The Reynolds Family in Pendelton District in the Early 1800s

The Reynolds brothers, Archelius W., Bartemous and Millenton, came to the Oconee part of Old Pendelton District, SC in the early 1800s from Henry County, Virgina (formerly Pittsylvania). They were the sons of Archelius Reynolds Sr., born about 1742 and Susannah. They had brothers Moses, Jesse, David and Reuben Reynolds who stayed in Virginia.

Archelius W. Reynolds was born about 1767 and lived on Leatherwood Creek in Henry County, Virginia until 1794 when he received a land grant of 369 acres surveyed for him on Big

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Beaverdam Creek in Old Pendelton District between Seneca and Fairplay, which became his in 1803.

Archelius appears on the 1800 Pendelton District Census with his first wife Sarah "Sallie" and several unknown children.

I am seeking information on who she and these children may have been.

Archelius buys 400 acres on the French Broad River in Buncombe County in 1805 and he is on the 1810 census.

By the 1820 Census, he is back in Pendelton District where he remains for the 1830 and 1840 Census. He buys land and lives on Cane Creek which is now under Lake Keowee. He lives near the Newry Dam according to a great-grandson later in "The Keowee Courier."

Archelius has a second wife, Mary Adams, whose father Richard Adams lives on Cane Creek as well as her brothers and sisters: Parker Adams, Martha Rainwater, Elias Adams, Richard Adams, Nancy Cobb, Rebecca Peterson, Elizabeth and Clarissa Carnes, James Adams and Anna Fountain.

Mary Adams and Archelius have several children together whose names I am also looking for.

Archelius traded land with David Hawkins, John See Reynolds, Continued on Page 4

McCarley, William Hall and Ransom Hunt in Oconee County. Archelius is said to have been a felt hat maker, but I need verification of this. He disappears after 1841 and I assume he has died as he was between 70 and 80 on the 1840 census. Mary Adams remarries William Barton by the 1850 Census. They lived on the Chauga River on the other side of Westminster near Madison.

Both Archelius and William Barton are older men than Mary. Stories say her first husband had died when she came to Barton's. DNA testing has linked one of Mary's known sons to the Reynolds of Henry Co., VA three different times.

Archelius Reynolds and his first wife Sarah are known to have had a son named John W. Reynolds born in 1807 and possibly, a daughter, Tabitha. I know nothing of Tabitha. A Charles Runnells lived near on Cane Creek also, but nothing is known of him.

John W. Reynolds went to Hall County, Georgia to live with his uncle Bartemius. He married Frances Harrington and had several children. A recorded story down there says John W. left Oconee because he didn't get along with his stepmother, presumably Mary Adams. John W. Reynolds died in 1898 and is buried at Airline Baptist Church in Hall County,

John W. Reynolds' son is Wyley Allen Reynolds, born 1843, married Thaney Hulsey Shockley and had a son John Wiley Reynolds Jr., born 1874. John Wiley Reynolds Jr. marries to Lillie Frances Cobb of Oconee County and moves back to Madison, SC on the Chauga River near Mary Adams Reynolds Barton's children. Lillie Frances Cobb is herself the granddaughter of Mary's sister Nancy Adams Cobb and Robert Cobb by their son Rev. Roland Cobb.

John Wiley Reynolds Jr. becomes a well known public educator in the early 1900s in Oconee County. He taught at Toxaway, Holly Springs, Long Creek, Neville, Clearmount, Return and Cheohee. He was a mail carrier for 27 years also. He was president of the state and local singing conventions; and was a gospel singer and songwriter. "The Tugaloo Tribune" of August 28. 1917 and July 4, 1946 tell his story, as well as "The Keowee Courier" of November 16, 1966.

Archelius Reynolds' brother, Bartemous, was born in 1769 in Pittslyvania County. He is married to Mary Mildred Taylor in Patrick County. Virginia on February 5, 1799. Bartemius moves to the Oconee part of Old Pendleton District, SC by 1800 and is living on the Little Beaverdam Creek (deed misfiled in Anderson County)

By 1820, Bartemous has moved to Hall County, Georgia, in Captain Buffington's District. Bartemous Revnolds and John W. Reynolds had business and familial relations with the Buffingtons. Osborn Buffington moved to Hall County from Oconee where he had a plantation on Cane Creek.

Ezekial Buffington was born circa 1741 in Pennsylvania. He came to Pendelton District, where he was a trader with the Cherokee. He had large tracts in Pendelton District and sold one to General Andrew Pickens in 1799. Ezekial moved to Jackson and Hall County. Georgia. Bartemous Reynolds was a bondsman in settling his estate.

Bartemous Reynolds and Mary Mildred Taylor had a son named Pickens Taylor Reynolds, born in 1815. The Heritage of Hall County, Georgia book and The Reynolds Family of Hall County, Georgia by Ralph Buffington tell the story that when Mary was expecting this child, her uncle, General Zachary Taylor rode all they way to Hall County, Georgia on horseback from Virginia. He asked that Bartemous and Mary would name the son after him if it were a boy. They only half complied. Bartemous wanted to name the son after his friend General Andrew Pickens, so the son was named Pickens Taylor Reynolds in honor of both men. General Zachary Taylor later became President Zachary Taylor.

Bartemous Reynolds was one of the first preachers at Timber Ridge Baptist Church in Lula, GA. His son, Pickens Taylor Reynolds. also preached there later. Bartemous died in 1854 and Pickens Taylor in 1899. They are both buried at a cemetery in the woods, off Joe Chan-

dler Road behind Dunigan's Chapel, not far from Timber Ridge Church. Bartemous had other children and there are many descendants still in located in Hall County, Georgia.

Archelius and Bartemous Reynolds' brother, Millenton Foster Reynolds, was born circa 1767 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia and married Elizabeth Murray on September 7, 1791 in Patrick County, Virginia. He is on the 1800 Pendelton District, SC Census and witnesses a deed on Big Beaver Dam Creek in Oconee.

In 1810, he has gone to Nashville and Rutherford, Tennessee. In 1820, he was in Union County, Illinois; in 1830/ 40, Montgomery County, Illinois; and in 1850, Jackson County, Illinois. He has descendants in Illinois. Almost all the occurrences of Archelius, Bartemous and Millenton Reynolds are grossly misspelled in indexes and records making research of them difficult.

Moses Reynolds stayed in Patrick County and had some interesting descendants.

Archelius W. Reynolds had several children whose names are unknown. I would appreciate any information on Reynolds in or from Oconee County, SC that may have been his children or descendants. You can send email to kevincadams@bellsouth.net or call 864-888-3513.





And whereas the State of South Carolina on the twenty-first day of December Anno Dominic Seventeen hundred and ninety-nine passed an Act prescribing the mode of appointing Guardians for free Negroes and for other purposes therein mentioned——And whereas your petitioner being desirous of being appointed Guardian of the aforesaid Negro CAESAR for the better securing the rights privileges and liberties of a free Negro as prescribed by the Law of the State of South Carolina aforesaid prays to be appointed and admitted as Guardian of the aforesaid Negro CAESAR and as in duty bound your petitioner will pray.

Pendleton the twenty fourth day of February Anno Dominic one thousand eight hundred and thirteen.

On the twenty fifth day of October 1820, personally appeared, in open Court in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Assize and General Goal Delivery, being a Court of Record, for the said District, in the State aforesaid **John Wilson**, **aged Sixty five years**, Who, being first duty sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress, of the 18 March, 1818 and the 1st May, 1820.

that he, the said **John Wilson** enlisted, for the Term of Three years on the day of January in the year 1777 in the State of Virginia in the company commanded by **Captain M. Boyer in the Regiment commanded by Colonel James Wood** in the line of the State of **Virginia** on the continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps until the . . . day of **January 1780** when he was discharged from the said service, in **Kiakatt** in the state of **New Jersey**.

he the said Charly Williamson enlisted for the term of the duration of the War on the 1st March 1781 in Augusta County in the State of Virginia in the Company commanded by Capt Robert Gamble in the Regiment commanded by Lieut. Col. Thomas Posey and Col. George? of the Virginia line on the continental Establishment that he continued to serve in said corps until he was march into the State of South Carolina when he was transferred into a company commanded by Capt. Morse under Maj. William Finley in the Regiment commanded by Col. George Matthews under the command of General Nathl. Greene

he was in some skirmishes near to the City of Charleston in the State of South Carolina, and he continued in the said corps until about the 20th day of June in the year 1783 when he was discharged by **Major William Finley** as well as he recollects the Col. had left the command, he was discharged at the **Baracks about five miles from the City of Charleston** in the State of South Carolina. That he was in no important battles during the term of his service, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of said services, he does not know whether any of his officers or fellow soldiers are yet alive and if they be where to find them. He is very poor and afflicted with the dropsy.

And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United Station on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I Have not since that time by gift sale or any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained the Schedule hereunto annexed, and by me subscribed that is to say:

One cow & calf, one heifer two yeas old, one sow & three shoats – one oven; one pot, a few old tools that is a saw-drawing knife 2 augers, 2 chissels, 1 pair broken compass. I was security for my son John Williamson and by that means got involved and my property was sold by the **Sheriff of Buncomb County**. I am now sixty years of age and am much afflicted and deceased. Have Wife named Rebecca also about sixty years of age, all my children have left me and we are in great need of assistance from the Government. I have no debts due me. Signed Charles Williamson.

Ben Robertson of Pickens County

Transcription of Edwin Camp's Feb. 25, 1943 "Views of the News" Broadcast About Ben Robertson

IT SEEMS certain now that Ben Robertson was one of those who died when the Yankee Clipper crashed Monday into Tagus River at Lisbon. Used as we newspapermen become to receiving bad news about those whom we have met through the busy years, some of whom we have perhaps come to know intimately, still experience does not cushion against the shock of personal tragedy that comes with such news.

Ben Robertson I did not know as well as I would have chosen. I had long been aware of his reputation, of course. For a dozen years he had been, by common assent, one of the ablest reporters in the world. He had made the globe his beat. Australia and the Philippines were as familiar to him as was Europe. And in Europe he had peered beneath the encircling veil with those steady and searching, yet smiling eyes, until he knew the countries and the peoples almost as well as he knew the Bermudacarpeted campus of Clemson College on which he had been reared, and the families of the faculty members among whom he had grown up.

He knew England and France and Germany as well as he knew the hills and vales of Oconee and Pickens Counties, South Carolina, and the ways and fashions, the habits of life and the modes of thought, the flowers and the fragrances, the comedies and the romances and tragedies of the folks of the valley of the Keowee River and Twelve-Mile Creek -- the valley and its people whom he had so lovingly and so truthfully described and preserved for America in what is to me the tenderes, and most moving book ever written about a Southern civilization that has passed forever.

I had read this book -- "Red Hills and Cotton," it is called, and I counsel you, if you love our South and our people, to buy it and treasure it -- I had finished "Red Hills and Cotton" only a few weeks ago and had been going about evangelizing everybody whom I met as to the imperative duty of doing as I had done, when Wright Bryan called me and said, "I want to bring Ben Robertson down to meet you."

They had been raised together on the Clemson campus, their fathers being members of the college faculty, and had been life-long friends. Playmates in childhood, schoolmates, then college mates in the formative years, each had pursued with singleness of purpose the determination and ambition to become a newspaper man.

Wright Bryan came to The Journal shortly after their graduation and rose with rapid steps to become managing editor. Robertson took the world as the shop of his apprenticeship and won his journeyman rank in Adelaide and Honolulu and perhaps other farflung places before buckling down to New York where his success was immediate. But upon it he did not rest.

For some reason I had expected to see a worldly, sophisticated globe-trotter, a dashing beau-sabreur of a war correspondent in the visitor whom Wright Bryan was bringing for a word. Instead there was a slender; grave yet smiling young man, whose voice was so low and so gentle and whose demeanor was so self-effacing, one got the idea that he was the shiest and most timid of mortals. Yet if you looked closely, you could see eyes that photographed all within their range; you could see a mental alertness that missed not an element in the scene, not a syllable of what was said, not an implication from a word or deed.

His modulated voice, his slow speech, his deferential yet alert attitude and his utter lack of pose were parts of what we call manners. And in this young South Carolinian they were manners that made it possible for him to talk on terms of equality with the rudest long-shoreman of the harbor of Sydney or the haughtiest functionary of No. 10 Downing Street.

I didn't wonder that he was a great reporter. He could go anywhere and see anybody, and find the truth whever he sought it, because he was keen and energetic, mentally and physically, and in his person he was still the well-bred South Carolinian of the Keowee Valley.

When I chatted with im, he had just landed from a transatlantic flight. Only a few days before he had been in New Delhi, India. From there he had flown to Cairo. From Cairo he had been passenger in a bomber, sitting on a crate of freight all the way to the port from which he took off for home.

County Historical Society Recipient Of Robertson Papers

The Pickens County Historical Society recently was the recipient of more than 1500 letters and other correspondence of the late Ben Robertson. Robertson was a noted journalist and author of the 1930's and a native of Pickens County.

The gift of the Robertson papers "came like a shot in the dark" to the historical society, Dr. 'Charles Busha told a

crowded news conference Friday. Dr. Busha is the president of the Pickens County Historical Society.

The large donation to the society was made as a gift by Mrs. Julian M. Longley of Dalton, Ga., Ben Robertson's sister.

Ben Robertson was born in Calhoun, which at the time was a section of Clemson. He was a graduate of Clemson and the University of Missouri School of Journalism. While at Clemson, he wrote stories for *The Tiger* and edited the "Taps" yearbook his senior year.

Robertson was perhaps best known nationally for his work as a war correspondent. His ability and personality worn for him many friendships, both in the publishing world and those about whom he wrote.

As a war correspondent for the New York Herald-Tribune, The Associated Press, PM Daily and other newspapers and magazines, he fought fires in German bombing attacks on England. He served as a seaman on the "City of Rayville," the first ship torpedoed in World War II; he covered the warfront in India and the battle of Stalingrad.

A New Year's greeting from George Washington Carver and a letter in which Gone With The Wind author Margaret Mitchell dodges an interview are part of the collection of Robertson papers.

Also in the collection are correspondence with Eleanor Roosevelt and Mrs. Winston Churchill, shop talk with fellow correspondent Ernie Pyle. And a receipt for IPTAY dues are part of the collection.

Robertson is best known locally for his book Red Hills and Cotton. The book tells of his early life in Pickens County, and is described by some as "the most beautiful book ever written about the South."

On February 22, 1943, Robertson was killed in the

Clipper airpiane en route to Lisbon, Portugal. His eventual destination was London, England where he was to assume the news bureau of the New York Heruld Tribune.

It was some time after the airplane crash that Robertson's

body washed ashore. He was identified by a silver bracelet he wore as a New York Herald Tribune correspondent.

After funeral services were held in Tillman Hall on the Clemson Campus, Robertson was buried in the West Veiw Cemetery in Liberty.

"Copies of the collection of Robertson's papers will be available to the public through the historical society," Dr. Busha told the news gathering. "The original documents, however, will be preserved in a safe place so as not to be destroyed."

When the Yankee Clipper crashed Monday, he was on his way back to action, this time as a correspondent of the New York Herald Tribune.

American journalism has lost one of its shining lights. More than that, I think, the South has lost a son who would have become one of its greatest men of letters -- a man who loved the South as one loves his nurturing mother. He had a great, and rare, ability to explain us to those who do not understand and he could explain without depreciation or apology. He was proud of his people.

Ben Robertson was a casualty of the war, as truly as if he had been hit by a shell.





You Can Get Involved!

The 150 Confederate Committee continue to identify Civil War soldiers of Pickens County so that Confederate Crosses of Honor can be placed at their graves. This five-year project coincides with the Centennial Anniversary of the War Between the States.

Tombstones are photographed, information recorded and the GPS coordinates are noted. Each potential soldier and possible wife of a soldier is researched and data is collected into each person's file at the Clayton Family Research Center.

The soldiers, and their sponsors, are recognized at Confederate Memorial Day services, through this newsletter and eventually in a published format.





Application for War Pension by Robert Clanahan

Pendleton District. On the fifth day of October 1820 personally appeared, in open court in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Afsize and General Goal Delivery being a Court of record for the said District in the State Robert Clanahan aged Sixty five years, resident in the District and State aforesaid who, being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

That he Enlisted under Lieutenant Colonel L. Williams and served in the sixth Company under Lieutenant N. Williams Comadant [sic] of Sixth Company of the Sixth Regiment of Maryland Line in January 1776 for during the War—was in the Battles at Germantown, Brandywine, Monmouth, and in various other Skirmishes—was discharged at Annapolis on the Ninth day of November 1783.

Made an Original declaration on the 17th May 1818 and received Pension Certificate No. 8058 dated 5th March 1819. And I do solemnly Swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts, due to me nor [unable to read] other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed,

and by [unable to read] cow and calf, one heifer, three pots, one oven, one skillet, two [unable to read] pot hooks, one Iron pot rack, four gimblets, two augers, two hammers, six chairs, one table, two ploughs, gopher & shovel, two hoes, two reap hooks of little value.

By occupation a farmer, and was wounded in his right arm in the **Battle at Camden**, SC and is much addicted to the rheumatic pains by which he is not able to cut Firewood: Wife **Anna** aged Fifty four years, has fits very often, and generally three every week; Daughter **Mary**, aged thirty years well enough, Daughter **Elizabeth** aged fourteen years, crippled in one foot so that she is unable to do much toward making a support.

Sworn to and declared on the 25th day of October 1820 before Abm. Nott, Presiding Judge. Robert Clanahan. (His mark)

Witnesses: John Verner, Esq. and George Verner, Esq., before Joseph Grisham, Notary Public. 24 Oct 1820. Schedule of Robert McClanahan is worth \$33.75.

Arial author uses yDNa to continue her Smith searches

Linda Smith Cheek was the guest speaker in January. She spoke about her new book, "Arial." Linda is the author of two books on Smiths books and Volumes 1, II, III and IV Genealogies of Old Pendleton District SC, and Volume A and Volume C deed books of Pickens County. She is a 22-year member of the Old Pendleton District Genealogical Society and a former Editor of this newsletter.

"I was born and raised at Arial and still live about one quarter mile from my old home place. I have always had a point interest in the community of Arial. Out of the blue one day decided to see what I could gather on this community," she said in a recent interview. "The people were wonderful to help name the people that lived on the streets and gave me pictures and all sorts of tales."

She worked on the 309 page-book for about three years. "Arial" has just completed the fourth printing and continues to sell well. The author will have copies available at the Reunion of Upcountry Families on April 26.

She also spoke on yDNA, which she calls "the best thing to ever hit genealogy for the Smith Families or any family that has many twists and doubts of who belongs to whom."

"It has given me a new lease on my Smith line with all the yDNA matches and now I am in progress of searching out a brand new Smith line," she said.

"I will also tell you that I have found a descendant of John Buckner Smith and one of Zacheriah Smith and they have been yDNA tested. At this time, neither of them have a match. They do not match one another and not brothers; they do not match Christopher Smith and not his sons."

"After a lot of research, I am pretty sure that I have the correct lines for both Buckner Smith, married to Dianah Toney from Virginia to Spartanburg, SC to Old Pendleton District SC and Zacheriah Smith, married to Elizabeth Adams from Rutherford County, NC to Greenville, SC."

Sheriff enlightens audience on historic Eastatoe Valley

Anne Sheriff, local historian and the OPD Archivist, was our guest speaker in February. She spoke to the members and guests about the early development of the Eastatoe Valley, including the Cherokee villages, early settlers, churches, and schools.

Her presentation included maps from 1820 and 1957, as well as several photographs of early homes in the area.

Anne told the audience about Eastatoe Town and the nearby Cherokee villages; and how a trader named Beamer was operating there as early as 1724. There were two deadly and destructive battles with the local tribes in 1760 and 1776.

The first land plats in this area were sold John Miller, Adam Right and James Smith in 1784. She spoke of early settlers like the Alexanders, Chapmans, Nimmons, McKinneys and others.

She detailed the early churches, including historic McKinney's Chapel, as well as cemeteries, schools, and post offices that once existed in the valley, citing many more local names.



Reese Bowen (1814-1900)
Maternal Great-Grandfather
of Ben Robertson

Reese Bowen was born October 31, 1814; he died July 7, 1900. He was a descendant of Moses and Rebecca Bowen of Wales, a principality constituting an integral part of the United Kingdom. Reese Bowen married Martha Elizabeth Blassingame (18 Oct 1822 - 7 Apr 1905). In 1868, when Pickens District was divided into Oconee and Pickens counties, Mr. Bowen served on the committee that selected a site where Pickens County's courthouse could be located. Other members of the committee were James H. Ambler, Thomas Price, Dr. W. T. Field, James E. Hagood and James Lewis. After a thorough search over the new county, the committee selected a site on a plateau about equal distance between the Keowee and Saluda rivers. The county's seat of government was soon established there, and the Town of Pickens developed into a thriving municipality.



Additional Information About the Family of William Thomas Bowen



This section contains brief biographical sketches for the six children of William Thomas Bowen and Rebecca Amelia (Allgood) Bowen. Among these offspring is the mother of journalist Ben Robertson, as well as his maternal aunts and uncles.

William Joel Bowen (21 Sep 1869 – 14 Jul 1938) graduated from the Medical College of South Carolina at Charleston, and he then practiced medicine in Mt. Pleasant, S.C. He married Sallie Eugenia Moss (1867 – 1950) of Oconee County, S.C. Dr. and Mrs. Bowen had the following children: William Joel Bowen, Jr. (1896 – 1918); Amelia Allgood Bowen (1901 – 1902); Mrs. Robert C. Astrop of Richmond, Virginia; and Professor Boone M. Bowen, of Atlanta, Georgia, who taught at Emory University. Dr. Bowen died unexpectedly at the age of sixty-nine in Charleston, S.C. He and his wife, along with two of their young children, were buried at Walhalla Westview Cemetery in Oconee County, S.C.

Lillian "Lillie" Tesora Bowen (16 Mar 1871 – 2 Nov 1946) married Julius "Jule" Euphronius Parsons (5 Sep 1870 – 7 Mar 1915), son of Confederate veteran Ferdinand Columbus Parsons (5 Sept 1828 – 1 Jan 1905), who served to the rank of 2nd lieutenant in Co. F, 22nd S.C. Infantry Volunteers. The children of Julius and Lillie (Bowen) Parsons were Thomas Julian Parsons (1891 – 1892); Mary Elfleda Parsons (b. & d. 1893); and Columbus Bowen Parsons (10 Sep 1894 – 25 Feb 1939), who, on June 16, 1923, married Florence Randall Stewart (11 Feb 1899 – 2 May 1986), a school teacher in Pickens, S.C. She was a daughter of the Rev. J. M. Stewart (16 May 1839 – 26 Feb 1929) and Bessie (Hamilton) Stewart. Julius Euphronius Parsons died in Lisbon, Florida, and his wife Lillie Parsons died at the age of seventy-five at Greenville General Hospital in Greenville, S.C. Both were buried at Secona Baptist Church in Pickens, S.C.

James Reese Bowen (7 Sep 1873 – 10 Apr 1953) first married Emma Milton Cox (21 Mar 1876 – 26 Dec 1940), who was born in Belton, S.C. and was a daughter of Matthew G. Cox. She died at the age of thirty-four in Greenville, S.C. and was buried at Sunrise Cemetery in Pickens, S.C. The second wife of James Reese Bowen was Virginia Pauline Bowen. James Reese Bowen was the father of James Walter Bowen of Vancouver, Washington; Cecil R. Bowen of Greenville, S.C.; Grady Bowen of Greenville, S.C.; Mrs. Maude B. Polk; Mrs. Annie Wood of Columbia, S.C.; Mrs. Luke Miller of Baltimore, Maryland; and Nelle B. Robinson (Mrs. J. D. Robinson) of Greenville, S.C. James Reese Bowen resided in the Sans Souci section of Greenville, S.C. for 25-odd years, and he was employed there at Mills Mill, a textile manufacturing company, from which he retired in 1948. He was a member of Sans Souci Baptist Church in Greenville. Mr. Bowen died in Travelers Rest, S.C. and was buried in Woodlawn Memorial Park in Greenville County, S.C.

Elizabeth "Bettie" Mahala Bowen (3 May 1875 – 5 Jun 1943) married Wade Clayton O'Dell (14 Jun 1875 – 26 May 1953), son of William Taylor O'Dell (21 May 1847 – 19 May 1933) and Ary (Parsons) O'Dell (9 Mar 1849 – 7 Jun 1938). Mr. and Mrs. O'Dell had one child, Alfred Taylor O'Dell (24 Mar 1899 – 10 Sep 1948), who was a professor of English at Furman University. He married Catherine McGlothlin, a daughter of Dr. William J. McGlothlin, president of Furman University. Because of her gift of \$675,000 to Furman University, Mrs. Alfred Taylor O'Dell became a major benefactor of the institution.

Mary Iola Bowen (6 Oct 1877 – 24 Dec 1910) married Benjamin Franklin Robertson (2 Aug 1873 – 1 Jul 1943). She was an 1899 graduate of Winthrop College (now Winthrop University) in Rock Hill, S.C. Mr. and Mrs. Robertson had two children, Benjamin Franklin Robertson, Jr., who became widely known as Ben Robertson and who graduated with a degree in horticulture from Clemson College in 1923; and Mary B. Robertson, who graduated from Winthrop College in 1924. On December 22, 1925, she married Julian M. Longley (6 Jun 1901 – 19 Mar 1979), who had obtained a degree in textile engineering from Clemson College. Mr. and Mrs. Longley resided for many years in Dalton, Georgia. Mr. Longley was manager there of the American Thread Company, and his wife was active in many civic, cultural, and social affairs. The couple had two sons. Ben and Mary B. Robertson's mother, Mary Iola (Bowen)
Robertson, died at the age of only thirty-three and was buried at West View Cemetery in Liberty, S.C. Her former husband later married Hattie Boggs (1885 – 1918) of Liberty, S.C., and the couple had one child, Hattie Boone "Boonie" Robertson, who was only four years old when her mother died of influenza in 1918. She married Frederick Wohlke Wagener of Brooklyn, New York, and the couple had three sons.

Thomas "Tom" Alexander Bowen (27 Dec 1880 - 26 Mar 1963) was the last child born in this Bowen family; he also became the last-surviving member of the family. On April 11, 1906, he married Willis Taylor O'Dell (5 Oct 1885 - 11 May 1983), daughter of William Taylor O'Dell, a Confederate veteran, and Ary (Parsons) O'Dell. Thomas "Tom" Alexander Bowen attended Clemson Agricultural College and was later Pickens County's first farm agent, a position he had held for thirty-six years before his retirement in 1949. He was an early promoter of rural electrification in the county, and he founded the 4-H Club Camp at Rocky Bottom in the county's mountains. Mr. Bowen also founded and served as the first president of the Pickens County Good Will Club. For many years, Tom Bowen promoted the need for local farmers to diversify their growing of various new crops, as cotton farming became less profitable. In 1942, he received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Association of County Farm Agents. Moreover, in 1939 the county agricultural building in Pickens, S.C. was named the Bowen Agricultural Building when it was dedicated in his honor. Tom Bowen died at the age of eightytwo years and was buried in the O'Dell-Clayton family cemetery in Pickens County. His widow was also buried there later. Mr. Bowen was survived by his wife and two sons, Thomas Otis Bowen, who once served as the farm agent for Sumter County, S.C., and William "Billy" Clayton Bowen (d. in 2001 at the age of 91) and was a professor emeritus of agricultural education at Clemson College.

Margaret Mitchell Refused to Grant Ben Robertson an Interview in Her Letter That Is Reprinted Below

After reading over this long letter, I realize that you will probably think that I am angry or very rude. I am neither and I want you to believe that I am trying to save both of us from something that is dangerous and embarrassing. It will injure me if a superficial, erroneous article is published about me, and it will hurt your reputation and standing if you are the writer of it, and I just cannot see how this article could be anything else than that.

Your letter gives me the impression that the Post is pushing you into writing the article even after you had told them of my refusal and my objections. It is diffucult for me to believe that the Post would be taking this attitude if it understood all the circumstances. From long acquaintance with the Post, I am unwilling to believe it would insist un publishing a superficial or erroneous article over my protest. I believe that the easiest and simplest way to get the situation cleared up would be for me to write the Post direct. I know Stuart Rose quite pleasantly and John has a letterwriting acquaintance with Mr. Wesley Stout, so I believe that if I wrote to one of them and gave him a frank statement of the facts, the Post would see the whole matter in its proper light. Let me know if you wish me to write them.

Displayed above are the last two paragraphs in what was designated as pages seven of a letter written to Ben Robertson and signed by Margaret Mitchell, author of *Gone With the Wind*. (The first six pages of the letter are not included in Ben's papers at the Pickens County Museum. Also note that the author signed her letter with her married name.) In her letter, Miss Mitchell, who was seemingly an impetuous writer, emphatically proclaimed that she would not allow Ben to interview her. That letdown both surprised and vexed Ben Robertson, who had considered the author as a fellow professional journalist who would probably lend him a hand. (Miss Mitchell had worked during the 1920s at the *Atlanta Journal* where she wrote feature articles.) Moreover, 3en had already explained to Miss Mitchell that he needed an interview to prepare an interesting

and worthy biographical article about her for *The Saturday Evening Post*. In addition, editors of the popular magazine regarded an interview as a weighty prerequisite for the preparation of the desired article, After all, Miss Mitchell was a promising – but still relatively unknown – new novelist whose opus was lauded by many reviewers and was also welcomed as a money-maker by the book trade. The author's book of historical fiction, with its setting in the Civil War and Reconstruction eras, was sweeping the nation. Moreover, devotees of novels were clamoring for information about the woman who had written a good one.

Margaret Mitchell, a Georgia native, was born in Atlanta in 1900. She briefly attended Smith College, a private liberal arts college for women in Northampton, Massachusetts. From 1922 until 1926, she worked as a feature writer at the *Atlanta Journal*; her articles were published in the newspaper's Sunday magazine. She was best known by her close friends and associates as Peggy Mitchell. Before the publication of *Gone With the Wind*, the writer was not widely known beyond the greater Atlanta metropolitan area. But the frenzy created by her celebrated book had meteorically thrust her into the national spotlight, the likes of which she had never encountered—nor probably even envisaged. Indeed, almost overnight Margaret Mitchell became a spontaneous celebrity. *Gone With the Wind* became so popular that it ultimately supplanted Harriett Beecher Stowe's antislavery novel *Uncle Tom's Cabin* as America's all-time best-selling work of fiction. (During the American Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln was introduced to Mrs. Stowe at the White House. The president was later quoted as having greeted the author by saying, "So you're the little woman who wrote the book that started this great war".)

After the publication of Margaret Mitchell's much sought-after and extolled novel, the famous Georgia author never wrote another book. But in 1939 Gone With the Wind was made into a Hollywood motion picture, and it was wisely and lucratively given the same title as the author's crowd-pleasing novel. The two leading characters in both the book and movie were portrayed by Clark Gable (1901-1960), as Rhett Butler, and by Vivian Leigh (1913-1967), who excelled as Scarlett O'Hare. Both film stars won Academy Awards for their performances. During World War II, Clark Gable was a major in the U.S. Army Air Force. Vivian Leigh, who had studied at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London, later won her second Academy Award for her performance as Blanche DuBois in A Streetcar Named Desire. Afilm adaptation of With the Wind received the American Film Institute's third-place ranking in a listing of the 100 best American movies of all time.

Although the book *Gone With the Wind* was never considered to be a great literary masterpiece by astute reviewers and aficionados of literature, it did garner the exceptional plaudits of readers of popular fiction and others who favored avocations in mass culture. Moreover, in 1937 the novel was awarded a Pulitzer Prize.

In the final analysis, Margaret Mitchell's sole book certainly underscored the devastating

and far-reaching political, social and economic cataclysms of America's greatest internal armed conflict. Those results were especially felt in the South where the deleterious consequences of the war affected many ensuing generations of Southerners. And, by genuine coincidence, *Gone With the Wind* also served as a literary exclamation point to the closure of the Civil War and the demise of the pro-slavery Confederacy.

Margaret Mitchell's life ended tragically in 1949 when she was forty-eight years of age.

While the author was walking in downtown Atlanta, she was struck down by a drunk driver who had lost control of his car.

individualists they were.



He died in the following year at the age of thirty-eight.

On this **Twenty sixth day of October 1820**, personally appeared, in Open Court, in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Assize and General Gaol Delivery being a Court of Record, **Edmund Singleton** aged Sixty six years resident in the Pendleton District in the State who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

That he enlisted under Captain Lewallen Jones? of the first, Lighthorse Regiment Commanded by Colonel Theodorick Beann of Virginia Line was in Battles at Strawberry Hills and Monmouth.

An original Declaration was made on the **Twenty eighth day of October 1819**. Number of Pension Certificate 17,3551.

And I, do solemnly swear that I was a resided citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

One Mare and colt, two cows and calves, and two yearlings, twenty three head of hogs. By occupation a farmer: The Ream of this Deponents Belly is broke wich enables him to do any work almost. Wife Elizabeth aged Fifty nine years who is very often unable to do any thing; Robert aged thirty two years who has always been very sickly and has not got his health yet, Thomas aged Nineteen years who is unable to do any thing, Jincy aged Seventeen years, Overstreet aged fifteen years; of which the two youngest of the family only, are able to do much towards their support. one ax one mattock, one pot one oven Two plows and two pair trace chains.

Elizabeth's father was William McGuffin. He had several children including three sons who moved to Texas in the early to mid 1800s: John, Hugh and James. Hugh McGuffin became a great friend to Stephen F Austin.

Hugh and Elizabeth's children were Edmund Hugh Williams born about 1813-1816, Andrew C Williams born 1820 and Matthew M Williams born 1822. All three sons were born in Pendleton but married and died in Texas/Louisiana. I'm looking for any record of their birth or baptism. There may also be more children that I have yet to find.

Richard Speake Revolutionary War Pension

Abstracted by G. Anne Sheriff

The State of South Carolina, Pendleton District. On this **Twenty seventh day of October 1820**, Court of General Sessions of the Peace Oyer and Terminer Assize and General Gaol Delivery being a Court of Record for the said District in the said State, **Richard Speake** aged Sixty five years, resident in the Pendleton District in the said State, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

That he enlisted in April A.D. 1776 under Captain Bothin of the Third Regiment Commanded by Colonel Thomson but shortly afterwards commanded by Colonel James Mason of the South Carolina Line for the term of fifteen Months but – was continued in the Continental Service. Nine months after the term of this Deponents enlistment expired – was in the Battles at Sulivans Island, Cowpens and at the Seige of Ninety-six and several others; was honourably discharged but has since lost his discharge.

An original Declaration was made on the Twenty seventh day of October 1818 and has received a Pension Certificate dated Twenty Sixth day of November 1819 Number 16,029.

And I, do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

History of Mt. Carmel Baptist Church

Prepared by a committee consisting of Messrs. J.R. Lathem, Joseph Looper, N.K. Smith, L.L. Smith and G.E.R. Williams and read before the church by Mr. C.V. Lathem.

This church owes its origin to a community prayer meeting. About 1830 a small body of Christians was meeting from house to house, and the idea of a church was originated.

Permission was obtained from Cross Roads church for them to meet as an arm of that church. They began meeting as an arm of Cross Roads church, but did not seem very successful, and after they had met for some time the mother church sent Bro. Joe Looper down to ask them to come back to Cross Roads, but a few faithful sisters, viz: The Misses **Kennemore**, **Mrs. Mary Lathem**, **Mrs. Niza Hunt**, **Mrs. Martha Burdine**, begged **Bro. Looper** to meet with them, and through their combined efforts this church grew, and today we have a membership of over 200.

From the best information obtainable this is the fifth house this church has had since its organization. It was organized as a church in January, 1837. The presbytery consisted of the following: Bros. Wm. King, David Blythe, Joseph Robinson, Allen Robinson, Stephen Powell, W. Cantrell, Mark Freeman. Bro. King acted as moderator.

Charles Davis and John Kennemore, the first two deacons of this church, were ordained by this presbytery. Bro. Davis seems to have been clerk from the beginning but in February, 1837 Bro. Harvey Kennemore was elected clerk.

In April of the same year the church received **Stephen Powell** as a member. He was a licensed preacher, and in July of the same year he was ordained a preacher by the following brethren: Elders **Jordan** and **Blythe**, and **Capps.** Bro. **Powell** seems to have been supplying the church at the time of his ord

In July 1840 the church elected Bro. Jackson as deacon. At this time the church was being visited by various preachers, viz: Roper, Boroughs, King, Blythe, Jordan, Robinson and Bro. Miller, a Methodist circuit rider. The church seems to have been growing spiritually and numerically for in October, 1842, the church received into its membership by experience the much beloved and noble servant of God, the Rev. W.B. Singleton. The church also set apart two new deacons, Joshua Jackson and D. H. Kennemore. The

presbytery consisted of Rev. T.L. Roper, Rev. S. Powell, and Deacons Grogan, Whitmire and Davis.

In 1843 Bro. Kennemur resigned as clerk and Bro. H. Cle_Hunt was elected and served until April, 1845. Bro. Red Rackley was elected clerk in November, 1845.

Bro. Powell was still supplying this church and asked permission to establish an arm of the church at old Brushy Creek, now Siloam church, and in June 1846, was organized as a church. The church was still growing, and in 1847 sent out another preacher, D. Harvey Kennemore. He was ordained by the following, by the laying on of hands: Bros. D. Powell, A. Williams and James Kay.

It seems that Brother Powell preached for the church from the time it was organized until 1849. In February Bro. D. Blythe was called to the pastorate and served until 1852 when Jesse Dean was elected. In this year Bro. Rackley resigned as clerk and Bro. John Smith was elected. In 1854 Bro. John Ariail was called to the pastorate and preached twice a month. During Bro. Ariail's pastorate the church ordained and set apart another preacher, Bro. N.R. Smith, who was ordained by the following: Rev. Jesse Dean, David Blythe, T. Looper and W.B. Singleton. In February, 1856, Bro. Holder was called as pastor. In 1857 Bro. Powell was elected and served one year. Then the church called Rev. W.B. Singleton, who served one year. Then Rev. T. Looper took charge of the church and served until 1862. Elder David Blythe was then called and served until January, 1866, when the church called Elder A. D. Bowers. At the same time the church elected two more deacons, W.L. and O.H.L. Smith. They were set apart by a presbytery consisting of Rev. T. Looper, Rev. A.D. Bowers. Deacons Joseph Looper and Elijah Roper. L.R. Smith was elected church clerk.

In 1869 Rev. W.B. Singleton took charge of the church as pastor. In 1872 B.F. Dilworth was elected church clerk and Rev. T. Looper preached for the church. In 1873 Rev. W.B. Singleton again supplied the church. In 1874 Rev. A.D. Bowers was called and in 1875 Elder G.W. Singleton was called and in 1875 Elder G.W. Singleton was called as pastor and Bro. N.K. Smith was elected clerk of the church. In 1876 Rev. W.B. Singleton again preached for the church and L.R. Smith was set apart as a deacon. The presbytery consisted of Rev. W.B. Singleton and Rev. G.W. Singleton.

In September 1878, the old church having gone to rack and the members having been meeting in the schoolhouse for several years, resolved to build a church – the building we now occupy. The following building committee was appointed: Bros. W.L. Smith and B.F. Dilworth, Citizens G.W. and J.S. Lathem and W.R. Clardy. The ground the church now stands on was donated by W.R. Clardy, and the largest contributors were G.W. and J.S. Lathem. Later the building committee was enlarged by appointed E.T. Holcombe, L.R. Smith, J.W. Hunt, S. O'Sheals, W.B. Singleton, and M.F. Williams and Citizen W.J. Ponder. The new church was dedicated Sept. 27, 1879. The dedication sermon was preached by Elder W.B. Singleton, from Timothy 3d chapter, 15th verse. By request of the church Rev. G.W. Singleton helped to raise the money for painting the church.

In February 1880, Brother __ Smith resigned as clerk and Bro. N.A. Christopher was elected. In March, 1881, Rev. S.A. Gary took charge of the church, and during his pastorate the church had a great revival and the church was greatly strengthened and another preacher, J.F. Singleton, was received into the church.

In February, 1884, Rev. J.W. Hutchins took charge of the church. In February, 1885, Bro. Christopher resigned as clerk and Bro. J.F. Singleton was elected. In May, 1887, the church set apart a new deacon, Bro. Wm. Hutchins, T. Looper and Deacons N.K. Smith and J.F. Singleton. Ordination prayer by Bro.

T. Looper.

The first burial at this church was September 4, 1887.

In October, 1887, Bro. Singleton resigned as clerk of the church and J.R. Lathem was elected and has continued until the present time almost 28 years, and has missed only seven conferences in that time.

In November, 1887, Rev. S.A. Gary was elected pastor and served one year. During Bro. Gary's pastorate the church bought its first organ and the following brethren acted as a committee to raise the money and purchase the organ: T.O. Singleton, James Hunt, H.G. Smith and M.F. Williams.

In 1889 Bro. W.B. Singleton preached for us, and in May of the same year Bro. J.F. Singleton was ordained a minister of the gospel by the following presbytery: Revs. W.B. Singleton, Thomas Looper and J.M. Stewart. Bro. Stewart delivered the charge to Bro. Singleton, which was a very strong and able one.

In May, 1890, the church set apart two new deacons, Bros. J.R. Lathem and I.P. Garrick. The presbytery consisted of Bros. W.B. Singleton, J.F. Singleton, W.L. Smith, N.K. Smith, Wm. Kennemore, Melvin Barton and J.T. Childress.

In 1891 Bro. J.F. Singleton began preaching for us. In 1892 Bro. Johnie Freeman took up the work and in 1895 Bro. W.B. Singleton again supplied the church and continued until 1898 making a total of 19 years he had preached for the church, and his last years were his best years; and none but God can tell what a great work he did for us. He departed this life Sept. 8, 1898.

In 1898 Rev. I.C. Holtzclaw began to preach for the church and continued until January, 1902, when he resigned. During his pastorate we started a fund to place a monument to Bro. W. B. Singleton and this church headed the list with \$27.50. We also helped to raise a monument to Bro. Hutchins.

In March, 1902, Bro. B. Holder began preaching for us and preached for us the balance of the year. In April, 1903, Bro. W.C. Seaborn took charge of the church and preached for us this year and the next.

In 1905 one of our own boys began preaching for us, Bro. W. A. Christopher, and during his pastorate the church was greatly built up. Three new deacons were added to the church, L.L. Smith, John Christopher and Leigh Hunt. The presbytery consisted of Robert Kay of Georges Creek, Samuel Looper, J.B. Findley, Martin Bowen and John Roper of Cross Roads, N.K. Smith, G.E.R. Williams and J.R. Lathem of this church. Rev. W.A. Christopher acted as moderator and Bro. H.K. Williams acted as clerk, and at this same meeting Bro. W.A. Christopher received a unanimous and indefinite call. He served two years; Bro. J.M. Culbertson then preached for us nine months and W.P. Holland finished out the year.

In 1909 Bro. W.J. Foster was unanimously called and served five years. The church was greatly blessed during his pastorate.

We then called Bro. D.W. Hiott, our present pastor.

Minutes of The Commissioners of Free Schools for Pickens District (1837-1851) W.P. A. Project 65-33-118. Copied by Lula May McNinch, 1936

4th Monday, 23rd January 1837 at Pickens Court House. The Commissioners of Free School appointed at the last Session of the Legislature, met according to the provisions of the Acts of Assembly. Present: Joseph Grisham, Silas Kirksey, Joseph B. Reid, William L. Keith.

The Board then proceeds to elected officers whereupon the following persons were elected to wit: Col. Joseph Grisham, Chairman and William L. Keith, Secretary & Treasurer.

Received that in future the Teachers shall be paid according to their several cases.

- 1st Class to Receive \$10 per annum
- 2nd Class to Receive \$8 per annum
- 3rd Class to Receive \$6 per annum

Resolved: That on the fourth Monday in January annual hereafter there shall be an examination of every Teacher by the Board, those deemed capable of instructing in Spelling and correct pronunciation according to Walkers Standard Writing and Arithmetic shall be ranked in the Third Class. Those exhibiting higher proficiency in the above branches, shall be marked in the second Class. Those qualified to teach the foregoing with the addition of English Grammar and Geography shall be ranked in the first Class. Rate of tuition to be regulated by the Class into which Teachers have been admitted, and no Teacher shall in future receive any aid from this Board, without producing the most satisfactory evidence of good moral Character, steady habits, and general attention to business at the time of his application.

Resolved that every Teacher of Free schools shall keep a day Book subjected to the inspection of the Trustees, who shall certify at the end of each quarter that the Scholars admitted as free have attended at least two thirds of that quarter that they have been examined by the Trustees their general proficiency and the deportment and attention to the Teacher during each quarter.

Resolved that no report of a Teacher will be passed unless the quarter shall have been completed, within three months after the quarterly meeting, at which it ought to have closed.

Resolved that any Teacher who shall exact any compensation from the parents or guardians of Free Scholars subsequent to this date, who shall be convicted of this Act, shall be denied ever after, the patronage of this Board.

The following is a Resolution of the State Legislature.

Resolved that the several Boards of Commissioners of free schools, shall require every Teacher employed by them to submit his account for Teaching setting forth therein, the exact time each Scholar was taught by him to certify the same by affidavit and that in future no account for Teaching shall be paid by any Board until the above requisition is strictly complied with.

Resolved that we only allow six Scholars to each School. Resolved that the following Schools be located to Wit:

Lynda Dillard Flowe wrote n short article in the newsletter concerning John Blackwell Marchbanks who was born 14 April 1837, a son of Stephen Perry Marchbanks and his wife, Rachel Rebecca Jones. J.B. Marchbanks joined the Reedy River Baptist Church "by experience". He married Mary Jane Ferguson on 22 Nov 1857. He was a member of the 3rd Reserves Troops, Co. G and 1st State Troops, Co. H. His grave was marked with a Confederate Cross in May of 2005.

Reedy River Baptist Church was established prior to 1789 by Revolutionary War veterans, incorporated as "Head of Enoree Baptist Society". The church moved to its present location around 1819. Just a few years ago, the oldest described tombstone was dated 1822.

The cemetery is significant in that it contains graves of founders of the area, slaves, 40 Confederate soldiers and veterans, 1 Spanish American War veteran, 14 World War I veterans, and more than 40 World War II veterans.

On Friday night, April 25, 2014, of the Upcountry Family Reunion, conducted at the Folger Fine Arts Building at Southern Wesleyan University, Paul Kankula was presented the first copy of the Pickens County Cemetery Map by Kenny Blakeney and Anne Sheriff.

Paul Kankula moved to Seneca from Michigan and Gary Flynn moved from Dayton, Ohio—both ham radio operators. During the last 15 years Paul and Gary visited hundreds of cemeteries, recorded their longitude and latitude, took photographs of the sites, and placed them on GenWeb and other internet outlets. In Pickens County they numbered 327 possible cemeteries. Kankula and Flynn collected cemetery information on Anderson and Oconee counties and other cemeteries throughout South Carolina and Georgia.

The Old Edgefield District Genealogical Society and Edgefield Civic League are hosting the third annual "Southern Studies Showcase" in Edgefield on September 19 and 20, 2014. Genealogical and historical societies from all over South Carolina and parts of Georgia are being invited to participate in this two-day event. Over 130 people attended the event in 2013 and 2014 and this year, it is expected to bring over 200 people to the Town of Edgefield.

Vendors are being invited to set up tables in several vacant building on the Town Square. Twenty-four workshop classes will be held over the course of the two days, with local and out-of-town speakers giving lectures on a variety of topics (please see attached schedule).

These workshops will be held in the Town Hall, the Discovery Center, and Edgefield United Methodist Church. This two-day gathering will begin on Friday at 10:00 a. m., with speakers and workshops, and a "Block Party" on the Edgefield Courthouse Square Friday evening from 6:30 p. m. to 8:30 p. m., including dinner and an historical re-enactment from Edgefield's colorful past.

On Saturday speakers and workshops will be held from 9:00 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. Time will be allotted on Friday and Saturday for lunch at local restaurants, shopping with local merchants, and visiting local historic and tourist sites.

Pennsylvania Death Certificates Starting to Appear On-Line

The following information is from the People for Better Pennsylvania Historical Records Access (PaHR-Access). The initial batch of Pennsylvania state death certificates is now online through Ancestry.com (as of April 18th). Remember only birth and death certificates that are open records will be online (50 years for death certificates and 105 years for birth certificates). The overall schedule is:

1906-24 death certificates – April 2014 1925-44 death certificates – June 2014 1945-63 death certificates – November 2014

1906 birth certificates – March 2015

July 24, 1837

Resolved that Levi Burts, C.P. Dupre and John A. Moore be allowed 20 scholars to each Saturday School.

Resolved that each School be allowed 10 Scholars six months when the teacher has been reexamined to our previous order.

Resolved that **Philip Smith** be allowed the aggregate amount of scholars.

Resolved that John A. Moore be allowed to remove his location from Perkins Creek to the neighborhood of Henry Johns. And appointed Henry Johns, Abner Hutchens & Saml. Johnson Trustees.

Resolved that **James Chandler** change the location of his school from Eastatoe Meeting House to Toxaway and appoint **E. Hinkle, John McKinney** & **John Reid** Trustees.

Resolved that the Chairman and Secretary be allowed to draw on the Treasurer for report passed in favor of **Henry Thompson**.

Resolved that **J.L. Kenady** [**Kennedy**] attend at our next Board and be examined or forfeit his location and that Col. **F.N. Garvin** notify him of this order.

Resolved that the Secretary pay over the money in his hands over paying **John A. Moore**. Report to **James Chandler** for what is due him in arrears.

Resolved that all teachers that have failed to attend at this meeting to be reexamined are allowed to teach the 10 scholars and attend at our next meeting and be reexamined and give a reasonable excuse and that they be allowed pay in proportion to the other Teachers.

Resolved that in the future Teachers shall not be required to report every Quarter. That in the future if there be a deficiency in Number of Free Scholars for one quarter, they may be made up before reported to the Board, but no greater amount be allowed when reported than granted for the time of Location or in that proposition.

Resolved, that the Chairman & Secretary draw on the Treasurer for amounts due Report passed at this Board.

Resolved, that this Board adjourn to meet on the 4th Monday in October next at 11 o'clock.

Pickens Court House, 23 October 1837.

The Commissioners of Free Schools met at Pickens C.H. on fourth Monday of October it being the 23rd day agreeable to adjournment. Present: Joseph Grisham, F.N. Garvin, Jacob R. Cox, Silas Kirksey, Samuel Mosley, Joseph B. Reid & W.L. Keith.

The Chairman directed that S. Kirksey & J.R. Cox to proceed to examine the Teachers present.

The Chair then took up the Reports and passed them in the usual form.

Resolve that the Chairman give notice to the Teachers of Free Schools through the Pendleton Messenger that each Teacher will be required to set forth in his day Book the exact time each scholar was taught by him agreeable to the Act of Legislature. And in future no Report will be passed unless the law is strictly complied with.

Resolve that John A. Moore school be located three months back to be taught on Concross near John McWhorters and appoint John McWhorter, Alex. Bryce, and Pendleton Isbell Trustees.

Resolve that the following Schools be Located:

- 32. 1st Class. **Thomas J. Zachary** (10 Scholars and six months). Trustees: **F.N. Garvin, Benjamin Chapman**, and **James Gaines**, Esquire.
- 33. 2nd Class. Lemuel H. Verner (10 Scholars and three months). Trustees: W.C. Lee, L. Towers & T.W. Harbin.
- 34. 2nd Class. William R. Williamson (10 Scholars and three months). Trustees: Simeon Webb, Mathias Fricks & Daniel Johnson.

Eagle Scout Project to Photograph 50,000 Graves

Fifteen-year-old Hunter Boyer has chosen a unique Eagle Scout project to benefit the past, present and future at the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery in San Antonio, Texas, USA. Boyer's goal is to recruit enough volunteers to take photos of over 50,000 graves using the smartphone app BillionGraves.

The BillionGraves Android and iOS app allows anyone to quickly and easily capture images of headstones with their GPS locations. From there, these records are transcribed and made available for free to families everywhere on BillionGraves.com and FamilySearch.org

FamilySearch.org, the genealogy website of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, works in conjunction with BillionGraves to provide family history enthusiasts with critical genealogical information from headstones that cannot be acquired by any other source.

FamilySearch.org has selected San Antonio as a trial area to test the BillionGraves app with youth and young adult members of the Church in hopes of increasing interest in family history among young Church members. Boyer's Eagle Scout project will be one of the first of these Latter-day Saint BillionGraves youth events in the test pilot area.

Boyer says he thinks family history is something important that youth should be more excited about. "I think it's such a good experience for kids my age to have. It's been a good experience for me to be part of," Boyer said. "There is a special feeling with doing genealogy and learning about people before us."

As a member of the Church, Boyer has been promoting his Eagle Scout project among the youth in other Latter-day Saint congregations as well as high schools across the state.

"I was first introduced to BillionGraves by my mom. She used it to help her piece together her family tree," Boyer said. "But I think it's great for young people. It's very simple, and I love how it's set up with a GPS."

This month is BillionGraves' "Million More in May" promotion month. The app, with over 100,000 users, wants to reach one million new records during the month of May. BillionGraves is offering a new iPad Mini to anyone who takes 50,000 unique images or transcribes 75,000 records.

Boyer predicts that the photos taken at his Eagle Scout project will put BillionGraves at just over 1 million and will help reach its goal.

Anne also reported that the Confederate Soldiers Project need funds for the expected 200+ crosses needed for placement on graves that have been identified. Barbara Clark is creating a database for the project.

She also reported that the SC Archives Funding Bill vetoed by the Governor, has been overridden by the SC House vote and will be soon voted on by the SC Senate.

The Federation of Genealogical Societies will be held August 27-30, 2014 in San Antonio, Texas if anyone is interested in attending. Anne Sheriff is planning to go.

Eyewitness Account of the Unveiling of a Portrait of General Andrew Pickens at the Old Stone Church Near Clemson






October 3, 1982, was an unusually hot autumn day, and a large group of people had assembled at the Old Stone Church near Clemson, S.C. to witness the unveiling of a portrait of General Andrew Pickens, Revolutionary War hero and the man for whom Pickens County was named. I arrived at the old rustic church about fifteen minutes before the ceremony was scheduled to start, and I had a opportunity to scout about the churchyard cemetery, as well as the restored church building itself. It was like turning back the pages of time as I wandered among the old tombs, including the graves of General Pickens and his wife, Rebecca Calhoun Pickens.

The Old Stone Church sits back in a grove of trees just off Highway 76, the road between Clemson and Anderson, S.C. The site of the church is impressive, and there is a quietness about the place, despite the hustle and bustle going on along the highway below the church. As I walked about on that historic spot of ground, where the church was constructed in 1802, I could almost hear the voices of long ago. But I knew that those voices had long since been quiet and would never be heard again.

As I examined the interior of the church while the participants in the ceremony were getting ready for the historic affair, I walked up several steps to the unique pulpit of the church. The pulpit is elevated and it has





a large window behind it. The old wooden shutter had been pulled back, allowing the fresh air and sunlight to filter directly into the church. The window had no screens; it is just as it probably was in the days of Andrew Pickens, who was one of the founders of the Old Stone Church and one of its first elders. I stood in the simple but impressive pulpit and could feel a cool breeze and hear it rustling among the turning leaves outside the window. As I stood there looking into the sanctuary of the rustic edifice, I felt almost as though some of the great men of God who once served the church as ministers were standing there with me.

All the old wooden shutters on the windows had been thrown open and the glass panel windows on both sides of the church had been raised to allow the breezes to sweep through the unairconditioned building a building that does not have electricity. Three outside doors of the church had also been thrown open; they did not have screens either. At the two side doors, there were rough stone steps, and as I walked up those steps, I felt as though I was

When I sat down in the old pews (at least they looked very old), I didn't feel their hardness. On the contrary, I felt elated—as if I was sitting on cushions of air. An inner peace seemed to come over mg, and I could almost feel the presence of departed saints.

The unveiling ceromony, sponsored by the Pickens County Historical Society, was a very beautiful--but simple--affair. The portrait of Andrew Pickens had been set up to the right of the pulpit. The oil painting was convered with a bright red velvet cloth which covered the entire painting and its frame. As I sat there awaiting the unveiling of the portrait, I couldn't help but wondering how it would look--how the "Fighting Elder" would be depicted by the artist Martin Mugar, who painted the portrait that had been donated to the Pickens County Historical Society Museum by James P. Rouleau, a resident of Greensboro, N.C. and a descendance of Andrew Pickens. As I sat there in great anticipation, I could almost hear beautiful music coming from the antique organs that stood on both sides of the pulpit.


At the appointed time, 3 P.M., the unveiling ceremony started. Officials and guests of the Pickens County Historical Society were seated at the front of the church where they were facing the audience. I recognized Dr. Charles H. Busha, President of the Pickens County Historical Society, Dr. Georgiana McDaniel Harvey, immediate past president of the Society, and John McCravy, curator of the Society's Museum in Pickens, S.C. Once Mrs. Dorothy Blase, the Society's vice-president, had introduced herself and the other assembled persons at the front of the church, I learned the names of everyone. The other persons sitting in chairs that had been placed in front of the pulpit and behind a white speaker's stand, were James P. Rouleau, the donor of the portrait of Andrew Pickens; The Reverend James T. Richardson, Minister of Fort Hill Presbyterian Church in Clemson; and Mrs. Mozelle Cole, Secretary of the Pickens County Historical Society.

After brief introduction were made by Mrs. Blase, The Reverend Richardson gave a moving invocation. Then, Mr. Rouleau, the portrait donor, was introduced, and he made a few comments about the painting and his relationship to Andrew Pickens. Mr. Rouleau, a scholarly looking man in a grey suit and club tie, told us that he had commissioned the artist, who has a B.F.A. degree from Yale University, to paint his great (six times) grandfather's portrait, but that, after he brought the painting home, he began to think that it belonged in a museum rather than in his house. He thought about where to place it, and the idea of giving it to the museum in Pickens County came to him. He then placed the painting in his car and delivered it to the county in which Andrew Pickens once lived and the county that bears the distinguished Indian

fighter and Revolutionary War soldier's name.

Next, Mrs. Blase pointed out that she was the first to learn of the portrait's donation to the Museum and that she had called Dr. Busha to inform him of the gift. She also pointed out that Dr. Busha had told her that the Society should have a formal unveiling of the portrait in the Old Stone Church where General Pickens worshipped and where his body is now resting. As I sat there in increasing anticipation, Mrs. Blase asked Mr. John McCravy and Mr. Rouleau to come forward and in inveil the portrait. They moved to the right of the pulpit and untied the ribbons that held the cover in place. Suddenly, the splendid portrait was looking directly at us. There was an elderly General Pickens, his hair almost all gone and his blue and gold uniform as bright as new. As I looked into the portrait's eyes, I felt as though Andrew Pickens was looking directly at me. The portrait was framed in a simple but impressive gold frame. I thought about how nice the portrait would look on the walls of the museum and of how proud citizens of Pickens County should be to have the striking oil painting of General Pickens.

Dr. Busha then began his address on the life and career of General Andrew Pickens. It was entitled "Andrew Pickens, 1839-1817: American Patriot on the Carolina Frontier." Although the descriptive address was long and detailed, it was most interesting. Dr. Busha told us about the Pickens family's migration from Pennsylvania and how the family moved Southward to Augusta County Virginia, the Waxhaws along the North and South Carolina border, and eventually to the Long Cane Settlement on the South Carolina frontier. He told us about Andrew Pickens' service with the 1761 Expedition Against the Cherokee Indians and about the Patriot's role in the Battle of Kettle Creek, the Battle of Cowpens, the Battle of Ninety-Six, the Battle of Stono, and many skirmishes with the Indians in the upper country of South Carolina. About a hundred people in the audience set through the long address, and it was evident to me that they all enjoyed and appreciated it.




Dr. Busha also thanked Mr. Rouleau for the gift portrait, assuring him that the painting would always remain in the Pickens County Historical Society Museum in Pickens, where it would be protected and placed in a suitable location, where it could be appreciated by all persons who might visit the Museum.


Also as a part of the unveiling ceremonies, descendants of Andrew Pickens were asked to stand and be recognized. While standing, they were presented with a red, white, and blue lapel ribbon. At this point, some humor entered into the rather serious ceremony. For example, when Pickens' descendants were asked to stand, a lone black man, who had entered the church and had taken a seat, stood up. Several descendants of Andrew Pickens looked puzzled when the black man stood up however, no one said anything. As the ribbons were passed out to the descendants of Andrew Pickens, the black man also took one. Several people who had assembled for the ceremony looked back in apparent amazement. It was not until Dr. Busha completed his



talk that the mystery of the black man was revealed. The very nice and pleasant black man went to the front of the church to shake hands with the speaker, Dr. Busha. Looking at Dr. Busha, the elderly gentleman said: "Preacher, that was the best sermon that I have ever heard." To those comments, Dr. Busha replied: "Thank you sir, and I hope that you can come back to church every Sunday and be with us." You see, Dr. Busha and others around the speaker's stand quickly realized that the old black gentleman was



Pickens County, South Carolina Naturalizations 1783-1850

Original Source: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1985, Compiled by B. H. Holcomb.

The original naturalization records contain much more information and the researcher is advised to consult the original documents to obtain the complete data available. This index of the 1985 publication was compiled by D. Whitesell for South Carolina Genealogy Trails.

Pickens District was formed in 1826 from Pendleton District. Records prior to that year can be found in Anderson-Pendleton Records section. The records below were published in The Georgia Genealogical Magazine, No. 7, Summer 1975.



...South Carolina passed a statute concerning naturalizations on March 26, 1784, and another on February 27, 1788. Congress passed a law on March 26, 1790, stating that "any alien being a free white person who shall have resided in the United States for two years may be admitted a citizen, on application to any common law court of record in any one of the states wherein he shall have resided for the term of one year at least." Also, a law was passed April 14, 1802, stating that "any alien may be admitted to become a citizen . . . [if] he declares his intention in any court three years at least before his admission. . . resides in the United States at least five years, and at least one year in the state or territory.



The National Personnel Records Center Fire of 1973: Not Everything Was Destroyed (Dick Eastman Newsletter, 7 Jun 2014)

One of the big losses to genealogists and to many others occurred on July 12, 1973, when a fire destroyed many records at the National Personnel Records Center in Overland, Missouri, a suburb of St. Louis. The records storage facility was operated by the National Archives and Records Administration and housed military service records. The fire destroyed approximately 16 to 18 million official military personnel records. While that is a staggering number of records, it still represents only about one-third of its 52 million official military personnel files.

Sadly, the records had not yet been digitized for long-term preservation nor even copied to microfilm, the standard method of preserving paper documents at that time. The records existed only on fragile paper and were susceptible to fire, flood, mildew, and other dangers. The building was essentially a large warehouse, filled with filing cabinets. There were no firewalls or other fire-stopping devices to limit the spread of fire. No heat or smoke detectors were installed in the building, nor was there a fire sprinkler system to automatically extinguish a fire.

The exact cause of the fire was never fully determined. However, the fire investigation later reported that cigarettes were present in several trash cans, obviously displaying a hazard in a building full of paper. Another possibility was spontaneous combustion. The same report noted that the floor where the fire started had seen extremely high temperatures in the St. Louis summer with little or no ventilation.

When the fire broke out, it spread rapidly and destroyed the only copies of millions of records. The fire destroyed the entire 6th floor of the National Personnel Records Center. Water damage destroyed many more records on the 5th floor, and additional water damage was spread throughout the building. Another problem was mold that was observed within days in the hot, humid summer weather. Officials sprayed thymol throughout the building to control any mold outbreak.

For any genealogist looking for an ancestor's personnel record, this was a great loss. It became an even bigger loss for the men and women whose records were destroyed as it became difficult to prove military service when applying for benefits. Indeed, many people assume "all the records must have been destroyed in the fire, so I won't even bother to check." While millions of records were destroyed that day, this is unfortunate since not all of them went up in flames. In fact, many of the records did survive and are available today. No indexes had been created prior to the fire. In addition, millions of documents had been lent to the Department of Veterans Affairs before the fire occurred. Therefore, a complete listing of the records that were lost is not available. The National Archives reports the following losses: 80% loss to records of U.S. Army personnel discharged November 1, 1912, to January 1, 1960 and 75% loss to records of U.S. Air Force personnel discharged September 25, 1947, to January 1, 1964, with names alphabetically after Hubbard, James E. The records of Air Force personnel with names occurring earlier in the alphabet survived.

Some U.S. Army Reserve personnel who performed their initial active duty for training in the late 1950s but who received final discharge as late as 1964. There were no losses to the records of Navy and Marine Corps military records. In May 2011, the National Personnel Records Center completed construction of a new facility, located at 1 Archives Drive, St. Louis, Missouri. Surviving records have been moved to the new building that is equipped with the latest fire prevention technology. While many records were indeed destroyed by fire, you should realize that not all of them went up in flames. Study the list of available records carefully. You may be surprised to find that the record you seek is still available.

A Genealogy of the Leading Families of the Pendleton District, South Carolina by R.W. Simpson

In trying to write up and preserve the genealogies of the families of the early settlers of Pendleton, it has been impossible to obtain the necessary information unless some of their descendants were living and were willing to help get up the data. Some to whom when application for information was made, failed to furnish it, which no one regretted more than the writer. It will be our purpose to consider every family, and if anyone should be overlooked or not mentioned it will be owing to the fact that they had passed entirely out of the knowledge of the writer, and of those who aided and assisted him in this work. JOSEPH D. SCOTT was a soldier in the Revolution of 1776. He was engaged in the battle of King's Mountain, and was a witness to the hand to hand conflict between Col. Washington and Col. Tarleton. Washington in this fight cut off some of the fingers of Col. Tarleton, which caused him to drop his sword. Mr. Scott picked it up and handed it to Colonel Washington, who told him to keep it. This sword is now in the hands of his nephew, Mr. T. E. Dickson. He had a son, Joseph D. Scott, who came to Pendleton from Abbeville County and married Narcissa Griffin, a daughter of Capt. James Griffin. Joseph D. Scott and Narcissa (Griffin) Scott had three children: A. E. Scott, James G. Scott and Julia K. Scott. A. E. Scott married a Miss Reams. The other two never married.

THOMAS DICKSON. The Dicksons came from Ireland in the early history of this country and settled in Virginia. Thomas Dickson with his brother, Michael Calvin Dickson, who was a distinguished divine of the Presbyterian faith came from Virginia and settled in Abbeville until 1841, when Thomas Dickson came to Anderson County and bought up a large estate on the waters of Three and Twenty, three miles east of Pendleton. He owned a large number of valuable slaves and during the war contributed largely of his means to support the government. He was one of the charter members of the Pendleton Farmer's Society. He married Nancy Young Scott, daughter of William Scott, who was a brave soldier in the war of the Revolution. They were blessed with five children, viz: Mary Montgomery Dickson married Samuel McElroy. Henry Franks Dickson married Ruth Cannon of Anniston, Alabama. Michael Calvin Dickson married Addie A. Gilkerson of Laurens. Thomas Eugene Dickson married Ella Jones of Anderson. Florence Scott Dickson married George Russell of Anderson. (Further information available in book.)

MICHAEL CALVIN DICKSON. One who knew him after he had passed through the Civil War says - too much cannot be said of him - words cannot do him justice, only those who saw him in the fierce conflict -- only those who saw the gallant charges that he made leading his fellow soldiers in the battle, and ever standing the fury of the conflict, with invincible courage that drew forth the admiration of all who beheld him. Yes, only those could measure his strength and rise up to take in his unselfish and lofty patriotism in defense of his country. Unflinchingly with a grand heroic spirit did he bear the hardships of war, and ever ready with a cordial greeting to cheer his comrades and brighten the monotony of camp life with his natural witticism that always drew a circle around him.

JACOB BELLOTTE married Sarah Dickson. They had the following children: John E. Bellotte married Susanna DuPree. Sarah Bellotte married Archie McElroy. Thomas Bellotte was killed in Confederate War. William Bellotte was killed in Confederate War. Michael Bellotte was killed in Confederate War. (Further information available in book on John E. Bellotte.)

MAJOR DICKSON resided on Three and Twenty Creek near Capt. James C. Griffin. He was highly esteemed and represented Pendleton District in the legislature. He was no relation to his neighbor, Thomas Dickson. His daughters never married. His son, Alex Dickson who resided in the Fork of Anderson County, was the father of young Alex Dickson and J. Walter Dickson, a distinguished minister of the Methodist Church. Major Dickson had a sister who married a Mr. Gaston who resided near him on land afterwards owned by Colonel T. J. Pickens. This Mrs. Gaston was an elegant and accomplished woman and a very determined one also. A man whipped one of her sons. Shortly afterwards, while riding on horseback she met a man she thought was the one who had whipped her son. She stopped him in the road and belabored him with her riding

whip, very much to his surprise. She then rode on to the home of her neighbor, Capt. Griffin, and confessed what she had done, and was informed that she had whipped the wrong man.

JOSIAH E. SMITH was a son of Smith at one time President of the South Carolina College. He married Eliza Seabrook, daughter of Governor Seabrook. He came to Pendleton about the year 1850 and purchased the tract of land upon which was located the Pendleton Manual Labor School and afterwards owned by Miss Caroline Taliaferro. His mother and sister, Miss Sallie Smith, and Miss Mary Seabrook, his wife's sister, resided with him. They were elegant, refined and accomplished ladies and gentlemen. Josiah E. Smith and wife Eliza (Seabrook) Smith had several children, but the only two I can now recall are Margaret Smith and Seabrook Smith. Margaret was an exceedingly handsome young woman - tall, slender, black hair and sparkling black eyes. I saw her during the war when her family returned as refugees. She was then engaged to Paul Hamilton, a handsome, brave and gallant young officer. He and Seabrook Smith, Margaret's brother, were both killed during the Confederate War.

JOHN LAWRENCE NORTH was born in Philadelphia in 1782. His mother with other ladies had been sent from the city of Charleston to that city by the British for some cause now unknown. He married Eliza Elliot Drayton, daughter of General and Elizabeth Drayton. In 1807 he moved to Pendleton and settled at Rusticello farm, purchased from Joseph Whitner and now owned by the Rev. W. W. Mills. They had no children. They were buried in the Episcopal Churchyard at Pendleton. John Lawrence North had a sister, Mary Eliza North who married Benjamin Savage Smith. They left surviving them one daughter, Sarah North Smith, who was raised by her uncle, John L. North. She married her cousin, William Cutino Smith.

BENJAMIN SAVAGE SMITH was the son of Benjamin and Sarah Smith who was great-grandson of Thomas Smith. He married Mary Eliza North, sister of John Lawrence North. They had one child, Sarah North Smith who married her cousin, William Cutino Smith and resided at Rivoli, adjoining Rusticello farm. William Cutino Smith and wife, Sarah (North) Smith had eleven children, seven of whom reached maturity:

- 1. Mary E. N. Smith, died unmarried.
- 2. Alice Drayton Smith married Dr. J. A. Talmage.
- 3. John L. N. Smith killed at Seven Pines, VA. Unmarried.
- 4. William Cutino Smith married Martha Maxcy of Columbia.
- 5. Sarah E. Smith married Rev. W. W. Mills.
- 6. Benjamin Savage Smith-killed at Malvern Hill, Va.- unmarried.
- 7. Emily Hayne Smith-unmarried.

(Further information available in book.)

The following families settled near Pendleton early in the year 1800:

- Dr. Hall at the Colin Campbell's place, afterwards owned by Mr. W. H. Trescot, and after him by John Owen. Dr. Dart settled close by at the place now owned by John S. Newton's family.
- Mrs. McGreggor at the Eliot place near Dr. Dart's. Old Ben DuPree settled near Dr. Dart's on the
 place known as Lorton place, now owned by H. S. Trescot. Nicholas Bishop settled on land adjoining
 Dr. Hall. Of these families I can gather but little information. They all came from Charleston, and were
 refined in their manners, but possessed of moderate means.
- Mr. Bishop left two daughters, Jane Bishop and Dorcas Bishop, who never married, and resided at
 their father's home on Big Garvin Creek, and lived to a good old age, and were buried at the Old Stone
 Church.
- Gov. Frank Burt married the eldest daughter of Dr. Hall and Samuel Towns of Greenville married another daughter of Dr. Hall.
- Mrs. McGregor had three daughters, one of whom, Mary McGregor, married Thomas Bowen of Pickens. They all removed from here many years ago, and no further information can be obtained as to their descendants.

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ARMISTEAD BURT, SR. moved from Edgefield to Pendleton and with his wife and is buried at Old Lebanon, nearby the former residence of Mr. **Thomas Dickson**. Children:

- 1. **Armistead Burt, Jr.** married **Martha Calhoun** no issue. He moved to Abbeville, was at one time a member of United States Congress and was recognized as a distinguished lawyer.
- 2. Governor Frank Burt married Georgiana Hall, daughter of Dr. Hall. Gov. Frank Burt practiced law at Pendleton, and resided at the residence now owned by Mr. G. E. Taylor. He was appointed by the President, Governor of the Territory of Nebraska during the excitement of the question of slavery. A few months after entering upon his duties in Nebraska he died and his remains were brought home and buried in the Episcopal Churchyard at Pendleton. After this his family removed from Pendleton.
- 3. Miss Kittie Burt.
- 4. Eliza Burt married Campbell Miller.

COLONEL BARNARD BEE came from Charleston and settled on a farm about one and a half miles from the town of Pendleton, on the place still known as the **Bee home** and now owned by **Edward Hall**. His remains are buried with other members of his family in the Episcopal churchyard. Miss **Maria Bee**, his sister, resided with him. One who knew this lady well says too much cannot be said in praise of her. She was a lovely, refined and Christian woman. Colonel Bee was celebrated for his elegant and courtly manners. In fact he was the most elegant gentleman in his manners I ever knew. Children:

- 1. General Barnard Bee graduated at West Point, and entered the United States Army as a lieutenant. At the beginning of the Confederate War, he resigned his position in the United States Army, and was appointed a colonel in the Confederate Army. Shortly thereafter was promoted to be Brigadier General. He was killed at the first battle of Manassas. It was General Barnard Bee who in this battle gave the name of Stonewall to General Jackson. Gen. Barnard Bee married a Miss Hill; there were two children, both of whom died quite young at Pendleton of diphtheria His remains were brought home and buried in the Episcopal churchyard.
- 2. **Hamilton Bee** early in life went to Texas, and figured largely in the war of Texas independence. I [Simpson] can learn nothing further of him.
- 3. Ann Bee married General Clement Stevens
- 4. Susan Bee never married.
- 5. Mattie Bee never married.
- 6. Emma Bee never married.

WILLIAM HUBBARD had two children: A daughter who married a Mr. Smith and William Hubbard, Jr., a well known citizen of Pendleton who married Mahala Waddell. The daughter of Wm. Hubbard and her husband, a Mr. Smith, had a son Munro Smith who married Esther Watkins, daughter of Baylis Watkins. (Further information available in book.)

JOHN PIKE came to this country from England and settled about one mile west of Pendleton near the Old Stone Church. They were people of gentle manners. Mrs. Pike, when a widow, was employed by Mrs. John C. Calhoun as her companion. They had three children: Ellen Pike, never married. Lucretia Pike married Andrew Stephens. John Pike married Martha Fitzgerald.



Clemson area homes are part of history

Clemson University's Director of Historic Properties Will Hiott was the OPD guest speaker for September. He is also the Curator of historic Fort Hill, Hopewell Plantation & the Hanover House.

His presentation, titles "From Revolution to Reconstruction" included photos, maps and sketches of homes, along with information as to their owners and the places these homes stood in our history.

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 OPD information
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Hiott spoke about the history of the area around the present day Clemson University, going back to when Seneca was one of the Cherokee Lower Towns. He told of Fort Rutledge and the Battle of Seneca Town in 1776.

General Andrew Pickens (1739-1817), who the Cherokee called Skyagunsta or Wizard Owl. It would be at Hopewell that negotiations with nearby Indian tribes were held, and the famous Hopewell treaty was signed.

Hopewell was built about 1785 and is located in the southern section of the Clemson Experiment Forest.

The Department of Hisotric Properties has begun complete restoration of the house including a new metal roof. It is not currently open to the public as they continue to work on it.

Hiott also spoke of Clemson University's Fort Hill Plantation, built about 1803. This was the home of John C. Calhoun from 1825 to 1850.

In his lifelong career as a Statesman, Calhoun served as a U. S. Representative, Secretary of war under James Monroe, Vice President under both John Qunicy Adams and Andrew Jackson, Secretary of State under John Tyler and as a U.S. Senator.

Calhoun and his wife Floride raised seven children at Fort Hill, including Anna Marie, who would later marry Thomas Clemson.

It was Thomas Green Clemson, founder of Clemson University, who would will that Fort Hill "shall always be open for the inspection of visitors," as a museum.

The antebellum plantation house and art gallery are completely restored with Calhoun and Clemson furnishings.

Another historic house at Clemson, the Hanover House, is originally from Berkeley County.

Built in 1716, the French Hugenot home was deemed of national importance and moved to Clemson University in 1941.

More recently, the house was relocated to the South Carolina Botanical Gardens and serves as a museum.

Hiott concluded his topic by telling the audience to visit Clemson University on Legacy Day from 2 to 4:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 16, at Fort Hill, the historic home of Thomas Green and Anna Calhoun Clemson.




He served in Company F, 2nd South Carolina Cavalry (Hampton's) and in Company B, 37th Battalion Virginia Cavalry during the war. He was wounded on or about July 31, 1864, near Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, the town that had been torched by Lieutenant Colonel Ambrose C. Dunn and his Confederate cavalrymen. Looper died of gangtene in a hospital at Lynchburg, Virginia, on October 30, 1864. The soldier's death occurred one day after his wife had arrived at his bedside from South Carolina. Newly widowed, Sarah Jane Looper then accompanied her husband's body back to South Carolina. She and her husband's coffin arrived at the railway station in Greenville.

Confederate Veteran Matthew Hendricks of Pickens County Died at the Age of 101


atthew Hendricks grew up in the Oolenoy Community of Pickens District, which is also known as Pumpkintown. He attended Oolenoy Academy, a school taught by J. B. Reid. When the war began, Matthew Hendricks was eighteen years of age, and he enlisted as a private in Company H, 4th South Carolina Volunteers. After that regiment disbanded in 1862, he joined Brooks' Artillery, which was commanded by Captain A. B. Rhett. Later, he became a member of Captain John Westfield's South Carolina Cavalry (Company H), in which he served until the war ended. He was paroled on April 12, 1865, by Union troops at Salisbury North Carolina. Two of Matthew Hendricks' brothers lost their lives during the Civil War. Shortly after the end of the Civil War, Matthew Hendricks (1842-1944) married Mary Jane Looper (1840-1926) of Pickens District, S.C.

The wedding was performed at the home of the bride's parents by the Revered Thomas Looper (1816-1906), an uncle of the bride. The couple would eventually become the parents of the following nine children: (1) an infant son who died shortly after birth; (2) William Franklin Hendricks (1867-1948), who, on April 22, 1888, married Naomi Holden (1871 - 1956), daughter of William Holden and Naomi Barton Holden of Oconee County; (3) Sarah Elizabeth "Lizzie" Hendricks (12 Nov 1868 - 24 Mar 1891), who married Amos Coleman Sutherland (10 Dec 1863 - 1 Sep 1941), son of John Bailus Sutherland (25 May 1821 - 17 Mar 1900) and Mary A. Hunt Sutherland (9 Jan 1832 - 7 Sep 1907); (4) James Allen Hendricks (1872-1950), who married Sallie Harris (1875-1958), daughter of James R. Harris (b. ca 1840 - 22 Feb 1900) and Rachel Emeline Hill Harris (22 Jun 1844 - 5 Jun 1884); (5) Rosa Emma Hendricks (8 Aug 1873 - 29 Mar 1919), who, on July 31, 1892, married Phillip Bower Martin, Jr. (18 Sep 1871 - 29 Aug 1946), son of Phillip Bower Martin, Sr., M.D. (4 Jan 1826 - 24 Dec 1871) and Elmina E. Hagood Martin (31 Mar 1834 - 11 Jun 1911); (6) Joseph Matthew Hendricks (1876 - 26 Jun 1967), who married Fannie Looper and later moved to Tyler, Texas, where he died; (7) Mary Lenora Hendricks (1878 - 8 Sep 1964), who married William Thomas Batson, Sr. (d. 1953); (8) Martha Ida Hendricks (4 Aug 1881 - 20 Jul 1977), who married Elijah Denton Chastain (7 Nov 1873 - 16 Jun 1955), son of John Chastain (14 Mar 1835 - 6 Mar 1883), a Confederate veteran (Company C, 4th South Carolina Volunteers), and Marab Melinda Stewart Chastain (2 Sep 1841-29 Dec 1924); and (9) Bert Hendricks (18 Dec 1883 - 29 Dec 1970), who, in December 1908, married Joseph Isaac Reece (15 Oct 1883 - 22 Nov 1970), son of John Isaac Reece and Sarah Maples Reece.

Matthew Hendricks entered politics in Pickens County in 1880, when he became a special commissioner to lay out a public road from Hester's Store at Pumpkintown to Holly Springs Baptist Church, situated just west of Table Rock Mountain. Later, he was involved in the construction of many additional roads while serving as county supervisor. In 1890, Hendricks was elected a county commissioner, an office he held for many years. He also once served as chairman of the county commission. In May 1891, Hendricks announced that bids were being accepted for the construction of a new brick courthouse to replace the county's first such structure, which had been built shortly after Pickens County was created in 1868. Also in 1891, he was elected to the directorship of the Farmers' Publishing Company, which established the second weekly newspaper in the county, *The People's Journal*, edited by T. C. Robinson. He was also active in the temperance movement, which was impelled by evangelicals and so-called "hard-shell" Baptists who advocated total abstinence from intoxicating beverages. In 1904, Hendricks expressed his approval of the 735 to 420 referendum vote in favor of closing Pickens County's legal liquor dispensary. On April 5, 1919, this Confederate veteran applied for a Civil War pension, noting on his application that he was practically blind and in feeble health. His wife, Mary Jane, died in 1926. But the old soldier lived on for eighteen more years and became a living icon of a Confederate veteran in Pickens County. He died April 26, 1944, at the age of 101 years. He was buried at Oolenoy Baptist Church in Pickens County. Before his death, Matthew Hendricks had been one of the

two Confederate veterans still living in the county. (The surviving Confederate veteran was William Bud "Buddy" Evatt (25 Jan 1844 - 5 May 1944), who passed away nine days following the death of Matthew Hendricks.)18

Mention should also be made here of a granddaughter of Matthew Hendricks who left a significant gift to the citizens of Pickens County. She was Irma Hendricks Morris (1890-1987), daughter of William Franklin Hendricks and Naomi Holden Hendricks, both of whom were mentioned previously in this article. Her husband was James Madison Morris (1886-1967). A public school teacher for many years, Irma Morris traveled widely throughout Europe after her retirement, and she purchased numerous antique paintings and pieces of fine, old furniture there. Some of those furnishings and works of art were eventually placed in Homestead Hall, Irma Morris' home on Lewis Street in Pickens. The collector of antiques had purchased the house in the 1950s after the death of its previous owner, Frances Miles "Queen" Hagood Mauldin (d. 26 Feb 1954), widow of Thomas Joab Mauldin (1870-1931). The structure had originally been built at Pickens Court House (Old Pickens on the Keowee River) for James Earle Hagood (1826-1904) and his family, but it was moved in about 1868 to the seat of government of the then newly-created Pickens County. When Irma Morris died childless in 1987, she bequeathed Homestead Hall and its furnishings to the Pickens County Historical Society, which now maintains the old dwelling as a museum of fine arts. Known today as the Hagood-Mauldin House/Irma Morris Museum of Fine Arts, the building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.



While Matthew Hendricks served as a Confederate soldier in Virginia, he saw a house which collared his attention. Thus, he prepared a rough sketch and a floor plan of it and took some measurements of its physical dimensions. After the Confederate veteran had returned to South Carolina, he constructed a replica of the Virginia residence that he had admired. His house was built in the Oolenoy/Pumpkintown community of Pickens County. It is still standing. It faces Table Rock Mountain, one of the most popular and majestic natural landforms of the state's Piedmont area. From the structure's balcony, which is situated on the second floor above the front entrance, a clear, unobstructed view of Table Rock Mountain and the surrounding panorama can be relished by observers. The mountain is the centerpiece of Table Rock State Park in Pickens County. Matthew Hendrick's sturdy and attractive wood farmhouse is quite similar to the so-called Carolina I-house, some of which were constructed on local farms when cotton was the South's chief agricultural crop. Two-storied I-houses were one-room deep and two-rooms wide. Each floor of these houses had central hallways, and brick or rock chimneys were symmetrically placed on each side of the structures. Perhaps Matthew Hendricks was attracted to the house in Virginia, because it reminded him of the I-houses back in his homeland, the Palmetto State.

Ft. Prince George Marker Dedicated at Mile Creek Park

A sizable crowd witnessed the dedication of the South Carolina Historical Marker for Fort Prince George as it was unveiled at Mile Creek Park. Sponsored by the Piedmont Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Colonists, it is the 17th state historic marker in Pickens County.

Fort Prince George was built in 1753 by His Majesty's Royal Governor James Glen at the request of Attakullakula and his fellow Cherokee chiefs in the Keowee Valley in what is now Pickens County.

It was the hub of extraordinary trade and the guardian of the frontier. Pickens County Historical Society senior vice president, Wayne Kelley, told the crowd the fort played a deciding role in the French and Indian War and the names of young soldiers, Francis Marion,

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Thomas Sumter, William Moultrie and Andrew Pickens, are forever linked with Fort Prince George.

"Now, more than 250 years later, the Pickens County Historical Society and our partners intend to resurrect our important lost heritage by rebuilding the fort in its entirety in a nearby pristine valley," Kelly said.

"It can be an economic engine for historic tourism for Pickens County and the Upcountry of South Carolina." (Pickens County Courier, 5 Nov 2014)






The church depicted above was established before Pickens County was created. It evolved out of a congergation of worshipers who met in a brush arbor at what today is West View Cemetery in Easley, South Carolina. Residents of Pickensville, the court house town of the old Washington District, as well as early settlers of the Easley area, attended the church, Some of these local residents were also buried in Mt. Olivet's churchyard. By1900, the churchyard cemetery had become very crowded with graves, Thus, Confederate veteran William Allen Mauldin (1845-1919), an Easley businessman, urged Easley public officials to establish a public cemetery in the town. His suggestion was quickly approved, and the municipality purchased six acres of land which included the old Mt. Olivet burial ground. West View Cemetery was then established there in 1901. It is also known as Easley City Cemetery. The first person buried in the new necropolis was twenty-year-old Kate Hudgens (1881-1901), daughter of a Civil War veteran, Ambrose W.Hudgens (1843-1904) and his wife, Lucy M. Hudgens (1848-1909). Three years after his daughter's untimely death, Mr. Hudgens also passed away and was interred alongside his daughter's grave, In 1919 William Allen Mauldin, who had urged the creation of the new cemetery, also died. Mr. Mauldin was an early deacon of Easley Presbyterian Church, and his tombstone proclaims that he fired the first shot of the U.S. Civil War on April 12, 1861, during the Bombardment of Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor. That claim has been questioned by several notable Civil War historians.

Chapman Covered Bridge on the Keowee



ased on available estimates, fewer than twenty covered bridges were apparently ever built in South Carolina. Most of those were in the Upstate, where they were usually extended over swift streams that flowed between high banks. Because winter temperatures in the Piedmont and Blue Ridge regions drop below the freezing point more frequently than in the Midlands and Low Country, covered bridges were more utilitarian and practicable in the Upstate. Some of the old spans were given names of local families. Others were named after such geographical features as rivers, creeks, shoals or settlements. The most notable covered spans of the Upstate had the following names: Chapman Bridge, Allen Bridge, Campbell Bridge, Prather Bridge, Long Creek Bridge, Upper Gassaway Bridge, Lower Gassaway Bridge, and Tumbling Shoals Bridge. Today, Campbell Bridge, situated in northern Greenville County, is the state's only femaining covered span. A comparatively small structure, Campbell Bridge was put up over Beaverdam Greek in 1909.

ne of South Carolina's best-known and most memorable covered spans was Chapman Bridge, which extended over the upper reaches of the Keowee River for forty-five years. The rustic, picturesque span was situated between the Eastatoee Valley in Pickens County and Jocassee Valley in Oconee County. The Keowee was once a crystal-clear, mountain river that served as a demonstrable boundary between the two counties. In the late 1960s and early 1970s, when the massive Keowee-Toxaway Project was under development by Duke Power Company, the river was impounded by two large, man-made bodies of water, Lake Keowee and Lake Jocassee. During the construction of the former lake as a source of cooling water for Oconee Nuclear Station near Seneca, the site of Chapman Bridge was destined for inundation. Thus the span was carefully disassembled by employees of Duke Power Company and then moved a few miles south to higher ground, where it was resurrected. Despite that attempt to save the old span, it was ultimately destroyed.



Waiting for the Passenger Train at Easley Station in the Early 1900's




Historical Marker for Old Pickensville Easley, South Carolina





Robert Elliott Holcombe (1823-1893) Founder of Easley, South Carolina











Engine of the Atlanta & Charlotte Air Line Railway







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Appalachian Lumber Company Sawmill, 1928

The person we know as Grandmother Grant or "Little" Grandmother was Nancy Arta Estella Murphree. She was born on October 3, 1885 and died November 1, 1970. She often used the spelling Murphy.

The earliest documented Murphree ancestor is Irishman named Daniel who was born around 1715. He and his wife, Sarah Dempsey, were living in North Carolina in 1743. They had 12 children, all of whom were listed by name in his 1769 will. He died around 1771 in North Carolina. Five of his sons served in the Revolutionary War.

Our direct ancestor was Daniel's son, Moses. He was born in Bertie County, N.C. about 1761 and served in the North Carolina Militia. He received land in South Carolina, August 9,1787.

Our family has been in South Carolina for 227 years. Moses had three sons and seven daughters, only one of whom he called by name in his will. Over the period of his lifetime, he owned over 1900 acres including 166 on the Toxaway River. He died in May of 1846.

Moses' son, William, was our direct ancestor. William married Mary Baker, Daughter of Revolutionary War solider William Baker and they had at least nine children. William appears to have been a very good son and was named guardian for his afflicted brother.

William was already "sick in body" when he wrote his will July 31, 1846 and he died August 10 which was two months after his father's death. He apparently lived his entire life in what is now Northern Pickens County.

Nimmons Murphree, William's youngest son and 8th of his nine children is our direct ancestor. He was born May 28, 1835 and married Nancy E. Price, the daughter of Harden and Elizabeth Alexander Price. They had eight children between 1855 and 1874. He usually signed his name J.N. and nobody is really sure what the "J" stands for.

He served in Orr's Rifles and was captured at Petersburg. He served on the County Commission, on the Grand Jury and as a Steward at the Poor House. He died February 6, 1903. He also lived in entire life in Northern Pickens County.

William Harden Murphree, the second son of Nimmons and Nancy, is our direct ancestor. He was born November 3, 1859. He married Elizabeth Perritt on March 12, 1882. He served as Postmaster at Eastatoe post office in 1886.

His children were William Taylor, born 1883 and Nancy Arta Estella, born 1885. He died February 12, 1888 of Bright's Disease at the age of 28. He also spent all his life in Northern Pickens County.

Historical Society's Collection Moves to College of Charleston

(Written by Robert Behre of the Post and Courier and published in the Greenville News)

When the Fireproof Building opened in 1827, its construction was considered state of the art – a perfect place to storeimportant government documents. But two centuries have a way of changing things. And that is why the SC Historical Society – a statewide nonprofit archive is moving its collection of approximately two million documents about a mile away.

So recently these documents started being boxed up and won't be available until January 12, 2016 by by which time all of them are scheduled to be moved to the College of Charleston's Addlestone Library. An opening ceremony is set for late February.

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"When we open the doors in January, this will be a major research library in Southern history, South Carolina history and Atlantic world history," said John White, Dean of Libraries. The library's special collections wing will be renamed to add the SC Historical Society. The Society still will own its collection and will keep both its offices and other artifacts in the Fireproof Building.


