

Re: Pages from the Durham-Garves Bible and questions regarding identity of the person(s) placing markers on graves of SARAH CATHERINE ALBERTSON and LIZZIE RICE PARKER

Francis Marion Durham (1835-1913) was my great-grandfather. The entries in the Bible were made by his daughter and my grandmother, Ida Rose Annie Durham Garves (1883-1964). This Bible record proved to me that Francis Marion's step-daughter Lizzie Rice was the same person as **Mary Elizabeth Parker**. There are two grave markers in Walhalla Baptist Church cemetery with only the names "Durham" and "Rice". I believe the two markers are the graves of **Francis Marion**'s wife **Sarah Catherine Albertson** and his stepdaughter **Lizzie Rice Parker**.

Mrs. Durham was a member of the Walhalla Baptist church. She spent the most of her life in this county. and her life was a long and useful one. She was nearing her 80th year. She was first married to a Mr. Rice, and after his death she married F. M. Durham, who died in 1912, He was a Confederate soldier. She is survived by three children-Miss Lizzie Rice, of this community; Mrs. B. D. Garvis, of Charleston, and John M. Durham, of Walhalla, all of whom were at the bedside for the past two weeks. Funeral services were conducted at the home by Rev. L. M. Lyda, and her remains were laid to rest in the Baptist cemetery at Walhalla at 3 o'clock on Thursday afternoon, Dec. 7th, the services being concluded at the grave.

Brick Wall Searching for PHILIP DUFF—

My mother was Leah Duff, a direct descendent of **Philip Duff**. I cannot find his birthdate, where born, and who his parents were. I have searched for 40 years and have searched many texts, microfilms, written letters, been to the Family History Library in Utah several times, and joined various genealogy societies in South Carolina. I have searched land records, probate records, military records, tax lists, deed books, etc. The earliest record of him was in a will witness record in 1792 in Greenville Co., S. C. He was in several land records in Greenville Co., S.C. from 1799 to 1803. This mostly occurred on the Saluda River. He and his family moved to Illinois with the earliest record of 1810. So don't know when they arrived there. He was in the 1810, 1820, and 1830 censuses in Illinois and in several state censuses. He died 11 January 1836 and is buried in the Middle Fork cemetery. No burial records exist. But I do have a picture of his headstone. Perhaps his brothers include Denis and William. Several Duff's were transported to America as they were enemies of the crown as they fought in the battle of Culloden. Several people suggest he was born in Georgia or Kentucky but have found no verification of that. These people are deceased so this makes this a bit more difficult. I realize that few records were kept this early but I keep trying.

I also have many land records for Denis that suggests he was from the 96th district so wonder if Philip is from there also. Family tradition states 13 brothers came before the Revolutionary War and said they would always name some of their offspring after them and their brothers. But, as with most family traditions, only so much is true!

Anne Sheriff reported that she had written the grant for the 100 Year Reunion of the Upcountry. She also reported that 10-12 people went on search for Confederate soldiers' graves at Aaron Boggs Mt. Tabor, Old Mt. Zion, Silas Clayton Cemetery on Chastain Road and Sharon Methodist Church. Sharon Church has about 15-20 soldiers graves however will not be searched because it is located in Anderson County.

She reported that 72 crosses are need and will cost \$20 to \$30 each. The UDC doesn't have the funds for the project. Old Stone Church has replaced 40 crosses that had been stolen.

Help is needed to organize these articles this coming Wednesday at the Clayton Room located at Southern Wesleyan University.

Keith Brown announced that the May meeting will be held Saturday, May 19, 2012 at 6:00PM at the Oconee Heritage Center in Walhalla. Come early and tour the town. Member will pay \$5.00 and non-members will pay \$10.00. There will be NO Tuesday meeting in May.

Keith Brown introduced the speaker of the evening, Scott Alexander. Scott gave a most interesting talk on the history of

Oconee Station, which is located half-way between Walhalla and Salem on Hwy 11. The station was established in 1792 and has had a great deal of impact on the history of the region. It is open on Saturday and Sunday for 1-5.

The major attractions are hiking on marked trails, wildflowers and trail to waterfall with an 800 ft. elevation change.

Joann Brewer gave a report on refreshments. The refreshments for this evening were provided by Kathleen Willard, Ellen Neal, and Ernest Lanier.

The refreshments were provided by Nancy Holcombe, Katie Gillespie, and Marilyn Boren.



Sam Rudd lived most of his life in Anniston, Calhoun County, Alabama, but was buried in Cleburne County, AL. I'm trying to contact some of his granddaughters that put postings on Genforum Genealogy several years ago, but I've hit a brick wall



Sam Rudd and Thomas' grandmother married Feb. 3, 1923, in Greenville, SC. Their marriage only lasted for a short time. We believe Sam never knew he had a daughter in SC. Thomas' grandmother wouldn't let anyone talk about him or ask questions. After her death we started researching him. We found him in



Georgia working at Cedartown Cotton Export. This was before he married Thomas' grandmother. We believe he was bringing the cotton to the mill in Greenville when they met. Sam lived most of his life in the Anniston, Alabama and worked in cotton mills.

Sam had an old milk can filled with rocks when we first found it. The picture to the left shows the old Milk Can marker next to the new marker placed by Tom and Nancy Holcombe.

MEMBERS LEARN ABOUT ONLINE HISTORIC NEWSPAPERS

A four-person team from Columbia attended the April meeting to inform OPD members and guests about the South Carolina Digital Newspaper

Program (SCDNP). The guest speakers included Kate Boyd, the University Libraries Digital Collection Librarian; Project Director Santi Thompson; Virginia Pierce, a metadata and outreach specialist; and Craig Keeney, a Published Materials Cataloger.

Digitized newspapers are available online and can be easily read, compared to microfilm. It is a great tool for genealogists who want to search newspaper articles.

Thompson explained that the state project is part of a national program sponsored by the National Endowment of the Humanities and the Library of Congress called Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers

http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/

Thompson explained that during the first 2-year grant cycle, the SCDNP digitized 103,352 pages from 19 newspapers ranging from 1860 to 1922, when copyrights began. During the second phase, the timeframe for the project was extended back to 1836.

In the Old Pendleton District area, newspapers "Keowee Courier" (1860-1922) and "Anderson Intelligencer" (1860-1917) are already online.

The group will be adding 1849-1859 to the "Keowee Courier" and will also digitize "The Pickens Sentinel" from 1871-1922.

He said that an advisory board helps select the titles to digitize and focuses on newspapers of record and those with complete sets.

Keeney, who also writes essays on each newspaper, explained the history and significance of several local historic papers that have been digitized and advised everyone to use this free federal resource. Pierce showed the audience how to navigate through the main source websites, including search and print aspects. She maintains a blog on the SCDNP site and said all the information covered during this meeting could be found online in a webinar (web-based seminar) on their website http://library.sc.edu/digital/newspaper/

The presentation was also covered by the Old Pendleton District Chapter Facebook page, with links to Digital Collection and the Chronicling America sites.

NEW BOOKS BY JERRY ALEXANDER

Jerry Alexander is writing two new family history books at the same time!. Yep, two!

One is called, "Alexanders--our family legacy in Oconee and Pickens Counties." Scores of signatures of old Alexanders long dead and gone grace this book's most unusual cover. Jerry goes way back to concentrate on Alexander immigrants as they sailed aboard a cramped little ship from Northern Ireland to Philadelphia, then journeyed in increments over two decades by covered wagon here to Crow Creek, Keowee and Little Rivers. The book contains over 350 pages of extremely old photographs, including an indeed rare one of Daniel D. Alexander, patriarch of the Little River set, and many others. It is loaded with old deeds, wills, letters, maps, photos of home places and several actual early Alexander log cabins. The new book specifically focuses on those very early generations and does not get into modern times much, so it will be an attraction to many genealogists. He plans to have it for sale at the 100-year Celebration at Southern Wesleyan University in June.

Jerry's second book is entitled simply "Hopping Billy" and focuses on Billy's three families by marriages to Celia Boon, daughter of Ratliff Boon and Nancy Harris Boon, who settled Jocassee Valley in 1790; Anna Robertson of Keowee River, and Catherine Crenshaw of Crow Creek. An added double feature is two very rare and extensive genealogies of the fabled Boon family and the Robert Harris family of England, into Virginia, into North Carolina and finally, members here in S.C. Even the famous James and Mary Boon McKinney family is featured. The book also runs over 350 pages and is indeed a jewel for genealogists.

Other books by Jerry Alexander: The Cateechee Story, Where Have all our Moonshiners Gone?, Old Pickens District, SC, Alexander Families of Upper SC.



When the Great Depression hit the United States in 1929, the American economy hit rock bottom. The value of the dollar became nearly worthless and millions of Americans lost their jobs. In 1933, President Franklin D. Roosevelt introduced "The New Deal", a series of new programs designed to pick America back up on to its feet and get the economy moving again.

The Works Progress Administration (WPA) was one of those programs. Initially designed to fund the building and improvement America's infrastructure, it also funded the arts, history, and culture of America. In short, the WPA employed out-of-work Americans who were certified by local agencies as meeting certain qualifications.

The WPA was born in 1935 with an initial appropriation of \$4.88 billion dollars from the Emergency Relief Fund. Over the years, the WPA would employ some 8.5 million Americans, and spent a total of \$11 billion dollars. Interestingly, half of those workers were employed in New York City alone!. Typical WPA workers were paid \$15 to \$90 dollars a month. It remains today as the most vigorous attempt in history to stimulate the U.S. economy. In 1939, the WPA was renamed to the Works Projects Administration. The WPA lived for only eight years.

THE 1940 CENSUS PROJECT - CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS



1940 U.S. CENSUS COMMUNITY PROJECT ANNOUNCES CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS TO CREATE FREE, SEARCHABLE DATABASE OF 1940 U.S. CENSUS RECORDS

Most Informative Record of American Life prior to U.S. WWII Involvement Has Potential to Unlock New Insights into the Past, Discovery of Unknown Family Connections

The 1940 U.S. Census Community Project—a joint initiative between the National Archives and Records Administration

(NARA), <u>Archives.com</u>, <u>FamilySearch.org</u>, <u>findmypas</u> <u>t.com</u>, and other leading genealogy organizations -organized a national service project to create a free, high quality, searchable database of the 1940 U.S. census records. Through the indexing efforts of online volunteers across the U.S., records from the 1940 census that were closed by law for 72 years will be easier to find. These census records capture countless untold stories of those who lived through the Great Depression—great men and women who have been called "the greatest generation."

With the support of NARA, the 1940 U.S. Census Community Project is leading the digital transformation effort to create an index entirely by online volunteers. Fueled by the joy of discovering fascinating surprises from their own family history, volunteer indexers are excited to join many thousands of Americans in an online community effort to make the historic 1940 U.S. census readily searchable for others. "Many of us living today know someone in the 1940 U.S. census, but we may not know much more than their name or the town in which they lived," said David S. Ferriero, archivist of the United States. "The 1940 census will unlock some of these mysteries for us. We are delighted to join with the U.S. Census Community Project to produce an index which will make this census much more user-friendly."

When complete, the index and images will also be available online for free through the sponsoring organizations' websites. Those interested in lending a hand can learn more and sign up to be an official 1940 U.S. census volunteer indexer at the <u>1940</u> <u>census</u> website (the1940census.com). The project aims to make available to the public a fully functional, free, and searchable record database by the end of 2012. By mid-April some smaller states like Delaware were already complete and accessible online.

"Many parallels exist between life in 1940 and 2012: international conflict, the political intrigue of an election year, and efforts to rebuild a flagging economy," said Dan Lynch, spokesperson for 1940 U.S. Census Community Project. "Our goal is that through the work of online volunteers across the nation, a fully digitized and searchable database of the <u>1940 census</u> records can help strengthen connections between Americans, their families, and an important time in our collective history while bringing renewed understanding of the resolute courage past generations had in restoring America."

The 1940 U.S. Federal Census is the largest, most comprehensive, and most recent record set available featuring the names of people living in the U.S. at the time. In fact, the census contains more than one million pages and features a depth of detail that paints a more complete portrait than was previously available of the 132 million people living in the U.S. during the Great Depression. From this new vantage point, we can learn about the life and times of our people living 72 years ago. Several new census questions appeared for the first time in 1940, including:

- Where people lived five years prior to the census
- Highest educational level achieved
- Detailed income and occupation


Perhaps more so than at any other time in American history, these individuals taught us lessons in hardship and survival. The Great Depression, the Dust Bowl, and the subsequent New Deal programs have left an indelible footprint on American history. In addition, many of these men and women listed in the 1940 census went on to support the fight or actually fought in World War II. Helping index the census, for many, is a way of giving something back to this great generation and rightfully preserving their place in our nation's history.

- And develop a volunteer staff from the diverse cultures and backgrounds of the Oconee County population for identifying, collecting and cataloging historical items and for staffing the center.



Planning is well underway and early registration is open for the Annual South Carolina Genealogical Society Summer Workshop, which takes place at the SC Archives in Columbia on Friday and Saturday, July 13-14, 2012. Many great sessions are planned and exciting speakers lined up.

Headlining are Tony Burroughs, internationally known genealogist, and Jan Alpert, past president of the National Genealogical Society, will deliver lectures at the South Carolina Genealogical Society's 40th Annual Summer Workshop.
