

Soapstone Mined in Old Marietta

A generation ago the section west of Marietta was known as "Billings' Hills."

A dirt road ran down the center of a stream, as the sandy stream bed made a better road than the red clay of the countryside, according to area residents. This part of the road was known as "Double Branches."

This road led the traveler into Pickens County, where soapstone was mined. A nearby church was called Soapstone Church.

Slabs of the soapstone were quarried and used to completely line graves in the church-yard. Headstones were quarried from this same deposit.

In the early years soapstone was also mined near Greenville, at the foothills of Paris Mountain.

Correction on article from June 2016 about A. R. Lewis Elementary School

THE GRANT KIDS

You have heard stories about people who lived 200 years ago-people that you never heard of before and probably never want to hear of again. This is a story about a group we'll call the GRANT KIDS. Their names were Lois, John, Guy, Leona, Eunice, Mary Lou, James and much later Margaret.

Mary Lou and James were born at Glenwood mill village. Earlier, about 1915, John had jumped off the front porch there and injured himself and according to rumor, his mother didn't make him do much because of this injury. Along about the 1920's, Lois got a doll for Christmas that would open and close its eyes. John took it under the house where the children played and took it apart to see how the eyes worked. Later, Lois got a toy piano for Christmas and John----took it under the house and took it apart to see how it worked.

Another time while both their parents were at work, their mother had moved the mattresses out into the yard to air. John and Guy moved the mattress over near the garage and helped Lois, Leona and Eunice climb to the top of the garage so they all could take turns jumping off the garage onto the mattress. A neighbor went to the mill and told their mother what they were doing. She came home and switched them all. Later, on a Saturday all the children had been bathed and put on clean clothes. They slipped out the back door and down to the pasture and played in the gully and got red mud all over all of them. When they got home, mother lined them up and switched them all starting with the oldest. Eunice remembers hoping that their mother would be tired by the time her turn came--mother wasn't tired.

Mary Lou's chore was scraping the plates into the scrap bucket. She dropped one of the plates and cracked it. Mother made her use that cracked plate—every time and always. She was about five at the time.

Lois was always in charge of the younger children. She cut and fixed the girls hair and cut and sewed their dresses without even using a pattern. Leona's chores were milking the cow and washing the dishes and she and Lois often locked horns over this. The girls all had some red in their hair. Their Uncle Charlie was known to say "here comes brother Ed and that "passel" of red-headed girls."

The Glenwood grammar school principal visited the house once. Guy saw her coming and jumped out the back window and ran. Poppa apologized but Mrs. Ligon said, "He's not a bad boy, just mischievous". He must have had a little bit of a guilty conscience, too.

After the family moved to the "old homeplace," Lois, who was in charge, had mopped the kitchen floor. Guy walked in on her wet floor. She threw her bucket of mop water on him. Somewhere along the way, James got involved and she shut him up in the churn closet.

As the years went by, Lois who was the 2nd mother, stayed in charge-always. John kept the family history alive and made his career taking things apart and putting them back together. Guy did some hoboing, then turned his aggressiveness to fighting in some of the fiercest Pacific battles of WWII. Leona's temper stayed touchy but she became very focused and became a pillar of her church. Eunice continued to be a good little sister and big sister and work to keep the family together. Mary Lou who was rumored to be Poppa's favorite, doesn't have to use that cracked plate anymore. Baby James returning in Dec 1941 from serving in the army, heard that Pearl Harbor had been bombed and drove to the homeplace to tell his parents that he was re-enlisting to go back and continue serving his country. Now besides showing us that the GRANT KIDS were just ordinary kids who grew up to be very special adults, these stories tell our grandchildren how different things were in "the good old days."

- 1. Houses were not underpinned. They were built on brick pillars or piles of rock and provided a great place to play -out of the rain and sun.
- 2. Mattresses were made of solid cotton. There was no air conditioning. At night you sweated like a horse and mattresses had to be aired to dry.
- 3. Neighbors knew each other, watched after each others children -told on them- and parents responded with switches. And no one called social services
- 4. Mill villages had community pastures, people kept cows and churned milk.
- 5. You saved scraps to feed animals-- there were no garbage disposals. Also, you had chores and learned early about personal responsibility and consequences.
- 6. Teachers had small classes, knew the children and their parents and were allowed to control those classes.

This family was very lucky to be raised by THE GRANT KIDS.

Civil War 18th Infantry, Company D from Anderson and Pickens Counties Information Need on Soldiers

The 18th Regiment, South Carolina Infantry was assembled during the winter of 1861-1862 with men from Laurens County and other counties (Company D from Pickens and Anderson counties) in the northwestern part of the state. It was mustered into Confederate service for three years in May 1862. After serving in the Department of South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida, it was ordered to Virginia. During the war it was assigned to General Evans', Elliott's, and Wallace's Brigade. The 18th Regiment surrendered on April 9, 1865 at Appomattox Courthouse in Virginia.

James B. Clary, author of A History of the 15th South Carolina Volunteer Infantry Regiment: 1861-1865, is once again researching information on Civil War Soldiers. He is planning a publication on the 18th Infantry, not 18th Militia.

He needs help researching men who served in Company D of the 18th South Carolina Volunteer Infantry regiment from 1861-1865. Company D consisted of men mostly from Anderson/Pickens District, South Carolina. Many of these men mustered-in at Mountain Spring (Sandy Springs) in Anderson District Additional men mustered-in at other locations in Anderson District including Anderson City.
