

LOST COLONY WASN'T LOST



The State of South Carolina, Pickens District
Revolutionary War Pension record of Joseph Chapman

On the twelfth day of March 1833 Joseph Chapman in open Court of General Sessions and Common Pleas for Pickens District in the State aforesaid, aged 87 years last Christmas. Resident in said District who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath makes the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he was born in Halifax County Virginia the 25th December 1745. When he entered the service of his Country, he resided in Guilford County North Carolina where he enlisted or joined General Rutherford in an expedition against the Cherokee Indians. He was in several engagements or skirmishes with said Indians and acted as captain and served four months.

On his return he enlisted or joined under Captain Andrew Vanoy and joined a body of men under the command of General Locke [Col. Francis Locke] at Wilmington North Carolina and was marched to a place called **Pine Tree in South Carolina** which force was designed to meet the British. He served in this expedition four months.

He returned home and immediately removed to South Carolina and settled in **Turkey Creek** then in Ninety-Six District previous to the fall of Charleston A short time after the fall of Charleston he joined a company under the command of Captain Robert Anderson and marched against the fort at Ninety-Six (May 22-1781).

Colonel Andrew Pickens commanded the regiment to which his company was attached and the whole was under the command of Major General Greene. He was present when the first spade of dirt was thrown up at the siege. Lord Rawdon coming to the relief of the fort the besieging army retreated. The company to which he was attached dispersed and met 15 or 20 miles below Ninety-Six when he was allowed to return home to his family. He served at this time about four weeks.

A few weeks after his return home he enlisted under Captain Robert Maxwell who raised a Company of Dragoons and joined Colonel Pickens in an expedition into the Cherokee Country and was engaged in many skirmishes and scouts. One engagement was at an Indian Town by the name of Tessenty where they destroyed the town and killed and took the inhabitants. The same day of the Battle of Tessenty he was out on a scout about four or five miles from the Town.

The company was separated and he and Maxwell and two others came across four Indians at the camp. The Indians broke in different directions this deponent pursuing two Indians up Toney Mountain when he fired on them but misfiring the Indians turned on him. He was shot through the body with a rifle. Colonel Elijah Clark was in the above engagement with a detachment from Georgia.

The deponent was never able to serve after receiving the wound and returned home. I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declare that my name is not on the Pension Role of the agency of any State. I have no record of my age. I have lived in South Carolina, Pendleton District ever since the war. I volunteered my services.

William L. Keith, C. C. South Carolina, Pickens District. Personally came Joseph Chapman before me the subscribing Justice and makes following affidavit (in order to amend his application for a Pension under the Act

of 7th June 1832 which was made at Pickens Court and certified for 12 March 1833 and forwarded to the War Department and returned as deficient. That he entered the services of the United States in the summer of 1776 under Colonel Pacey [sic, John Paisley], General Rutherford's Brigade, served four months as a Captain. That his enlistment under Captain Maxwell was for a tour of eighteen months. He served to the best of his recollection three months of said tour when he received a wound which rendered him unable for service was put under the care of Doctor Russell where he remained all winter.

That he is confident he served four weeks as specified under Captain Anderson. Terms of Service under Captain Maxwell and Captain Anderson. He served as a Private and that he never received a regular discharge. Sworn to and subscribed before me this 8th October 1833

Joseph Chapman, X his mark

John Cobb, a clergyman, and Col. Benjamin Hagood gave the standard certification of reputation for veracity, belief of age and belief in service as a revolutionary soldier.

Philip Porter appeared personally in open Court of Pickens District and being duly sworn declares on oath that he was well acquainted with Joseph Chapman – now a resident of this District during the Revolutionary War as they both lived in the same neighborhood. They served together one tour of three months under General Andrew Pickens against the Cherokee Indians during which said Chapman was badly wounded with a ball in his body.

He was never with him personally after but always understood him to be an active and zealous soldier in the cause of independence.

Sworn to & subscribed day & year aforesaid before

With a note indicating that the veteran died on January 18, 1836. The file contains no family data.

Researching the Your Early Settlers of Pickens County through Land Deeds

There are several excellent books available if you are researching your family Land Deeds from the Pickens County. The books can be found at our Library Genealogy Rooms.

1. **Settlement of Pendleton District South Carolina 1777-1800** by Frederick Van Clayton 1930.

Although this says Pendleton District, it includes Oconee, Pickens and Anderson Counties. It is reprinted from the 1930 thesis written by and submitted to the Department of History by Frederick Van Clayton in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the degree of Master of Arts from the University of South Carolina. It is a small book but loaded. It contains maps of the early land owners with the location of their plats and an index that gives the owner, acres, dates and state location of the plats. Many are bounty land holders. Those are lands reserved and rewarded to the soldiers of South Carolina who served in the Revolutionary War. Some of the people receiving land grants never settled the land while others “stopped” for a while on their way west.

2. **1800 Census of Pendleton District South Carolina** by William C. Stewart. Number 26 Special Publications of The National Genealogical Society 1963. This book not only list the people of the 1800 census but contains notes about the family’s history.

Both of these books contain a history of Pickens before 1777. The first book contains an excellent history of land before 1777.

3. There is no book available that contains an index to all the land deeds in Pickens County, SC. To find this you will need to visit the **Pickens County Register of Deeds** located at 222 McDaniel Ave Ste B5, Pickens, SC Phone: 864-868-5868. Grantee & Grantor Index of the surname with dates starting in the 1840s (sometimes earlier) to 1980’s. The books with the deeds are also located in this area. The earliest books A-1 to C-1 are located in the Clayton Room at Southern Wesleyan University in Central, SC. These contain many of the early land deeds Deeds after the 1980s can be found on line.
4. On Line Images of Historical Maps of SC from the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps of South Carolina are another excellent source for tracing your family location. [Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps of South Carolina – Digital Collections \(sc.edu\)](http://www.sanborn.com). These include maps for the towns of Liberty, Easley, Pickens and Clemson in the years 1884 to 1975.

The Formation of Pickens County., SC

When researching your family lines in Pickens County, it is always helpful to know the dates of its formation:

1670-1st English settlement established near present day Charleston


1682-Original Proprietary Counties in SC were: Berkeley, Colleton, Craven & Colonial Period Parishes:



1710-The Carolina Colony was divided into South & North Carolina.

1721-South Carolina becomes a Royal Colony

1775-1783-American Revolution



1785 -96 District, SC formed form counties of Spartanburg, Union, Laurens, Newberry, Abbeville, and Edgefield.

1785- Treaty with the Cherokees and other Native Americans opened up the Indian land for settlement

1788-May 23- South Carolina became the 8th state to enter the union.



1789- tracts of land were laid out at a courthouse erected in what would become the village of Pendleton.

1791-Feb. 19 to 1800-Jan. 1– **Washington District**- formed from the former Cherokee Indian Lands and Pendleton District that included Greenville, Anderson, Oconee and Pickens Counties. The court house and jail were in Pickensville, SC.



1791-A town laid out called **Rockville**. Being built on a rocky site at the crossing of the present-day Pendleton Street & and Hwy. 8. Old names were Federal & Pinckney Street.

1792 -Rockville was changed to **Pickensville** in honor of Gen. Andrew Pickens.



This 1958 Map of Easley, shows the location of **Pickensville**. Pickensville remained a country village for several years until a disastrous fire destroyed the stores and most of the homes. Later it became a suburb of Easley.

1800-Jan. 1-Greenville and **Pendleton Districts** were created from **Washington District**.

The term **County** was abolished and **District** was used until 1868.

1819-The Cherokee Indians were forced to cede their land


1826-Dec. 20- **Pendleton District** was divided into **Pickens** and **Anderson District**

1860-Dec. 20-South Carolina seceded from the union.


1868-Oconee County was established from **Pickens District**.

The term **District** was abolished and **County** was used.

The Mouzon Map



One of the earliest and accurate Maps of South Carolina showing the area that would become the Pendleton District is the **Mouzon Map**. *Title on the Map: An Accurate map of North and South Carolina with their Indian frontiers, shewing in a distinct manner all the Mountains, Rivers, Swamps, Marches, Bays, Creeks, Harbors, Sandbanks and Sounding on the Coats with the Roads and Indian Paths as well as the Boundary or Provincial Lines, Their several Township and other divisions of the Land in Both Provinces: the whole FROM ACTUAL SURVERYS by HENRY MOUZON and OTHERS.* This map along with many historical maps of South Carolina can be purchased on line.



One of Henry Mouzon's Descendants, **Dr. Scott Ashley Mouzon, DDS**, owns the Mouzon Family Dentistry, 402 College Ave, Ste 3, Clemson, SC. He Provided us with his family history: **The Mouzon Family** from Lewis and William Henry through John Pressley Mouzon by George Timothy Mouzon.

The **Mouzon** family name originated from the small town in the north of France called Ville de Mouzon located in the Champagne-Ardenne region of France on the Meuse River, very close to the border of Belgium. They were **Huguenots** belonging to the Protestant Reformed Church of France, historically known as French Calvinists.

The Huguenots

were known for their criticism of worship as performed in the Roman Catholic Church. They gained a hold in some cities with attacks against Catholic Churches in which altar and images and sometimes the buildings themselves were torn down. By 1562, the Huguenots in France peaked in number at approx. 2 million compared to approx. 16 million Catholics. During the St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre of 23-24 August 1572, Catholics killed thousands of Huguenots in Paris who had been burning stores and provoking the police. Similar massacres took place in other towns in the weeks following, with an estimated total death toll of 110,000. The massacre happened during the wedding of Henry of Navarre, a Huguenot, to Marguerite de Valois (daughter of Catherine de Medici) when thousands of Huguenots converged on Paris for the wedding. **Catherine De Medici** had persuaded her son, **Charles IX**, to order a mass murder. Many years later after his actual conversion, he became the King of France as King Henry IV. In 1598, he issued the Edict of Nantes that granted the Protestants equality with Catholics under the throne and a degree of religious and political freedom within their domains and protected Catholic interests by discouraging the founding of new Protestant churches in the Catholic controlled regions. In 1685, **King Louis XIV** revoked the Edict of Nantes and declared Protestantism illegal. After this huge numbers of Huguenots fled France. **Louis de Mouzon** was one of many who settled in



Charles Town, South Carolina. In 1685, **Rev. Elie Prioleau** became the pastor of the Huguenot Church in Charles Town. Today that church is the oldest continuously active Huguenot congregation in the US. In 1764, persecution of Protestants ended in France and they gained full citizenship in 1789, with the French Revolution.

French Huguenot Church, Charleston

Founded in the 1680s, it had about 450 congregants by 1700. The original sanctuary was built in 1687, but was deliberately destroyed as a firebreak during the great conflagration of 1796. The church was replaced in 1800, but that building was in turn

demolished in favor of the picturesque stucco-coated Gothic Revival sanctuary you see today, which was completed in the mid-1800s.

The MOUZON MAP

William Henry Mouzon II was the creator of the Mouzon Map. Surveyor, mapmaker and civil engineer, he was born in Craven (now Williamsburg) County, SC but spoke fluent French. After his father's death in 1749, eight-year-old Henry Jr. was sent to France for his education. Mouzon graduated from the Sorbonne as a civil engineer and surveyor of the first rank.

He received his first important public commission in 1771, when he and **Ephraim Mitchell** (subsequently the surveyor general of South Carolina, whose name appears on the early land deeds of the plats indexed in our *Frederick van Clayton's Book: Settlement of Pendleton Dist.*) were appointed by **Governor Lord Charles Greville Montague** (the last Royal Governor of the Province of South Carolina from 1766 to 1773) to survey the boundaries of the civil districts of South Carolina. In May 1774, Mouzon advertised a proposal for a corrected map of South Carolina to be issued the following January. When the map was published, it included both North and South Carolina and corrected some of the mistakes of the two previous maps of the area—**James Cook's** 1773 map of South Carolina and **John Colett's** 1770 map of North Carolina. Individual copies of the map cost £5. A few pocket maps on parchment, priced at \$1, were available "for the use of Gentlemen who ride the circuits and others who travel." **Francis Marion (The Swamp Fox** whose father was a French Huguenot) was among his assistants in these surveys before the Revolutionary War. **Francis Marion** had **William Henry Mouzon** prepare additional maps during the War. They were used by the American Army

AND their enemy, the British Army and Lord Cornwallis. Gen. George Washington followed his campaign in the south from Charleston, SC to Gilford, NC Courthouse with his canvas-backed original copy of Mouzon's map in his saddlebag. Henry Mouzon was a Captain of the Williamsburg Militia and served with Gen. Francis Marion. Henry was one of the BIG FOUR for Marion's Brigade.

Henry's school friend, **Banastre Tarleton**, was a Lt. Col. for the English Army. He had a reputation of being callous and bloodthirsty in war and hated the French as a result of the past wars between England and France. **Col. Banastre Tarleton** burned Mouzon's Plantation and outbuildings in August of 1780. Shortly thereafter, on Sept. 28, 1780, Capt. Henry Mouzon, fell badly riddled by buckshot at Marion's Black Mingo Creek victory and forced to retire from further service. He remained a cripple for the rest of his life.

RESEARCHING A PICKENS COUNTY, SC FAMILY

The family of **THOMAS BROOKS** and **ELIZABETH PULLIAM** moved to Pickens District about 1874. Their 1st son, Andrew Pulliam Brooks, and 2nd daughter, Mary, passed away before the move:

THOMAS WARREN BROOKS, SR. was born 1816 in Newberry Co., South Carolina, and died 1892 in Pickens Co., SC burial Unknown. He married **ELIZABETH (LIZZIE) ANN PULLIAM** 1836 in Abbeville Dist., SC, daughter of **BENJAMIN PULLIAM, Jr.** (1780-1832) and his 3rd wife, **LUCY LONG ANDERSON SWANCEY SIMS** (1783-1836). She was born 1816 in Abbeville Dist., SC, and died 22 Feb 1892 in Pickens Co., SC burial Unknown.

1. **ANDREW PULLIAM BROOKS**, b. 1838, South Carolina; d. July 15, 1865, at Elmira Prison, 1825 Davis St., buried @ Woodlawn Cem., Elmira, Chemung Co., NY. Andrew and his younger brother, Thomas Warren Brooks, Jr. served with the 1ST REGIMENT RIFLES known as Orr's Rifles, organized at Sandy Springs, S. C., in July, 1861. Its members were recruited from the counties of Abbeville, Pickens, Anderson, and Marion. The unit was first stationed on Sullivan's Island and called by the other troops "The Pound Cake Regiment" because of its light duty. Then in April, 1862, it moved to Virginia with 1,000 men. Assigned to General Gregg's and McGowan's Brigade it fought with the army from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor. Later the regiment endured the hardships of the Petersburg trenches and the Appomattox operations. Of the 537 engaged at Gaines' Mill, fifty-nine percent were killed, wounded, or missing. The unit reported 116 casualties at Second Manassas and 170 at Fredericksburg, then lost forty-nine percent of the 233 at Chancellorsville and three percent of the 366 at Gettysburg. There were 12 killed and 81 wounded at The Wilderness, 15 killed, 36 wounded, and 44 missing at Spotsylvania, 3 killed and 34 wounded at Deep Bottom, and 9 killed and 37 wounded at Poplar Springs Church. It surrendered 9 officers and 148 men. The field officers were Colonels Daniel A. Ledbetter, James W. Livingston, J. Foster Marshall, George M. Miller, James L. Orr, and James M. Perrin; Lieutenant Colonels William M. Hadden, J. E. Harrison, Joseph J. Norton, and James T. Robertson; and Majors John B. Moore and Leonard Rogers.

Thomas Nalley**. Home in 1920: EASLEY, SOUTH 5TH STREET, PICKENS COUNTY, SC, in the household of **Hollie Berry Ballentine**, and daughter **Clora King**. **Hollie Berry Hellams** married first **William Dean King** married second **Albert Crayton Ballentine**. Daughter **Clora King** married **George W. Barr**. She had a brother, **Clarence Hutchinson King** married **Eula Cannon**. In 1870, **William D. King** was living next to **Laban Mauldin** and **Cassandra Rogers**-next to the land **Thomas Warren Brooks, Sr.** purchased in 1874 from **Benjamin Mauldin**.

He married (1) **CYNTHIA JANE STRAWHORN** 1865 in Abbeville Dist., SC, daughter of **JAMES STRAWHORN** (1821-1903) and **LOUANY ELIZABETH ELLIS** (1823-1866). Thomas Warren was wounded and missing at Manassas Oct. 1862. He was ordered unfit for service the month of Nov. & Dec. 1862. He was discharged Dec. 19, 1862. The grandchildren of **Shelton O.** and **Anna Eugenia Brooks Shore** remember Anna telling the story of how her father, Thomas W. Brooks, Jr., was once hiding from Union soldiers and scared them away from the house by dressing himself up as a ghost with a white cotton beard and flour on his face and appearing in an upstairs window. This must have been after he was discharged and sent home. He wore a watch with a chain made from his mother's hair. Thomas Warren Brooks was called a Captain on the railroad-he was responsible for laying the tracks in all the places that he lived. When he returned to Greenville, SC and continued to work on the railroads in Ft. Inn, SC, he lost his leg in a railroad accident. He walked with a wooden leg from that time on. His interest in the railroad may have been spurred by the fact that Cynthia Jane Strawhorns' family-owned property in Greenwood, SC adjoining the new railroad station. The railroad tracks were being laid in Greenwood County during the time that Thomas Warren and Cynthia Jane lived there. The tracks he laid followed the Broad River from Marshall, NC through Fountain Inn, SC. Before that he laid the tracks from Lula, GA to Greenville, SC.

5. JOHN ROBERT BROOKS, b. 1847, possible Edgefield Co., SC/Newberry Co., SC; d. 30 Oct 1876, Easley Station, Pickens Co., SC. He married **ALLSTON (ANN E.) GADSDEN** 10 Jun 1868 in Cokesbury, Abbeville Co., SC @ the groom's residence by **Rev. William Honor Fleming**, daughter of **FISHER GADSDEN** (1805-1870) and **LAURA (FANNY) WASHINGTON MICHAUX** (1806-1886). 




Early as the year 1792 we find that the **Mauldin Community** produced as it does today some of the best and most worthy citizens of the nation. In Those days the ox cart and wagons took the place of the speedy autos. Journeys that are made today in a few minutes between two towns, required several hours in those days Cotton Gins and cotton mills were not to be found in this part of the world, and the little cotton that was raised by the farmers was seeded and made into cloth by hand. The crude hand-made gins were in use some years later, but at the time the cotton was separated from the seeds by hand.

The women carded, spun and wove the cotton, and made the cloth into the articles of clothing, such as dresses, sheets, hand towels and other things. Sheep were raised and the wool was made into cloth. All of the work of carding, and spinning and weaving was done by hand.

Tailors were found in some communities, who made woolen suits for the men. Most of the clothing for the women was made by them, or the servants in the home. Also, woolen blanket, coverlets, etc. were made in the home.

No cook stoves were to be found in the south at the. The food was coked over open fires. It was much harder on the women who did the cooking, but if you have never eaten any cornbread baked in one of those ovens, they used in those days, then you have eaten any REAL CORNBREAD! Shoes were made by hand. They were made with wooden pegs instead of tacks used today. They were sewed by hand.

One of the leading citizens of the Mauldin community in the year 1792 (this year is a mistake-ALLEN MAULDIN did not move to Pickens Co. until 1810) was one ALLEN MAULDIN. He was a dirt farmer not afraid of work, and one of the leaders in the civic, social and church activities of the community. To him and his wife, OBEDIENCE HUGHES MAULDIN, were born eight children-POLLY, who married a MR. SHERIFF; MILTON, who was known as UNCLE BUNK and whose wife was MISS SALLIE O'DELL; MAULTON M., who married RHODA DUKE; NANCY who was the wife of ELIAS KENNEMORE; BIDDY who married a MR. COTTRELL; ELIZABETH who was the wife of PERRIN (PURN) O'DELL and ALEX who married a MISS SHERIFF. The old Homeplace of MR. & MRS. ALLEN MAULDIN was near what is now the home of MR. & MRS. CHARLIE THOMAS, on the Liberty Easley highway, just outside the city limits of Easley.

ALLEN MAULDIN was born 30 Aug 1791 in Union Co., SC, the son of **Rucker N. Mauldin, Sr.**, Pvt. and Chaplin in the SC Militia and **Nancy Posey**. He died 1876 in Pickens District, SC buried @ Kennemore, Mauldin, O'Dell Cem., Pickens Co, SC. He married **OBEDIENCE HUGHES** 1814, daughter of **ANDREW HUGHES** and **OBEDIENCE SUMNER**. She was born 1796 in NC, and died 1880 in Pickens District, SC buried @ Kennemore, Mauldin, O'Dell Cem., Pickens Co, SC. Cemetery is about halfway between Liberty and Easley, off Old Liberty Highway and about ½ mile from the quarry; take Old Liberty Highway from the quarry and turn left onto road where the small cemetery sign is posted at gate, and travel 1/5 mile to where path exists on the left up to cemetery. The clearing is located about 125 yards up this path.


