

I want your members to know about two simple, free genealogy websites for sophisticated genealogists. I could not reach you by email because it would be spam, which is not allowed.

If all researchers simply upload their GEDCOM files to GEDCOMLIBRARY.COM, connecting the lines will be a snap. Events are indexed by locality, and then by name, on GEDCOMINDEX.COM, each linked to the GEDCOM file, which the user can download. Thousands of GEDCOM files, mostly on other websites, already indexed, resulting in more than seven million entries.

I'm running out of GEDCOM files to index. Your members are of course welcome to put their GEDCOM files on any website and send me the link, or to upload their GEDCOM files onto GEDCOMLIBRARY.COM.

Old Soldiers' Day

When the bright summer sunshine of last Wednesday (a perfect summer day) broke over the hills and a little later the people began to come from every quarter to do tribute to the grandest soldiery that ever marched against enemy, the people of Pickens realized that the biggest day of the year was upon them.

And well did these people respond to every call made upon them to give substantial expression to their hospitality, for they had been aroused to the immense proportions of the day and they left nothing undone to make the day a success

But it is to the ladies of the Daughters of the Confederacy that is due the grand success of this Memorial Day. They worked and stinted not, and the day closed a revelation to every thinking man.

The crowd was so large, so much greater than was expected, that there was some unavoidable delay in starting the program, but at about 10 o'clock the procession formed at the depot headed by the Liberty Band and followed by the school children and the assembled veterans and a large crowd of spectators, and proceeded to the court house where the veterans wore comfortably seated, and as many others as could crowd in were accommodated.

Rev. J. E. Foster opened the day's program with a touching and impressive prayer asking God's mercy upon the veterans and invoking God's aid in that greater cause that will never be lost to the soldiers enlisted under the leadership of Christ – the Captain of our Salvation. He prayed for the success of the day and moved the people by his earnest appeal for the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Col. J. A. Hoyt, of Greenville, was the honored guest of the Veterans and his speech was a masterly presentation of the soldierly qualities of the Confederate Soldier – the private soldier – as well as a plain statement of the facts of history showing that from that galaxy of distinguished generals of the Confederate army, South Carolina furnished her quota, and in this connection he paid a glowing tribute to the peerless Hampton that elicited that applause that carried the thoughts of men back to the time when some of them followed that intrepid leader in war and recalled his lasting services through the days of reconstruction as the representative of his people in the highest councils of the nature.

Col. Hoyt's speech was a chaste and eloquent one, and it reached the heart of every old veteran and made the younger people appreciate and understand how and why, in some measure, their fathers fought so well, and their mothers endured, without complaining, the hardships of war.

General M. L. Bonham, of Anderson, was the representative on this occasion of the Daughters of the Confederacy. It is impossible to do justice to his eloquent address which. came, as he took occasion to say himself, from the very fullness of his heart. General Bonham is a most earnest and impressive speaker, and warming up to the full appreciation of his theme, he spoke words of truth, picturing the works of the soldiers of the Southern army saying that their achievements will live because they fought for living principles – they were men of our own country and not the hired minions of a government with unlimited resource backed by the nations of the world. General Bonham's address will be remembered by all who had the pleasure of hearing it.

It is a matter to be regretted that the other speakers on the program were not present. We do not know the causes of their absence but know that it was a disappointment that they were not here – a disappointment shared especially by the Daughters who planned and carried these exercises through an addition to the plans of the veterans themselves.

Two features of the exercises, not printed in the program were the welcome by Mr. W. T. McFall, Intendant of Pickens, attended by the waving of white flags by two little girls, indicating that the town had surrendered to the veterans and the visitors, and the reading of some original verses by a lady of Pickens, entitled "The Old Canteen," which were most appropriate to the occasion:

[Old Pendleton District Messenger]

"Awake awake, the old canteen, From its long and quiet sleep; We want It to Mingle with the scene While Memorial Day we keep.

The hand may be forever still, That once filled it to the brim: From some far away spring or rill, Before the battle did begin

To the old canteen we hold Though rusty worn and bent; It tells of a life rave and bold When mother's boy dreamed beneath a tent

This old, ugly, knotty string Tells of a shoulder true and strong, Upon which the old canteen could swing When the march was hard and long.

When the smoke of battle had fled, The old canteen held the crystal tide, That bathed the brows of our noble dead Scattered over the field far and wide.

Now, shot and shell have ceased to fly, The roar of musket and cannon passed away – Upon the old canteen heap rose high, Willing hands this Memorial Day.

While the old canteen is covered with roses sweet, we gather lilies for the Blue and Gray, Putting envy and~ strife beneath our feet With spirit as gentle as zephyrs of May."

Professor W. E. Dendy read these lines bringing to accent their salient thoughts with touching effect, and the great crowd appreciated the sentiments so beautifully expressed and evinced its approval in generous applause at the conclusion of the reading.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. O. M. Abney.

The benediction was not said, however, before the announcement was made that, at the tap of the drum every veteran was expected to come to The Sentinel Journal building where the ladies had prepared bountiful dinner. The old soldiers were not only expected but urged to come, and they wore fed as best they could be attended to by loving hands who sought, by these intentions, to honor them.

During these exercises, the Liberty Band, under the most efficient leadership of Mr. James E. Parsons, discoursed sweet music which added to the pleasure of the occasion, and gave to the program an air of recreation and enjoyment.

There was no boisterous conduct, no disorderly conduct and a spirit o: good feeling pervaded the entire crowd.

Pickens is glad to have had the veterans and the people with her or that day, and all are looking forward to the time when it will be the privilege of this community to entertain the old veterans and their families and friends again.

We want you – we want to show our appreciation of your sacrifices and every year the local chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will expect you as their guests

I thought that your newsletter researchers would enjoy researching the following upstate lake construction records -- it represents a lot of work on the part of myself and Gary Flynn.

Duke Power's Archived Reinternment Records are in such sad shape, that they often refer researchers to my Cemetery Projects. The owner of the current Davenport Funeral Home in West Union, purchased the historical Davenport Funeral Home of Walhalla. Duke's/Davenport's original reinternment records have been preserved in their basement.

The on-line Corps of Engineers cemetery records are very good. However, if you ask the Corps a research question, expect to pay them \$75/hour for archive research.


The Whitten Bible was donated to the Faith Clayton Genealogical Collection on February 2, 2017 by Sharon Miller and from the Julia Woodson family.


Note from Susan Roberts, an Old Pendleton Genealogical Member

The buses leave promptly.

Monday, April 24 meet CATBUS tour on Main Street in Central at 9:45 a.m. for approximately 2hour tour to Seneca to visit the Bertha Lee Strickland house and Dr. L. M. Lunney House Museum. Bertha Strickland was an industrious African American lady who helped maintain the home of Dr. Lunney and his wife. Her former home is now a museum to African American history of the early 20th century.

Tuesday, April 25 meet at CATBUS stop on Main Street in Central at 9:45 a.m. for tour of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Pendleton. Jo McConnell, who is very familiar with the church, will lead the tour. The church cemetery is the burial place of Thomas Greene and Anna Calhoun Clemson; Confederate officers, including General Barnard Bee and General C.H. Stevens; and other important early residents of the Pendleton District. General Bee is said to have given Confederate General "Stonewall" Jackson his nickname. Tour the church and learn of its early history and see and hear the church's famous Jardine pipe organ. The tour continues to the Bart Garrison Agricultural Museum to view artifacts of early farming practices in Upstate South Carolina.

Wednesday, April 26 ride the CATBUS from the Central stop to Six Mile for a presentation bySouth Carolina historian and outdoorsman Dennis Chastain. Learn of Chastain's recentdiscovery of remnants of the Cherokee Path in Six Mile.
