



The SC Archives are important to everyone interested in SC genealogy and we do not want the General Assembly to cut their budget any further. We do not want what happened in Georgia to happen here. Please feel free to let your genealogy friends and chapter members know that we need their help. We've got to let the folks in the State House know that this is important to us.

The officers and members of the South Carolina Historical Association are concerned about the severe cuts suffered by the SC Department of Archives and History over the last decade. As the center for the depository and preservation of South Carolina's significant documentary history from its first settlement in Charleston in 1670 through the 20th century, these important records are not only historically significance to our state but also to our nation's history. To name just a few, this agency houses and preserves such important national documents as the SC Ordinance of Secession (1860), SC Ordinance of Nullification (1832), and one of the few remaining original state copies of the Declaration of Independence (1776). Not only are these important documents threatened by a lack of professional staff to monitor and make accessible for public viewing and research, thousands of other historic records of our state's history are threatened. Below are a few examples:

- 1. Records of one of our most distinguished military leaders, Francis Marion, are held at the SC State Archives. Most know that he was commonly referred to as the Swamp Fox who made significant contributions to gaining independence from Britain as a guerrilla leader in occupied South Carolina, (1780 to 1782). Documents of his service include an orderly book, 1773-1782, and copies and extracts of his letters and correspondence from his lifetime. These are in Record Group Number 900000.
- 2. Records of Anderson as the first city in America to operate on a continuous electric power source are deposited at the SC State Archives. Files on Walt Whitner, who designed the hydroelectric power plant on

the Rocky River in 1894 and revised and improved it further, show why this upstate city is worthy of the name, "Electric City." Record Group 001054.



- 3. Records for Laurens County provide details on its name sake, Henry Laurens, President of the Continental Congress and native Charleston. Other important details about the pivotal battle of Musgrove Mill (August 1780) are also held at the SC State Archives, all of which provide citizens with valuable details about the early history of the county. These are found in Series Numbers .S 213089, .P 900356. .P 900012.
- 4. Records for Clemson College provide valuable details on the early history of this state university. A total of 32 series,

group, and item level records for this institution are held by the SC State Archives. These include valuable information on important leaders, programs and developments at Clemson. One of these programs is the SC Agricultural Experiment Stations that became an important public service to all regions of the state soon after Clemson opened in the 1890s. Some of these records are found in Record Group 251000, .S 251003.

All of these records are preserved and are available to all citizens of South Carolina to see on request. They document a rich history on a national, regional and even local level. However, during the last decade, this state agency has suffered severe cuts to its dedicated staff and therefore its important services to the state and its citizens. With a staff now numbering just twenty-three we urge that the legislature carefully review the difficult conditions to which this agency has been reduced. It is now imperative that the SC Department of Archives and History begin to see their state revenue increase.

By reversing the reductions of the last decade, the staff of the SC State Archives can begin to restore its severely reduced services to citizens of the state. It is paramount to the continuing mission of the SC Department of Archives and History that to adequately preserve, store and make accessible its valuable historical records that a new effort be implemented by the legislature to appropriate additional funds for this agency. This will allow it to hire professional staff lost over the years due to budget reductions. Such positions include records management, conservation, and preservation.

Our state has always prided itself in its rich history and contributions to the nation. It is important that this long history of South Carolina documented in these records be preserved and made accessible. This can only happen when an adequate, trained staff is available to catalogue, store and protect these for current and future generations of South Carolinians. Without proper staffing and resources, generations in the future will lose significant portions of their heritage, the hallmark of any educated society.

Mrs. Nettie Selfridge Goodman

<u>Clemson College</u>, Aug. 12. – *Mrs. Nettie Selfridge Goodman* died today at Norcross, Ga. She was a niece of Admiral Selfridge of the United States navy and a direct descendant of Plymouth Rock settlers. Her remains will be interred at Old Stone church, near Clemson, tomorrow. She was the mother of Jno. S. Goodman of Clemson. [State – 14 Aug. 1902; transcribed by Marla Zwakman]

Yesterday afternoon the remains of *Mr. Hugh Powers*, one of the students of Clemson College, who died at that institution of pneumonia, passed through the city on their way to Georgetown, the home of the deceased young man. An escort of a detail of two of the students of the institution accompanied them. The deceased was a son of the Rev. J. J. Powers of Georgetown. [State – 22 Oct. 1893; transcribed by Marla Zwakman]

Pickens, Feb. 1. – *Avery Looper*, a well known and highly respected young man of the Cross Roads community, died Sunday in the 37th year of his age. The funeral was held Monday afternoon by the Rev. D. W. Hiott at Cross Roads church. [State – 2 Feb. 1916; transcribed by Marla Zwakman]



GROWING UP A CHANDLER IN PICKENS, SC

CFA newsletters contain stories about interesting Chandler ancestors from long ago. The researchers invariably use data from censuses, property records, tax records, wills, birth certificates, marriage certificates, and other legal documents. Oral family stories, family letters, and family Bibles supply information that gives life to each story. One common thread among these stories is the comment that "There may be additional unnamed children." Many of us descend from these unnamed children and we miss the satisfaction of knowing about much of our ancestry. My story is about my oldest known ancestor who is one of those missing children.

My Chandler ancestors were few and they all lived in Pickens by 1895. Pickens is a small town located at the corner of South Carolina, North Carolina, and Georgia. When this county was first settled it was part of the Old Pendleton District. Most area residents worked in manufacturing or retail. Farming was already a thing of the past in the SC hill country when I was born there in 1946.

The patriarch of my family was my grandfather and he ran a small grocery store near Pickens Mill. William Forrest Chandler was born in Pickens on August 9, 1897. He and my grandmother, Lunette Swayngham Chandler, lived next door to me and they were as much a part of my life as my parents. Grandfather had one brother, George Chandler, and he married my grandmother's sister. George and Leona lived about a quarter mile from me and Uncle George farmed until he retired. Grandfather had a sister, Ada, who married Horace Powell and they lived about five miles from us. Grandfather had a half-sister but we never knew her or her family.


My father, William David Chandler (1927), was Grandfather Chandler's only son. Dad had two sisters, Hazel and Mary, but neither ever married or had any children. Uncle George and Aunt Leona Chandler had no children. You get the picture – we were a small close-knit family.

As a small close-knit family, we often spent time as a group. However, ancestry rarely was discussed. I do recall my grandfather driving me to a new plant construction site and telling me that this location was his father's farm. I was a small child and I did not ask any questions. In grandfather's later years he gave me an Elgin Railroad watch that had been his fathers. Some years later it was cleaned and the jeweler told me that he knew the watch was made February 14, 1893 because that date was stamped inside the back cover.

George, Forrest, and Ada have been gone for over forty (40) years. Their knowledge of the family history is lost forever. My father passed in 1966. My brother, sister, and I would like to know more about our ancestry but there is no one to ask.

Grandfather was a good man who worked every day and always was serious by nature. I loved to go to the store and help grandfather stock can goods and sell penny candy. He had a glass case with every kind of candy and gum imaginable. He had a cola cooler that was water cooled and the drinks were very cold. This was paradise for a small child. Adults would hang out at the grocery store so I learned a lot about the community and local politics as a child.

Grandmother was a housewife who rarely left home. They had a three quarter acre vegetable garden that consumed spare time in summer. I was often drafted to help in the garden but not without a fuss. Grandfather often drove an A Model truck that was made by taking out the rumble seat and adding a wooden bed. Grandfather played a five string banjo, but not very often and not very well. He taught me how to pick out Cripple Creek when I was in grade school.






Picture on Right: George Newton Chandler and Leona Swayngham Chandler Picture on left: William Forrest Chandler and Lunette Swayngham Chandler

My aunts kept the car until one passed and drove it until he bought a 1949 Pontiac. He parked the 31 on one side of his garage and the Pontiac on the of Uncle George from WW1, their wind up victrola, and their 1931 Chevy. Uncle George bought the Chevy new outgoing type and she often had my siblings and I over to play. She and George would show us their pictures Uncle George Chandler was a quiet, serious man like my Grandfather. Aunt Leona was the friendly,



A search for information on my great -grandfather, William Pless Chandler, turns up several local newspaper articles about his fine cotton crop. The textile mills were being built in the era that William Pless came to Pickens. Did he come here to raise cotton for local customers? Perhaps his family had passed through this area before moving to Georgia? My cousin, Ada's daughter, has the books he kept for Town Creek Baptist Church. The church no longer exists. I have a book that I believe to have been his – The Mineral Wealth of Virginia. Was he involved in mining at some point? Was mining the reason why his parents went to White County? My mother told me that she remembered him and that he told her he had two brothers who were professionals. Did she remember correctly for sixty years?

The Search Begins for William Pless Chandler

Our Great -Grandfather's ancestry search began with his death certificate and obituary. My grandfather supplied the information and it said that William Pless Chandler was born May 31, 1862 in White County, Georgia. His father was Robert Chandler and his mother was Mary. Did grandfather not know his grandmother's maiden name?

A check of the census showed that William Pless Chandler and Hattie Earle were married in 1893 and his parents were both born in Georgia. Censuses are notoriously poor and this incident was no exception. Some years he was William P Chandler and others he was William M Chandler or William D Chandler. The death certificate said William Pless Chandler so we assume Pless, or Pleasant, was his middle name. His age calculated back from the census to a birth year of 1862, 1857, and 1868. Again, censuses are notoriously wrong. We decided to look at Georgia birth certificates and other records in White County, Ga.

Trips to White County, Habersham County, Lumpkin County, and the Georgia archives resulted in little usable information. White County was formed in 1857 from Habersham County. It was five years old when great -grandfather was born and the Civil War was raging. That area was Cherokee land until 1832. I learned that pioneers came to North Georgia for cheap land and adventure. White County was in the area that gold was discovered and mined. My ancestors were Pioneers! A check of the White County censuses for 1860 and 1870 showed no Chandlers. 1862 was a Civil War year: Could Mary have gone to her parents to live while Robert fought in the war? Did the parents move to White County and leave before the 1870 census?

The Mossy Creek area of White County was previously Habersham County. The only documented Chandler family in Habersham was Hezekiah Chandler and his descendants. Hezekiah died in 1844 and most of his children moved on to Alabama. A search of Hezekiah's descendants did not turn up a missing William. Nearby Franklin, Hall, Walton, and Elbert Counties had quite a few Chandlers.

Georgia censuses from 1820 to 1880 were searched but the results were inconclusive. The names Robert, William, and Mary are used repetitively in our family. A William was found in Jackson County in 1870 among children by other names, but no parents were with him. How might we determine if this is my ancestor when parents are not with him? Was this my ancestor? Was he a war orphan?

After frequently reaching dead ends in our search, my sister asked my brother and I to do Y-DNA test to find our ancestry. We match to other Chandlers but with very distant relationships. Our Y-DNA was put in the CFA group 26 (other). Our DNA matches lines are distant but they appear to go back to Halifax County, Virginia. My guess is that they were in Virginia at about the time of the American Revolution.

Pioneers move to areas with few birth records. Marriage records are largely in the family Bible. Wills, where they exist, may not include children in a distant land. No doubt many other Chandlers are undocumented like my William Chandler. Many of you have spent years searching for have. Many of you have turned to DNA testing to connect the missing links. I am grateful to the CFA for providing us the platform to work together in solving these mysteries. If you have any information that might help clear up this mystery, please contact me.

Addington is Charged with Black Death

March 14, 1940 Easley Progress Warrant Signed By Coroner Following Inquest Held Saturday

A warrant charging Henry Addington, 40, with death of Jake R. Black, 45, was signed Saturday by Coroner Dennis H. Rampey following an inquest held in Black's death Saturday afternoon. Spectators filled the council chamber of the city hall here where the hearing was originally scheduled but officials in charge had the inquest changed to the Northside school auditorium where more room space was afforded. Around 500 persons crowded the school to witness the investigation.

The coroner's jury after hearing one eye witness to the shooting, Ellison Richey, and a statement prepared by Dr. N. C. Brackett, said Black came to his death from gunshot wounds at the hand of Henry Addington.


Mr. Richey was the only witness testifying besides Dr. Brackett.

Mr. Richey said that Addington shot Black following an argument between the two on land boundaries. He said that Addington charged Black with saying that some timber was cut on his (Addington's) land.

Addington was not present for the inquest. The shooting occurred on February 19.

Dr. Brackett's statement, which was read at the inquest, said Black's death was due to gunshot wounds in the head. Black however suffered five buckshots in the back: one in the neck and two in the head. The shots in head entered through his face, the statement said.

Solicitor Robert T. Ashmore of Greenville and G. G. Christopher of Pickens assisted Coroner Rampey at the hearing.




Henry Addington was the son of Robert Posey Addington b. 1871 d. 2941 and Martha Eulalah (Lula) Brooks b. 1878 d. 1906. Lula Brooks was the daughter of Preston (Pet) Sylvester Brooks b. 1854 and Martha C. Miller b. 1865 d. 1880. Preston Brooks was the brother of our Thomas Warren Brooks, Jr. b. 1844 d. 1927.

The location of the land dispute is now the **Greenville- Pickens Speedway** on Hwy.123 in Easley, SC. The property was an inheritance to Martha Eulalah (Lula) Brooks Addington from her mother, Martha C. Miller Brooks who inherited 25 acres from her father Tillman S. Miller b. 1800 d. 1871 buried at George's Creek Baptist Church in Easley, SC. Tillman Miller was the father of 23 children by 2 wives- Martha was his last child.






Lt. Thomas Herbert "Hub" Williams (1844–1890)

A member of a well-known Salubrity family, Thomas Herbest (Hub) Williams was born in Pickens District in 1844, the son of William Stanton and Harriett (Worthington) Williams. He was a grandson of Jeremiah and Charity (Stanton) Williams. Shortly after the outbreak of the War Between the States, Hub Williams, then only 16, enlisted in the Palmetto Sharpshooters. Two years later, he was commissioned. a second lieutenant. During the war, he served in Bratton's Brigade. When the war ended, he joined a group of ex-Confederate soldiers, led by Manson (Mans) Jolly of Anderson District. Because the "unreconstructed rebêls" soon came into conflict with Yankee occupation troops stationed in Anderson, Manse Jolly and Hub Williams decided to leave South Carolina. They went to Milam County, Texas, in the fall of 1866. Jolly was accidentally drowned there in 1869, when he attempted to ride his horse across a rain-swollen creek. On June 17, 1875, Hub Williams married Emily Massingale, and the couple became the parents of seven children. Then in 1890, when he was fortyfive years of age, Thomas Hub Williams died. He was buried near Maysfield, Texas, in the Line River Cemetery, where Mans Jolly had also been laid to rest two decades earlier. 


