The Little Church on the Plateau

In the year 1834 there was a void of Baptist church services for the farmers and their families in this great triangle formed by three churches, Secona (Seeconnee), Oolenoy, and Antioch. The minutes of The Twelve Mile River Baptist Association for that year lists fifteen churches as follows:

6 Mar 1868. p. 1, col. 1. Capt. George W. Harmon of Elbert Co., GA slaughtered a shoat 18 mths. Old, weighed 480 lbs. Lard from hog measured ten gallons and a half.

6 Mar 1868, p. 1, col. 6. Charleston, Feb 24. Constitutional Convention discussed whether Governor should be a resident of the State four years or two. A resolution was introduced, restoring property of minors sold during the war for Confederate money.

6 Mar 1868, p. 1, col. 2. Death of **Prof. Cleveland**. He was a scholar of rare acquirements and a teacher of unsurpassable skill. He leaves a wife and child. "He has long been in a declining condition, the effect of wounds received in the late war."

6 Mar 1868. P. p, col. 2. "Blue Ridge" is not concerned where the counties placed their court houses."

6 Mar 1868, p. 2, col. 3. Services at Evangelical Lutheran Church at Walhalla, Rev. C. Web, Pastor. Next week Rev. Mr. Foy will speak.

6 Mar 1868, p. 2, col. 4. Sale day at Pickens Court House. Tracts of land sold by Sheriff, L. Thomas, for arrearage of taxes:

The orders also provide for the installation of the newly elected State officers "on the tenth day after the approval of the Constitution by the Congress of the United States. (Is this the date that that Pickens County officially is separated from Oconee County?) Senator for Pickens County is Thomas A. Rogers. Pickens County House of Representative: William T. Field.

May 29, 1868, p. 2, col. 1. Rev. C.H. Spears declines the nomination for School Commissioner of Oconee County.

The Walhalla Female Seminary, in charge of the Misses Morgan is a note institution. These ladies came to us after a 16 years experience in teaching in one of the wealthiest and most polished District in the State. Written by J. Overton Lewis at Wayside, Oconee County, SC.

- 1. Ancestry decided to take all my Rootsweb hosted GenWeb Project webpages off-line. This resulted in tens of thousands of broken hyperlinks.
- 2. Then Ancestry then decided to take my Rootsweb hosted Cemetery GPS Project off-line. Again, tens of thousands of broken links.
- 3. Then the USGen Project decided to move all 4 of my county GenWeb projects to another server. Again, thousands of links needed to be changed for Abbeville-Anderson-Oconee-Pickens counties.
- 4. Then the SCGS decided to switch to another server, which took Anderson-Camden-Greenville-Pendleton Chapter websites off-line. This resulted in these websites going off-line because of broken hyperlinks.
- 5. Then the SCGS agreeded to re-new my Cemetery GPS Project but on their new server -- what a challenge getting it back on-line, but Janice Mahafney & Ted Burgess of ACGS have been helping me. See http://www.cemeteryscgs.scgen.org/index.html (It's still being worked on, but we'll get it done.)

Ancestry is making no promises, but it sounds like in late 2018 or 2019 their #1 & #2 hosted Rootsweb websites will be back on-line. So these problems won't get worked on.
