The Reynolds Family in Pendelton District in the Early 1800s

The Reynolds brothers, Archelius W., Bartemous and Millenton, came to the Oconee part of Old Pendelton District, SC in the early 1800s from Henry County, Virginia (formerly Pittsylvania). They were the sons of Archelius Reynolds Sr., born about 1742 and Susannah. They had brothers Moses, Jesse, David and Reuben Reynolds who stayed in Virginia.

Archelius W. Reynolds was born about 1767 and lived on Leatherwood Creek in Henry County, Virginia until 1794 when he received a land grant of 369 acres surveyed for him on Big Beaverdam Creek in Old Pendelton District between Seneca and Fairplay, which became his in 1803.

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Archelius appears on the 1800 Pendelton District Census with his first wife Sarah "Sallie" and several unknown children.

I am seeking information on who she and these children may have been.

Archelius buys 400 acres on the French Broad River in Buncombe County in 1805 and he is on the 1810 census.

By the 1820 Census, he is back in Pendelton District where he remains for the 1830 and 1840 Census. He buys land and lives on Cane Creek which is now under Lake Keowee. He lives near the Newry Dam according to a great-grandson later in "The Keowee Courier."

Archelius has a second wife, Mary Adams, whose father Richard Adams lives on Cane Creek as well as her brothers and sisters: Parker Adams, Martha Rainwater, Elias Adams, Richard Adams, Nancy Cobb, Rebecca Peterson, Elizabeth and Clarissa Carnes, James Adams and Anna Fountain.

Mary Adams and Archelius have several children together whose names I am also looking for.

Archelius traded land with David Hawkins, John

McCarley, William Hall and Ransom Hunt in Oconee County. Archelius is said to have been a felt hat maker, but I need verification of this. He disappears after 1841 and I assume he has died as he was between 70 and 80 on the 1840 census. Mary Adams remarries William Barton by the 1850 Census. They lived on the Chauga River on the other side of Westminster near Madison.

Both Archelius and William Barton are older men than Mary. Stories say her first husband had died when she came to Barton's. DNA testing has linked one of Mary's known sons to the Reynolds of Henry Co., VA three different times.

Archelius Reynolds and his first wife Sarah are known to have had a son named John W. Reynolds born in 1807 and possibly, a daughter, Tabitha. *I know nothing of Tabitha. A Charles Runnells lived near on Cane Creek also, but nothing is known of him.*

John W. Reynolds went to Hall County, Georgia to live with his uncle Bartemius. He married Frances Harrington and had several children. A recorded story down there says John W. left Oconee because he didn't get along with his stepmother, presumably Mary Adams. John W. Reynolds died in 1898 and is buried at Airline Baptist Church in Hall County,

John W. Reynolds' son is Wyley Allen Reynolds, born 1843, married Thaney Hulseley Shockley and had a son John Wiley Reynolds Jr., born 1874. John Wiley Reynolds Jr. marries to Lillie Frances Cobb of Oconee County and moves back to Madison, SC on the Chauga River near Mary Adams Reynolds Barton's children. Lillie Frances Cobb is herself the granddaughter of Mary's sister Nancy Adams Cobb and Robert Cobb by their son Rev. Roland Cobb.

John Wiley Reynolds Jr. becomes a well known public educator in the early 1900s in Oconee County. He taught at Toxaway, Holly Springs, Long Creek, Neville, Clearmount, Return and Cheohee. He was a mail carrier for 27 years also. He was president of the state and local sing-

ing conventions; and was a gospel singer and songwriter. "The Tugaloo Tribune" of August 28, 1917 and July 4, 1946 tell his story, as well as "The Keowee Courier" of November 16, 1966.

Archelius Reynolds' brother, Bartemous, was born in 1769 in Pittsylvania County. He is married to Mary Mildred Taylor in Patrick County, Virginia on February 5, 1799. Bartemius moves to the Oconee part of Old Pendleton District, SC by 1800 and is living on the Little Beaverdam Creek (*deed misfiled in Anderson County*)

By 1820, Bartemous has moved to Hall County, Georgia, in Captain Buffington's District. Bartemous Reynolds and John W. Reynolds had business and familial relations with the Buffingtons. Osborn Buffington moved to Hall County from Oconee where he had a plantation on Cane Creek.

Ezekial Buffington was born circa 1741 in Pennsylvania. He came to Pendleton District, where he was a trader with the Cherokee. He had large tracts in Pendleton District and sold one to General Andrew Pickens in 1799. Ezekial moved to Jackson and Hall County, Georgia. Bartemous Reynolds was a bondsman in settling his estate.

Bartemous Reynolds and Mary Mildred Taylor had a son named Pickens Taylor Reynolds, born in 1815. The Heritage of Hall County, Georgia book and The Reynolds Family of Hall County, Georgia by Ralph Buffington tell the story that when Mary was expecting this child, her uncle, General Zachary Taylor rode all the way to Hall County, Georgia on horseback from Virginia. He asked that Bartemous and Mary would name the son after him if it were a boy. They only half complied. Bartemous wanted to name the son after his friend General Andrew Pickens, so the son was named Pickens Taylor Reynolds in honor of both men. General Zachary Taylor later became President Zachary Taylor.

Bartemous Reynolds was one of the first preachers at Timber Ridge Baptist Church in Lula, GA. His son, Pickens Taylor Reynolds, also preached there later. Bartemous died in 1854 and Pickens Taylor in 1899. They are both buried at a cemetery in the woods, off Joe Chan-

bler Road behind Dunigan's Chapel, not far from Timber Ridge Church. Bartemous had other children and there are many descendants still located in Hall County, Georgia.

Archelius and Bartemous Reynolds' brother, Millenton Foster Reynolds, was born circa 1767 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia and married Elizabeth Murray on September 7, 1791 in Patrick County, Virginia. He is on the 1800 Pendleton District, SC Census and witnesses a deed on Big Beaver Dam Creek in Oconee.

In 1810, he has gone to Nashville and Rutherford, Tennessee. In 1820, he was in Union County, Illinois; in 1830/40, Montgomery County, Illinois; and in 1850, Jackson County, Illinois. He has descendants in Illinois. Almost all the occurrences of Archelius, Bartemous and Millenton Reynolds are grossly misspelled in indexes and records making research of them difficult.

Moses Reynolds stayed in Patrick County and had some interesting descendants.

Archelius W. Reynolds had several children whose names are unknown. I would appreciate any information on Reynolds in or from Oconee County, SC that may have been his children or descendants. You can send email to kevincadams@bellsouth.net or call 864-888-3513.

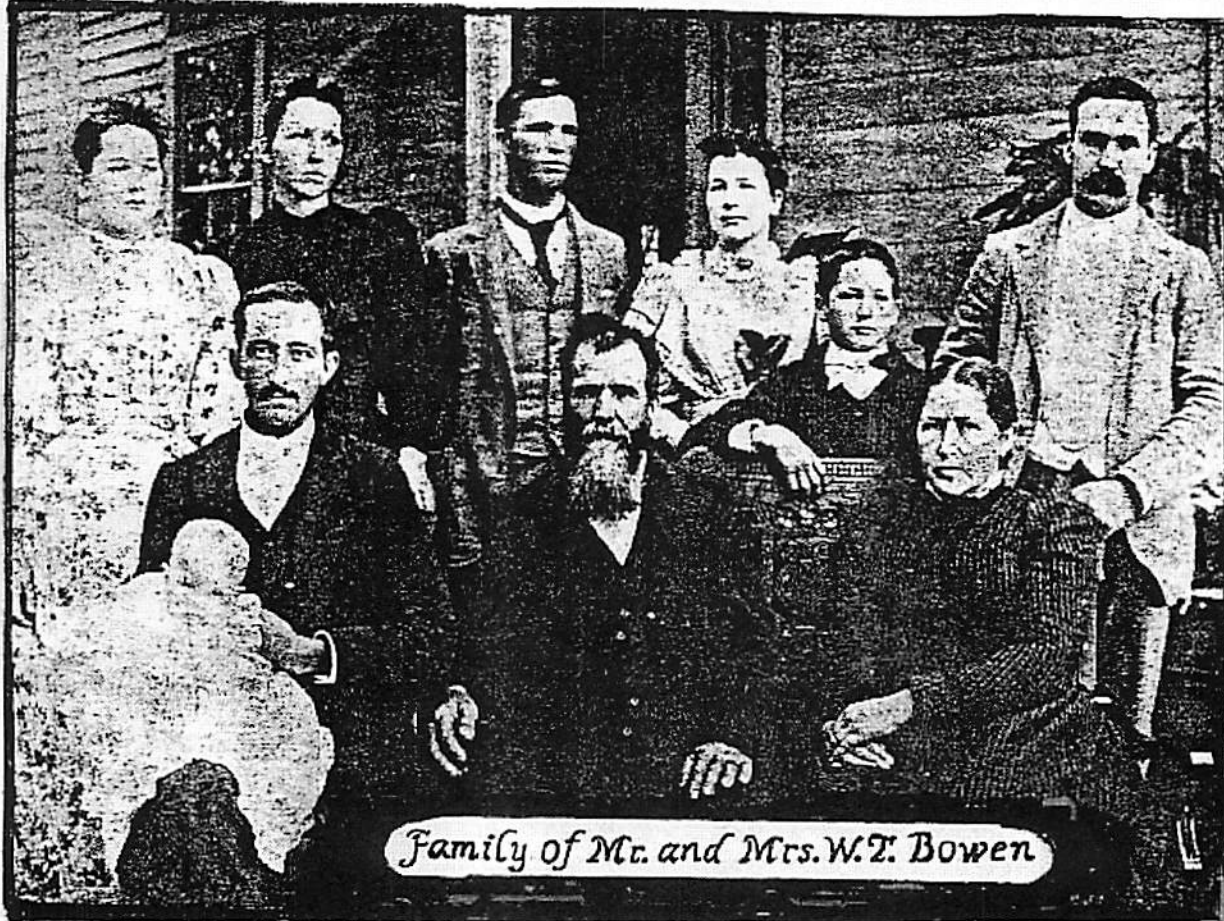


**BEN ROBERTSON
OF PICKENS COUNTY**

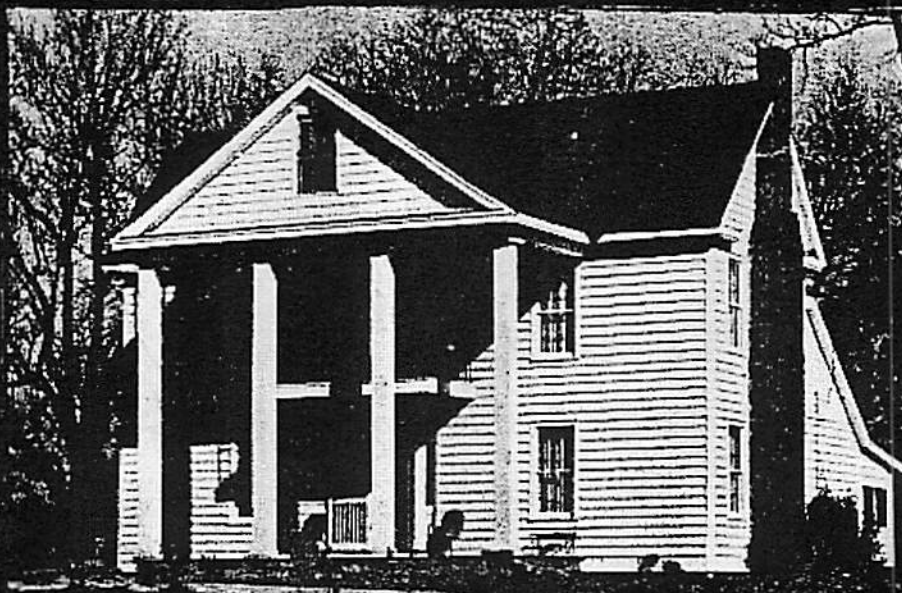


*Ben Robertson Dressed as a U.S.

William Thomas Bowen and his wife, Rebecca Amelia (Allgood) Bowen, had six children, all of whom are included in the above photograph, made about 1895 on the family's cotton farm in Pickens County, South Carolina. Also included in the photo is Julius Euphronius Parsons, the Bowen's son-in-law, who is seated on the left side of the front row and is holding his infant son, Columbus Bowen Parsons. Seated on the right side of the first row are Ben Robertson's maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W.T. Bowen. Standing in the back row (from left to right) are the following six children of this family: (1) Elizabeth "Bettie" Mahala Bowen; (2) Lillian "Lillie" Tesora (Bowen) Parsons, mother of the baby held by her husband in the first row; (3) James "Jim" Reese Bowen; (4) Mary Iola Bowen, who later married Benjamin Franklin Robertson, Sr. and gave birth to Ben Robertson, the journalist and author; (5) Thomas Alexander Bowen, the youngest child; (6) Dr. William Joel Bowen, the oldest child.





The Bowen Family's Farmhouse

Construction was completed in 1880 on the above farmhouse of Confederate veteran William Thomas Bowen, who was Ben Robertson's maternal grandfather. The historic dwelling is still standing only a few miles southeast of the town of Pickens, South Carolina. The house is also situated near the farm on which Mr. Bowen grew up before he enlisted in the Confederate Army on April 14, 1861 at the age of seventeen. All of Mr. and Mrs. Bowen's children grew into adulthood while living in the farmhouse, but Thomas "Tom" A. Bown, the youngest child, was the only one who was born in the above abode. His birth took place shortly after the new house had been built. The parents of Ben Robertson, the noted upstate journalist and author, were married in the Bowen's farmhouse on August 16, 1901.

During the latter years of the nineteenth century—and for many years of the ensuing century as well—train tracks of the Pickens Railroad Company skirted the Bowen farm. The rail lines extended across the foot of a hill behind the Bowen's dwelling. The railroad's locomotive, popularly called the "Pickens Doodle", once tugged local railroad cars carrying both freight and passengers back and forth along the nine-mile-long tracks that once connected the towns of Pickens and Easley. When Mr. Bowen served in the S.C. House of Representatives from 1878 until 1880 and in the S.C. Senate from 1890 until 1891, engineers on the "Pickens Doodle" sometimes sounded the train's loud steam whistle as the train approached the Bowen farm. Then, the train would stop behind the family's

farmhouse, and Mr. Bowen would procure his official mail from state legislative offices in Columbia.

The late Tom Davidson, who was a co-founder and a charter member of the Pickens County Historical Society, owned the old farmhouse of the W.T. Bowen family during part of the second half of the 1900s. He was a colorful raconteur and layman historian who did much to promote and preserve the historical legacies of both the Bowen's former habitation and its first inhabitants. Mr. Davidson even installed several stone historical markers at the old Bowen dwelling so that visitors there could become more aware of both the history of the house and the contributions of its original owners to their country, state and nation.

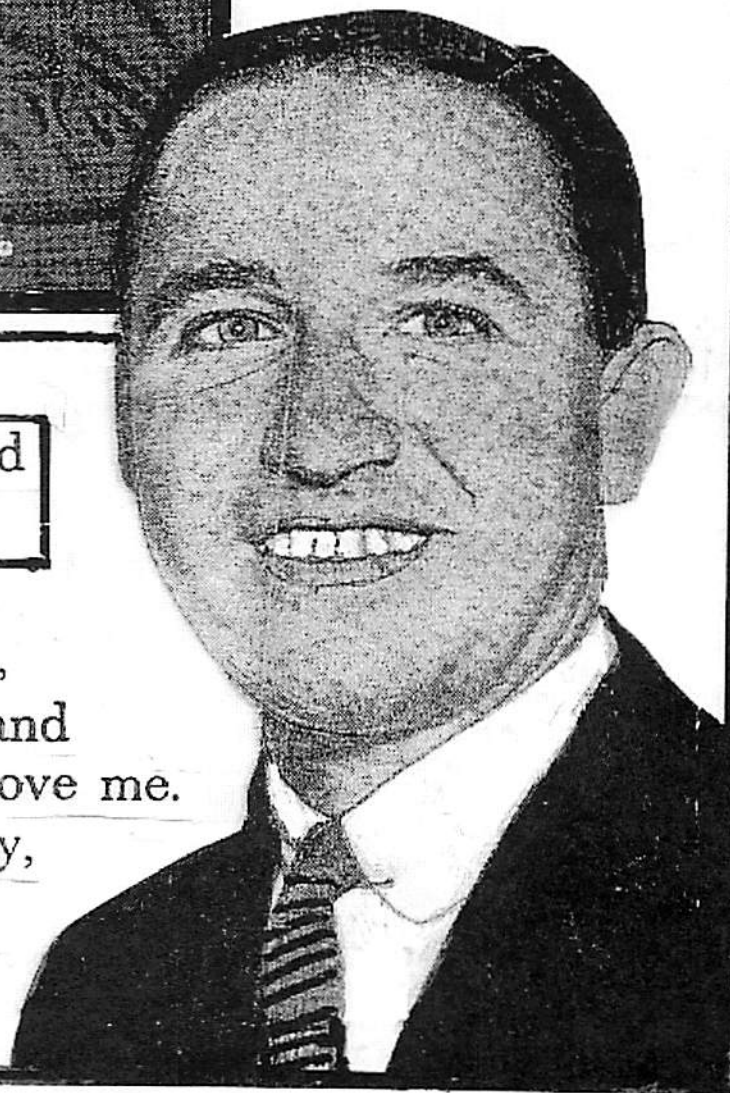

The photograph at the left is the last-known one taken of Ben Robertson. It was made at Clemson, S.C. in the home of Ben's father and only several months before the journalist's death. In the photograph Ben is in the uniform worn by U.S. foreign correspondents during World War II.

Ben's grave is marked with his words:

"I rest in thy bosom,
Carolina. Thy earth and
thy air around and above me.
In my own country,
among my own,
I sleep."

That whereas a certain THOMAS WINSLOW of Randolph County in the State of North Carolina did emancipate and set free a certain Negro man slave called CAESAR which said Negro is now a resident of the State of S. Carolina and District aforesaid. And whereas the State of South Carolina on the twenty-first day of December Anno Dominic Seventeen hundred and ninety-nine passed an Act prescribing the mode of appointing Guardians for free Negroes and for other purposes therein mentioned---And whereas your petitioner being desirous of being appointed Guardian of the aforesaid Negro CAESAR for the better securing the rights privileges and liberties of a free Negro as prescribed by the Law of the State of South Carolina aforesaid prays to be appointed and admitted as Guardian of the aforesaid Negro CAESAR and as in duty bound your petitioner will pray.

Pendleton the twenty fourth day of February Anno Dominic one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

Application for Pension by John Wilson

Typed by G. Anne Sheriff

Pendleton District. On the twenty fifth day of October 1820, personally appeared, in open Court in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Assize and General Goal Delivery, being a Court of Record, for the said District, in the State aforesaid **John Wilson, aged Sixty five years,** Who, being first duty sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress, of the 18 March, 1818 and the 1st May, 1820,

that he, the said **John Wilson** enlisted, for the Term of Three years on the day of January in the year 1777 in the State of Virginia in the company commanded by **Captain M. Boyer in the Regiment commanded by Colonel James Wood** in the line of the State of Virginia on the continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps until the . . . day of **January 1780** when he was discharged from the said service, in **Kiakatt** in the state of **New Jersey**.

That he was in the **Battle of Brandywine, Monmouth, Germantown & White plains;** and that he has no other evidence, now in his power, of his said services. And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May, 1820, I do solemnly Swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

By occupation a farm, but is not able to support himself and is much affected by the wound in his head received in the Battle of Monmouth and is very much troubled with pains; Wife, **Polly aged fortysix [sic] years,** she has almost lost her eyesight, and is very sickly and helpless; son **John Wilson aged thirteen years,** who is much troubled with the cholick.

Sixty years of age since July last, who bring first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress of 18 Mar 1818 and the 1st May 1820 that

he the said **Charly Williamson** enlisted for the term of the duration of the War on the 1st March 1781 in **Augusta County** in the **State of Virginia** in the Company commanded by **Capt Robert Gamble** in the Regiment commanded by **Lieut. Col. Thomas Posey** and **Col. George ? of the Virginia** line on the continental Establishment that he continued to serve in said corps until he was march into the State of South Carolina when he was transferred into a company commanded by **Capt. Morse** under **Maj. William Finley** in the Regiment commanded by **Col. George Matthews** under the command of **General Nathl. Greene**

he was in some skirmishes near to the City of Charleston in the State of South Carolina, and he continued in the said corps until about the 20th day of June in the year 1783 when he was discharged by **Major William Finley** as well as he recollects the Col. had left the command, he was discharged at the **Baracks about five miles from the City of Charleston** in the State of South Carolina. That he was in no important battles during the term of his service, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of said services, he does not know whether any of his officers or fellow soldiers are yet alive and if they be where to find them. He is very poor and afflicted with the dropsy.

And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United Station on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I Have not since that time by gift sale or any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained the Schedule hereunto annexed, and by me subscribed that is to say:

One cow & calf, one heifer two yeas old, one sow & three shoats – one oven; one pot, a few old tools that is a saw-drawing knife 2 augers, 2 chissels, 1 pair broken compass. I was security for my son John Williamson and by that means got involved and my property was sold by the **Sheriff of Buncomb County**. I am now sixty years of age and am much afflicted and deceased. Have Wife named Rebecca also about sixty years of age, all my children have left me and we are in great need of assistance from the Government. I have no debts due me. Signed Charles Williamson.

Sworn to in open Court and declared on the twenty eighth day of October in the Year of our Lord one Thousand eight hundred and twenty four.
