

Adjutant Ron Masters of Camp 71 introduced Mrs. Anne Sheriff, who detailed the history of the 150 Confederate Project.

Pickens County History Society Vice-President Wayne Kelley read the names of 38 Confederate Soldiers and the church or family cemetery where Confederate Crosses have been placed.

Three additional crosses have been placed at the graves of three soldiers at Saluda Hill Baptist Church.

In addition to locating the grave sites, the group is gathering documentation including military service, pension, and census records kept on file at the Clayton Family Research Center.

Adams to speak about Dr. Basil Manly at September meeting

Seneca resident, Kevin Adams, will be the guest speaker at the September 17 meeting of the Old Pendleton District Genealogical Society which will be start at 7 p.m. at the Central-Clemson Library on Highway 93 in Central. His topic will be Dr. Basil Manly, Sr., a well known Baptist preacher, educator and Confederate.

He became a Baptist preacher and went to Beaufort College and USC. He started Edgefield First Baptist Church and became the pastor of Charleston First Baptist at the request of Dr. Richard Furman.

Manly served as Chaplain to the Confederate Congress in Alabama in 1861 when Jefferson Davis was nominated as President.

Basil became the second president of the University of Alabama and was a driving force in the formation of the Southern Baptist Convention. He and his two sons were instrumental in the founding of Furman University, the Southern Baptist Seminary at Greenville and the Seminary at Louisville.

He lived in Greenville later in life and is buried with his family in Springwood Cemetery.

Adams 1993 graduate of Clemson University and is a member of the Old Pendleton District Genealogical Society, Sons of Confederate Veterans and the Seneca Baptist Church Historical Committee.

He is the author of a book about the Adams of Chauga River, and has details on several other Oconee County families connected to the Adams family. He has also written articles for the Oconee and Anderson County Heritage Books.

Central Area Bridge Named for Samuel Maverick

The bridge over Highway 123 on Eighteen Mile Road near Central was dedicated as the Samuel Maverick Bridge following a ceremony on Friday, August 16 at the Central History Museum.

Beverly Cureton of the Central Heritage Society welcomed the crowd of about 40 people gathered to witness the unveiling on the signs that were later placed on the bridge. Central Mayor Mac Martin greeted the guests and dignitaries. Anne Sheriff of the Central Area Business Council spoke to the group followed by State Senator Larry Martin, State House representative B. R. Skelton and Trey Whitehurst from the Pickens County Council.

Wayne Kelley, Vice President of the Pickens County Historical Society read the Senate resolution that was passed by the South Carolina General Assembly naming the bridge after Samuel Maverick.

Samuel Maverick Sr.

Maverick Family History


Samuel Maverick Sr. was born in 1772 in Charleston, one of eleven children. He married October 5, 1802 Elizabeth Anderson, daughter of General Robert Anderson (Anderson County) and they had five children: Samuel Jr., Ann Caroline, Robert, Mary Elizabeth and Lydia Ann.

Samuel Maverick Sr. was not born into wealth. He was selling molasses candy on the Charleston streets to help support his mother and father when he was less than 15 years old. His father (also Samuel) was in the Revolutionary War and never recovered from an injury.

Mr. Maverick moved from Charleston to Pendleton in the early 1800s to escape the heat and mosquitoes of the low country. He was considered the wealthiest man in South Carolina at one time.

When he died in 1852, he owned 4,400 acres around his home place and 33,000 acres in Pickens County, much of it adjacent to his home, Montpelier.

He owned 100 lots on King and Meeting streets in Charleston District with lands in Abbeville, Colleton, Edgefield, Greenville, Laurens, Lexington, Newberry, Orangeburg, Spartanburg, and

Sumter. It is said that his son traveled all the way to Texas, sleeping on his father's land each night.

Samuel Maverick Sr. was known to have corresponded with Thomas Jefferson about vineyards and orchards and how to grow crops on the waters of Eighteen Mile Creek, next to the bridge.

Samuel Maverick Sr. and his son were friends with John C. Calhoun, even though they did not always agree with Calhoun's ideas.

Montpelier

Samuel Maverick's home "Montpelier" is located about two miles from the bridge, across from Refuge Church near the intersection of Eighteen Mile Creek Road and Highway 88. It was the home of Samuel Maverick Sr. and Samuel Maverick Jr.

The original house was destroyed by fire in the late 1840s.

In 1849, Maverick began the construction of a second Montpelier on the original site.

The floor plan of the house consists of four large rooms on the

ground floor, two on each side of a spacious hall which runs the length of the house. From this hall, a set of stairs rises to the second floor where the same floor plan is repeated. The house is still being used as a home.

Samuel Maverick, Jr.

Their son, Samuel Augustus Maverick, Jr. (1803-1870) traveled with his widowed sister to the Maverick lands in Alabama. They left Pendleton with 45 slaves, a wagon, a carriage, twenty horses, and \$644.50 in cash.

Samuel Sr. instructed his son of buy large tracts of land in Texas and sent him gold buried in boxes of seed to pay for it.

After Samuel Maverick, Jr. moved to Texas in 1835, he took part in the struggle for independence. He was a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence and Maverick County, Texas is named in his honor.

Samuel Maverick, Jr. was at the Alamo but left to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence just before the Mexicans overran the fort and killed most of the ones inside.

Samuel Maverick was given 300 head of cattle in payment for a debt. He left the cattle with one slave in charge on his remote ranch near the Gulf of Mexico. He herd ran wild, and it was generally known that any unbranded or stray cattle were "mavericks."

He was elected by the people of San Antonio to represent them in the Seventh Texas Congress and was later elected to the Texas Legislature after the state was annexed into the United States of America.

- 4. Mary Elizabeth Maverick was born December 23, 1807, in Charleston, and was first married to Joseph Turpin Weyman and he died at Montpelier Plantation on May 20, 1834. She married Joseph Thompson of Lauderdale County, Alabama on October 14, 1836.
- Lydia Ann Maverick was born at Montpelier on June 28, 1814 and married William Van Wyck in Pendleton.

Family history book dedicated to Clayton Research Center

Thirty years after graduating from Southern Wesleyan University, Sarah Pitts-Holmes returned to the Central campus July 29, along with her sister Mary Pitts-Brown and many family members, to present a copy of their family's history to the Clayton Family Research Center, located in Rickman Library.

"This is our family and our history. We're very proud to have it here and to have you want it to be here. That means a lot to us," said Mary, who authored and published the comprehensive history of their families and tells of their life in Oconee and Pickens counties. The book provides a comprehensive history of the Pitts and Harbin families, based on years of extensive research and DNA testing.

Along with the book, Sarah and Mary presented a DVD filled with genealogical data to Anne Sheriff, who curates the Clayton Family Research Center at SWU. Mary previously authored a family history in 2011, and the book was revised in honor of their aunt, Vada Pitts-Henderson, who recently celebrated her 100th birthday.

"Receiving a book on an African-Ameri-

can Upcountry family is a first for the Clayton Room," Sheriff said. "The Pitts family from Pickens County and the Harbin family from Oconee County and their related history adds information about local interactions in the late 1800s and early 1900s."

Sarah and Mary's great-grandfather was Seaborne Pitts, a white man who fought in the Civil War and died of an illness he sustained while in Virginia.

"What a wonder to know that my great-grandfather was of total Caucasian descent and fought in the Civil War for the right to protect slavery, and yet my African-American family is proudly thriving, standing strong and free today," Sarah wrote in the book's dedication page. Tracing the genealogy of the Pitts family, who were white, and the Harbin family, who were African-American, reminded Sarah of the importance of promoting the understanding of mankind's origins.

"It is my hope and prayer that this book will inspire other African-American families to accept the challenge of searching their heritage. I also hope that it will educate all races just how entwined the human race has become since the beginning of creation," Sarah said.

The family recently gathered in Oconee County for a week-long celebration of Vada's birthday. They gathered at a family home in Oconee County, coming not only from the Upstate, but from as far away as Texas, Indiana, Michigan and New Jersey. Holmes is currently executive administrator for Soapstone Center for Clinical Research in Decatur, Ga., and is the mother of current student Kenneth Holmes, a member of the SWU Warriors Men's Basketball Team. Brown resides in Detroit.

Explosive Spring Tamed by Big Earthquake of 1886

Back 60 years ago and beyond there was at Mountain Springs, in Brushy Creek Township, a spring that really packed plenty of power.

The spring not only boiled, but squirted into the air like a geyser. Toss a log into the spring and it was promptly hurled out with great violence. A man living near the spring became fearful of it.

He had it packed in the back end of his head that one of his children might fall into it, as the youngsters appeared attracted by the turbulent waters. So, he hauled wagon load after wagon

load of rocks and dumped

Nevertheless, the spring remained in a wrathful mood until one sultry night in September, 1886. All was still, yet uneasy. Animals were restless. Roosters crowed, dogs howled and cows bellowed. Along about 9 o'clock conditions became almost intolerable. From somewhere, apparently underground, came a dull roar, following by a tremendous shock.

All through the night and far into the following day the shocks continued. During the course of this disturbance the

water channel supplying the spring was broken. Other springs sprang up. The pressure at the big spring went down.

Today, the spring is a memorial to the late John T. Wigington. Mr. Wigington was one of

Anderson County's pioneer merchants and specialists. Not only did he sell just about everything from a toothpick to a steam engine, but made guns, fixed watches, operated a printing office and took pictures. He actually experimented with colored photography 60 years ago.

The coping around the spring was designed by R. M. Spearman and B. T. Wigington. It was put in place about 1920. The land is in the name of the Mountain Springs Lodge of the Woodmen of the World. It was donated to the lodge by John T. Wigington.

About 100 yards from the lodge hall stands Mountain Springs Church. This church replaced the one burned some months ago. The original church was erected in 1856 and remodeled in more recent years.

Digital Newspaper Program adds "The Pickens Sentinel"

The South Carolina Digital Newspaper Program (SCDNP) team is going strong as they finish up their second phase of digitizing historic newspaper pages from across the state.

In 2011, the team contributed over 100,000 pages to Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers (http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/), a free online web resource sponsored by the National Endowment for Humanities (NEH) and hosted by the Library of Congress.

This year, the team is on track to add 100,000 more pages to Chronicling America, 70,000 of which are already available.

The SCDNP team has digitized a number of historically significant newspapers from the Upstate, including the Abbeville Press and Banner, Anderson Intelligencer, Keowee Courier, and Laurens Advertiser.

They have most recently added the Pickens Sentinel, recognized as the oldest continuously published newspaper in Pickens County, and its related titles the Easley Messenger, People's Journal, and Pickens Sentinel-Journal. The team has also added the issues of the Keowee Courier published between 1849 and 1922.

The SCDNP team is also excited to announce that they have recently been awarded a third round of funding from NEH which will allow them to digitize another 100,000 pages over the next two years.

The team plans to work with newspapers from communities that have thus far been unrepresented or underrepresented. Learn more about SCDNP and their resources by visiting their website, http://library.sc.edu/digital/newspaper/index.html.




