## Ft. Prince George Marker Dedicated at Mile Creek Park

A sizable crowd witnessed the dedication of the South Carolina Historical Marker for Fort Prince George as it was unveiled at Mile Creek Park. Sponsored by the Piedmont Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Colonists, it is the 17th state historic marker in Pickens County.

Fort Prince George was built in 1753 by His Majesty's Royal Governor James Glen at the request of Attakullakula and his fellow Cherokee chiefs in the Keowee Valley in what is now Pickens County.

It was the hub of extraordinary trade and the guardian of the frontier. Pickens County Historical Society senior vice president, Wayne Kelley, told the crowd the fort played a deciding role in the French and Indian War and the names of young soldiers, Francis Marion,

Thomas Sumter, William Moultrie and Andrew Pickens, are forever linked with Fort Prince George.

"Now, more than 250 years later, the Pickens County Historical Society and our partners intend to resurrect our important lost heritage by rebuilding the fort in its entirety in a nearby pristine valley," Kelly said.

"It can be an economic engine for historic tourism for Pickens County and the Upcountry of South Carolina." (*Pickens County Courier*, 5 Nov 2014)

## *In Memory of OPD President Bill Hughes*

Former President of Old Pendleton Genealogical Society, William Leander "Bill" Hughes, 80, of Windy Hill Road, husband of the late Martha Hendricks "Cricket" Hughes, passed away Wednesday, October 15, 2014 at his home.

Born in Pickens County, he was the son of the late Isaac and Willie Roper Hughes. Mr. Hughes was retired from the US Air Force after 20 years of service. Following retirement, he was a Real Estate agent, taught at Tri-County Technical College and most recently was the President of the Oconee County Home Builders Association.

Mr. Hughes served as a UN Peacekeeper in the Belgian Congo, flew into hurricanes to track dangerous storms, and spent many years in air force intelligence. More recently, he volunteered with the Alzheimer's Association.

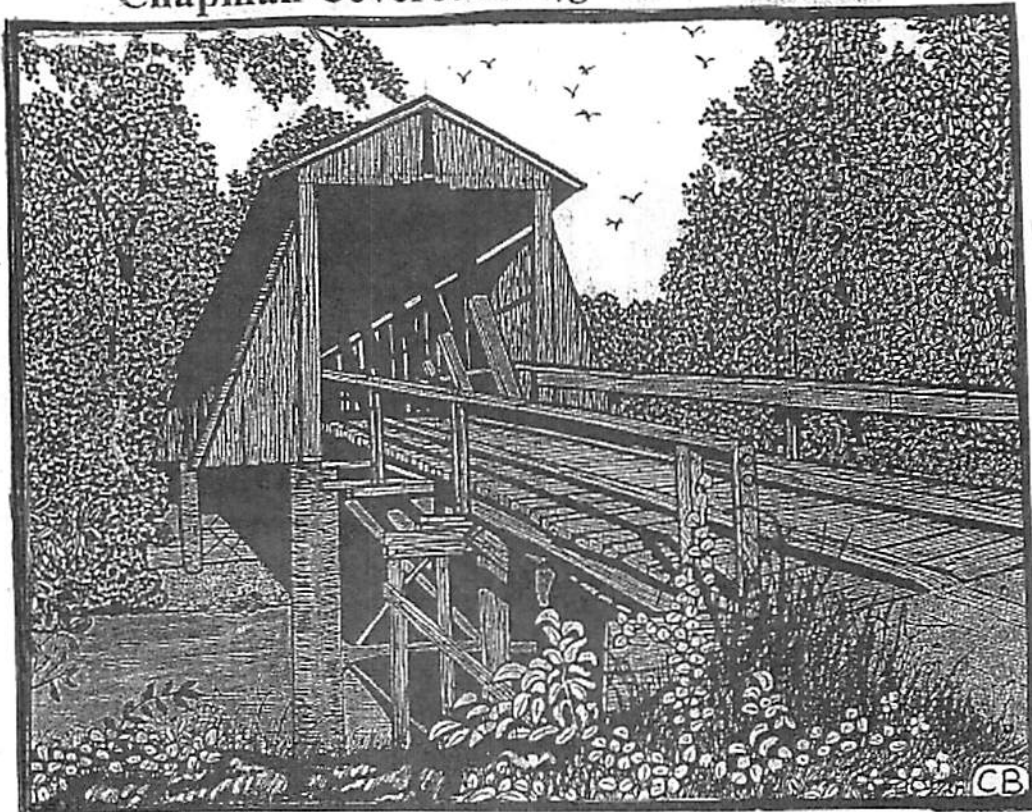

### Mt. Olivet Methodist Church

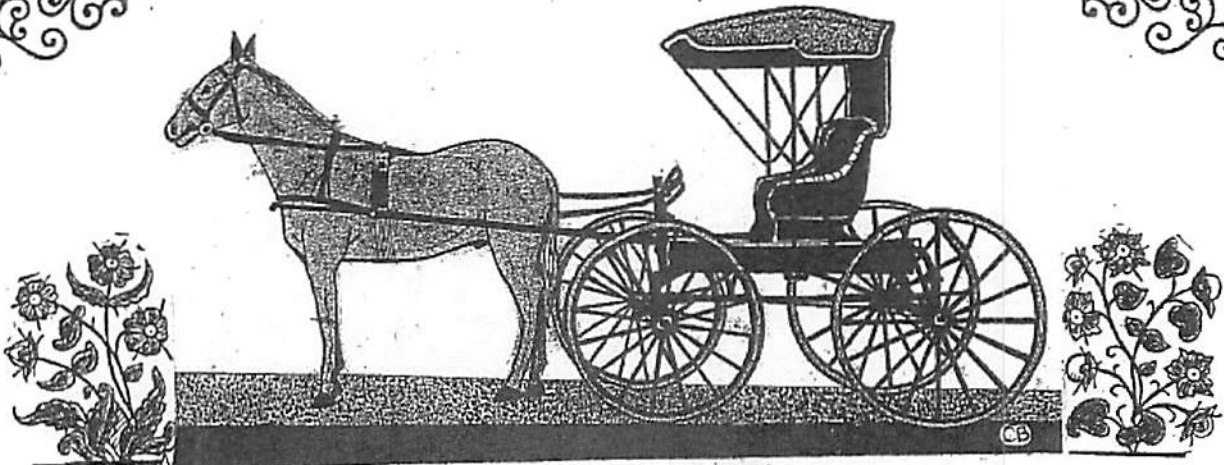
The church depicted above was established before Pickens County was created. It evolved out of a congregation of worshipers who met in a brush arbor at what today is West View Cemetery in Easley, South Carolina. Residents of Pickensville, the court house town of the old Washington District, as well as early settlers of the Easley area, attended the church. Some of these local residents were also buried in Mt. Olivet's churchyard. By 1900, the churchyard cemetery had become very crowded with graves. Thus, Confederate veteran William Allen Mauldin (1845-1919), an Easley businessman, urged Easley public officials to establish a public cemetery in the town. His suggestion was quickly approved, and the municipality purchased six acres of land which included the old Mt. Olivet burial ground. West View Cemetery was then established there in 1901. It is also known as Easley City Cemetery. The first person buried in the new necropolis was twenty-year-old Kate Hudgens (1881-1901), daughter of a Civil War veteran, Ambrose W. Hudgens (1843-1904) and his wife, Lucy M. Hudgens (1848-1909). Three years after his daughter's untimely death, Mr. Hudgens also passed away and was interred alongside his daughter's grave. In 1919 William Allen Mauldin, who had urged the creation of the new cemetery, also died. Mr. Mauldin was an early deacon of Easley Presbyterian Church, and his tombstone proclaims that he fired the first shot of the U.S. Civil War on April 12, 1861, during the Bombardment of Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor. That claim has been questioned by several notable Civil War historians.

## Chapman Covered Bridge on the Keowee



**B**ased on available estimates, fewer than twenty covered bridges were apparently ever built in South Carolina. Most of those were in the Upstate, where they were usually extended over swift streams that flowed between high banks. Because winter temperatures in the Piedmont and Blue Ridge regions drop below the freezing point more frequently than in the Midlands and Low Country, covered bridges were more utilitarian and practicable in the Upstate. Some of the old spans were given names of local families. Others were named after such geographical features as rivers, creeks, shoals or settlements. The most notable covered spans of the Upstate had the following names: Chapman Bridge, Allen Bridge, Campbell Bridge, Prather Bridge, Long Creek Bridge, Upper Gassaway Bridge, Lower Gassaway Bridge, and Tumbling Shoals Bridge. Today, Campbell Bridge, situated in northern Greenville County, is the state's only remaining covered span. A comparatively small structure, Campbell Bridge was put up over Beaverdam Creek in 1909.

**O**ne of South Carolina's best-known and most memorable covered spans was Chapman Bridge, which extended over the upper reaches of the Keowee River for forty-five years. The rustic, picturesque span was situated between the Eastatoee Valley in Pickens County and Jocassee Valley in Oconee County. The Keowee was once a crystal-clear, mountain river that served as a demonstrable boundary between the two counties.<sup>5</sup> In the late 1960s and early 1970s, when the massive Keowee-Toxaway Project was under development by Duke Power Company, the river was impounded by two large, man-made bodies of water, Lake Keowee and Lake Jocassee. During the construction of the former lake as a source of cooling water for Oconee Nuclear Station near Seneca, the site of Chapman Bridge was destined for inundation. Thus the span was carefully disassembled by employees of Duke Power Company and then moved a few miles south to higher ground, where it was resurrected. Despite that attempt to save the old span, it was ultimately destroyed.

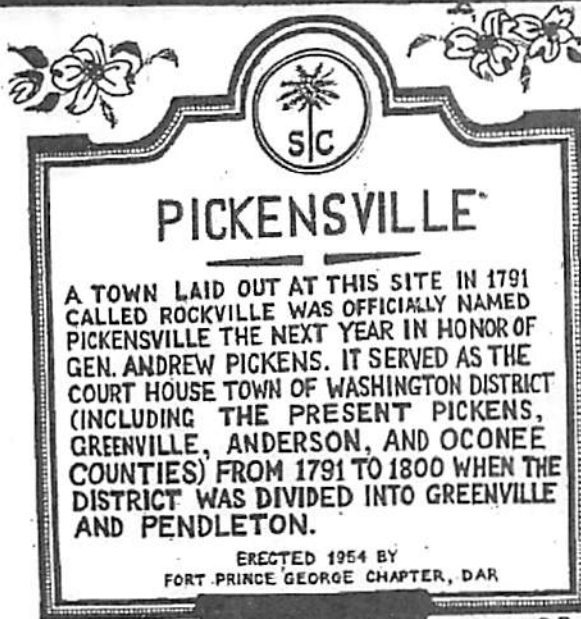

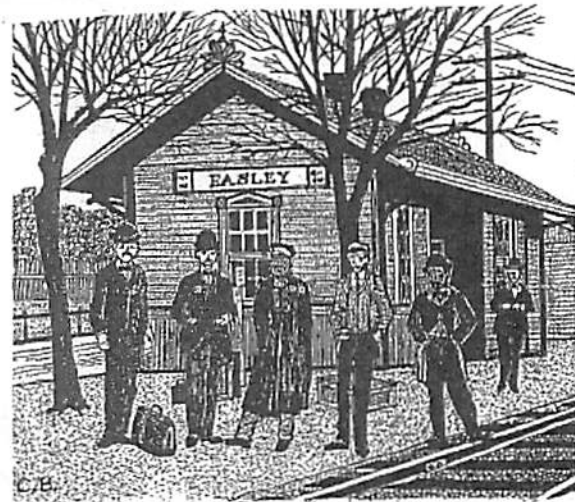

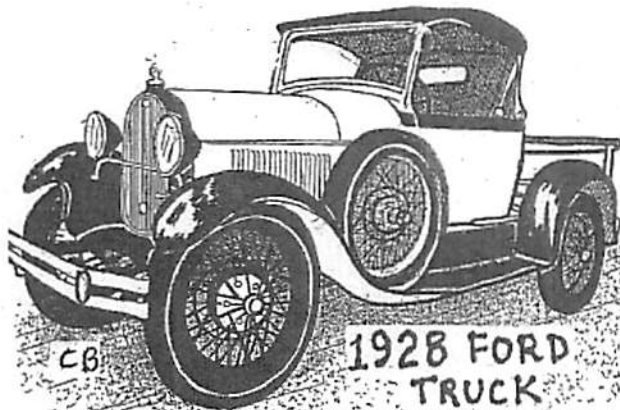

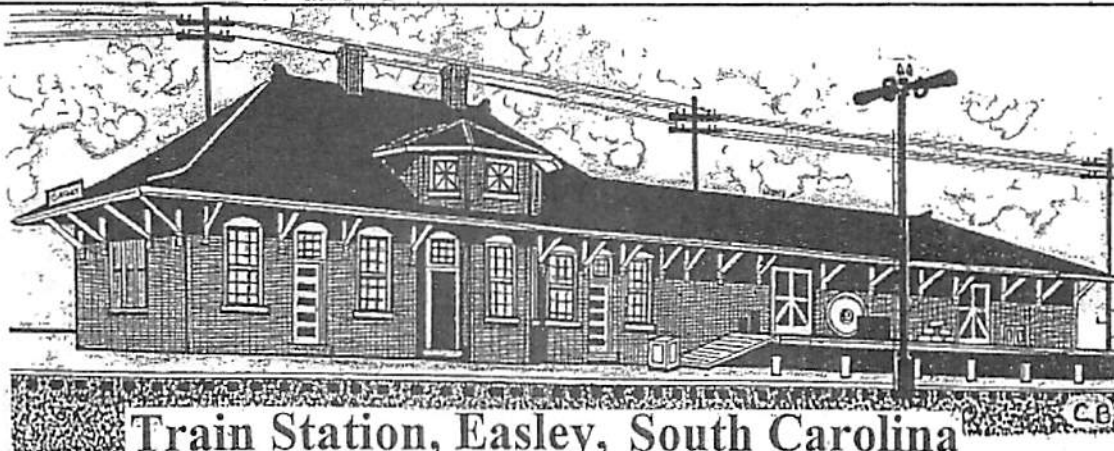

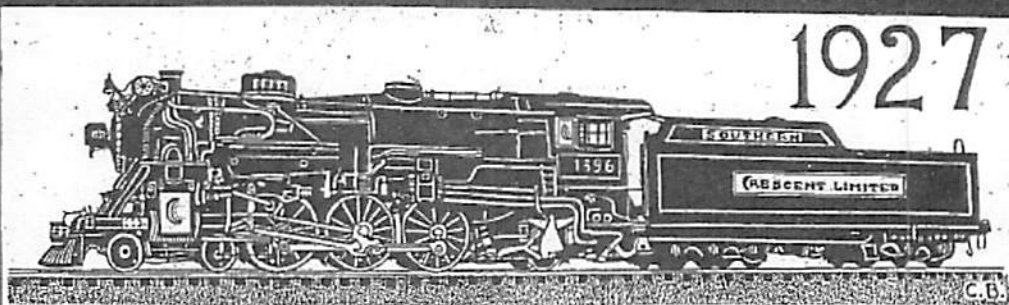

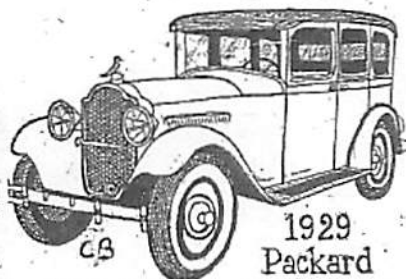

**Engine of the Atlanta & Charlotte Air Line Railway**

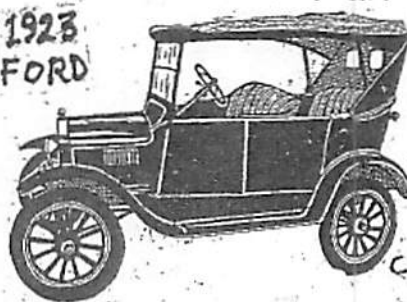

## Our Murphree Ancestors

The person we know as Grandmother Grant or "Little" Grandmother was Nancy Arta Estella Murphree. She was born on October 3, 1885 and died November 1, 1970. She often used the spelling Murphy.

The earliest documented Murphree ancestor is Irishman named Daniel who was born around 1715. He and his wife, Sarah Dempsey, were living in North Carolina in 1743. They had 12 children, all of whom were listed by name in his 1769 will. He died around 1771 in North Carolina. Five of his sons served in the Revolutionary War.

Our direct ancestor was Daniel's son, Moses. He was born in Bertie County, N.C. about 1761 and served in the North Carolina Militia. He received land in South Carolina, August 9, 1787.

Our family has been in South Carolina for 227 years. Moses had three sons and seven daughters, only one of whom he called by name in his will. Over the period of his lifetime, he owned over 1900 acres including 166 on the Toxaway River. He died in May of 1846.

Moses' son, William, was our direct ancestor. William married Mary Baker, Daughter of Revolutionary War soldier William Baker and they had at least nine children. William appears to have been a very good son and was named guardian for his afflicted brother.

William was already "sick in body" when he wrote his will July 31, 1846 and he died August 10 which was two months after his father's death. He apparently lived his entire life in what is now Northern Pickens County.

Nimmons Murphree, William's youngest son and 8th of his nine children is our direct ancestor. He was born May 28, 1835 and married Nancy E. Price, the daughter of Harden and Elizabeth Alexander Price. They had eight children between 1855 and 1874. He usually signed his name J.N. and nobody is really sure what the "J" stands for.

He served in Orr's Rifles and was captured at Petersburg. He served on the County Commission, on the Grand Jury and as a Steward at the Poor House. He died February 6, 1903. He also lived in entire life in Northern Pickens County.

William Harden Murphree, the second son of Nimmons and Nancy, is our direct ancestor. He was born November 3, 1859. He married Elizabeth Perritt on March 12, 1882. He served as Postmaster at Eastatoe post office in 1886.

His children were William Taylor, born 1883 and Nancy Arta Estella, born 1885. He died February 12, 1888 of Bright's Disease at the age of 28. He also spent all his life in Northern Pickens County.

Archivist and Curator of Faith Clayton Room, Anne Sheriff reported the project to locate the graves and information of our Confederate Soldiers is in its last stages.

Currently, \$6000 is needed to purchase 200 more crosses in addition to the 200 already bought.

Obituaries are also needed of the soldiers and their wives.
