26 Apr 1904. Postcard from Robert Adams in Laurens, SC to Senator A. C. Latimer in Washington D. C. requesting a copy of the Proceedings in the Smoot? Lease.

31 May 1904. Statement for Honorable Al Latimer Amos Rice? from Horton & Gambrell Groceries, Furniture, Coffins and Caskets of Belton, SC.

1906-1936. Postcards. Miss Ida Parry, 277 Ashland Blvd., Chicago, Ill.; Miss A. E. Parry, 32 S. Washington, Columbia, OH; Miss Grace Parry, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. James Parry, Route 4, New Philadelphia, OH; Mr. Teddy Parry, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. George L. FerRoll, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. Ruth C. V. Peart, East Akron, OH; Miss Aurilla B. Parry, Prescott, Ariz.; etc.

1906 – 1922. Letters to Mrs. Katie Timms (Catherine, Mrs. W. H., Mrs. Hugh) and Miss Katie McDonald, 15 Werner Ave., Atlanta, GA. Did not read all the letters. Many of them are from Ludlow, Massachusetts.

9 May 1906. Telegram from N. D. Hook, J. W. Fisher, C. Sampkins, committeeman to Honorable A. C. Lattimer, U. S. Senator, Washington, D. C. Concerns railway companies issuing free transportation to members of railroad workers.

31 Jan 1907. [copy] Application for Isadora Igrer Franklin Eades for monies from the Eastern Cherokees. No. 16173. Also, 28764, 40887, 40893, 40218, 40207, 32408, 32408, 32409, 32410.

16173. Isaac F. Eades Bartlesville, OK, 28 Aug 1908. Born in Pickens County, SC. Father was Indian. Grandmother died in SC. Isaac Eades has cousin named Sam Yates who was "drove" from SC with the other Indians. He was one year old in 1851. Ran away from home when 13 years old. "My Indian name is Pilgrim that is my grandmother name my English name is Eads—that is my father name."

22 Jan 1908. Letter from John W. Eades, Simpson, OK. "

My father's name is Miles Anderson Eades. He was in Texas when he got his return card from Washington."

18 Nov 1908. Mentions joint affidavit with Isaac Durham, Susan Hester, and Joseph Hendrix. Applications. Birth is 26 Nov 1850, Pickens Court-house, SC. "Claim through my grandmother, Delethe Pilgrim who was a full blood Cherokee Indian." He is married to Alice Eades, age 50. Father is John Thomas Eades, mother is Nancy Ann Durham. Father and mother were born in Pickens, SC and they resided there in 1851. Death of father was in 1867 (info not copied) and mother in 1869 (info not copied). Brothers and sisters: Elizabeth Gillam (1836), Miles Eades (1838), Francis McClannan (1845-1905), Sam Eades, Sarah Smith (1852), John Eades (1855) and Tyler Eades (1859). Children of John Eades and Deletha Pilgrim Eades include: Matt Eades (died 1870), Bill Eades (died 1870) and Hannah Eades Pilgrim.

8 May 1908. Letter from Eliza K. Earle to Mrs. Mary K. Harris, 2410 11th St., Meridian, Miss. Mrs. Earle says her grandfather was Nathaniel Reid. Mrs. Earle's mother had said that Mr. Reid had suffered a great loss at the close of the war. "I do not know his father's name. His mother was a Miss Hood, related to General Hood of the Confederacy. My Grandmother was Isabella Brown. Her father's named was Joseph Brown. I have a walnut chest made by him and given to my mother with his initials carved on it and the date." She enclosed a letter from Miss Sallie Brown, daughter of Senator Brown of Georgia. "We are

descended from the same branch of Browns she refers to. Mackey Brown, her grandfather was first cousin to my Mother, also the Broyles (Duffie and Porters spoken of in her letter were my mother's relations.) I think my great great grandfather's name was David Brown, his father was William Brown."

Enclosed letter from A. L. Keith, Selina Kansas to Mrs. Eliza Earle. A. L. Keith writes that he was informed "that your father was William Keith".

12 Aug 1908. Letter from Sophy Reid Chappell, 4248 Morgan, St. Louis, Mo. to Mrs. E. J. Harris, 2410 11th St., Meridian, Miss. She is replying to letter from Mrs. Harris and says her great grandfather was Nathan Reid.

Captain Nathan Reid was born about 1752 and died November 6, 1830. Three brothers, Andrew, John, and Thomas Reid emigrated from County Down, Ireland and settled first in Octavra Co., PA; later moving to Albermarle Co. VA. We do not know which one was the father of Nathan Reid but believe John to have been the one, as my father and grandfather have that name. Captain Nathan Reid married Sophia Thorpe, daughter of Francis Thorpe and Kitty Callaway. Eight children were born to them: John, Betsy, Maria, Nathan, Martha, Francis Thorpe, Mary Anne and Katherine. Nathan Reid was Captain of the 14th VA regiment. Enlisted January 28, 1777, wounded at Brandy Wine on September 11, 1777. Regiment designated 10th VA on September 14, 1778. Transferred to 1st VA Regt. on 12 Feb 1781. Retired 1 Jan 1783. Died 6 Nov 1830. (See Heitmanns History, p. 343.)

Also in the same envelope—not sure it belonged to that envelope. Notes about ladies who had joined the DAR on Nathaniel Reid. Also note about "Sir Wm. Keith was Gov. of Penn. – died bout 1749, a near relative of our Grt. Grandfather Cornelius Keith—had a son named Cornelius.

28 Aug 1908. Letter from Lila Keith Gaines? at Greenville to Mrs. Eugene Harris, Meridian, Miss. Nathaniel Reid who married Sophia Thorpe must have been her great-grandfather therefore father of the Nathaniel Reid who was her mother's father. Nathaniel Reid, her mother's father was also in the war and an office. This Nathaniel Reid married Isabella Brown.

1908-1910. Ledger Book possibly from Mitchell & Reeder Cotton dealers in Oconee County. Some names on M index page. L. T. McAlister, J. T. McAlister, J. N. Moore, Baxter McClain, Wilton Mason, Jack Martin, John McAlister, A. A. McGuffin, A. P. Marrett, Leo Markaleos, Jule Martin, Lee Moon, Jim Mize, S. L. Miller, A. Louis McGufin, Lester Mills, Jess Morrison, and Ottoway Marett.



190_ - 1913. Two postcards. One from Maude to Harley Ford, Cheddar, SC (22 Dec 1913) and one from unknown to Mr. Harley Ford, Nagnet, Ark.

1911-1912. Four postcards from Nava, S. C. Allan, J. G. Ward, & Sarah to Mrs. Sarah North, Brevard, NC.

14-19 Jul 1913. Program for Williamston's Chautaugua. Poor condition. Several sheets from the Williamstonian, local school newsletter. List the High School Directory. Articles by Clark Stewart, Mary Herbert Attaway, and May Powell.

20 Feb 1918. Letter from unknown to Mrs. Ester Dorn, Westminister, SC c/o cotton mill. Dear children. Mentions Lizzie, Clint, Mag, Uncle Carl, Essie, Johnny. [Ester must be married to Carl]



militia major; owned and operated tannery, Walker-Emoyle community of Anderson District, S.C.; son of Felix Watkins and Ellen (Robinson) Watkins; pre-war marriage to Margaret Smith (19 Nov 1827 – 19 Oct 1883), daughter of Whitaker Smith (26 Jun 1787 – 12 Sept 1850) and Mary (Moorehead) Smith (b. 8 Oct 1787 – d. 1875); elected major January 29, 1862; elected lieutenant colonel May 5, 1862; fought in Confederate's Maryland campaign of 1862; wounded in Maryland September 14, 1862, during Battle of Crampton's Gap at South Mountain; found/captured by Union troops at Boonsboro, Maryland; sent as wounded prisoner of war to Frederick, Maryland, hospital; died there

1st Lieutenant James Orr, elected company commander after Captain Watkin's promotion to major; was not re-elected at regiment's reorganization in May 1862.

September 26, 1862; buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery (grave # 45) at Frederick; was

2nd Lieutenant James M. Pickens, promoted to 1st lieutenant and later to captain during Civil War, became company commander Oct 15, 1862; captured December 15, 1862, by Union troops at Kinston, N.C., paroled December 15, 1862; wounded June 25, 1863, in Mississippi after having returned to army; survived the war and was paroled at Appomattox Courthouse, Virginia, April 9, 1865.

3rd Lieutenant A. J. Major

survived by wife and seven children.









SERGEANTS AND CORPORALS

1st Sergeant Joshua Jameson (12 Dec 1822 – 10 Dec 1906), son of William Jameson, Jr. (1786 – 1851) and Rebecca (Fowler) Jameson; married Mary Bowen Hunt (24 Nov 1830 – 20 Oct 1899), daughter of William Hunt and Elizabeth (Bowen) Hunt of Greenville District, S.C.; Joshua Jameson and wife had twelve children; he was elected captain of Company G on May 5, 1862; resigned October 15, 1862, because of pulmonary health problems; returned to home in Anderson District and remained there for several months until health improved; returned to the army and served until war ended; post-war service as a magistrate for 24 years in Anderson County and as county supervisor for eight years; he and wife were buried at Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church, northern Anderson County, S.C.

2nd Sergeant John Hunter Cannon (b. ca. 1834 – d. 24 May 1862); promoted to 2nd lieutenant during Civil War; died of disease in army, age 28.

3rd Sergeant Edward H. Watkins (b. ca. 1834 – d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to 1st lieutenant during Civil War, killed in action at age 30 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia.

4th Sergeant Daniel Smith (5 Jul 1831 – 25 Mar 1862), son of William Smith (11 Oct 1795 – 28 Feb 1849) and Anna Mariah (Mattison) Smith (30 Aug 1799 – 15 Oct 1883); he married Laura Breazeale on October 9, 1852; died at age 31 of disease at Charleston, S.C.; widow later married John Jones.

5th Sergeant William A. Martin (b. ca. 1839 – d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to 3rd sergeant during the Civil War, killed in action at age 25 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

1st Corporal John C. Hamilton died at age 29 of pneumonia fever at Charleston, S.C., during Civil War; his name included on a Civil War memorial plaque at Carmel Presbyterian Church, Pickens District, S.C.; attended Enon Baptist Church in same district for twelve years before his death; said to have been buried at Enon Baptist Church.

2nd Corporal Robert Stephenson

3rd Corporal James G. Douthit (1 Feb 1832 – 24 Jun 1902; married Sarah E. Watkins (18 Aug 1823 – 19 Jan 1897); both husband and wife buried at Sandy springs Methodist Church, in northern Anderson County, S.C.









4th Corporal Aaron John Smith (b. ca. 1830 – d. 30 July 1864); promoted to 1st sergeant during Civil War; killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Barrett, Isaac (b. ca. 1824 – d. 15 Aug 1864); died of disease at age 40 at Farmville, Virginia.

Bird, J. F. Bloodworth, Milton

Bolt, Abram (12 May 1839 – 29 April 1910); captured by Union troops at Farmville, Virginia, April 6, 1865; taken to City Point, Virginia; moved later to Newport News, Virginia, and paroled there; married **Mary Matilda** Clark (13 Feb 1841 – 28 Oct 1923); died in 1910; buried at New Hope Methodist Church, Anderson County, S.C.; he was son of **Asa Bolt** (1808 – 1807) and **Hannah Abercrambie Bolt** (1808 – 1891); help to found New Hope Methodist Church where he was later laid to rest.

Bolt, Robert died of dropsy at Charlotte, N.C., August 24, 1864.

Bolt, Thomas Belton (d. 30 July 1864); killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah Abercrambie Bolt; wife was Martha Jane (Sherer) Bolt; couple had two daughters.

Bolt, Thomas W. (b. ca. 1837 – d. 16 Jul 1864); died of disease at age 27, Petersburg, Virginia; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah (Abercrambie) Bolt.

Bolt, Toliver (3 Mar 1833 – 6 Nov 1903); shoemaker in the Confederate States Army; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah (Aberbrombie) Bolt; wife was Nancy Marie (Pritchard) Bolt (3 May 1833 – 8 Dec 1914), daughter of Lewis Pritchard and Harriet (Morris) Pritchard; couple had ten children; buried at New Prospect Baptist Church in Anderson County, S.C.

Bolt, William L. (22 Sept 1836 – 14 Dec 1909); captured by Union troops at South Mountain, Maryland, September 14, 1862; sent to a hospital in Frederick, Maryland; moved January 15, 1863, to another hospital in Baltimore, Maryland; captured by the enemy at Petersburg, Virginia, April 3, 1865; sent to Farmville, Virginia; moved on April 21, 1865, to Point of Rocks, Virginia; survived the Civil War; wife was Cassandra Jolly Bolt (11 Mar 1833 – 31 Dec. 1923); both buried at Hopewell Baptist Church, Anderson County, S.C.









Bolt, William A. (30 Jun 1830 – 12 Feb 1920); lost his right leg (between the knee and ankle) because of battle wound; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah (Abercrambie) Bolt; wife Martha Jane (Clarke) Bolt (1837 – 1919), daughter of Mathew and Jane (Clarke) Bolt; both William A. Bolt and wife were buried at Asbury Clarke Methodist Church, Anderson County, S.C.; they had eight children.

Bowen, J. E.

Brown, C. H.

Callaham, John William (b. 1835 – d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to sergeant during the war, killed in action during Battle of the Crater. Petersburg. Virginia; wife was Martha Adeline (Hallum) Callaham (5 Jan 1834 – 10 Oct 1912) who was buried in Liberty Cemetery, Liberty, S.C.

Carson, J. C.

Chamblee, Anderson F. (b.ca. 1842 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 22 during the Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Chamblee, J. J.

Chastain, R. L. (b.ca. 1834 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 30 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Clark, E. V.

Clark, Henry (b. ca 1834 – d 30 Jul 1864); killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Clark, William

Clyde, Joseph Benjamin (b. 1832 in Charleston, S.C.); captured by the enemy at a hospital in Richmond, Virginia, on April 3, 1865; held as prisoner of war until paroled on April 21, 1865; he attended Thalian Academy at Slabtown in Anderson District, S.C.

Cooley, J. C.; captured June 21, 1864, by Union troops at Petersburg, Virginia; sent to City Point, Virginia; moved June 30, 1864, to Lookout Point, Maryland, and probably paroled there.









Dean, J. M.

Darby, William (b. ca. 1837 – d. 24 Feb 1865); died of disease at age 28, Petersburg, Virginia.

Davis, J. M. C.

Davis, Richard P. (b. a. 1842 - d 21 Feb 1862); died of disease at Columbia, S.C.

Davis, S. P.

Douthit, J. W.

Eirod, D. R. A.

Evatt, Ben Franklin (b. ca. 1824 – d. 30 July 1864); killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Farmer, James A. (b. ca. 1828 – d. 18 Sept 1863); died of disease at age 35 at Savannah, Georgia; buried there in Laurel Grove Cemetery.

Farmer, Josiah (b. ca. 1827 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 37 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia; buried there at Blanford Church; his wife, Catherine Farmer of Pelzer (Anderson County), S.C., was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in 1902.

Fennell, Henry L. (b. ca.1836 – d. 1864); died of disease at age 28 at Richmond, Virginia; buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (grave # V166).

Fennell, William M. (b. 1833 – d. ca. July 1864); died while being held as a prisoner of war at Elmira Prison, Elmira, New York; buried at Elmira in Woodlawn National Cemetery (grave # 221).

Fowler, Richard

Garrett, W. G. (b. ca. 1844 - d. 18 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 20 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia.

Gillespie, William Young (24 May 1834 – 22 Aug 1910); captured by Federal troops at Farmville, Virginia, April 6, 1865; taken as prisoner of war to Newport News, Virginia, on June 25, 1865; probably also paroled on that date.









Hackett, John W.; died of disease at age 30 on April 15, 1864, at Summerville, S.C. (Note: Some sources claim that he was killed during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia.)

Hackett, Robert (b. ca. 1842 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 22 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Hammond, Hosea

Hendricks, William Clark (b. ca. 1837 - d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to 3^{rd} corporal during Civil War; killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia. (Note: He was reported as buried alive in the dirt during the big explosion there.)

Hill, William

Hunter, J. A. (Note: A soldier listed in official records as John Hunter, age 45 and a member of Company G, 22nd Regiment, S.C. Volunteers, died at Farmville, Virginia, on July 7, 1963. Was he the J. A. Hunter listed above?)

Hunter, John (b. 1818 - d. 7 Jul 1863) must be the soldier mentioned above.

Irby, Sanford V. (1836 – 1923); captured by Union troops at Town Creek, N.C., February 20, 1865; sent to Point Lookout, Maryland, June 25, 1865, and probably paroled there; wife was Susan Irby (b. 27 Dec 1847 – d. 1932); Sanford V. Irby was buried in Williamston Memorial Cemetery in Anderson County, S.C.

Irwin, D. C.

Johnson, Harvey W. (b. ca. 1841 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 23 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Jolly, Levi D., killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Jolly, Wilson

Jolly, William Enos (b. ca. 1839 - d. 14 Dec 1862); son of Joseph Moorehead Jolly and Anna Cole (Sherrill) Jolly of Anderson District, S.C.; brother of Manse Jolly (1840 - 1869) the legendary "unreconstructed rebel" who was sought by Federal authorities after the Civil War—but who fled to Texas where he was accidentally drowned at age 29; William Enos Jolly was promoted from private to sergeant; killed in action at age 22 at Kinston, N.C., December 14, 1862.









Knight, Samuel Thompson (b. 1845), son of Warren Walker Knight (4 May 1816 – 13 Nov 1894) and Amanda (Robinson) Knight (19 Jan 1819 – 22 Nov 1898); father was an early elder of Carmel Presbyterian Church in Pickens District, S.C.; this soldier first enrolled as a private in Hampton Legion Infantry on 20 Oct 1863; received order for exchange with Company G, 22nd Regiment, S.C. Volunteers, during Civil War; captured by Union troops at Five Forks, Virginia, April 1, 1865; later sent as prisoner of war to City Point, Virginia; moved to Point Lookout and paroled on April 3, 1865; left his home in Pickens District, S.C., after Civil War and migrated to Texas; lived in Red River County, Texas, in 1886.

Maret, George Washington (16 Mar 1821 – 27 Feb 1903); resided in western division of Pickens District (now Oconee County); survived the Civil War, buried at Beaverdam Baptist Church in Oconee County, S.C.

Maddox, Marvin A. E. (b. ca. 1846); enlisted in army July 1862 at age 16; son of Thomas A. Maddox (7 May 1807 – 10 Dec 1891) and Catherine (Kay) Maddox; (16 Apr 1807 – 27 May 1896); survived the Civil War; paroled April 10,1865

Maddox, Thomas Pinckney (b. ca. 1838 – d. 13 May 1865); son of Thomas A. Maddox (7 May 1807 – 10 Dec 1891) and Catherine (Kay) Maddox (16 Apr 1807 – 27 May 1896); captured by enemy troops at Savannah, Georgia, December 21, 1864; captured again at Burkeville, Virginia, April 14, 1865; taken to U.S. Field Hospital; moved later to City Point, Virginia, and then to Savannah, Georgia; died of consumption at Savannah; five of his brothers also served in the Confederate States Army.

Major, A. J.

Martin, Chesley (5 Apr 1844 – 24 Oct 1911); survived the Civil War, buried at Hopewell Baptist Church, Anderson County, S.C.

Martin, J. Alfred (b ca. 1844 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 20 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Martin, Warren J. (8 Feb 1823 – 15 Mar 1911; captured by Union soldiers April 1, 1865, at Five Forks, Virginia; sent to City Point, Virginia; moved to Point Lookout, Maryland, where he was paroled on April 4, 1865; he was buried at Sharon Methodist Church in northern Anderson County, S.C.

The National Genealogical Society is pleased to announce that next year's conference will be held at the Charleston Area Convention Center, 5001 Coliseum Drive, North Charleston, SC 29418, May 11-14, 2011. Plans are already underway to bring two thousand genealogists from around the country to Charleston for the event. The Society selected Charleston because of its significance in American history. In addition to attending the NGS 2011 Family History Conference, participants will have an opportunity to tour Charleston's historic buildings, churches and homes as well as its many museums and research facilities. April 2011 will mark the 150th Anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War at nearby Ft. Sumter, so the four day family history conference will feature talks on both Revolutionary War and Civil War records. More than fifty nationally recognized speakers will provide over one hundred and fifty lectures on a wide variety of topics including research in South Carolina and the surrounding states, migration patterns, religious records, research methodology, and problem solving. The conference program will also include lectures about researching various ethnic groups including Germans, Cherokee, African - Americans, Scots, and Scots - Irish. Registration will open on 1 December 2010 providing a choice of full conference registration or a daily fee.

An exhibit area with more than one hundred exhibitors will be open and free to the public Wednesday through Saturday including the latest in genealogical software, online research providers and DNA testing services. Founded in 1903, the National Genealogical Society is dedicated to genealogy education, high research standards, and the preservation of genealogical records. The Arlington, VA - based nonprofit is the premier national society for everyone, from the beginner to the most advanced family historian, seeking excellence in publications, educational offerings, research guidance, and opportunities to interact with other genealogists.

The Pendleton Messenger Published by Frederick W. Symmes Pendleton, SC

January 30, 1833

First two pages concerns tariffs and state rights.

Editor writes that Union Societies have been organized in the district.

Murder near Stantonville in this district on Jason Howard by John Barkley. "Howard, it is said, was on the road to market, with a wagon; was walking, when met by Barkley and Jeremiah Green, returning from muster. Barkley ordered Howard to give the road, and as he stepped to one side, raised his gun and shot him down. He lived an hour or two—Barkley and Green fled, but Green has since made affidavit... There was no quarrel, but it is said, when Barkley loaded his gun at the muster, he declared his intention of killing another man, with whom he had some difference. He was intoxicated.... John Barkley is about 5 ft. 10 inches high, 43 or 44 years, complexion sallow, with light brown hair, considerably inclined to gray; sandy beard; his chin square; some of his front teeth decayed; he is a shoemaker by trade; drinks freely occasionally, and is very disorderly when drunk; chews tobacco in excess; is very profane in his conversation; is left handed and dressed in homespun. It is supposed he will make either Hall county in Georgia; or Iredell in North Carolina, where he has relations." Reward. [Not sure where Stantonville is located. There is a Stantonville, TN.]

For the Messenger. The following notice, verbatim, was passed up at Sherard's Store, in the southwest corner of Anderson district a few weeks ago.

Notice. Mr. John S. Pressly will be here at this place on the 3d Saturday of the present month and will give his views of Nullification without something particular takes place to hinder him from getting here. A.B.

13 Jan 1833. Mr. ___ accordingly attended, and a large number of the citizens attended also, to hear what was to be said. The meeting was organized, by calling Col. Rice to the Chair. Mr. Pressley opened the proceedings by a speech against nullification. He was replied to by Gen. Whitner. Mr. P followed in a second speech, and Gen. W. rejoined. The meeting adjourned for a short time and on again assembling, was addressed by Maj. Whitefield, in defense of the proceedings of South Carolina. In order to test the sense of the meeting, the following resolution was introduced, and on a division was carried by a majority of three to one, one half the minority, it is said, being from Abbeville.

"Resolved, as the opinion of this meeting, that we regard the assumption of the right claimed by Gen. Jackson to coerce a Sovereign State into obedience to an unconstitutional law by military force, as unwarranted by the Constitution, dangerous to the liberties of the free people of these States, and meriting the denunciations of every Carolinian."

From the Columbia Telescope. Indian Land, York. 7 Jan 1833. "We are going on finely, in getting up Volunteers. Old Indian Land is true, almost to a man. The company in which I muster, volunteered yesterday, with one solitary exception, and forms, altogether, a corps of as bold and resolute fellows, as ever sprung a trigger."


J. M. Phillips

Born March 7, 1857, author of *Shiloh*, the story of a Baptist church for 95 years. Started the smallest print shop in the world in Seneca in 1880—type case 7x7 inches, 3a fonts. West to school 11 months. Seen here picking odd strains from Litz's E major Polonaise from a two hundred year old Strad. Established *Farm and Factory* in 1903. Taught school at Shiloh in 1877 and furnished Martin's Creek locals for *Keowee Courier*. Worked for James P. Harrison & Co., State Printers for Georgia, in 1885, at \$1.35 a week. Attended King's wedding at Shiloah in 1866. King was 17 at this time. Immediately after the ceremony he broke out with, "When I was a single man, I had peace and pleasure; now I am a married man, I've trouble in full measure."



John, Evelyn, Loutitia and Andrew Phillips (left to right) lined up before Hug Phillips' Far mand Factory camera. They stand in front of Stephen Baldwin's residence, built 117 years ago. In this building in March 1832 (Church Record), "A number of brethren living on Martin's Creek and neighborhood thereof, believing it would promote the cause of God to have an arm of the Hebsibah Church established in their neighborhood, petition for that privilege this day granted." Shiloh's first church conference was held in this house April 14, 1832, and the first three members taken in were Uriah and Elizabeth Hembree, by letter, and Mary Phial by experience.

Rev. H.N. Hayes

Born in Anderson District on July 26, 1822; died at Seneca, SC on July 18, 1889. Seneca Baptist Church was organized about 1874. Rev. H.N. Hayes was an original member and preached in the church.



Rev. W.W. Abbott

Born June 16, 1822 and died May 12, 1912. Organized Hopewell Baptist Church on May 10, 1858. He gave the land for the church. Was ordained to the ministry December 1, 1865. Served his church as pastor for a number of years; also other churches. His father-in-law came from County Kent, England, from near Gad's Hill, where Charles Dickens lived. J.M. Phillips, the editor of *Lo Here! Or, Lo There!*, copied the story of his life from the *Baptist Courier* in 1880.

This edition contains controversy between J.M. Phillips, editor and Rev. Gardner, who was born in May 1885. Rev. Gardner was pastor of Seneca Baptist Church.





Mt. Nebo Baptist Oconee County



Sometime about 1885 some disagreements came up in the Seneca River Baptist Association and the result was a split in the churches. Led by the late Rev. W.R. Parker, New Mt. Nebo Baptist Church or Nebo #2 came out from the Old Nebo, or Nebo #1, located on the Southern Railroad. Two more churches did the same, known as Little Abel and Parker's Church.

These three churches were known as the Parker's Association. This church, Nebo #2, purchased two acres from Robert Swinger, recorded on 18 Dec 1888 at \$10.00 per acres. Deacons at the time were Ephriam Wiggins, William Reese, John Milligan.

Bowling's administration on 23 Jun 1957, three deacons were added: Major Webb, Joe H. Parker, R.J. Mickler. In 1963 three deacons were added: Moses Jenkins, Mack Williams, Thomas Ellis. In 1966, Eugene Ellis was chosen as a deacon. Feaster Hampton, Ben Keasler were added as deacons after 1975.

Church Clerks: J.A. Williams, Willis Galloway, E.D. Pettigrew, Julius Williams, Idella Ellis Blassingame, Darlene Williams Almond, R.J. Mickler 1955-1972 and Rosa Parker (1972-1988, and Ida Harrison 1988-.

In 1888 the church was a building about 30 x 38 feet with 10 foot walls facing the north. Thirty years later (1918), another building was constructed under the administration of Rev. C.M. Galloway that was 36 x 40 with 14 foot walls facing the west at a price of approximately \$3,000. Under Rev. J.H. Fowler's administration the church was insulted with asbestos shingles and sealed with sheet rock. Gas heat was installed in 1958. New pulpit furniture was purchased in 1960. The church was bricked in 1963.
