Men's Bible Class. Mr. Rogers died at the age of sixty-seven in December 1974. He was survived by his wife and a son, Fred Bieman Rogers, Jr.; two sisters, Mrs. W. D. Anthony of Piedmont, S. C., and Sue Rogers of Pelzer, S. C.; a brother, James W. Rogers of Albuquerque, New Mexico; and two grandchildren.

Margie Smith Rogers was also a member of Pelzer United Methodist Church. After her husband's death and her retirement from Anderson County School District One, Mrs. Rogers moved to Louisville, Kentucky, where her only child, Fred Bieman Rogers, Jr., and his wife resided. She died there in May 1983,

and her body was returned to her hometown in Anderson, S. C., where funeral services were conducted at Pelzer United Methodist Church.

Lawrence M. Smith

Very little information about Lawrence M. Smith could be found while research for the present article was being conducted. He was a son of John Posey Smith and Margaret Ward Smith, but his birth and death dates could not be determined. Because Lawrence was listed as a survivor of several of his siblings when their obituaries were published in newspapers, I know that in 1930, he resided in Slaton, Texas. Also, in the years 1947, 1963 and 1965, he was a resident of Atlanta, Georgia. Then, in 1968 his residence was listed as St. Petersburg, Florida, which might have been where he lived in retirement.

During the 1930s, J. Warren Smith lost this dwelling due to a Great Depression mortgage foreclosure. Members of the Lee J. Kelley family then resided in the house until it was purchased by the Fleming family in 1994. Now, Jane R. Fleming, a Liberty High School science teacher, owns and also lives in the former Myrtle Inn.

Robert R. Clanahan. The State of South Carolina, Pendleton District. On the **Twenty-Fifth day of October 1820** personally appeared, in open court in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Assize and General Goal Delivery being a Court of record for the said District in the said State, **Robert Clanahan** aged **Sixty five** years, resident in the District and State aforesaid, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

- That he Enlisted under **Lieutenant Colonel L. Williams** and served in the **sixth Company under Lieutenant N. Williams Comadant [sic] of Sixth company of the Sixth Regiment of Maryland Line in January 1776 for during the War**—was in the Battles of **Germantown, Brandywine, Monmouth, and in various other Skirmishes**—was discharged at **Annapolis on the Ninth day of November 1783.**
- Made an Original declaration on the **17th May 1818.** And received Pension Certificate No. **8058** dated **5th March 1819.**
- And I do solemnly Swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the **18th day of March, 1818;** and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary . . . war," passed on the **18th day of March, 1818;** and that I have not, nor has any . . . in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me, nor . . .
- other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by . . . and calf, one heifer, three pots, one oven, one skillet, two . . . pot hooks, one Iron pot rack, four gimblets, two augers, two hammers, six chairs. By occupation a farm, and was wounded in his right arm in the Battle; he is not able to cut Firewood:
- **Wife Anna aged Fifty four years,** has fits very often, and generally three every week; **Daughter Mary, aged thirty years** well enough, **Daughter Elizabeth aged fourteen years,** crippled in one foot so that she is unable to do much toward making a support.
