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





Nathan Turner died of disease at Pocotaligo, South Carolina, while serving in the Confederate Army.

John Wesley Vickery (b. ca 1835), who lived in Hurricane Township, was wounded during the Civil War and died during the last month of the conflict.

James C. Wade died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, while serving in the Confederate Army during the Civil War.

Albert L. Ward (1827-1864) died August 17, 1864, while serving in the Army of the Confederate States of America.

W. Tolliver Watkins was killed in Virginia while serving in the Confederate Army during the North/South conflict.

Eli Watson (1822-1862) died of pneumonia April 15, 1862, at Orange County Court House, Virginia.

T. H. Wearnes, a Confederate soldier during the Civil War, died at Lynchburg, Virginia, in 1863.

H. Wharton died at Adams Run, South Carolina, while serving in the Confederate Army.

Thomas A. White lost his life during the Wilderness Campaing in Virginia in the conflict between the North and South.

- George M. Williams, a Confedrate soldier, was killed at Lookout Mountain, Tennessee, during the Civil War.
- James Franklin Williams (b. ca 1832 d. 1861) died of typhoid fever September 8, 1861, while serving in the Confederate Army.
- J. T. Williams, a Confederate soldier, died of disease at Richmond, Virginia, during the Civil War.
- John H. Williams, who lived in the Dacusville area, died during the Civil War while serving in the Confederate Army.
- Samuel S. Williams, a soldier in the Army of the Confederate States of America, died of disease during the Civil War.
- John F. Wilson was killed in battle at Petersburg, Virginia, during the War of the Rebellion.
- Isaac Winchester (1841-1862) was killed September 17, 1862, in Maryland while serving in the Confederate Army.
- Willoughby Winchester (1843-1862) (Note: There were two cousins with this same name and the same birth and death years.) Resided in Antioch Church area; died of measles in Columbia, South Carolina, in 1862.
- Willoughby Winchester (1843-1862) (Note: This man was a first cousin of the above soldier; he had the same name and same year of birth and death as the above. These two men are incorrectly listed in Confederate military records as father and son---senior and junior.)
- Benjamin Cornelius Wooton was killed during the North/South struggle while serving in the Confederate Army.
- Jackson Wooten of Hurricane Township died of disease in Maryland during the Civil War.
- Mancel Wooten (b. ca 1843) lost his life in Virginia while serving in the Confederate Army.
- Warren Wooten, who resided in Hurricane Township and who served in the Confederate Army, died in Tennessee during the Civil War.
- Redmond Foster Wyatt (1825-1864) resided in the Fairview Methodist Church area, situated south of present-day Easley, S. C., and was killed July 30, 1864, at Petersburg, Virginia.
- Alonzo Archibald Young (1826-1864), who resided in the Tabor Methodist Church area, died March 2, 1864, while serving in the Confederate Army.
- Richard Young, a Confederate soldier who lived in Hurricane Township, died of disease in Tennessee during the Civil War.

William A. Young (b. ca 1842 - d. 1861) was wounded during the First Battle of Bull Run at Manassas, Virginia, and died the following day.

Epilogue to "They Fell to the Southern Cause"

This publication contains a list of the names of 386 men who lost their lives while serving in the Confederate Army during the U. S. Civil War and who once resided in the eastern division of Pickens District, South Carolina (present-day Pickens County). The list was compiled in August 1998, following a request for the same from Rick Simmons, veterans affairs officer of Pickens County, as part of his preparations for the creation of a Veterans Memorial Garden and Wall of Valor, which is currently being planned for the grounds of the county courthouse. The tragic military conflict in which these Confederate soldiers served and died was waged in the four-year period between 1861 and 1865. It pitted states of the North against those of the South and ended April 9, 1865, after General Robert E. Lee surrendered the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia to the Union Army of the Potomac at Appomattox, Virginia. The terrible armed struggle has often been described as "the first modern war" because of its warfare innovations, and it was given the official name "War of the Rebellion." Today, the conflict is most often referred to as either the Civil War or the War Between the States, the latter designation being preferred by some Southerners.

Many soldiers from the thirteen-member states of the Confederacy lost their lives during the Civil War: 320,000 of them were killed or wounded; 26,000 died while held in Union prison-of-war camps: 60,000 died from such diseases as typhoid fever, measles and pneumonia; and some of them were accidentally killed---both on and off the battlefield. The 386 men whose names are published herein died as a result of one or the other of those causes. Based on available evidence, more than 3,000 men from the old Pickens District of South Carolina served in the Army of the Confederate States of America. Some of them took part in major battles of the war; others participated in smaller engagements. In contrast to what happened in some army units, relatively few soldiers from Pickens District deserted the Confederate Army.

The names of local soldiers who died during the war were gleaned from the files of information collected as a result of the Confederate History Project. That research effort was initiated in Pickens County in 1985, and it is still an ongoing enterprise designed to collect and disseminate historical, biographical and genealogical data about local Civil War soldiers.

Without a doubt, the present listing falls somewhat short of being exhaustive. Additional names will most probably be added in the future—this because (1) the research project has not yet been completed and (2) active searches for more soldiers are still being conducted. Indeed, additional names are presently being added to the

project's files from time to time, and some are for men who were war casualties. On the other hand, the present roster is probably fairly inclusive. Perhaps it reflects the long period of time in which rigorous searches have been conducted, as well as the extensive and exemplary input that has been made by many members of the Old Pendleton District Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society.

One of the problems dealt with in the preparation of this list was that of determining whether a soldier's home was in the eastern or western division of Pickens District. This issue was especially relevant in the case of men who resided in the valley of the Keowee River, which was once the rough dividing line between the district's eastern and western divisions. Thus, readers who might find errors in this respect are urged to notify the Confederate History Project. Persons who know of additional local men who lost their lives in the Civil War are also strongly encouraged to write to the Confederate History Project.

In the WPA census list he was listed as King Solomon by mistake so when you do a search look for the last name Solomon, then look at the actual census records for Solomon King. He is listed on the same page in the original records as John King. There are deeds listed in 1785 for a Solomon King, Sr., and a Solomon King, Jr., in Pendleton District, SC. Solomon King does not appear in SC census records in 1800. Does anyone have information on Solomon King, Sr., and Jr. in SC in the 1785-1790 time period?





Mt. Nebo Baptist Church was established in a brush arbor on the Rock Hill of Pumpkintown, SC in 1866, according to Luther Johnson's history, under the Christian leadership of its first pastor, Rev. Earle. [Before publishing in other material, this date should be check with other sources. It is possible that the date should be 1868 or shortly thereafter.]

About the year 1873, the brush arbor was moved to the location where the Church now stands. At that time the land was owned by Earl Edens. The congregation worshipped at this place, and in the year 1876, Earl Edens agreed to partly sell and partly give three acres of land for a Church.

In the year 1881, Soap Stone, Pine Grove, Shoals Creek, and Mt. Nebo met at the Shoals Creek to organize the first Oolenoy River Association and the first session met at the Mt. Nebo Baptist Church in 1882. A slab structure was built on this land. According to the *Pickens Sentinel* in 9 Mar 1893, "Martin Terrell is rebuilding the Mount Nebo Colored Baptist Church." After this structure, a wooden church experienced much spiritual and numerical growth. Another church was built in October 18, 1923. After 1941 the church did not have services for six years and one day.

In the year 1947, a few got together to reorganize the Mt. Nebo Baptist Church. The people that were responsible were Deacon Roy McGowan, Deacon Will Terrell, Deacon B.C. Hill, Deacon A.C. Hill, Deacon Ernest Mile, Deacon Harvey Mile, and Deacon Henry Brazell, Rev. T.M. Morigne was called as pastor.

The church sanctuary was rebuilt in the year 1955, under the leadership of Rev. T.M. Morigne. During the year 1977, Rev. T.M. Morigne was succeeded by Rev. P.P. Pace and he was succeeded by Rev. David Mayes in 1979. His deacons consisted of Deacon B.C. Hill, Chairman Emeritus; Deacon Harry Peden, Chairman; Deacon John Whitter, Co-Chairman; Deacon James Miles and Deacon Willie Pickens, Jr. The secretary during his pastorate was Mrs. Betty H. Pickens and the Treasurer was Brother Dirlyn Hill.

During the organizational meeting, Rev. F.W. Moore called the house to order. It was motioned that the Rev. J.H. Cunningham, be the acting Moderator and Miss Estelle Jenkins the secretary. After the organization, a motion was made by Rev. F.W. Moore that the Rev. J.H. Cunningham preach for the remainder of the year. Ashmore Oglesby and S.M. McClure were ordained as deacons.

Mrs. Elsie Lay Watkins Poole was the first member to be baptized at White Oak Spring Baptist Church.

In the fall of 1904, Rev. F.W. Moore was elected Pastor, who served four years. During those years, he ordained Samuel Lay and J.W. Wright as deacons. John Grier, a deacon, joined by letter.

From this organization, the church has had sixteen pastors. They are as follows:

Rev. J.E. Young 1965

Rev. Ulysses Durham 1969. In 1973 Matthew Oglesby was licensed and ordained to preach the gospel.

Rev. B. E. Griffith 1974. A complete renovation and fellowship hall was built in 1976.

Rev. Lonnie E. Skelton 1989. Melvin Patterson, Jr. was ordained as a deacon.

Rev. Ronald S. Watson 1997. Russell Oglesby was licensed to preach the gospel in 2000.

Rev. John L. Black, Jr. 2002. Four individuals were trained for deaconship; A. H. Oglesby, Marcell Oglesby,

Michael E. Forbes, and Paul Oglesby, Jr. were ordained and Russell M. Oglesby ordained as a minister.

The church, located on Simms [Symmes] School Road, was destroyed by fire in October 1988. This was the third time in the existence of the church that fire destroyed the facility.

Rev. Matthew Oglesby was concerned about the church congregation having a place to worship. He contacted Rev. James Wiggins, pastor of Trinity Wesleyan Church, concerning their vacant church on College Street in Central. Rev. Matthew Oglesby and the White Oak Spring Missionary Baptist Church Board met at Trinity Wesleyan (formerly named Second Wesleyan Methodist Church) to discuss using their vacant church for services. In 1988, after several months of using this church, it was decided to purchase the building.

On May 11, 1997, the new Fellowship Hall was completed and dedicated. Wilbert L. Morgan (Chairperson), Julian W. Oglesby, Bryant S. Black, Sr., Michael E. Forbes, and Russell M.

Glenn 2 Oct 1871 Anderson Co SC.

I'm trying to locate the grave site of my ancestor Thomas Mann (1755 -1834). He served in The American Revolution. He was buried in Pickens County in 1834. He married to Sarah Tackett (1760 - 1858). John Bailus left Pickens and moved to Gaffney/Limestone Springs (Cherokee County) where my grandmother was born. During the time of the Great Migration from the South the family spread to Chicago/Evansville and Washington, D.C./ Maryland where pockets of them remain today. Some also went out West. 

(St. John's German Evangelical Lutheran Church of Walhalla) St. John's Lutheran . Church was constructed between 1859 and 1861 under the direction of John Kaufmann, master builder from Baden, Germany, for the German Lutheran congregation of Walhalla. The pulpit of "twisted wood" is of the style used by the High German Church. A number of charter members of the congregation were members of German Colonization Society. organization responsible for the development of Walhalla. Selected from this same group came three intendants, five town wardens, and one state senator, all of which indicates St. John's had a socially and politically influential congregation, who actively participated in the founding and management of the town of Walhalla. The nominated acreage also includes a ca. 1932 brick Sunday School building and the church cemetery, the earliest gravestone dating to 1851.

Mountain View Baptist Church cemetery is on private property owned by George Newton. Mr. Newton bought the church and cemetery property from the church in 1974. The last pastor of the church was the only surviving member of the church at the time of the sale and he signed the deed. Mr. Newton said his name was Rev. Cunningham. Mr. Newton also stated that the last service held in the church was a funeral in 1954. He said that there were Rosemonds, Simpsons and Liddles buried in the cemetery.

Only three headstones and two funeral home markers were located. There were several fieldstones and numerous unmarked graves. Other headstones may be covered with leaves. The cemetery is covered with small trees and some underbrush but is not difficult to walk through. Mr. Newton said that he would not refuse any family member access to the cemetery. He only asks that they do not smoke because of the fire hazard and that they respect his property.

The cemetery is at the very edge of his yard and the old church was about 200 feet beyond the cemetery. The church and cemetery was on the old Walhalla road and ran in front of Mr. Newton's house and then past the cemetery and church.

Mrs. Rosa Anna Anderson Busha was born on December 29, 1909 in the Coweta Community near Franklin, North Carolina. At the time of her birth, she was given the name Rosetta Anna Anderson; however, she later shortened her given name to Rosa Anna.

She was the fourth child to be born into the family of G. W. (General Washington) Anderson (1882-1970) and Martha Ann Ledford Anderson (1882-1920). Her ancestors were of Irish and English stock, and they were among the original white settlers who obtained land in the Nantahala Mountains immediately following the Revolutionary War. The area in which the Anderson family's ancestors settled is now part of the Nantahala National Forest, and, prior to the Revolutionary War, the area was the heartland of the Cherokee Indians of North Carolina.

According to legends passed down from one generation of the Anderson family to another, the Anderson family maintained a shaky but friendly relationship with their many Indian neighbors, often trading tobacco and other goods with them. In at least one case, a member of the Anderson family married a Cherokee Indian girl. That family member was Mrs. Busha's uncle, Colonel Thomas Anderson, who lived near Franklin, North Carolina.







Mrs. Busha's paternal grandparents were Joseph Anderson (1824-1905) and Mary Watts Parker Anderson (1844-1928). Her maternal grandparents were William M. Ledford (died 1912) and Sara Rosetta Ann Nichols Ledford (1862-1940). POTLIGHT SA ANNA BUSH

During her early childhood, Mrs. Busha lived near the Little Tennessee River in one of the most beautiful mountain settings of western North Carolina. She has many fond memories of the peaceful mountains and their flora and fauna. Her father was a very good hunter, and fish and game were very plentiful in the area during the early years of the present century.

Mrs. Busha recalls that her father often brought in wild turkeys, deer, quail, pheasant, rabbits, squirrels, racoons, and other edible animals. Mr. Anderson was also a very good fisherman, and it was not unusual for him to return from a fishing trip with a sack full of trout from the

many swift-running, pure mountain streams that are located in the Nantahala Mountains. The family of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Anderson lived in various communities of Franklin and Macon counties of North Carolina. Mr. Anderson was engaged in the logging business; he worked in some of the most magnificent virgin forests east of the Mississippi River. In addition, he was an accomplished carpenter and a part-time farmer. During Mrs. Busha's early childhood, the family in which she grew up was almost entirely self-sustaining, as they took advantage of readily-available wildlife, fish, and such natural foods as nuts and berries. They also drank sassafras tea made from the dried root bark of the sassafras tree. They picked blueberries and blackberries, which grew in abundance in the area. They also gathered teaberry leaves and such delicious and plentiful nuts as chestnuts, hazel nuts, black walnuts, and white English walnuts.

Altogether, seven children were born between 1904 and 1918 into the Anderson family. In addition to Rosa Anna Anderson, there were the following offspring: William Joseph Anderson (1904-1924), Lula Mae Anderson (1906-1981), Wiley Thomas Anderson (1908-1944), John Henry Anderson (1912-1913), Jessie Bascombe Anderson (1914-1946), and Frank James Anderson (1918-1947).

Among the memories of her early years in the mountains of western North Carolina, Mrs. Busha recalls that landslides were fairly common along the dirt roads that had been carved out of the steep mountainsides. Once, when the Anderson family was living at Rough Fork near Franklin, N.C., and when Mr. Anderson had traveled to town for some needed provisions such as sugar and coffee, a big landslide prevented him from returning home for several days. Almost the entire side of a mountain had slid into a valley, destroying many roads and paths. But most of the memories that Mrs. Busha has of her life in the mountains are very pleasant.

Although the mountain homeland of the Anderson family was very picturesque, life was often harsh there. Winters were very cold, and access to the outside world was meager because of poor road conditions in the early part of this century. Thus, as industry developed in the neighboring states of Georgia, Tennessee, and South Carolina, some of the inhabitants of western North Carolina began to long for better living conditions and "good-paying jobs" that they were hearing about, especially in news from Upstate South Carolina.

The Anderson family had plenty of land; they were what was once referred to as "land poor"



people. For example, Mrs. Busha's grandfather, Joseph Anderson, owned so much mountain property that he once traded ten acres of bottom land for a good milk cow. Indeed, mountain land was relatively inexpensive in the 1890s. But land was not enough.

In search for a better standard of living and way of life, G. W. Anderson decided to move his family to South Carolina. He had heard about good jobs in the textile industry for people who were willing to work hard for their money, and he decided to resettle his family in Easley. Thus, the family packed whatever possessions they could carry easily, and they sold and gave away whatever was left. They purchased train tickets from Franklin, N.C. to Easley, S.C. In those days, the train took them first to Atlanta, Ga. and then to Easley. Rosa Anna was about eight years of age when her family left North Carolina. At that time, the United States had just about decided to enter the war in Europe (World War I).

Shortlty after the family arrived in Easley, Mr. Anderson obtained a job in the slasher room at Easley Mill, where he was employed for the next twenty-two years. He also secured a house for his growing family on the Easley Mill Village. For a while, the family members truly believed their father's contention that they had come to the "land where money grows on trees." But that myth was gradually dispelled as the family came to grips with the realities of their new environment that was relatively busier and more crowded than the mountain area from which they came. They were not alone in their new experience. Hundreds of other families had poured out of the North Carolina mountains into South Carolina to take jobs in the state's rapidly expanding textile industry.

Rosa Anna Anderson attended school at the old Easley Mill School and at West End School. But, like many of her school classmates, she took a job in the mill when she was only fourteen years of age. She worked in the spinning room, where her older sister, Lula Mae, had obtained a job earlier. When she first went to work in the cotton mill, Rosa Anna's salary was only \$9.35 per week. She recalls that beef steak could be purchased for only 25 cents a pound at that time. In addition, she could buy two yards of cloth (she was a very small person at that time) and a spool of thread to make a new dress for only a quarter. Lula Mae, her sister, was a good seamstress, and Rosa Anna often called upon her to make her clothes.



One of the many adjustments that the Anderson family had to make in their new home in Easley was that of purchasing, rather than growing, almost all their food. Although Mrs. Anderson was a good provider and a good cook, she had to depend upon the foodstuffs that were available for sale in local markets and grocery stores. In the mountains of North Carolina, Mrs. Anderson often prepared wooden barrels of pickled green beans and sauerkraut, utilizing home-grown cabbages and beans from the family's excellent gardens. But the grocery stores of Easley offered many new processed foods that had not been available in the mountains.

And the stores not only delivered groceries to homes but also sent a person to all houses to take each family's grocery order. Rosa Anna recalls that her grandmother, Sarah Rosetta Ledford, who had moved to Easley with the Anderson family, often ordered four pounds of steak, paying only one dollar for the lot. The meat that the family ate in the mountains had been, for the most part, game that was killed in the thick forest, but it had been free for the taking.

Shortly after the end of World War I, a terrible influenza epidemic passed through the land, and many people fell victim to the dreaded disease. Rosa Anna's mother was one of the victims. Martha Ann Ledford Anderson was laid to rest in 1920 in the Easley Mill Cemetery. She left behind her six young children. Her mother, Mrs. Ledford, a long-time widow, then took care of all her Anderson grandchildren, with the assistance of G. W. Anderson, her son-in-law.

A few years after Mrs. Anderson's death, the oldest child of the family, William Joseph Anderson, was killed in a train accident near Taylors, S.C. He was only twenty years of age at the time of his death. His body was placed in the Easley Mill Cemetery beside that of his mother's. The loss of two dear members of the family in such a short period of time was a great shock to the Anderson family.

In addition to working in the Easley Mill, Mr. Anderson also did carpentry work. He helped to make and install many screen windows and doors for mill houses in Easley.

On March 10, Rosa Anna Anderson became the wife of James Henry Busha (1907-1974) of Liberty S.C. Her husband was an employee of Duke Power

Company in Liberty at the time of the marriage, and he worked for the same company for many years. He had worked as an electrician previously for the J. Warren Smith Electric Company, which had brought electricity to Liberty for the first time. At the time of his marriage, he roomed at the Brown House on Front Street in Liberty. Mr. and Mrs. Busha were married in Abbeville, S.C.

Mr. Busha was of French Huguenot and Cherokee Indian descent. He was the first child born into the family of John Allen Busha (1882-1951) and Cora Cordelia Smith Busha (1886-1949). He was

born in Oakway (Oconee County), S.C.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Busha lived in Liberty, S.C. on Peachtree Street, where their house was struck by a tornado in the early 1930s. Their first child, Charles Henry Busha, was born in Liberty on December 14, 1931. Peggy Jean Busha, the family's second child, was born in Pickens, S.C. on November 11, 1933. Jo Ann Busha, the third child, was born in Six Mile, S.C. at Dr. Peek's Hospital on June 25, 1938. Helen Frances Busha, the last child, was born in Pickens

on December 29, 1945.

Mrs. Busha's three daughters are now married, and all of them have children; two have grandchildren.
Peggy married Charles (Chuck) Dwight Stewart on November 22, 1951.
Jo Ann married Larry Frederick Chandler on October 19, 1956.
Helen Frances married Thomas McAlister on

August 17, 1963. Mrs. Busha's son, Dr. Charles H. Busha, is the executive director of the Pickens County Council on

Aging.

In 1930, the same year in which Mrs. Busha was married, her widower father, G. W. Anderson, also remarried, taking as his second wife Martha Elizabeth (Lizzy) Henson (1905-1967), daughter of Otha Hamilton Henson (1875-1957) and Ora Kidder Robinson Henson (1885-1957) of Easley, S.C. The second Mrs. Anderson was a sister of Flora Almeda Henson Johnson; who married Wayne C. Johnson, a long-time postmaster of the Easley Post Office. Mr. Johnson was postmaster of Easley between 1940 and 1942. After serving in the U.S. Army during World War II, he returned to Easley and was postmaster there from 1945 until his retirement in 1962.

Mr. G. W. Anderson and Mrs. Martha Elizabeth Henson Anderson became the parents of four children, who are Mrs. Busha's stepsiblings. Lewis Edward Anderson (born July 5, 1931) is the first child. Mary Priscilla Anderson (born August 6, 1933) is the second child. The third child is Charles Monroe Anderson (born April 26, 1938). And James Donald Anderson (born April 6, 1940) is the last child of the family.

Lewis Anderson now lives at Route 2, Marietta, S.C. Mary Priscilla (Shine) Anderson married Jerry Bowie, and she makes her home in Easley on Lavonne Avenue. Charles Monroe Anderson was brought up in the home of his grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Otha Hamilton Henson of Easley; he has been employed in the aerospace industry for many years and presently lives on an island in the Indian Ocean. James Donald Anderson makes his home now in Omaha, Nebraska; he has retired from a twenty-year career with the U.S. Air Force.

Mrs. Busha is the last surviving member of her father's first family. Her only full sister passed away in 1981, and her brothers all died at relatively young ages. Two of the brothers died of tuberculosis shortly before the invention of streptomycin, a modernday drug that has proven to be most effective

in fighting the disease.

Jessie Bascombe Anderson, one of Mrs. Busha's brothers, left Easley when he was in his late teens. The Great Depression was in full swing at that time, and Jessie couldn't find work. He traveled all over the United States and spent quite a bit of time in California, where he worked as a chauffeur and butler for a wealthy Los Angeles widow. A young idealist with socialist leanings. Jesse was one of the 2,800 Americans who joined the Abraham Lincoln Brigade and made his way to Spain to fight against Gen. Francisco Franco's insurgents between 1936 and 1939 in the Spanish Civil War. About 900 of the Americans became casualties, and Jesse Anderson was wounded both physically and mentally as a member of the unofficial and poorly trained troops who made up an international contingent in support of the government (loyalists) against the military.

Mrs. Busha's brother returned to the United States from Spain, and he spent the greater part of the remainder of his relative-ty short life in hospitals. He died in Columbia at the State Hospital in 1946. He

was buried in the Easley Mill Cemetery.

Mrs. Busha recalls the sad times when she visited her late brother in a Columbia hospital. He talked about the war in Spain and seemed to be obsessed with war supplies and equipment. It was apparent to those who visited Jessie that he would never overcome the horror of the Spanish Civil War, in which 700,000 people lost their lives, only to have Spain taken over by an absolute dictator who ruled the country for many years.

Mrs. Busha retired from Woodside Mills in 1971, and she has enjoyed her retirement very much. She spends quite a bit of her time working in her yard, especially raking leaves, and she likes to read very much. She reads several newspapers each day, in addition to many books and magazines.

In addition to being a member of PCCOA, Mrs. Busha is a member of the Pickens County Historical Society and the Liberty Arts Council. She attends the Liberty Senior Center whenever her health permits, and she has many friends there.

She is the proud grandmother of seven grand children and six great-grandchildren. Her husband passed away in 1974 and was buried in Liberty Memorial Gardens. Among Mrs. Busha's activities is walking. She takes daily walks, trying to increase her walking distance each time. Recently, she was hospitalized for about seven weeks in a Greenville hospital; however, her health is now generally good and she is feeling fine.



- 3) Lake Hartwell Corps of Engineers have what is called Tract Maps for all the cemetery locations. It was from these large maps that Gary Flynn at (visit above website) was able to estimate their GPS mapping values. The letter before the cemetery reference number specifies the Tract Map. Ex: E-503C = "E Map"
- 4) The Hartwell Dam was constructed from 1955 to 1963 and was part of a flood control and hydropower project. The dam was built as a result of the U.S. Army 2nd Corps of Engineers Flood Control Project. The entire project comprised 76,450 acres of land & water and cost over \$89 million. The dam rises 204 feet above the streambed.
- 5) Lake Hartwell is located in the northeast corner of Georgia, along the South Carolina state line. It is bordered by Franklin, Stephens, Elbert & Hart Counties in Georgia and is bordered by Anderson, Pickens & Oconee Counties in South Carolina. Extending 49 miles up the Tugaloo River and 45 miles up the Seneca at normal pool elevation. Lake Hartwell covers nearly 56,000 acres of water with a shoreline of 962 miles.

Jessie McMahan and Lucretia Caroline Barrett

Jessie McMahan was born July 15, 1804 in Grove Station, near the present town of Piedmont, in Greenville County. His father, Archibald McMahan was a Revolutionary War soldier and his grandfather was a native of Scotland. In 1806, when he was two years old, his family moved to the George's Creek section of Pickens County, then the Pendleton District, East of the current town of Easley and West of the Saluda River. He married Lucretia Barrett on February 6, 1848 at Carmel Presbyterian Church in Pickens County. The service was conducted by the Reverend John Leland Kennedy. The bride and groom reportedly rode to their wedding on horseback, with Lucretia riding side saddle. Jessie was mentioned in an estate settlement on November 24, 1868 as being a heir of a portion of a 100 acre tract of land owned by William Barrett, Lucretia's father. In 1869 or 1870 they moved with his family to Oconee County and settled on Little River. He was never outside the bounds of South Carolina. Jessie and Lucretia had nine children, all of whom were living in Oconee County when he died. Jessie died Sunday, May 3, 1896, a month after he fell on the floor at the house of his daughter, Lurana Barron, and received severe injuries which hastened a general decline. He is buried in the Fairview Southern Methodist Church Cemetery on Ebenezer Road in Oconee County and his service was conducted by Reverend J. A. Wilson, pastor of the Seneca Presbyterian Church. He survived all of his brothers and sisters. In Lucretia's obituary, it was noted that Jessie had become successful on his farm and had been one of the community's respected and successful farmers. Jessie was reported to have made the furniture his daughter Mary Ann used when she and her husband set up housekeeping.

Her parents were William Barrett and Mary Bradley Barrett. William is reported to have died in 1859, a native of Pickens County. Mary was the youngest of 24 children, daughter of her father's third wife. Her father's first name is believed to be Lawrence. Mary was born in Buncombe County NC, and died in 1862. Lucretia died Sunday June 23, 1895, after a lingering illness from heart disease. Her funeral was conducted by the Reverend G. G. Mayes and she was buried in the Fairview Southern Methodist Church Cemetery at noon on Monday, June 24, 1895

From I-85, take exit 19B (US76). Turn onto US 76 N towards Clemson and Pendleton. Continue for approximately 9 miles to the traffic light at Woodburn Road. The campus of Tri-County Technical College will be on the right. Turn left at this intersection, and look for the sign for Woodburn at the corner after turning across US76. The large sign marks the entrance to History Lane. Turn right onto History Lane and continue to the end where the gate of Woodburn is located.

Woodburn Plantation is an <u>antebellum</u> house near <u>Pendleton</u> in <u>Anderson County, South Carolina</u>. It is at 130 History Lane just off of <u>U.S. 76</u>. It was built as a summer home by Charles Cotesworth Pinckney. Woodburn was named to the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u> on May 6, 1970. [1][2][3] It also is part of the <u>Pendleton Historic District</u>. [4]

Although some indicate that Woodburn was built in the early 1800s, [3] it is believed to have been built around 1830 by Charles Coteworth Pinckney. [2][4] Charles Cotesworth Pinckney (1789-1865) was son of Thomas Pinckney. He was named for his uncle Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, who was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention. The younger Pinckney was lieutenant governor of South Carolina from 1832 to 1834. [4][5]

Thomas Pinckney, a brother of Charles, built his summer home "Altamont" in Pendleton. This house no longer exists. In 1828, Charles Pinckey purchased land in the Pendleton area. He constructed Woodburn around 1830. [4][6]

In 1852, Charles Pinckney sold Woodburn to David S. Taylor, who resold it to John Bailey Adger. Dr. Adger had been a Presbyterian missionary in <u>Smyrna</u> and <u>Constantinople</u>. Adger sold Woodburn to his brother Joseph E. Adger in 1858. It was bought by Augustine T. Smythe in 1881, who developed it into a model livestock farm with purebred cattle and race horses. [4][6]

William Frederick Calhoun Owen purchased the land in 1911, but he lost it through mortgage foreclosure in 1930. It was later sold to John Frank. Later it was acquired by the U.S. government and then by <u>Clemson College</u>. [4][6] It is currently owned by the Pendleton Historic Foundation. [4][6]

Jane Edna Hunter, an African-American social worker, was born in 1882 to sharecropper parents on the Woodburn Plantation. She went on to establish the Phillis Wheatley Association in Cleveland, which was named to honor Phillis Wheatley, a Revolutionary era African-American poet. [7][8][9]

Woodburn is now a museum home run by the Pendleton Historic Foundation. Eighteen furnished rooms on three floors can be viewed. Adjacent to Woodburn is the Pendleton District Agricultural Museum.

Architecture

The original house was constructed around 1830 and enlarged in 1850. A $\underline{widow's\ walk}$ at the top of the house was removed in the twentieth century. [3][12]

The house is a two and one-half story frame house on a full, raised basement. The house was covered in <u>clapboards</u>. The house is a "Charleston-type" house built to take advantage of summer breezes. It has two-story porch or <u>veranda</u> that wraps around three sides of the house. There are two sets of stairs leading from ground level to the first floor. These lead through <u>French doors</u> to either the parlor or the drawing room. Some of the second floor windows have hinged panels below to allow access to the veranda. [5][12]



100 Year Family Reunion Report March 27, 2010 Old Pendleton District (Anderson, Oconee, Pickens)

In addition to numerous family history displays, the reunion featured presentations about genealogy, archival preservation and cemetery research as well as tours of the Faith Clayton Genealogy Room at Southern Wesleyan. More than 250 people participated in the event, held at Founders' Hall on the university's campus in Central. Many came from out-of-state to participate in this new event.

Turner is a recent recipient of the South Carolina Heritage Award for his skills in luthiery – the building of stringed instruments which include dulcimers and violins.

Round Table Groups represented included the Sons of the Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Sons of the Confederate Veterans, Anderson County Library, Central Heritage Society, Pickens County Historical Society, Pickens County Museum, Old Pendleton Genealogical Society, Birchwood Center, World War II Veteran Oral History Project.



Benjamin Arnold Jr. d. 1 Nov 1858, aged 89 yrs. NOTE--(This is not correct as Benjamin Jr. was born 22 Jan 1808 in Greenville District SC d. 1 Nov 1858 m. Mary McDavid. He was not 89 years old when he died)—perhaps typo?

Died at his residence in Greenville district on Friday the 15th Jan last, Benjamin Arnold in the 78th year of his age. The subject of this notice was born in Virginia and when a small boy his father emigrated and settled near Petersburg, Georgia. Benjamin Arnold Sr. (father) removed his family (from GA) and settled on Horse Creek in Greenville County in 1783. Here his son (Benjamin Jr.) lived and raised a large family. He had the misfortune to lose his wife in 1836. Early in life he was promoted to the command of the Regiment of Militia in the district in which he lived and served in the office of Magistrate for upwards of thirty years. Newest National Register of Historic Places Listings

The Allen Temple A.M.E. Church in Greenville was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on April 16, 2010. Built 1929-30, it is significant as the first A.M.E. church in Greenville and architecturally significant as an excellent example of early twentieth century Classical Revival ecclesiastical design. The architect was Juan Benito Molina, born and educated in Cuba and the only black architect practicing in Greenville in the early twentieth century. Organized during Reconstruction as a mission church, Allen Temple A.M.E. was formally organized as a separate congregation in 1881. The church is a large gable-front, steel-frame brick building laid in American bond, with projecting twin towers of unequal height. The two-story Dreher Educational Building was added in 1949. The Fort Fremont Battery on St. Helena Island in Beaufort County was listed in the National Register on May 5, 2010. Fort Fremont Battery is significant as an intact example of late nineteenth and early twentieth century military architecture. It is also significant as the major armament at one of two surviving coastal fortifications in the U.S. intact from the Spanish-American War era. Fort Fremont was authorized soon after the Spanish-American War began in April 1898. It was named for Major General John C. Fremont, explorer, first presidential candidate of the Republican Party in 1856, and Civil War general. Its location was chosen to protect Beaufort from possible enemy incursions into Port Royal Sound. Although the war ended in the fall of 1898 and the Sound was never threatened, construction continued as planned. The complex was built by the Corps of Engineers with hired labor from the Beaufort area and was completed by 1900, when it was turned over to the Coast Artillery. The War Department planned to phase out the post at Fort Fremont as early as 1906, but a garrison normally numbering some one hundred officers and men was stationed there, usually conducting artillery practice and maintaining the fort and its guns, until 1911. The fort was then decommissioned and the property was sold at public auction by the War Department in June 1930. Manson Sherrill Jolly (1841-1869), the ex-Confederate soldier who has been described as an "unreconstructed rebel" and who acquired the nickname "Manse Jolly," was born on a 300-acre farm in the Lebanon community of Anderson District, S.C. He was one of the eleven offspring of Joseph Moorhead Jolly and Anna Cole (Sherrill) Jolly. On February 5, 1861, he enlisted at Pendleton, S.C., in an infantry regiment organized by William Butler. Later, during the Civil War, he served with distinction as a first sergeant in Co. F. 1st S.C. Calvary. Five of Jolly's brothers also served in the C.S.A., and four of them were killed during the war. The other brother committed suicide shortly after the war. In the fall of 1866, Jolly went to Texas, where two years later he married Mildred Elizabeth "Millie" Smith (1847-1924), a daughter of John Gray "Lightning Jack" Smith (1825-1880), who was a native of Anderson District, S.C. Jolly and his wife had only one child, Ella Manson Jolly, who was born in Robertson County. Texas, in 1964 shortly after her father's accidental death in Texas.



DEATH OF MANSON JOLLY

The news will be received with regret by the many friends of this bold and daring Confederate soldier. We learn that a private letter has been received, stating that Manson Jolly was drowned on the 8th of July near his home in Texas. He was building a residence on the opposite side of the creek from where he lived, and had crossed over on horseback several times during the day. The stream was greatly swollen, and in attempting to cross for the third or fourth time, he was carried with his horse down the creek, and in the struggle which ensued both were drowned. Mr. Jolly had been married about one year, and leaves a young wife, the daughter of a former citizen of Anderson.

The thrilling exploits and adventures of Manson Jolly in this section of the country, immediately after the war closed, are fresh in the recollection of all. His name was a terror for a long time to the garrison of United States soldiers, especially the volunteer white and colored regiments stationed at this place. When the regular troops arrived, he removed to Texas, where he has since been leading a quiet and peaceful life.

A weathered tombstone in the cemetery at Little River Baptist Church near Maysfield (Milam County), Texas, marks the end of the trail for Manse Jolly. Shortly before his untimely death by accidental drowning in 1869, the Confederate veteran applied for membership in the Masons. To investigate that application, the San Andres Lodge of Cameron, Texas, appointed former Confederate Army Lieutenant Thomas Herbert Williams (1844-1890) to process it. But Jolly lost his life before the application process was completed. The Masons then decided to accept Jolly's membership posthumously. Subsequently, the order's emblem was carved on the tombstone depicted above. The Texas cemetery in which this celebrated Civil War soldier was buried also contains the grave of Walter Largent, another Confederate veteran and a loyal Jolly sidekick. In addition, the grave of John Gray "Lightning Jack" Smith (1825-1880), a native of Anderson District, S. C., a decorated Confederate soldier and the father-inlaw of both Jolly and Largent, is also situated in the cemetery. Thomas Herbert Williams, a native of the Salubrity area of Pickens District, S. C., was also buried there. He moved to Texas with Jolly in the fall of 1866.



Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams (1844-1890)


A member of a well-known Salubrity (Liberty), S. C., family, Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams was born in Pickens District in 1844, the son of William Stanton Williams and Harriett (Worthington) Williams. He was a grandson of Jeremiah Williams and Charity (Stanton) Williams. He served as a 2nd lieutenant in the Palmetto Sharpshooters and was wounded during the Civil War. After the war, he joined Manse Jolly's group of ex-Confederate soldiers and went to Texas with Jolly in 1866. He became a very prosperous and wealthy farmer in Milam County, Texas, where he died in 1890.





MANSON SHERRILL JOLLY (1841-1869)

Confederate soldier Manse Jolly was born in 1841, a son of Joseph Moorhead Jolly and Anna Cole (Sherrill) Jolly of the Lebanon Community of Anderson District, S.C. He was educated in a local common school, and he enlisted in the Confederate States Army shortly after the outbreak of the Civil War. His enlistment took place at Pendleton, S.C., on February 5, 1861, when he joined an infantry regiment organized by William Butler. The military unit was mustered into Confederate Service as the 1st S.C. Regulars, and it later became the 1st S.C. Infantry Regiment. On March 10, 1861, Jolly was assigned to Co. "F" of his regiment and given the rank of corporal. In July, 1861, Jolly was promoted to the rank of sergeant. On February 5, 1862, Jolly's one-year enlistment expired and he joined Co. F. 1st S.C. Calvary Regiment, in which his brother, William Enos Jolly, also served. Manse Jolly furnished his own horse (or mount as it was called) and received a payment of \$12.20 per month for the use of his horse, in addition to his regular pay. On October 1, 1862, the regiment in which Jolly served was sent to Richmond, Virginia, and Jolly was made a scout and detached to regimental headquarters. He was returned to this company in March, 1863. The regiment participated in some of the fiercest fighting of the Civil War. It was in both the First and Second Battles of Brandy Station and at the Battle of Gettysburg. During the last battle, Manse Jolly was promoted to the rank of first sergeant. Jolly survived the Civil War, but he was very disappointed by its outcome. Four of his brothers lost their lives in the war, and a fifth brother committed suicide after the war. After the conflict, Jolly formed a band of disenchanted, if not disgruntled, ex-Confederate soldiers. The small group was made up of Jolly; Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams of Salubrity (Pickens County, S.C.); Henry J. Knauff of Pendleton, S.C.; Walter Largent, and ex-solider from Maryland; and John Jolly, a cousin of Manse Jolly. Jolly and his followers delighted in the harassment of federal soldiers garrisoned as occupation troops in Anderson, S.C. At times, the so-called "unreconstructed rebels" captured the troops' supplies and horses, both of which were then transported across the Savannah River and into Georgia, where they were sold in the thriving black market of the post-war years. In mid-September, 1866, Jolly and his friends left South Carolina and went to Milam County, Texas. Jolly was accidentally drowned in Texas in a rain-swollen creek on July 8, 1869.





U. S. ARMY COMMANDING GENERAL VOICED HIS OPINION OF MANSE JOLLY OF ANDERSON DISTRICT

In early October 1865, three young Yankee soldiers of the occupation force were killed in Anderson District, S. C. They had been stationed as guards at Brown's Ferry on the Savannah River and were all from the state of Maine. Congress became very upset by the murders. Thus, Congressman F. A. Pike, who was also from Maine, chaired a committee to conduct hearings on the affair. Among the persons who testified at a February 1867 hearing was Major General Daniel E. Sickles, who led the New York Excelsior Brigade at Gettysburg during the Civil War and was awarded the Medal of Honor. After the conflict (and during Reconstruction) he was appointed the commander of the 2nd military district, comprising both North and South Carolina. Concerning the individuals believed to have taken part in the killings at Brown's Ferry, General Sickles said, "There were probably other persons present [at the ferry] who were never arrested. I tried very hard, indeed, to secure one of them—a notorious fellow by the name of Jolly —who escaped __I hear that he has gone to Texas. He ran for sheriff of the county [Anderson] a short time after the murder[s]. He was undoubtedly one of the men who fired upon soldiers, and I have no doubt that he was one of the worst." (Quoted in E. Don Herd, Jr., The South Carolina Upcountry, 1540-1980, Vol. II.

To All Whom it May Concern

The bearer here of Manson S.Jolly, a SGT. of Captain Thomas M. Baker's Company, II First Regiment of Infantry, aged 20 years, six feet 4 inches height, ruddy complexion, blue eyes, red hair and by profession a farmer born in Anderson District in the state of S.C. enlisted at Pendleton in the state of S.C. on the fifth day of February Eighteen Hundred Sixty one to serve for the period of one year is hereby permitted to go to Anderson in the Distriot of Anderson in the state of S C, he having received a furlough from the 4th day of Aug. to the 19th day of August at which period he will rejoin his company at Sullivan's Island or wherever it then may be, or be considered a deserter.

urlough Another Jolly Accomplice: Henry J. Knauff of Pendleton


Among Manse Jolly's post-war sidekicks was Henry J. Knauff of Pendleton, South Carolina. He was also a Confederate veteran who fled to Texas in September of 1866in order to avoid apprehension by Federal officials. At that time, lawmen were in hot pursuit of members of Jolly's gang, having suspected that they had been involved in the murders of U.S. occupation troops stationed at Brown's Ferry on The Savannah River. Henry Knauff provided the two-horse wagon used by the ex-Confederates to haul their meager possessions to the West.

Henry was a son of William J. Knauff of Pendleton. The father had moved his family to the Upstate from Charleston, South arolina. He was a gifted cabinetmaker who had relocated to Anderson District at the suggestion of Floride Bonneau Calhoun, wife of Vice President John C. Calhoun. She very much admired Mr. Knauff's craftsmanship, and she commissioned him to build pieces of furniture to place in "Fort Hill", the Calhoun's plantation home near Pendleton.

According to a newspaper article published in *The Pendleton Messenger* on January 2, 1833, the following properties of William J. Knauff were the objects of a legal suit filed by Charles Miller of Pendleton: two lots situated in the village, one of which contained a dwelling and a cabinetmaker's shop. Also put up for sale in the suit were other Knauff properties, including a sideboard, cupboard, desk, bookcase, dressing table, bedsteads, unfinished chest of drawers, stove, walnut sideboard, chest of drawers, table and a quantity of lumber. The causes and consequences of this legal action are presently unknown. But the Knauffs must have remained in Pendleton, because it was there that Henry lived when he enlisted in the Confederate States Army.

During the U.S. Civil War, Henry, son of the cabinet-maker, first served in Company "B", (Palmetto Riflemen), 4th South CarolinaInfantry Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment). Later, after his regiment had been disbanded in Virginia during the spring of 1862, the young man enlisted in Company "G", 6th South Carolina Calvary. Little else is presently known about this Confederate veteran, but oral tradition sources have implied that he eventually left Texas and possibly then returned to South Carolina.





Boyhood Home of Manse Jolly

The legendary Jolly dwelling on Anderson County's Manse Jolly Road was built in 1820 by your farmer Joseph Moorhead Jolly, father of Manse Jolly. The original three-room section of the two-story farmhouse was made of logs. Throughout the years, wood siding and additional rooms were added. A large fireplace is a feature of the main room of the old house. Many of the family's meals were cooked in the open fireplace made of brick. The entire unpartitioned second story of the house is open, has bare log walls, and was once used as a bedroom by the eleven Jolly children. Above drawing is by Charles H. Busha.

Members Visit historic Woodburn Plantation By Kayce Shusterman

The Old Pendleton District Chapter held its annual outing on May 18 with a tour and dinner at historic Woodburn Plantation, a fourstory clapboard house which is on the National List of Historic Places, and remains an excellent example of early 19th century architecture.

Members were treated to refreshments on the spacious front porch, also known as a piazza, according to Dr. Tim Drake, who served as tour guide and host for the evening. During the tour, he gave everyone a glimpse into the summer social life of South Carolina's wealthy citizens as well as fascinating facts about the famous families who once lived there.

Drake is a member of the OPD Chapter who delivered enjoyable and informative presentations on his ancestor Andrew Pickens and infamous Manse Jolly last year as guest speaker at our meetings. He is head of the Department of Pesticide Regulation at Clemson University, serves as Secretary of the Board of Directors for the Pendleton Historic Foundation and he is an avid historian and preservationist.

The tour began with a description of how the land became the summer home for Charles Cotesworth Pinckney around 1830. The



Pinckney family was one of the prominent families of early South Carolina. Drake explained that wealthy Charleston families often built homes in the Upstate to avoid the heat and bug-borne illnesses of the coastal area.

Dr. John Adger, a wealthy Presbyterian minister, purchased the home in 1852, enlarging the farm and house. The expansive two-story porches, which add so much character to the house, were added to provide extra living and sleeping space.

Drake explained that the house was built on a hill and features double doors, large windows and high ceilings, all designed to take advantage of the summer breezes. He pointed out several original trees on the lawn as well as a carriage house, cook house and slave/tenant farm house that have been added to the property.

He told the group that Jane Edna Hunter was born in a tenant farm house at Woodburn. She would grow up to be a nurse, activist and a founder of the Phyllis A. Wheatley Society, a nationally recognized organization.

Drake led the group to the third floor where only the ladies slept, explaining that the men slept on the piazza on the main level. This floor had several bedrooms, a nursery, and a morning room to lounge in. The rooms had large windows and doors with a wide wrap-around porch. The rooms were furnished

with beautiful antiques, incredible textiles, period clothing and many other interesting art and artifacts.

Members were allowed access to the upper floor which houses the boys and girls dormitories and was also used as storage space for trunks and clothing.

Drake brought the group back to the main level where they toured the two front rooms as he gave fascinating details on specific treasures, photographs and furnishings on display. The first floor also included the main entry hall, the master's study and a relativity new concept, a dining room.

The lower level of the house is a sub-basement with windows to let in light. There are several rooms and pantries. This was where the families of the past would generally have eaten most of their meals, according to Drake. Today, this level has electricity and includes storage and preservation areas, an office and a gift shop. This is where the members sat down to a wonderful meal catered by Central Station Cafe. Afterwards, many members toured the grounds and outbuildings.

This historic house serves as a museum with scheduled and arranged tours as well as a variety of planned events. It is owned and maintained by the Pendleton Historic Foundation, which also maintain the Ashtabula Plantation, located nearby. These homes are open from April through October for visitors, tour groups and special events. 



Haven't heard from the Co. since I sent on the sample of the work for inspection. If they are please think we will hear by the last of this week. Haven't we had a siege of rain? We have been almost washed away by high water. We cannot cross any of the streams around here on account of having washed out or filled with quick sand. I received a long letter from Aunt Mary Saturday. She and Uncle Allman are very anxious for me to go up again this summer. Dr. Groff will take his same place again this year. Come Friday night if you can. I hardly think it would be prudent to spend Saturday on the river unless the ground dries very rapidly. Think they will have a nice little Hop Friday night. Truly hope we will not have any more rain soon. If you can come and is convenient please let us know. In haste, Yours as ever, Helen.
- 14 Sep 1885. Original Document. Deed of Marvin D. Seaborn to Thomas Cordes. 14 acres in Pendleton near Baptist Church. Mentions: James Hunter, W. P. Hall, J. B. E. Sloan, Eighteen Mile Creek, Harris Ferry Road, Mrs. K. D. Cornish, W. G. Smith, Larkin Newton.
- 3 Nov 1885. Letter from B. F. Whitner & Son in Anderson to Thomas C. Harleston in Charleston, SC. Sent title to property in Pendleton. Mrs. Seaborn left for Boston some days before the purchase was consummated and had to send the money to her there.
- 1 Sep 1886. Letter from Ida R. Welborn at Williamston Female College to Frank Smith at Oak Grove, SC. She is attending school after taking off five weeks of rest and enjoyment. "We had an earthquake shaking here last night; it frightened all the girls so much that they could not remember any thing today like the dates of the year. The colored people were at church when it began, and they were so frightened that they ran out of the house and quit having services for the night. I never had such feelings as I had then. The house shook all over and a few chimney tops were blown off. Signed your sincere relative.

The above photograph of the young family of John Allen Busha and Cora Cordelia (Smith) Busha was taken almost 100 years ago on Nubbin Ridge (present-day Oakway) in Oconee County, S.C. The couple was married on February 26, 1906. The first four of their eleven offspring are also pictured above, and they are, from left to right; James Henry (age 5), Dessie Mae (age 4), Rufus Alexander (age 2), and Julia V. (age 1). The children's quizzical facial expressions probably mirror a curiosity concerning their first picture-taking experience. The bodies of the above husband and wife were buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church, situated on Hwy. 24 and between Westminster and the Tokeema community of Oconee County.

THE BEARDEN FAMILY

William Thompson Bearden (b. ca. 1842-d. 1922) was a son of William "Bucky" Bearden (1810-1882) and Elizabeth (McGuffin) Bearden (1808-1911). He served in the Confederate States Army in Co. F, 1st S.C. Rifles (Orr's Regiment) in which his enlistment took place on March 19, 1862, at Pickens Court House on the Keowee River in Pickens District, S.C. During the American Civil War, he was captured by Union troops at North Anna, Virginia, on May 23, 1864. He was paroled at Point Lookout, Maryland, and then sent to Aiken Landing, Virginia, on March 14, 1865. This Confederate soldier first married Rebecca Wooten (1843-1895), and he later married Lorena "Rena" Lipford. By his first wife he was the father of the following children:

- (1) Mary E. Bearden (1862-1906), who married W.C. "Babe" Jaynes.
- (2) John W. Bearden (1869-1891).
- (3) James "Little Jim" Bearden, who married Emma Cain.
- (4) Missouri Bearden (1866-1946), who married John W. Graham (1866-1947).
- (5) Cora Bearden (1877-1966), who married Fred Taylor (1873-1933.
- (6) Thomas O. Bearden (1882-1914).

William Thompson Bearden and his second wife, Lorena "Rena" Bearden, had one child:

(1) Leon Bearden (1900-1961), who married Lexie Standridge.

This Confederate veteran and his second wife were buried at Bethel Baptist Church near Oakway.

Andrew Bearden (1844-1929) was a brother of William Thompson Bearden (see his sketch above), as well as Joseph Bearden (see his sketch below). He served in the Confederate States Army as a member of Co. A, 22nd S.C. Infantry Volunteers. He was married three times to the following wives: Nannie (Hunter) Bearden (1853-1915), Mary M. (Leathers) Bearden (1843-1896) and Annie (Brewer) Bearden. After the Civil War, this Confederate veteran became a preacher. His seven children are listed below:

- (1) Amanda Tulula Bearden (1866-1940), who married John Aaron Eubanks (1863-1941).
- (2) Martha E. Bearden, who married Lemuel H.V. Hobson (1861-1943).
- (3) Maranda Bearden (1868-1924), who married William Thomas Gibson (1868-1951).
- (4) William Walker Bearden (1870-1962).
- (5) Josie Bearden (1871-1943), who married William M. Lemmons (1866-1934).
- (6) Joseph Silvester Bearden (1877-1961), who married Annie Haley (1875-1951).
- (7) H. Russell Bearden, whose wife was Elizabeth D. Bearden (1883-1975).

Andrew Bearden, the father of the above-listed children, was buried at Bethel Baptist Church in the Oakway community. Two of his three wives, Nannie and Mary, were also buried there.

Joseph Bearden (1838-1914) was another son of "Bucky" and Betsy Bearden. Like two of his brothers, he was a Confederate soldier during the Civil War. Joseph and his father were both gunsmiths, and the son was employed at Crook's Armory in Athens, Georgia, during most of the North-South military conflict. However, when Union General William Tecumseh Sherman posed a threat to Macon, Georgia, in 1865, Joseph enlisted as a private in Pendergrass' Company of the 23rd Georgia Infantry Battalion and was slightly wounded soon afterwards, but he survived the conflict and returned to

Oakway in Oconee County. Before the Civil War, Joseph married <u>Ellen Land</u> (29 May 1838-3 Jul 1910). She was a daughter of <u>Elijah and Eleanor (Jolly) Land</u>. The following six children were born to this couple:

- (1) Cenie Bearden (1858-1920), who married Frank Moore.
- (2) William Bearden, who died as a child.
- (3) John Milton Bearden (1861-1935), who married Ellen (or Ella) Lumpkin.
- (4) Joseph Alex Bearden (1863-1945), who married Lucy Ann Doyle (1869-1917).
- (5) Julia L. Bearden (1883-1917), who married Jackson Miller.
- (6) Margaret Ellen Bearden who married David Warren Jaynes.

Confederate veteran Joseph Bearden was one of the twenty former Civil War soldiers who were honored on January 20, 1907, at Clemson A&M College where the 100th birthday of Confederate General Robert E. Lee was celebrated by the John C. Calhoun Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Joseph Bearden marched down the aisle of Memorial Hall on the Clemson campus, while the college band played "Dixie", the unofficial anthem of the Confederacy. In 1914 this Confederate veteran's body was buried at Bethel Baptist Church in Oconee County. His wife was also laid to rest there in 1910.

THE CARROLL FAMILY

John Peter Carroll (15 Aug 1845-19 July 1924) and his wife Mary E. (Hobson) Carroll (31 Jan 1858-16 Dec 1934) were residents of the Oakway community. Their offspring included the following persons:

- (1) Lester Ligon Carroll (19 Dec 1888-29 July 1959), who married Julia Etta Smith (9 Oct 1888-14 Jan 1959), daughter of James Roland Smith (1859-1935) and Emiline (Cox) Smith (1866-1941) of Oakway.
- (2) Henry Carroll (1897-1899).
- (3) Irvin R. Carroll (1886-1972).
- (4) James Clifton Carroll (1880-1955), who first married Minnie Lee Simpson (1879-1920) and who later married Martha Isabelle Brock (1875-1940).
- (5) George Carroll
- (6) Anna Carroll; Della M. Carrol (1884-1956); and Lillie Carroll. During the American Civil War, John Peter Carroll served in Co. C, S.C. Reserves. This Confederate veteran and his wife were buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church.

William Thomas "Bill" Carroll (1846-1928) was a Confedereate veteran who served in Co. K, 1st S.C. Rifles (Orr's Regiment) during the Civil War. His wife was Caroline. Hannah Heller (1853-1894) who was buried in Silverbrook Cemetery in Anderson, S.C. The children of William Thomas Carroll were Clayborn Carroll (1879-1961), who married Fay Glern; Russell Carroll, who died at the age of sixteen; Rufus Greene Carroll (1882-1971), who married Marie Tribble (1895-1906); Maggie Ann Carroll (1886-1951), who married Clarence H. Vaden; John Bowman Carroll (1841-1940), who married Hattie Erline Snipes (1900-1982); and Winfield Tillman Carroll (1893-1977), who married Willie Edwards. William Thomas Carroll was buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church.

THE BUSHA FAMILY

John Allen Busha (4 Sept 1882 – 24 Feb 1951) and Cora Cordelia (Smith) Busha (28 June 1886 – 22 Mar 1949) were longtime residents of Nubbin Ridge (now Oakway) in Oconee County, South Carolina. Their eleven offspring were also born there. Cora Cordelia Smith was one of the fourteen children of Oakway inhabitants James Roland Smith (1859 – 1935) and Emiline (Cox) Smith (1866 – 1941)

In about 1902, John Allen Busha left his home near Toccoa, Georgia. He then crossed the wide and deep Tugaloo River, arrived in Oconee County and settled there in the Oakway community. His parents were Mitchell and Alpha (Brady) Busha of Stephens County, Georgia. Their home was in the Currahee Mountain district near Toccoa. Mitchell and two of his brothers, namely Samuel and Warren Busha, served as Confederate soldiers in various Georgia infantry units during the American Civil War. All the brothers survived the conflict. Later in their lives they received pensions in Georgia for their military service.

Most persons in upstate South Carolina and in northern Georgia who have the surname Busha (pronounced but shā) are believed to be kinfolks—not by virtue of the unusual spelling and French-sounding pronunciation of their surname, but by a blood relationship. Of more import is the reality that many, if not all, of these Bushas have ancestral roots that can be traced back to a man who was originally known as Pierre Bousquet. He was a French immigrant who obtained U.S. citizenship papers on October 8, 1832, at Rock Hill in York County, South Carolina, where he had settled earlier. Around the time that Pierre Bousquet's citizenship was granted, his name was apparently Anglicized by a change to Peter Busha. Of course, the English language counterpart of the given name Pierre is Peter, but the new surname, Busha, probably represents someone's questionable effort to phonetically transcribe into English the French pronunciation of the surname Bousquet.

Unfortunately, Peter's historical and genealogical paper trail is very scant, insofar as such records as wills and deeds are concerned. Therefore, South Carolina and Georgia census data have been the chief sources of genealogical information that has been collected thus far. For example, Peter is now known to have married a South Carolinian named Elizabeth Briley (b. ca. 1812). She was a daughter of Sabrina Briley (b. 1774) and an unknown consort or spouse. Moreover, Peter and Elizabeth had the following seven children: William, Samuel, Mitchell, Warren, Elizabeth, Mary Ellen and James, all of whom had the surname Busha. Some of these children were born in York County, South Carolina, and other offspring of the couple might have been born in the adjacent county of Union to which this family later relocated. Peter Busha probably died before 1850—this because, by that year, his widow, along with the couple's seven children and Sabrina Briley (the seventy-six-year-old mother of Elizabeth) had moved from South Carolina and all were living in Hancock, Georgia, in the household of Lewis Whitesides. Also, William Busha, Elizabeth's oldest son, was at that time working as a day laborer for Thomas Dixon, who was the next-door resident of the Whitesides' home.

However, by 1860 Elizabeth Busha had moved her family to Habersham County, Georgia. The family settled in that part of the county that became Stephens County in 1905. (This Busha family took up residence in the Currahee Mountain district of present-day Stephens County.) It was from that northern part of Georgia that Mitchell Busha's son, John Allen Busha, moved to South Carolina. Soon after his arrival in the

Oakway community of Oconee County, John befriended <u>Fair Alexander Smith</u> (1884 – 1954), who then introduced him to his attrictive sister, <u>Cora Cordelia Smith</u>. The newly introduced couple soon fell in love, became engaged, were married, and eventually begetted the following eleven children while living at Oakway:

- (1) James Henry Busha (9 Apr 1907–18 Jul 1974), who married Rosa Anna Anderson (29 Dec 1909–2 Nov 1988), daughter of General Washington (G.W.) Anderson (1882–1970) and Martha Ann (Ledford) Anderson (1882–1920).
- (2) Dessie Mae Busha (b. 27 Aug 1908), who married Willie Harvey Moser (4 May 1905-25 Aug 1987), son of John Robert Moser (1864-1926) and Mattie (Kelley) Moser (1872-1966).
- (3) Rufus Alexander Busha (10 Feb 1910-8 Jun 1970), who married Willie Mae Lesley (17 Oct 1915-15 Apr 1979), daughter of William and Minnie Lee (Cothran) Lesley of Pickens County.
- (4) Julia V. Busha (19 Oct 1911-15 Nov 1982), who first married J.C. Mann (b. 16 Aug 1910) and who later married Ural P. Mitchell (d. 1979).
- (5) Bessie Busha (b. 23 Jun 1913), who first married Walter Alford Hendrix (1909-1983) and subsequently married Coly Porter—still later she became the wife of Calvin Mann of Central, S.C.
- (6) Dollie Bell Busha (b. & d. 3 Mar 1915).
- (7) Ruby Glenn Busha (b. 25 Dec 1916), who first married Johnny Thomas Phillips and who later married Bannister Woodrow Bowen (1905-1975).
- (8) Ralph Wilson Busha (2 Jun 1919-9 Apr 1971), who first married Annie Pearl Trotter (1912-1981) and later married Pearl Bearden, after which his third marriage was to Wilma Marie McLeod.
- (9) Garnett Lee Busha (b. 15 Feb 1922), who married Frances Lorine Walker (20 May 1923-11 Aug 2008), daughter of John Robert Walker and Banner (McCoy) Walker.
- (10) William Rosser Busha (b. 30 Aug 1923), who married Mary Lucille McKinney (b. 16 Mar 1916), daughter of Oscar M. and Bessie Mae (Holcombe) McKinney.
- (11) Clyde A.Z. Busha (10 Nov 1925-d. 1982), who married Sarah Opel Holcombe (23 Mar 1925-18 Aug 1998).

John Allen Busha and Cora Cordelia (Smith) Busha both died in the Sans Souci section of the city of Greenville, South Carolina, where they had lived for several years prior to their deaths. Their bodies were taken back to Oconee County and buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church.

THE MASON FAMILY

Oakway resident James Mason (b. ca. 1839-d. 1922), was a Confederate veteran who served in Co. D, 22nd S.C. Infantry during the Civil War. His wife was <u>Clara Mason</u> (1841-1917). In 1901 Mason was the recipient of a Civil War pension. The Civil War veteran and his wife were buried at Bethel Baptist Church in Oconee County, S.C. Additional members of Oakway's Mason families were: <u>John Wesley Mason</u> (1852-1933) and his wife <u>Marthe E. (Leathers) Mason</u> (1854-1967); <u>Elias Wilton Mason</u> (1862-1918) and his wife <u>Susan Ella (Grant) Mason</u> (1862-1930); <u>Marshall W. Mason</u> (1885-1972) and his wife <u>Weepie (Cobb) Mason</u> (1890-1920); <u>Waymon W. Mason</u> (1883-1972); <u>James Harrison Mason</u> (1877-1960) and his wife <u>Anna (Bearden) Mason</u> (1870-1959); and <u>William Elman Mason</u> (1880-1977) and his wife <u>Cora (King) Mason</u>.

THE McDONALD FAMILY

William H. McDonald (1827-1911) served in the American Civil War as a member of Co. B, 10th S.C. Cavalry Bn. He was wounded on May 28, 1864, during the Battle of Haw's Shop in Virginia. The seven-hour-long battle was the second all-cavalry victory achieved by the northern Union Army of the Potomac. Major General Wade Hampton (1818-1902) of South Carolina was the leader of the opposing Confederate cavalry troops during the battle. General Hampton had previously replaced Major General J.E.B. "Jeb" Stuart (1833-1864), who died of battle wounds on May 12, 1864. William H. McDonald of Oakway married Mary Elizabeth Day (1842-1918), and in 1901 they resided in Easley township of Pickens County, S.C. At that time this Confederate veteran was a recipient of a Civil War pension. He died on October 11, 1911, and was buried at Old Center Methodist Church at Oakway in Oconee County, S.C., where his wife was also buried in 1918.

Additional McDonalds who once resided at Oakway were Andrew W. McDonald (1860-1941) and his wife Tyrenda J. McDonald (1865-1937). Among their offspring were a son, Styles McDonald, who died unmarried at an advanced age, and a daughter Effie McDonald (b.23 Sept 1894), who married Fair Alexander Smith (7 Feb 1884-1 Mar 1954).



THE COLE FAMILY

Nathaniel Pickens Cole (1828-1903) was a resident of the Oakway community and a son of Sydney Cole (1802-1842) and Charlotte (Myers) Cole (d. 1877). The Coles were of Native American descent. Thus, Nathaniel acquired the nickname "Indian Chief." He married Mary Elizabeth Ables (1835-1918), daughter of William Ables and Elizabeth (McGuffin) Ables. During the American Civil War, Nathaniel Pickens Cole was conscripted into Confederate military service; he served in Company C, 2nd SC. Rifles (Moore's Regiment). Cole survived the Civil War, after which he returned to his home in South Carolina. This Confederate veteran and his wife had the following children:

- (1) William Hartwell Cole (1854-1921), who married Sarah Jane Crooks.
- (2) <u>Jesse Cole</u> (1864-1934), whose wife was <u>Myrtle P. Cole</u> (1879-1934).
- (3) James Hillary Cole (1869-1948), who married Essie Eugenia Lemmons.
- (4) Amanda "Mindy" Cole, who married John Crooks.
- (5) <u>Frances "Tannie" E. Cole</u> (1860-1953), who married <u>Samuel "Sammy" Grant, Sr.</u> (1839-1928), who was a Confederate veteran.
- (6) Lina A. Cole (1868-1919), who married John A. Patterson (1824-1919).
- (7) <u>Julia S. "Julie" Cole</u> (1871-1947), who married <u>Columbus "Lum" Patterson</u> (1870-1941).
- (8) Laura Cole, who married George Elrod.
- (9) Mary Alice Cole (1872-1943), who married her brother-in-law, John A. Patterson.
- (10) Mattie Cole (b. 1874), married Robert L. "Bob" Patterson (b. 1863).


In 1902 Nathaniel Pickens Cole was a resident of Pelzer, S.C., and he received a Civil War pension at that time. This Confederate veteran and his wife were buried at Bethel Baptist Church near Oakway. (To be Continued next month in Part II)

Stone Tool Technology Dell Millar Displays Cherokee Artifacts Written by Kayce Shusterman

Dell Millar, a Native American artifact hunter, brought a small portion of his collection to the June meeting of the Old Pendleton District genealogical society for a discussion on Cherokees in the Upstate. Millar and his wife, Judy, have long been members of the OPD group. Dell has been a speaker at schools, colleges, clubs and other groups for more than 30 years. He brought with him, many examples of "stone tool technology" that he has found during his 50 years of hunting artifacts.

His daughter Ruthie accompanied him and helped with the impressive display and program on the earliest settlers of this area. According to Millar, the Cherokee nation once covered 44,000 square miles including the *Golden Corner* of Pickens, Oconee and Anderson counties in South Carolina, as well as parts of several other states. He said the Cherokees had lived in the area for more than 2,000 years. He explained that stone tools and other artifacts are often found wherever these nomadic people settled. The settlements were generally located on flat land near a freshwater source.

He told a few stories about his hunting techniques to encourage others to search for artifacts. Near the Seneca River, he found Russian glass trade beads from the 1700's and a pipe head from London. Millar demonstrated how tools like arrowheads, scrapers, tomahawks and drills were developed and used by the Cherokee people. He showed heavy grinding stones, cook pots, blow darts, spears and ceremonial rattles. He encouraged everyone to visit the Native American exhibits at the Oconee heritage center in Walhalla and the Pickens County Museum. Using Cherokee sign language, he told the group to "go in peace."

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

19 Dec 1807. p. 429. That a ferry be established at the plantation of **John B. Earl**, over Keeowee river, and be vested in him and his heirs, for the term of seven years; and that the same rates of ferriage be taken as at the ferry of **Andrew Pickens**.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

19 Dec 1807. p. 429. That a ferry be established at the plantation of **Joseph Taylor**, over Keeowee river; and that the same be vested in the said **Joseph Taylor**, and his heirs, for the term of seven years; and that the same rates of ferriage be taken as at the ferry of **Andrew Pickens**.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

19 Dec 1807. p. 430. That a ferry be established across Keowee river, at the plantation of Andrew Pickens, Jr., and that the same be vested in the said Andrew Pickens, Jr., his heirs and assigns, for the term of seven years. And the said Andrew Pickens, Jr., his heirs or assigns, may be permitted to keep such gates or bars through the said plantation, as may be necessary for a communication with the said ferry; and the following rates of ferriage be taken and received, to wit: for every foot passenger, 3 cents; for every man and horse, six ¼ cents; for every led horse, and every head of black cattle, 3 cents; for every head of hobs, sheep or goats, one cent; for every wagon and team, 50 cents; for every rolling hobs-head or loaded cart, 25 cents; for every empty cart or carriage, with two wheels, 12 ½ cents; and for every riding carriage with four wheels, 25 cents; and that the roads leading to the said ferry, be opened and kept in repair as public roads.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

20 Dec 1832, p. 596 That the commissioners of roads for the fifth regiment, SC Militia, Pendleton district discontinue that part of the old Keowee road which runs from Gresham's road to the new road, crossing Twelve Mile River at Mitchell's ford.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

20 Dec 1821. p 513. Volume IX-65. A new road shall be laid out and opened from Captain Peter E. Bellot's to the Ford on 26 mile creek, where the road leading from Pendleton court house to Orrsville crosses at present, the said road to cross the Big Beaver Dam creek, at Millwee's old ford; and that Captain Peter E. Bellot, Captain James Anderson, Captain William Givens, Aaron Guyton and Dr. William Anderson, be, and they are hereby appointed, with full power and authority to lay out and open the same.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

17 Dec 1831. p. 590. That commissioners of roads for the 5th regiment, in Pendleton District open a road from Pendleton village to Pickens court house, as marked out by commissioners. Public road leading from Pendleton to Pickens, leaving the road by James Gaines's at some convenient point above Eighteen Mile Creek, by Calhoun's Factory, to a suitable point into the road crossing Keowee at Robertson's Ford; and all the hands living within five miles of the said road, without regard to the regimental boundary line, shall be liable to work on the same.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

20 Dec 1832, p. 596 That the commissioners of roads for the fifth regiment, SC Militia, Pendleton district, be, and they are hereby, authorized and empowered to discontinue that part of the old Keowee road which runs from Gresham's road to the new road, crossing Twelve Mile River at Mitchell's ford.

Statues at Large of SC. Acts Relating to Roads, Bridges and Ferries

19 Dec 1833. p. 598. James McKinney be authorized to lay out and make a turnpike road from Pickens court house, by the most convenient route, to the North Carolina line, to intersect said line at some intermediate point between Pickens court house and Macon in North Carolina, and that as soon as said road be completed, it shall be vested in the said James McKinney, his heirs and assigns, for the term of 20 years, and that he be authorized to charge and receive the following rates of toll, to wit: for every four wheeled wagon, 50 cents; for every gig and horse, 18 ¾ cents; for every man and horse, six ¼ cents; for every single horse, 3 cents; for all black cattle, 2 cents; for every hog, one cent.



Death of Carter Clayton Porter Born 24 Dec 1827 Died 2 Jun 1920

Carter Clayton Porter died last Wednesday morning, June 2, 1920, at 7:25 o'clock, at the home of his son, James T. Porter, of Forest Park, GA. His death was the result of old age. Mr. Porter was born in Old Pickens District, SC, December 24, 1827, being 92 years, 5 months and 8 days old. He was a son of the late James Porter who died at 100 years of age, less four days. He is buried at the cemetery of the First Westminster Baptist Church.

Mr. Porter lived at Old Pickens District, near the head of Twelve Mile river, until 1872, when he moved with his family to Oconee county, near Westminster, on Colonel's Fork creek. He was married to Miss Malinda Robertson, of Old Pickens, on August 1, 1858, to whom five children were born. One child died in infancy. The union was of 58 years duration, until his wife preceded him to the grave about four years ago.

He lived in Oconee until about four years ago, when he moved with his son to Forest Park, GA. He was well and favorably known to many of the citizens of Pickens and Oconee counties.

Mr. Porter served in the Confederate army in the Civil war for four years and six months. He was a member of Gen. Boureguard's and Capt. Bloodsaw's Battery, Western army, and served in every battle engaged in by this battery and fought Sherman's army from Vicksburg, Mississippi, and on through Georgia. He was captured at Salisbury, NC, on April 13, 1865, and carried to Camp Chase, Ohio, and put in prison. He was released on June 28, 1865. He came to Cartersville, GA, by train and walked there to Old Pickens, arriving July 5, 1865. He fired the last cannon shot in the War Between the States. Mr. Porter went through the war without a wound of any kind.

Mr. Porter was a member of the Methodist church, having joined the church at **Old Pickens** at the age of twelve years. He lived the life of a Christian and strictly observed the rules of his church. He was conscientious and was of the old Methodist type. He and his father were what is known as "shouting Methodists," but they felt the religion of Jesus Christ and lived it every day of their lives. Mr. Porter always made friends instead of enemies and has many acquaintances in Pickens, Oconee and Georgia can testify to this fact. He had lived the life of a good man, and in old age his "lamp went out," He was called from labor to refreshments to "that house eternal in the heavens" to "that house eternal in the Heavens" by Lord, who giveth all good and perfect gifts."

Mr. Porter was buried at Jones' Chapel, Forest Park, GA on Thursday afternoon, by the side of his wife, with impressive and solemn burial ceremonies of the Masonic order, by Forest Park Lodge No. 809, according to his request.

Mrs. Malinda Porter Died at Forest Park, GA last Wednesday – Was Well Known in Oconee Born 3 Aug 1931 Died 26 Sep 1916

Mrs. Malinda T. Porter, wife of Mr. C.C. Porter, who fell and broke her hip on the evening of June 26th, died at the home of her son, Mr. Jas. T. Porter, of Forest Park, GA, last Wednesday evening at 6 o'clock. Mrs. Porter fell and sustained injuries in her hip while in her room Monday night and her condition was considered grave from the first. She never regained consciousness. All of the children were at her bedside when the end came except the second son, W.C. Porter, who resides at El Paso, Texas. He could not come on account of the serious illness of his son. The announcement of the death of this estimable lady was received with much sadness by her friends and acquaintances in and around Westminster, where she had spent most of her long and useful life.

Mrs. Porter was in her 86th year, having been born August 8, 1830. Her maiden name was Robertson and she was reared in Pickens county. She and Mr. Porter had been married upwards of 55 years. In 1872 they settled on Colonel's Fork Creek, the plantation now owned by T.N. Carter. Some fifteen years ago the family moved into the Taber section, where they resided until last December, Mr. and Mrs. Porter having moved to Forest Park with their son.

Surviving are her aged husband, C.C. Porter, who is 89 years old; three sons, J.T. of Forest Park;
William C. Porter, of El Paso, Texas;
Dr. F.S. Porter, of Pickens,
and one daughter, Mrs. Unity V. Brock, of Central,
and a number of grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Of a large family of brothers and sisters only one, Mrs. J.O. Armstrong, of near Return, is now living.

Mrs. Porter united with the Methodist church many years ago and lived an exemplary Christian life. At the time of her death her membership was at Forest Park. "Granny" Porter, as she was familiar known, had read the Bible through ten to twelve times.

Funeral services were conducted at the home in Forest Park Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock by her pastor, in the presence of many sympathizing friends. Her body was interred in the cemetery at Forest Park at the conclusion of the funeral.

JOHN C. ANDERSON, a farmer and stock dealer, living near Omaha, Ill., is a descendant of one of the oldest families in that portion of the Lower Ohio Valley. His **grandfather**, **Solomon Anderson**, was born in South Carolina, Feb. 8, 1806, his parents being **James and Polly Anderson**.

On May 5, 1830, Anderson was married to **Margaret Williams of Kentucky**, she being at the time of her marriage but fifteen years of age, and soon afterward settled in Posey county, Ind., on the site of the village of old Springfield. There he followed the occupations of farming and shoemaking, and achieved quite a reputation as a hunter and trapper.

The children of Solomon and Margaret Anderson were William N., Urbane, Asa C, Nancy, Martha, Margaret, Mary E., John and Elias.

William N. was born Sept. 2, 1831, and died Dec. 26, 1857. He married Mary A. Rusher, daughter of Jerry Rusher, who came from North Carolina in pioneer days and settled in Posey county. This couple was the parents of John C. Anderson, the subject of this sketch, who was born in White county, Ill., Dec. 20, 1854. When he was but three weeks old his parents removed to Posey county, and there he grew to manhood on his father's farm. At the age of twenty-one years he started out for himself.

On Sept. 6, 1877, he was married to Miss **Hannah Downen** and in October came to Gallatin county, locating on the farm where he now lives, only thirty acres of which was at that time under cultivation. For two and a half years he lived in a log cabin, when he built a better house, and by his own industry he has cleared 125 acres of land, leaving only about twelve or thirteen acres of his farm that is not now under cultivation.

Mr. Anderson buys and ships a great deal of live stock, most of which is shipped from Omaha. He has followed this business in addition to his farming interests for about fourteen years, and has been very successful as a stock dealer. He is a member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen and in politics is independent, voting for the man rather than for the candidate of any particular party. He and his wife have the following children: William L., Bertha, Stella M., Julia H., Mary A., Dora and Audrey.

Mentions: Mother, Mr. & Mrs. Frank staying at home, singing at Presbyterian Church, Mr. Cothran coming to see Miss Mattie on his way to Baltimore where he is being treated for heart disease. Mr. Stokes wants us to celebrate Calhoun's birthday in April, Gilmore Simms in May and then get ready for commencement in June. Lell, Miss Gussie Sitton and Tucker had their "branty struck" the other day. Mr. Stokes has sent us into Mr. Smith who already had sixty scholars because he was too much rushed and has taken the fifteen in the fifth grade and has his wife to help him teach them. Every Sunday night the Hokes, both families of Sittons, and the crowd at the Hotel meet in the Keowee parlor to sing and Lell says the music is splendid. Mr. H. L. Adams and his brother have bought the store which Mr. Sitton owned and will commence business together. Mr. Amos Adams is going to board at the Hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Ligon spent the night with us Monday night. They expected to stay with Mrs. Sitton but after she got here found out that they had the whooping cough and was afraid her baby would catch it. Mr. Norman (a Dutchman who lectured here about a week ago) promises to teach Volaprrk this new language which is becoming very popular, French, German, rapid calculations, short hand, how to remember dates and several other things too numerous to mention in two weeks and for two dollars, strange to say he has about twelve scholars. Dr. Davis among them. Tell sister Mrs. McCarley started that table scarf. She stamped and is doing it very nicely. Mrs. Broyles told Mother that she heard sister was taken embroidery lessons which worried Mother very much. Mrs. Dumas sent down to Grgn that to get fifty lbs. of sugar and Mr. Lewis wanted to know if they were going to crystallize Miss Alice Lowery. When Alice came down to get after him about it, he said, "No Miss Alice, I didn't say it; for I know it would take a barrel to crystallize you." Did you see Mrs. Coleman's letter in the Free Press?

The registries of lands now embrace 332,660 acres, in almost every district of the State, for sale at reasonable rates and on favorable conditions; and nearly 6,000 acres of good lands in salubrious sections of the State have been registered to be given as a free donation to actual settlers upon reasonable conditions of improvement. . . . The railroads from Charleston to Memphis being willing to transport immigrant passengers at one cent per mile, and their baggage at very reduced rates, would make this route to the West a more favorable one than over either New York or Baltimore. Immigration. Published by Request. Down in SC is brother Boinest who lives in Pomaria and is the President of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of SC. Boinest wrote that he wanted a "German family for his farm. At New Year, 1868, I was enabled through the help of Mr. Erbe, the Superintendent of the Intelligence office at Castel

Garden, to find such a family, with seven children, honest and intelligent, but poor and needy, waiting at Wards (the great waiting depot for poor immigrants.)." The parents became members of the congregation and took Lord's Supper where Boinest celebrated it in German. Meeting in district about German immigration, Boinest became president of group. Fifteen hundred dollars contributed. Bro. B. came to take a number of immigrants immediately. The ages are to be from \$8 to \$10 per month. Next year they will give land to the families to work in shares—say 100 acres. The laborer has only to procure his support and for his work receives the third part of the crop. An opportunity is given to acquire land for themselves, which can be had at present rate of from four to six dollars per acres. The traveling expenses are advanced, and will be reimbursed at the close of the year. . . . Last Saturday I stood with Bro. B. at 2 o'clock, p.m. in the steerage of the steamer Charleston. . . . There were seventeen people there to greet the "small band of immigrants".



FORMER FAMILIES OF NUBBIN RIDGE IN OCONEE COUNTY

Part Two

THE KING FAMILY

John Hester King (b. ca. 1830-d. 1862) was born in North Carolina and was a son of Robert King (b. ca. 1791-d. 1880) and Lavenia (Horton) King (b. ca. 1800-d.ca. 1885). At the age of thirty-two, John Hester King was conscripted into the Confederate Staes Army on July 1, 1862. Then he served as a private under Capt. Wallace in Co. C and Co. B of the 2nd S.C. Infantry. This soldier was describer in military records as a married farmer who was 5 feet and 10 inches tall, had fair complecion, and dark eyes/hair. Before the Civil War, he married Mary A. Chastain (1828-1909), daughter of Stephen and Mary Chastain. Private King died of pneumonia while in service on December 19, 1862. He was buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Richmond, Virginia (Section 155, Row M, Div. A). His three children were:

- Robert William King (1854-1933), who married Matilda June Mason (1853-1902).
- (2) Rufus Hezikiah King (1859-1917), who married Molly (Kennedy) King (1861-1932).
- (3) <u>Richard D. King</u> (1862-1942), who married <u>Lucille "Lou" or "Polly" Smith.</u> In 1899, Mary A. King, widow of this Confederate soldier, was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in Oconee County, S.C. She died on March 31, 1909, and was buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Robert Canady King (b. ca. 1834-d.1862), was a native of North Carolina, but he moved to South Carolina with his parents who settled on Nubbin Ridge. He was a younger brother of John Hester King, a subject of the previous sketch and who also served in the Confederate States Army. When Robert was about thirty years of age, he enlisted in Capt. Ramsey's Co, 4th S.C. Infantry Volunteers (Sloan's Regiment). He is believed to have also served in Co. F, 1st S.C. Rifles (Orr's Regiment). This soldier was wounded during the Battle of Gaines' Mill in Virginia, during which General Robert E. Lee's troops won a victory. The engagement was one of the Seven Days' battles in the defense of Richmond, and it was a bloody struggle. About 8,750 Confederate soldiers were casualties of the battle. After the Civil War, many upstate soldiers who fought at Gaines' Mill would remember it as one of the fiercest clashes of the war. On December 13, 1862, Robert Canady King was killed in action during the First Battle of Fredericksburg in Virginia. That battle was a major engagement between a smaller

Confederate Army and the much larger Union Army of the Potomac, which was commanded by General Ambrose E. Burnside. The military clash became General Lee's most one-sided victory of the American Civil War. About 12,653 Union troops were casualties of that struggle, and the South's losses amounted to 4,201 casualties. Prior to the Civil War, Robert Canady King married Eliza Newell (21 Oct 1834-9 Sept 1903), and the couple had the following five children:

- (1) James Austin King (12 Dec 1854-19 Oct 1940), who married Martha Elmira Dodd.
- (2) William Lucas King (25 May 1858-16 Jan 1938), who married Malissa Cox.
- (3) <u>Baylus Earl King</u> (13 Apr 1861-4 Sept 1928), who, on December 14, 1879, married <u>Sarah Jane Todd</u> (3 Sept 1857-7 Apr 1948).
- (4) Roxy King, who married Irvin Pelfrey
- (5) Samuel King, who married Annie Mac York.

Another King family in the Oakway area was that of Sylverter Bleckley King (1870-1951) and his wife, F. Mae (Bearden) King (b.1877). Their children were Lesley Claude King, Edwin King, Elmo King, Alton King, Harold King and Elise King.

THE MOORE FAMILY

George F. Moore was a Confederate soldier whose grave is situated at Bethel Baptist Church in the Oakway community. He was born on May 10, 1847, and died February 13, 1922. During the Civil War, he was a member of Co. L, 1st S.C. Rifles (Orr's Regiment). His wife was Margaret E. Moore (18 Dec 1851-6 Apr 1917). He attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Seneca, S.C., in 1916. At that time he resided in the Westminster area of Oconee County, S.C.

THE CAIN FAMILY

Richard Cain (1833-1915) served from Oakway as a corporal in Co. K, 22nd S.C. Infantry and was buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church. In 1909, he was a recipient of a pension for his military service in the Civil War. Some additional Cains of the Oakway community were Thomas Cain (d. 9 Apr 1883), Lydia Cain (d. 20 May 1883), Charles B. Cain (1888-1946), Lillie H. Cain (1899-1962), Moses Cain (1830-1915), Leanna Cain (b. 1845), R.M. Cain (b. 1850) and Sarah L. Cain (1851-1918).

Joseph C. Cain (15 Nov 1863-7 Sept 19230, and his wife, Margaret J. Cain (20 Aug 1855-26 Jan 1948) also resided at Oakway. Also, Maggie O. Cain (28 Dec 1836-30 Sept 1892) was a resident of Oakway.

THE TAYLOR FAMILY

Samuel H. Taylor of Oakway served in Co. F, 22nd S.C. Infantry during the Civil War. He received a battle wound in the back, but he survived the war. His wife was Mary E. Taylor (21 Apr 1844-1 Aug 1917). In 1901 this Confederate veteran received a Civil War pension in Oconee County, S.C. In November 1916 he attended a reunion of Orr's Rifles at Seneca, S.C. Taylor and his wife were buried at Old Center Methodist Church at Oakway. (His grave marker does not contain birth and death dates.)

THE SMITH FAMILY

Among the former residents of Nubbin Ridge was the family of James Roland Smith (19 Jul 1859-21 Dec 1935) and Emiline (Cox) Smith (20 Feb 1866-19 Nov 1941). James Roland Smith was a son of Hulda Smith (d. 1909?) who was of Cherokee Indian descent. (Her husband's name is presently unknown.) She was buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church near the grave of one of her sons, Jeff Dixie Smith (1881-1972). The fourteen offspring of James Roland Smith and Emiline (Cox) Smith are listed below:

(1) Lillie Smith (1882-1908).

- (2) Fair Alexander Smith (7 Feb 1884-1 mar 1954), who married Effie McDonald (b. 23 Sept 1894), daughter of Andrew W. and Tyrenda J. McDonald.
- (3) Cora Cordelia Smith (28 Jun 1886-23 Mar 1949), who married John Allen Busha (4 Sept 1882-24 Feb 1951), son of Mitchell and Alpha (Brady) Busha.
- (4) Julia Etta Renthia Cornelia Smith (9 Oct 1888-14 Jan 1959), who married Lester Ligon Carroll (19 Dec 1888-29 Jul 1959), son of John Peter Carroll, a confederate veteran, and Mary (Hobson) Carroll.
- (5) Lewis Roscoe Smith (b. 4 May 1890- d. 1929), who married <u>Luvinia Smith</u> (d. 1933), who was a Smith before her marriage to Lewis Roscoe Smith
- (6) Climmer Allentine Smith (20 Dec 1872-30 Nov 1967), who married John Calhoun (J.C.) Cromer.
- (7) Alonzo Smith (27 Jan 1894-29 Jan 1960), who married Lucy Allen (?).
- (8) Bertha Luvie Smith (8 Jan 1896-3 Jun 1942), who married Bert Orlander McLain (25 Mar 1889-4 Mar 1973).
- (9) Laura Smith (b. 25 Jun 1898-d. Jun 1963), who married Freeman Jefferson Crumpton (d.ca. 1953?).
- (10) Ollie Glenn Smith (5 Mar 1903-9 Jun 1922), who married Rufus Waters.
- (11) Jessie Elizabeth Smith (13 Jun 1904-4 Dec 1970), who first married John Wood (d. 1958) and later married Jesse Blackwell (1904-1970).
- (12) Belton Clifton Smith (1 Apr 1906-20 Sept 1926), who married <u>Ruby Smith</u>. (She was a Smith before her marriage).
- (13) Rosser Harold Smith (25 Jan 1909-10 Oct 1978), who first married Donnie Mae Freeman (19 Feb 1909-19 Nov 1984) and who later married Ovie Lee Walling.
- (14) Baby Boy Smith (b. 13 Jul 1911, and he died in infancy).

James Roland Smith, the father of the above-listed offspring, died in 1935 and was buried at Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church in Oconee County, S.C. When his widow died in 1941, she was also buried at the same church.

THE MAULDIN FAMILY

Ervin M. Mauldin (1845-1932), a Confederate veteran who served in Co. B, 16th S.C. Infantry and in Co. F 1st S.C. Artillery, was once a resident of the Oakway community. He was one of the longest living veterans in Oconee County. Mauldin's first wife was Rebecca E. (Rogers) Mauldin (1844-1923). His second wife was Caroline (Leathers) Mauldin (1860-1934). In 1916 this Confederate veteran attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Seneca. At that time he resided in the Westminster area of Oconee County. In 1930 he was a recipient of a \$240 annual Civil War pension. He was buried at Bethel Baptist Church near Oakway.

THE GAMBRELL FAMILY

Oakway resident Newton J. Gambrell (16 Apr 1845-9 Sept 1921 and his wife Julia M. Gambrell (12 Jul 1844-10 Dec 1934) were buried at Old Center Methodist Church at Oakway. Newton served as a Confederate soldier in Co. B, 16th S.C. Infantry Volunteers during the Civil War, and in 1930 his widow was recipient of a widow's annual pension of \$160 for her husband's military service. At that time she resided in the Westminster area of Oconee County. The Gambrell's had the following children:

- (1) Edward Monroe Gambrell (13 Jul 1867-18 Jun 1928), who married Janie E. Patterson (25 Feb 1866-10 Jan 1945).
- (2) Augustus Gambrell
- (3) Robert Gambrell
- (4) P. Henry Gambrell (28 Oct 1882-19 Jun 1952), whose wife was Lillie Mae B. Gambrell (b. 26 May 1894).
- (5) Willia (?) Gambrell
- (6) Nettie Gambrell
- (7) Dacus Gambrell



THE SANDERS FAMILY

The Oakway resident Joseph Berry ("Jo Berry") Sanders (8 Jan 1830-Oct 1900) was a Confederate veteran who served as a private in Co. C, 2nd S.C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment) during the American Civil War. His military company was commanded first by Capt. O.M. Doyle, who was promoted to regimental surgeon, and also later by Capt. S.P. Dendy. Private Sanders was paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, when the Civil War ended in 1865. He was married twice-first to Mary Sanders (7 May 1825-6 Aug 1882) and then to Nancy E. Sanders (22 May 1937-17 Aug 1900). In 1880, Joseph Berry Sanders was a schoolteacher in the western division of Pickens

In 1880, Joseph Berry Sanders was a schoolteacher in the western division of Pickens District (now Oconee County). This Confederate veteran and his two wives were buried at Old Center Methodist Church at Oakway. Another Sanders family at Oakway was that of Simon Sanders (1856-1922) and his wife Mary F. (Ables) Sanders (b. 1856).

THE GRANT FAMILY

Samuel "Sammy" Grant, Sr. (6 Oct 1839-19 Dec 1928), a resident of the Oakway community, served as a Confederate soldier in Co. D, 2nd S.C. Rifles (Moore's Regiment) during the Civil War. He was a private in the army, and his company commanders were Capt. D.L. Cox and Cap. S.P. Lanford. This Confederate veteran married Frances E. (Fannie) Cole (27 May 1860-30 Jun 1953), daughter of Nathaniel Pickens "Pick" Cole (1828-1903), who was also a Confederate veteran, and his wife Mary Elizabeth (Ables) Cole (1835-1918) of Oakway. Samuel Grant, Sr. attended the 44th reunion of Orr's Rifles at Seneca, S.C., and in 1928 his widow was a recipient of a Civil War widow's annual pension of \$160. Grant and his wife were both buried at Bethel Baptist Church in Oconee County, S.C.

THE MULLIKIN FAMILY

John Leland Kennedy Mullikin (20 Oct 1840-19 Mar 1931) was born in the Slabtown community of Anderson County, S.C. He was a son of Benjamin Mullikin, Jr. and Sarah Jane ("Jennie") Smith Mullikin. He was named after the prominent Rev. John Leland Kennedy (1801-1877), a longtime minister at Carmel Presbyterian Church in Southern Pickens County, S.C., who also served as headmaster of Thalian Academy at Slabtown. At the age of twenty years, John L. K. Mullikin enlisted on April 14, 1861, as a private in Co. D. 4th S.C. Infantry Volunteers. Mullikin's company was commanded by Captain James Long (1828-1878). After the regiment was reorganized, this soldier enlisted in Co. A, 13th S.C. Battalion on April 21, 1862. On November 16, 1862, he was transferred to Co. K. Hampton Legion Infantry. His older brother, Mattison Harvey Mullikin (22 Oct 1838-15 Oct 19220, also served in Hampton Legion. The parents of these two Confederate had thirteen children, and twelve of them were boys, seven of whom fought in the Civil War. After the war, John L.K. Mullikin walked from Virginia to South Carolina. Then, during the fall of 1865, he married a neighbor girl, Jane Mauldin (1839-1927) who had waited for his return home from the battlefield. His wife was a daughter of Rucker Mauldin, Jr. (b. 1802) and Catherine "Katie" Westbrooks Mauldin. He and his wife had only one child, Emma Mullikin (1868-1956), who married J.T. Bryant (1860-1939). In about 1901, Mullikin, who was a farmer, moved his family to Oakway in Oconee County,

In 1930, Mullikin was a recipient of a Civil War pension in Oconee County. Mullikin and his wife became members of Old Center Methodist Church and were also buried there.







Death of John P. Carroll Tugaloo Tribune, 22 Jul 1924

Mr. John Peter Carroll one of the most substantial farmers of the Oakway section, died at his home near that place, Saturday morning 19th of paralysis. He leaves one brother, Mr. Wm. T. (Thomas) Carroll of Oconee. Mr. Carroll was a model farmer of his section and always made plenty of everything grown on the farm. He will be missed in his community. The deceased had been a member of the Oakway Wesleyan Methodist Church many years. His funeral was conducted on Sunday by Rev. John Cary of Clemson College and the internment made in the Wesleyan Cemetery in the presence of many relatives and friends. Mr. D.G. Sheldon was undertaker and in charge of the burial. Children listed in will are: William, Patience, James, John, Daniel, Sarah, Rebecca, Mary, George He is shown on the 1790 - 1810 Censuses for Pendleton.

1800 Census Book by William C. Stewart, p. 81.

"Association and several land deal connections indicate that the Bruce family in Greenville and Pendleton Districts may have been related to the William Bruce who moved from Albemarle County, VA to Surry County, NC where in 1790 he was a neighbor to a Stewart family that moved subsequently to Greenville District. Land on Saluda River in Pendleton was granted to William Bruce 4 Jan 1790 and sold by Bruce to William Laffoon 20 Mar 1793, with John Keith from Wilkes County, NC as a witness. James Bruce was living on Wolf Creek of 12-Mile River 28 Dec 1792, when land adjacent to his farm was sold by Benjamin Perry to Jonas Hill. The land was granted to Perry 4 Jun 1786. William Stewart of Greenville District bought in 1801 land on Clear Creek in Greenville from Charles Bruce; he seems to have had some connection with William Stewart of Pendleton District (not the William Stewart above) who sold 8 Mar 1796, to William Bruce, land on Carpenter's (formerly Warrior's) Creek, a fork of Saluda River. John Bruce was a witness."



- 1906-1936. Postcards. Miss Ida Parry, 277 Ashland Blvd., Chicago, Ill.; Miss A. E. Parry, 32 S. Washington, Columbia, OH; Miss Grace Parry, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. James Parry, Route 4, New Philadelphia, OH; Mr. Teddy Parry, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. George L. FerRoll, Uhrichsville, OH; Mrs. Ruth C. V. Peart, East Akron, OH; Miss Aurilla B. Parry, Prescott, Ariz.; etc.

- 16173. Isaac F. Eades Bartlesville, OK, 28 Aug 1908. Born in Pickens County, SC. Father was Indian. Grandmother died in SC. Isaac Eades has cousin named Sam Yates who was "drove" from SC with the other Indians. He was one year old in 1851. Ran away from home when 13 years old. "My Indian name is Pilgrim that is my grandmother name my English name is Eads—that is my father name."
- 22 Jan 1908. Letter from John W. Eades, Simpson, OK. "
- My father's name is Miles Anderson Eades. He was in Texas when he got his return card from Washington."
- 18 Nov 1908. Mentions joint affidavit with Isaac Durham, Susan Hester, and Joseph Hendrix. Applications. Birth is 26 Nov 1850, Pickens Court-house, SC. "Claim through my grandmother, Delethe Pilgrim who was a full blood Cherokee Indian." He is married to Alice Eades, age 50. Father is John Thomas Eades, mother is Nancy Ann Durham. Father and mother were born in Pickens, SC and they resided there in 1851. Death of father was in 1867 (info not copied) and mother in 1869 (info not copied). Brothers and sisters: Elizabeth Gillam (1836), Miles Eades (1838), Francis McClannan (1845-1905), Sam Eades, Sarah Smith (1852), John Eades (1855) and Tyler Eades (1859). Children of John Eades and Deletha Pilgrim Eades include: Matt Eades (died 1870), Bill Eades (died 1870) and Hannah Eades Pilgrim.
- 8 May 1908. Letter from Eliza K. Earle to Mrs. Mary K. Harris, 2410 11th St., Meridian, Miss. Mrs. Earle says her grandfather was Nathaniel Reid. Mrs. Earle's mother had said that Mr. Reid had suffered a great loss at the close of the war. "I do not know his father's name. His mother was a Miss Hood, related to General Hood of the Confederacy. My Grandmother was Isabella Brown. Her father's named was Joseph Brown. I have a walnut chest made by him and given to my mother with his initials carved on it and the date." She enclosed a letter from Miss Sallie Brown, daughter of Senator Brown of Georgia. "We are

descended from the same branch of Browns she refers to. Mackey Brown, her grandfather was first cousin to my Mother, also the Broyles (Duffie and Porters spoken of in her letter were my mother's relations.) I think my great great grandfather's name was David Brown, his father was William Brown."

Enclosed letter from A. L. Keith, Selina Kansas to Mrs. Eliza Earle. A. L. Keith writes that he was informed "that your father was William Keith".

12 Aug 1908. Letter from Sophy Reid Chappell, 4248 Morgan, St. Louis, Mo. to Mrs. E. J. Harris, 2410 11th St., Meridian, Miss. She is replying to letter from Mrs. Harris and says her great grandfather was Nathan Reid.

Captain Nathan Reid was born about 1752 and died November 6, 1830. Three brothers, Andrew, John, and Thomas Reid emigrated from County Down, Ireland and settled first in Octavra Co., PA; later moving to Albermarle Co. VA. We do not know which one was the father of Nathan Reid but believe John to have been the one, as my father and grandfather have that name. Captain Nathan Reid married Sophia Thorpe, daughter of Francis Thorpe and Kitty Callaway. Eight children were born to them: John, Betsy, Maria, Nathan, Martha, Francis Thorpe, Mary Anne and Katherine. Nathan Reid was Captain of the 14th VA regiment. Enlisted January 28, 1777, wounded at Brandy Wine on September 11, 1777. Regiment designated 10th VA on September 14, 1778. Transferred to 1st VA Regt. on 12 Feb 1781. Retired 1 Jan 1783. Died 6 Nov 1830. (See Heitmanns History, p. 343.)

Also in the same envelope—not sure it belonged to that envelope. Notes about ladies who had joined the DAR on Nathaniel Reid. Also note about "Sir Wm. Keith was Gov. of Penn. – died bout 1749, a near relative of our Grt. Grandfather Cornelius Keith—had a son named Cornelius.

28 Aug 1908. Letter from Lila Keith Gaines? at Greenville to Mrs. Eugene Harris, Meridian, Miss. Nathaniel Reid who married Sophia Thorpe must have been her great-grandfather therefore father of the Nathaniel Reid who was her mother's father. Nathaniel Reid, her mother's father was also in the war and an office. This Nathaniel Reid married Isabella Brown.

1908-1910. Ledger Book possibly from Mitchell & Reeder Cotton dealers in Oconee County. Some names on M index page. L. T. McAlister, J. T. McAlister, J. N. Moore, Baxter McClain, Wilton Mason, Jack Martin, John McAlister, A. A. McGuffin, A. P. Marrett, Leo Markaleos, Jule Martin, Lee Moon, Jim Mize, S. L. Miller, A. 

Captain Thomas C. Watkins (b. ca. 1825 – d. 26 Feb 1862); served pre-war as militia major; owned and operated tannery, Walker-Emoyle community of Anderson District, S.C.; son of Felix Watkins and Ellen (Robinson) Watkins; pre-war marriage to Margaret Smith (19 Nov 1827 – 19 Oct 1883), daughter of Whitaker Smith (26 Jun 1787 – 12 Sept 1850) and Mary (Moorehead) Smith (b. 8 Oct 1787 – d. 1875); elected major January 29, 1862; elected lieutenant colonel May 5, 1862; fought in Confederate's Maryland campaign of 1862; wounded in Maryland September 14, 1862, during Battle of Crampton's Gap at South Mountain; found/captured by Union troops at Boonsboro, Maryland; sent as wounded prisoner of war to Frederick, Maryland, hospital; died there September 26, 1862; buried in Mt. Olivet Cemetery (grave # 45) at Frederick; was

1st Lieutenant James Orr, elected company commander after Captain Watkin's promotion to major, was not re-elected at regiment's reorganization in May 1862.

2nd Lieutenant James M. Pickens, promoted to 1st lieutenant and later to captain during Civil War; became company commander Oct 15, 1862; captured December 15, 1862, by Union troops at Kinston, N.C. paroled December 15, 1862; wounded June 25, 1863, in Mississippi after having returned to army; survived the war and was paroled at Appomattox Courthouse, Virginia, April 9, 1865.

3rd Lieutenant A. J. Major

survived by wife and seven children.









SERGEANTS AND CORPORALS

1st Sergeant Joshua Jameson (12 Dec 1822 – 10 Dec 1906), son of William Jameson, Jr. (1786 – 1851) and Rebecca (Fowler) Jameson; married Mary Bowen Hunt (24 Nov 1830 – 20 Oct 1899), daughter of William Hunt and Elizabeth (Bowen) Hunt of Greenville District, S.C.; Joshua Jameson and wife had twelve children; he was elected captain of Company G on May 5, 1862; resigned October 15, 1862, because of pulmonary health problems; returned to home in Anderson District and remained there for several months until health improved; returned to the army and served until war ended; post-war service as a magistrate for 24 years in Anderson County and as county supervisor for eight years; he and wife were buried at Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church, northern Anderson County, S.C.

2nd Sergeant John Hunter Cannon (b. ca. 1834 – d. 24 May 1862); promoted to 2nd lieutenant during Civil War; died of disease in army, age 28.

3rd Sergeant Edward H. Watkins (b. ca. 1834 – d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to 1st lieutenant during Civil War, killed in action at age 30 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia.

5th Sergeant William A. Martin (b. ca. 1839 – d. 30 Jul 1864); promoted to 3rd sergeant during the Civil War, killed in action at age 25 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Bolt, Toliver (3 Mar 1833 – 6 Nov 1903); shoemaker in the Confederate States Army; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah (Aberbrombie) Bolt; wife was Nancy Marie (Pritchard) Bolt (3 May 1833 – 8 Dec 1914), daughter of Lewis Pritchard and Harriet (Morris) Pritchard; couple had ten children; buried at New Prospect Baptist Church in Anderson County, S.C.

Bolt, William L. (22 Sept 1836 – 14 Dec 1909); captured by Union troops at South Mountain, Maryland, September 14, 1862; sent to a hospital in Frederick, Maryland; moved January 15, 1863, to another hospital in Baltimore, Maryland; captured by the enemy at Petersburg, Virginia, April 3, 1865; sent to Farmville, Virginia; moved on April 21, 1865, to Point of Rocks, Virginia; survived the Civil War; wife was Cassandra Jolly Bolt (11 Mar 1833 – 31 Dec. 1923); both buried at Hopewell Baptist Church, Anderson County, S.C.









Bolt, William A. (30 Jun 1830 – 12 Feb 1920); lost his right leg (between the knee and ankle) because of battle wound; son of Asa Bolt and Hannah (Abercrambie) Bolt; wife Martha Jane (Clarke) Bolt (1837 – 1919), daughter of Mathew and Jane (Clarke) Bolt; both William A. Bolt and wife were buried at Asbury Clarke Methodist Church, Anderson County, S.C.; they had eight children.

Chastain, R. L. (b.ca. 1834 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 30 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Farmer, Josiah (b. ca. 1827 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 37 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia; buried there at Blanford Church; his wife, Catherine Farmer of Pelzer (Anderson County), S.C., was a recipient of a Civil War widow's pension in 1902.

Fennell, Henry L. (b. ca.1836 – d. 1864); died of disease at age 28 at Richmond, Virginia; buried there in Hollywood Cemetery (grave # V166).

Fennell, William M. (b. 1833 – d. ca. July 1864); died while being held as a prisoner of war at Elmira Prison, Elmira, New York; buried at Elmira in Woodlawn National Cemetery (grave # 221).

Garrett, W. G. (b. ca. 1844 - d. 18 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 20 during Battle of the Crater at Petersburg, Virginia.

Irby was buried in Williamston Memorial Cemetery in Anderson County, S.C.

Irwin, D. C.

Johnson, Harvey W. (b. ca. 1841 – d. 30 Jul 1864); killed in action at age 23 during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Jolly, Levi D., killed in action during Battle of the Crater, Petersburg, Virginia.

Jolly, Wilson

Jolly, William Enos (b. ca. 1839 - d. 14 Dec 1862); son of Joseph Moorehead Jolly and Anna Cole (Sherrill) Jolly of Anderson District, S.C.; brother of Manse Jolly (1840 - 1869) the legendary "unreconstructed rebel" who was sought by Federal authorities after the Civil War—but who fled to Texas where he was accidentally drowned at age 29; William Enos Jolly was promoted from private to sergeant; killed in action at age 22 at Kinston, N.C., December 14, 1862.









Knight, Samuel Thompson (b. 1845), son of Warren Walker Knight (4 May 1816 – 13 Nov 1894) and Amanda (Robinson) Knight (19 Jan 1819 – 22 Nov 1898); father was an early elder of Carmel Presbyterian Church in Pickens District, S.C.; this soldier first enrolled as a private in Hampton Legion Infantry on 20 Oct 1863; received order for exchange with Company G, 22nd Regiment, S.C. Volunteers, during Civil War; captured by Union troops at Five Forks, Virginia, April 1, 1865; later sent as prisoner of war to City Point, Virginia; moved to Point Lookout and paroled on April 3, 1865; left his home in Pickens District, S.C., after Civil War and migrated to Texas; lived in Red River County, Texas, in 1886.

Lambert, Benjamin

Maret, George Washington (16 Mar 1821 – 27 Feb 1903); resided in western division of Pickens District (now Oconee County); survived the Civil War, buried at Beaverdam Baptist Church in Oconee County, S.C.

Maddox, Marvin A. E. (b. ca. 1846); enlisted in army July 1862 at age 16; son of Thomas A. Maddox (7 May 1807 – 10 Dec 1891) and Catherine (Kay) Maddox; (16 Apr 1807 – 27 May 1896); survived the Civil War; paroled April 10,1865

Maddox, Thomas Pinckney (b. ca. 1838 – d. 13 May 1865); son of Thomas A. Maddox (7 May 1807 – 10 Dec 1891) and Catherine (Kay) Maddox (16 Apr 1807 – 27 May 1896); captured by enemy troops at Savannah, Georgia, December 21, 1864; captured again at Burkeville, Virginia, April 14, 1865; taken to U.S. Field Hospital; moved later to City Point, Virginia, and then to Savannah, Georgia; died of consumption at Savannah; five of his brothers also served in the Confederate States Army.

Martin, Chesley (5 Apr 1844 – 24 Oct 1911); survived the Civil War; buried at Hopewell Baptist Church, Anderson County, S.C.

Martin, Warren J. (8 Feb 1823 – 15 Mar 1911; captured by Union soldiers April 1, 1865, at Five Forks, Virginia; sent to City Point, Virginia; moved to Point Lookout, Maryland, where he was paroled on April 4, 1865; he was buried at Sharon Methodist Church in northern Anderson County, S.C.

The Pendleton Messenger Published by Frederick W. Symmes Pendleton, SC

January 30, 1833

First two pages concerns tariffs and state rights.

Editor writes that Union Societies have been organized in the district.

Murder near Stantonville in this district on Jason Howard by John Barkley. "Howard, it is said, was on the road to market, with a wagon; was walking, when met by Barkley and Jeremiah Green, returning from muster. Barkley ordered Howard to give the road, and as he stepped to one side, raised his gun and shot him down. He lived an hour or two—Barkley and Green fled, but Green has since made affidavit... There was no quarrel, but it is said, when Barkley loaded his gun at the muster, he declared his intention of killing another man, with whom he had some difference. He was intoxicated.... John Barkley is about 5 ft. 10 inches high, 43 or 44 years, complexion sallow, with light brown hair, considerably inclined to gray; sandy beard; his chin square; some of his front teeth decayed; he is a shoemaker by trade; drinks freely occasionally, and is very disorderly when drunk; chews tobacco in excess; is very profane in his conversation; is left handed and dressed in homespun. It is supposed he will make either Hall county in Georgia; or Iredell in North Carolina, where he has relations." Reward. [Not sure where Stantonville is located. There is a Stantonville, TN.]

For the Messenger. The following notice, verbatim, was passed up at Sherard's Store, in the southwest corner of Anderson district a few weeks ago.

Notice. Mr. John S. Pressly will be here at this place on the 3d Saturday of the present month and will give his views of Nullification without something particular takes place to hinder him from getting here. A.B.

13 Jan 1833. Mr. ___ accordingly attended, and a large number of the citizens attended also, to hear what was to be said. The meeting was organized, by calling Col. Rice to the Chair. Mr. Pressley opened the proceedings by a speech against nullification. He was replied to by Gen. Whitner. Mr. P followed in a second speech, and Gen. W. rejoined. The meeting adjourned for a short time and on again assembling, was addressed by Maj. Whitefield, in defense of the proceedings of South Carolina. In order to test the sense of the meeting, the following resolution was introduced, and on a division was carried by a majority of three to one, one half the minority, it is said, being from Abbeville.

"Resolved, as the opinion of this meeting, that we regard the assumption of the right claimed by Gen. Jackson to coerce a Sovereign State into obedience to an unconstitutional law by military force, as unwarranted by the Constitution, dangerous to the liberties of the free people of these States, and meriting the denunciations of every Carolinian."

From the Columbia Telescope. Indian Land, York. 7 Jan 1833. "We are going on finely, in getting up Volunteers. Old Indian Land is true, almost to a man. The company in which I muster, volunteered yesterday, with one solitary exception, and forms, altogether, a corps of as bold and resolute fellows, as ever sprung a trigger."


J. M. Phillips

Born March 7, 1857, author of *Shiloh*, the story of a Baptist church for 95 years. Started the smallest print shop in the world in Seneca in 1880—type case 7x7 inches, 3a fonts. West to school 11 months. Seen here picking odd strains from Litz's E major Polonaise from a two hundred year old Strad. Established *Farm and Factory* in 1903. Taught school at Shiloh in 1877 and furnished Martin's Creek locals for *Keowee Courier*. Worked for James P. Harrison & Co., State Printers for Georgia, in 1885, at \$1.35 a week. Attended King's wedding at Shiloah in 1866. King was 17 at this time. Immediately after the ceremony he broke out with, "When I was a single man, I had peace and pleasure; now I am a married man, I've trouble in full measure."



John, Evelyn, Loutitia and Andrew Phillips (left to right) lined up before Hug Phillips' Far mand Factory camera. They stand in front of Stephen Baldwin's residence, built 117 years ago. In this building in March 1832 (Church Record), "A number of brethren living on Martin's Creek and neighborhood thereof, believing it would promote the cause of God to have an arm of the Hebsibah Church established in their neighborhood, petition for that privilege this day granted." Shiloh's first church conference was held in this house April 14, 1832, and the first three members taken in were Uriah and Elizabeth Hembree, by letter, and Mary Phial by experience.

Rev. H.N. Hayes

Born in Anderson District on July 26, 1822; died at Seneca, SC on July 18, 1889. Seneca Baptist Church was organized about 1874. Rev. H.N. Hayes was an original member and preached in the church.



Rev. W.W. Abbott

Born June 16, 1822 and died May 12, 1912. Organized Hopewell Baptist Church on May 10, 1858. He gave the land for the church. Was ordained to the ministry December 1, 1865. Served his church as pastor for a number of years; also other churches. His father-in-law came from County Kent, England, from near Gad's Hill, where Charles Dickens lived. J.M. Phillips, the editor of *Lo Here! Or, Lo There!*, copied the story of his life from the *Baptist Courier* in 1880.

This edition contains controversy between J.M. Phillips, editor and Rev. Gardner, who was born in May 1885. Rev. Gardner was pastor of Seneca Baptist Church.





Mt. Nebo Baptist Oconee County



Sometime about 1885 some disagreements came up in the Seneca River Baptist Association and the result was a split in the churches. Led by the late Rev. W.R. Parker, New Mt. Nebo Baptist Church or Nebo #2 came out from the Old Nebo, or Nebo #1, located on the Southern Railroad. Two more churches did the same, known as Little Abel and Parker's Church.

These three churches were known as the Parker's Association. This church, Nebo #2, purchased two acres from Robert Swinger, recorded on 18 Dec 1888 at \$10.00 per acres. Deacons at the time were Ephriam Wiggins, William Reese, John Milligan.

In 1966, Eugene Ellis was chosen as a deacon. Feaster Hampton, Ben Keasler were added as deacons after 1975.

In 1888 the church was a building about 30 x 38 feet with 10 foot walls facing the north. Thirty years later (1918), another building was constructed under the administration of Rev. C.M. Galloway that was 36 x 40 with 14 foot walls facing the west at a price of approximately \$3,000. Under Rev. J.H. Fowler's administration the church was insulted with asbestos shingles and sealed with sheet rock. Gas heat was installed in 1958. New pulpit furniture was purchased in 1960. The church was bricked in 1963.

make a fair record of the same, and within three months after such return shall transmit the original plat to the office of the surveyor general of the State for the time being, where the same shall be delivered.

[To be appointed in the same manner as surveyor general.]

IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That each and every of the said commissioners of locations shall be appointed in the same manner as the surveyor general is by law to be appointed, and shall enter into bond for the faithful discharge of his duty, together with two good and sufficient securities, in the full and just sum of ten thousand pounds sterling, payable to the treasurers of this State, and shall also, at the same time, before some magistrate, take and subscribe the following oath of office: "I, A B, do hereby solemnly swear or affirm that I will well and faithfully execute the office of commissioner of locations for the district of _____, without giving a preference to any through favor, fear, or reward, according to the best of my skill and ability. So help me God."

[Surveyor general to make plats of land surveyed, and a record of plats and grants to be kept.]

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the surveyor general of this State, V. on the return of the entry and plat of survey to his office from the office of commissioner of locations, shall make out a plat of the lands surveyed as aforesaid, and record and transmit the same, certified, to the office of the secretary of the State, who shall cause a grant to be to be prepared for the same, and the great seal affixed thereto, and shall, within three months thereafter, cause a fair record of all such grants to be made and kept in his said office, with alphabetical indexes; and on every third Friday in the months of January, April, July, and October, the said secretary of the State on the said days respectively, shall lay before his Excellency the Governor for the time being, all such grants by him prepared as aforesaid, who is hereby empowered and directed to sign the same, and thereupon deliver them to the said secretary of the State, to be delivered to the respective grantees, or to their order: Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases, previous to the signing of the said grants, where there shall appear to be any fraud or collusion in the progress of the said entry, warrant, and survey, the Governor or Commander-in-chief for the time being, and any five members of the Privy Council, shall have full power and authority to cause all parties to appear before them, and without delay in a summary manner decide in such as to justice and equity shall appertain.

[Surveyor general to give bond and take an oath.]

VI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said surveyor general shall enter into bond for the faithful discharge of his duty, with two good and sufficient securities, in the same sum, payable in the same manner, and shall also take and subscribe the same oath or affirmation, before the secretary of this State, in the presence of his Excellency the Governor, as is hereinbefore prescribed to be entered into and taken by the several commissioners of locations to be appointed as aforesaid, which bond and oath of affirmation shall be thenceforth recorded in the secretary's office.

[Persons applying for a warrant to take an oath.]

XI And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid. That every person who shall apply for a warrant of survey shall, previous to his obtaining the same, take the following oath or affirmation, to wit: I, A B, do swear or affirm, that I have not heretofore applied for, or obtained from this or any other office in the State, under or by virtue of this Act, either in my own name, or in the name of any other person, any warrant or warrants of survey, for more than six hundred and forty acres of land. So help me God." Which said oath or affirmation shall be administered by the surveyor general, or any one of the commissioners of locations; which said oath or affirmation shall be sent to the respective commissioners of locations in their said offices, before any warrant of survey shall issue for the same.

[Laying off vacant lands on navigable streams.]

XII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That on all creeks or rivers, navigable for shipping or boats, whereon any vacant lands shall lie, the deputy surveyors shall, and they are hereby directed to, lay off the same by measuring four chain back from such river and creek for every one fronting on and bounded by the same; and all surveys not made and regulated by this rule, and any grants which may be obtained thereupon, are hereby declared to be null and void to all intents and purposes.

[Treasury indents a legal tender for lands.]

XIII. And be it, further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all treasury indents of money due and payable by this State to individuals, shall, and they are hereby declared to, be lawful tender at the treasury, as so much money, in payment of all moneys accruing and to become due to this State for lands hereby directed to be granted and sold; any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

[Fees to the surveyor general, & c.]

XIV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the following fees, and no other, shall be demanded or taken by the secretary of the State, surveyor general, commissioners of locations, and deputy surveyors, who shall make out a table of the same, and keep posted up in some conspicuous part of the said respective officers, who shall demand or receive any greater or other fees that is allowed by this Act, each and every such person shall be liable to an indictment for extortion, and on conviction thereof shall pay a fine of 100 pounds sterling, one-half to be paid to the prosecutor, and the other to the treasurers for the time being, for the use of this State,

Secretary of the State's fee for making out the grant, recording the same, and fixing the great seal thereto, ten shillings sterling;

surveyor general's fee for every search, one shilling and two pence sterling;

copy plat, four shillings and eight pence;

recording and sending the same to the secretary's office, seven shillings and six pence;

commissioner's of locations fees; for receiving applications, making entries, and granting warrants of survey under hand and seal of office, four shillings and eight pence; for receiving

ceded by the said treaty to this State, shall be entitled to and possess all the rights, immunities and advantages which the citizens of the **present district of Pendleton** now do, or shall hereafter, possess or enjoy; and be in like manner subject to the payment of taxes, and liable to militia, and all other duties, and subject to all laws to which the citizens of the said district of Pendleton now are, or may hereafter be subjected or made liable to, under the laws of this State.

V. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the Governor be, and he is hereby, authorized and empowered to nominate and appoint three commissioners to make an actual survey and demarcation of the lines and boundaries mentioned and contained in the said treaty, as circumscribing the lands ceded to this State by the said treaty; and that the said commissioners shall cause and procure all the lands mentioned within the said treaty aforesaid, to be surveyed and platted off into tracts containing not less than one hundred acres, nor more than five hundred acres; and that they return a plat of the said territory so ceded as aforesaid, to the Legislature of this State at their next meeting; and for that purpose the said commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to employ one or more surveyor or surveyors, if more than one should by them be thought necessary, to complete the said survey before the next meeting of the Legislature.

VI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the expenses to be incurred in making the said survey, and all other incidental expenses, shall be paid by the Governor, out of the contingent fund.

VII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That for the performance of militia and patrol duty, the inhabitants of the said ceded territory be added to the eighteenth and nineteenth regiments of militia, the commanders of which are hereby authorized to divide the said territory into companies.

In the Senate House, the nineteenth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, and in the forty-first year of the Independence of the United States of America. [19 Dec 1816]


He had lived in Pickens county for 40 years.
