Two Smith Families From England to Virginia and to Anderson County, South Carolina

The following is from Smith Family Research by Guy Raymond Smith Sr., Brighton, Michigan (deceased).

England, British Isles

- 1. Robert (Rondle) Smith b England 1539 m TBD
- 2. James Smythe b 1558 England m Isabella Drake
- 3. John Smith b 1580 England m Frances Sanford
- 4. Henry Smith b 1600 England m Judith Cooper
- 5. Daniel Smith b 1635 England m Esther Chickering; Cheesemaker
- 6. Daniel Smith b 1650 m Rebecca Prime: Brew Master
- 7. Capt. John Smith (British Army) b England between 1699 and 1701 m Margaret Harrington in Ireland

From Ireland to Chester Co., PA 1730-1739 with Family b Ireland (Ref. Smith Cousins Four (SCF) & VA. Records)

To Orange County, VA - 1740 Order Book with Looney Family (HDH-Smith Family Research and others)

To Botetourt County, VA with Family and Looney's Ref. (Chalkey's Book on Scotch Irish Immigrants)
There Capt. John Smith went to Ohio Country to suppress the Indians. Later he was in Fort Vause, VA near
Christianburg, VA and was captured by French Officers and 300 Indians. His son Jonathon was killed. On the march
back to Canada, his son Joseph died. Capt. John Smith kept records he hid on the French fortifications along the
march to Canada. He was taken back to France. In a prisoner exchange he was returned to England where he gave
the information to the British Military. (Chalkey, SCF, HDH and others)

Later, he returned to Virginia and Botetourt County, VA, where his son Abraham was about to process his will as they thought Capt. John Smith was dead. (A list of his family can be found in SCF).

In 1765 3) Henry Smith and his wife Amy and Family sold out their property and bought land they thought was in Mecklenburg Co., NC but turned out to be in York Co., SC. (Ref. Smith Cousins Four (SCF))

Later, the Revolutionary War started. Capt. John Smith stayed at home and ran the Militia to defend against the Indians. Abraham and Daniel left to fight the British. Daniel was at Yorktown, VA, when Cornwallis surrendered. (The Long Grey Line, Chalkey and others). York Co. SC, on the Broad River at Smith's Crossing (Home is still there today) – (SCF)

These two Smith Families also had connections to the Major family back to 1635 when William Major came to VA. and was a Colonel in the Militia and served in the House of Burgess. His descendant John Perry Major is buried at The Sandy Springs Methodist Church. <u>Ref. Majors and Their Marriages, by James Branch</u> Cabell.

These two Smith Families are also kin to the Henry Hendricks Sr. m Nancy Major. The Hendricks Family from Newberry Co., SC to Pickens Co., SC. Some of them are buried at The Prater-Hendricks Cemetery near Liberty, SC. One in particular James Franklin Hendricks (CWS) is buried at the Liberty Town Cemetery with a Civil War marker.

Another group of Hendricks from the same Hendricks Family in Pickens Co., SC, where David Hendricks Sr. m 1st Sally Major, 2nd Sarah Mullinax and 3rd Assenath Holland. Then David Hendricks Sr. went to Blount Co., AL where he died in 1856. His will can be found enumerating his children in Blount County, Al records.

Cherokee Research

As with all research for the DAR, SAR, UDC, CSA, you need to locate official documents for the first three generations:

Date of Birth:

Birth Certificate, Death Certificate

Date of Death:

Death Certificate

Marriage Date:

Marriage License

For the next generations use the same as above plus other records including census records to prove relationships and dates.

- 2. Is one of your direct ancestors on the 1924 Baker Roll?
- 3. Locate proof of your blood quantum. Is it 1/16 or better?
- 4. Are any of your ancestors accepted on the Guion Miller Roll?
- 5. Check the Miller Roll to the Drennen, Chapman, or other census rolls for the Cherokees.
- 6. Look in state and county records for Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, or North Carolina.

Oklahoma Cherokee Lineage. (Source: Linda Woodward Geiger, 2005 NGS Conference)

- 3. Check the enrollment packet for each of your relatives—not just grandparents. You need to locate a direct relative.

Native Americans are able to find a wealth of information on their ancestors. Particularly those who were listed on the Guion Miller rolls. There are many resources for Cherokee genealogy, but the Cherokee Nation does not provide genealogy services. A private researcher, libraries and other organizations may be of some help to you. Here is a list of rolls that may list your Cherokee ancestors: (Source: Website for Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma)

Rolls Before and During Removal

Reservation Rolls 1817

Cherokees who chose to accept a plot of land on the Cherokee reservation (in the Eastern homeland).

Emigration Rolls 1817-1835

Cherokee who chose to "emigrate" to Indian Territory west of the Mississippi River in present day Oklahoma and Arkansas (prior to the Trail of Tears.)

Henderson Roll 1835

Cherokees who were to be removed to Indian Territory on what would later be called the Trail of Tears.

Mullay Roll 1848

Cherokees who remained in North Carolina after removal.

Post Removal Rolls

Siler Roll 1851 - Eastern

Eastern Cherokee entitled to per capita payment.

Old Settler Roll 1851 - Western

Recorded those Cherokee (still living) who emigrated to Indian Territory prior to removal.

Chapman Roll 1852 - Eastern

Eastern Cherokee who actually received payment from the government (reference to Siler Roll). Drennen Roll 1852 - Western

Recorded those Cherokee who came to Indian Territory in 1839 on the Trail of Tears.

Swetland Roll 1869 - Eastern

Recorded those Cherokees, and their descendants who were listed on the Mullay Roll as residing in North Carolina.

Hester Roll 1883 - Eastern

Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians provides a great deal of detail about those listed.

Churchill Roll 1908 - Eastern

Additional roll of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians which also includes those rejected from the Eastern Band.

Guion Miller Roll 1909 - Eastern and Western

For Cherokees (east and west) excluding the "Old Settlers."

Baker Roll 1924 - Eastern

The final roll of the Eastern Band of the Cherokee in anticipation of allotment. The land was not allotted and the reservation still exists. This roll is the basis for tribal membership in the Eastern Band.

The Dawes Rolls 1898-1914 - Western

The final roll of the western Cherokee. Allotment of Cherokee land to Cherokee individuals was based on this roll. Direct descendency from someone on this roll is required for tribal citizenship in the Cherokee Nation today.

Sally Reeves is the co-author of the awardwinning New Orleans Architecture series. She served two appointments as archivist for the New Orleans. Notarial Archives where she managed the archival and public access needs for over 40 million pages of bound, original civil law notarial acts dating from 1735 and written in French, Spanish and English.

Will Hiott is responsible for the overall operations of the department of historic properties at Clemson University. Highlights of his tenure include the relocation of the Hanover House to the South Carolina Botanical Garden, the restoration of Fort Hill and the preservation planning for Hopewell.
