The Chapter's genealogical and historical archives are housed at the Clayton Family History Center, located in the lower level of the Rickman Library on Southern Wesleyan University campus in Central, SC. ## Harry Truman Liked Central Man's Spunk

Central. When Harry Truman took over as President when Franklin Roosevelt died in 1945, Lawrence Pike of Route 3, Central, saw Truman's picture in the paper and said to his wife: "Hey, I know that man. I met him in France."

It was indeed the same Harry Truman who was an artillery officer in World War I. The first time Pike talked with Truman they were training behind the lines. Pike was attached to the 156<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery. "Mr. Truman walked up to me one day and said "Son, I admire your spunk. Another time he told me, "When you say something don't back up on it."

Lawrence Pike has followed those admonitions from Truman to this day. He says what he thinks and he backs up his word.

"I think we should have dropped everything we had on North Vietnam, he says. "I don't believe in killing, but if you've got to kill a man in a war, kill him and get it over with."

When he joined the Army in the spring of 1918 and was sent to Camp Jackson for training they had him currying horses and cleaning out corrals and he didn't like it. The sergeant was beating him up and pushing him around. He didn't like that either.

So Lawrence Pike walked right into the headquarters and laid it on the line to the officer in charge. The officer was so impressed with the young man's audacity that he took him out of the stables and gave him a job drilling troops. Pike told him that he had lived all his life around Clemson College and had watched the drilling there.

Pike is equally outspoken on events today. "The Watergate ain't nothing but a dadblame mess," he says. "It's just the Democrats putting down the Republicans. The Democrats bankrupt this government every time they was in there. I was born a Democrat, but I turned a Republican several years ago."

Pike's outspoken manner was also partly responsible for landing him a wife. After he came home from the War he went to a singing at Lawrence's Chapel Methodist Church one Sunday afternoon. When a pretty girl walked by, he said to one of the other boys: "There goes my wife right there."

True to his word, he married the girl.

The Pikes live on the farm on Pike Road that has been in his family for 200 years. The house they live in was standing on the place when his great-great-grandfather Philpott bought the 500 acres for 10 cents an acre.

He pointed toward the rear of the house. "There used to be seven other rooms back there, but they were torn down more than a hundred years ago. A cyclone back before the Civil War knocked an L off the north side of the house. My grandmother told me about that.

"Right down there below that fence is the old road that used to run from Charleston to Pickens and right over there is where the first yarn mill in the upper part of South Carolina was located"

Pike was wearing a modern-day Air Force shirt that his son-in-law gave him. He went out to visit his daughter and son-inlaw in Colorado Springs six or seven years ago and ran into a general who was his second lieutenant in France back during the Great War. "He was getting up in years but he said he was going to stay in until they threw him out."

You're around the Pikes only a short time before you begin to see the deep admiration, they have for each other and the fact that they are still very much in love.


She looks at him and smiles warmly. "He's always the same. Never raises his voice. Never gets mad. Wish I could say the same."

He reciprocated. "Oh, yes, she's been a good wife. She's kept a good house and we had a good time."

Mrs. Pike has always helped around the farm, pulled her share of the load. "I've plowed, helped cut cord wood and helped load crossties. If he was hauling out fertilizer, I was right there with him.


Mr. Pike sighed, "It hasn't always been easy. There were times when we didn't know where the next sack of flour was coming from.



## The Family of William James Brown, Sr. & Lucy Henbree:

WILLIAM JAMES BROWN, SR. the son of JAMES BROWN (1757-1846) and LAVINIA ALCY FELTON (1812-1885) was born 19 May 1826 in the Old Pendleton Dist, part that became Anderson District., SC, and died 24 May 1914 in Toccoa, Stephens County, GA. He married LUCY HEMBREE 22 Oct 1846, daughter of WILLIAM HEMBREE (1794-1862) and ALSEY BALDWIN (1802-1856). She was born 23 Aug 1823 in SC, and died 26 Aug 1908 in Toccoa, Stephens County, GA. Both are buried @ Tugaloo Cemetery, Toccoa, Stephens County, GA.

Tugalo Baptist Church, established before 1789, was first known as the Tugalo River Church. Founded by the Rev. John Cleveland, a Revolutionary Soldier, Tugalo is the oldest church in what was then Franklin County. The county covered an area in GA and SC about the size of Rhode Island.

The church has been called "The Mother Church" of Baptist churches in this area. Cleveland was to become known as "The Father of Baptist Principles." He and the Rev. Thomas Gilbert represented Tugalo River Church when the Tugalo Baptist Association was formed in 1818.

The land upon which the church stands was deeded to the church by Robert and Sarah (Wheeler) Craig July 28, 1895, and both the church and the cemetery have remained on their original site since its founding.

In the cemetery is the grave of Henry Fricks who lived his life during three centuries. He was born in 1799 and died in 1901.

Arthur Edwin Brown, 79, of 394 Choice St., left a Franklin County, GA farm when he was 18 to become a man of many talents in Greenville. Born May 3, 1878, he came to Greenville from the farm and became a sweeper in the old Huguenot Mill on W. Broad Street at a wage of 40 cents a day. Later he became a loom fixer and then became a city policeman for almost two years. He helped install machinery in Camperdown Mill and remained with the mill company for 18 years. He then entered the automobile repair business with Martin Bridges, later the Greenville Packard dealer, and Fred Cooper. He remained in this business until his retirement in 1951. He married the former Mariah Smith of Greenville and from this union there were four children. They are Mrs. Bessie Mull and Joe Brown of Greenville, and Donald and Willie Brown of Pensacola, Fla. His only hobby, he says, is reading. "I don't read trash," he emphasized. "I try to read something that will improve my mind." He and Mrs. Brown are members of Paris Mountain Baptist Church.



The Sterling China Company was established by B.E. Allen in 1917 with a factory in Wellsville, OH and later had offices in East Liverpool, OH. In the early years production consisted of small items such as cups, bowls, coffee mugs, ashtrays, etc. as the years went by new wares, shapes and designs were added to the line. From the very beginning the primary customer base of the Sterling China Company were hotels and the company continues to operate today as a major supplier of hotel dinnerware. During WWII they supplied a tremendous amount of china to the military and also manufactured china for a few railroad companies. Over the years Sterling China acquired other hotel ware factories such as Scammell, Lamberton, the Puerto Rico factory of Iroquois and Wellsville. It is not unusual to see Sterling China marks that include one of the above names. Shortly after WWII, Russel Wright designed a few styles for Sterling China and MOST of these pieces are clearly marked. If the backstamp includes "East Liverpool, Ohio" or "Wellsville, Ohio" then it too was made by the Sterling China Company.

The G-8 Is the Date Code for manufacturing. This one was Manufactured October - December 1969




