Minutes March 15, 2022 7:00 Central Library

Meeting of the Old Pendleton District Chapter of the S.C.G.S. was called to order by President, Keith Brown at 7:00 p.m. After welcoming visitors and members, Keith requested suggestions for our June Outing Meeting. Minutes and Treasurer's Report were approved. State Representative, Anne Sheriff gave details of the upcoming State events.

Vice President, Judy Ballard introduced the speaker, John Perkins, Director of the Pendleton Historic Commission located in the Guard house at Pendleton Village Green in the Square once the Old Jail, a Maverick Pub House and Pendleton Library. John and his wife came from Johnson City, Tennessee to Pendleton. He spoke about the present historical plantation properties that the commission oversees: Ashtabula c. 1825 owned by the Meade Corporation, Woodburn c. 1830 owned by Clemson University, The Guard House c. 1806 and the most recent addition, the Old Jenkins House located behind the Pendleton Methodist Church, built 1836, containing 9 acres of land and out buildings. John gave the history of the Jenkins House concentrating on the owner, Charles Cotesworth Pinckney IV whose uncle, Charles Pinckney (1746-1825) and right-hand man to General. George Washington, nominated to run for President 2 times in 1804 and 1808. Helped write Article 6 of the Constitution. Charles Cotesworth Pinckney IV's aunt and sister of Charles Pinckney, Eliza Lucas Pinckney was responsible for the success of indigo as a cash crop in Colonial South Carolina. In 1830 there were 16 plantations homes built for Charlestonians to use during the hot summer months but Ashtabula was built to be lived in. Built by Lewis Ladson Gibbes to recover from Tuberculosis but died in 1828, the first person to be buried at St. Paul's Episcopal Church Cemetery in Pendleton.

John and his wife held a drawing for books and tickets at the end of his presentation. They brought a few books for purchase through the Historic Commission, one of them is a very impressive book, *Recollections & Reflections of Pendleton, South Carolina Timeline of Village History 1785-2020* by Jacqueline Reynolds. It contains all the homes of Old Pendleton in chronological order with photos, maps and names.

There were 21 in attendance with refreshments served by LaMarr Brooks, Keith Brown and Kat Vargo.

Philip Porter Fiction Carved in Stone By Lucy Ayers Gunthorpe

A veteran's headstone or marker for Philip Porter was placed at Porters Chapel United Methodist Church Cemetery, Pickens, South Carolina in late 2004 or early January 2005. A local chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution placed the marker in recognition of Philip's service in the American Revolution. The marker is standard issue for an American veteran provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs.



Philip's marker was inscribed with the following:


PHILLIP


Much of the information on the marker is historically incorrect.

Philip's name is spelled incorrectly.

Samples of Philip's unique signature was lifted from his pension applications.³ He spelled his name Philip, rather than Phillip.

The date of birth is incorrect.

Two records created by Philip during his lifetime provide different birth years. The date and month remain the same in both records. The tombstone inscription reads <u>7 Jan</u> which is a reversal of the day and month.

1 July 1763: Date given in the Revolutionary War Pension declaration of 7 Oct. 1834.4 -

1 July 1764: Birth date found in the Philip Porter Bible Record.5

"PVT Continental Line" is historically incorrect description of Philip's service.

Philip Porter tells much of his own story when he went to the Pickens District Courthouse on the 7th day of October 1834. While under oath he gave a deposition in open court to obtain a pension for his service in the American Revolution.⁶

The United States Congress passed an Act on June 7th 1832 to provided "a general service pension for revolutionary officers, muscians, soldiers and Indian spies who served one of more terms for two years, the amount of his full pay. Those who served less than two years but not less than six months received a proportionate amount."

Philip's service in the militia is well documented through his pension applications⁸ and his pay stub from South Carolina.⁹ He describes his service with the following terms and phrases:

- volunteer,
- spy,
- scout,
- drafted militia man,
- procuring provision and guarding Fort Norrod,
- always a volunteer and minute man.

He was only 16 or 17 when he served in the South Carolina Militia after the fall of Charleston to the British, 12 May 1780.



This is a part of the indent for payment to Philip Porter (SC File # 6044) for his service in the Militia during the American Revolution.¹⁰ It shows he was paid eight pounds, eleven shillings, and five pence sterling for militia duty as a Private, since the reduction of Charleston.



The evidence does not support the claim of Philip's service in the "Continental Line." Most likely the mistake comes from a lack of knowledge or understanding of the difference between the Militia and the Continental Line.

The entire South Carolina Continental Army was captured at the fall or reduction of Charleston on 12 May 1780. Any service in South Carolina after the fall of Charleston was by local patriot militias.¹¹

I am a proud descendant of Philip Porter, proud of his service in the American Revolution. He is my 4th great grandfather. I am confident that the people responsible for erecting this marker had good intentions and share my pride. It is unfortunate that they didn't have the correct information.

THE MAULDIN COMMUNITY Part V

Continued...... Laban Mauldin, second cousin to A. M. (Uncle Abe) Mauldin, moved into the community about the year 1868. He was clerk of Enon Baptist Church for many years. The district was named in honor of him. His wife was Miss Mollie (Mary) Rogers. They had no children and at the death of Mr. Mauldin, who survived his wife for a short time, most of his estate went to the Connie Maxwell Orphanage in Greenwood, SC. One of the cottages, or homes, there is named in honor of him. It is called The Mauldin Home. Mary (Mollie) Rogers was the daughter of Felix Rogers.

LABAN AUGUSTUS MAULDIN was the son of VARDREY MAULDIN b. 14 Feb 1814 in Pickens District, SC, d. 24 Apr 1885 in Forsyth County, GA and MARY DACUS, daughter of ARCHABALD DACUS and SUSANNAH CHURCH b. 07 May 1821 in Pickens District, SC, d. 04 May 1876. He was born 06 Feb 1842, Pickens County, SC; d. 10 Aug 1915, Pickens County, SC; m. MARY (MOLLY) AMANDA ROGERS, 11 Jan 1866, Pickens County, SC; daughter of FELIX M. ROGERS (1803-1863) and CASSANDRA PARKINS (1808-1884). She was born 27 Jul 1844, Abbeville Dist., SC; d. 06 Aug 1914, Easley, Pickens County, SC. Both are buried at West View Cemetery.

Mrs. Laban Mauldin. On the 6th instant Mrs. Mary Rogers, be beloved wife of Hon. Laban Mauldin, died at their home on Main Street in Easley, in the 71st year of her life. Mrs. Mauldin in her younger days was a very active church worker. She joined the church at Enon when she was young, where she and her husband did much good work for the Master. Mrs. Mauldin had not been able for several years past to be very active in her church, but till the last she was bright and cheerful, always ready to do what she could to help in the Master's work. The funeral services were held by Rev. E. V. Babb, assisted by Rev. D. W. Hiott, on the 8th inst., and her body was laid away in West View cemetery amidst tears and flowers. To the bereaved husband and other relatives, we extend our heartfelt sympathy. H.

THE WATCHMAN AND SOUTHRON, Sumter, SC Aug. 14, 1915 Laban Mauldin Dead.


Easley, Aug. 11-Laban Mauldin died at 7:20 at his home here last night after an illness of a few weeks. He was in his 74th year and apparently was in splendid health until about three weeks ago when he was taken sick suddenly.

Mr. Mauldin was a native of Pickens County, having been born there in January 1842. He took an active part in the War Between the States, as well as having responded to all duty calls through his entire life. He was member of the Confederate camp of veterans here, a member of the local camp of Woodmen of the World and a most faithful member of the First Baptist Church. Mr. Mauldin has always taken considerable interest in political affairs of the county and State, having represented this county in the State legislature several terms. He is survived by three brothers, two living in Georgia and the third in Alabama. He also has a nephew, Walter Evatt, of this place.

VARDREY MAULDIN

The funeral was held at his residence this afternoon at 4 o'clock, interment following at Westview Cemetery. The services were conducted by the Woodmen.





THE INTELLIGENCER, Anderson, SC Sunday, August 15, 1915- this appeared in the paper only 5 days after his death.

\$13,000 is left to Connie Maxwell. Was bequeathed by late Laban Mauldin of Easley.

WILL BUILD HOME. To be known as "Mrs. Laban Mauldin Home," in Memory of His Wife. The Connie Maxwell Orphanage of Greenwood receives \$13,000.00 by the will of the late **Laban Mauldin** of Easley. Mr. Mauldin was a trustee of the institution giving it much thought and attention during his lifetime and leaving it nearly his entire fortune at his death.



The will provided that **Walter Evatt**, a nephew of Mr. Mauldin, was to receive the house and lot, located on Smith Street, in which Mr. Evatt now lives, and left \$500 in cash to **Mrs. Charlie Thomas**, niece by marriage of Mr. Maudlin. They were the only persons who received bequests, the remainder of the estate going to the orphanage. Included in the orphanage bequest are the residence in which Mr. Mauldin lived, situated on a large lot on Main Street, and in a most desirable part of town, a small house and lot located on Smith Street, one block from main street: two farms of 280 acres, situated about two or three miles from town, and all personal property. The total value of this is approximately \$13,000. All this property according to the will, is to be sold and the proceeds to be given to the orphanage to build a home at the orphanage call the Mrs. Laban Maudlin home. The amount to be expended for this home is not specified, but the amount left after the completion of it is to be placed as an endowment fund for the institution.

Walter Evatt was named as one executor and another is to be selected form the board of trustees of the orphanage. Also appeared in THE LAURENS ADVERTISER, Laurens, SC, 15 Sep 1915, THE HERALD AND NEWS, Newberry, SC, 17 Aug 1915.

The Mauldin Cottage was finished a year after his death:

A Good Name is Rather to Be Chosen Than Great Riches

The following is an outline of the address delivered by Rev. D. W. Hiott at the dedication of the Mauldin Memorial Home at Connie Maxwell orphanage at Greenwood, September 2, 1916:

Solomon, the wisest man from a human standpoint and under Divine inspiration make that declaration, and it is true. How to make a good name is to obey the word of God when it says "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you." The man who makes money for money's sake, what he may hoard it or use it only for himself, is not wise. But the man who makes money and uses it for the good of others is acting wisely and making a good name.

Laban Mauldin did that. Seventy-four years ago, just on the Anderson and Pickens County line, a little boy was born. His father and mother were very poor people so far as property was concerned. This boy with several others had to work hard to help support the family. After crops were laid by, he would go to school a few weeks at a time. In this way he learned to read, write and, as they called it then, cipher a little. He grew to young manhood, went to the Confederate service and served through the war in the famous Hampton Legion, serving as a corporal. After the war was over, he returned to his home and married Miss Mollie Rogers, who proved a helpmeet indeed to him. They were both industrious and economical and after many years of earnest labor they accumulated a splendid property.

My acquaintance with Brother Mauldin and his wife began about 39 years ago when they were both young. I became pastor of Enon church in Pickens County where they were members. They were good, upright people but not active members of the church in the way of church work. The church had no Sunday school at this time, and I persuaded Bro. S. A. Gary and Bro. Laban Mauldin to undertake to carry on a Sunday school at the church. The both declared at first that they lived too far away, but I finally persuaded them to try it, which they did with wonderful success. Gray, who was converted at 9 years of age, was at this time fifty or fifty-five years old. He became so aroused in the work that at the age of 60 he was ordained to the ministry and baptized many into the fellowship of the churches which he served. He baptized one young boy who is now one of the leading preachers in Georgia, a trustee of Mercer University. I refer to Rev. James F. Singleton. Brother Mauldin was never ordained to the ministry but was ordained a deacon and was a great helper to his pastors.

When the orphanage was founded, 24 years ago, he at once began to take an interest in it. He gave liberally to its support. He was elected a trustee of the Connie Maxwell orphanage and was a trustee at the time of his

Many times, in conversation with him during the later years of his life he told me that after he had prayed over it and thought over it, he had decided to put his money into this Memorial Home in memory of his beloved wife.

Why do we build monuments? Sergeant Jasper's monument is built in memory of a heroic deed. The Confederate monument is built in memory of the fallen dead. This monument will stand indefinitely and another one will be erected and so it will go on, providing shelter for the homeless for all time to come, in memory of a loving wife.

Connie Maxwell orphanage has its name and a large part of its property in memory of a beloved daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Maxwell. Mrs. Hetty Green, the richest woman in this country, lost all her property because it was not invested for the Lord nor humanity.

Laban Mauldin saved his property because it was wisely invested for the Lord and helpless orphan children.

The following visitors attended from the Piedmont Baptist Association of which Mr. Mauldin was a member: Rev. H. K. Williams, Dr. W. R. Wyatt, Laban Rogers, Walter Evatt and two little daughters, Lois and Rosebud, Dr. and Mrs. L. L. Jameson, Senator W. T. O'Dell, W. C. O'Dell, Hon J. Ashmore Hinton, Frank Hinton, b. D. Lenhardt and Virgil Rogers.

Keowee Courier, September 13, 1916 Also added:

The day was a memorable one for the orphanage children. The building is already occupied by 25 orphan girls.

There are now 300 children in the institution.

TODAY:


The Mauldin building was called the Community Building. It no longer stands. All the old Cottages were torn down and replaced with buildings to meet the new building codes. Plaques have replaced the old buildings. A gentleman in Greenwood has created drawings from all the old Cottages and has one of the Mauldin Building.

<u>Connie Maxwell Orphanage</u> was founded in 1892 by Dr. John Chappell Maxwell who saw tragedy in his own family:

JOHN CHAPPELL MAXWELL, DR. son of ROBERT MAXWELL (1809-1848) and NANCY BROOKS CHAPPELL (1816-1864) both of Old Ninety-Six District, SC, was born 10 Nov 1837 in Starkville, Oktibbeha, MS, and

died 19 Aug 1899 in Greenwood, Greenwood County, SC buried at Connie Maxwell Cemetery. He married (1) ANN BENJAMIN (BENNIE)
RICHARDSON, daughter of BENJAMIN RICHARDSON (1806-1842) and SARAH R. VAUGHAN (1805-1850). She was born 14 Sep 1842 in Edgefield County, SC, and died 24 May 1867 in Greenwood, Greenwood County, SC buried at Greenwood Cemetery. 503 East Cambridge Street, Greenwood, SC. He married (2) SARA S. RICHARDSON sister of Dr. Maxwell's 1st wife. She was born 25 Dec 1841 in Edgefield County, SC, and died Apr 1902 in Greenwood, Greenwood County, SC buried at Connie Maxwell Cemetery.

Dr. Maxwell married in 1867 to his first wife and lost her and their child, **BENNIE MAXWELL** that same year. He married her sister, Sara, the next year. They had 3 children that died in infancy: 1. **J. LESCLEIR MAXWELL**, b. 1869, d. 1870. 2. **DRURY (MAXIE) MAXWELL**, b. 1871, d. 1874. 3. **ROBERT ERNEST MAXWELL**, b. 1877, d. 1879. All 3 were born and died in Greenwood, Greenwood County, SC; buried at Greenwood Cemetery. They had one child: **CONSTANCE POPE (CONNIE) MAXWELL**, born 18 Sep 1875. She died 28 Apr 1883 from scarlet fever brought home by her father from treating the neighbor's son. The orphanage was named for her.


The nephew of Mr. Laban Mauldin, Walter Evatt, who received the house and lot, located on Smith Street, in which Mr. Evatt lived was the nephew of **BOTH** Laban Mauldin and his wife, Mary Amanda Rogers. **WALTER FLEMING EVATT** son of **WILLIAM HENRY EVATT** (1840-1910) and **PARINTHA JANE MAULDIN** (1846-1895) (Parintha was the daughter of **VARDREY MAULDIN** and sister of **LABAN AUGUSTUS MAULDIN**), was born 06 Oct 1872 in Pickens, Pickens County, SC, and died 08 Aug 1943 in Pickens, Pickens Co., SC buried at West View Cemetery, Easley, Pickens County, SC.
