

## Pickens-Oconee County Sesquicentennial Articles

Keowee Courier Newspaper, June 5, 19, 1868

Abstracted by G. Anne Sheriff Continued from June 2018 for September 2018 Issue



June 5, 1868. p. 2, col. 1. D.S. Hull, Administrator, selling property on 20 June 1868.

June 5, 1868, p. 2, col. 1. Hail storm east of Walhalla last Tuesday. Barn of Capt. Wm. H. Stribling destroyed Damaged to wagons, etc., wheat and corn crops.

June 5, 1868. p. 2, col. 1. "It will be seen by advertisement that the Commissioners of the locations of the Court House for the new County of Oconee, have secured a body of land within the incorporation of Walhalla, which they will sell in lots to the highest bidder on Thursday the 6<sup>th</sup> of August next."

June 5, 1868. p. 2, col. 5. Citizens near Rock Spring Church (Oconee Co.) met on 27 May 1868 for organizing a Democratic Society. Names mentioned: Capt. J.L. Shanklin, Rev. H.H. Penny, Thos. A. June 5, 1868, p. 3, col. 1. The first batch of any considerable number of German immigrants, (Newberry Herald of the 27<sup>th</sup>) arrived under the care of Rev. T.S. Boinest. About twenty-two, rose-cheeked, intelligent-looking men, women and child.

June 5, 1868, p. 3, col. 1. Administrator's Sale on 20 Jun 1868. Personal property belonging to Estate of Nathaniel Hull, seven miles south of Walhalla at the residence. Resolved, That each of the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Georgia, Alabama and Florida, shall be entitled and admitted to representation in Congress as a State of the Union when the Legislature of such State shall have duty ratified the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, proposed by the Thirty-ninth Congress, and known as article fourteen.

The <u>Fourteenth Amendment</u> contains a number of important concepts, most famously state action, privileges & immunities, citizenship, <u>due process</u>, and <u>equal protection</u>—all of which are contained in Section One. However, the Fourteenth Amendment contains four other sections. Section Two deals with the apportionment of representatives to Congress. Section Three forbids anyone who participates in "insurrection or rebellion" against the United States from holding federal office. Section Four addresses federal debt and repudiates debts accrued by the Confederacy. Section Five expressly authorizes Congress to enforce the Fourteenth Amendment "by appropriate legislation." The states ratified the Fourteenth Amendment in 1868 in the immediate aftermath of the <u>American Civil War</u>, along with the other Reconstruction Amendments—the <u>Thirteenth</u> and <u>Fifteenth</u>.

#### Disqualification for Rebellion

Section Three of the Fourteenth Amendment disqualifies an individual from serving as a state or federal official if that person has "engaged in insurrection or rebellion against" the United States. Although the clause was written in the context of the Civil War, it would theoretically still apply for members of future rebellions or insurrections against the United States.

Debt

The fourth section of the Fourteenth Amendment involved making the national debt sacrosanct and repudiating Confederate debt. In *Branch v. Haas* 7 Va. L.J. 473 (1883), a federal court decided that <u>contracts</u> involving Confederate <u>debt</u> would not be enforced, although contracts that involve Confederate currency are enforceable to prevent injustice to those who were required to accept them during the Civil War. The issue of the repudiation of the United States' debt came up again in the *Gold Clause Cases* (1935). In those cases, the Supreme Court held that Congress exceeded its authority by refusing to pay bonds in gold, but that the debt holders could not recover because the <u>damage</u> was only nominal. <a href="https://www.law.cornell.edu/wex/fourteenth\_amendment\_0">https://www.law.cornell.edu/wex/fourteenth\_amendment\_0</a> (Cornell Law School)

On Saturday, the final day of the Conference, attending more sessions on DNA and learning how to use probates for research was an exciting final day of the trip to Ft. Wayne.


I had a very enjoyable time and learned many things and I am looking forward to going to their next conference in Washington, DC.
