

# The Miller Family of Pickensville, Pickens County, SC

From page 13 of the Nov. 2021 Newsletter issue: Child #8. **PRESTON (PET) SYLVESTER BROOKS** (1854-1899), married 1st **MARTHA C. MILLER** (1865-1880) the daughter and last child of **TILLMAN MILLER** (1800-1871) and **SARAH WINES** (1819-1899). Tillman Miller became a large land owner in Pickens County and the father of 22 children. His populated Pickens County.

## THE TILLMAN MILLER STORY



Tilman Miller's father, Israel Miller, was born to Quaker parents in New Garden, PA in 1763. At age 17 Israel left PA and traveled to Wilkes Co., GA where he joined men from Militia Companies formed in Wilkes County, and fought at Camden, Kings Mt., Cowpens and several other Revolutionary War battles in GA and SC. On Oct., 13, 1785 Israel received a Land Grant from the Governor of Georgia, for 200 acres in Wilkes Co., and took up farming with his wife, Mary. They lived in Wilkes Co. for 9 years and had 4 children.


When his health began to fail, Israel sold his land in GA and moved to upstate SC. In 1793, he purchased 120 acres on both sides on the Enoree River for 50 lbs. Sterling in Greenville Dist. He later bought 193 acres on the Enoree and 232 acres on Brushy Creek in Greenville. He continued to buy and sell parcels of land throughout his life and became a prosperous landowner.

Tilman was born on his father's plantation on the Enoree River in what is now Simpsonville, Greenville Co., SC. Tilman married Lucy Fowler on Oct. 28, 1819 at age 19. She was the twin sister of Louisa who was married to Edmund, Tilman's older brother. The parents of Lucy & Louisa had 3 sets of twins; Lucy & Louisa were the 2<sup>nd</sup> set. When Tilman was 23 he bought 250 acres on the south side of Canebrake Branch of the Enoree River for \$200.00, adjacent his father's land. In 1835 he bought 380 acres for \$500.00 on the East and Middle Forks of Laurel Creek waters of Reedy River from his father-in-law. Lucy died on Nov. 7, 1840 after a painful illness of 15 months.

Tilman's next marriage created a problem with dates and his next child, Sarah Jane. Sarah Jane was born 3 months before Lucy died, so it looks like Lucy was her mother, but Sarah Jane's death certificate listed Sarah Wines as her mother. Church records also show that at Lucy's death, she was survived by her husband and 9 children, all were still living at her death and born before 1840. Tilman married, 2 months after the death of Lucy, Sarah Wines on Jan. 4, 1841 in Haywood Co., NC, where Sarah Wines was born and raised. Her daughter, Sarah Jane, was already 4 months old.

If Tilman was the father it would mean he was carrying on a relationship with Sarah Wines while his wife Lucy was gravely ill. This deception is out of character with the outstanding church going land owner. Maybe it was a scandal, but he was too important to the church, so they looked the other way. Tilman Miller donated the lands on which the George's Creek Baptist Church was built. Perhaps, they successfully covered it up. 79 years later, Sarah Jane's son, **ROBERT POSEY ADDINGTON**, said Sarah Wines name is on his mother's death certificate. DNA can resolve this issue.

In 1845 Tilman bought an additional 21 ¼ acres on the branches of Laurel Creek Waters of the Reedy River from Martin H. JONES for \$42.50, bringing his land total to 651 ¼ acres for his own on and around the Enoree and Reedy Rivers.

On Oct. 26, 1859, Tilman sold 314 ½ acres on Laurel Creek to Jackson Brown for \$1,731.00. two months later he bought 581 acres on Georges Creek near Easley, SC, 2 for \$3,000 from W. K. EASLEY and moved his family. Is was "the tract of land known as

as the MAULDIN TRACT: adjoining land of J.A. EASLEY, JOHN BOWEN and others in Pickens District on the waters of Georges Creek on the Old Pendleton Road. Witnesses: JESSE A. WALKER, JACOB MILLER, signed W.K. EASLEY. 24 Dec. 1859. Old Pendleton Road is now Old Saluda Dam Road or Saluda Dam Rd off Hwy 25, the White Horse Road, Greenville/Pickens County Line). Tilman and Sarah Miller are listed in the 1860 & 1870 Census living @ the Pickensville Township P.O. In 1870, they are living next to OSBORN MAULDIN.

In Tilman's will he decreed that his properties be divided into 4 equal tracts and to be sold. The proceeds from the sale to be distributed among his surviving heirs after taking into account previous distributions of property and implements. This would explain why there were no large tracts of land in the possession of present descendants.

#### TILMAN MILLER'S FAMILY

**TILMAN S. MILLER** was born 18 Jun 1800 in Greenville, Greenville Co., SC, and died 14 Oct 1871 in Pickensville, Pickens Co., SC. The son of **ISRAEL PICKENS MILLER** (1763-1833) and **MARY HENDERSON** (1768-1861). He married (1) **LUCY FOWLER** 1821 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC, daughter of **ARCHIBALD FOWLER** (1758-1839) and **EDITH WEST** (1761-1855). She was born 14 Nov 1801 in Greenville, Greenville Co., SC, and died 07 Nov 1840 in Pickens Co., SC. He married (2) **SARAH CAROLINE WINES** 04 Jan 1841 in Haywood County, NC, daughter of **ABNER C. WYNES** (1787-1868) and **CHRISTINA BETHANY BARTHENA LYON** (1793-1865). She was born 1819 in Fines Creek, Haywood Co., NC, and died 15 Jun 1899 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC. All buried @ Georges Creek Baptist Church Cemetery, 1991 Saluda Dam Road, Easley, Pickens Co, SC. Also known as Georges Creek Cemetery.



**Obituary:** Confederate Veteran Dead: James Jones, one of the oldest citizens of Greenville County died at the residence of his son, J.T. Jones, near this city yesterday morning at the age of 84 years. Mr. Jones was a veteran of the Confederate army, and was held in high esteem by a large number of acquaintances and friends in this county. Nine children and many relatives survive. The funeral services and interment will be held today at Clear Springs church, the Rev. M. B. Samples officiating.




10. **JAMES HENRY MILLER**, was born 09 Jun 1858 in Easley, Pickens Co SC, and died 08 Dec 1900 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC. He married **NANCY JANE ROBINSON** 1877 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC. Daughter of **JAMES T. ROBINSON** (1830-1862) and **LYDIA JONES** (1827-1898). She was born in Easley, Pickens Co., SC, and died Feb 1926 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC. both buried @ George Creek Bap. Ch. Cem.
11. **JACKSON PICKENS MILLER**, was born 31 May 1860 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC, and died 12 Jan 1882 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC buried @ Georges Creek Baptist Ch Cem. He married **MARTHA (MATTIE) MCCOMSON**. She was born 1860 in SC, and died 25 Jan 1953 in Cherokee Co., SC.
12. **MARTHA C. MILLER**, was born 1863 in Pickens Co., SC, and died July 1879 in Pickens Co., SC possible burial @ Antioch Meth. Ch. Cem., Easley, SC, no tombstone has been found. She married **PRESTON (PET) SYLVESTER BROOKS** 1877 in Easley, Pickens Co., SC, son of **THOMAS BROOKS** and **ELIZABETH PULLIAM**. He was born 24 Sep 1854 in Cokesbury Twp., Abbeville Dist., SC now Greenwood Co., SC, and died 27 Apr 1899 in Cornelia, Habersham Co., GA buried @ Level Grove Baptist Church Cem.\ City Cem. in Habersham Co., GA.
- Martha was 5 years old at the time of her father's death and too young to receive her inheritance.
- 1877 Sept-Oct: Martha, age 14, married Preston Brooks, age 23.
- 1878 June 9: Birth of daughter, Martha Eulah (Lula) Brooks.
- 1879 July: Martha died from typhoid fever.
- 1879 Dec. 5: Alexander Miller & John Staling Thackston (m. Mary Ann Miller), Executors of Tilman Miler Estate to Martha C. Brooks of Pickens Co, SC. Release for 25 acres land being a portion of tract known as Lot No. 3 of the estate of Tilman Miller near Georges, Creek. She received the land in 1879 but it was not recorded until December.
- 1880 June 7: Census: Preston was living with his father without Martha.
- 1881: Preston remarried Martha Jane Shore and was living in Cornelia, Habersham Co., GA.
- 1883 Aug. 23: Preston Brooks to Martha Eula Brooks, his minor daughter of five years, that piece of land that was run off to the said Martha Brooks, deceased, by the executors of the estate of Tilman Miller. Adjoining lands of Samuel Barr, Freeman, Garrison and others. Preston authorized and empowered his father, Thomas Warren Brooks, to hold, use and cultivate the land as his own and pay all taxes, provided that he will feed, cloth and educate Martha until the age of 21 when she will take possession of the land. It was witnessed in the state of NC, Madison County by Martha Jane Brooks, the wife of Preston S. Brooks.
- 1892: Thomas Warren & Lizzie Brooks died leaving Martha to be raised by her 2 Aunts & Uncle.
- 1896: Martha Eulah (Lula) Brooks, at age 18, married her 1<sup>st</sup> cousin, Robert Posey Addington (1871-1941). He was the son of Sarah Jane Miller & Lowery Thomson Addington listed above. Sarah Jane & Lowery Thomson Addington inherited 183 1/5 acres on George's Creek from Tilman Miller. Lula & Robert lived on the she inherited until Robert sold it to his uncle and bought another place.

### *The Family of Martha Eulah (Lula) Brooks and Robert Posey Addington*

**ROBERT POSEY ADDINGTON** was born 21 Sep 1871 in Pickens Co., SC, and died 02 May 1941 in Pickens Co., SC. He was the son of the above **SARAH JANE MILLER & LOWERY THOMSON ADDINGTON**. 

## *What became of Martha Miller Brooks Land?* AUTOMOTIVE NASCAR STOCKCAR

Greenville, SC (June 17, 2003)- After over 47 years of continual private ownership, THE GREENVILLE PICKENS SPEEDWAY, NASCAR's second oldest facility, was sold on Monday, June 16, 2003. Greenville automobile dealer Kevin Whitaker purchased the entire 150-acre track for an undisclosed sum from long time owners, the Blackwell family. The purchase included the speedway and property and business of the annual Upper South Carolina State Fair.

The Blackwell family, who purchased the speedway in December of 1955, guided the speedway through the early years of NASCAR development when the track hosted NASCAR Grand National events, the forerunner of today's Winston Cup Series. The speedway is renowned in NASCAR history for hosting the first NASCAR race to be televised live from flag to flag to the nation, broadcast on ABC's Wide World of Sports in April of 1971. Since 1972, the speedway has hosted the NASCAR Weekly Racing Series, NASCAR's weekly short track racing event.

Whitaker will take immediate ownership and management of the property, but in a separate agreement of the parties, Tom Blackwell will remain as General Manager of the facility, administering the day-to-day activities of both the speedway and the annual Upper South Carolina State Fair.

"I'm getting more advanced in age now and what I really wanted to do is ensure that this historic speedway remains in tact here for the pleasure and enjoyment of race fans," Blackwell said of the transfer of ownership of the property. "Kevin and I have been close friend for many, many years, and I know that GREENVILLE PICKENS is in good hands. The generations of fans over the decades who have enjoyed this place will remain to do so in the coming years with Kevin at the helm," said Blackwell.

"This is a dream come true for me," Whitaker said. "Tom and family have worked hard over the past many years to mold Greenville Pickens Speedway into one of the best NASCAR facilities in the nation, and fans can be sure that that leadership will continue. I also want to be clear to the many fans of the speedway that my intentions and dedication to building upon that legacy and improving the speedway in the years to come is genuine," said Whitaker.

Additionally, the annual UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA STATE FAIR, which runs 10 days annual over the Labor Day weekend, is included in this sale. The Fair, which hosts about 270,000 individual day visits each year, will open its gates for a 40th year on Thursday, August 28.

### **JACKSON STONEWALL MILLER WAS MY GRANDFATHER**



**Jackson Stonewall Miller** was my mother, **Mary Sybil Miller's** father. He was born on June 20, 1885 on his father's farm at George's Creek, near Easley in Pickens Co., SC. The large farming plantations of his grandfather, Tilman and his Great Grandfather, **Israel Miller** were gone with the after the Civil War. His father, James Henry Miller had a small farm, his share of the inheritance dispersed to the 20 siblings living at the time of Tilman Miller's death.

In 1900 a Boil Weevil infestation devastated the cotton crops throughout South Carolina. I remember as a small child hearing my grandfather, Jackson Stonewall Miller, talking of his childhood on the farm. He remembered how poor they were and toiling in the fields, side by side with his neighbor's children, both white and former slaves. They were all equal, friends working together, wearing the same clothes, and sharing what food they had. It did not matter if they were former slaves or former land owners, they all considered each other family.

Times were very hard on the farm and on Dec 8, 1900, Jack's father, **James Henry Miller** passed away suddenly at the age of 42 making things even more difficult. James left his wife, Nancy, a 42-year-old widow with six children ages 16 years to 11 months. Jackson was only 15 years old when he had to step up with his older brother Dabner to try to support the family. Finding farming too difficult Nancy moved her young family to Greenville to find work.

I next found a record of the family in the 1910 Census. They were living at #214 Johnson St. in Greenville Township. He is listed as living at home with his mother and siblings and working as a carpenter building houses. Also at home were his siblings, Dinie age 20, Flora, age 18, Rubie, age 16, and Perry age 11. The three sisters are listed in the census as working as cigar maker in the Cigar Mill.

The Cigar mill would have been **The American Cigar Factory** located in a four-story building at #25 East Court St in downtown Greenville. According to the State Newspaper, in 1903: "250 girls and young women have been given employment and everyday there are some added to this number." At the time cigar making was considered a job in the women's industry, or job fields which utilized skills thought best handled by women. The processes involved in making cigars required highly-developed fine motor skills, something once thought to be possessed more by women than by men. Women were also paid much less for their work, creating higher profit margins for factory owners. The factory eventually went out of business during the depression and the building was eventually bought by Stone Manufacturing Company. Today the building is used for Apartment Space, offices and a restaurant.

## Artifacts in the Attic

As we begin the 2022 year with our Old Pendleton District Newsletter, I want to encourage all members to contribute your family history. This is your newsletter and it should contain your family histories.

We all have artifacts that have been passed down through our families. Consider contributing a historical article about those “Artifacts from the Attic” to our newsletter this year. Once a year, the Old Pendleton District Chapter use to reserve a meeting for members to bring a family artifact to present. We could begin a spot in our newsletter with your contributions about those articles similar to this one:

### What do “Tom & Jerry” have to do with Egg Nog?

My grandmother, **Frances Perrin Cheatham Gilliam**, passed away in 1997. We stored 14 packed boxes from her house in our attic until 2016 when those boxes moved with us to our new home. While unpacking them, one of the many items discovered were 6 white cups with gold leaf “Tom & Jerry” written on them. Research revealed that it was not the cartoon cat and mouse, “Tom & Jerry”, Hanna/ Barbera created, but a set of punch bowls, cups and mugs that became popular during the 1930’s. My great grandfather, **Albert Lamar Gilliam, Sr.** (1885-1960). owned and operated a liquor store located on Trinity Street in Abbeville, SC. It stands to reason that these cups could have been sold in his store at that time.

This earliest mention of “Tom & Jerry” is found in 1821 in London, England as a play that depicts the adventures and misadventures of two young men, Tom and Jerry. “It exhibited the ill effects of overindulgence and keeping bad company with drunkenness, quarrelling and dueling”. (“Olympic Theatre”, *The Morning Post*, 13 November 1821, p. 3). Numerous plays were produced from the popular book “Life in London” by Pierce Egan (1772–1849) a British journalist, sportswriter, and writer on popular culture, but “Tom and Jerry”, or “Life in London” became the first play to ever run 100 performances in London. Tom & Jerry became an English word and The Oxford English Dictionary cites examples of its use: “to describe young men given to drinking, gambling, and riotous living – in the US, Australia and Britain throughout the 19th and 20th centuries and into the 21st. In British usage a “Tom and Jerry shop” was a 19th-century term for a small tavern or alehouse – “especially one regarded as disreputable”. In American usage the phrase “Tom and Jerry” came to be applied from at latest the 1840s to an alcoholic drink resembling egg nog”.

It is believed that the author, Egan, introduced the cocktail as a way to promote his book and play. During the 1830’s bartenders did not disclose the ingredients in their drinks. One of the first bartenders to share his ingredients was Jerry Thomas, who is considered the father of modern mixology, claimed that he invented the Tom and Jerry, and although he published a similar egg-based cocktail in his 1862 book “How to Mix Drinks (or The Bon-Vivant’s Companion)”, most historians agree that Egan is the true originator. (Gunter: *Today’s classic Cocktail History*: Dec. 29, 2014).

The “Tom & Jerry” drink with its punch bowl & mugs was served by three elderly industrialists to their guests in a wonderful old 1940 movie playing at Christmas called “Beyond Tomorrow”, also known as “And So Goodbye and Beyond Christmas”. (You can watch it any time on YouTube). The drink is warmed before it is served so it makes a good addition at Christmas.

I have read the 1930's Tom and Jerry Mugs and Cups were a 100-year celebration of the 1830s popular drink. They were manufactured by many companies in several types of ceramics and glass, in crystal & iridescent by the Jeannette Glass Company (1887-1983), milk glass by McKee, Hazel Atlas, and peach glass by Universal Cambridge. Our set was manufactured by the Homer Laughlin Company.

The original ingredients in the Tom & Jerry are similar to the ingredients for today's egg nog: 6 eggs, 2 ½ cups sugar, 1oz Rum, 1 ½ oz vanilla extract, 2 dashes angostura bitters, ¼ tsp cinnamon, ¼ nutmeg, ¼ allspice, ¼ cloves, ¼ ginger served with warm milk. The "Tom & Jerry" Carton debuted 1940, the same the drink was making a "come back". The original names of the cartoon characters were Jasper & Jinx.

Joab was the **FIRST** Sheriff of Pickens County.

**OBITUARIES: Mr. Joab Mauldin** died at his home near Pickens, CH on Tuesday, November 30<sup>th</sup>, aged 58 years. He was one of Pickens County's best and most popular citizens, and had served four terms as Sheriff of the County. A widow and nine children survive him.

**Joab Mauldin** died at his residence two miles south of Pickens, Tuesday, the 30<sup>th</sup> of Nov., 1897, aged 58 years. Though it was known that he had been in feeble health during the fall and that he had been confined to his bed for a few weeks, yet the community was not prepared for this sad announcement.

There was not a man in the county better or more favorably known than Joab Mauldin. Frank, and generous hearted he made friends of all who knew him. He was no sort of a politician. He was popular because all who know him were willing to trust him. His thousand kindnesses to all he could assist never had the least tinge of time serving or self-aggrandizement. So, when he offered for the office of sheriff of the county, his election was a foregone conclusion. He filled that responsible office for four terms, with fidelity to the people and with unflinching courage in the discharge of his duty. Discretion and official tact were marked characteristics of the man.

In the midst of his political success, his increasing responsibilities and cares, he heard and obeyed the still small voice calling him to be a Christian. Well does the writer remember when he arose in the congregation at the Methodist church and announced the fact that he believed that Christ was the Son of the Living God, and his Savior, and in that faith, he lived and acted until the day of death. Without ostentation, without malice, above suspicion in all things he walked humbly and trustfully in the pathway of true piety. His widow and nine children survive him. He has left them a consolation, a heritage that wealth cannot buy nor adversity take away. His remains were interred at Pickens Cemetery on Thursday with Masonic honors.

Both Joab and Deborah are buried @ Sunrise Cemetery. Sunrise Cemetery is also known as Pickens Mill Cemetery located on East Cedar Rock Street at Newton Drive in Pickens, Pickens Co., SC.

South Carolina was signally honored when President Wilson on August 14 sent to the Senate the nomination of Colonel Frank G. Mauldin, a native of Pickens County, to be brigadier-general in the US Army. The Palmetto State has only one other brigadier, Gen. E. A. Garlington, of Newberry, who was lately inspector general of the army.

Gen. Mauldin, who is now stationed at Camp Codey, Deming, New Mexico, said in a recent letter, "I still look upon South Carolina as home and am proud of the progress now being made in the section where I was born." He has often visited Greenville and spent a day here before going West after his promotion. He was born in Pickens County, near Easley, and is a son of the late Ex-Sheriff Joab Mauldin of Pickens County. His mother, before her marriage, was Deborah Reid Hollingsworth. He is one of a large family, as he has the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Vesta McFall, of Pickens, Circuit Judge T.J. Mauldin of Pickens, Mrs. N. D. Lesesne of Kingstree, Ivy M. Mauldin of Greenville, Lieutenant-Commander C. W. Mauldin of US Navy, Wayne F. Mauldin and Greg T. Mauldin of Pickens.

Frank G. Mauldin was educated at the common schools in Pickens County and at the Piedmont Institute at Pickens. He took a short course for teachers at the South Carolina College and completed the sophomore year at that historic institution. He was appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point by the late Congressman D. Wyatt Aiken, Sr., entering in June, 1886. He was graduated in 1890, standing twentieth in his class.

Upon graduation, he was assigned to the artillery and served with that arm at various station in the US and in the Philippine Islands. While stationed at Washington Barracks, DC, he took a night course in the law school of Columbia University and was graduated from that intuition in 1893 with the degree of LL.B. He served three years with the field artillery at San Antonio, Texas. For four years he was detailed as instructor in the department of law and history at West Point. He went with the Shafter expedition to Cuba, in 1898, during the Spanish-American war. He was graduated at the School of Submarine Defense at Fort Totten, New York, in 1904,

and for four years commanded one of the US Army mine planters. In 1908 he was detailed to the inspector-general's department and served for five years in that department at Washington, Atlanta, Vancouver Barracks, Washington, San Francisco, California and Manila, P.I.

He had command of the Presidio, San Francisco, in 1915 and later served as fort commander at Fort McKinley, Maine. At the time of his promotion to brigadier general he held the rank of colonel of coast artillery corps and was in command of the Recruit Depot, Fort Slocum, New York. Just after his promotion, he was ordered to Camp Cody.

General Mauldin is widely known in this section of the Palmetto State and held in the highest esteem. His further career will be watched with great interest by the people of the Piedmont, who feel certain that he will acquit himself with uncommon distinction wherever he serves.

**3. THOMAS JOAB (T.J.) MAULDIN**, b. 21 Jul 1870, Pickens Co., SC; d. 22 Oct 1931, Pickens Co., SC. Tombstone Inscription: Lawyer, Jurist, Christian Citizen.

**Thomas Joab Mauldin**, son of **Joab Mauldin** (b. 1839) and **Deborah Reid Hollingsworth**, was born 21 July 1870 in Pickens County. Educated at Piedmont Institute in Pickens, he attended The Citadel from which he graduated with honors in 1891. Returning to Pickens, he studied law under his uncle **C. L. Hollingsworth** and was admitted to the bar 16 December 1892. He taught school for several years and was principal of the Laurens Male Academy (ca. 1891-1896) before resettling in Pickens as an attorney; he formed law partnerships with his brother **Ivey Milton Mauldin** (b. 1875) and later with **Benjamin Arthur Morgan** (1864-1957). Pickens County chose him as a Democrat for the House for the Sixty-sixth General Assembly (1905-1906). While in the House, he was a member of the committees on incorporations (1905-1906), the military (1905-1906), and privileges and elections (1905-1906). Elected to the state Senate, he represented Pickens in the Sixty-ninth (1911-1912) and Seventieth (1913-1914) General Assemblies and was on the committees on contingent accounts (1911-1914), incorporations (1911-1914), the judiciary (1911-1914), the military (1911-1914), penal and charitable institutions (1911-1914), police regulations (1911-1914; chairman, 1913-1914), printing (1911-1914), county offices and officers (1913-1914), and manufactures (1913-1914). Mauldin resigned his Senate seat upon his election as judge of the thirteenth judicial circuit on 27 Feb 1914; he continued in office until his death. Locally, he also served as captain of the Pickens Rifles (1895-1897); city clerk (1899) and treasurer (1900) for Anderson; editor of the Pickens Journal (1900-1901); chairman of the Pickens County Chapter of the American Red Cross (ca. 1914-1931); director of banks in Greenville, Pickens, and Anderson; member of the Masons; member and steward of the Methodist church; member of the Sons of the American Revolution and Sons of Confederate Veterans; and member of the Pickens County, South Carolina, and American bar associations. On 28 Sep 1904, he

married **Frances Miles Hagood**, daughter of **James E. Hagood** and **Esther Robinson**. No issue was born to their union. Survived by his wife, Thomas Joab Mauldin suffered a heart attack and died 22 Oct 1931 in Pickens. [Biographical Directory of the South Carolina Senate]



He married **FRANCES MILES HAGOOD**, 28 Sep 1904, Pickens Co., SC; daughter of **JAMES EARLE HAGOOD** (1826-1904) and **ESTER BENSON ROBINSON**, b. 1870, Pickens Co., SC; d. 26 Feb 1954, Pickens Co., SC. Both are buried @ The Hagood Family Cemetery. The Cemetery is located approximately 225 yards southeast from driveway of home at 664 Midway Road, in woods. It is not quite visible from the road. Inscription on her tombstone: Devoted wife of Thomas Joab Mauldin. She gave her time and Energy to county, State, and National Educational Historical and Patriotic Work.

**Photo from the South Carolina & West Indian Exposition Photo Passbook 1901-1902.** The photos in this collection were taken as part of a season pass that patrons could purchase for unlimited admission to the South Carolina Inter-State and West Indian Exposition, held in Charleston in 1901 and 1902. Each individual's photo was mounted in a passbook kept by the patron and a duplicate photo was mounted in an album kept by the Director of the Departments of Admissions and Collections, Hugh James Fleming (whose image is on page 34, number 297). The album contains images of 1,326 people, of whom 1,213 are identified by a caption presumably made at the time the photograph was taken. The total number of seasons pass photos taken for the Exposition is unknown, but similar photos beyond the present collection are known to survive in extant individual Exposition pass books. Mr. Fleming donated this photographic album in 1948 to the Charleston Free Library (now called the Charleston County Public Library). Since the paper on which the gelatin silver

photographs are mounted is extremely brittle and in a state of deterioration, the album was disbound several years prior to its digitization in order to facilitate its preservation. The collection of photographs can be found on line at the Charleston Archive at Charleston County Public Library.

He was born 10 Feb 1862 in Kingstree, Williamsburg Co., SC, and died 01 Mar 1954 in Greenville, Greenville Co., SC. Both are buried @ Sunrise Cemetery, Pickens Co., SC.

**PICKENS, MARCH 1, 1954-(SPECIAL) OBIT:** Nabor DeKalb Lesesne, 92, who lived here with a daughter, Mrs. L. I. Hendricks of Pickens, died at 7:30 am Monday. Funeral services will be held at 3 pm Tuesday at the residence of Mrs. Hendricks, conducted by the Rev. Hawley Lynn, former pastor of the Graves Methodist Church, and the Rev. M.E. Boozer, pastor. Burial will be in Sunrise Cemetery here. Mr. Lesesne was born Feb. 10, 1862, in Clarendon County, s son of the late Nabor DeKalb and Marion Ervin Lesesne. He was a former county superintendent of education of Williamsburg County and connected with a Kingstree Bank. At the time of his death Mr. Lesesne was the oldest living graduate of Wofford College. Mr. Lesesne moved to Pickens 10 years ago following retirement. His wife is the former Miss Hortense Mauldin of Pickens. Surviving besides the widow are two sons, Dr. J.M. Lesesne of Erskine College and Marion H. Lesesne of Greenville, and seven grandchildren. The Clayton-Dillard Funeral Home of Pickens is in charge of arrangements. The family requests that flowers be omitted.

She was born 09 May 1886 in Woodruff, SC, and died 31 Dec 1945 in Greenville Co., SC. Both are buried @ Springwood Cem., Greenville, Greenville Co., SC.

**Dr. L. O. Mauldin, Prominent Local Physician, Succumbs.**

Greenville News, May 7, 1932. Doctor Member of Family Well Known in this portion of State. Dr. Leland Osgood Mauldin, 54, prominent Greenville physician, died at 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning at the family residence, 300 Pettigru Street, after a brief illness. He suffered a heart attack following



influenza, and news of his death comes as a distinct shock to relatives and friends.

Dr. Mauldin was a native of Pickens, being a son of the late Joab Mauldin and Deborah Hollingsworth Mauldin. He received his education the public schools of Pickens and later attended Clemson College where he made a fine record. After graduating there, he studied and received his degree in medicine from the SC Medical College at Charleston, returning to Pickens where he practiced his profession. Later he studied in the East and European clinics and located in Greenville where he practiced his specialty: eye, ear, nose and throat treatment.

Dr. Mauldin was past president of the Greenville County Medical Society. He was a member of the Southern Medical Association, The American Medical Association and a fellow in the American College of Surgery. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church of this city, a member of the board of deacons, the Rotary Club, Boy Scout Council and other professional business and social organizations.

Twenty-three years ago. Dr. Mauldin was married to Miss Carrie Floyd of Woodruff, who survives him together with two daughters, Misses Mae and Ossie Mauldin and a son, Leland Osgood Mauldin, Jr. all of this city. The following sisters and brothers also survive: Mrs. Vesta McFall and Mrs. N. D. Lesesne of Pickens; Greg T. Mauldin of Pickens, Capt. C. W. of the US Navy, Gen Frank G. Mauldin, retired US Army General, of this city, Judge T.J. Mauldin of the 15<sup>th</sup> judicial Circuit who died recently was a brother.

Funeral services for Dr. Mauldin will be held from the First Presbyterian church on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Dr. T.W. Sloan officiating, assisted by Dr. Charles H. Nabors and the Rev. C. T.
